1959 SCHEDULE

PRESS PASSES — Requests for working passes should be made directly to Sports Publicity Office a week prior to the game. Women are not allowed in the press box, and the area is reserved for those actually covering the game. Drivers, and others who may accompany those covering the game will be asked to sit elsewhere. Comp seats will be made available, if the requests are made in advance.

PRESS BOX — The new BYU press box, which is located at the top of the east stands, is just inside the main entrance to the stadium. A parking area just north of the main gates is reserved for working press, and passes will be supplied by request.

BROADCASTING BOOTHS — Four radio booths are available, including one reserved for the visiting station which is designated the official station by the visiting team.

SERVICES — Complete game statistics—lineups, play-by-play, scoring and yardage reports—will be supplied at the end of the game.

TALLY STEVENS



Tally Stevens
BYU's Head Football Coach

Floyd "Tally" Stevens, one of the most admired and respected men in the coaching profession, became BYU's eighth head football coach by appointment January 1. As heir apparent to the post formerly held by Harold W. Kopp, who resigned after last fall's campaign, Tally was the popular choice as the man to guide the Cougars' future football program.

All the attributes found in the model coach are part of Stevens' natural makeup. Tally has a warm, commanding personality; the vigor and vitality of an enterprising executive; and a sound knowledge and grasp of football. Gifted with an instinct for human relations, Tally has already gained the unqualified support of his staff and his players.

A native of Evanston, Wyoming, Tally launched his playing career at the University of Utah. He

played one season with the Redskins before going into the service where he played ball for the Fourth Air Force. Returning to Utah following the war, Tally won conference honors on Ike Armstrong's post-war teams and developed into one of the finest ends in Red-skin history.

Stepping into the coaching profession following graduation in 1949, Tally spent his freshman coaching year at Morgan High School in Utah. From Morgan he moved to East High School in Salt Lake City, where he enjoyed phenomenal success as a prep mentor. In his last four years at East his teams rolled up an unbelievable 33-3-1 record, which included three Class "A" state championships. His overall record within the high school ranks is a glossy 49-11-3.

When Harold W. Kopp was appointed head coach at BYU in 1956, Tally was his first appointment as the staff's senior assistant, a position he held until he was selected as the new head coach.

Coach Stevens is 35-years old and has the massive build of a professional wrestler. He and his wife, Phyllis, have two girls and a boy; Terri Lee, 10; Sandy, 8; and Tally Jr., 5.

OWEN DIXON, ASSISTANT

Senior member of the BYU staff in terms of length of service at Brigham Young University is Owen Dixon, the plucky, hard-nosed coach who directs much of the Cougar's line play. Owen who is charged with the team's defensive line play, was captain and all-conference guard on the BYU team following World War II.

A native of Provo, Dixon is still regarded as one of the finest linemen the school has produced. Winning honors before and after stint in the service, he was respected for his play throughout the conference.

Owen graduated from BYU in 1946 and that fall joined the coaching staff at B.Y. High school in Provo. A constant threat in every campaign, his team won the regional title in 1952. Advancing to the state playoffs, the team was defeated for the state title by one point. He was named freshman coach of the Cougars in 1954, and joined the varsity staff in 1955.



ROLLINS-APOSTOL

CARL ROLLINS, ASSISTANT

One of the new members of the staff, Carl Rollins has been assigned to work with the Cougar backfield. He comes to BYU from Sheridan High School in Wyoming, where his team won both football and basketball championships for the school.



Considered as one of Wyoming's finest contributions to the field of coaching, Rollins is also a great organizer. He organized and for four years served as president of the Wyoming Coaches' Association, and also directed Wyoming's Coaching Clinic.

Born in Lyman Wyoming, Carl attended the University of Wyoming, where he cap-

tained the Cowboy's first championship football team in 1949. He obtained the M.A. degree in education administration at Wyoming in 1950.

In three and a half years spent in the Corps of Army Engineers he advanced from private to captain. He spent 20 months of foreign service in Burma and India.

