# The Conference

The Western Athletic Conference began its 18th season with the start of the 1979-80 school year. However, things have changed since its formation in 1962. On July 1, 1978, two charter members of the league, Arizona and Arizona State, left the WAC for the Pac-Ten. On the same day, San Diego State made its official entry on the scene, upping the league membership to seven members.

More changes are due in 1980. The University of Hawaii became the eighth member on July 1, 1979. The Air Force Academy enters the WAC on July 1, 1980 and Nevada-Las Vegas' entrance is pending final vote by WAC President's Council.

All three of the new members possess good athletic programs and represent three of the fastest growing areas in the country.

When the league expands in 1980, the WAC will stretch from the pine tree forests of Utah, Colorado, and Wyoming to the desert southwest of West

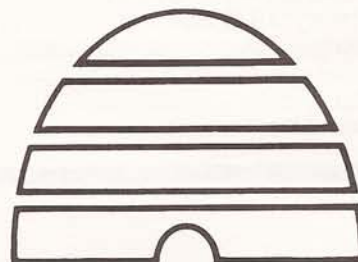
Texas, New Mexico, and Nevada to the coastal surfs of California and Hawaii.

Founded on July 1, 1962, the charter members included Arizona, Arizona State, Brigham Young, New Mexico, Utah, and Wyoming. In September 1967, Colorado State and Texas-El Paso were added to make the WAC an eight-team league.

Based in Denver, Colorado, the WAC is led by Commissioner Stan Bates who assumed his current position in 1971. Bates, former athletic director at Washington State University, is the third conference commissioner since the formation of the league.

Nordy Jensen serves as director of information for the WAC; John Adams is supervisor of football officials; and Irv Brown is supervisor of basketball officials.

# University Background

Sponsored by The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, Brigham Young University is the nation's largest church-related university (25,000 students).

Its more than 1,100 full-time faculty members hold degrees from throughout the United States and several foreign countries and instruction is offered in 150 subject areas by the University's 16 colleges and graduate schools.

Situated just 45 miles south of Salt Lake City in beautiful Utah Valley, the 536-acre campus has the Wasatch Mountain range as a backdrop on the east with Utah Lake on the west.

BYU has had more than its fair share of firsts, but the University has much more to offer prospective engineers, artists, teachers, and businessmen. It is a place where a student can examine his or her own needs for truth in the context of moral and spiritual development.

The answers to students' searching questions are shaped by the variety of interests, backgrounds and aspirations. BYU is not an island. The largest ethnic

group on campus is the American Indian, numbering over 500. There are Chicanos, Blacks, Orientals, and others, all applying their own particular perspective of life to their academic programs.

The campus is perhaps one of the most cosmopolitan in the nation, enrolling students from every state and 70 foreign countries. Nearly 8,000 others are bilingual, having served missions abroad for The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints.

Admission is open to those of any race, color, creed, or national origin, provided they meet the University's academic requirements and their personal behavior conforms to the standards of the LDS Church.

It was a century ago that Brigham Young, the great Mormon colonizer of the West, signed a deed of trust to establish an academy of the LDS Church in Provo which later grew to be Brigham Young University. A German immigrant schoolmaster, Dr. Karl G. Maeser, was commissioned to open the institution with this charge: "I want you to remember that you ought not to teach even the alphabet or the multiplication tables without the spirit of God."

# The Marriott Center

"Sold Out," was the sign that hung by the Marriott Center Ticket Office this year at the first of October.

The 22,700-seat arena, now in its ninth season, is the largest on-campus arena in the nation. While the seating capacity is listed at 22,700, a record crowd of 23,006 was in attendance for last year's BYU-Utah basketball game. Last season's total attendance record of 277,020 was also a new school record.

Basketball fever is rampant at BYU, in Utah and in the Western Athletic Conference. In fact, the state of Utah leads the nation in per capita attendance and the WAC was third overall in attendance, drawing over 1,000,000 fans for the fifth year in a row.

The J. Willard Marriott Center could surpass the 2,000,000 mark this season if this year's 14 home games draw as well as the home games of 1978-79.

No wonder, then, that University officials thought big when the time came to build a new multi-purpose arena several years ago. The new center had to be located as close to the center of campus as possible, had to be flexible enough to serve other major activities, and had to seat as many spectators as possible.

Named after the nationally known businessman who was the major contributor, the Marriott Center houses crowds for basketball, commencement exercises, concerts, pageants, devotionals and many other activities.

Twice the Marriott Center has served as the host facility for the NCAA Far West regional playoffs, 1977 and 1979.

The building was opened on schedule on December 3, 1971, and has met the above expectations since then.

Physically, the building covers three acres. The outside dimensions are 280 x 340, or the equivalent of two football fields placed side by side. The roof covers 130,000 square feet and encloses 8-million cubic feet. From the playing floor to the top of the roof the height is nearly ten stories.

There are roughly 10,100 chair seats in the building with the balance being bleacher seats. About 40 percent of the seats are below the concourse level.

Besides the usual locker rooms, training facilities, etc., the Marriott Center serves as ticket headquarters for most major campus events. It also provides offices for the basketball coaching staff.

