Western Athletic Conference

The Western Athletic Conference began its 19th season with the start of the 1980-81 school year. However, things have changed since its formation in 1962. On July 1, 1978, two charter members of the league, Arizona and Arizona State, left the WAC for the Pac-Ten. On the same day, San Diego State made its official entry on the scene, upping the league membership to seven members. Then, University of Hawaii became the eighth member on July 1, 1979.

Another change occurred this past year. Air Force Academy entered the WAC on July 1, 1980, while Nevada-Las Vegas is waiting final vote of the President's Council.

All three of the new members possess good athletic programs and represent three of the fastest growing areas in the country.

Now that the league has expanded to nine members, the WAC stretches from the pine tree forests of Utah, Colorado, and Wyoming to the desert southwest of West Texas and New Mexico, to the coastal surfs of California and Hawaii.

Founded on July 1, 1962, the charter members included Arizona, Arizona State, Brigham Young, New Mexico, Utah, and Wyoming. In September 1967, Colorado State and Texas-El Paso were added to make the WAC an eight-team league.

Based in Denver, Colorado, the WAC is led by Commissioner Joe Kearney, who assumed his current position in 1980. Kearney, former athletic director at Arizona State, Michigan State, and Washington, is the fourth conference commissioner since the formation of the league.

Nordy Jensen serves as director of information for the WAC; John Adams is supervisor of football officials, and Irv Brown is supervisor of basketball officials.

Brigham Young University

Dedicated to the education of the whole person, Brigham Young University in Provo, Utah, provides a quality education with emphasis on adherence to Christian ideas.

BYU is sponsored by The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints (Mormon) and, with its enrollment of 26,000 students, is the largest church-related and private university in the nation.

More than 1,250 full-time faculty, 67 percent of whom hold doctorates from colleges throughout the United States and several foreign countries, instruct in 150 subject areas in the University's 13 colleges and graduate schools.

BYU is on a three-semester system (4-4-2-2) with Fall and Winter semesters each being four months long and the summer semester being divided into Spring and Summer terms.

The 646-acre BYU campus is at the western base of the 12,000-foot-high Wasatch Mountain range and is situated in Utah Valley, 45 miles south of Salt Lake City.

Roughly 95 percent of the student body is Mormon; non-Mormons come from over 25 other denominations. Around 22 percent of the student body is married.

Admission is open to those of any race, color, creed, or national origin, provided they meet the

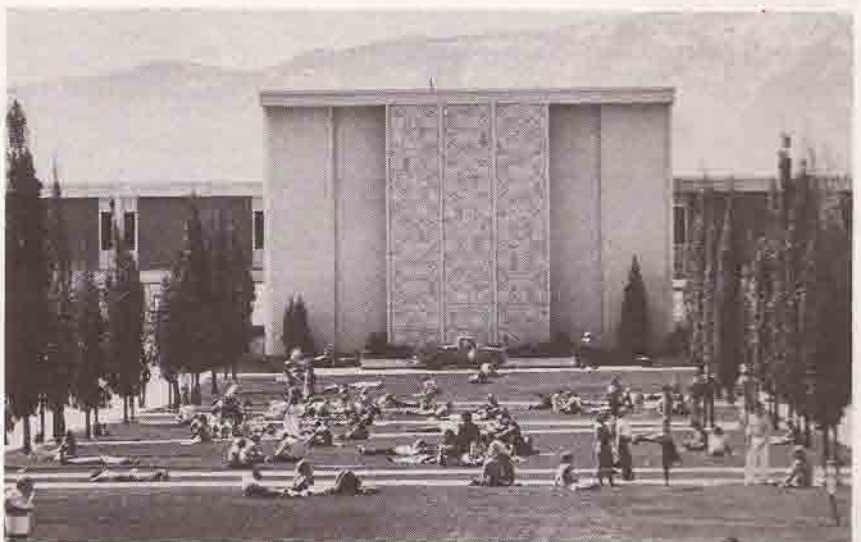
University's academic requirements and their personal behavior conforms to the standards of the LDS Church.

American Indians comprise the largest ethnic group on campus, numbering over 500 and representing 61 tribes. There are Chicanos, Blacks, Orientals, and others, all applying their own particular perspective of life to their academic programs and providing a rich, intercultural learning atmosphere for all students.

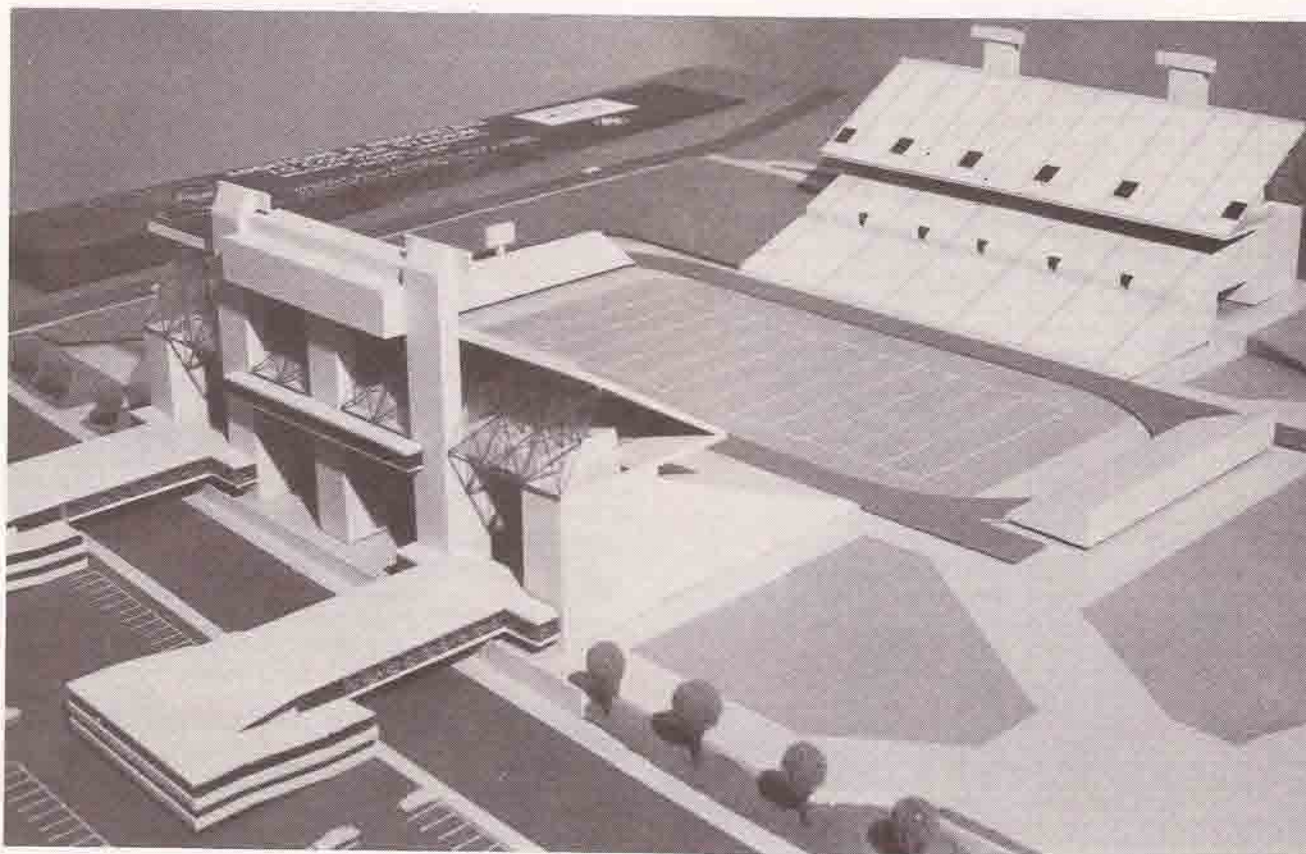
The BYU Provo campus is perhaps one of the most cosmopolitan in the nation, enrolling students from every state (30 percent from Utah) and more than 70 foreign countries. Over 8,000 students are bilingual since many have served missions abroad for the LDS Church.

