





COACHING STAFF

STAN WATTS (BYU '38) Head Varsity Coach

Patriarch of the hardwoods in the Intermountain Area is Stan Watts, the ageless mentor who is now in his 14th year as head varsity basketball coach at BYU. Stan is the man behind one of the school's great traditions—colorful, exciting basketball.

In his tenure with the Cougars, Watts has had only two losing seasons, 1960 and 1962. That's quite a record for a coach and a school that likes to tackle

the big names in college basketball.

Stan is one of seven coaches in the nation to win over 100 games in his first five years of college ball, and the trophy case in the fieldhouse contains one NIT championship and three conference championship trophies.

Watts moved onto the scene at BYU in 1946 as freshman coach of both football and basketball. He was named assistant basketball coach and assistant director of athletics. In 1949 he succeeded Floyd Millett as varsity basketball coach.

A native of Murray, Utah, Stan was an outstanding all-around athlete at Murray High School and Weber Junior College before coming to BYU. Before he graduated in 1938, he won two letters each in football, basketball and track for the Cougars, and was named outstanding senior athlete.

As a coach in the prep ranks he tasted success at Millard County High School. He also coached at Dixie J. C. (St. George) before moving to Jordan High (Salt Lake City), where his teams twice tied for the Big Nine championship.

ROLAND MINSON (BYU '51) Assistant Varsity Coach

Newest addition to the BYU staff is Roland Minson, former BYU cage great, who left a job as Denver bank executive this summer to assist Watts with the varsity. Prior to joining the Cougars, Minson was personnel director and assistant vice-president for Central Bank and Trust in Denver.

A native of Idaho, Minson won all-state fame at Idaho Falls, where he was one of finest players the state has ever produced. He enrolled at BYU and was a starter with the varsity for three seasons. He helped spark the Cougars to two league titles and an NIT championship, where he was voted the tourney's MVP. He still holds two major records at BYU.

He obtained a degree in business in 1951, earned a commission as officer in the U. S. Navy, and has served as a game official in the old MSAC.

ALAN "PETE" WITBECK (BYU '52) Freshman Basketball Coach

The glossy win-loss record being compiled by the Cougars' freshman teams is adding luster to the coaching reputation of Pete Witbeck. Last year the Kittens rolled to a 13-1 record, one of the best marks in recent years.

Prior to 1959-60, the year he was selected as freshman coach, one of Witbeck's responsibilities was that of scouting BYU's opponents, a chore he did with dedication.

Witbeck is a faculty member in the College of Physical Education. His main area of instruction has been in the area of skills for majors. As an undergraduate he won a letter as a distance runner, and his coaching experience includes basketball teams in industrial and amateur leagues.

SEASON OUTLOOK

In a few words, BYU's current season outlook is

fogged with uncertainty.

On paper it would appear Stan Watts and the Cougars have the makings of a good team. All of last year's regulars are returning, three transfers have been added to the ranks in an effort to strengthen the ailing post position, and no less than five sophomores have moved up to the varsity squad from last

vear's 13-1 freshman team.

But it will take more than the above to get the Cougars rolling again. The '62 regulars, for instance, had to scramble to cling to a 10-16 record last season. While they could, and should, improve this year, there is no reason to believe they will explode with more than they displayed last winter. The transfers could help, but here again it will take time to fit them into the system. And as far as the sophomores are concerned, they too lack the experience necessary for a consistent, balanced performance.

The losses from the '62 unit were not major. Guards Bob Wilson and Gene Kunz finished their senior years, and center Lloyd Johnson did not return

for preseason practice this fall.

Five of Watts' seven returning lettermen are seniors. They are not wanting for experience, but they do leave a lot to be desired in playing consistency. There is a tendency to run hot and cold, and right now the Cats are looking for steady performers, be they seniors, sophomores or transfers.

Individually the veterans look impressive. But col-

lectively they seem to lack cohesion.

Bruce Burton, who has been in every game since he came to the squad as a sophomore, played steady ball as a 6-4 center last season. He has been returned to the forward position. Forward Bob Skousen, who set a scoring record as a sophomore before his mission call, was the team's number one scorer last year. Jim Kelson and Bill Blumenthal are the other experienced forwards, along with guards Gary Batchelor and Ron Steinke.

The center spot is up for grabs with two transfers and a sophomore vying for the starting role. John Lewis (6-7) and Paul Wyatt (6-6) are the transfers (see opposite page), and Lou Andrus is the soph can-

didate.

Of the sophomores, forward Bob Quinney and guard Mike Gardner seem to be the best equipped. Either could anchor a starting berth. The others could press into the picture, but will have to beat out the more experienced hands.

If a first unit can emerge from the 17-man squad, and if they can play with some consistency the outlook could brighten. But at this writing the team has not as yet jelled. If it does, the Cats could be a powerful force in the first WAC campaign.