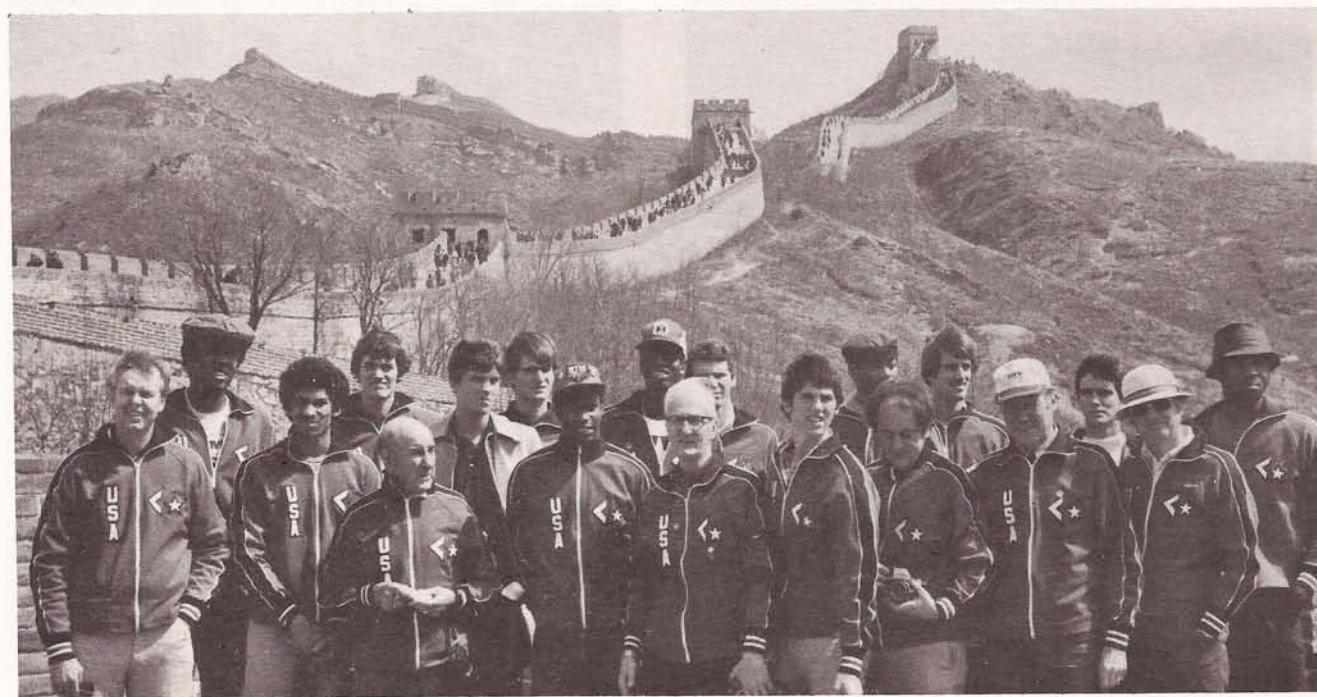

## The Outlook

There has been only one school to win back-to-back conference titles in the 17-year history of the WAC and that was BYU in 1971 and 1972.

All five starters return from last year's championship BYU squad and the 22,700-seat Marriott Center is sold out for season tickets, so the only onus or bonus for the Cougars is to see if they can repeat as WAC titlists.

Should the starting five remain the same as last year, the lineup would be two seniors, a junior and two sophomores. The 1978-79 squad produced a 20-8 record, the best since the Cougars won the 1972 WAC crown with a 21-5 record.

The lone junior from last year's starting five is All-American Danny Ainge, referred to as Danny Two Sport by *Sports Illustrated*. Ainge, twice All-WAC, sports a 19.8 average in his two years on the BYU guard line. When Ainge isn't serving as a catalyst for the Cougars, he is working out as a second baseman for the Toronto Blue Jays.

The two seniors to join 6-5 Ainge are 6-10 center Alan Taylor and 6-1 backcourt artist Scott Runia. Runia was second team All-WAC and Taylor was honorable mention last season. Taylor enters his third season as a starter in the pivot, improving vastly each season. Taylor is BYU's workhorse on the boards and is an excellent percentage field goal shooter inside the perimeter.

Outside the perimeter, the quick release pistol is Runia, a BYU starter since his freshman days.

The two sophomore forwards are excellent shooters both inside and outside, with a number of fluid moves toward the bucket. The power forward mold is filled by 6-10 Fred Roberts, who played in four foreign countries this past season with either U.S. all-star teams or the BYU squad's trip to Italy and Yugoslavia. Roberts had an excellent freshman year. The finesse forward is filled by 6-7 Devin Durrant, who had a good freshman season. Durrant is a highly skilled passer who exhibited a deft touch a few times last season.

And without losing hardly a beat in pulse in the backcourt, Arnold can insert 6-2 junior Steve Craig, who can really spring as a jumper.

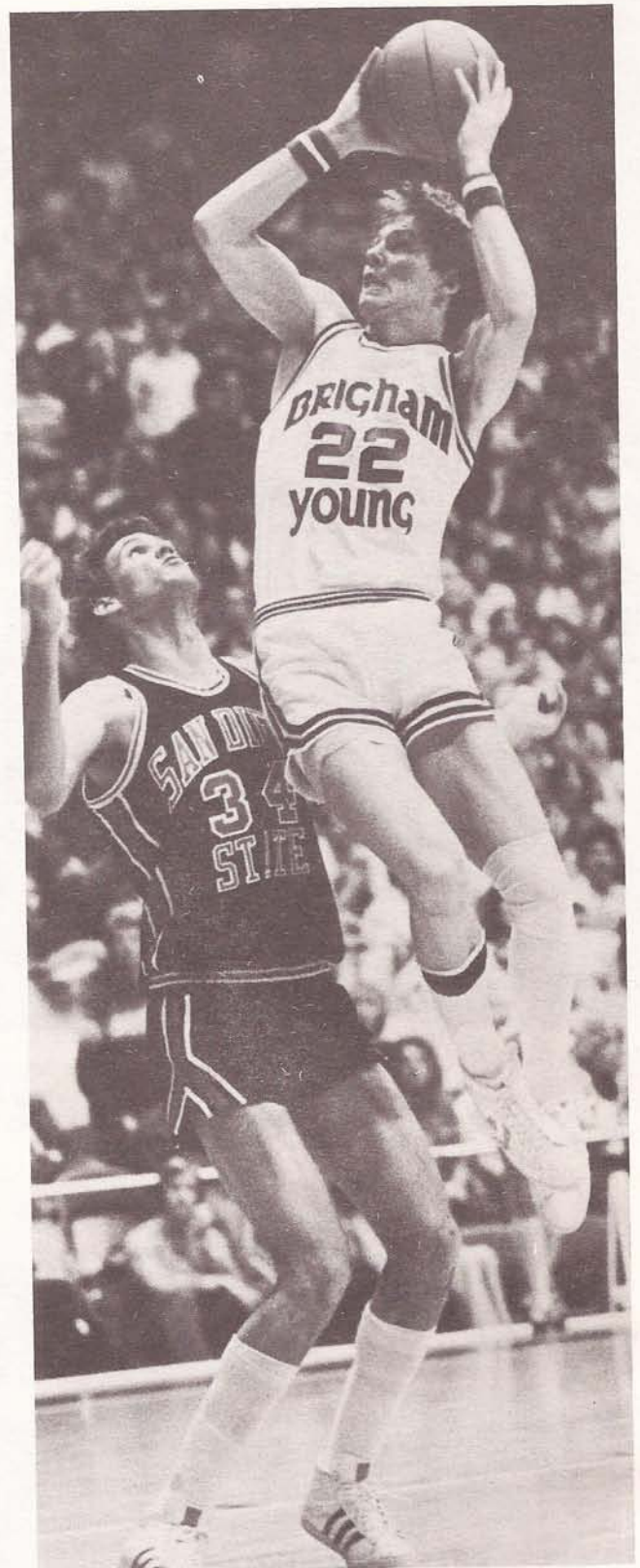
Sophomore muscleman Steve Trumbo, 6-8, is probably the first forward off the bench, but even had to spare others in the pivot at times last season. He, too, has excellent vertical jumping ability.

Craig Christensen, 6-4, was the only other returning letterman who saw much action last season, but finds himself mixed with some of the most talented backcourt players in the Rockies.

A new blossom in the backcourt is 6-3/4 redshirt Greg Ballif, who pots left-handed and has hustled himself into contention after foot surgery.

The trip to Italy and Yugoslavia produced a few surprises other than Ballif's return, and one of them was 6-6 Steve Anderson. Anderson proved himself as a long-range zone buster and seems to have recovered from knee surgery which curtailed his playing time last season.

Newcomers, a couple of prep All-Americans, strengthen the pivot and guard line for the Cougars, with 6-11 Greg Kite and 6-1 Mike Maxwell. Kite (Houston, Tex.) has the ability to adequately spell Taylor, while Maxwell (Salt Lake City, Utah) is quick

and is an excellent shot—both were probably the cream of their respective regions last season.