In addition to the regular student body on the Provo campus, BYU serves other students at the BYU-Hawaii Campus in Laie, Hawaii, through the Study Abroad programs supervised by BYU faculty members in Austria, England, Israel, and Hawaii, and through the BYU Division of Continuing Education which enrolls more than 350,000 in its courses each year.

The University is supported from funds appropriated by the LDS Church and from tuitions and gifts.



Stadium Ready For Expansion



Proposed expansion of the BYU Stadium (see model above) could be ready for the Cougars in fall of 1981.

Regardless of how the '80 football season finishes, it is already assured some historical import as the year the Cougars launched a campaign for stadium expansion. If all the pieces drop into place, there is a good chance BYU will be playing in an expanded 50,000-plus stadium beginning in the fall of 1981.

Permission has been given by the Board of Trustees to move forward with plans to increase seating in BYU Stadium, and construction plans for two 9,000-seat decks on the east and west sides of the field have already been approved by Provo City. However, supporters of the stadium addition will have to raise \$12 million to finance the project. The fund drive, too, is already underway, and the response for public support has been encouraging.

Expansion is an outgrowth of an unprecedented demand for seating at BYU games. Although seating capacity in the all-steel stadium, which was constructed in 1964, is listed as 30,000 permanent seats, the Cougars averaged 35,357 fans for five games last season. In the final game of the '79 campaign, a record crowd of 40,236 fans witnessed the contest with Utah.

It was the largest crowd ever to attend an athletic event in Utah. The previous high was 38,333 who were on hand for the BYU game with Wyoming in 1966, two years after the stadium was put into operation.

Since no church or university funds will be used in the construction of the expansion, financial support will come from alumni, the general public, faculty, staff and students. To help raise these funds, donor seats, boxes and loges are being made available on the 9,000-seat decks on both sides of the field.

The increased seating is expected to bring capacity in the facility to roughly 53,000 seats. At the present time there are 29,730 permanent seats in the stadium, along with 2,130 temporary seats in the north end zone and 3,312 seats in the new bleachers in the south end zone. Thus the exact seating is currently 35,172. The new seats in the two upper decks will boost the seating to over 53,000.

Since the stadium opening in 1964, the Cougars have played a total of 81 games on the natural grass field, and in 26 of those games, attendance has been in excess of seating capacity. In all, over two-million spectators have been in attendance over that 15-year period.

Twice since the facility was opened it has served as the site of the NCAA track and field championships (1967 and 1975). The all-weather track that surrounds the field is a Chevron 440, and the Cougars are scheduled to host the NCAA championships again in 1982.

The '80 Outlook: Good Carryover

It's been a few years since the Cougars have had to fall back on the familiar "building year" bromide of the past. And it's unlikely the cry will be heard from the BYU camp this fall, since it appears the Cougars have another good foundation under them for the season ahead.

From a team that led the nation in scoring, passing, total offense and kickoff returns, there is enough carry over in regulars and reserves to stimulate hopes for another successful season. In fact, BYU looms as a prime contender for another Western Athletic Conference championship, having won or shared the title for the past four years.

For those who might expect a carbon copy of the 1979 team (a club that produced Division I's first 4,000-yard passing season), there will be some distinct changes.

All-America quarterback Marc Wilson has graduated with a degree in economics, and taken with him a host of NCAA records. Gone also are seven other regulars and a veteran place-kicker from the team that posted an 11-0 record during regular season play. But LaVell Edwards still has enough talent left to admit BYU is returning "a potentially good ball club."

A trio of All-American candidates in defensive back Bill Schoepflin, offensive lineman Nick "Bear" Eyre and linebacker Glen Redd aren't the only talented returnees. Quarterback Jim McMahon is the most talked about of the signal-callers, perhaps because he was All-Western Athletic Conference as a sophomore in 1978 and redshirted last season.

The wizardry of the BYU offensive prowess is in offensive coordinator Doug Scovil who has guided the Cougars to national acclaim in each of his three years. While McMahon may provide an extra dimension with the versatility to run, a senior laden backfield will also help.

Leading the backfield are Eric Lane and Homer Jones, a pair of transfers who made a difference in BYU's attack last season. Some writers jested that the most some teams saw of these two backs was from behind.

The talent available on the 1980 squad could provide material for the redshirt program which Edwards and staff have used to perpetuate a winning program. The high-risk passing pro offense will be present again this season, but again will be complemented by the flexing 43 defense.

The WAC has been expanded to nine teams and some respectable non-conference competition should make BYU a contender for the Holiday Bowl. Should the Cougars emerge unscathed from the majority of these contests, then too, the national rankings may again make room for the pride of the Rockies.

Offensive Analysis Pro-Set

QUARTERBACKS: Four players covet the position, but Jim McMahon has the spurs. McMahon (a junior) redshirted last year behind Marc Wilson, but shared playing time two years ago when Jim became the first sophomore to earn All-WAC honor at the QB slot. Royce Bybee (a senior) backed up Wilson last year while McMahon recuperated from knee surgery. Bybee also served an apprenticeship as a redshirt, as has Mike Jones (sophomore), so now the redshirt distinction will probably go to Eric Krzmarzick (a 6-5 sophomore who threw for over 1,000 yards in freshman games).

RECEIVERS: Nearly all of the veterans return from the platoon-shuttle cadre. While three running backs led in pass receiving, Lloyd Jones (a senior) took in the most reception yardage. Augmenting Jones' talent is Bill Davis (a senior) who has good speed and hands, as does late-bloomer Matt Braga.



(a senior). A third of Braga's catches last year went for TDs. Don't discount **Dan Plater** (a junior) who has moves, speed and hands, too. The best of the rest isn't a wide or split receiver, but tight end **Clay Brown** (a senior), who is the best at that position in the school's history; plus the fact he led the nation in punting. Two-time reserve **Rob Andersen** (a senior) will probably back up Brown. Up from the jayvee squad **Scott Collie** (a sophomore), a comer, will be at wide receiver.

RUNNING BACKS: The transferring tandem of **Eric Lane** and **Homer Jones** are back for their senior years. Lane led in the rushing department, while Jones was the Cougars' leading receiver. And the duo backed each other up in the number two slots of the rushing and receiving departments. If the receiving appears to be senior-laden, then look no further in the running back department. Fullback **Steve Carlsen** and **Scott Phillips** are both seniors who back up Lane and Jones. Up from the jayvee unit is **Jimmy Jones** (a sophomore), but people are talking about freshman **Waymon Hamilton**, too.

OFFENSIVE LINE: All-America candidate **Nick Eyre** (6-5, 270 senior) is the only All-WAC returnee from last year's star-studded line. But offensive tackle Eyre wasn't the only good news for first-year coach Roger French. **Calvin Close** (a junior) has returned from his mission, and was a starter before he left two years ago. Close will play at guard, while the other guard and tackle slots could be filled by a pair of sophomore redshirts, **Lloyd Eldredge** (guard) and **Wayne Faalafua** (tackle). But the redshirt twosome will have to contend with veterans **Ray Linford** (senior tackle) and **Walt Manwill** (junior guard). The center could be a battle between returned missionary **Bart Oates** (sophomore) or last year's backup **Trevor Matich** (sophomore).

