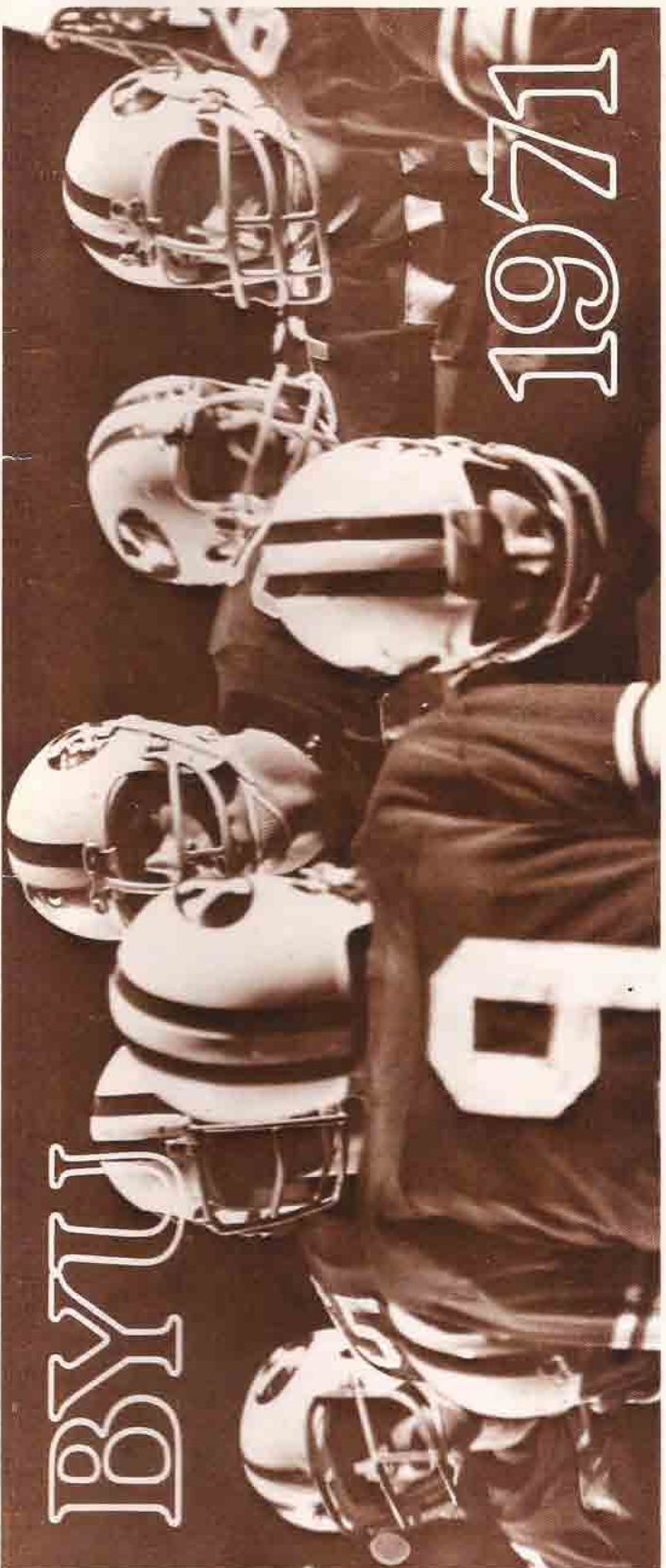

76 — Gordon Gravelle, Offensive Guard, 6-5, 245, 22, Senior, Walnut Creek, Calif. A first team All-American pick on at least two preseason selections (Kick-Off and Playboy), Gordon Gravelle ranks among the nation's finest offensive linemen . . . hurt in the first game (North Texas State) last season, Gravelle was granted another year of eligibility as a hardship case . . . says Coach Hudspeth of Gordon: "He is the best offensive lineman to play for me in my seven years at BYU, and his potential in the game seems unlimited." . . . he has been clocked in a 4.8 in the 40-yard dash, which is rather amazing for a player of his dimensions . . . born 6/12/49, Gordon was a guard at Ygnacio Valley High in Concord, Calif. . . came to BYU where he was a starter his sophomore year as offensive tackle . . . he was WAC honorable mention as a junior . . . few players his size move as well . . . one BYU ball carrier calls him a "running back's dream" because he opens the hole and clears the path for the runner . . . Gordon has a brother with the San Diego Chargers . . . Gordon and his wife Molly were married prior to the start of the '70 season . . . he is a business administration major.

