# **PRESS NOTES**

PRESS PASSES—will be provided members of the working press only. Women and children are not allowed in the press box. Drivers and others who accompany the press to the game will be exted to sit elsewhere. Comps will be provided if requested well in advance of the game. Visiting press will be issued their credentials after the arrival in Provo. If requested but not received they will be at the will call window.

PRESS BOX—is located in the West stands. Quicker entry will be through sections G and F or GG and FF. The main press section is on the main level, while radio and scouts will be located on the top level.

PRESS PARKING—is located in parking area No. which is immediately south of the West stands. Cars should enter from Canyon Road (the north-south artery) or from 1650 North (east-west artery). These passes will be issued along with the working passes.

PRESS SERVICES—will be provided at all games.
Complete game statistics—lineups, play-by-by-scoring and yardage reports, team and individual statistics—will be supplied. Post-game interview with the coaches will be arranged on request.



# TOM HUDSPETH

"You've got to crawl before you learn to walk," Tommy Hudspeth told B.Y.U.'s followers soon after he was named head coach over a year and a half ago. And after one season with the Cougars, it would appear B.Y.U.'s football program is headed in the right direction. Admittedly, the Cougars are far from the goal Tommy has in mind for B.Y.U. football, but

it is evident he has added materially to the program.



But the road ahead is loaded with challenge, and the 34-year old Kansas product is displaying the vigorous approach and dedication that has marked him as one of the "comers" in the coaching profession.

Born in Cherryvale, Kans., on Sept. 14, 1931, Tommy

J. Hudspeth attended high school in Afton, Okla., where he won all-state honors. He enrolled at University of Iulsa, where he was captain of the freshman football team. Tom emerged as a standout player in Tulsa's golden era of football. He played quarterback and defensive halfback on the Hurricane team that led the nation in total offense in 1951. A regular for three years at Tulsa, Tommy played a major role in the Hurricanes' conference championship conquests in 1950 and 1951.

As a senior he capped his career at Tulsa by captaining the Hurricanes in the 1953 Gator Bowl. It was during his undergraduate days at Tulsa that Hudspeth was coached by Darrell Royal (Texas) and Jack Mitchell (Kansas), who were then coaches at the Ok-

lahoma school.

A leader off the field as well, Tommy served as president of his senior class. He graduated from Tulsa in 1953 with a B.A. degree in physical education. He has 36 hours toward his master's degree in

counseling.

Tommy began his coaching career at Norman High School soon after graduation. There followed a two-year stint in the U.S. Air Force as a commissioned officer. Discharged as a first lieutenant in 1955, he resumed high school coaching, this time at Tulsa Central. His team at Central posted a 6-2-1 record, and the following year he was appointed freshman coach at Tulsa under Bobby Dobbs.

In 1961 Dobbs was named head coach of the Calgary Stampeders, and Tom, then an old-timer of 28, went with him as an assistant. The Stampeders were conference contenders for the three years he

was with them.

Tommy married the former Ruth Ann Sandmire in 1953. They have two sons: Max (10) and Phil (6).

# COACHING STAFF

#### CHRIS APOSTOL (UTAH STATE '50)

The senior member of the staff in terms of service at B.Y.U., Chris joined B.Y.U.'s football staff in 1959. Chris' assignment is with the Cougars' defensive backs.

Apostol launched his athletic career at Bingham High School (Utah) where he was to win all-state honors and serve as student body president. He enrolled

at Utah State where he played as a lineman.

Following his graduation from Utah State in 1950, he joined the staff at Ogden High where he coached for nine seasons. His record as head football coach was 44-13-2, and his last team at Ogden won the state class A title (11-0 record and seven shutouts).

Chris is married to the former Marva Funk, and they have five children: Kristine, Konn, Kip, Kurt and

Kami.

#### LAVELL EDWARDS (UTAH STATE '52)

A native of Provo, and a former all-state football player from Orem, LaVell Edwards enrolled at Utah State. His football record at the Logan school included two years as varsity captain and two years as an all-conference lineman (center and linebacker).

Following graduation in 1952, he was called into the Army for two years at Fort Mead, Maryland. He returned to Utah in 1954 to coach at Granite High School in Salt Lake City. He joined the staff at B.Y.U. in 1961, and his present assignment is defensive line coach.

LaVell is married to the former Patti Covey, and they have three children: Ann (9), John (7), and James (3).

#### FRANK FABRIS (TULSA '53)

A teammate of Hudspeth's at Tulsa, Frank joined B.Y.U.'s football staff a year ago last spring. The offensive line is his main football assignment.

Born in Macon, Ga. 34 years ago, Fabris proved to be a gifted athlete, and he added hard work to this gift. At Tulsa he was a defensive end, winning all-conference mention and playing in the Gator Bowl.

Moving into the high school coaching ranks following graduation, Frank achieved phenominal success. His record at Vidalia, Ga., was 19-1; Cartersville, 8-2; and Rossville, 55-12-3. In 1962 his Rossville team had a 10-0 record and captured the state AA title. Frank was subsequently named coach of the year in Georgia.

