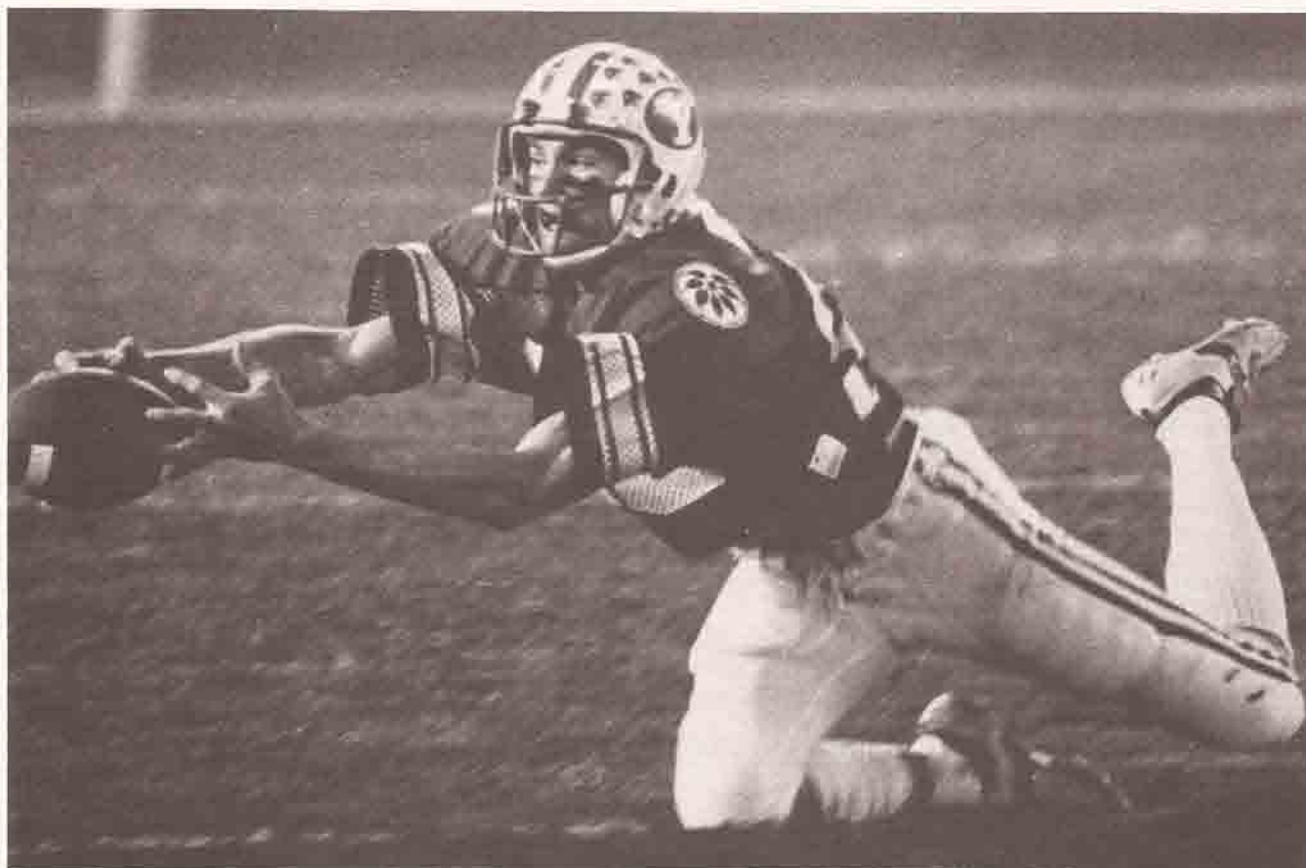

# About Brigham Young University

Founded in 1875 and dedicated to the education of the whole person, Brigham Young University strives to prepare its students for successful professional careers and personal lives by providing a proper balance between academia and religious instruction.

BYU is sponsored by The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints (Mormon) and, with its enrollment of 26,000 students, is the largest privately owned university in the country.

More than 1,250 full-time faculty, 67 percent of whom hold doctorates from colleges throughout the United States and several foreign countries, instruct in 150 subject areas in the university's 13 colleges and graduate schools.

BYU is on a three-semester system (4-4-2-2) with Fall and Winter semesters each being four months long and the summer semester being divided into Spring and Summer terms.

Utah Valley, located approximately 45 miles south of Salt Lake City, provides the backdrop for the 646-acre BYU campus. The 12,000-foot-high Wasatch Range rises immediately to the east of the campus, and Utah Lake can be seen only a few miles to the west.

Although 98 percent of the studentbody is Mormon, admission is open to those of any race, color, creed, or national origin, provided they meet

the university's academic requirements and their conduct conforms to the standards of the LDS Church.

Nonmormons come from over 25 other denominations, and around 22 percent of the student body is married. The Provo campus is also very cosmopolitan, with students coming from every state (30 percent from Utah) and more than 70 countries. Over 8,000 students are bi-lingual, having learned a foreign language while serving a two-year mission for the Mormon Church in another country.

Of the ethnic groups on campus, the American Indians have the largest representation, numbering more than 500 and coming from 61 tribes. There are also Chicanos, Blacks, Orientals, and others, all applying their own particular perspective of life to their academic programs, and providing a rich, intercultural learning atmosphere for all students.

In addition to the regular student body on the Provo campus, BYU serves other students at the BYU-Hawaii Campus in Laie, Hawaii, through the Study Abroad programs supervised by BYU faculty members in Austria, England, Israel, and Hawaii, and through the BYU Division of Continuing Education, which enrolls more than 350,000 in its courses each year.

The university is supported from funds appropriated by the LDS Church and from tuitions and gifts.

## Western Athletic Conference

The Western Athletic Conference began its 20th season with the start of the 1981-82 school year. However, things have changed since its formation in 1962. On July 1, 1978, two charter members of the league, Arizona and Arizona State, left the WAC for the Pac-Ten. On the same day, San Diego State made its official entry on the scene, upping the league membership to seven members. Then, University of Hawaii became the eighth member on July 1, 1979.

Another change occurred last year. Air Force Academy entered the WAC on July 1, 1980.

The new members possess good athletic programs and represent two of the fastest growing areas in the country.

Now that the league has expanded to nine members, the WAC stretches from the pine tree forests of Utah, Colorado, and Wyoming to the desert southwest of West Texas and New Mexico, to the coastal surfs of California and Hawaii.

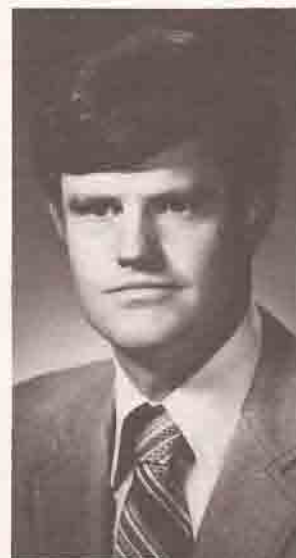
Founded on July 1, 1962, the charter members included Arizona, Arizona State, Brigham Young, New Mexico, Utah, and Wyoming. In September 1967, Colorado State and Texas-El Paso were added to make the WAC an eight-team league.

Based in Denver, Colorado, the WAC is led by Commissioner Joe Kearney, who assumed his current position in 1980. Kearney, former athletic director at Arizona State, Michigan State, and Washington, is the fourth conference commissioner since the formation of the league.