KICKING: Punting chores will be amply handled by **Clay Brown** (senior) who led the nation last year. Should he need any help, it could possibly come from juniors **Mike Mees** or **Jim McMahon**. Place-kicking duties could land on **Dave Taylor** (a junior), the Tangerine Bowl kicker who is coming off a redshirt year, or jayvee kicker **Kurt Gunther** (a sophomore), or incoming freshman **Mack Smith**.

SUMMARY: The offensive line is the only question mark, and if that develops, Marc Wilson and company could be only a memory. The battles for starting positions should improve the traditionally explosive offense.

Defensive Analysis

Defense: 4-3

FRONT FOUR: Essentially, the starters from last year return, led by All-WAC defensive end **Glen Tintensor** (a senior). The other end slot could be occupied by **Brad Anae** (a junior) or honorable mention All-WAC **Mike Morgan** (a sophomore). On the interior, it's a slugout between **Pulusila Filiaga** (a junior), **Jim Jaramillo** (a senior) and **Chuck Ehin** (a sophomore); the latter has shown the most improvement in the off-season. Ehin was the only one who didn't see starting action last season and Jaramillo is coming off a knee injury.

LINEBACKERS: All-America candidate **Glen Redd** is counted on for a strong senior year by the coaches. The All-WAC Redd can play any of the three positions, but earned most of his kudos at the strongside. It's hard to believe that **Ed St. Pierre** was a walk-on, but his senior year should be a second season of starting at the weak side. The middle linebacker could be protegee **Kyle Whittingham** (a junior), or sophomore **David Aupiu**.

SECONDARY: Another player who could earn All-America honors is **Bill Schoepflin**, a hard hitting senior who will see his third year as a starter at left corner. The right corner is held by senior **Dave Francis**, with the safety slots in contention. Seniors **Bob Prested** and **Rob Wilson** both have starting experience at weak safety, and twin brothers **Mark** and **Steve Brady** are at strong safety, with Mark having the edge of a year's varsity experience. Two talented sophomores could back up at the corners in **Tom Holmoe** and **Pat Cabulagan**.

SUMMARY: On the line and at linebacker when the reserve talent is dipped very deep, the quality may go down. But the starters are solid. Graduation losses were at a minimum for the team that led the WAC in all four defensive categories.

Clay lettered three years in football, two in basketball . . . was MVP as basketball forward . . . also MVP back-of-the-year with 800 yards on 95 carries (8.4 average) . . . had punting average of 45.6 . . . team champion of Mission Valley League . . . 3.2 GPA.

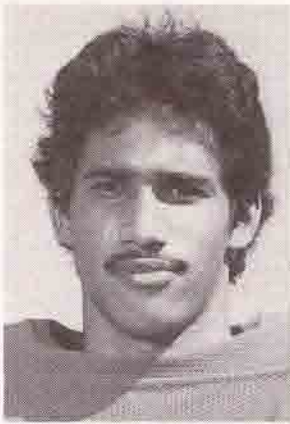

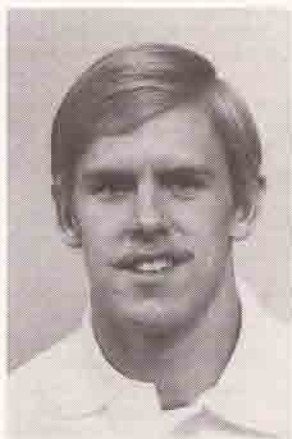

Homer was AP honorable mention All-America ... against Texas A&M, fans were tipped off by this new athlete with his 53 yards rushing and returning three kickoffs for 87 yards ... had a 51-yard run against Weber State ... 81 yards rushing against SDSU was his season high ... caught 10 passes for 102 yards and scored three TDs against Wyoming ... scored a TD against Hawaii and caught seven passes for 52 yards ... caught seven passes for 27 yards against Colorado State along with rushing for 64 yards ... caught six passes for 55 yards and returned four kickoffs for 146 yards against Long Beach State ... season totals: 546 yards rushing (second to Lane's 595), 404 yards receiving (leading the team with a 4.2 average, too) ... returned 22 kickoffs for 579 yards ... scored 11 TDs for third place on the team ... led the WAC in receiving.

Jones lived in Washington D.C. until he was 11, then moved to Rantoul, Ill. (Chanute AFB), for three years, then moved to Honolulu (Hickam AFB) to finish out his prep years.

Out of nine prep games his senior year, he rushed for over 100 yards in seven outings.

BYU sent him a letter after high school, but Homer went to Santa Rosa JC, then was contacted by all of the WAC schools along with Oregon, Oklahoma, and Kentucky.

In 1978 at Santa Rosa JC, he carried the ball four times against UC-Davis for 143 yards, caught 10 passes for 128 yards, returned four kickoffs for 196 yards and scored five TDs but one of the TDs was called back because of holding. The 26-yard callback cost him the all-purpose rushing title in California by 19 yards.

"I came to BYU because everybody else was trying to sell me on a lot of good points and Danny Frazier (linebacker from 1977-79) showed me some of the things he didn't like here in Provo."

An only child, Homer's parents saw him play twice last season in the nationally televised San Diego State game and in the Holiday Bowl.

"Since coming to BYU I have started to realize if I don't make it in football, then what do I have? I have to get a degree so that in case something doesn't work out in football I have something to fall back on."

LaVell says: "He has great quickness and acceleration and can catch the ball well."

JONES, JIMMY (24) Tailback, 6-1, 200, Soph., Blanding, Utah.

PERSONAL: Born 12/2/60 in Monticello, Utah ... parents are Keith and Merlan ... married to Ann Yoakam ... majoring in physical education.

HIGH SCHOOL: Coached by George Bayles (Snow) at San Juan High School ... team made it to semifinals one year ... he was all-state two years in football and one year in basketball.

BYU: After his 1979 JV performances, coaches call him a definite prospect of the future ... scored five TDs against Snow College in a 42-41 come-from-behind victory ... scored two TDs against Ricks and two TDs against Air Force along with 36 yards rushing.

****JONES, LLOYD (87)** Wide Receiver, 6-4, 187, Sr., Pomona, California.

PERSONAL: Born 1/7/58 in Detroit, Mich. . . . parents are Lloyd and Julie Jones of Cottonwood, Calif. . . . following the New Mexico game in '79 he married Bonnye Savage.

HIGH SCHOOL: A track and football star at Canesha High . . . won four letters in both sports in addition to three letters in basketball . . . a scholar athlete . . . made all-prep, all-league, and all-valley as a grinder . . . as a 120-yard high hurdler, he was champion for the league, CIF masters and the State of California . . . also ran 330-yard lows . . . received Russell Stickler award.

BYU: Outstanding as a freshman . . . redshirted in '77 and ran track for BYU . . . in '78 he was the WAC indoor 60-yard hurdles champion . . . best outdoor time in the 110-meter hurdles was 14.08 in '79 . . . had lengthy receptions in four varsity games in '78 . . . injured during '79 spring football . . . one of the fastest players on the squad . . . in 1979 he was All-WAC, AP honorable mention All-America and All-Rockies . . . three times named player-of-the-game among the receivers . . . had two key receptions against Utah State . . . four times in '79, Lloyd went over the 100-yard mark in passing yards . . . against Weber State he was four for 118 yards . . . against Utah State he was seven for 153 yards . . . against New Mexico he was eight for 153 yards and one touchdown . . . against Utah he was six for 134 yards . . . he had one reception against Colorado State—a 72-yard touchdown catch . . . netted 735 yards in receptions to lead the team . . . season totals in '79: 33 catches for 735 yards and two TDs.