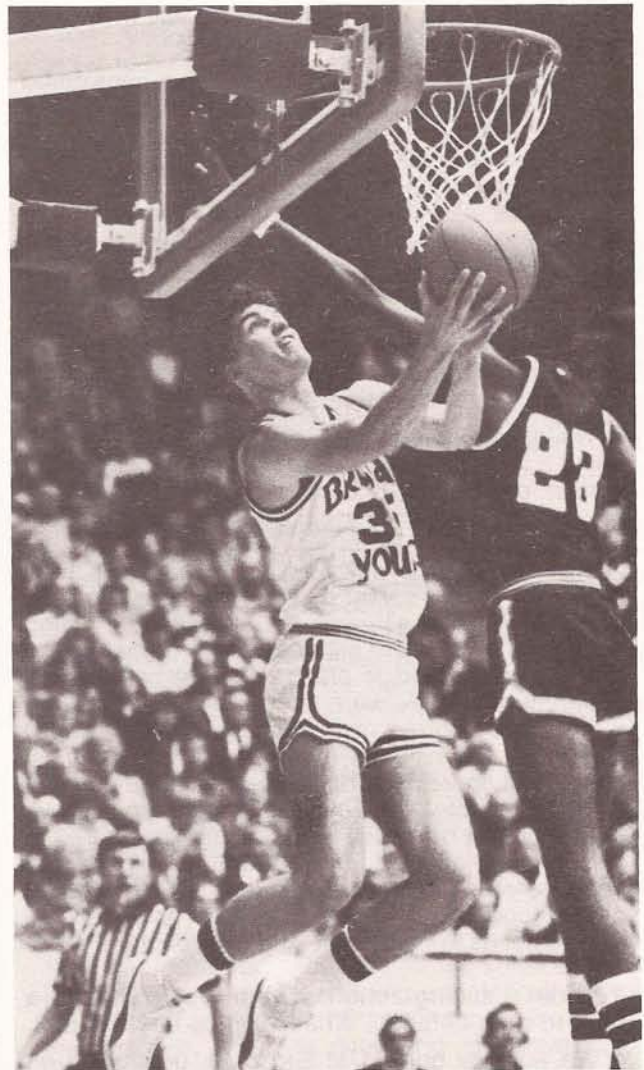
Graduation losses from last season were just a shade below those of 1978—two players with a combined firepower of five per cent. Another loss to the team is that of 7-0 Dave McGuire, who transferred to a Los Angeles area junior college.

# **Arnold Answers**

## **Questions on**

### **1979-80 Team**

Will our graduate and mission losses or our incoming freshmen alter BYU's game plan?

• Very little, if any. Our graduation and mission losses included two players that saw limited action and one redshirt that saw none. If anything, our incoming freshmen Greg Kite and Mike Maxwell will give us additional strength and depth.

The starting five returns this year; will they necessarily be the starters for 1979-80?

• On the first day of practice, they were considered as our starting five. What happens between now and our first game, however, will be based entirely upon which five players will best play together as a unit. Frankly, I feel that too much emphasis is put on who will start. There is no doubt in my mind that we have at least seven players who have the ability to start for us and two more who will play substantially and will contribute greatly to the success we hope to enjoy.

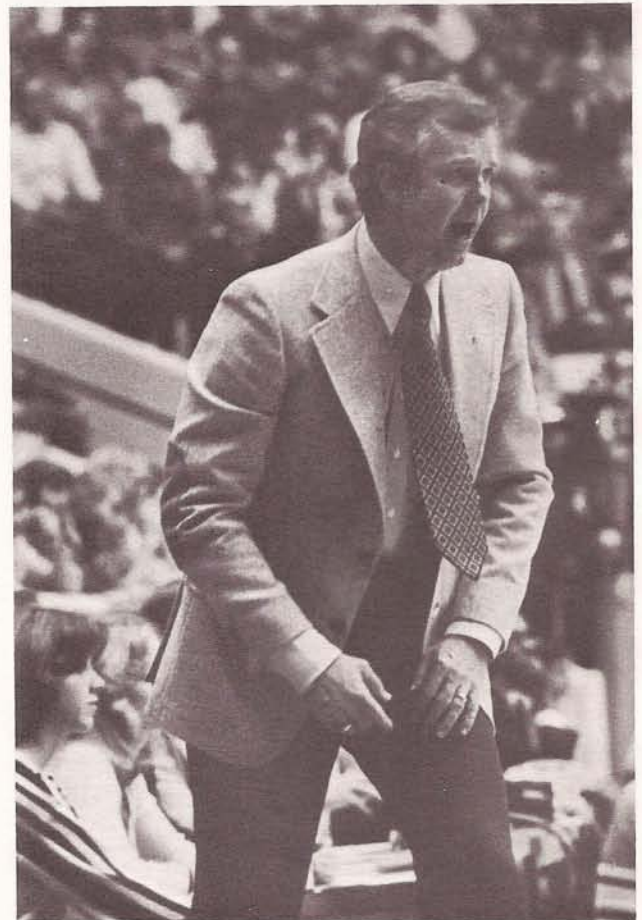
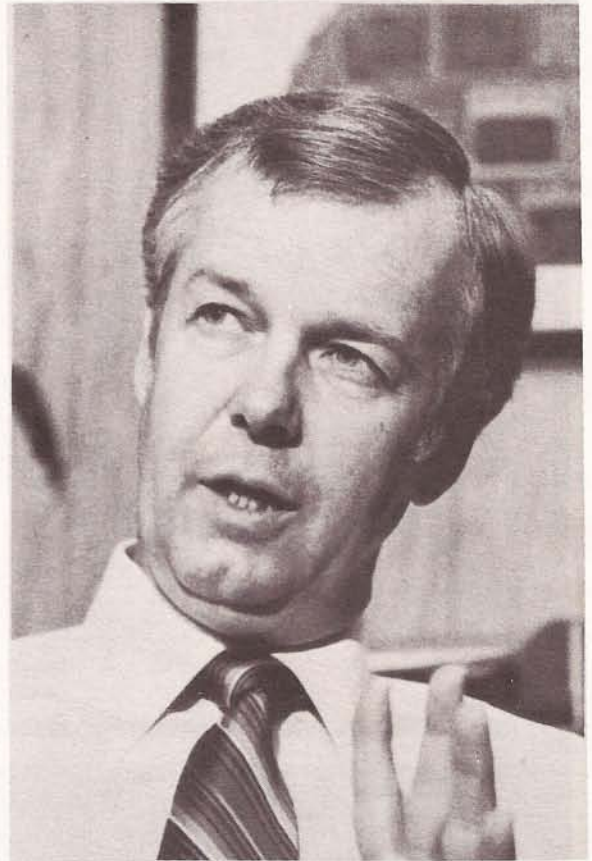
What was it that our team lacked last year and do we have those elements this year?