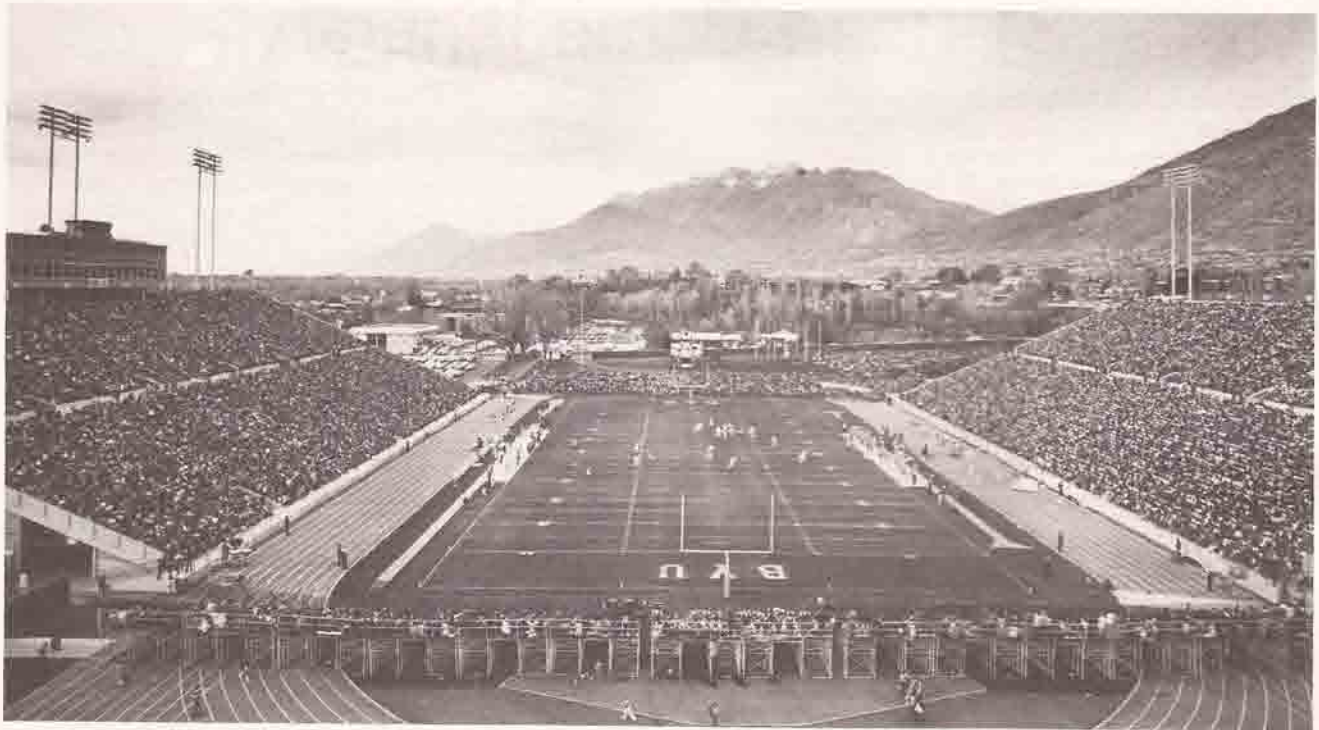

## Plans for Stadium Expansion

For the second time in less than two decades, the BYU football program has outgrown its seating capacity, leaving administrators, athletes and fans anxious for expansion of the 35,000-seat Cougar Stadium.

Due to tremendous fan support in recent years, the wish for a larger stadium will likely begin to materialize at the end of the 1981 football season. BYU's Board of Trustees has granted permission to expand the stadium, and the fund-raising drive has been underway for more than a year.

Originally it was hoped the Cougars would be playing in an expanded stadium this year; however, architectural problems combined with inflation to nullify plans to deck both sides of the stadium.

School officials are now promoting a plan to enclose the stadium in a horseshoe bowl by adding end zone seats or perhaps lowering the playing field. Seating capacity would then be increased to nearly double that of the current stadium.

Seating capacity for Cougar Stadium is listed at 35,000, but BYU has averaged over 35,000 fans for the last two seasons. A total of 227,975 witnessed six home games last year—an average of 37,996. The 41,296 fans who showed up for the Wyoming game set a record for the largest crowd ever to witness a sporting event in the state of Utah. More than 40,000 spectators have packed Cougar Stadium a total of three times.

The stadium was constructed in 1964 after football attendance outgrew the 10,000-seat stadium located where the Richards P.E. building is now situated. At present, Cougar Stadium has 29,730 permanent seats, along with 5,442 temporary seats in the end zones.

Over two million people have witnessed BYU games since the stadium's opening in 1964. The Cougars have played a total of 87 games on the

natural grass field, and in 32 of those games, attendance has been in excess of seating capacity.

Officials indicate that over 36,000 season tickets for the 1981 season have already been sold, including several hundred standing-room-only tickets on the hill immediately north of the stadium.

The track, scheduled to host the 61st NCAA track and field meet, will be moved to the field immediately south of the stadium. The 400-meter oval will boast an improved Chevron 440 all-weather surface and a self-contained field where all field events will be contested within view of the spectators.

Permanent seating for the track facility will be about 4,000, with temporary seating capacity exceeding 10,000.

# Cougar Club

Along with BYU's rise to prominence in the world of college athletics has come a wave of enthusiasm among Cougar fans. And perhaps the best indication of "Cougarmania" is the BYU Cougar Club.

According to Managing Director Dale R. McCann, membership in the Cougar Club has multiplied by 400 percent over the past six years, with the total number of boosters now exceeding 2,100 members.

"The contributions we receive," says McCann, "range from a \$50 associate member (age 25 and under) to the lifetime Golden Cougar (\$15,000 contributed over a three-year period). Resident membership is \$150 annually, and we have several classifications between resident member and the lifetime Golden Cougar."

In return, the contributor 1) has the satisfaction of knowing the contribution is building the program, directly supporting recruitment, and aiding significantly in funding the broadcast of road football and basketball games; 2) is the recipient of a Cougar Club medallion mounted on a walnut shield; 3) is given preferred parking for all BYU home games, with special passes for Golden and Silver Cougars; 4) receives an official football and basketball press guide; 5) is invited with a partner to the annual Cougar Club banquet; 6) receives the twice-monthly sports newsletter, *Cougar Close-Up*; and 7) can take the contribution as a tax deduction on state and federal returns.

## KSL Broadcasts

For more than a quarter of a century, BYU fans in the intermountain west and other parts of the country have been following Cougar athletics via 50,000-watt KSL radio (1160 on the dial), located in Salt Lake City, Utah.

"The Voice of the Cougars" has been play-by-play man Paul James, a veteran broadcaster with 30 years' experience behind him. A University of Utah graduate, James entered broadcasting in 1950. For six years he broadcast Utah basketball and football games before joining the staff at KSL Radio and Television in July of 1965. James has been at the microphone calling BYU games for the past 15 years.

KSL's broadcasts of the BYU games can be picked up live on the following stations: KTEE (1260 AM), Idaho Falls, Idaho (Daytime games only); KSTM (107.1 FM), Mesa, Arizona; KADQ (94 FM), Rexburg, Idaho.

With an FM sideband, games can be picked up in the following areas: WRFM (105 FM), New York, New York; WCLR (101.9 FM), Chicago, Illinois; KBIG (104.3 FM), Los Angeles, Calif.; KOIT (96.5 FM), San Francisco, Calif.; KSEA (100.7 FM), Seattle, Wash.; KMBR (99.7 FM), Kansas City; KAFM (92.5 FM), Dallas, Texas.

# The Outlook: Generally Solid, But...

With over half the starters gone from the 1980 squad, skeptics might be quick to place BYU in the "re-building" category; nevertheless, the Cougars have enough talent returning to vie for a sixth consecutive WAC title.

Gone from the 12-1 Cougars of 1980 are a string of receivers and offensive backs, plus several key linebackers and defensive backs. But the Cougars have been able to muster promising talent in those areas, and should be solid with very few exceptions.

The catalyst of the passing attack, Jim McMahon, returns to continue his barrage of the NCAA record books. The faces he will be throwing to will be new, however, due to graduation, but BYU has always found dependable receivers to complement its quarterbacks.

In all, 43 lettermen, including 12 starters, are returning. Graduation and missions depleted the Cougar ranks by 21. In addition to experienced lettermen, BYU coaches put together one of their best recruiting years. A frosh or two could possibly see starting action.

BYU's offensive designer for the past several seasons, Doug Scovil, vacated the Cougar coaching staff to take the head position at San Diego State. However, BYU will continue to place emphasis on the forward pass and a flexing 43 defense. Scovil's replacement, Ted Tollner, has tutored some impressive quarterbacks in his years as a coach.