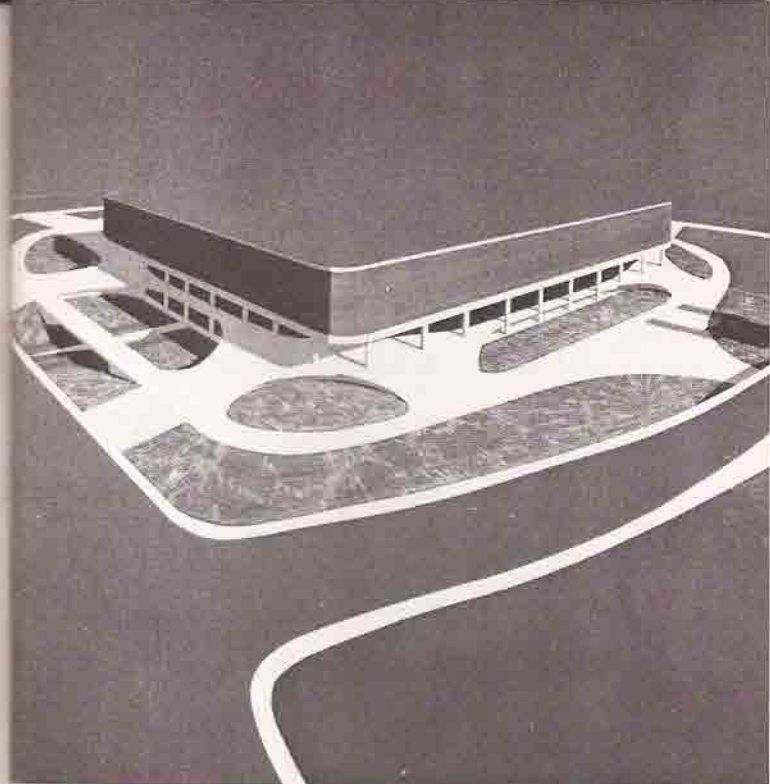

THE UNIVERSITY

Brigham Young University, the fountainhead of learning for The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints is among the largest church-related institutions of higher learning in the world. Within the University there are 13 colleges, and the graduate school offers masters degrees in 85 fields and doctoral degrees in 40 fields.

The school is located in beautiful Utah Valley on a bench overlooking Provo, Utah, a community of almost 50,000 people. Rugged mountains in the Wasatch range border the valley on three sides, the Utah Lake forms a border on the west.

Forty-five miles to the north is Salt Lake City, capital of Utah and historic center of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, (commonly called the Mormon Church).

This is the setting. But the school is more than this. It is a center of higher learning which places special emphasis on spiritual values, on friendly association, and on knowledge. But in any setting, the school would be unique because of its atmosphere.

BYU is a member of the Western Athletic Conference and is consistently a powerful contender in both conference and national intercollegiate sports.

THE OUTLOOK

If a football team were a four-wheeled machine operating on a combined mixture of hope and optimism, BYU would get a lot of mileage out of this year's club. But neither hope nor optimism alone will get the Cougars where they want to go this fall.

Most of the experts, after taking a long look at the Cougars, are of the opinion that Hudspeth's squad is locked-in with the also rans this time around.

But the experts have been fooled before. In fact, the year they won the WAC title (1965), BYU was everybody's pick for last place. And life in the post-Virgil Carter years has been an in-then-out proposition. The Cougars finished third in the WAC in '67, then fell back to 2-8 year in '68. The following year they bounced back to tie for third, and then last year were reduced to a 3-8 record.

Fair warning, then, this is the alternate year.

Here is the prospectus for the coming campaign:

Quote from Tom: "If we can avoid the injuries that thinned us out last year, and if we can get a steady performance — especially with our passing game — at quarterback, we will be a better team than we were last year. We have some fine talent, but we still haven't the depth we need".

Major Losses — Of the 21 lettermen not returning the most notable is Chris Farasopoulos, two-time all-conference defensive back and kick-return specialist. Chris set two NCAA records last year, and he was a standout in the secondary. The defense will be the hardest hit by graduation; people like Gerald Meyer, Ted Nelson (leading defensive player), Mike Jacobsen etc. Even so, the losses can't be considered severe.

Returning Lettermen — Good help here with a total of 23 lettermen, about half of them regulars, back in the fold. The group includes three starters in the backfield (quarterback Brian Gunderson, tailback Pete VanValkenburg, and fullback Dave Coon) and split end Golden Richards. All of the above mentioned will be juniors this fall. Of the top six receivers of last year, five will be returning; hence the need for a good passer.

Formations — The Cougar staff has discarded the I-slot for Houston's Veer-T formation. It is believed that the Veer will provide the same kind of running game as is found with the Wishbone. "The difference between the two," explains offensive coordinator Dave Kragthorpe, "is the Veer gives us a greater opportunity for passing, since there are two wide receivers to go with the split backs." Defensively, the Cougars will go with the Oklahoma 4-3 formation.

Rushing — Given more speed, the Y's running game could be a real threat. But the breakaway runner is missing. Even so, last year's leading rusher, junior Pete VanValkenburg, is back, along with all-around back Dave Coon. Hawaiian scatback Pili Saloune (5-9, 170) looks like the starter at fullback, and Ron Wilson, a junior running back, has the quickest start of any player on the team. Still something of a question mark in the pre-season look.

Passing — If there is a key to the '71 season for BYU, it is here. Brian Gunderson, who took over at mid-season and did a creditable job, is returning for his junior year. He was 31 for 74 attempts, averaging 13.0 yards per completion. Sophomore southpaw Dave Terry was a redshirt last fall, and he is a candidate. But the best bet at this point is a transfer, Bill August from Chabot J. C. in California. August is a fine passer, and the Cougars have cadre of top receivers; split end or flanker Golden Richards, who led all receivers as a sophomore (36 catches for 512 yards); two-year letterman Bill Miller; tight end Dan Bowers; and running backs Dave Coon, Pete VanValkenburg.