Since his freshman year in high school, Lloyd started winning in the high hurdles. He holds the CIF record at 8.7 in the 70-yard highs, and 13.9 was his best prep mark in the 120 highs. Lloyd beat Charlie White (Heisman Trophy winner) at the 120 highs, but White won the 330 intermediates.

A WAC indoor hurdles champion, Lloyd's best outdoor performance for BYU was a 13.9 accutrack time and a fourth place in the WAC finals.

"Running hurdles has given me more flexibility, more strength, power and drive in my legs. I have lengthened my stride a lot more. That is deceptive to a defensive back, because it doesn't look like I'm running fast."

"In 1979 there was only one play the whole season when I caught a ball in stride . . . a 72-yarder for a touchdown against Colorado State."

"(Gifford) Nielsen could relate to any route I ran; (Marc) Wilson sometimes underthrew me, but he had excellent touch and I could catch it anywhere he put the ball; and (Jim) McMahon can throw the farthest of the three quarterbacks. McMahon throws harder . . . he can even overthrow me."

Although recruited heavily by UCLA, Lloyd came to BYU because he figured he could reach his potential here. "I didn't know anything about BYU until I found out Jay Miller led the nation in pass receptions (100 in 1973) and I found out BYU led many of the passing statistics nationally."

LaVell says: "Lloyd has great speed and concentration on the ball."

JONES, MIKE (15) Quarterback, 6-1½, 190, Soph., San Jose, California.

PERSONAL: Born 10/1/60 in Birmingham, Ala. . . . parents are Howard and Dorothy . . . majoring in engineering.

HIGH SCHOOL: At Bellarmine College Prep in San Jose he won four letters as a quarterback . . . won numerous honors . . . set 10 school and league passing records, including most touchdown passes (24), best completion percentage (64%), most yards gained (1,600), most TD passes one game (5) . . . coached by Walt Arnold (California).

BYU: Was the starting quarterback for most of the 1978 jayvee season . . . led the jayvees to a 4-1 record . . . completed 69 of 135 passes (.511) for 1,063 yards and seven TDs . . . longest pass was a 52-yarder to Dan Plater against Air Force . . . injured during the latter part of '79 spring ball . . . redshirted in '79.

KELLERMAYER, DOUGLAS (66) Defensive Tackle, 6-1, 240, Soph., Scottsdale, Arizona.

PERSONAL: Born 6/1/61 in Ohio . . . parents are Larry and Shirley.

Eric was a high school catcher and had a .375 batting average, but the pro scouts left Eric alone when he told them he wanted to concentrate on football.

As the nephew to MacArthur and Sid (Utah State gridgers), Eric worked with MacArthur on cars and spent this past summer working in a health spa. Sid counseled Eric to come to BYU because "it was a school similar to Utah State and I knew he wouldn't pull a fast one on me."

Eric lacked 15 yards rushing for 1000 yards at Chabot Junior College, because of a bruised thigh which kept him out of the final game of 1978.

"Everyone thinks scoring touchdowns would be my big thrill, but to me blocking is just as satisfying. The five touchdowns I scored at Utah State were nice, but I think it was a bigger thrill for the offensive line than for me."

On his 52-yard touchdown run against San Diego State with less than a minute left in the first half: "I had no idea how much time was left, but I was trying to get to the end zone any way I could." Eric nearly collapsed in the end zone because "I was a little worn out."

LaVell says: "He is a complete football player—an outstanding blocker, a good receiver and runner."

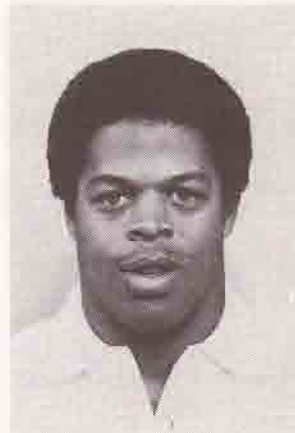

"When I moved to Utah I became the third string quarterback for a while. Then I started doing things that were normal on the field in California, and the people in Utah thought I was unbelievable."

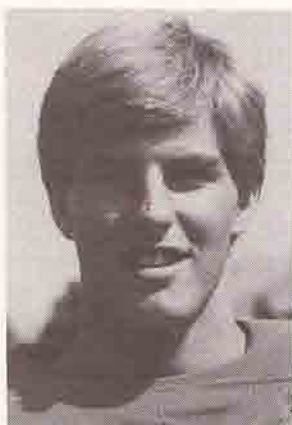
As a nine-year-old, McMahon threw a football 50 yards.

Among Schoepflin's activities last summer were helping his 10-year-old brother train for a second place boxing finish in the Colorado Junior Olympics.

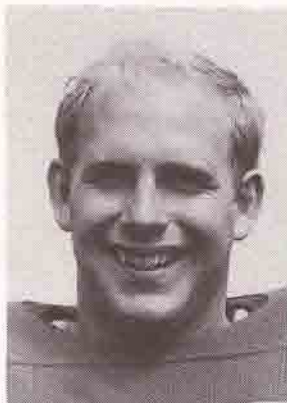

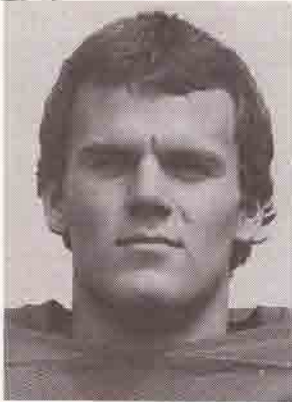

Glen likes to snow ski, build furniture, and play the family sport of raquetball.

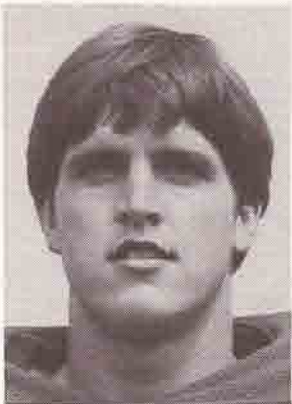

BYU President Jeffrey R. Holland

Dr. Jeffrey R. Holland assumed the presidency of Brigham Young University August 1, 1980. Dr. Holland replaced Dr. Dallin H. Oaks, who had served in that position for nine years.

The St. George, Utah, native was a varsity athlete, student officer and high honor graduate at both Dixie High School and Dixie College in his hometown. From 1960 to 1962 he served a volunteer mission for The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints in Great Britain. Upon returning to the United States, President Holland enrolled at BYU where he obtained a bachelor's degree in English with highest honors and a master's degree in religious education, graduating with distinction. While at BYU, he was designated an E. S. Hinckley Scholar and was elected to Phi Kappa Phi honor society. More recently, he was honored as a recipient of the University's Distinguished Alumni Service Award.

Dr. Holland obtained a second master's degree and a doctorate in American Studies at Yale University in 1973 where he was a Yale University Fellow. He pursued scholarly interests in Mark Twain, writing his dissertation on "Mark Twain's Religious Sense: The Viable Years—1835 to 1883."