Perhaps the most solid area will be the defensive line, where four regulars return. Only Glen Titensor departed from the front four, which means the Cougars should once again prove tough against the run.

Candidates for national recognition include quarterback Jim McMahon, wide receiver Dan Plater, guard Calvin Close, center Bart Oates, linebacker Kyle Whittingham, defensive back Tom Holmoe, defensive lineman Brad Anae, defensive tackle Pulusila Filiaga, defensive tackle Chuck Ehin and safety Mark Brady.

## Offensive Analysis

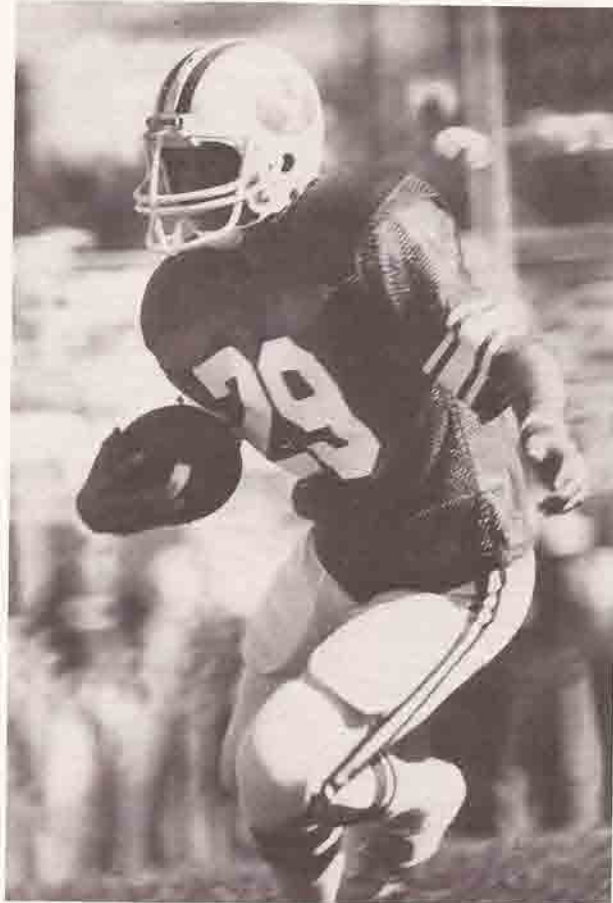
At the quarterback position, Heisman candidate Jim McMahon has it nailed down, but sophomores Steve Young and Eric Krzmarzick will battle for the backup role. Another sophomore, Gym Kimball, could see action.

The offensive backfield was left vacant by running backs Eric Lane and Scott Phillips, but Scott Pettis (Jr.) had impressive statistics in the short time he played last year. Waymon Hamilton (Soph.), at 211 pounds, will battle with Bruce Hansen (Soph.) for the starting fullback role. Vai Sikahema and Jimmy Jones, both sophomores, could also see action at halfback.

The receiving corps is basically untried. Only Dan Plater (Sr.) has seen considerable varsity action regularly. Scott Collie (Jr.), Glen Kozlowski, a freshman, and Neil Balholm (Jr.) will all be catching passes. At tight end, sophomore Gordon Hudson and junior Brad Hardisty are frontrunners for the spot vacated by Clay Brown. Converted linebacker Mike Lacey (Sr.) should help.

The offensive line looks solid. Bart Oates (Jr.), last year's starting center, returns as do guards Lloyd Eldredge (Jr.) and Calvin Close (Sr.). Both

tackles will be new. Candidates for the openings are Vince Stroth (Jr.), Steve Rogers (Sr.), Wayne Faalafua (Jr.) and Scott Robinson (Soph.) Transfers Bob and Kurt Armstrong could also fit into the picture.

Kicking chores will be handled by either Kurt Gunther (Jr.) or Lee Johnson (Soph.). Johnson did some punting last year. Mike Mees (Jr.) punted two years ago and will kick again this year.

## Defensive Analysis

The front line is especially strong with four regulars returning. Pulusila Filiaga (Sr.), Mike Morgan (Jr.), Chuck Ehin (Jr.) and Brad Smith (Soph.) buoy up the tackle spots. Brad Anae (Sr.) and Brandon Flint (Jr.) will secure the end slot with Barry Oates (Jr.) and Jim Herrmann (Soph.) in the wings.

Only Kyle Whittingham (Sr.) returns from the linebacker corps. He'll have help, however, from David Aupiu (Jr.) and Mike O'Neil (Jr.). Returned missionary Brian Hansen (Jr.) and sophomore Todd Shell are competing for the starting job also.

In the defensive backfield, Tom Holmoe (Jr.) and Mark Brady (Sr.) head up the experienced players. Steve Brady (Sr.) and David McKee (Sr.) are competing for the other slots. Kevin Walker (Jr.), Ken Walker (Jr.), John Mannion (Jr.) and Mike Jensen (Jr.) have impressed the coaches with their play also.

# McMahon Emerges on National Scene

As a 6-0, 185-pound, 22-year-old young man with brown hair and slightly tinted glasses, Jim McMahon usually doesn't receive many double-takes while walking to and from class. But once he dons football gear, steps onto the field and begins to throw the pigskin, everyone who knows anything about football sits up and takes notice.

McMahon, a Roy, Utah, native who also has roots in New Jersey and California, has created such a list of NCAA records and statistics that a full-time worker can hardly keep track of them all.

His football skills can be traced back to the time he was nine years old. A coach handed him a ball and asked him to throw it. He did—50 yards worth! As a sophomore in a California high school, pro baseball scouts were stalking him; then he moved to Utah and guided his high school football team to a 20-0 record in two years.

Choosing BYU, not because he was Mormon—he's Catholic—but because it had a better baseball program than any of the other schools which recruited him, McMahon handled punting chores for the Cougar varsity squad in 1977, averaging 39.3 yards per kick. He also saw limited playing time as quarterback in the back-up role.

BYU, always blessed with good quarterbacks, had All-American Marc Wilson returning as a junior for the 1978 season; but McMahon proved he was ready. In the third game of the season, Wilson was injured and McMahon stepped in to complete seven of nine passes for 112 yards and a touchdown. He also rushed for 80 yards while providing the spark for the 32-6 BYU victory over Colorado State.

Three games later, he came off the bench again to spark a comeback and lead BYU to a 17-16 victory over Oregon. He went on to start in five of the remaining games and ended the season 87-176 passing for 1,307 yards and 248 yards rushing.

He was named All-WAC first team and Honorable Mention All-America (AP) for his efforts.

McMahon watched the 1979 season from the sideline. He was redshirted to recuperate fully from a knee operation he had undergone in the off-season. BYU went undefeated (11-0) in the regular season as Wilson garnered national attention, being named consensus All-American. When the 1980 season rolled around, McMahon was ready to retain his starting job.

