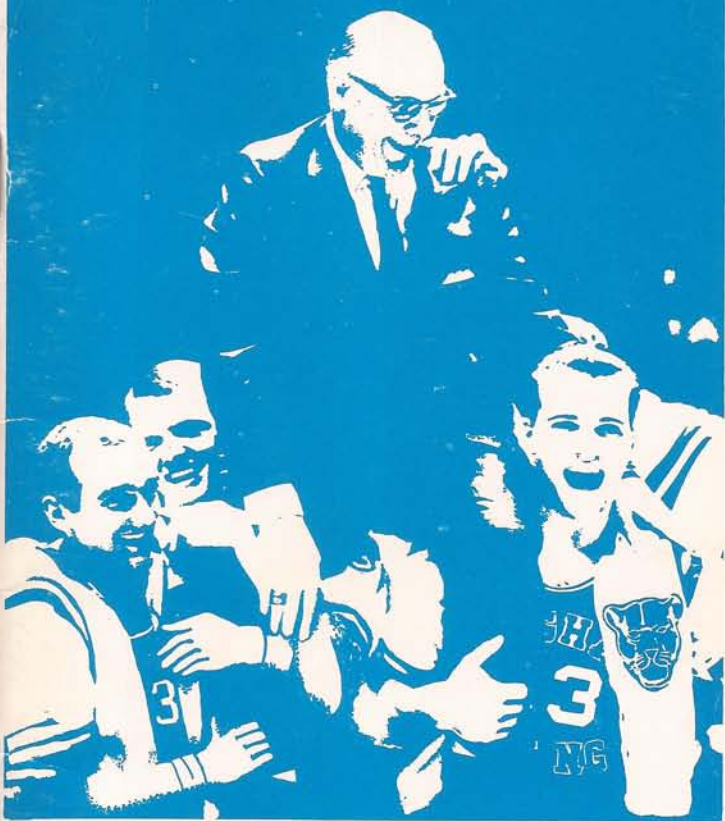

WELCOME, PRESS

PRESS PASSES — Requests for working passes should be made directly to Sports Information Director a week prior to the game. 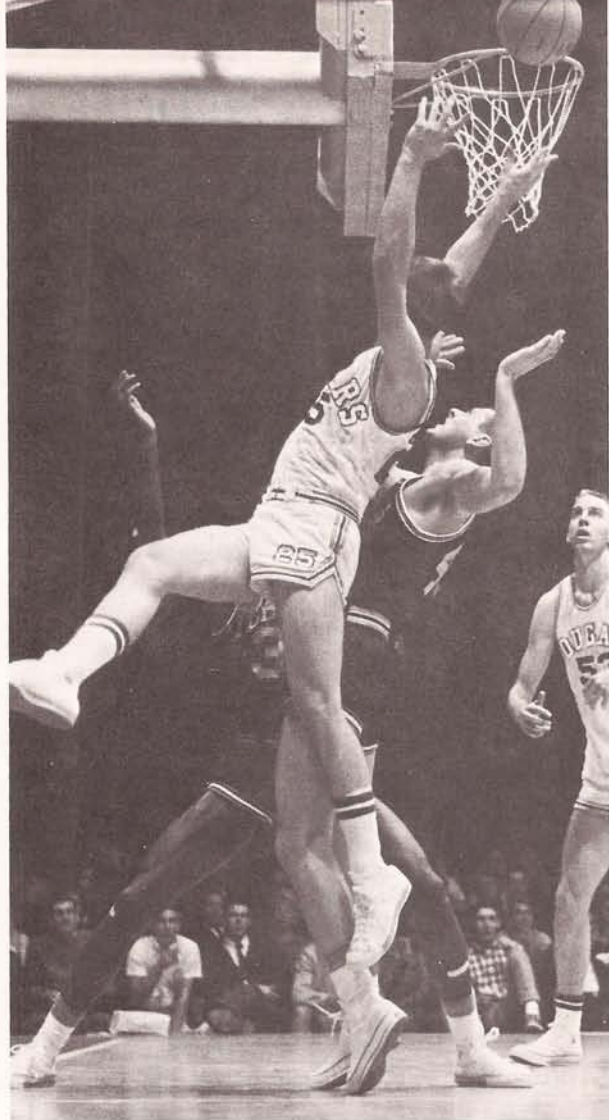

THE UNIVERSITY

Brigham Young University, the fountainhead of learning for The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints is among the largest church-related institutions of higher learning in the country. Within the University there are 13 colleges, and the graduate school offers the doctoral degree in 14 departments.