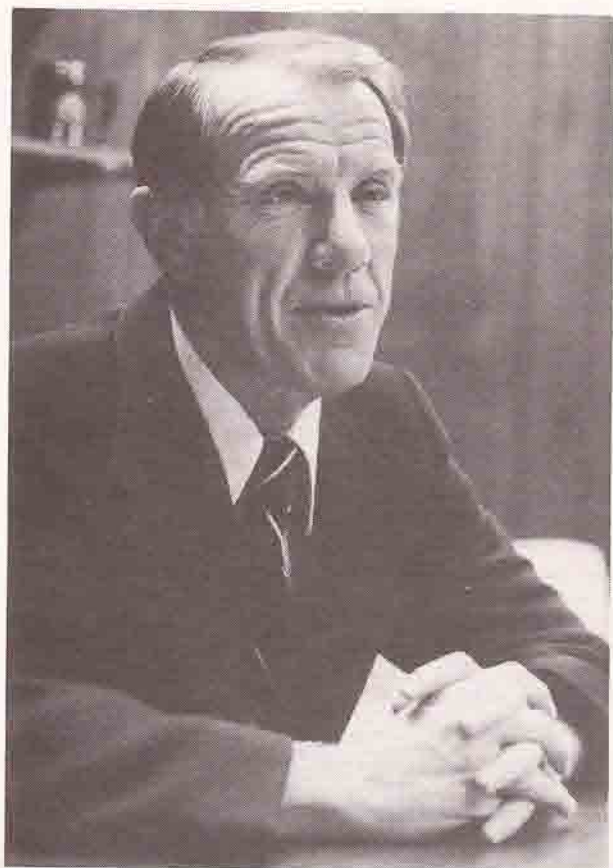
Before becoming president of BYU, Dr. Holland served more than four years as Commissioner of Education for the LDS Church, with responsibilities for all of the Church's educational programs which reach more than 750,000 students worldwide. Prior to that, he was dean of Religious Instruction at BYU, and he has served as an instructor or director at LDS Institutes of Religion in Hayward, Calif.; Seattle, Wash.; New Haven, Conn.; and Salt Lake City. The BYU president is a popular speaker and is noted for his keen sense of humor. More than 30 of his articles and addresses have been published in LDS magazines and professional journals, including *Vital Speeches of the Day*.

In the LDS Church, he has been a high councilor, a bishop's counselor, a bishop, and a counselor in three stake presidencies. He also served as director of the Melchizedek Priesthood MIA program and as chairman of the Church's Young Adult Committee.

President Holland is on the Advisory Board of the National Multiple Sclerosis Read-a-thon Committee and last year was chairman of the Scottsdale Conference on Church-Related Higher Education. He is a representative for the LDS Church to the National Congress on Church-Related Colleges and Universities and serves on the governing boards of the LDS Hospital in Salt Lake City and the Polynesian Cultural Center in Laie, Hawaii.

He and his wife, Patricia Terry Holland, also of St. George, have three children: Matthew, Mary Alice and David.





DR. GLEN TUCKETT, Athletic Director

The Cougars' athletic director likes to think the 1979-80 school year will be typical of things to come in the future at BYU . . . the Mountain Cats won four conference championships last year . . . Glen will be entering his fifth year as A.D. at BYU . . . Glen has invested himself in the very productive side of athletics . . . as an athlete (amateur and professional), as coach, as a teacher and as an administrator . . . he has brought vigor and vitality to his assignments, and he uses his varied talents to push the wholesome, worthwhile programs in athletics . . . he is acknowledged as one of the foremost leaders in his field . . . Tuckett is a native of Murray, Utah, where he was an all-around athlete at Murray High . . . he entered professional baseball after graduation, but continued his studies at the University of Utah where he obtained his B.S. degree in 1953 . . . Glen spent nine seasons in professional ball and twice was selected on all-star teams . . . he launched his coaching career at West High School in Salt Lake City, where he coached three sports . . . in 1959 he joined the staff at BYU . . . he served as assistant football coach for six years and head baseball coach for 17 years . . . his teams won 13 division titles, three conference championships, and two NCAA District 7 crowns . . . his teams went to College World Series in Omaha twice . . . one of the high points of his career came in 1974 when he was chosen as coach of the United States team which won the World Amateur Baseball Tournament for only the second time in the tourney's 22-year history . . . Tuckett was the 1977 president of the American Association of College Baseball Coaches . . . in January of 1979 he was inducted into the Collegiate Baseball Hall of Fame . . . used to be a color commentator for KSL Radio before his athletic director appointment . . . voted outstanding teacher at BYU . . . obtained his M.S. degree from BYU in 1962, and received his doctorate in 1976 . . . a former Bishop, Tuckett now serves as a counselor in the Edgemont Stake Presidency . . . DR. CLAYNE R. JENSEN, Dean and Faculty Representative

An experienced and respected administrator, Dr. Clayne Jensen is beginning his seventh year as dean of the College of Physical Education, which encompasses BYU athletics . . . Coach LaVell Edwards



Selected as national coach of the year in 1979 by two organizations, LaVell Edwards enters his ninth season at Brigham Young University with a career coaching record of 63-29-1 (.683).

The Bobby Dodd Coach of the Year Award and the Churchmen's Hall of Fame Coach-of-the-Year Award no doubt were a reflection of the guidance LaVell gave to BYU's perfect season and fourth bowl appearance.

LaVell, 49, the winningest coach in BYU grid history, is ranked 17th among the nation's winningest active coaches. However, he stands only behind Bear Bryant, Barry Switzer and John Robinson in winning percentage the past four seasons.

Edwards served as head coach of the West during the East-West Shrine Game last season and has coached twice in the Blue-Gray game and in the Coaches' All-America game. During 1977 and 1979 he was Kodak District Eight Coach of the Year and in 1972 and 1979 he was selected as Western Athletic Conference Coach of the Year.

But the Bobby Dodd Award has to rank among the highest honors bestowed upon Edwards. His peers, 11 former coaches, selected him for that honor. On the selection committee were Frank Broyles, Paul Dietzel, Ray Graves, Jake Gaither, Don Faurot, Jess Neely, Bob King, John McKenna, Bill Murray and Darrell Royal.

"This man is the kind you'd like to have your son playing for," said Dodd, who attended the award ceremony last January in Provo.

The Bobby Dodd Award is given, "In recognition of a higher and more noble aspect of college coaching . . . a style that emphasizes something more than winning the game . . . a belief that the game of football should be kept in perspective with college life in general."

LaVell responded at the award ceremony and commented on some of the difficulties his fellow coaches were having.

"We should remember these men are all good men who were under intense pressure to win," said LaVell. "You can't imagine the pressure until you move into the other office and sit in that head chair. I'll be glad when we can put college athletics back in perspective, when we can play for the fun of it again."

"It's almost as if Brigham Young sat there waiting patiently for one of its own to come out of the church and assume his responsibility," said the Atlanta Constitution's Furman Bisher of LaVell.

The coach is known as "Doc" in some circles, since he completed his Ed.D. work at BYU in 1978. The product of Utah Valley grew up in nearby Orem on a family farm which was only a mile or so from the site of the present football stadium. One of 14 children raised by Mr. and Mrs. Philo Edwards, LaVell opted to attend college at Utah State University.

LaVell obtained his bachelor's degree at Utah State in 1952 and his master's in 1960 from the University of Utah.

At USU he was a three-year letterman at center and was captain and all-conference for two years (1950-51). He played service ball for the Army (1952-54) at Fort Lee, Va., and was player-coach for a 6-3 team at Fort Meade, Md. He joined the BYU staff in 1962 after coaching at Granite High School in Salt Lake City. After developing some strong defensive units, Edwards was named head coach in 1972.

"I had a hunch he would become a mentor some day," said John Roning, LaVell's head coach at Utah State.

Under Edward's guidance, several of his football teams led the nation in scoring, passing, total offense and kickoff returns. His 1979 team was the first major college team to pass for over 4,000 yards in a season. The team's ninth place ranking near the end of the '79 season was the highest ever achieved by a Cougar grid squad.

Edwards has led BYU to all of its four bowl appearances and has won or shared five Western Athletic Conference titles.