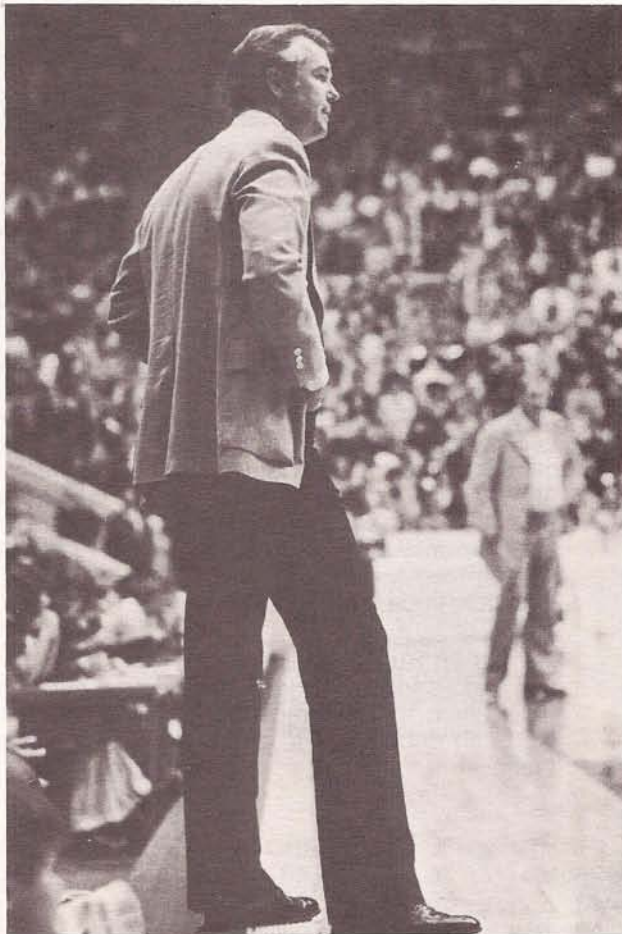
• We lacked three things last year that kept us from being a legitimate national power. (1) Experience at certain positions; (2) Solid man-to-man defensive play at certain positions; (3) Backup strength at the center position.

This year I believe we will improve in all three areas. (1) We are a year older so obviously we have more experience, although we are still quite young in certain spots; (2) Last year some of our young players were asked to play a different position defensively than they were accustomed to. I'm sure we will see improvement from them this year; (3) Greg Kite will help us more this year than most people will appreciate. His presence on the practice court will enable Alan Taylor to continue to improve even more for his final year. I do not expect Greg to set the world afire his first year, but he will prove to be a very competent replacement for Alan when called upon, which will enable us to give Alan the rest he needs to perform at peak efficiency.

You ran a sliding zone last year, but you favor a man-to-man defense. What will it be in 1979-80?

• We will play both M/M and zone, depending on the opposition. Whichever it is I assure you it will be hard-nosed and intense.





Do you plan to implement any other offensive or defensive changes?

• We were successful with what we did last year so I have no intention to change things drastically. We simply hope to improve upon—in some cases add to—our offensive and defensive attacks.

Evaluate the following: our strengths, weaknesses, schedule, and the WAC.

• *Strength*—I believe that we will be strong at all five starting positions, and have a very capable, strong bench for support. We will be a good rebounding team and an excellent shooting team. Our team togetherness is exceptional.

*Weaknesses*—Speed and quickness in certain positions.

*Schedule*—A good schedule. We will be fortunate enough to face some of the outstanding teams in America, particularly in tournament play, providing we are successful in first round competition.

*WAC*—I have said on many occasions that I felt that the WAC was down a bit last year—mainly because it was so young. Every team, with one exception, had outstanding freshmen and sophomore players. That certainly does not lessen our championship, because we were one of the youngest teams, if not the youngest team, in the conference overall.

Our young players continue to grow, and will prove to be as good as any in the country. I therefore feel that for the next two or three years we can expect the competition in the WAC to be among the finest in America. We will be one of the top three or four conferences nationwide.

You were picked to finish first in the WAC last year and accomplished that task. Explain how you intend to repeat this process.

• Last year is history. We are proud of our accomplishments, but they are absolutely meaningless as far as our future is concerned.

We intend to upgrade our level of performance in every category. We will expect every coach and every player to dedicate himself to longer, harder hours of work.

It is our goal to become the very best team that we are capable of becoming. If we do that and it results in another conference championship, we will obviously be pleased and proud once again. On the other hand, if we become the very best team we are capable of becoming and it does not result in a championship, we will still be pleased and proud. To do our best is our objective. If we do so, we will be successful.

Hawaii is now in the league. Will their addition pose many new problems?

• Hawaii's program has been down, but they are rebounding steadily. We expect them to be a positive force in future years. The long round trip to Honolulu looks very attractive on the surface. It will be, however, a very demanding and difficult trip for just the one game. Other than the travel, the lure of the beaches, the hula girls, and the great Polynesian food, we certainly see no problems with Hawaii's entrance into the WAC.

# The Head Coach: Frank Arnold

Fifth Year

56-55 Record

Entering his fifth season at BYU, Frank Arnold is now among the elite of Cougar coaches who have posted plus .500 records. His 56-55 record puts him among the top four coaches out of the 11 who preceded Arnold.

Since 1976 Arnold, 46, has steadily rebuilt the Cougar hardwood program to one of national prominence. Arnold, the former assistant at UCLA from 1971-75, is well known in basketball circles for his technical knowledge of the game, his broad coaching background and dedication to the game. He has also participated in many basketball clinics at home and abroad. Most recently he conducted clinics in China, Italy and Yugoslavia. The China tour was with the U.S. All-Star team last summer and the Italy-Yugoslavia tour was with the BYU squad last July.

Among Arnold's past clinic itineraries are three clinics in Spain, two clinics in Yugoslavia, one in Peking and Shanghai, a few in Canada and many throughout the United States.

"The Italian basketball Coaches Association said our clinic was one of the finest they've ever had," says Arnold.

Frank has authored a book on man-to-man defenses and was selected as Coach of the Year in the Western Athletic Conference for 1979 by *Basketball Weekly*.

Arnold coached at UCLA from 1971-75 as an assistant to John Wooden. In the four seasons at UCLA, Arnold helped coach the Bruins to three NCAA titles. While at UCLA Arnold was responsible for much of the recruiting and scouting, and was in charge of the junior varsity program where he tallied a 50-26 record.

Although Frank has altered some of his philosophies since coaching in the WAC, a lot of his ideas remain the same.

"I set forth three criteria for an athlete: out-

standing ability, a sincere desire to get a degree, and fine citizenship."