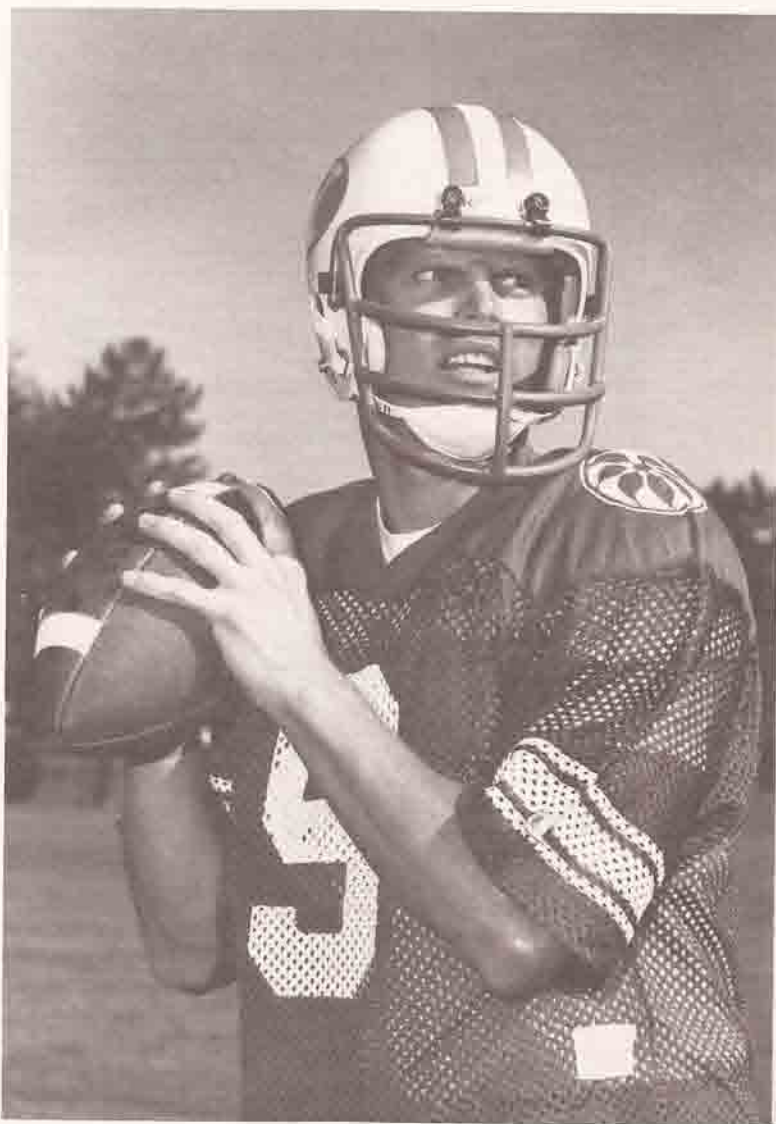
The year couldn't have gotten off to a worse start, however, as New Mexico upset BYU 25-21. The Lobos blitzed McMahon all night, taking advantage of a young offensive line. It was to be only the second loss McMahon would experience in his first 18 starts.

The rest of the season is history. Over 2.92 miles of passing yardage, 32 NCAA records broken and two tied, 12 straight victories. "WAC Offensive Player of the Year," "First Team All-American," and "Utah Ath-

lete of the Year" are only a few of the titles bestowed on him following his record-setting year. (For statistics see accompanying story.)

Ron Meyer, Southern Methodist's coach said of McMahon: "He's in a class with Bob Griese. He can scramble so well and that's where he hurts you. And as for changing plays at the line of scrimmage, McMahon is the best in the country at that. He's a franchise."

Everyone is waiting anxiously to see what McMahon will do for an encore in 1981—everyone, that is, except opposing teams.

# NCAA Report on McMahon Statistics

(The following is taken from the Bulletin of the NCAA Statistics Service report of Dec. 16, 1980, which summarized the final individual and team leaders for the 1980 football season:)

## TOTAL OFFENSE & PASSING

BRIGHAM YOUNG junior Jim McMahon had the No. 1 season statistically of any quarterback ever in any NCAA football division—and that includes PORTLAND STATE senior Neil Lomax.

Until 1980, TULSA's Jerry Rhome held this distinction with his fantastic 1964 season, in which he set the all-time high in passing efficiency (broken by McMahon) and major-college records in passing yardage, total-offense yardage, touchdown passes, pass completion percentage, TDs responsible for and lowest percentage had intercepted.

Throughout NCAA history, the total-yardage record-holders and efficiency record-holders have almost always been separate breeds. Being the most prolific and most efficient at the same time has been next to impossible—not only in passing but in other categories.

Rhyme was the exception among quarterbacks until McMahon came along.

McMahon didn't win the Heisman Trophy. That went to SOUTH CAROLINA's George Rogers, the national rushing champion, with PITTSBURGH's remarkable end Hugh Green second and freshman running sensation Herschel Walker of GEORGIA third—highest ever by a freshman.

McMahon wasn't even the leading vote-getter among quarterbacks. PURDUE's Mark Herrmann, the career record-holder in passing and total offense among major collegians (Division I-A), held that distinction. He was fourth, McMahon fifth, OHIO STATE's Art Schlichter (a junior quarterback) sixth and Lomax, the career I-AA and collegiate leader, seventh.

## 4,571 YARDS, 47 TDs, 176.9 EFFICIENCY!

McMahon set an all-time high for passing efficiency at 176.9 rating points (breaking Rhome's 16-year-old 172.6) and smashed the record for yards per attempted pass with *better than a first down per attempt*—10.27 yards, to be exact. That broke the 9.85 by ARIZONA STATE's Danny White in 1973, using a minimum of 225 attempts (White threw only 265 passes to McMahon's 445).

That takes care of efficiency. Now for McMahon's totals records. His 4,571 passing yards, 4,627 rushing-passing in total offense, 47 TD passes, 53 TDs responsible for (he scored six TDs) and 320 points responsible for (he threw one two-point conversion) all are all-time highs, not only in major-college history, but in the history of any NCAA division.

It's true McMahon played 12 games. Even so, his per-game figures smashed the all-time highs—380.9 passing, 385.6 total offense and 3.92 TD passes. (The previous per-game yardage marks—346.4 passing and 334.3 total offense—were set in 1965 by Rhome's successor

at TULSA, Bill Anderson. The previous totals marks—3,720 passing and 3,580 total offense—were set in 1979 by BYU's Marc Wilson. SAN DIEGO STATE's Dennis Shaw held the others—39 TD passes, 45 TDRs and 270 points responsible for in 1969. Shaw and Anderson played 10 games; Wilson 11.)

McMahon, 6-1 and 182, was born in Jersey City, New Jersey, went to high school in San

Jose, California, for two years, then to Roy, Utah, his last two, where his team was 20-0-0. He has excellent mobility and a strong arm. As a six-year-old he accidentally gouged himself in his right eye, using a fork to undo some knotted string. Doctors doubted he'd ever see out of the eye again.

"Those first few years the eye was really weak and I could hardly see," McMahon says. "Now I wear glasses, except when I'm playing. My vision in the eye has improved to 20-60 and it hasn't affected my play. At night, though, my vision does get a little blurry."

In all, McMahon now holds at least 26 NCAA records (when you get into 300- and 400-yard games, consecutive and total, most yards in 2, 3, 4 consecutive games, etc.). And talk about domination—he averaged 108.6 yards more in total offense than the runner-up, Herrmann, and had 1,667 yards more than the second man—Dave Wilson of ILLINOIS!

and he has served as an instructor or director at LDS Institutes of Religion.

The BYU president is a popular speaker and is noted for his keen sense of humor. More than 30 of his articles and addresses have been published in LDS magazines and professional journals, including *Vital Speeches of the Day*.

In the LDS Church, he has been a high councilor, a bishop, and a counselor in three stake presidencies. He also served as director of the Melchizedek Priesthood MIA program and as chairman of the Church's Young Adult Committee.

President Holland is on the Advisory Board of the National Multiple Sclerosis Read-a-thon Committee and two years ago was chairman of the Scottsdale Conference on Church-Related Higher Education. He is a representative for the LDS Church to the National Congress on Church-Related Colleges and Universities and serves on the governing boards of the LDS Hospital in Salt Lake City and the Polynesian Cultural Center in Laie, Hawaii.

While at BYU, he was designated an E. S. Hinckley Scholar and was elected to Phi Kappa Phi honor society. Dr. Holland obtained a second master's degree and a doctorate in American Studies at Yale University in 1973 where he was a Yale University Fellow. He pursued scholarly interests in Mark Twain, writing his dissertation on "Mark Twain's Religious Sense: The Viable Years—1835 to 1883."

Before becoming president of BYU, Dr. Holland served more than four years as Commissioner of Education for the LDS Church, with responsibilities for all of the Church's educational programs which reach more than 750,000 students worldwide. # LaVell Edwards



For a decade, the success of Brigham Young University's football team has been rooted in the abilities of a man who owns the titles of Coach, Bishop, husband, father, grandfather, author, teacher and doctor—LaVell Edwards.

And as BYU's 11th head football coach, Edwards has given BYU a new title, that of "perennial football power." After nine full years as head coach, the 51-year-old Edwards enjoys a 75-30-1 (.712) record, ranking him 12th among the winningest active coaches in the nation.