Winning, bowl games, records and honors come to the BYU system under Edwards, who maintains part of his success is to let the assistant coaches do their job.

"I'm a firm believer in hard work to reach the desired goals," he says, "but I also believe football should be fun; a sport the players, as well as the fans, can enjoy. It doesn't have to be regimentation or drudgery. The outgrowth of football should be good, positive values that will benefit a player for the remainder of his life."

His wife Patti writes a sports column throughout the year for the *Provo Daily Herald*.

DOUG SCOVIL (Pacific '52)

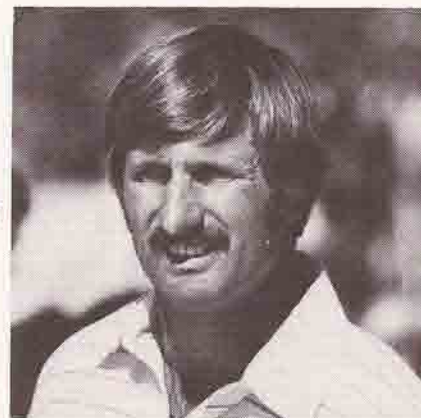
Offensive Coordinator, Quarterbacks

BYU Grid History: A Late-Bloomer

Many have said the 1979 season is a yardstick by which all other seasons will be measured.

For it was in the 1979 that BYU produced the perfect 11-0 regular season and quarterback Marc Wilson became the school's only consensus All-American, with the Cougars leading the nation in four statistical (Division I) categories.

The Western Athletic Conference title claimed in 1979 was BYU's sixth, the first coming in 1965 under Coach Tommy Hudspeth, followed by 1973, 1976 (tie), 1977 (tie), 1978, and 1979 all under Coach LaVell Edwards.

Football had its origin at BYU near the turn of the century in Provo, but a fatality resulted in its discontinuance. Resumed in 1922, minus three years during World War II, BYU has played a total of 55 intercollegiate seasons.

Historically, the Cougars have competed in the Rocky Mountain, Mountain States, Skyline, and Western Athletic football conferences, but only recently has BYU participated in bowl games.

The first bowl appearance came in the 1974 Fiesta Bowl in Phoenix, Ariz., as a result of winning the WAC title. BYU's first invitation to a bowl other than through conference affiliation was the 1976 Tangerine Bowl in Orlando, Fla. And consecutive outright WAC titles have led BYU to the 1978 and 1979 Holiday Bowls in San Diego, Calif. In 1977 BYU made an appearance in Japan's Silk Bowl.

The current winning tradition is fueled by good athletes who have neared their potential under the tutelage of veteran coaching staffs. Among those athletes are quarterback Marc Wilson, who set numerous records nationally, regionally, and locally from 1977-79. Wilson, who balloted third in Heisman Trophy voting, was preceded by QB Gifford Nielsen, who balloted sixth.

Nielsen (1975-77) set a few records himself and led the nation in passing categories to earn All-American honors. Nielsen was preceded by QB Gary Sheide (1973-74), who threw most of the 100 pass receptions caught by Jay Miller (1973-76), Miller's season record of 22 receptions in one game still stands.

Sheide was preceded a few years earlier by QB Virgil Carter (1964-66), who also set NCAA marks (his 599 yards total offense vs. UTEP still stands).

Carter was a two-time Academic All-America selection and had a favorite passing target, too, in Phil Odle (1965-67), who holds all of the BYU career reception records.

While passing has garnered the spotlight in Cougar annals, the running game has also produced some outstanding individuals. Eldon "The Phantom" Fortie (1961-62), a single-wing tailback who could pass and run, won All-America notice in 1962.

"Fleet" Pete VanValkenburg (1970-71) was the nation's leading rusher and a second team All-American, setting several WAC and school records in the process.

The top career rusher was Jeff Blanc (1973-76), and he had several plus-200-yard rushing games.

Offensive linemen of note include Gordon Gravelle (1970), Paul Howard (1972), Brad Oates (1973-75), and Orrin Olsen (1972-75), and most recently, Tom Bell (1974-79), the national Swede Nelson Sportsmanship Award Winner.

Defensive linemen of note include Jeff Slipp (1969), Wayne Baker (1972-74), Paul Linford (1972-74), and Mekeli Ieremia (1977).

Return specialists, too, have suited up for BYU, including Chris Farasopoulos (1968-70), the Galloping Greek, who led the nation in punt returns and set two NCAA records; and Golden Richards (1970-71), who is still listed as holding five NCAA records in kick returns.

1979 IN REVIEW

T'was a Season for Superlatives

It was a season of superlatives for the Cougars—a season unsurpassed in BYU history. The '79 Cougars completed BYU's first undefeated season ever, while a lanky quarterback by the name of Wilson made his "marc" in the NCAA annals by setting 11 records, bringing the Cougars into the national limelight by making a valiant bid for the Heisman.

While Wilson's performance was phenomenal, the '79 season was by no means a one-man show. The Cougars led the nation in several team stats, including total offense, with a 521.4 yards per game average; passing offense, averaging 368.3 yards per game; scoring offense, with a 40.6 points per game average; and kickoff returns, 26.3 per return.

As these totals were mounting, Clay Brown ran off with a national high in punting by averaging 45.3 yards per kick. Even the Cougar fans got into the standard-setting act, raising the attendance average from 31,000 to 31,944.

Few people could have guessed that the Cougars would post such a spectacular season, especially at the start, when an attack of appendicitis struck, victimizing three players, including Marc Wilson. But in its season debut, BYU, a decided underdog, used

an all out team effort to squeak past Texas A&M 18-17.

This started the momentum needed to power the Big Blue Machine through the season, finally reaching their post-season goal: a berth in the Holiday Bowl.

Shining out from their list of conquests are victories over interstate rivals Utah State and University of Utah, as those wins put the Cougars back on top of Beehive State football. In their bout with the Aggies, the Cougars reclaimed the symbol of their rivalry, the Wagon Wheel, by doubling Utah State 48-24. The Cats then went on to secure the Beehive Boot, which represents Utah football supremacy, by blanking the Utes 27-0.

The season was capped when the All-WAC list was announced, as BYU had the best player representation of any school in the league, including two unanimous picks—offensive lineman Tom Bell, and QB Marc Wilson, who was also a first team All-American pick.

Listed below are the game-by-game accounts of the 1979 season:

GAME-BY-GAME

BRIGHAM YOUNG 18, TEXAS A&M 17

Sept. 8—Evening Game (67% Rel. Humidity, 85°)
in Rice Stadium, Houston, Texas (40,000)

The Cougars began the season in a grand fashion by overcoming the Texas heat and humidity to edge the Aggies on a two-point conversion with 52 seconds remaining in the game. No one would have thought the Cougar win possible after the close of the first half, when most Aggie statistics more than doubled those of the Cougars. BYU had managed to keep within four points of the Aggies, however, when BYU answered an A&M-David Brothers touchdown with a 26-yard Brent Johnson field goal kick. The Cougars fell behind still further during the first possession of the second half when the Aggies scored on a 51-yard drive. It was then that QB Marc Wilson, convalescing from a recent appendectomy, came to form, completing six-out-of-six passes at one stretch which included a 20-yard touchdown pass to Dan Plater. The second Cougar touchdown was scored after Tim Halverson partially deflected an Aggie punt, which the Cougars capitalized on, scoring a Wilson-to-Brown touchdown. This brought the Cougars within one point of the Aggies, which was soon topped when Wilson connected with Mike Lacey in the end zone to seal the Aggie fate by one point. BYU now 1-0.