Frank is married to the former Bettye Jane Hendrix, and they have two sons; Robert (11) and Jon (7).

# COACHING STAFF

#### EARL LINDLEY (UTAH STATE '54)

Another member of the coaching staff to come from Utah State is Earl Lindley, offensive backfield coach for the Cougars. Earl, a native of Wellsville, Utah, came to B.Y.U. from Idaho Falls High School in 1961.

An all-stater from South Cache High School in northern Utah, Earl enrolled at Utah State. An allconference halfback in 1953, Lindley was the na-

tion's leading scorer the same year.

Launching a playing career with the pros following his USU graduation in 1954, Lindley played four years with the Edmonton Eskimos in the Canadian League. But an injury shortened his career in the pro ranks, and in 1958 he took over as head coach at Idaho Falls.

Earl is married to the former Marilyn Jensen, and they have four children: Greg (II), Teresa (9), Lance

(4) and Corey (1).

#### WAYNE STARTIN (BYU '59)

The newest member of the staff, Startin joined the football staff a year ago. His main chore with the Cougars is that of freshman coach, although he will also handle some scouting assignments.

A native of Murray, Utah, Wayne was judged one of the finest quarterbacks the state has ever had.

He was all-state as a junior and senior.

In 1956-57-58 he quarterbacked the Cougars, and one of the highlights of his career was a fourth-quarter touchdown pass that defeated Utah in 1958.

Wayne began his coaching career at Olympus High (1959-62), then took over as football coach at Skyline High School in Salt Lake City before coming to B.Y.U.

Wayne is married to the former Janice Nelson, and they have four children; Bryant (10), Judith (8),

Nancy (6), and Jill (1).

# STAFF

#### ROD KIMBALL, TRAINER

A kind of patriarch of athletic teams at B.Y.U., Rod Kimball has spent more than 26 years in his assignment as team trainer. As the father figure for

the Cougars, Rod's duties range from cut man to moulder of team morale.



Besides being one of the most popular men on campus, Rod is perhaps the most traveled man in Provo. Besides the usual game junkets with the teams, Rod has been to Europe four times, South America twice, and Hawaii once.

A native of Jordan Utah, Rod was an outstanding athlete and student leader in college. He is a former LDS bishop, and he and his wife, LaNeve, have 12 living children.

#### GAME BROADCASTS

For the 15th consecutive year Radio KSL in Salt Lake City will carry all of B.Y.U.'s football and basketball games. Broadcasting the live, play-by-play of

the game will be announcer Paul James, veteran sportscaster in the Mountain area.



KSL is a 50,000-watt, clear channel station designated as the only official station to carry B.Y.U.'s games. The station is located at 1160 on the radio dial.

James, who is one of the better known television and

radio sportscasters in the West, recently joined the KSL, KSL-TV staff after more than ten years with another Salt Lake City station.

A graduate of the University of Utah, where he attended on a four-year Rotary Scholarship, James majored in speech and English.

KSL's studios are located on Social Hall Ave. in downtown Salt Lake City.



# THE STADIUM

It will take a long time for the newness to wear off B.Y.U.'s new football stadium which was inaugurated at the first home game of the 1964 season. Over 33,000 fans were on hand the night of Oct. 2, 1964 to watch the Cougars contest New Mexico in the inaugural game. The Lobo won, 26-14.

Built at a cost in excess of \$1,500,000, the allsteel stadium has 26,812 permanent seats. Temporary bleachers will permit crowds in the neighborhood

of 30,000.

Ground was broken for the stadium in October, 1963, and a year later the structure had been completed and was ready for use. Total area involved in the stadium project is 36.5 acres, over 20 acres of which is being developed for parking facilities.

Chair seats have been installed in the West stands, and there are 4,758 chair seats in all. The towering stadium lights are nearly 16 stories high. When the six stands of lights are turned on, roughly 576,000 watts of light are directed on the playing field.

The playing field is circled by a rubberized asphalt track, one of the finest anywhere in the country. The all-weather track is composed of 30 percent rubber and 70 percent asphalt.

The structure, which will serve for activities other than football, contains dressing rooms for the players, rest rooms, concession areas, storage areas, etc.

Aside from the towering lights, the most conspicuous part of the stadium is the press box. The first level of the press box will serve sportswriters, statisticians, wire services and public address. The second level will house radio broadcasters, telecasters, scouts and movie cameramen.

# THE OUTLOOK

Stated briefly in Tommy Hudspeth's own words, the Cougars are expected to be, "generally improved, but face a tougher schedule." This summation may, or may not, mean B.Y.U. will improve on the 3-6-1 record of last year, Hudspeth's first at the Cougar helm. The Mountain Cats are being dogged by too many uncertainties that could send them in a change of direction.

