

WELCOME, PRESS

PRESS PASSES — Requests for working passes should be made directly to the Sports Information Director a week prior to the game. Women are not allowed in the press box, and the area is reserved for those actually covering the game. Drivers, and others who may accompany those covering the game, will be asked to sit elsewhere.

PRESS BOX — The BYU press box is located on the west side of the playing floor, and is reached through entry of sections AA on the north end of the floor. All parking in the immediate vicinity of the fieldhouse is reserved. Parking permits should be requested in advance.

BROADCASTING BOOTHS — Three radio booths are available, including one reserved for the visiting station which is designated the official station by the visiting team.

SERVICES — Complete game statistics — the box score, shooting percentages, shooting charts, and play-by-play — will be supplied at the half and end of the game.

UNIFORMS — The Cougars will wear white uniforms at home and royal blue on the road.



THE UNIVERSITY

Brigham Young University, the fountainhead of learning for The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints is among the largest church-related institutions of higher learning in the world. Within the University there are 13 colleges, and the graduate school offers the doctoral degree in 14 departments.

The school is located in beautiful Utah Valley on a bench overlooking Provo, Utah, a community of almost 50,000 people. Rugged mountains in the Wasatch range border the valley on three sides, the Utah Lake

forms a border on the west.

Forty-five miles to the north is Salt Lake City, capital of Utah and historic center of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, (commonly called

the Mormon Church).

This is the setting. But the school is more than this. It is a center of higher learning which places special emphasis on spiritual values, on friendly association, and on knowledge. But in any setting, the school would be unique because of its atmosphere.

BYU is a member of the Western Athletic Conference and is consistently a powerful contender in both

conference and national intercollegiate sports.

THE FIELDHOUSE

The home floor for the Cougar basketball team is the George Albert Smith Fieldhouse located near the south end of the University's athletic complex.

Although the Fieldhouse was originally designed as a basketball arena, it is definitely multi-purpose. It is the scene of concerts, devotionals, forums, graduation exercises, and a hundred and one other activities where large audiences need to be accommodated.

Built in 1951, the original structure has since been added upon. A west annex, which provides a spacious area for indoor baseball and track, was added in 1959. The new gymnasiums, courts, locker rooms, etc., on the east end were added in 1964.

Seating capacity for the fieldhouse is 10,200.

For yearly attendance figures and the Fieldhouse single game record, see the records section of the brochure.

The first game played in the Smith Fieldhouse was in Dec. of 1961. Brigham Young defeated Arizona in the inaugural game.

With the completion of the new Activities Center in 1971, the Cougars will move into their new facility, leaving the Smith Fieldhouse to intramural competition.

DR. ERNEST L. WILKINSON UNIVERSITY PRESIDENT

If any one individual can be credited as the driving force behind BYU's dramatic growth, it is Dr. Ernest L. Wilkinson who has served as the president of the University since 1951. It is generally accepted that no other person has played such a significant role in building the school into the institution it is today.

Born and raised in Ogden, Utah, Dr. Wilkinson attended Weber College before transferring to BYU. He was editor of the campus newspaper and was a formidable debater at BYU prior to his graduation in 1921. He pursued his education at George Washington Law School, graduating summa cum laude. He continued graduate work, receiving the degree of juridicial science from Harvard.

He had an illustrious career as a lawyer, and was widely respected in the field. But in 1951 he accepted a challenge in another field, education. Since his appointment, the enrollment has increased many fold, and more than 80 major, permanent buildings have been constructed on campus. In 1965, one of these buildings, the spacious new student activities building was named in his honor.

DR. MILTON F. HARTVIGSEN, COLLEGE DEAN

There is a reason why they call the Cougars' modern athletic complex "Milt's Miracle Mile." The tag put on the Y's extensive facilities alludes to some of the contributions made to the College of Physical Education by Dr. Milton F. Hartvigsen, dean of the college.

