

STAN WATTS, Head Coach

Brigham Young University has enjoyed an overflowing of basketball fame in recent years, and a healthy share of the credit for such deserving distinctions must be given Stan Watts. In Stan's eyes basketball coaching is a fine art, and he gives it the same artistic devotion. It has been eight years since he took over the coaching duties at BYU, and his teams have been a regular part of the national picture.

In the short span of seven seasons, BYU teams coached by Stan have: (1) won a National Invitational Tournament title, (2) produced two Skyline champions and (3) have yet to finish below third place in the MSAC basketball standings. Coach Watts' well-drilled teams have never lost more games than they have won in any season of play. In fact, Stan is one of seven coaches in the country to win over 100 games his first five years of college coaching.

Stan started his career at Murnay High School (Utah) where he was an all-around star. He continued his education at Weber Junior College where he was a standout performer in the major sports. Stan transferred to BYU in 1936, and before he had graduated two years later, had garnered two letters each in football, basketball, and track. In 1938 he was awarded a trophy as the outstanding athlete at BYU for that year.

Following graduation, Coach Watts was named to the coaching staff at Millard County High School. A second move found him at Dixie Junior College, and later he was appointed head basketball coach at Jordan High. He was at Jordan for only two seasons, but his cage teams tied for the Big Nine championship

both years.

In 1947 he came to BYU as freshman coach of both football and basketball. A year later he was made assitant basketball coach and assistant director of athletics. In 1949 he succeeded Floyd Millet as head basketball coach.

At the present time he is District Seven representative on the NCAA Basketball Rules Committee and a member of the National Basketball Board. He has penned several articles on the game, and his penetrating observation has been put to special use at several basketball clinics.

## BOB BUNKER, Assistant Coach

Last fall Bob Bunker was appointed assitant basketball coach and freshman basketball coach, the latter is

a post he has held for the last four seasons.

Bob is a Utah State graduate (1937) and captained the Aggies' conference football champions in 1936. He also won his share of honors on the USAC basketball court. Following graduation he joined the coaching staff at South Cache High School.

During World War II he served more than five years in the Army. He was commissioned a captain and served overseas in the European Theatre of Opera-

tions.

Bob returned to coaching after the war, taking a post as basketball coach at Preston High School (Idaho). Between 1947 and 1949, Coach Bunker's teams won a state championship (1945) and finished second in the state finals (1947).

Coach Bunker came to BYU in 1949 as assistant football coach to Charles "Chick" Atkinson. He held this post until he was appointed assistant basketball

coach last year.

## The Outlook:

## CATS MEASURE SHORT

The 1956-57 season at Brigham Young is one of those infrequent years when BYU cage fortunes temporarily dip for rebuilding purposes. This anticipated drop below par is accompanied by the usual shortages. There is a shortage of veteran lettermen, of tested personnel, of height, and other ingredients necessary for a front-runner. Consequently the Cougars aren't expected to floor a team that is a threat in the accepted sense.

Coach Stan Watts, who has yet to come up with more losses than wins in seven seasons at BYU, faces some major personnel problems. Graduation took the heart out of the team that finished in second place last year. Powering the Brighams last year were such standouts as Terry Tebbs, Little All-American who averaged 20 points a game; Herschel "Soup" Pedersen, the Y's 6-6 pivot ace; Ed Pinegar, Blaine Anderson, Dave Lewis and other key players. With these boys gone, the Cats must fill a most prodigious void.

Another problem Watts is wrestling with is height. While most of the major college teams in the country are snaring taller players, the Cougar timber seems to be dropping off. It's likely Stan's starting five will average 6-11/2, which indicates the Brighams may be

in for a beating on the boards.

Stan will have only six returned lettermen to work with, and the distribution favors the forward position. John Benson (6-4), Lynn Rowe (6-31/2), Jack Anderson (6-6), and Hal Jensen (6-3) are all concentrated at forward. While there is good depth and height here, Benson is the only regular, and he could be headed for all-conference honors. A tremendous rebounder, Benson holds the current fieldhouse rebounding record with 26 recoveries in one game. Harry Anderson 5-11) and Tom Steinke (5-10) are the only letter winners at guard, and the center spot is without a letterman. Three sophomores will be vying for the pivot.

Another indication of the moulding job necessary is seen in the fact that 10 players or more than half the number on the 1957 roster, are sophomores.

The large turnover in personnel may also change the team's offensive pace. With Tebbs out of the picture, Stan may be forced to modify the fast break that had the Cougars scoring 77.2 points a game (a record high) last season. Without the height to control the boards, the Cats may lean more to a control game.

Coach Stan Watts has never had a team finish below third place in the Skyline standings, but the

exception may take place in '57.

(14)-JOHN GUSTIN, Center, 6-4 210, Sophomore, Springville, Utah — There's a good chance Gustin will be given the nod as first string center for the Cougars. Although shy the height a post man usually has. John works fine sleight of hand and is clever enough to offset this height disadvantage. An all-stater from Springville High School, Gustin spent time in service before returning to BYU last year. Had excellent form as a member of frosh club in '56.



(20) — BRYANT SQUIRES, Guard, 6-0, 180, Senior, Idaho Falls, Idaho — A transfer from Ricks College, Rexburg, Idaho, where he lettered on basketball court for three years. Stan is looking for additional help on guard line, and Bryant may fit into the BYU picture this year. Although not tall or unusually fast, Squires has veteran experience a sophomore club can use.