The school is located in beautiful Utah Valley on a bench overlooking Provo, Utah, a community of almost 42,000 people. Rugged mountains in the Wasatch range border the valley on three sides, the Utah Lake forms a border on the west.

Forty-five miles to the north is Salt Lake City, capital of Utah and historic center of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, (commonly called the Mormon Church).

This is the setting. But the school is more than this: It is a center of higher learning which places special emphasis on spiritual values, on friendly association, and on knowledge. But in any setting, the school would be unique because of its atmosphere.



COACH STAN WATTS

"The Dean of the Intermountain Coaches" seems a fitting title for BYU's Stan Watts. His 17 year record at BYU certainly speaks for itself.

Watts has many fond memories of teams coached at BYU since he came to Provo in 1949. Since that time, Cougar basketball teams have rolled up 312 wins against 189 losses, making Watts one of a select group of coaches who have won 300 games in a career.

Included in Stan's 17 seasons are four league championships, two NIT championships, seven second place finishes in conference play, and wins in such fine holiday tournaments as the Dixie Classic, Holiday Festival, Motor City Toruney, Quaker City, and Far West.

Certainly Watts will have a hard time forgetting the accomplishments of his 1966 team. Rebounding from four losses on the road, the Cougars finished second in the WAC and then went on to win the NIT in New York City, thus bringing acclaim to not only BYU but also Provo, the State of Utah, and the Western Athletic Conference.

Even after 312 wins, victory is not routine for Watts. He has had to scrap for every one of them, and competition he has faced includes many of the great teams in college basketball history.

In addition to coaching, which he admits is a 12-month job—Watts has found time for many other activities. He is the author of a fine book, "Developing an Offensive Attack in Basketball," that has sold nearly 15,000 copies to date. He is also a regular contributor to magazines and periodicals on the subject of basketball. In addition, he is a member of the BYU Campus Fourth Stake High Council.

A quick look at Watts' background can help tell his story in athletics. A native of Murray, Utah, he was an all-around athlete at Murray High School and Weber College before transferring to BYU. While at BYU, he was a three sport letterman.

In 1938 he began his coaching career at Millard (Utah) High School, where he was head coach of three sports. In 1941 he moved to Dixie College as athletic director and head basketball coach. He moved back into the high school ranks in 1945 as head basketball coach at Jordan High School. In 1947, he returned to his alma mater and became head baseball and assistant basketball coach for the Cougars. Two years later the head coaching job opened and Watts was named head basketball coach.

Watts also served for a short time as defensive backfield coach of the BYU football team, and one of those years BYU was rated among the top teams in the nation in pass defense.

A popular speaker at clinics, workshops, and other affairs, Watts has been active in many organizations. He is a past member of the National Basketball Board and is currently third vice-president of the National Association of Basketball Coaches.

Watts has been married to the former Emily Kelly "for over 25 years" and they have four children: Janice (Mrs. Dennis Jones), Susan (21), Judy (17), and Howard (13).

COACH PETE WITBECK

Now in his third year as chief assistant to Stan Watts is Alan "Pete" Witbeck, a native of Raymond, Alberta, Canada.

Many Brigham Young University basketball fans will remember Witbeck best as the Cougar freshman coach. During a span of several years, Witbeck and his frosh enjoyed unusual success. His last three years with the frosh, the Kittens were 38-3. His 1963-64 team included such players as Neil Roberts, Ken James, Craig Raymond, Jim Jimas, and Gary Hill, and was undefeated in 14 games. That team averaged over 109 points per game, a record that may stand for many freshman seasons.

In addition to winning regularly, Witbeck was able to orient the new players to the BYU style of play, thus making the job of moving up to the varsity a little easier.

In 1964 he was named assistant varsity coach following five years with the frosh. Hired initially as a scout for Watts, he did so well that he was able to progress rapidly. He is regarded as one of the top recruiters in this part of the country.

Witbeck was a three year letterman for BYU track teams in the early 1950's. He was an outstanding distance runner, competing in the mile and two mile.