A former teacher, coach, principal and superin-

tendent of schools in Idaho. Dr. Hartvigsen came to BYU in 1956 after obtaining his Ed.D. at UCLA. He was a 1930 graduate of Utah State University and obtained his M.Ed. from the Logan school.

Since coming to BYU, Dr. Hartvigsen has helped shape one of the finest athletic complexes in the country. His programs, which have won wide-spread commendation, are the result of his own keen planning, careful design, and forceful administration.

Dr. Hartvigsen serves as chairman of the Athletic Advisory Council, and has served on several key NCAA assignments. He was voted professor of the year at BYU in 1963.

FLOYD MILLET, DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

Nobody—coach, athlete or fan—likes to win more than does Floyd Millet, the University's director of athletics since 1964. And the fact that some of the Cougars' greatest moments in sports have come within the last three years is by no means coincidental.

An all-round athlete and all-conference performer at BYU, Millet won a reputation as one of the hard-nosed set by the time he graduated in 1934. He entered coaching and obtained his M.A. degree from USC in 1939.

He served in a number of coaching capacities—football, track and basketball—and was director of athletics before resigning to enter private business. Even so, he kept a hand in athletics, serving as chairman of the athletic committee of the General Board of the YMMIA. He directed one of the largest athletic programs in the world in that capacity.

COACH STAN WATTS

Entering his 21st year as the Cougar head mentor, Coach Stan Watts has shaped BYU into a basketball empire, while establishing himself as one of the all-

time winningest coaches.

Stan is one of the top 20 basketball coaches in the nation, and his record speaks for itself. After two decades with the Cougar varsity, Watts and his teams have netted two NIT championships (1951 and 1966) and six conference championships; not to mention 384 victories against 224 defeats while playing some of the best competition in collegiate basketball.

WAC Record

Against WAC competition, considered among the country's best conferences, Stan is out in front again with a 43-27 record, for a .617 percentage. This is far ahead of the next best WAC team, New Mexico, with

a 37-33, for .528 percentage.

To know the man and his accomplishments, one must go back to 1949, the year he took over at BYU. The Cougars were regarded as a good basketball school at the time, but it wasn't until Stan took the helm that they won a national tournament. His colorful, fast-break basketball shaped a basketball tradition that is known far and wide today.

TOURS

Part of the fame abroad has come as a result of the team's several tours. While Watts has been the head coach, the Cougars have made three extended tours overseas. The first trip was made in 1950, the year the

Cougars toured South America, came back and won the NIT. BYU returned to Central and South America in 1965, playing some of the best teams to be found in the Latin American countries. The summer of 1967 found the team making an extended tour through the Orient-Pacific .Consequently, the BYU Cougar (or Puma, as it is known in South America) is often identified by fans on foreign courts.

Stan grew up in Murray, a small community just outside of Salt Lake City. An all-around athlete at Murray High, he attended Weber State before enrolling at BYU for junior and senior years. Stan won honors in three sports with the Cougars and, grad-

uated in 1938.

Continuing his endeavors along the athletic lines, Stan began his coaching career at Millard High, where he was head coach in three sports. From Millard he moved to Dixie College as athletic director and head basketball coach. He returned to the high school ranks in 1945 as head coach at Jordan High. Two years later he joined the staff as an assistant coach at BYU. In his early years at BYU he served as head baseball coach, assistant football coach, and track coach. When the basketball post opened at BYU in 1949, Stan was everyone's choice.

SCHEDULE

Stan handpicks his own schedule, and year after year his teams have faced the elite in collegiate basketball. In addition, his teams have played in practically all major tournaments in the country.

Besides coaching, Watts has done very well as a lecturer and author. His book, "Developing an Offensive Attack in Basketball," has sold well since its publication in 1959. He is also a regular contributor to magazines and periodicals on the subject of basketball.

Widely respected within the coaching profession, Stan has been a past member of the National Basketball Board, has been first vice-president of the National Association of Basketball Coaches, and is currently serving as the national president of the organization.