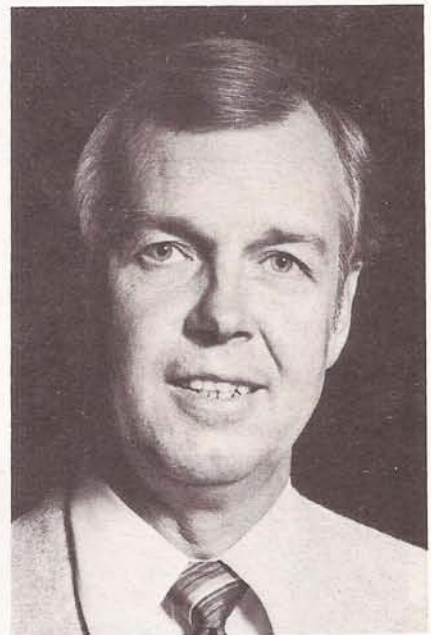
Born October 1, 1934 in Ogden, Utah, Arnold graduated from Pocatello High School in 1952 and then graduated from Idaho State University in 1956. His first coaching job came at Payette, Idaho, in 1956-57. Arnold then accepted the head coaching job at Provo's B.Y. High in 1958 and began working on his master's degree. He obtained his master's in physical education in 1960 and coached at the BYU laboratory school through 1962.

In the 1962-63 season, Arnold served as a graduate assistant coach at the University of Oregon at Eugene and then accepted the head coaching job at Pocatello High for 1963-64.

In 1964 he took over as the head basketball coach at Clark Junior College in Vancouver, Wash., where he remained until 1966. From 1966-71, he served as an assistant basketball coach at Oregon before he began coaching at UCLA in 1971.

# Harry Anderson

An original member of Frank Arnold's staff, Harry Anderson is now in his fifth season as an assistant coach. He came to BYU from Orem High School and Utah Trade Tech where he had very successful teams at both schools.

During his 10 years at Orem, Coach Anderson's teams were perennial contenders for league honors. In the last eight seasons his teams won 144 games and lost only 28. They were in the semifinals or finals of the state tournament his last five years. His final two teams placed second in the state, losing each time by a single point to arch-rival Provo.

Coach Anderson left Orem High on sabbatical leave in 1974 and soon after was offered the head coaching job at Utah Tech. At UTC he produced the school's first winning record in their four-year history. He was timed in the 100 in 9.7 in high school and recorded a 9.5 in a Skyline meet.

Coach Anderson averaged 12 points in college basketball and lettered four years in track.

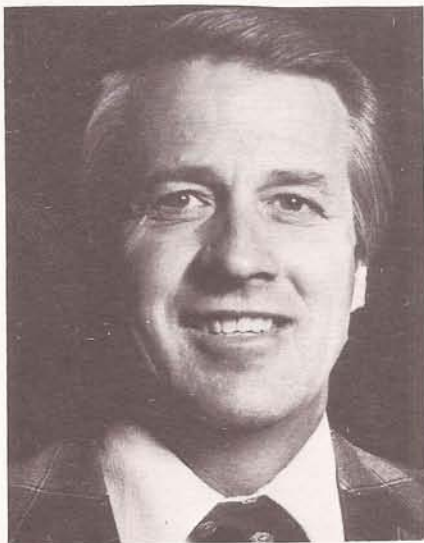
He started his junior and senior years (1955-57) and the final team he played on won the Skyline Conference championship under Stan Watts, former Director of Athletics at BYU.

Currently Harry serves as a bishop for the LDS Church.

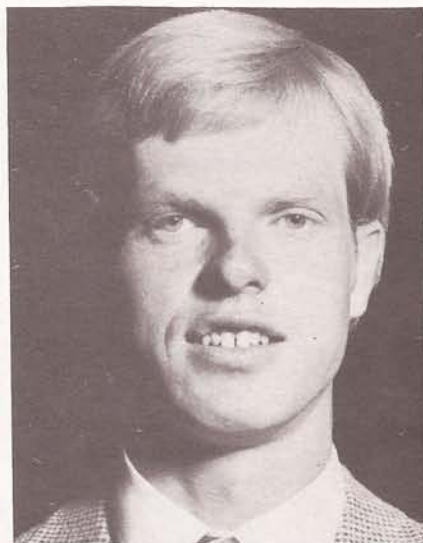

# Roger Reid

Newest member of the Cougar basketball staff is Roger Reid, 31-year-old graduate of Weber State (1968), who was named assistant coach for the 1978-79 season in October.

Reid, who coached at Clearfield High for the past four years, took a leave of absence from Clearfield in May to work on his Master's degree. The following month he was awarded a graduate teaching assistantship at BYU, and has been associated with the program since then.

"Because of this involvement," said Arnold, "he was the logical choice for the opening created by Coach McMullen's unexpected departure."

A native Utahn, Reid was an outstanding athlete at Springville (Utah) High School where he was student body vice-president and all-state athlete. He was named MVP in the annual North-South All-Star baseball game as a senior.

Reid enrolled at BYU where he was a member of the freshman basketball team and also made the trip to Mexico City with the Cougar baseball team.

Transferring to College of Eastern Utah, Reid was selected as the MVP on the school's baseball team and twice was named to the Junior College All-America team in baseball.

From CEU he moved to Weber State College, where he was a member of the Big Sky Conference championship team coached by Dick Motta. Reid also received all-conference honors in baseball for two years.

Reid spent four years as a shortstop in professional baseball with the Chicago White Sox and Atlanta Braves organizations.

Reid began his coaching career in 1971 as a basketball and baseball coach at Payson High School. His overall basketball record at Payson was 50-26, and the baseball team had a 35-11 mark under his direction.

In 1974 he joined the coaching staff at Clearfield High School, where he took the basketball team to the state tournament for the first time in five years.

Clearfield's overall record was 60 wins against 24 losses during that period.

Reid is married to the former Diane Gardner, and they have four sons; Randy, 9; Robbie, 5; David, 3; and Darren, four months.

# The Administration

## President Oaks

Dallin H. Oaks took office as President of Brigham Young University August 1, 1971.

He graduated from B.Y.U. with high honors in 1954, receiving his B.A. degree in accounting. In 1957 he graduated from the University of Chicago Law School with the Doctor of Law degree (J.D.), *cum laude*, and was named to the highest legal scholarship society, the Order of the Coif. In his senior year he was Editor-in-Chief of *The University of Chicago Law Review*.

After graduation he began his legal career by serving for one year as a law clerk to Chief Justice Earl Warren of the United States Supreme Court. He then practiced law for three years with a large law firm in Chicago, specializing in corporate litigation. In 1961 he became an Associate Professor of Law (and in 1964 a Professor of Law) at the University of Chicago. From 1970 to 1971 he was Executive Director of the American Bar Foundation, a large professional research organization affiliated with the American Bar Association.

In 1969 President Edward H. Levi (later Attorney General) appointed him chairman of a University of Chicago faculty committee that resolved disciplinary charges against over 150 students summoned in a sit-in at the University's administration building. From January through June, 1970, he served as Legal Counsel to the Bill of Rights Committee of the Illinois Constitutional Convention, where he had an important role in writing the Bill of Rights for the new constitution that Illinois voters adopted in December, 1970. He is a member of the Bar in Illinois and Utah and has been admitted to practice in the United States Supreme Court and other federal courts. He is a Professor of Law in BYU's J. Reuben Clark Law School, where he teaches one course each year.