(21)—JIM THORN, Guard, 6-1, 185, Junior, Springville, Utah—Thorn will be remembered by many BYU fans as a member of the University's National Invitational Tournament championship team of 19 51. Jim didn't see too much action as a sophomore guard, namely because the talent of that squad was knee deep. Jim has seen tour in service since then, but is back to give it another try.

## PLAYER PROFILES

(22)—RUSS JONES, Forward, 6-51/2, 175, Sophomore, Provo, Utah — Three years ago Russ was one of the better prospects on the Y freshman team, but a call to arms interrupted his plans for the varsity. Right now it appears Russ and his 6-51/2 height may be the answer to some Y problems at the forward position. Russ played ball at Provo High, continued his activity on courts while in the service.



(23)—TOM STEINKE, Guard, 5-10, 154, Senior, West Jordan, Utah—If any one player can make the fans forget Terry Tebbs, it's Steinke. Tom is a sensational outside shot, and his past performances prove he can break a team's back with his devastating swishers. A two-year letterman, Steinke tallied 166 points last year. Tom is shortstop on Cougar nine, a great infielder. Attended Granite High School, SLC.



(24) — MELVIN WILKES, Guard, 6-0, 163, Sophomore, Aurora, Utah — Wilkes, a fine all-around athlete, will undoubtedly fit into the guard picture this year. His natural ability won him four basketball letters at North Sevier High School, all-state honors. Has excellent floor speed, can hit well from nearly anywhere. Mel is broad jumper, hurdler, sprinter on Cougar track team.





(25)—DOUG BECK, Forward, 6-2, 170, Sophomore, Pleasant Grove, Utah—Beck will be remembered as the slender chap who won "most valuable player" award at All-Church basketball finals at BYU last winter. Doug sparked Pleasant Grove to M-Men title, caught the eye of Coach Watts. Beck has fine form, but could use a little more varsity experience before getting a shot at upper berth.





(32)—RUSS PETERSON, Guard, 6-0, 170, Sophomore, Franklin, Nebraska—Russ saw plenty of action with frosh two seasons ago, saved his eligibility last year when it appeared he would not see much action on '55 club. Peterson is looking better this year, and season ing may label him for more action. Russ won letters in football, baseball, and basketball in high school.



(33)—JACK CRAVENS, Guard, 6-21/2, 185, Sophomore, San Diego, California—One of the better athletic prospects at BYU, Cravens is great ball handler, has great speed. With little more fire power, he could be great guard. He is first class rebounder, too. Cravens played all sports as prep in San Diego, is reputed to be outstanding baseball pitcher.



(34) — GARY MILES, Forward, 6-4, 195, Sophomore, Montpelier, Idaho—One of the ten sophomores Watts is carrying this year, Miles is progressing well. A center in high chool, G ary has been undergoing schooling as forward. He uses his height well, and a little more polish will put him closer up front. Miles won all-state honors in Idaho.

(42) — BOB RICKS, Forward, 6-5, 185, Sophomore, Stockton, California—A couple of seasons ago Bob was out for varsity squad, but was called on a mission for church. Now he's back and seems to have gained height and ability. Like all the sophomores, Bob can use more experience to good advantage. He is developing a beautiful hook shot.



(35)—ROY THACKER, Center, 6-4, 185, Sophomore, Heber City, Utah — An all-stater from Wasatch High School, Thacker showed fine potential as center on frosh teams last year. With Pedersen gone, Roy and two other sophomores are candidates for varsity post. Thacker has makings of fine center, will porbably start on varsity five this year as experience is his greatest need.



(43)—JOHN BENSON, Forward, 6-4, 190, Junior, Parowan, Utah—Finest all-around player on BYU squad, Benson is headed for best year. Key player on the squad, John is relentless rebounder and defensive tiger, a fierce competitor. A two-year letterman, John has been regular since he played as sophomore. He came to BYU from Parowan High School where he was all-stater. Benson and Tom Steinke are best bets for all-conference honors.

(40) — JACK ANDERSON, Forward, 6-6, 180, Senior, Salt Lake City, Utah-Jack is the tallest man on BYU squad, but will be used at forward rather than center. A transfer from the University of Utah, Jack won letter at BYU last year. Although slender, he has nice touch and hit 48% of his field goal attempts last year. As a prep, Anderson won fame at East High School, SLC.





(44)—KEITH PEDERSEN, Center, 6-51/2, 210, Sophomore, Salt Lake City, Utah—Keith saw a lot of action as a member of the frosh team last year, after returning from service. A brother to Herschel "Soup Bones" Pedersen, Sandy is working hard to play the kind of ball that will win him a spot at center. Team could certainly use his height.

(41) — LYNN ROWE, Forward, 6-31/2, 185, Senior, Spanish Fork, Utah—With Ed Pinegar and Blaine Anderson graduated, Lynn Rowe falls heir to forward position he shared with them last year. Lynn has good form, nice speed, and should figure as threat in this spot. He is two-year letterman, won all-state honors as a prep at Spanish Fork High.





(45) — HAL JENSEN, Forward, 6-3, 195, Senior, Axtell, Utah—Hal came to BYU from Snow Junior College where he led the Badgers to national finals, won all-American honors for himself. He lettered at forward last year for Cougars. Hal has developed fine jump shot. He won all-state honors as a prep at Gunnison High School.