BRIGHAM YOUNG 48, WEBER STATE 3

Sept. 15—Afternoon game (Fair and clear)
in Provo (33,161)

After a scoreless first quarter, the Cougars took hold of the Wildcats and never let loose, accumulating 707 total offensive yards, despite a new BYU penalty yardage record being set at 219. The scoring started early in the second period when a 1-yard Mike Lacey rush coupled with a Brent Johnson kick put the Cougars up 7-0. This was added to by a Johnson field goal several possessions later. Both plays were set up by interceptions deep in Wildcat territory. The Cougars scored three more times in the first half—on an Eric Lane rush, another Johnson field goal, and a Wilson-to-Bill Davis pass. This put the Cougars in the locker room with a 27-0 lead. The only chance the Wildcats had to light up the board was in the third quarter on a field goal kick by Roger Ruzek. They came close to scoring again, however, when Weber's Otto Ribary picked off a Wilson pass, only to be stopped by Wilson himself. That brought in backup quarterback Royce Bybee, who proved an able substitution by connecting with Matt Braga for two touchdowns. Add a Homer Jones rush and three successful extra-point kicks by Johnson, and the final score comes out 48-3. BYU now 2-0.

BRIGHAM YOUNG 31, TEXAS-EL PASO 7

Sept. 29—Afternoon game (Fair and clear)
in Provo (34,724) Homecoming

The Cougars got off to a shakey start in this, their league opener, for although they opened the scoring with a field goal booted by Brent Johnson, the Miners scored with a 24-yard pass that gave them a 7-3 advantage over the Cougars in the first quarter. The homecoming crowd uttered a sigh of relief when Eric Lane rushed a yard to put the Cougars

ahead of the Miners 10-7 at the half. In the third period the Cougar defense came down on the Miners and the offense sparked up as Homer Jones rushed for one touchdown and Marc Wilson connected with Scott Phillips and Kent Tingey for two more. The defense, which shut the Miners out in the second half, was led by Gary Kama. Among other accomplishments, Kama deflected a pass into the arms of Dave Francis to stop a Miner scoring drive in the first half. BYU now 3-0.

BRIGHAM YOUNG 38, HAWAII 15

Oct. 5—Evening game (Clear, windless, 68°)
in Provo (34,741)

The largest home crowd so far gathered to see the Cougars overcome a stubborn Hawaii, and watch Marc Wilson break his fourth NCAA record. Wilson became the first player to accumulate 300 or more yards in total offense for eight games in his career. Wilson went 28-49-1 for 342 yards and three touchdowns in the process of picking up the record. Two of those touchdown passes went to Matt Braga in the second and fourth quarters. The third went to Bill Davis. Wilson also rushed for the initial Cougar score, Homer Jones rushed for a TD, and Brent Johnson was responsible for 5 PATs and a field goal. Hawaii lit up the scoreboard with 2 TDs on a pass and a rush, in the second and fourth quarters respectively. BYU now 4-0, a BYU record for most consecutive games won at the beginning of the season.

BRIGHAM YOUNG 48, UTAH STATE 24

Oct. 13—Afternoon game (Sunny, warm, 70°)
in Logan (28,094)

The Cougars made up for last year's 7-24 homecoming embarrassment against the Aggies by soundly defeating interstate rival Utah State in front of the largest crowd in Aggie history. Most of the stats were relatively close, except for the passing statistics, which proved to be the difference. Completing 20 of the 27 passes attempted and accumulating 394 aerial yards, the Cougars outscored the Aggies even though the Cougars drew numerous penalties. Eric Lane scooted over the goal line five times for five TDs, a new WAC and school record, and Marc Wilson connected with Bill Davis and Scott Phillips for the remaining two. Brent Johnson was good for six of seven PATs. The Aggies' touchdowns were limited to two passes and a run, plus a field goal. BYU now 5-0.

BRIGHAM YOUNG 54, WYOMING 14

Oct. 20—Afternoon game (Rain, snow, 35°)
in Laramie (14,723). Televised Regionally by ABC.

The worst playing conditions of the year did not detract from the Cougar aerial show, as four Wilson passes found their way through the snow flurries for four TDs, and 494 more passing yards were added to the Cougar statistics. Wilson also went 33-49 with no interceptions under the protection of such linemen as Tom Bell, Nick Eyre, Danny Hansen, Randy Tidwell, and Scott Neilson. Wilson connected twice with Homer Jones, and once each with Matt Braga and Scott Phillips for the passing TDs. The remaining four were run in twice by Steve Carlsen and once each by Homer Jones and Eric Lane. Reserve quarterback Royce Bybee led Carlsen's scoring efforts when he entered the game late

in the third quarter. The Cowboys made scoring efforts in the second and third quarters on a Davis pass and run, but the efforts were in vain as BYU ran its record up to 6-0.

BRIGHAM YOUNG 59, NEW MEXICO 7

Oct. 27—Afternoon game (Clear, 58°)
in Provo (33,921)

Both the offense and the defense sparked in this Cougar scoring fest that started on a dismal note for the Cougars. Much to the surprise of all concerned, the Lobos scored first with a Jimmy Sayers rush in the first quarter. From then on out, however, the Cougars held the reins of the game, accumulating 463 passing yards and posting four pass interceptions and two fumble recoveries as well. Bill Schoepflin and Bob Prested were responsible for two interceptions each, and Prested, along with Glen Titensor, recovered the fumbles. The pass-happy Cougars connected for six touchdown passes; from Wilson to Homer Jones in the first period, and to Lloyd Jones, Dan Plater and Bill Davis in the third. Royce Bybee completed the remaining touchdown passes, both to Kent Tingey in the fourth period. Homer Jones scored the only rushing touchdown in the second quarter, and Brent Johnson was responsible for eight PATs plus a field goal. BYU now 7-0.

BRIGHAM YOUNG 30, COLORADO STATE 7

Nov. 3—Afternoon game (Calm, partly cloudy, 40°)
in Fort Collins (25,612)

It was one of the toughest games the Cougars had faced since Texas A&M. A fired-up Colorado team was unable to keep Marc Wilson from becoming the WAC's all-time total offensive leader with 6,697 yards and becoming the NCAA's record holder for having five consecutive games with more than 300 yards total offense. Though the offensive stats were impressive, the game was no breeze for the Cougars. They took a 10-0 lead in the first quarter, thanks to a Brent Johnson field goal and a Wilson-to-Braga touchdown pass. But Colorado State came back on a fumble recovery to score by rushing. Wilson completed one more touchdown pass to Bill Davis before the half was through. In the final half, a strong Ram defense held the Cougars to only two touchdowns—a rush by Eric Lane and another Wilson-to-Davis pass. But the stronger Cougar defense held the Rams scoreless in the second half, and the Cougars upped their record to 8-0.

BRIGHAM YOUNG 31, LONG BEACH STATE 17

Nov. 9—Evening game (Warm, clear)
in Anaheim, Calif. (20,051)

The Cougars came out of this non-league game with nine-and-two-to-go, plus two more WAC records for Marc Wilson, in a contest sparked by the offense but regulated by the defense. (Wilson's three touchdowns gave him a career high of 56, breaking the WAC record previously held by Arizona State's Danny White and BYU's Gifford Nielson.) The scoring passes were to Bill Davis, Homer Jones, and Clay Brown. Eric Lane added a four-yard rush, and Brent Johnson kicked a 21-yard field goal plus two PATs to complete the scoring. The Forty-niners led 7-6 in the first quarter, fell behind 24-7 at the half, then scored 10 points in the third

period to approach BYU's total. The Cougar defense was responsible for holding the Cougar edge as Bill Schoepflin, Glen Redd, and John Neal each intercepted CSULB passes to keep them from scoring. It was now time for the Cougars to look ahead to two games that were touted as the toughest WAC competition BYU would face all season.