Along with the Edward's reign at BYU has come the nation's leading passing attack. For the past two seasons, the Cougars have won a kind of triple crown by leading the nation in total offense, passing and scoring. And going back five years, no other NCAA team (Division I) has acquired more victories than BYU (49-8).

At the Cougar helm since the 1972 season, Edwards, previously a defensive coach, has used his passing offense and a sticky 43 defense to capture six WAC championships, including five consecutive titles starting in 1976. Five bowl appearances—of which BYU's miraculous 46-45 victory over SMU in the Holiday Bowl last December is the most memorable—also highlight Edwards' record.

His peers have a high respect for the Orem, Utah, native who was raised on a farm not far from BYU's

stadium along with 12 brothers and sisters. Three times (1972, 1979 and 1980) he has been named WAC coach-of-the-year and four times (1974, 1977, 1979 and 1980) as Kodak District Eight Coach-of-the-Year.

In 1979, LaVell was selected as national coach-of-the-year by two organizations, the Bobby Dodd Award and the Churchmen's Hall of Fame. His post-season coaching opportunities have included the Blue-Gray Classic, the East-West Shrine Game and the Coaches All-America game.

After graduating from Lincoln High School in Orem, Edwards attended Utah State where he was a three-year letterman and captain of the football team. Twice he earned all-conference honors at center. While attending USU, he met his future wife, Patti Covey. But before getting married, LaVell entered the Army, where he participated on two service football teams, Fort Lee, Va. (1952-54) and Fort Mead, Md., where he was a player-coach.

His first coaching job was secured at Granite High School in Salt Lake City (1954) at which school he coached until joining the Hal Mitchell staff at BYU in 1962. The head coaching job became available in 1971 after Tommy Hudspeth left the University, at which time Edwards was called on to fill the position.

"It's almost as if Brigham Young sat there waiting





patiently for one of its own to come out of the church and assume his responsibility," wrote Furman Bisher of the *Atlanta Constitution* concerning LaVell's appointment as head coach.

Edwards' philosophy is a strong reason for BYU's winning tradition.

"I'm a firm believer in hard work to reach the desired goals," he says. "But I also believe football should be fun; a sport players, as well as the fans, can enjoy. It doesn't have to be regimentation or drudgery. The outgrowth of football should be good, positive values that will benefit a player for the remainder of his life."

In 1960, LaVell earned his M.S. degree at the University of Utah, then continued his education at BYU, receiving his Ed.D. degree in 1978. He has coached more years, won more games and had a better winning percentage than any coach in Cougar football history. He is also the dean of WAC coaches, ranking only behind Frank Kush in winning percentage and games won in the WAC.

Edwards is an active member of the College Football Association. His wife, Patti, writes a sports column throughout the year for the *Provo Daily Herald*. This year, LaVell's youngest son, Jimmy, will be playing for the Cougars as a freshman. Another son, John, competes for BYU's track team in the distance races.

# Highlights of LaVell's Career

Quarterback Gary Sheide is runner-up in NCAA passing, and number three in total offense . . . teammate Jay Miller leads the nation in pass receiving (100 receptions for 1,181 yards, eight TDs) . . . as a team the Cougars are second in the nation in passing, eighth in total offense . . . Miller sets an NCAA record in most pass receptions (22) in one game (record still stands).

1974—Team ranks high in two NCAA statistical categories; seventh in passing offense, fourth in rushing defense . . . Individually, Gary Sheide is runner-up in passing for the second year in a row (to Steve Bartkowski of California, this time) . . . Gary's career completion percentage is fourth on all-time list (behind Roger Staubach, Jerry Rhome and Jesse Freitas . . . his career percentage is .607 . . . Bartkowski's final pass completion edged Sheide (182-181) for title.

1975—A year of adjustment, the Cougars faltered through the first part of the season, then win six of last eight games on the schedule . . . Gifford Nielsen, a sophomore reserve, came off the bench in the fourth game (New Mexico) to spark come-from-behind victory . . . Giff set WAC record with 10-of-12 passing in that game . . . was starter thereafter . . . Nielsen finished the year 13th in NCAA passing, Cougars were 10th as a team in passing.

1976—Gifford Nielsen places fourth in NCAA passing (18.8) with only one-tenth completion separating him from Jack Thompson (Washington State) in second place . . . But he was second in total offense behind Tommy Kramer (Rice) . . . As a team, the Cougars were first in passing, sixth in total offense and eighth in NCAA scoring (424.4 total, 307.8 in passing and 31.9 scoring) Nielsen voted first-team All-America.

1977—Nielsen unexpectedly exits scene with injury in fourth game (Oregon State) and Marc Wilson takes over . . . by the end of the season the two have combined for 40 TD passes, 3,585 yards passing and a .605 completion percentage . . . had one or the other been able to play a whole season, they might have captured passing

and total offense titles . . . Even so, Wilson finished eighth in passing and third in total offense (behind Doug Williams and Guy Benjamin) . . . as a team the Cougars led the nation in passing (341.6), were second in scoring (39.4) and third in total offense (470.2) in final NCAA figures . . . BYU's 341.6 yards per game was third highest in history, and 41 TDs second . . . surprisingly, the Cougars also topped the nation in "take-aways" with a total of 56 defensive (interceptions and opponents' fumbles recovered) takes.

1978—Both Wilson and sophomore quarterback Jim McMahon see action in 10 games as they share Q.B. duties . . . Wilson was injured in third game of season . . . Although neither is mentioned in NCAA statistics, the Cougars are 8th in passing, fourth in NCAA fumble recoveries . . . Cougars finish with WAC title, third straight 9-2 season and a bowl bid to Holiday I.

1979—With two all-conference quarterbacks to choose from (Wilson in 1977, McMahon in 1978), the Cougars elect to redshirt junior McMahon in favor of senior Wilson . . . Although the decision wasn't made until just before the Texas A&M game (opener) because of Marc's illness (ruptured appendix), Wilson helps engineer upset that starts Cougars on 11-game win streak . . . Marc leads the nation in total offense (325.5) and is fourth in passing efficiency (147.1) . . . Wilson finishes senior year as consensus All-America with 10 NCAA records to his credit . . . As a team the Cougars lead the nation in four categories; passing (368.3), total offense (521.4), scoring (40.6) and kickoff returns (26.3) . . . also, the Cougars were 11th in scoring defense (11.4) and sixth in punting (40.1) . . . BYU was first Division I team to pass for more than 4,000 yards in season . . . LaVell receives the Bobby Dodd Coach of the Year Award.

1980—For the second year in a row the Cougars post an 11-win season. Also, for the second consecutive season BYU leads the nation in three major statistical categories; total offense (535.0), scoring (46.7) and passing (409.8). Quarterback Jim McMahon, who was named to the Kodak All-America (the football coaches), had an amazing season, to say the least. Jim became the first NCAA Division I player to pass for more than 4,000 yards (4,571 to be exact), and he set or tied a total of 26 NCAA records, most of them total offense and passing. Among the marks: the highest passing efficiency ever (a 176.9 that topped the previous high of 172.6 by Jerry Rhome in 1964) which was nearly 27 points ahead of the second-place finisher. McMahon also led the nation in total offense (385.6 yards per game,

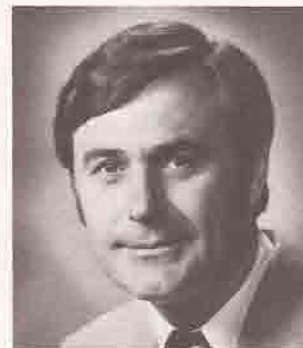

## Year of the Comeback

# Lobo Loss to Bowl Win Judged 'Best Ever'

"Comebacks." No one word sums up BYU's 12-1 1980 football season, perhaps the best in the school's history, more accurately.

From day one of the WAC wars, the Cougars found themselves in a hole after being upset by New Mexico 21-25. The remainder of the season was a come-from-behind effort, and BYU played each of its games knowing that another loss would knock the team out of WAC title contention.

But they came back to win the rest of their games and enter Holiday Bowl III as WAC champion for a



sixth straight time. In that bowl game, BYU put on one of the most remarkable comebacks in football history, scoring 21 points in the final four minutes of the game, including a touchdown with no time left on the clock, to defeat the SMU Mustangs, 46-45.