Offense — A Cougar strong point in season's past, it slipped to the bottom of the WAC last year. In part, BYU's inability to move the ball may have stemmed from the fact that the Cougars' already-thin squad was decimated by injuries. Things should improve, however, since the Y's offensive line is one of the team's strong points.

Defense — Both the line and backfield will feel a loss in experience. But the replacements (players like sophomore Keith Rivera and transfer Earl Burrell,) will strengthen with each game. Jeff Lyman, an all-conference candidate, anchors a fine group of linebackers. Three juniors and a sophomore are expected to start in the secondary. Dan Hansen, the weak safety who led the WAC in interceptions as a sophomore, is the only secondary regular returning. Thin and not too experienced.

Kicking Game — It's a one-man show with Joe "The Toe" Liljenquist doing both the punting and place-kicking, not to mention his assignment as defensive end. Joe averaged 40.3 per kick last fall, but will improve on that in '71. He led the team in scoring (9-10 in PAT and 11-16 in FG) with 42 points, the same total he had as a sophomore. One of the Cougar strong points, as long as Joe is around.

Summary — If the Cougars can crank up their offense, develop some Saturday heroes, and stay well, the Cougars can expect some significant gains over last year. This team will have built-in surprises for opponents.

55 — Steve Facer, Offensive Guard, 5-11, 230, Senior, Malad, Idaho. Singled out as the top scholar-athlete on the football team by the national Cougar Club, Steve ranks high in both areas . . . he had a 3.84 gpa for spring semester, and has an overall 3.25 . . . he is also versatile . . . was a tailback during his high school days at Malad, Ida. . . played middle guard on defense in his sophomore year at BYU . . . was a regular at guard last season . . . two-year letterman . . . P. E. major.

37 — Jeff Lyman, Linebacker, 6-3, 233, Senior, Salt Lake City, Utah. Jeff may be the hardest hitting linebacker in the WAC, and there are those who say he is . . . in any case, Jeff ranks as the best . . . he was tied with Joe Liljenquist for third defensive stax last year, both had 233 . . . Jeff had 47 unassisted tackles tackled seven players for a loss, recovered four fumbles and intercepted two passes . . . definite all-WAC candidate . . . born 8/21/50, he was all-state at Skyline High in Salt Lake City under H. G. Linford . . . he won eight letters in three sports . . . a two-year letterman . . . General College.

22 — Golden Richards, Split End-Flanker, 6-1, 178, Junior, Salt Lake City, Utah. Heralded as a future great, Golden didn't disappoint the fans his sophomore year . . . he led the Cougars in pass receiving with 36 catches for 512 yards, and was fifth among WAC receivers . . . he also worked in the safety with Chris Farasopoulos on punt and kickoff returns, averaging 23.0 on the latter . . . best game was against New Mexico when the Cougars were using the shotgun . . . 11 receptions for 119 yards, one TD also a good game against Arizona with six for 114-yards . . . fastest player on the squad . . . an outstanding all-around athlete who elected to go with football, Golden is credited fith a 9.6 in the 100 and 18.5 in 180-yard low hurdles . . . also an excellent broad jumper . . . named All-American by **Coach & Athlete** . . . all-state at Granite High in Salt Lake City . . . very scrappy, will battle for the ball . . . born 12/31/50 . . . business major.

11 — Dan Hansen, Weak Safety, 6-2, 195, Junior, Torrance, California. Outstanding as a sophomore, Dan led the conference in pass interceptions (eight for a total of 108 yards on returns) and was ranked 12th nationally in that department . . . in overall defensive statistics, Dan was second only to Ted Nelson in BYU's ranking (50 unassisted tackles, 10 pass deflections) with a total of 234 points . . . born 3/8/48 an outstanding all-around athlete . . . won all-CIF honors at North Torrance High as a quarterback and teammate of Chris Farasopoulos . . . also played defense . . . had three touchdowns, two pass interceptions in one game (Mira Costa) . . . played both freshman football and basketball (was "sixth man" on good team) at BYU and was redshirted in '69 . . . married the former Donna Wilson of Torrance . . . drafting major.

84 — Joe Liljenquist, Defensive End-Kicking Specialist, 6-2, 220, Senior, Ogden, Utah. What can you say about a player who led his team in scoring for two seasons and is ranked among the top four defensive men on the squad? . . . such is the case with Joe "The Toe" Liljenquist, Mr. Consistent . . . in his two years with the varsity he has scored a total of 84 points (42 points each year) . . . Joe's record in PAT kicking is 30 for 34, and is 18 for 31 with field goal attempts . . . he set a school record of five field goals in one game (against Colorado State as a sophomore) and his last kick with 17 seconds remaining in that game won it 22-21 . . . this was his first game as a varsity player . . . Joe also helped in the '70 opener with 22-yarder against North Texas State which won the game . . . he has a 45-yard field goal . . . while place-kicking is his forte, Joe also punts . . . he averaged 50.0 yards in five punts against CSU, had a longest of 75 yards last year (same game) . . . his '70 average was 40.3 (37 for 1,489 yards) ranked him 25th in the country . . . anchors defensive end position, led linemen in defensive statistics . . . tied for third overall with 233 points . . . led team in tackle-for-loss with 14 for the year . . . definitely a strong all-WAC candidate . . . a three-sport and All-American performer at Ogden High . . . born 10/2/50 . . . P: E: major with near 3.00 average for spring semester.