Dallin H. Oaks has published five books dealing with the subjects of church and state, trust law, criminal procedure, legal profession, and legal history. He is also the author of over 50 articles published in legal and other periodicals and magazines. He is a past president and director of the American Association of Presidents of Independent Colleges and Universities, and a past director of the National Association of Independent Colleges and Universities. He is currently a member and Chairman Pro Tem of the Board of Directors of the Public Broadcasting Service, a member of the advisory Board of the Notre Dame Law School's Center for Constitutional Studies, a member of the board of American Viewpoint Inc., a member of the Board of Directors of the Union Pacific Corporation and the Deseret News Publishing Company, a member of the American Bar Association's Consulting Panel on Advanced Legal and Judicial Education, a Fellow of the American Bar Foundation, a member of the Wilson Council of the Woodrow Wilson International Center for Scholars, and a member of the American Law Institute. He is listed in *Who's Who in America* and in other national and international biographical directories.

Active in The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, he has served in various capacities, including Stake Mission President of the Chicago Stake, and 8½ years as second counselor and first counselor in the Presidency of the Chicago South Stake. Since 1974 he has served as a Regional Representative of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. He is married to the former June Dixon of Spanish Fork, Utah. They have six children and four grandchildren.

## DR. CLAYNE R. JENSEN, Dean and Faculty Representative

An experienced and respected administrator, Dr. Clayne Jensen is beginning his sixth year as dean of the College of Physical Education, which encompasses BYU athletics . . . he replaced Dr. Milton F. Hartvigsen, who served as dean for nearly 19 years. . . . Dr. Jensen served in the capacity of assistant dean beginning in 1968 before becoming dean . . . he was also full professor within the college . . . born March 17, 1930 in Gunnison, Utah . . . he graduated from the University of Utah in 1956, and obtained his doctorate from Indiana in 1963 . . . from 1953-55 he was a captain in the U.S. Marine Corps, and coached two all-Marine

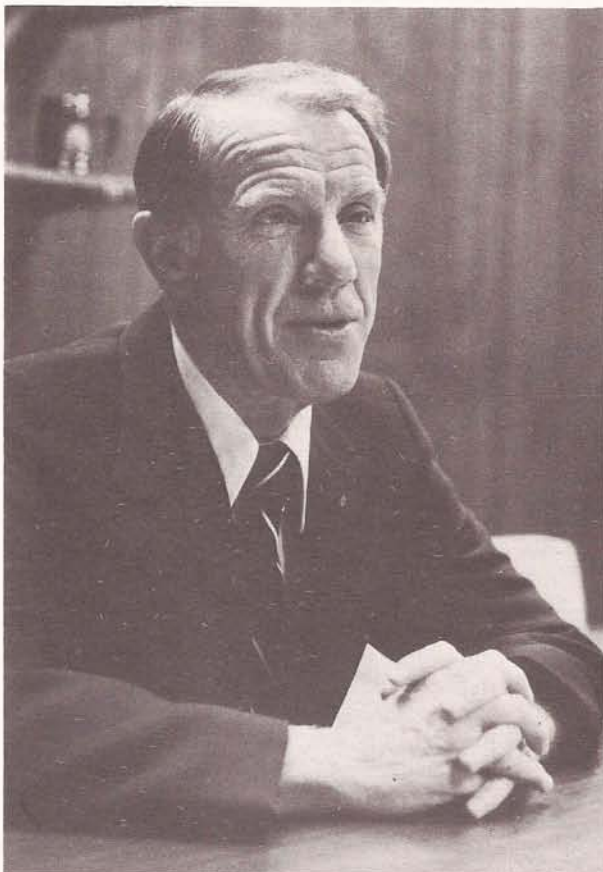

## DR. GLEN TUCKETT, Athletic Director

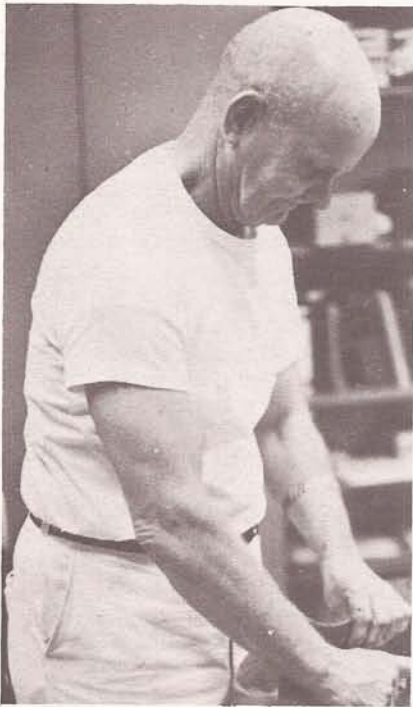
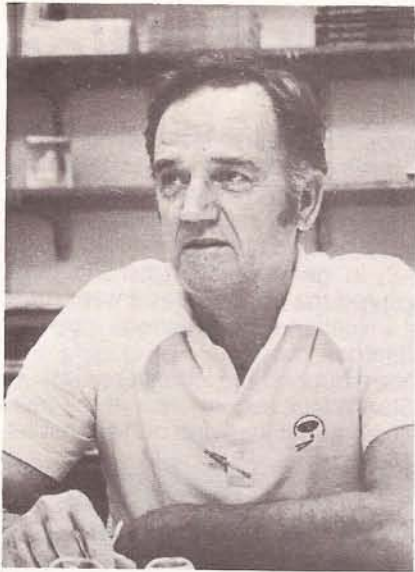

In 1976 he replaced Stan Watts, who moved into retirement after 29 years as coach and administrator . . . the choice was no surprise to those who follow athletics and who, for many years, have come to regard Tuckett as one of the outstanding members of the Cougar staff . . . Glen has invested himself in the very productive side of athletics . . . as an athlete (amateur and professional), as coach, as a teacher and as an administrator . . . he has brought vigor and vitality to his assignments, and he uses his varied talents to push the wholesome, worthwhile programs in athletics . . . he is acknowledged as one of the foremost leaders in his field . . . like his predecessor, Tuckett is also a native of Murray, Utah, where he was an all-around athlete at Murray High . . . he entered professional baseball after graduation, but continued his studies at the University of Utah where he obtained his B.S. degree in 1953 . . . Glen spent nine seasons in professional ball and twice was selected on all-star teams . . . and he usually led the league in fielding his position . . . he launched his coaching career at West High School in Salt Lake City, where he coached three sports . . . in 1960 he joined the staff at BYU . . . since then his teams have won 13 division titles, three conference championships, and two NCAA District 7 crowns . . . his teams went to College World Series in Omaha twice . . . one of the high points of his career came in 1974, when he was chosen as coach of the United States team which won the World Amateur Baseball Tournament for only the second time in the tourney's 22-year history . . . Tuckett was the 1977 president of the American Association of College Baseball Coaches . . . last January he was inducted into the Collegiate Baseball Hall of Fame . . . used to be a color commentator for KSL Radio before his athletic director appointment . . . voted outstanding teacher at BYU . . . obtained his M.S. degree from BYU in 1962, and received his doctorate in 1976 . . . a former Bishop, Tuckett now serves as a counselor in the Edgemont Stake Presidency . . . Glen is married to the former Josephine Whittaker of Stockport, England, and they have four daughters: Alison, 18, Shannon, 17, Kendall, 13; and Erin, six.