Stan and his wife, the former Emily Kelley, have been married more than 28 years. They have four children: Janice (Mrs. Dennis Jones), Susan, Judy, and Howard.

PETE WITBECK

The 1969-70 basketball season finds Alan "Pete" Witbeck in his sixth year as Watt's head assistant.

Hired initially as a scout for the varsity, Pete joined the BYU faculty in the College of Physical Education in 1955, after obtaining his master's degree from BYU.

Witbeck began scouting for Coach Watts in the late 50's, and was soon after named freshman basketball coach. For several years the frosh teams, under Witbeck, enjoyed unusual success. His last three freshman teams had a combined record of 38-3. His 1964 squad included such players as Craig Raymond, Neil Roberts, Gary Hill, and Jim Jimas, and they averaged 109 points in winning all 14 games.

The following year found Pete joining the Cougar varsity as assistant coach. He thus has moved up the coaching ladder very rapidly, and is highly respected in the profession.

Serving as top recruiter and scout, amongst his other duties, Pete works at his assignments. In 1965 he traveled about 100,000 miles, scouting and recruiting, including a 25,000-mile expedition into South and Central America with the Cougars. Pete improved on that mark in 1967, covering 30,000 miles while touring the Orient-Pacific with the varsity.

As an outstanding paddleball player, Witbeck is able to stay in good condition throughout the year.

A native of Raymond, Alberta, Canada, Witbeck was a distance runner for the Cougar track teams of 1950-52. He lettered for three years in the mile and two-mile.

Coach Witbeck is married to the former Kathy Marshall, and they have two children; a daughter and son.

COURTNEY LEISHMAN

In his first year with the Kitten frosh, Courtney Leishman should continue to bring exciting freshman basketball to the Cougar hardwoods.

After graduating from Utah State in 1958, Courtney launched his coaching career at Malad High, in Idaho. During his thre-year stay in Malad he coached football, basketball, and baseball.

In 1961 he came to BYU where he obtained his master's degree. The next year Leishman accepted the head coaching position at BY High, in Provo, and spent seven seasons there.

While coach of the BY High Wildcats, his basketball teams won or placed second in the region all but one year, even though the school had a relatively small studentbody.

With Leishman at the helm in 1963, BY High won the state class "B" championship, posting a 10-0 record on a regional level and a 22-2 overall mark. His overall basketball record at BY High was 82 wins against 31 defeats.

For the past year Leishman has been serving as an administrative assistant in the Department of Athletics at BYU. He joined the staff when BY High discontinued operations last fall.

Courtney's responsibilities with the freshman are great, as the strength of the varsity in years to come depends largely on the strengths of the frosh.

A native of Wellsville, Utah, Leishman graduated from South Cache High in 1948. He is married to the former Pat Humphreys, and they have three children; Kathy Lee (10), Jearlene (8), and Mike (2).

THE OUTLOOK

"We are green, and we have lost more starters than any other team in the league," says head coach Stan Watts. "Consequently, it may take us longer to reach our peak. But if the pieces should fall into place, we could have as good a team as we had last year."

There's just the right amount of pessimism and optimism in that statement o pu it dea don the mark. The Cougars will be hurting, especially on the forward line, but could emerge with a pretty fair squad. That, of course, remains to be seen.

But loss of three starters, plus the addition of new squad members, should mean the general complexion of the squad will be changed. Watts indicated that the '70 club will be bigger overall, but perhaps slower. As a result, Stan hinted, the Cougars may have to do things a little differently.

One of the different things will be a switch of positions for at least two players. Paul Ruffner, the Cougars 6-9 starting center of last year, will be working at both forward and the post. The forward line of last year, was cleaned out, and it was felt that an experienced player of Ruffner's ability was needed to anchor one of the positions. Ruffner has a good outside shot and can still get his share of rebounds. In the other change, forward Bob Davis, a senior, has been moved to the guard line. In neither case will the Cougars give up anything in the way of fire power.