NEW PRESIDENT

Brigham Young University's new president is 39-year-old Dr. Dallin H. Oaks, who assumed office Aug. 1, 1971. President Oaks, former professor of law at University of Chicago, replaces Dr. Ernest L. Wilkinson who served as president of BYU for a period of 20 years (1951-1971).

He began an illustrious legal career as law clerk to the Chief Justice of the United States, Earl Warren. A year later he entered private law practice in Chicago (Kirtland, Ellis, Hodson, Chaffetz and Masters). In 1961 he became associate professor of law at Chicago University, and was associate dean from May 1962 to January 1963, serving as dean during the last three months of this period. He was also Assistant States Attorney of Cook County (1964) and visiting professor of law at University of Michigan Law School (1968).

From January through June 1970 he was on leave of absence to serve as legal and research adviser to the Bill of Rights Committee of the Illinois Constitutional Convention. He became executive director of the American Bar Foundation (1970).

Pres. Oaks has been co-editor, co-author, or author of four books dealing with subjects of church and state, trust law, operation of criminal courts in Chicago. He has also authored about 30 articles in leading periodicals and other magazines.

An active member of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, he served as first counselor in the presidency of the Chicago Stake (district) and was formerly mission president in Chicago Stake.

He married June Dixon of Spanish Fork, Utah, and they have five children; Sharmon, Cheri, Lloyd, Dallin and TruAnn. The eldest daughter, Sharmon, will be a freshman at BYU this fall.

DR. MILTON F. HARTVIGSEN, Dean

The key administrator and planner in BYU's recent athletic growth is Dr. Milton F. Hartvigsen, dean of the College of Physical Education at BYU. HEAD FOOTBALL COACH

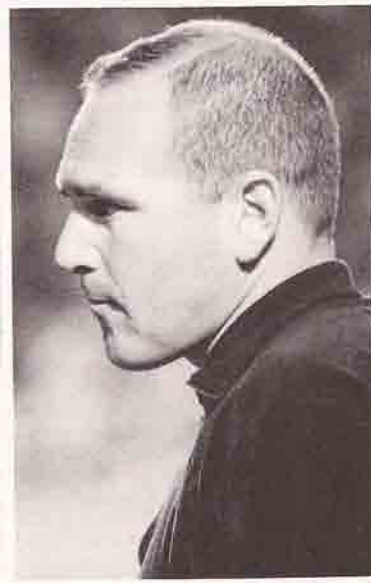
Tom Hudspeth is a believer in the theory of relativity; i.e., that time is a relative thing. Tom, who is now in his eighth season with the Cougars, has learned that time has a tendency to whiz by while you are winning, and drag while you are losing. And Tom should know—he's experienced both, traveling up the mountains and into the valleys.

In seven seasons as head coach of the Cougars his overall record stands at 34-36-1. His peak years were in 1965 (the first conference championship in the school's history), 1966 with an 8-2 record, and third place finishes in 1967 and 1969. Last year's 3-8 finish was a "valley" year.

Throughout it all, however, Tom's teams have produced more than their share of excitement and entertainment. "We'll entertain you," has been a Hudspeth maxim, as fans will attest. Tom's early teams were powered by a wide-open offense, and the more recent teams have reflected strong defensive play. Sometimes they put both together.

Here are the vital statistics on the 39-year old former Kansan:

Last Meeting: Sept. 12, 1971 in night game at Provo (Att. 23,496), BYU 10-7. In the season opener for both schools, all the scoring came in the first half. BYU got the first break, a four-yard NTS punt that gave the Cougars the ball on the NTS 15. Six plays later Kip Jackson plunged over from the one. The Eagle TD was setup by a fumbled punt return by Chris Farasopoulos on BYU 11. Four plays later Nap Landry scored from four yards out. Joe Liljenquist provides the winning margin, a 22-yard field goal with one-minute left in the first half.

Dan Hansen played a great game defensively for BYU with 10 unassisted tackles, 11 assists.

Outlook: The question seems to be, can the Wildcats be as tough without departed QB Bill Dickey? KSU was 6-5 last year with Dickey. It's expected that the Wildcats will have a more balanced attack this fall with some fine running backs. Only three starters returning on the defensive unit, however. Despite pre-season forecasts, look out for the Wildcats this fall.

Last Meeting: Sept. 24, 1965 at Provo, Utah (Att. 26,335). Final score: BYU 21, KSU 3. All of BYU's touchdowns came on Carter-to-Oddie passing plays, none of them very long. But it was the rushing of fullback John Ogden (112 yards on 24 carries) that made the big difference. KSU's only score was a 47-yard field goal by Jerry Cook in the third quarter.