CHRIS APOSTOL, ASSISTANT

Chris J. Apostol, who will be concentrating on offense, is another of the new assistants added to the staff by Coach Stevens. Chris was formerly head coach at Ogden High School where his team won 11 straight victories last season to win the Class "A" championship.

A native of Bingham, Utah, Apostol won all-state honors in football, lettered in basketball and baseball, and was studentbody president at Bingham before enrolling at Utah State University in 1946.

Chris was a member of Aggie varsity line for three seasons, and joined the Ogden High athletic staff in 1950. He succeeded Cluff Snow as head football coach in 1953. His overall prep record is 44 wins, 13 losses and two ties, including four league championships.



MITCHELL-KIMBALL

HAL MITCHELL, ASSISTANT

Hal Mitchell, 28-year old Californian who captained UCLA's 1951 football team, joined the Cougar staff this spring as varsity coach. He will also direct the freshman football activities for the University.



Earlier this year Hal resigned his coaching job at William S. Hart High School in Newhall, Calif., where his 1958 team won 11 straight before they were defeated in the semi-finals of the CIF "AA" playoffs.

A gifted player with outstanding leadership abilities, Mitchell captained his high school, college and service teams during his career as a player. He was unanimous choice as a lineman on the All-Coast selections in 1951, also captained the UCLA rugby team.

Hal joined the New York Giants in 1952, playing as a regular tackle for nearly two seasons. He spent two years in the Army as an officer, was named to the All-Army squad, and also was chosen MVP in Army football in 1954.

In three years of high school coaching his teams had two undefeated league seasons.

ROD KIMBALL, TRAINER

Veteran member of the staff is Trainer Rod Kimball, who has served all but one of the last 21 years in this position. Long in experience and know-how. Rod is among the most popular men on campus.

A native of Jordan, Utah, Rod was an outstanding athlete and student leader at Jordan High. He won letters in two sports at Utah State and BYU in his college days, and in 1937 he was chosen as trainer for Cougar teams. Since then he has traveled countless miles with BYU teams, conditioning athletes and attending their ills.



EVALUATION

OFFENSE: Switch to multiple this year. Spring game proved the boys can move the ball well with this system. Half a dozen backs very much at home in single wing. McFarlane, Hubbs, Ringwood can be expected to propel running game, while Dunn, Belnap and R. Startin will handle most passing. Cougars will use unbalanced line.

DEFENSE: Flanks are a bit vulnerable, but opponents will have trouble cracking line elsewhere. Passing defense much the same.

EXPERIENCE: Will vary with position. Very strong in backfield positions, interior line. Less than last year's by comparison.

SIZE: Generally, somewhat smaller than last year. Backs rather light, only one or two near 190 pounds.

DEPTH: Not as deep as last year. Outside of only one letterman at center, there are two or more in each position. Qualitatively, not as strong as last year.

SPEED: Excellent string of running backs, speed on line will be about the same.

RUNNING: Left halfback position is loaded with fine ball carriers in McFarlane, Hubbs, McGinn, and Lewis. LeGrand Young should measure up as top fullback for pounding line. Jacobsen has best speed among fullbacks. Ringwood and Gifford best at right half. Quarterbacks Dunn and Belnap are above average ball carriers.

PASSING: All quarterbacks, tailbacks, and occasionally a halfback.

KICKING: Dunn and Jacobsen will double on PAT and kickoff chores. Dunn is one of top punters in the league, will be spelled off by Hubbs, R. Startin, and Dale Grant.

PROSPECTUS

Change is bound to produce some uncertainty. A new coach, a new staff, and a new system have replaced those of last year. And while the atmosphere is a decidedly healthy one, there are still too many unknown elements involved to nail down anything more than a good guess.

Last year, with one of the most talented teams in BYU history, the Cougars came within a hair of bringing the school its first football championship. But an unexplained fold in the season finale with Wyoming dropped the Cougars into third place.