Witbeck handles much of the scouting of BYU opponents. That duty takes him thousands of miles each year. In 1965, he traveled about 100,000 miles, including a 25,000 mile chunk in South and Central America with the barnstorming Cougars. In addition to his scouting duties, he is responsible for pre-season conditioning.

Witbeck married the former Kathy Marshall last summer. They are now living in Provo.

COACH GARY EARNEST

The man who inherited Pete Witbeck's freshman coaching job (and its winning ways) is Gary Earnest, a standout guard on BYU basketball teams in 1959-60-61.

A native of Longview, Washington, Earnest was a three sport letterman in high school, winning monograms in baseball, basketball and football. In basketball, he was an all-state selection.

How he came to BYU is an interesting story. While in the Marines, his base team was playing in a semi-pro tournament in Las Vegas. Also in that tourney was a Salt Lake City team coached by Witbeck. Witbeck was so impressed that he immediately began recruiting Earnest for Stan Watts. The rest is history. Earnest came to BYU and proceeded to become the sixth leading career scorer in BYU history.

For three years he was a regular with the Cougars, and in his senior year, 1961, was an all-Skyline Conference selection. During his three years at BYU, he scored 1,108 points.

Upon graduation from BYU in 1961, Earnest began his coaching career at Rich High School in Randolph, Utah. His team there was 24-3 finishing third in the state playoffs. From there he moved over to Moapa Valley High School in Overton, Nevada. His one year there was equally successful, finishing with a 19-2 record and a second place finish in the state tourney.

After two years of coaching in high school and two years at BYU, his career record is 66-9—not bad for a young coach. His 1964-65 debut in the college coaching ranks was successful as his Kittens finished with a 10-3 mark. Last year's frosh finished with a 13-1 record.

Earnest is married to the former Ruth Robinson of American Fork. They have two sons, Edward Kent (3½) and Steven Kyle (2).

ROD KIMBALL, TRAINER

A kind of patriarch of athletic teams at B.Y.U., Rod Kimball has spent more than 26 years in his assignment as team trainer. As the father figure for the Cougars, Rod's duties range from cut man to moulder of team morale.

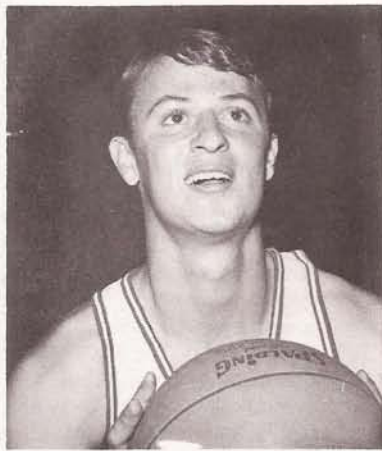

A native of Jordan Utah, Rod was an outstanding athlete and student leader in college. He is a former LDS bishop, and he and his wife, LaNeve, have 12 living children.

SEASON OUTLOOK

There's one built-in danger that every successful team has to learn to live with—too high a level of expectation from those who must fill the shoes of the champs. There's a wide-spread belief that, despite the loss of key personnel, every title team should pick up where it left off the season before. And memories of that NIT team are still fresh in the minds of the fans.

Viewed realistically, however, it should be apparent that this year's team will not resemble the '66 club; at least not in the fore part of the season. Certainly they should not be expected to come near the 20-5 record of last year.

Coach Stan Watts has only three regulars to replace—guards Dick Nemelka and Jeff Congdon, forward Steve Kramer. But with all his fababled court wizardry, Watts really isn't expected to replace this trio that averaged nearly 60 points per game between them. Congdon and all-American Dick Nemelka comprised the best backcourt twosome in college basketball last year, and the shooting and aggressive play of forward Kramer was the best seen at BYU within a decade. Over and above the loss of their shooting, speed and experience, they left a big void in leadership.

Consequently, there are bound to be some changes, and some experimentation to develop a new core.

Viewed at closer range, this year's team will have plenty of height (the eight forwards and centers will average 6-8), will be a hot-shooting group, but may not have the speed, court savvy or cohesiveness that pulled the Cougars through many a tight game last year.