No. 4 - New Mexico

October 1 - 7:30 at Provo

Location: Albuquerque, New Mexico; Enrollment: 18,061; Conference: Western Athletic; Nickname: Lobos, Wolfpack; Colors: Cherry and Silver; Stadium: University (30,000), 1960; Athletic Director: Pete McDavid;

Head Coach: Rudy Feldman (UCLA '54) 4th year, 11-19; **Sports Information Director:** Eddie Groth (505) 277-2026; **1970 Record:** 7-3 (2nd in WAC with 6-1); **Series Record:** BYU 10-9-1. An even series since it commenced in 1951. The Lobos broke a string of five losses last year with easy 51-8.

Outlook: After a faltering 0-10 start three years ago, Coach Feldman's teams have made a steady improvement. Now it's up, up, and away! The Lobos loom as the chief threat to WAC favorite and defending champion, Arizona State, NMU will have 38 lettermen returning, plus. This is essentially the same team that finished second in the nation in rushing last year, second only to Texas, Rocky Long, Fred Henry, Nate McCall and all will definitely be heard from this fall.

Last Meeting: Nov. 14, 1970 at Albuquerque (Att. 17,856). After a wait of five years, the Lobos found sweet revenge against BYU. Starting with a safety (BYU's Brian Gunderson was tackled in the end zone) in the first quarter, the Lobos gave the Cougars their worst licking ever under Hudspeth. The Cougars used a shot gun offense, completing 27 of 52 passes attempted. But the Cats were minus-96 yards in rushing (a school record). Meanwhile the Lobo ground attack was ripping off 377 yards rushing. No contest after the first few minutes of play.

No. 5 - Utah State October 9 - 1:30 at Logan

Location: Logan, Utah (22,333); **Enrollment:** 8,532; **Conference:** Independent; **Nickname:** Aggies, Utags; **Colors:** Navy Blue and White; **Stadium:** E. L. "Dick" Romney (20,000) 1968; **Athletic Director:** Frank "Buss" Williams; **Head Coach:** Chuck Mills (Ill. St. '50); **Sports Information Director:** Ken Mitchell (801) 752-4100; **1970 Record:** 5-5; **Series Record:** 26-17-3, Utah State, in a series dating back to 1922.

Outlook: The Cache Valley club is ready to explode with 34 lettermen returning, plus a solid supply of transfers, etc. There's a great passing duo in junior quarterback Tony Adams and split end Bob Wicks. Another standout is versatile John Strycula. If they can get past Kansas State and Nebraska the Aggies should be able to post victories most of the way through '71. They were 5-5 last season.

Last Meeting: Oct. 24, 1970 at Provo, BYU Homecoming (Att. 21,562). Final Score: BYU 27, USU 20. Underdog BYU, with seven sophomores in its starting offensive unit, upset the Aggies in a homecoming contest played on a cold, wet field. The Ags' Tony Adams threw three touchdown passes, plus a two-point conversion. But Joe Liljenquist kicked two field goals (28 and 27 yards) in the fourth quarter to preserve the win, after linebacker Ron Tree had plucked an Aggie fumble out of the air and returned it 22 yards for a TD. Pete VanValkenburg scored two touchdowns on one-yard plunges.

No. 6 - Wyoming October 16 - 1:30 at Laramie

Location: Laramie, Wyoming (23,143); **Enrollment:** 8,400; **Conference:** Western Athletic; **Nickname:** Cowboys, Pokes; **Colors:** Brown and Yellow; **Stadium:** Memorial (27,000); **Athletic Director:** Glenn J. Jacoby; **Head Coach:** Fritz Shurmur (Albion, Mich., '54) 1st year; **Sports Information Director:** Bill Young (307) 766-2256; **1970 Record:** 1-9 (tie for 7th); **Series Record:** 23-15-3, Wyoming, in a series dating back to 1922. The Cowboys have given up only three victories to BYU since World War II.

Outlook: Fritz Shurmur moves from assistant to head coach in place of Lloyd Eaton who is now assistant athletic director. The Pokes were 1-9 last year, and they will need help this fall to forge a comeback. A total of 34 lettermen are returning, 17 of them starters. The Cowboys are on their way back, but it won't happen overnight.

Last Meeting: Oct. 31, 1970 at Provo (Att. 22,551), cloudy but mild. Final score: BYU 23, Wyoming 3. Two NCAA career records were set (Bob Jacobs' field goals, Chris Farasopoulos on kick-returns) in a game marked by Wyoming mistakes. BYU intercepted six passes and recovered three fumbles and Brian Gunderson passed for two touchdowns. Wyoming's only score was a 22-yard field goal by Jacobs, the 37th of his career.

No. 8 - Texas-El Paso October 30 - 1:30 at El Paso

Location: El Paso, Texas; **Enrollment:** 12,500; **Conference:** Western Athletic; **Nickname:** Miners; **Colors:** Orange and White; **Stadium:** Sun Devil (30,000); **Athletic Director:** George McCarty; **Head Coach:** Bobby Dobbs (Army '46) **Sports Information Director:** Dick Mullins (915) 542-5254; **1970 Series:** 6-4 (4th); **Series Record:** 3-5-1, UTEP, first game in 1946.

