# WELCOME, PRESS

PRESS PASSES — Requests for working passes should be made directly to Sports Information Director a week prior to the game. # **COACHING STAFF**

STAN WATTS (BYU '38) Head Varsity Coach

The dean of basketball coaches in the Intermountain area, Stan Watts is now in his 15th year as head basketball coach at BYU. His following among basketball fans is as strong today as it was over 10 years ago when the Cougars captured the NIT championship, and respect for him among members of the coaching fraternity is just as evident.

An exponent of exciting, fast-breaking basketball, Watts is the force behind the school's great athletic tradition, basketball. Part of this tradition stems from the fact BYU likes to schedule the big names in college basketball.

Stan is one of a handful of coaches in the nation to win over 100 games in his first five years of college ball. It's worth noting that the trophy case in the fieldhouse contains one NIT championship, plus three conference championship trophies.

Stan first came to BYU as a member of the coach-

Stan first came to BYU as a member of the coaching staff in 1946 when he was named freshman coach of both football and basketball. Later he moved up

as an assistant coach, and in 1949 was named head basketball coach and assistant director of athletics.

A native of Murray, Utah, Stan was an outstanding all-around athlete. He attended Weber College in Ogden before coming to BYU where he won two letters each in football, basketball and track. In 1938, his senior year, he was named the outstanding senior athlete.

His coaching career started in the prep ranks at Millard County High School. He moved from there to Dixie College, and finally to Jordan High (Salt Lake City) where his teams tied for the Big Nine Championship twice.

### ROLAND MINSON (BYU '51) Assistant Varsity Coach

The newest addition to the BYU staff is Roland Minson, former All-American from BYU who joined the staff last fall. Minson left a position as a bank executive in Denver a year ago last summer to assist Watts and also teach in the College of Business at BYU.

A native of Idaho, Minson won all-state fame at Idaho Falls where he was acknowledged as one of the finest players the state ever produced. He anchored a starting berth on the varsity his first game as a sophomore, and he helped spark the Cougars to two conference titles and an NIT championship.

He was named Most Valuable Player in the NIT

of 1951

Graduating with a business degree, he earned a commission as officer in the U.S. Navy. He was a game official in the old MSAC and assistant vice-president of Central Bank and Trust in Denver before returning to BYU.


### ALAN "PETE" WITBECK (BYU '52) Freshman Basketball Coach

Pete is making a rapid rise in the coaching profession with one of the glossiest win-loss records around. Last year Witbeck coached the frosh to an II-2 record, and the year before rolled up a I3-I season mark.

Active in the game as player, manager and coach, he was assigned the job of scouting BYU opponents for Watts. He did his job so well that he was moved up as freshman coach in 1959-60. His record as freshman coach speaks extremely well of his efforts.

A member of the faculty in the College of Physical Education, his main area of instruction is in the area of skills for majors.

As an undergraduate he won a letter as a distance runner, and his tasks since that time include coaching teams in the industrial and amateur leagues.



### ROD KIMBALL, TRAINER

Probably more of a fixture in the BYU athletic department than any other person, Rod Kimball has spent all but one of the last 25 years as the Cougars'



athletic trainer. You can tape a lot of ankles, patch up a lot of players, and heal countless wounds in a quarter of a century, and that's just what he has done.

Besides overseeing the training needs of the teams, Rod dispenses humor, wisdom and other morale-building qualities along with physical therapy.

A native of Jordan, Utah, Rod was an outstanding athlete and student leader. He won letters at Utah State and BYU before joining the Cougars as athletic trainer. He has traveled countless miles with the Cougars since joining the athletic staff in 1937.

### SEASON OUTLOOK

By all accepted standards of measuring a basket-ball team, the Cougars' forthcoming crop is just too green to produce the kind of winner's harvest Coach Stan Watts would like to have. True, the 1963-64 team may have many things in its favor, but it doesn't have the experience so necessary to carry it through a rugged 26-game schedule with the poise and sustaining power needed by a championship team.

Looking first at the losses, the Mountain Cats are missing their top five scorers from last year's 12-14 squad. Add to this group four other lettermen with varying playing experience who are now departed, and you get a picture of the rather sweeping loss of veteran players. No less than five of the lettermen not returning were three-year lettermen. These losses are significant enough to keep the Cougars off balance in the season ahead.

But Coach Stan Watts has a knack for getting good mileage out of a team of this kind, and he may have enough talent within the ranks to keep the Cougars respectable.

One of the problem spots of the past has been the ailing post where the Cougars just haven't had the come-through performance of a stellar performer. This problem might be close to solution, however, with the acquisition of John Fairchild, a 6-8 transfer from Palomar Junior College in California. Fairchild isn't beefy, but he has some fine moves, plus fair speed, for a player his size. If he can strengthen the pivot position, the Cougars may move farther, faster.

Filling in the other vacancies will be five returning lettermen, most of whom were reserves last year. Bob Quinney, a 6-5 junior forward, will anchor one spot on the forward line, while the other position will be up for grabs among two other lettermen; Mark Miller (6-4 senior) and Paul Wyatt (6-8 junior); two sophomores, Bill Ruffner (6-5) and Steve Kramer (6-3); plus transfer Jon Stanley 6-6). The latter, a teammate of Fairchild at Palomar, looks like an excellent prospect.

There are only five candidates on the guard line headed by Mike Gardner, a 6-1 junior letterman who was a regular last year. A pair of sophomores, Jeff Congdon (6-1) and Dick Nemelka (6-0), are both in a position to move up to a starting berth. Only their lack of varsity experience can hold them back.

The two other candidates at center behind Fairchild are sophomore Dee Denzer (6-9) and senior Bill Blumenthal (6-5). The latter was a forward, but has been moved to the post.

In summary it might be said that this team can't be labeled a WAC contender because of its youth. But, barring the unforseen, it should prove respectable on anybody's floor.