The result of the "Year of the Comebacks" was an 11th-place national ranking (11th in one poll, 12th in another) by the wire services and a heap of additional respect for the Cougars' football program.

Led by All-American quarterback Jim McMahon, BYU sat atop the nation's statistics in total offense with an average of 535 yards per game. The Mountain Cats also led in passing offense (409.8 yards per game) and scoring offense (46.7 points per game).

Following are the game-by-game accounts of the 1980 season:

### BRIGHAM YOUNG 21, NEW MEXICO 25

Sept. 6—Evening game (75°, cloudy, wind at six knots) in University Stadium, Albuquerque, New Mexico (16,840).

New Mexico took advantage of an inexperienced BYU offensive line and blitzed the Cougars all night, making Jim McMahon hurry his passes or eat the football. The touted BYU offense was repeatedly stopped throughout the game, including no yards of total offense in the fourth quarter. New Mexico held the Cougars to only 147 yards passing throughout the game. The Cougars led 14-7 after Eric Lane scored on a one-yard plunge and McMahon found Clay Brown for an 11-yard touchdown pass. The second half, however, belonged to New Mexico as their kicker Pete Parks booted three field goals, including a 35-yarder with 11 seconds remaining in the game, to seal the Cougars' fate. BYU's only other touchdown in the game came in the third quarter when McMahon hit Brown again for a 21-yard score. Kurt Gunther, who was pulled out of the classroom minutes before the team was to board the bus, kicked all of the Cougars' extra points. The BYU defense allowed New Mexico to amass 400 yards of total offense in the game. BYU now 0-1.

### BRIGHAM YOUNG 35, SAN DIEGO STATE 11

Sept. 13—Afternoon game (78°, beautiful weather) in Provo (36,178). Televised regionally by ABC.

The Aztecs sought revenge for the 63-14 shellacking from BYU on national television in 1979. Jim McMahon tossed four touchdown passes, including an 80-yard flick to tight end Clay Brown in the third quarter. Brown also made the Cougars' first score on a 17-yard pass from McMahon. The Cougar defense, which had been run over the previous week, stiffened to allow the Aztecs only one field goal in the first half and one touchdown late in the game. The second score for BYU came early in the second quarter when McMahon layed a 17-yard screen pass to Scott Phillips. Then, on its next possession, BYU found pay dirt again. This time it was Bill Davis catching a 15-yard McMahon pass for the score. Even the defense chipped in to help the Cougars, who only ran two offensive plays in the third quarter. Bill Schoepflin blocked an Aztec punt and Mike Lacey picked up the ball and ran 12 yards for the touchdown. The Cougars used eight different receivers to "pass" up their opponents and gather 469 yards of total offense. BYU now 1-1.

### BRIGHAM YOUNG 28, WISCONSIN 3

Sept. 20—Afternoon game (72°, sunny and clear) in Camp Randall Stadium, Madison, Wisconsin (71,496). Televised live in Utah by KBYU.

Playing before a crowd nearly as large as the entire population of Provo, BYU proved to itself that it can play with teams from the Big 10 Conference. The Cougars dominated the game both offensively and defensively, especially in the second half when they scored 21 of their 28 points. Jim McMahon was first to put points on the board for the Cougars with a one-yard run in the second quarter. After the defense stopped Wisconsin close to the goal line by recovering a fumble, McMahon blew the game open by spotting Dan Plater and hitting him on a 59-yard pass play. McMahon threw another touchdown pass in the third quarter to Bill Davis. Plater performed an encore a few minutes later by coming up with a 20-yard scoring pass from McMahon with only 9:38 left in the game. The defense, once again, held the Badgers at bay, allowing them only three points in the game. BYU now 2-1.

### BRIGHAM YOUNG 41, LONG BEACH 25

Sept. 27—Afternoon game (78°, clear, with no wind) in Provo (37,152).

For the first time of the season, BYU's offense blew out of the starting blocks in the first period of the game and put the game out of reach with a 21-0 lead. Eric Lane put the Cougars out in front on their first drive of the game by scooting five yards around the end for the score. Jim McMahon then went to work and connected on two of his four touchdown passes of the day to Lloyd Jones and Matt Braga. Before he was finished for the day, McMahon had completed 25 of 42 passes for 339 yards—his third straight game of passing for 300 or more yards. Defensively, the Cougars played strong in the first half but seemed to tire in the second stanza, allowing the Forty-niners to score 19 points. The 497 yards of total offense churned out by the Cougars was their best performance up to that time. McMahon's remaining two touchdown passes were good for two and 13 yards, and they were thrown to Bill Davis and Eric Lane respectively. In the defensive backfield, BYU came up with four timely interceptions to stall Long Beach drives. BYU now 3-1.

### BRIGHAM YOUNG 52, WYOMING 17

Oct. 11—Afternoon game (76°, clear with small gusts) in Provo (41,296).

The largest crowd in the history of Cougar Stadium turned out to witness what was considered a clash between the two best teams of the WAC conference. Wyoming sat among the nation's leaders in rushing yardage, and BYU was regaining momentum following its season-opening loss. The Cougars, led by Jim McMahon, responded to the challenge by producing 575 yards of total offense—443 of which came via the forward pass. Jim McMahon connected for four more touchdown passes to Bill Davis, Dan Plater, Matt Braga and Clay Brown. Eric Lane added two additional six-pointers on one-yard dives up the middle. Besides being five-for-five in the extra point category, Kurt Gunther kicked his first field goal of the season—a 39 yarder in the second quarter. Steve Carlson finished the Cougars' scoring for the day on a one-yard run and Lee Johnson saw his first varsity action by booting the extra point. The Cowboys only managed touchdowns in the third and fourth quarters as BYU's front line held them to 181 yards on the ground. BYU moved its record to 4-1.

#### BRIGHAM YOUNG 70, UTAH STATE 46

Oct. 18—Afternoon game (54°, sunny and clear) in Logan (23,230). Televised regionally by ABC.

One sportswriter described the game perfectly when he said: "It was the best of times and it was the worst of times." Records fell like overripe apples as the two teams engaged in a four-hour passing marathon that produced 116 points and 1,160 yards of total offense. Jim McMahon set two new NCAA records and tied a third while completing his fifth consecutive game of passing for more than 300 yards. The bad times for the Cougars came late in the game when defensive tackle Pulusila Filiaga hit a referee and was ejected from the game and was suspended for the remainder of the season. McMahon threw for six touchdowns and ran for two more as the Cougars acquired 710 yards of total offense. On the first play from the line of scrimmage, McMahon hit Eric Lane on a short pass, and the speedy back rambled 76 yards for the touchdown. Royce Bybee produced his first touchdown of the year, passing to Homer Jones for 29 yards. Utah State came roaring back in the fourth quarter to score 16 points and close to within 18, but Coach Edwards put the regulars back in to preserve the win. BYU now stands at 5-1.



#### BRIGHAM YOUNG 34, HAWAII 7

Oct. 25—Evening game (79°, fair, wind 15 m.p.h.) at Aloha Stadium, Honolulu, Hawaii (49,139).

Only a few minutes before game time, Jim McMahon was named as the starting quarterback. A few days before the game McMahon had been listed as a doubtful starter or one who would not see playing time because of his shoulder. The first quarter was a tight game, notched at 7-7, with Hawaii applying good defensive pressure. So intense was the pressure against BYU that at one time the Bows nearly had McMahon trapped on an attempted punt. However, McMahon wheeled to his left on the run and avoided the pursuit long enough to punt the ball left-footed for 33-yards, and the ball was downed on the UH one-yard-line. When the final tallies were in, McMahon had attempted an astonishing 60 passes and completed 31 of them. McMahon played the entire game and was selected by the Hawaii media as offensive player of the game. The defensive player of the game was BYU's Hawaiian Brad Anae, a defensive end. The 49,139 fans witnessing the game at Aloha Stadium was a new record in the islands. BYU now 6-1.

#### BRIGHAM YOUNG 83, TEXAS-EL PASO 7

Nov. 1—Afternoon game (62°, no wind, light clouds) at BYU Stadium, Provo (36,251).