Outlook: The Miners could be the dark horse in WAC this fall. Quarterback Bill Craigie is back (138 of 309 passes) along with receiver Ed Puishes. UTEP's top six runners are also back, and only five of the 22 regulars of last fall are missing. The experience is there, and

backup strength will make the Miners even tougher this fall.

Last Meeting: Sept. 26, 1970 at Provo (Att. 27,408). Night temperatures in the 50's. Final score: UTEP 17, BYU 0. This is one game the Cougars would like to forget, since it was the first time a Hudspeth team was shutout at home. Two fumbles in the first 10 minutes of play setup two UTEP scores, and they coasted home from there. Bill Craigie passed 44 yards to Billy Taylor on the first play after a fumble. Jeff lost five fumbles in the game.

No. 9 - Arizona State November 6 - 7:30 at Tempe

Location: Tempe, Arizona; **Enrollment:** 29,000; **Conference:** Western Athletic; **Nickname:** Sun Devils; **Colors:** Maroon and Gold; **Stadium:** Sun Devil (50,000); **Athletic Director:** Fred Miller; **Head Coach:** Frank Kush (Mich. St. '53) 100-30-1; **Sports Information Director:** Nurdy Jensen (602) 961-3659; **1970 Record:** 11-0 (7-0, 1st in WAC); **Series Record:** 11-3, Arizona State.

Outlook: A solid favorite to repeat as WAC champion, ASU will have 22 lettermen returning from the squad that was undefeated and won the Peach Bowl last year. The main task for Coach Kush is to find a replacement for quarterback Joe Spagnola who won 25 of 28 games he started. There is plenty of individual talent in the likes of Monroe Eley, center-tackle Mike Tomco, defensive end Junior Ah You, defensive back Windlan Hall, etc. Even before the season starts, the Sun Devils should be ranked among the nation's top twenty.

Last Meeting: Oct. 17, 1970 at Provo (Att. 18,288). Final Score: ASU 27, BYU 3. The Sun Devils used a series of long, spectacular plays to crush the Cougars. ASU's Steve Holden returned a punt 94 yards (a stadium record). Windlan Hall returned an interception 29 yards, and J.D. Hill ran 69 yards for a TD. ASU rushed for 305 yards, too. The Cougars' only score came on a 38-yard field goal by Joe Liljenquist.

No. 10 - Arizona November 13 - 1:30 at Provo (HC)

Location: Tucson, Arizona; **Enrollment:** 26,500; **Conference:** Western Athletic; **Nickname:** Wildcats; **Colors:** Cardinal Red and Navy; **Stadium:** Arizona (40,000); **Athletic Director:** Dick Clausen; **Head Coach:** Bob Weber (Colorado State '58) 7-13, 3rd year; **Sports Information Director:** Frank Soltys (602) 884-1919; **1970 Record:** 4-6 (2-4, 5th place); **Series Record:** 6-5-1, Arizona in a series dating back to 1936.

Outlook: The Wildcats were ranked second in the WAC last year in team defense, and that could be the key to the '71 outlook. With 32 lettermen returning, including 16 of 22 starters, there's good chance the Cats move up the ladder. Anchoring the defense is Mark Arneson, an All-American candidate.

Last Meeting: Oct. 10, 1970 at Tucson, Arizona. Final score: Arizona 24, BYU 17. A controversial ruling on a fumble near the goal line was one of the big events in last year's game. Had the ruling gone in BYU's favor, the game might have ended as a tie or in BYU's favor. The Wildcats ran up 520 yards total offense, and it might have been higher, had the Cougars not made four interceptions. Golden Richards caught six passes for the Cougars. The score was tied at 10-10 at halftime.

No. 11 - Utah November 20 - 1:30 at Provo

Location: Salt Lake City, Utah; **Enrollment:** 23,000; **Conference:** Western Athletic; **Nickname:** Utes, Redskins; **Colors:** Crimson and White; **Stadium:** Ute Stadium (30,000); **Athletic Director:** Bud Jack; **Head Coach:** Bill Meek (Tenn. '43); **Sports Information Director:** Ron Fessenden (801) 322-6445; **1970 Record:** 6-4 (4-2, 3rd in WAC); **Series Record:** 37-5-4, Utah, in series dating back 1922.

Outlook: Even though other teams have been picked higher than the Utes, they are in a good position for a shot at the WAC title. A total of 31 lettermen from the 6-4 team are returning, headed by quarterback Scooter Longmire. They also have Fred Graves, Jay Hardman and a goodly number of other offensive backs. The weak point could be the offensive line. Seven regulars are back on the defensive unit. Ace in the hole is Marv Bateman, the great kicking specialist and leading scorer in '70 with 45 points.

Last Meeting: Nov. 21 1970 at Salt Lake City (Att. 20,165). Final score, and it was close: Utah 14, BYU 13. It was one of those could-a games . . . could-a gone either way. It was Dave Walker day, and the senior from Salt Lake City (a) returned an interception 46 yards for a TD, and (b) returned a punt 85 yards for another six points. That's all it took, even though BYU held a 10-0 lead at one point in the game. Joe Liljenquist kicked two field goals (26 and 32 yards) and added a PAT. Utah fumbles—five, all recovered by BYU—helped keep the Cougars in the game.