# Cougar History: A Mountain Tradition

The home courts: Springville Gym, Utah's Nielsen Fieldhouse, the Smith Fieldhouse and the Marriott Center.

Some of the Players: Hutchins, Minson, Nemelka, Cosic and Ainge.

Some of the Coaches: Roberts, Romney, Watts and Arnold.

Tradition echoes for the Cougars in the names of the players and coaches and places they played.

For a starting point, it is safe to say that inter-collegiate basketball, by some standards, began at BYU with the 1917-18 season. True, the school had basketball teams prior to this date under Coach E. L. Roberts. But this is the date when the BYU became a member of the Rocky Mountain Faculty Athletic Conference.

Subsequent conference affiliations included the Mountain States and Skyline Conferences, plus the Western Athletic Conference membership which began in 1962.

Looking at the "where" aspect of the game, the Cougars played their games on the third floor of the Training School building on lower campus from 1918-28. For the big games, the Cougar fans used to find themselves perched in window sills, on ladders and on top of lockers along the sides of the walls. In this manner as many as 700 could be accommodated for a game. And in 1925 the Cougars boasted the tallest player in the conference, Rags Ingersoll, a 6-4 center.

In 1928 the Cougars doubled their seating capacity by moving to the Women's Gym. Changes were taking place in the game, and it was during this period that E. L. Roberts, former coach, championed the change that eventually eliminated the center jump. It was also the era when Provo's local radio station (KOVO) carried one of the first ever broadcasts of a basketball game. It was also the day of the two-handed push shot. BYU also landed its first All-American, Elwood Romney.

An unforgettable chapter in the chronicle of BYU basketball was written between 1946 and 1950, when the Cougars played their home games on the floor of Springville High School.

Built for a crowd of about 1,200, the Springville Gym, officials discovered, could actually hold 1,700. They were crunched in uncomfortable seating positions, but the local fans were often too delirious to care.

Despite the obvious handicaps, the Springville Gym was the site for some outstanding basketball. It was a day when fans were treated to the play of Joe Nelson, Mel Hutchins, Roland Minson; Utah's Arnie Ferrin and Vern Gardner; Denver's Vince Boryla; Utah State's LaDell Andersen, to mention only a few.

They all played in Springville.

Forced out of the Springville Gym in 1950, the Cougars began casting about for a temporary floor to be used while the George Albert Smith Fieldhouse was being constructed.

The University of Utah very graciously offered its home floor—the 600-seat Einer Nielsen Fieldhouse. So for one season, 1950-51, the Cougars had a new home; on a rival's floor 45 miles north of the BYU campus.

Preseason games that year were played in the Springville Gym, but the action moved to Salt Lake City when the Skyline Conference schedule began.

Judging from the overall results, the Mountain Cats didn't suffer much as transients. They split with the Utes 2-2, in games played on the Einer Nielsen floor, captured the MSC title and went on to win the National Invitational Tournament crown in Madison Square Garden.

Not bad for a team dubbed the Homeless Cats.

It was Coach Stan Watts' second year at the helm of Cougar basketball, and it was one of his most talented crews: Mel Hutchins, Roland Minson, Jerry Romney, Harold Christensen, and Joe Richey.

It should be pointed out that the Cougars were used to travel, having toured South America the summer of '50.

After a long wait, the Cougars finally moved into their own arena—the George Albert Smith Fieldhouse (10,200)—in December of 1951. Basketball was just into the golden era for the Cougars, and in the 20 years that followed, the BYU drew large crowds. Coach Stan Watts, who coached every one of the 246 games played there, during that period, scheduled some of the finest teams available for the local fans.

Little wonder, then, that this period of boom is closely associated with Stan Watts. Prior to his retirement in 1972 after 23 years as head coach, Watts' teams won two National Invitational Tournament championships, plus eight conference titles.

In order to meet the growing demand of spectators, the Cougars needed a bigger facility. They got it in December of 1971, when the team opened the new Marriott Center, largest on-campus arena in the nation (just under 23,000 seats). The Cougars set attendance records that year, drawing an average of over 21,000 to home games.

Since its beginning in 1918, BYU basketball has had 11 coaches, a long list of All-Americans (data elsewhere in the guide), a record of playing some of the nation's finest, and a tradition that is still in the making.

# '79 Basketball Season Summary

Although it has been judged the finest basketball season at Brigham Young University in many years, the best part of the 1978-79 campaign is the expectation the Cougars' roundball successes should carry over into next season.

For the first time in the period of seven seasons the Cougars were able to post a 20-game season and also pick up a Western Athletic Conference championship.

For all the honors and achievements netted, the most heartening thing in the eyes of Coach Frank Arnold is the fact that all of this year's starters will be returning next fall. BYU's losses off the team will be two fine reserve forwards, and a third team member, a redshirt, has accepted a church mission call.

The balance of the team will be returning intact. There will also be some help in the form of new recruits.

Looking back on the season, the Cougars came very close to having an undefeated season in league play. During one stretch BYU won 10 of 12 games, and the two defeats were a two-point overtime decision against Wyoming in Laramie and a one-pointer to New Mexico in the Pit.

In pre-season play the Cougar losses came against three teams that had very good seasons; Texas, Rhode Island and St. Johns.

Statistically, the Cougars made tremendous improvement over the previous season. In terms of points scored, this was the best offensive team BYU has had since 1966, the year the Cougars won the NIT championship. Over the season haul, which ended in the first round of the NCAA playoffs with a loss to San Francisco, the Cougars averaged 85.0 points per game, an 8.4 edge over opponents.

This was also the best shooting team in BYU history. The Mountain Cats shot a fat .529 from the field, well ahead of the .491 team record set in 1967. In addition, five players ended the season with scoring averages in double figures.

For the second year in a row, guard Danny Ainge led the team in scoring (18.4 per game). Ainge, who now has a total of 1,130 points, has moved up to the top ten in career scoring at BYU with two seasons yet to be played. The sophomore from Eugene, Ore., the only unanimous choice on the all-conference selection, led the team in assists (122), steals (46) and turnovers (100).

As a team, the Cougars led opponents in every phase of the game.

But one of the most significant gains was in attendance, where this year's team drew record crowds. In winning all its home games (14), the Cougars had fans flocking to the Marriott Center in record numbers. A total of 277,920 were on hand for the home games, the highest overall attendance since the facility opened in 1972.

In terms of average attendance, the season mean was 19,851 fans, the highest since the first season in the Marriott Center, 1972. And the Cougars also drew the largest basketball crowd ever in Utah, packing 23,006 into the game with Utah. That topped the previous high by only eight spectators.

Individually, the season's top scoring performance was Danny Ainge's 40 points against Oral Roberts. Best rebounding performance of the year was Alan Taylor's 20 against Utah in Salt Lake City.

The Cougars also claimed the Old Oquirrh Bucket, the in-state trophy which goes to the school with the best record against common Utah opponents in the Beehive State.

In summary, the Cougars were 20-8 overall, 14-0 at home, 6-8 on the road and 10-2 in the final WAC standings.