BRIGHAM YOUNG 27, UTAH 0

Nov. 17—Afternoon game (Overcast, 57°)
in Provo (40,236)

BYU offset last year's 23-22 loss to the Utes, the Cougars' greatest rivals, and guaranteed themselves at least a tie for the WAC championship. They scored their first shutout of the season in front of the largest crowd in Utah football history. The Cougar defensive effort was brilliant, and the scoring came on touchdown runs of Matt Braga and Homer Jones, the two field goal kicks by Brent Johnson, and Wilson's 18-yard scoring pass to Braga. Seventeen of the 27 points were scored in the first quarter. The Cougar defense managed to hold the Utes down to 226 yards total offense, as opposed to BYU's 496. Marc Wilson became the first WAC player to tally over 7,000 yards in total offense. BYU now 10-0, with one game remaining.

BRIGHAM YOUNG 63, SAN DIEGO STATE 14

Nov. 27—Afternoon game (Sunny, clear)
in San Diego (46,121) Televised nationally by ABC

The Cougars' battle with the San Diego State Aztecs was the icing on the cake, an undefeated season. Not only did the victory make the Cougars the first team in the school's history to finish a season undefeated, but it sewed up the WAC championship, entitling the Cougars to a berth in the Holiday Bowl. BYU showed the largest crowd it had played before (46,121 in the stands, plus millions at home watching the game over national television) that the Cougars can run the ball as well as throw it. For the first time this season, the Cougars accumulated more yards rushing than passing. Eric Lane ran away with the rushing stats for 111 of the Cougars' 320 rushing yards. With an additional 293 yards in passing, the Cougars chalked up a season high of 613 total offensive yards. The Cougars controlled the Aztecs from the very beginning of the game when Marc Wilson completed four touchdown passes in the first half. BYU put the game on ice when it scored three touchdowns in the first nine minutes of the second half. Royce Bybee filled in for Marc Wilson in the final 16 minutes of play and maneuvered another touchdown. All the Cougar scoring was done in 66 plays, as opposed to San Diego's 88. The win enabled the Cougars to face their Holiday Bowl opponents with a spotless 11-0 record.

Holiday Bowl II

BYU Edged by Indiana, 38-37

What can they do for an encore?

That was the question following the first Holiday Bowl when Navy defeated BYU in 1978 and it could be an appropriate question following last year's Indiana victory over BYU.

The second annual Holiday Bowl was the solution to the first question and it was a classic. The lead changed hands seven different times among the BYU Cougars and the Indiana Hoosiers. Both teams collected a total of 52 first downs and 874 total yards and the game was not decided until the final seven seconds. Indiana, a Big Ten foe, had edged the Western Athletic Conference champion, BYU, 38-37.

"I have never been involved in a better football game in my life," said Indiana coach Lee Corso after the game. "In fact, I don't think I've ever seen a better football game. I guarantee you there won't be a better football game in America this year."

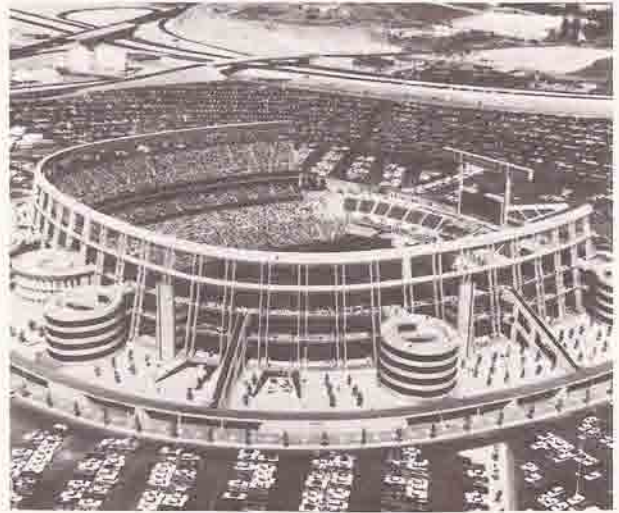
Corso was right. When the entire list of 1979-80 bowl games was finally over, one writer in a major newspaper headlined a story that read: ROSE HAD THE DRAMA, HOLIDAY THE DAZZLE AT BOWL SMORGASBORD. There is no doubt that the Rose Bowl in Pasadena was a thrilling and dramatic game. But those who attended and watched the Holiday Bowl on national television will be able to attest that the Holiday Bowl had everything.

San Diego Union Sports columnist Jack Murphy said this about the 1979 Holiday Bowl. "Those who hold ticket priorities for the Holiday Bowl would be well advised to keep them. For a toddler of two years, the game is in vigorous health. After the inaugural edition in 1978, Navy's George Welsh proposed that the Holiday Show will quickly become one of America's premier bowl games. Now similar sentiments are being expressed by Lee Corso of Indiana."

Now the "can you top this" problem has cropped up once again to the people who work long and hard on the Holiday Bowl. But they do not have to look for a solution. One has already been found. All that has to be done is play Holiday Bowl III. And that is just what is going to happen on Friday evening, December 19, 1980 when the champion of the Western Athletic Conference will take on a nationally ranked opponent in the Holiday Bowl.

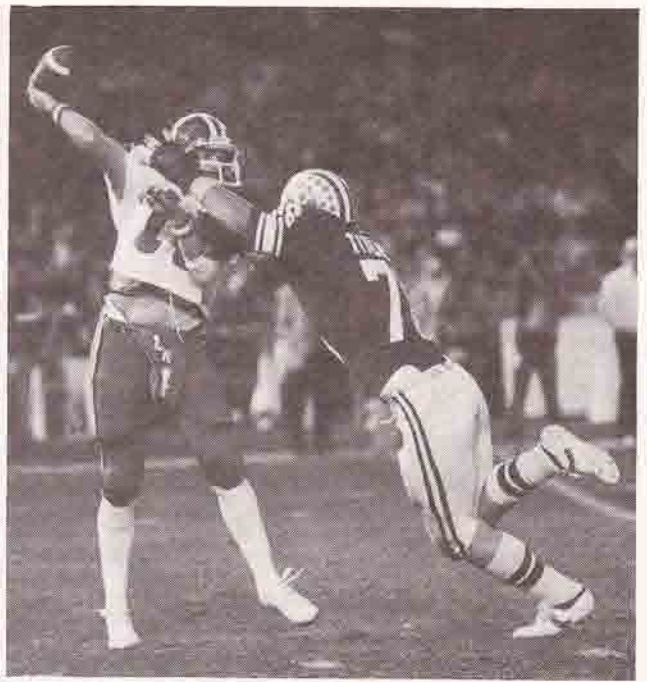

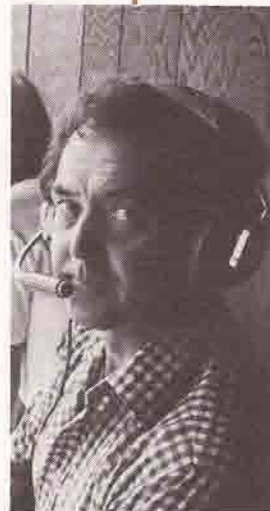

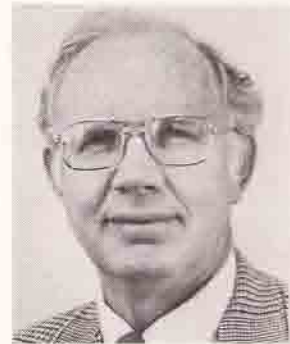
To all members of the news media who may be covering football this fall, we welcome you to BYU via our press guide.