Even with these changes, Watts will have to shore up the obvious weak spots with newcomers or less experienced personnel.

A pair of three-year lettermen, Kari Liimo (6-8) and Marty Lythgoe (6-4), no longer man the forward line. Ruffner could fill in one spot, but the other is a question mark. A 6-8 junior, LeRoy Maughn, could move in, or transfer Larry DeLaittre (6-7) is anothter possibility. Another candidate is Phil Tollestrup, a 6-6 sophomore, with good potential but not enough experience.

If Ruffner remains at forward, the post will be held down by Scott Warner, (6-6), a two-year veteran who may be relatively short for a center, but lacks nothing in every other respect. But centers often foul out, and the bench strength is a key factor here. A junior, Viekko Vainio (6-9), will be joined by sophomore Clyde Baker (6-7). Neither reserve has much playing experience, but here again the potential seems to be present.

As for the guard line, senior Doug Howard (6-3) has a firm grip on one position. Doug will be starting for the third year, and there is no question about his ability to play the game well. Best bet for the other starting berth at guard is Jim Miller (6-5), a

junior from Las Vegas, Nev. Miller doesn't pump up the shots very often, but his floor game is polished and consistent. Jim, too, is expected to score more frequently this season.

Senior Bob Davis (6-3), may need a little more time to develop his technique as a guard, but he, too, will be heard from. The other candidates include two sophomores, Gary Radunich (6-2), and George Wilson (6-1), plus junior Steve Kelly (6-3). Radunich, in paritcular, displays great promise as a guard. He averaged 21.7 as a freshman, and he is fitting into the varsity very well. Wilson is another player of promise, but shy on the experience.


In all fairness to those five lettermen and three squad members returning, this year's club may be hard pressed to match the efforts of the '69 group. With two more teams in the WAC race, it will become just that much more difficult to get even a share of the title.





1969 REVIEW



As a package, the 1968-69 season came tied with a blue ribbon with more than a few memorable highlights tucked away inside. It contained a little bit of everything, including a share of the WAC championship, a playoff game, and a birth in the first round

of the NCAA regional playoffs.

The Cougars started strong with a win (95-86) over USC at home with Paul Ruffner scoring 25 points in his first game with the Cougar varsity. However, the second game of the season was on the road against a team, New Mexico State, that the Cougars were to battle in the regionals. BYU lost at Las Cruces (65-83), but bounced back to beat Seattle (102-90).

BYU then dropped two games in the Cable Car Classic in San Francisco; 75-79 to San Francisco in the first round, and 75-98 to Houston in the second round. Returning home, the Mountain Cats beat Oregon State (89-64) and Denver (97-67), before losing a tight, tough ball game to Syracuse (73-77).

As one of the entrants in the Far West Classic in Portland, BYU beat California (82-74), then lost to Oregon (74-82), and bounced back to beat Oregon State (69-64). A week later in Palo Alto, the Cougars split with Stanford (95-89 and 78-94). Just prior to the start of WAC play, BYU lost to Utah State (84-91) at Logan.

BYU opened league play with wins over Wyoming and New Mexico at home, then lost on the road to the two Arizona schools. There followed nonleague games against Utah State (113-82) and St. Francis (98-85). The Cougars added to their WAC standing by beating Utah (73-67), Arizona State (102-89), and Arizona (70-66) at home, then lost to Utah

(85-98) in Salt Lake City.

What turned out to be one of the biggest wins of the season came the following week in Albuquerque, when the Cougars defeated New Mexico (77-71). They subsequently lost to Wyoming (69-79), forcing a tie for the championship. A playoff game in Phoenix saw the Cougars beating the Cowboys (95-82), thus winning the right to represent the WAC in the first round of the Far West regionals. They lost to New Mexico State (62-74) on the Aggie floor at Las Cruces.