# 1979-80 Tournaments

It's the sixth annual Cougar Classic and the 24th annual Far West Classic for BYU's tournament action this season.

Tip off for the Cougar Classic on Dec. 14-15 is at 7 p.m. for the opening round and 9 p.m. for the followup game. The first round of the tourney has LaSalle facing Texas A&M, while BYU hosts Cal State Santa Barbara. The Cougars have won three of the five tourneys which annually pairs a team from the different time zones in the U.S.

The Far West Classic invitation is the Cougars' fourth in 30 years and the highest finish for BYU is 1963's second place finish. In that appearance, BYU defeated Seattle, 77-74 and Oregon 80-70, but losing to Oregon State 68-58.

The Far West Classic will be played in Portland, Ore., and is in its 24th year. In BYU's last appearance at the Far West Classic, 1973, they lost their opening round to Indiana, 96-52. That BYU team had players like Jay Cheesman, Doug Richards, Belmont Anderson, Gifford Nielsen and Doug Ainge. The Hoosiers had the likes of Quinn Buckner, Scott May, Kent Benson and Bob Wilkerson. The Cougars finished out that tourney by beating Army, 81-72, and West Virginia, 85-83.

This year's Cougar Classic should be as exciting as the past five, if for no other reason than the presence of LaSalle's 6-7 Michael Brooks, a two-time All-American. Brooks was the leading rebounder and second leading scorer for last summer's gold medal Pan American team.

The Far West Classic is also an interesting one for BYU because junior All-American Danny Ainge of Eugene, Ore. will get a homecoming of sorts when the Cougars open against Penn State. And former Oregon coach Dick Harter, who recruited Ainge in the Ducks' behalf, now leads the Penn State squad.

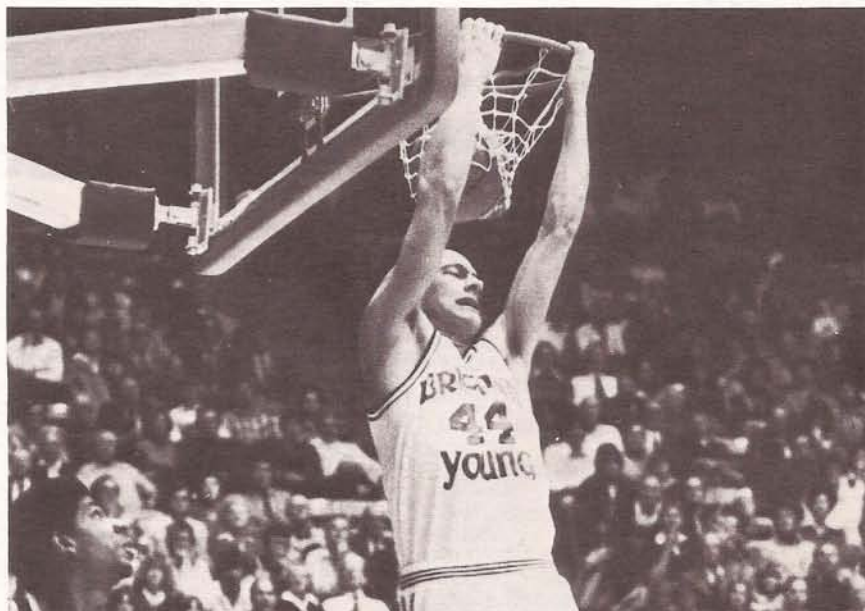

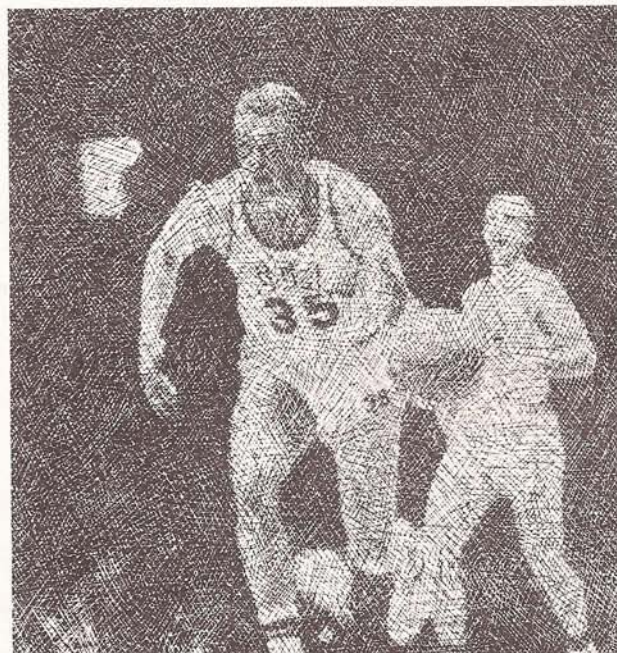

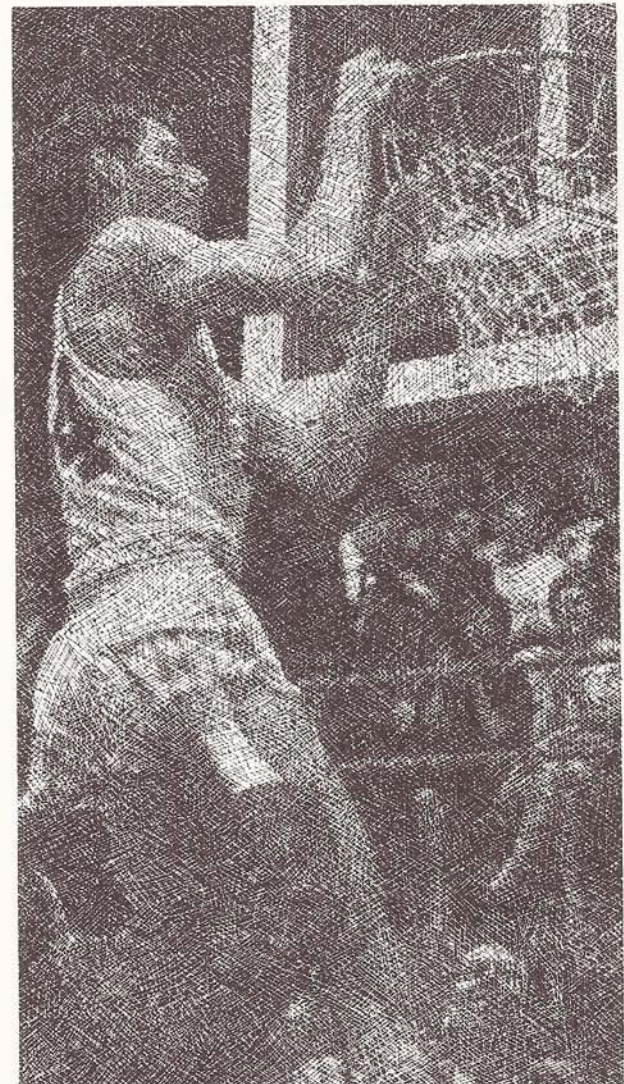