A new WAC and school record was set by the 83 points scored, with the Cougars exclusively running the ball for the final one and one-half quarters. Jim McMahon led the Cougars to seven touchdowns, six of which came before the Miners scored. Clay Brown and Scott Phillips each had a pair of TD receptions from McMahon. In fact, Brown didn't even suit up for the second half. Many were watching McMahon, who had been cleared earlier in the week by doctors, to see if his arm would respond. McMahon's arm responded for 451 yards passing and six touchdown passes. Scott Phillips was McMahon's leading target, snaring 10 passes for 152 yards, while Lloyd Jones had

four catches for 117 yards. At one point in the second quarter, BYU was so overpowering they scored four touchdowns on 19 plays, covering 224 yards in a span of five minutes. Ironically, Jim McMahon's 372-yards passing in the first half was bested on the same afternoon by one-yard, when Illinois Dave Wilson threw for 373 yards versus Ohio State. BYU now 7-1 for the year.

#### BRIGHAM YOUNG 41, NORTH TEXAS STATE 23

Nov. 8—Afternoon game (58°, light breeze, cloudy) at BYU Stadium, Provo (36,583).

The Cougars had the Mean Green down 21-0 in the first quarter thanks to three fumbles by North Texas State. The Cougars needed the margin, because on the ensuing kickoff after BYU touchdown number three, the Mean Green tricked the Cougar special teams. A lateral pass which resulted in a 63-yard return was stopped deep in Cougar territory. The Mean Green scored on that possession, blocking a Clay Brown punt to set up another score, while BYU could only muster a field goal, making the score an uncomfortable 24-14 at half. North Texas State's defensive front four proved to be the stingiest BYU had faced to date. NTS added a field goal to close the gap to 24-17 until the Cougars' Jim McMahon found Brown for a third quarter touchdown. The fourth quarter the two teams still were battling. Kurt Gunther kicking BYU's longest field goal of the season at 43 yards, NTS scoring a TD and McMahon passing a bomb to Dan Plater for a 42-yard pass. "North Texas State is as good as any team we've played this year," said LaVell Edwards as his team's record moved to 8-1.

#### BRIGHAM YOUNG 45, COLORADO STATE 14

Nov. 15—Afternoon game (29°, clear and cold, slight wind) at BYU Stadium, Provo (40,515).

During a heavily contested first half, the Cougars pulled off a couple of quick scores in the game which would have meant the WAC championship for the Rams. Of the Cougars' early scores, the picture perfect 71-yard touchdown pass from Jim McMahon to Lloyd Jones who scampered down the sideline for the score was a pleasant memory. Both second quarter strikes were touchdown passes from Jim McMahon to Clay Brown. Brown's two TD receptions boosted him to a new WAC record with 13 touchdown catches. With the score 28-14 in favor of BYU at halftime, the Cougars felt far more secure than the 14-11 margin which separated CSU and BYU for the first quarter and a half. The backbreaker for CSU came at the beginning of the third quarter when BYU defensive end Brad Anae intercepted a screen pass which he carried 45 yards for a touchdown. McMahon threw his fifth TD pass of the game with 10 minutes left in the third quarter, then exited from the game. McMahon had broken four major NCAA records with the CSU tallies added to his season totals, tied several others and reset some of his own national marks. McMahon was 23 of 33 for 441 yards and was relieved by Royce Bybee who threw for 101 more yards. BYU now 9-1.

#### BRIGHAM YOUNG 56, UTAH 6

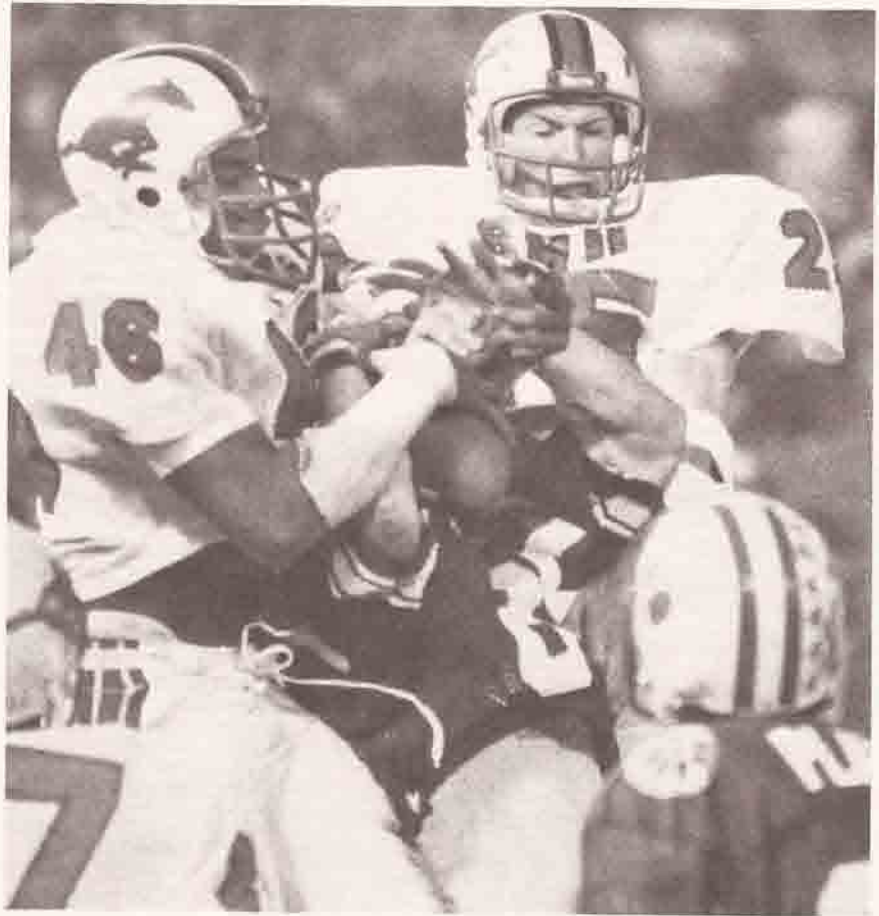
Nov. 22—Afternoon game (42°, rain showers, wind 4 m.p.h.) at Rice Stadium, Salt Lake City (30,520).

The Cougars' on-the-field actions spoke louder than the pre-game hype, with BYU securing the WAC Championship and the Holiday Bowl berth. Utah battled BYU well in the first half, stalling the Cougars who scored quickly only on their initial drive. Utah's offense was denied scoring opportunities until the Cougar offensive machine could untrack. Eric Lane scored the first of his three touchdowns in the game on the Cougar's opening drive. Jim McMahon ran for a TD and then scrambled long enough to spot Clay Brown in the end zone on another "great athletic maneuver" according to LaVell Edwards. Leading 21-0 at the half, BYU's offensive ions heated up for five more touchdowns, two more via the air to make McMahon the most prolific TD passer in the NCAA for one season. Although McMahon played all four quarters, his 399 yards passing stopped his streak of four consecutive 400-yard passing games. A bright spot for BYU late in the second half was the running of reserve tailback Scott Pettis who had a 50-yard run (the longest of the season for the Cougars) and scored the game's final touchdown. Until Utah scored in the fourth period, BYU had held the Utes scoreless for seven straight quarters including last year's tallies. BYU now 10-1.

#### BRIGHAM YOUNG 54, NEVADA-LAS VEGAS 14

Nov. 29—Night game (Clear, 53°) in the Las Vegas Silver Bowl (31,406).

Statistically, the Cougars and Rebels fought an even battle in every category except the score in the season finale. BYU, who was able to increase its win streak to 11 games, unleashed its record-setting offense for two touchdowns in each quarter, totaling 54 points. Once again it was Jim McMahon leading the way for the Cougars. The junior All-American completed 21 passes for 338 yards—his 11th consecutive plus-300-yard outing. Among his scoring feats were five touchdown passes and two TD gallops. McMahon's first scoring jaunt of 11 yards capped the Cougars' first drive of 71 yards and set the tone of the game. Later in the first quarter McMahon hit Matt Braga on a 21-yard strike to put the Cougars ahead 14-0. Before half time McMahon clicked with Dan Plater and Scott Phillips on passes of 32 and 2 yards. UNLV was first to score in the second half when Larry Gentry ran in from the two. In the remainder of the game, McMahon threw scoring passes to Eric Lane (23 yards), and Scott Phillips (10 yards) and ran two yards for another six-pointer. Scott Pettis also joined the scoring ranks with a 19-yard gallop in the last quarter. In total offense, BYU amassed 509 yards while averaging 7.5 yards per play. Scott Phillips was another offensive star for the Cougars, picking up 151 yards on four rushes and eight pass receptions. BYU now 11-1.