The Cougars offense averaged 83.0 points per game, and shot well from the field. BYU hit 45% from the floor during the season and was top in the average number of rebounds taken down against op-

ponents.

Twice during the season the Cougars were forced into overtime competition, losing to Oregon in the second round of the Far West Classic and beating New Mexico by six in an overtime period at Albuquerque.

In the statistical department, the most remarkable thing about the '69 season was the fact that a total of six players ended the year with scoring averages in

double figures.

Doug Howard, junior guard from Salt Lake City, captured the scoring title for the team with a 15.4 average. Howard tallied a total of 430 points, just

eight more than teammate Paul Ruffner.

Ruffner carried off rebounding honors, averaging nearly 10 rebounds per game. This is rather unusual, since he shared the duties at center with Scott Warner. Liimo was second in rebounding with nearly nine rebounds per game.

Like most teams, the Cougars fared best on their home court in 1969. They held a 12-1 record at home

and were 5-11 on the road.

Once again the Cougars drew well at the gate. In all, the team played before 231,035 fans, not including the countless thousands who watched them on television.

Kari Liimo scored enough points this season to become the third highest scorer (behind Joe Nelson and Dick Nemelka) in BYU history. His three-year total of 1,156 also produced the third best scoring average over a three-year span, 15.2.


As it was BYU was forced to settle for a 17-12 season record and co-championship of the Western Athletic Conference. It was the third title that Coach Stan Watts and the Cougars have won or shared since the WAC was organized seven years ago.

Reflecting on the season, Coach Watts can find a lot of satisfaction in th fact that the Cougars performed well for a team that was picked as third or lower in the WAC pre-season polls.



If all goes as planned, Brigham Young University's basketball team will have a new home court for the start of the 1971 season.

Plans for a new multi-purpose auditorium on the Cougar campus were announced recently, and construction of the new Activities Center is expected to get underway in the fall of 1969.

The exact size of the new auditorium has not been determined, nor have the architectural plans been finalized. But it is known that the new building will seat better than 20,000.

Site for the new Activities Center is directly north of the Abraham O. Smoot building which is close to the center of the campus. The structure will be located between Phillips Lane and Wyview Village with the west end of the building bordering 500 East.

Dr. Wilkinson said that the new Activities Center will be more than a sports pavilion and music hall. It is being designed to accommodate devotionals, student assemblies, forums, lyceums, convocations, religious assemblies, public gatherings and other activities.

According to preliminary plans submitted by the architects, Young and Fowler Associates, the building will include both bleacher and chair seats. The basketball playing floor, which can be converted into a stage for the other events, will run east and west.

The building will be rectangular in shape with rounded corners. Main entrances to the facility will be on the four corners, and a continuous concourse will encircle the interior. Approximately 60% of the seats will be below ground level, and about 40% will be above ground.

Among other things, the new building will include offices for the basketball coaching staff, locker rooms, and other facilities designed for basketball.

The entire building will be air conditioned for the comfort of the spectators.

"For the first time in recent years," said Dr. Wilkinson, "devotional messages, commencement exercises and all the other major campus events will be held under one roof for all students."

The exact cost will depend upon the ultimate size of the building, and facilities and the equipment to be included. It will be financed through gate receipts, student building fees and public contributions.

Dr. Wilkinson emphasized the fact that none of the costs of the building will come from tithes or other funds of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latterday Saints.

University officials said that in selecting a building site, top consideration was given proximity of campus housing and parking areas. Studies of campus traffic flow indicate good ingress and egress in that area.

The Center will be within easy walking distance of most campus buildings and convenient for automobile traffic from all directions.

When completed, there will be approximately 5,000 parking spaces within 1,500 feet of the Center. A total of 9,000 parking spaces will be available within 2,500 feet of the building.

The building will have a golden buff brick exterior that will blend with the main campus buildings. Sidewalks and ramps outside the Center will ring the entire building, enabling patrons to enter and exit at any point.