HISTORICAL

Although football—or what was known as football—was played at the Academy around the turn of the century, it was terminated soon after because of a player fatality. It was not resumed on campus as an intercollegiate sport until 1922.

In the 46 seasons that followed (no games during World War II) the Cougars had 10 coaches and played over 400 games. The Cougars haven't had any undefeated seasons, but Ott Romney had an 8-1 season (1932), and Tom Hudspeth logged an 8-2 record in 1966.

Several ball players have won national recognition, or have set national records that still stand. One of the most recent was Eldon "The Phantom" Forte, tailback who was named to several All-America teams in 1962.

A player of more recent vintage is Virgil Carter, outstanding quarterback in the mid-sixties (1964-66) who still holds three major NCAA records. Carter is credited with more yards total offense (6,354 yards) than any player in college football history. His 68 touchdowns is also a career record, and his 599 yards in a single game is also an NCAA high.

Another former player who is legend at BYU is Phil Odle, the Cougars' classy split end (1966-68) who is ranked as the number three NCAA receiver (181 receptions for 2548 yards) of all time. The most recent addition is Chris Farasopoulos, the Galloping Greek, who set two NCAA records in punt and kickoff return yardage last year.



Two all-time greats for the Cougars, Virgil Carter and John Ogden, amassed 8,717 yards total offense between them in three varsity years (1964-66).

'70 IN REVIEW

It's hoped that last fall's campaign wasn't a harbinger of things to come in football's new era of the swinging seventies. For BYU the 1970 season produced a lot of things: injuries for the players, frustration for the coaches and a general feeling of disappointment for many who had expected more. The final mark at the end of the year was 3-8. But it is pretty well agreed that the Cougars did very well in the face of crippling injuries and subsequent personnel changes.

Statistically, as might be expected under the circumstances, the Cougars lagged most of the field in the WAC. They were last in total offense (264.8 yards per game), last in rushing offense (117.2 yards), and fifth in passing (123.5). Defensively, the Cougars were sixth in the overall defense (359.8 yards per game), sixth in rushing defense (200.6), and fifth in passing defense (159.2).

BYU was seventh in scoring offense (12.5 points per game), and fifth in defense against scoring, giving up 23.2 points per game.

Individually, **Dan Hansen** led the conference in pass interceptions with eight for 108 yards. **Joe Liljenquist** was fourth in punting with 41.0 average, and **Golden Richards** was fifth in pass receiving (37 for 512 yards).

In national statistics, **Liljenquist** was listed among the top 25 in the nation in punting, and **Dan Hansen** was ranked 12th in pass interceptions.

First team all-conference honors were won by offensive tackle **Ken Serck**, defensive tackle **Gerald Meyer** and defensive halfback **Chris Farasopoulos**. A Second team berth went to **Dan Hansen**, defensive safety.

Here is a week-by-week summary of last fall:

Sept. 12 — BYU 10, NORTH TEXAS 7 at Provo (1-0). Two gallant goal line stands in the fourth quarter saved the win for BYU in the opener . . . first score was set up by NTS four-yard punt that went out of bounds on the 15-yard line . . . NTS's score followed a bobbled punt return by Chris Farasopoulos . . . but Chris made up for it with 78-yard punt return that set up Liljenquist's 22-yard field goal, the winning margin . . . Len Dunlap intercepted three BYU passes . . . offenses for both teams were weak . . . NTS had only 145 yards total offense . . . All-America candidate Gordon Gravelle was injured in this opener, missed the rest of the season.

Sept. 19 — WESTERN MICHIGAN 35, BYU 17 at Kalamazoo (1-1). The BYU-WMU series came to an end with the Broncos capitalizing on five fumbles and three pass interceptions . . . one interception went 100 yards for TD, another for 42 yards and TD . . . it was 28-3 at halftime . . . BYU had statistical edge, 434-316 in total offense . . . but lost flanker Bill Miller to injuries . . . list of injured regulars jumped to five.

Sept. 26 — TEXAS-EL PASO 17, BYU 0 at Provo (1-2). The first time BYU was shutout in own stadium as offense just couldn't get started . . . Miners took first of five BYU fumbles and turned it into TD . . . second fumble set up another TD and UTEP had 14-0 lead in first quarter . . . two goal line stands by BYU kept the score down.

Oct. 3 — SAN DIEGO STATE 31, BYU 11 at San Diego (1-3). A crowd of 36,000 watched the Aztecs bomb BYU, 31-11, to extend their unbeaten string to 26 games . . . Farasopoulos was the Cats' main threat with 177 yards in punt and kickoff returns . . . the defensive line did a good job in the first half, holding SDS to minus-four yards in rushing . . . Pete VanValkenburg had 50 yards rushing . . . the Cougars third straight loss . . . Dennis Watford and J. C. Hyder join injured corps on sidelines.