## Holiday Bowl III

# A Night to Remember

On the night of December 19, 1980, football fans across the country witnessed two football games in the San Diego Stadium.

The first, known as Holiday Bowl III, lasted three-and-a-half quarters and was won by Southern Methodist University. The second, since known as the "Miracle Bowl," lasted only four minutes and was won by Brigham Young University in front of a few thousand die-hard fans—remnants of the 50,214 who had expected a closer contest.

Officially, Holiday Bowl III, the most exciting of the incredulous Holiday Bowl finishes, will be remembered as a 46-45 BYU victory. But many of those who left the stadium or turned off their TV sets before the final gun had sounded, still swear SMU couldn't have lost the game.

Not even a movie producer could have dreamed up a better sequel to Holiday Bowl II, which Indiana won 38-37 after BYU missed a field goal in the closing seconds of the game. SMU, with running backs so powerful they had pulled their team to a second-place finish in the Southwest Conference, against BYU, the nation's offensive leader that was generated by a wide-open passing attack.

For 56 minutes, SMU taught BYU a lesson in running the football, its halfbacks rushing for huge chunks of yardage en route to paydirt. By the end of the third quarter, the Mustangs led 38-19.

At that point, TV sets clicked off around the nation and viewers went to bed. Fans exited the stadium as if in a fire drill. Those same people, however, were cursing themselves by morning.

The "Miracle Bowl" began with only 4:07 remaining in the game. At that point, SMU enjoyed what appeared to be an insurmountable 45-25 lead and the cheerleaders were receiving more TV time than the players.

A controversial catch in the endzone by Matt Braga, a recovered onside kick, a one-yard skirt around right end by Scott Phillips, a blocked punt by Bill Schoepflin, all set up what was later called a "Hall Mary" pass of 46 yards from Jim McMahon to Clay Brown after time had expired. Kurt Gunther's extra point sent BYU fans streaming onto the field, while SMU players, like BYU had done the previous year after their heartbreaking loss, slowly returned to the lockerroom.

The Fiesta Bowl loss in 1974, the Tangerine Bowl loss in 1976, the 23-16 loss to Navy in Holiday Bowl I, as well as the loss to Indiana in Holiday Bowl II, were all forgotten; the Cougars had finally won a post-season game.

Once again, everyone associated with the infant bowl game left the stadium with only one question on their minds: What can Holiday IV do for an encore?

# Cougars Add to Momentum

The wait was worth it.

For years Cougar fans waited for the aura of success to rest on BYU football. When things began to happen, they changed so dramatically that it is difficult even now to realize that as recently as the early seventies the Cougars had only one conference championship (and no bowl appearances) to their credit.

But during the nine-year tenure of Coach LaVell Edwards BYU football teams have won six WAC championships and appeared in five bowl games.

In 1979 the Cougars produced a perfect 11-0 record and quarterback Marc Wilson was named consensus All-American. The team also led the nation in four statistical categories. Everybody agreed that would be hard to duplicate in 1980. But the Cougars did.

The Western Athletic Conference title claimed in 1980 was BYU's seventh, the first coming in 1965 under Coach Tommy Hudspeth, followed by 1973, 1976 (tie), 1977 (tie), 1978, 1979, and 1980, all under Coach LaVell Edwards.

Football had its origin at BYU near the turn of the century in Provo, but a fatality resulted in its discontinuance. Resumed in 1922, minus three years during World War II, BYU has played a total of 56 intercollegiate seasons.

Historically, the Cougars have competed in the Rocky Mountain, Mountain States, Skyline, and Western Athletic football conferences, but only recently has BYU participated in bowl games.

The current winning tradition is fueled by good athletes who have neared their potential under the tutelage of veteran coaching staffs. Among those athletes are quarterback Marc Wilson, who set numerous records nationally, regionally, and locally from 1977-79. Wilson, who balloted third in Heisman Trophy voting, was preceded by QB Gifford Nielsen, who balloted sixth.

Nielsen (1975-77) set a few records himself and led the nation in passing categories to earn All-American honors. Nielsen was preceded by QB Gary Sheide (1973-74), who threw most of the 100 pass receptions caught by Jay Miller (1973-76), Miller's record of 22 receptions in one game still stands.

While passing has garnered the spotlight in Cougar annals, the running game has also produced some outstanding individuals. Eldon "The Phantom" Fortie (1961-62), a single-wing tailback who could pass and run, won All-America notice in 1962.

"Fleet" Pete VanValkenburg (1970-71) was the nation's leading rusher and a second team All-American, setting several WAC and school records in the process.

The top career rusher was Jeff Blanc (1973-76), and he had several plus-200-yard rushing games.

Offensive linemen of note include Gordon Gravelle (1970), Paul Howard (1972), Brad Oates (1973-75), and Orrin Olsen (1972-75), and most recently, Tom Bell (1974-79), the national Swede Nelson Sportsmanship Award Winner; and Nick Eyre (1977-80) won All-America honors most recently.

Defensive linemen of note include Jeff Slipp (1969), Wayne Baker (1972-74), Paul Linford (1972-74), Mekell Ieremia (1975-77); Glen Titenor (1978-80) and Glen Redd (1976-80).

Return specialists, too, have suited up for BYU, including Chris Farasopoulos (1968-70), the Galloping Greek, who led the nation in punt returns and set two NCAA records; and Golden Richards (1970-71), who is still listed as holding five NCAA records in kick returns.

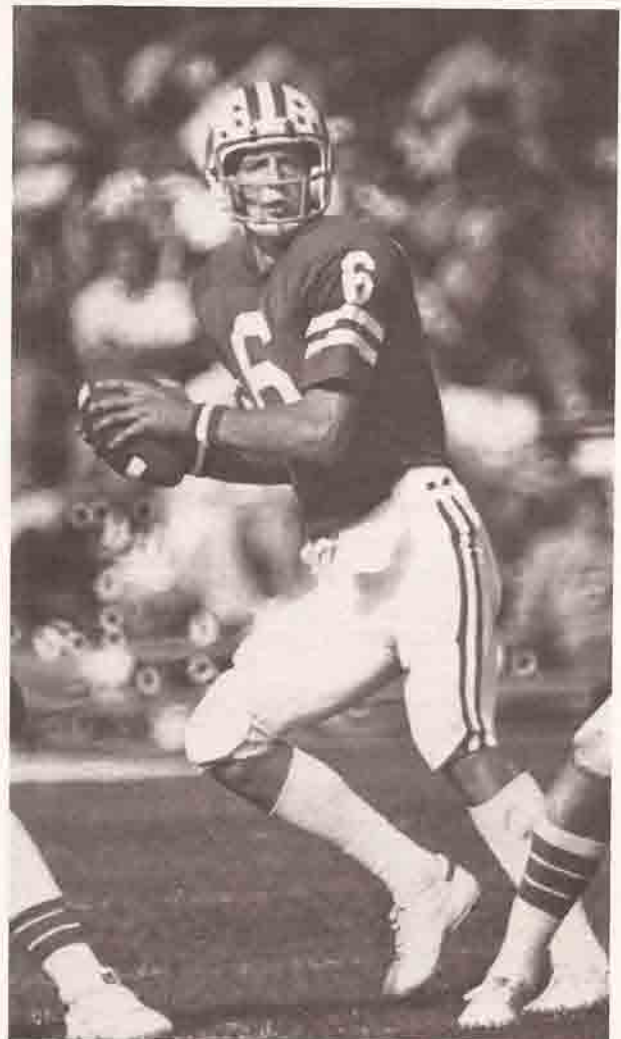