Gone from the '58 team are 19 lettermen who have either graduated or gone on church missions. This group includes R. K. Brown, all-conference end; fullback Weldon Jackson (best rushing average in the nation last year) two three-year lettermen at center; and three lettermen at right end.

The manpower situation, as far as incoming talent is concerned, will not offset the losses, since there are only two or three transfers and only a sprinkling of talent from the freshmen. The frosh, who had a 1-3 record last fall, are small in number and do not pose any particular threat to the experienced varsity.

But there is still enough talent left behind to keep the Cats in the thick of the first division race. There are six regulars from last year's first team, including a strong interior line and plentiful supply of backs.

A line anchored by Lonnie Dennis (all-conference in '58), Paul Eckel (most underrated guard in the league), and John Kapele (all-conference last two seasons) should cheer the heart of any coach.

In his first year as head coach, Tally Stevens has chosen the multiple offense as the best vehicle for the talent available. There are a number of players in the BYU backfield who are particularly adept in the single-wing, and the most will be made of this situation.

The breaks the Cats found in their '58 schedule have now been reversed. This year BYU will have to meet Utah, Wyoming and New Mexico on the road, and this alone will put the Catamounts in a hole even before the season starts. Arizona, Fresno and Arizona State and other teams the Cougars will face away from home.

It summing up the prospectus, it must be admitted that there are definite soft spots at both ends and center. But there is also enough manpower to stay in the thick of the race. The 1959 team should be able to finish somewhere in the first division.

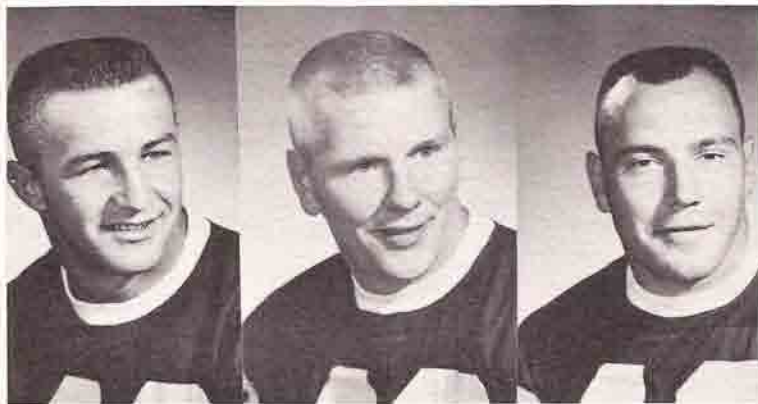

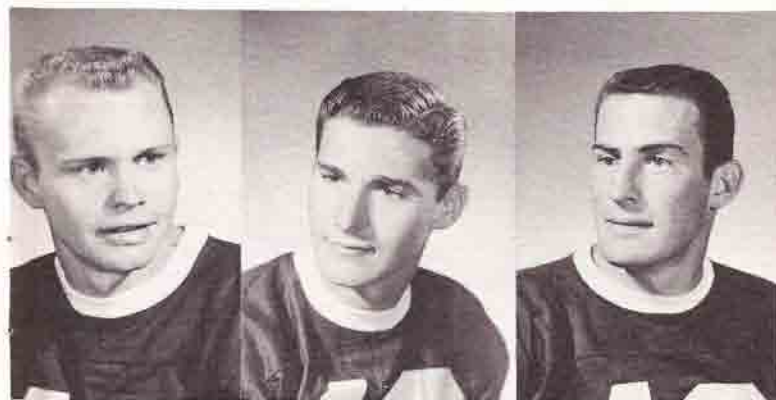

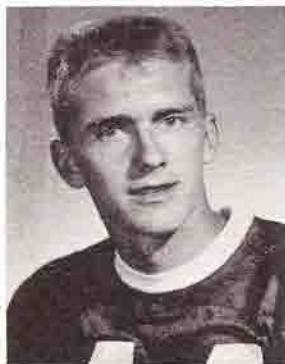