Past injuries, too, provide a precarious element to the outlook. At least three key players—forward Neil Roberts and guards Gary Hill and Jim Jimas—stand on uncertain stems. All have undergone knee surgery within the last year or so. At this writing, Jimas is still recovering from a knee injury suffered during pre-season practice.

Looking at the team by position: The guard line, without Jimas, will be a little inexperienced. Senior Ken James (6-3) could fill the gap, but Watts has moved Hill into the back court where the veteran can lend a little balance. Lynn Parsons (6-3) and Jon Dresser (6-2) are two sophomores up from the frosh team that will eventually add to the depth.

With three centers towering around 6-11, Watts has all the depth he needs. In lieu of a standout post man, the Cougars will very likely alternate with two

proven players, Craig Raymond and Jim Eakins. Raymond looked like an all-American in the NIT championship game, and he was the Cougars' top man in rebounding last year. Eakins had the best shooting percentage—57%—on the squad, and worked well on the boards. Orville Fisher and Scott Warner (6-7) will play backup roles.

On the forward line, Roberts (6-5) has been alternating with Hill at one forward position since his sophomore year. He should have one forward position nailed down. A pair of sophomores, Marty Lythgoe (6-5) and Kari Liimo (6-7) who averaged over 20 points a game as freshmen, are vying for the other starting forward position.

Once this club is given a little time to mature and is brought into focus, it should be able to battle with the best. Until then, it will probably have to age under fire.

1966 REVIEW

Time has a way of dissolving all but the best memories. This being the case, it will be a long, long time before BYU fans forget last year's squad was the highest-scoring, hottest-shooting team in the school's history.

In 1966, for the second year in a row, the Cougars finished as a 20-game winner; this despite the fact that only 22 games were on the regular schedule. The NIT provided the Cougars with an opportunity to reach the select 20-game circle.

The Cougars were undefeated on their home floor during the 1965-66 season, and four of their five losses on the road came against WAC opponents. The only other defeat on the road was a two-pointer to LaSalle in the first round of the Quaker City Tournament.

In 10 of their games the Cougars scored 100 or more points, and the team's scoring average was a skyscraping 95.5 points per game. Four of the Cougar regulars had scoring averages in double figures.

As a team, the Cougars hit 50% of their shots from the field, while limiting opponents to a 40% completion ratio.

—Field Goal Leaders—

Centers Craig Raymond and Jim Eakins, although they didn't attempt a large number of shots, led the team in percentage of field goals made. Raymond hit 56% and Eakins 57% from the field. Five other players scored better than half of their shots, and no BYU player hit under the 43% mark.

Steve Kramar set a new career record with the Cougar varsity. The big senior from Sandy averaged an even 50% from the field as a three-year regular with the Cats. Kramer and guard Ken James led the team in free throw shooting, each had an 81% average.

Six-eleven junior Craig Raymond captured the team rebound title with 247 rebounds, followed by Kramer with 219 and Eakins with 177.

All-American Dick Nemelka set a new school record with his 24.0 per game scoring average, and his three-year scoring mean of 16.7 points per game is also a new BYU standard.

As a team, the Cougars out-shot, out-rebounded, and out-scored their opponents for the second year in a row. Besides being 10% more effective in their shooting, the Mountain Cats averaged four rebounds per game more than their opponents.

In the scoring department, BYU ended the season with a healthy 12.6 point spread of offense over defense. This ties a school record dating back to 1953.

—Drawing Power—

In terms of drawing power, the Cougars proved to be a top attraction at home and on the road. In all, the Cougars played before 217,574 fans, a record number for one season.

At home the Cougars drew 111,722 fans, or an

average of 10,157 per game. There are only 10,200 permanent seats in the fieldhouse. Largest home crowd of the season was the 11,158 turnout for the game with St. Joseph's. Largest crowd on the road was the 18,499 who watched BYU defeat Army in the semifinals of the NIT.

These attendance figures do not include the closed-circuit telecasts of home and road games involving BYU. With one exception, all home games were beamed to audiences in the Wilkinson Center, and the Cougars' two games with Utah were both telecast live to fans in the Intermountain West.

In the 15 years that the George Albert Smith fieldhouse has been in operation, BYU's basketball teams have played before 1,413,332 fans in 183 games. The average crowd for all home games during this period is 7,723.