Oct. 10 — ARIZONA 24, BYU 17 at Tucson (1-1). The Cougars' offense started rolling again, but Arizona's was better . . . Kip Jackson rushed for 98 yards and two touchdowns . . . there was a controversial

decision following a BYU fumble in the third quarter . . . ball was awarded to Arizona on its own one-yard line . . . Golden Richards caught six passes for 114 yards . . . Cougars fourth straight loss . . . 32,500 watched night game . . . Jackson injured for season.

Oct. 17 — ARIZONA STATE 27, BYU 3 at Provo (1-5). A decided underdog, BYU was taken out of the game with three long TD plays . . . 94-yard punt return by Steve Holden, 29-yard pass interception by Windlan Hall, and 69-yard rush by J. D. Hill . . . not a really good game for ASU, however . . . BYU's three points came on 38-yard field goal by Joe Liljenquist in first quarter . . . linebacker Ted Nelson of BYU was named co-lineman of the week in WAC for his play . . . fifth straight setback . . . opening of deer season kept crowd at 18,288.

Oct. 24 — BYU 27, UTAH STATE 20 at Provo (2-5). At last, but it was very close . . . not until Chris Farasopoulos intercepted a pass on the goal line with 11 seconds left in the game was it decided . . . plenty of rain, snow and cold . . . quarterback-poor in the first half of the season, BYU called on sophomore Brian Gunderson, who hadn't played a competitive game in five years, to start at QB . . . Brian was 6-for-12, called an excellent game . . . but it was the rushing of Pete VanValkenburg that was the difference (178 yards on 36 carries) . . . other heroes: Joe Liljenquist with nine points including two field goals, linebacker Ron Tree with intercepted fumble that he returned for a TD, and Chris Farasopoulos with two pass interceptions and 135 yards return yardage . . . the Cats find new life . . . VanValkenburg was named WAC back of the week.

Oct. 31 — BYU 23, WYOMING 3 at Provo (3-5). A lot of historical import in this one . . . first time Hudspeth team was able to beat the Pokes, two NCAA records set (Bob Jacobs in career field goals, Chris Farasopoulos in punt and kickoff return yardage) . . . Gunderson again engineered the win, throwing two TD passes . . . Coon rushed for 67 yards, Liljenquist kicked a 38-yard field goal, Richards caught passes for 99 yards . . . Wyoming's only score came on 23-yard field goal by Jacobs . . . Tree injured in practice and missed the balance of the season . . . this was BYU's only league win . . . BYU was to tie Wyoming for seventh place in WAC.

Nov. 7 — COLORADO STATE 26, BYU 9 at Fort Collins (3-6). Lawrence (The Clutch) McCutcheon rushed for 207 yards, 125 of them on 15 carries in the first half . . . score was 24-3 at intermission . . . The Clutch's 39 carries was new school record . . . CSU had 11-game losing streak in WAC prior to win over BYU . . . Pili Saluone led Cougar ball carriers with 56 yards on 8 carries.

Nov. 14 — NEW MEXICO 51, BYU 8 at Albuquerque (3-7). Pressed by increasing injuries, the Cougars decided to use the shot-gun offense against the Lobos . . . it backfired . . . although the Cougars completed 27 of 52 attempts, the Lobos used a powerful running game (377 yards on 75 carries) to subdue BYU . . . too much Sam Scarber, Nate McCall, Fred Henry and Rocky Long . . . the game was great from spectator standpoint, but BYU's overall rushing yardage was minus-96 . . . the 51 total by New Mexico was the most ever scored against a Hudspeth team . . . and it was BYU's first loss to NMU since 1964.

Nov. 21 — UTAH 14, BYU 13 at Salt Lake City (3-8). It was close, and it could have salvaged much of the season for BYU, but the minus Dave Walker the score might have been 13-0 . . . the Ute senior scored one TD on a 45-yard pass interception return in the first half . . . then returned a punt 85 yards to provide balance of Utah's TD scoring . . . Ute Marv Bateman averaged 51 yards on five punts . . . VanValkenburg, who had 89 yards rushing, scored one TD, and Joe Liljenquist added one PAT and two field goals (26 and 42 yards) for the balance of the scoring for BYU . . . Utah tumbled five times, lost them all . . . a corker of a game for the season finale.

THE CONFERENCE

The Western Athletic Conference will enter its tenth year this fall, having established itself as one of the finest leagues in the nation. The eight member institutions extend over a broad region of the Rocky Mountain-Southwest (six states in all), and the league has its headquarters in Denver, Colorado.

Commissioner for the WAC is Stan Bates, former director of athletics at Washington State, who became the league's third commissioner on July 1, 1971. He replaced Wiles Hallock, who left to become executive director of the Pacific Eight Conference.

The Western Athletic Conference came into being on July 1, 1962. There were six charter members; Arizona, Arizona State, Brigham Young, New Mexico, Utah and Wyoming. Two members, Colorado State University and Texas-El Paso, were added to the group on July 1, 1968.

Conference headquarters are located in Denver, Colo., with offices at 1515 Cleveland Place (the Denver-Hilton). Director of Information for the WAC is G. David Price, who joined the staff in 1967. John Adams is supervisor of officials.