A quick look at the schedule indicates B.Y.U. will be bucking a curious slate this fall. Of five conference games on tap, four will be played away from home. Utah, a team the Cougars have always had trouble with, is the only WAC draw at home this season. In addition, the Cougars will face Oregon

and Utah State on the road.

At the conclusion of the '64 campaign, it was apparent to Hudspeth and members of his staff that some stockpiling would be necessary for the seasons ahead. Consequently the coaching staff took to the recruiting trail in an effort to find some talent with which to beef up the team. The result was about 15 new players, the biggest cache of transfers in the school's history. Some of the newcomers came to B.Y.U. with service ball credentials, most of them from the San Diego Marines. Others, like Glen Gardner, the junior college All-American lineman from Dixie College, came from two-year schools.

Spring practice provided the Cougars with an opportunity to blend in the new talent with the 20 or so returning lettermen from the 1964 squad. The returnees from last fall, of course, will have to carry the load, but the newcomers will fit into vital areas

where help is needed.

Of those positions found wanting, the tackle slots seem the most vulnerable. There are only two returning lettermen, Monte Jones and Dennis Brewster. Both are top-rated tackles, but proven reserve strength is missing. The ends, too, are shy experinenced personnel with only two lettermen from last year's squad returning. There are three lettermen listed among the guard candidates.

If any single thing can be singled out as the Cougars' main shortcoming it is experience. There are only two seniors in the entire backfield (tailback Kent Nance and fullback Henry Nawahine). Of the nine returning lettermen in the backfield, seven are

juniors.

However, the players who put the "go" in last year's offense are, for the most part, all returning. Virgil Carter, the starting quarterback in all of the Cougars' games last year as a sophomore, should be a little stronger, a little more poised this fall. Last year Carter was ranked 13th in the nation and second

in the WAC in total offense (1,542 yards rushing and

passing).

Another great back who won his spurs as a sophomore is fullback John Ogden, the WAC's leading rusher with 770 yards. Ogden and tailback Kent Oborn both placed relatively high in the NCAA figures last year. Oborn gained some recognition for his punt and kickoff returns.

Before the season is very old, the Cougars should be hearing from newcomers such as John Greene, the fine wingback from San Diego City College; quarterback Barney Williams; split end Phil Odle; plus a

few of the better sophomore prospects.

Speed, especially in the backfield, is one of the Cougars' major needs at this writing. A little more zip in the backfield would give the team even more offensive punch. Last year B.Y.U. ranked 22nd in the nation in total offense, averaging more than 300 yards per game.

Knee operations resulting from injuries last fall may cost B.Y.U. the services of two great linemen, offensive center Glenn Shea and linebacker Mel Olson. Any further injuries to a team as raw and inexperienced as this could put the Cougars in a hole

this fall.

# TEAM ANALYSIS

TEAM SIZE: Linemen will be a little bigger than last year, especially at tackle. The backs will be about average, centers and ends the same.

TEAM SPEED: Once again, only average, at best. No blazing speed in the backfield. This could be one

of the club's shortcomings.

FORMATION: Slot-T, wing formation with inside, outside belly series. The Cougars would like to get 50-50 split in running and passing game. Last year they threw an average of 20 passes a game.

DEFENSE: Hudspeth and staff will use the monster

defense with squirming secondary.

WEAKNESS: Pure inexperience; lots of newcomers in form of transfers and sophomores, only a handful of seniors available. No schedule breaks in 1965 with four of five league games on the road.

STRENGTHS: Some great personnel in Virgil Carter, John Ogden, Dennis Brewster. Defensive game should be stronger this fall. Potential strength in newcomers.

CONSENSUS: Hudspeth's season should be another step forward; if not a giant stride, a measurable one. His teams are noted for their hit and hustle.

# BY POSITION

ENDS: One of the Cougars' weaker positions in recent years, still thin. Split end Phil Odle could be top receiver of Carter passes. About the same.

TACKLES: Dennis Brewster and Monte Jones only returning lettermen, but reserve strength a question mark. Newcomers like Glen Gardner will help, and this position has good size. About the same.

GUARDS: Grant Wilson, Bill Mitton and Bill Wanosik are only returning lettermen. Transfer Dave Duran will help, but this isn't one of B.Y.U.'s stronger positions. Weaker.

CENTERS: Excellent potential here until Mel Olson and Glen Shea were sidelined. Gordon Jennings, a former end, will handle offensive chores. Weak-

OUARTERBACKS: Virgil Carter will be backstopped by transfer Barney Williams, with only sophomore help behind them. Although paper thin, this spot should be a bit stronger.

TAILBACKS: Good backs in Kent Oborn and Kent Nance. All the reserve strength is first-year help,

however. About the same as last year.

WINGBACKS: Steve Ogden is returning lettermen, and will be pushed by transfer John Greene. Reserve strength untested. Position should be stronger.

FULLBACKS: John Ogden was tops in league last year, will be backed by letterman Henry Nawahine. Only sophomores behind them, so position should be about the same.






