Brigham Young University

Dedicated to the education of the whole person, Brigham Young University in Provo, Utah provides a quality education with emphasis on adherence to Christian ideas.

BYU is sponsored by The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints (Mormon) and, with its enrollment of 26,000 students, is the largest church-related and private university in the nation.

More than 1,250 full-time faculty, 67 percent of whom hold doctorates from colleges throughout the United States and several foreign countries, instruct in 150 subject areas in the University's 13 colleges and graduate schools.

BYU is on a three-semester system (4-4-2-2) with Fall and Winter semesters each being four months long and the summer semester being divided into Spring and Summer terms.

The 646-acre BYU campus is at the western base of the 12,000-foot-high Wasatch Mountain range and is situated in Utah Valley, 45 miles south of Salt Lake City.

Roughly 95 percent of the student body is Mormon; non-Mormons come from over 25 other denominations. Around 22 percent of the student body is married.

Admission is open to those of any race, color, creed, or national origin, provided they meet the University's academic requirements and their personal behavior conforms to the standards of the LDS Church.

American Indians comprise the largest ethnic group on campus, numbering over 500 and representing 61 tribes. There are Chicanos, Blacks, Orientals, and others, all applying their own particular perspective of life to their academic programs and providing a rich, intercultural learning atmosphere for all students.

The BYU Provo campus is perhaps one of the most cosmopolitan in the nation, enrolling students from every state (30 percent from Utah) and more than 70 foreign countries. Over 8,000 students are bilingual since many have served missions abroad for the LDS Church.

In addition to the regular student body on the Provo campus, BYU serves other students at the BYU Hawaii Campus in Laie, Hawaii, through the Study Abroad programs supervised by BYU faculty members in Austria, England, Israel, and Hawaii, and through the BYU Division of Continuing Education which enrolls more than 350,000 on its courses each year.

The University is supported from funds appropriated by the LDS Church and from tuitions and gifts.

Western Athletic Conference

The Western Athletic Conference began its 19th season with the start of the 1980-81 school year. However, things have changed since its formation in 1962. On July 1, 1978, two charter members of the league, Arizona and Arizona State, left the WAC for the Pac-Ten. On the same day, San Diego State made its official entry on the scene, upping the league membership to seven members. Then, University of Hawaii became the eighth member on July 1, 1979.

Another change occurred this past year. Air Force Academy entered the WAC on July 1, 1980, while Nevada-Las Vegas is waiting final vote of the President's Council.

All three of the new members possess good athletic programs and represent three of the fastest growing areas in the country.

Now that the league has expanded to nine members, the WAC stretches from the pine tree forests of Utah, Colorado, and Wyoming to the desert southwest of West Texas and New Mexico, to the coastal surfs of California and Hawaii.

Founded on July 1, 1962, the charter members included Arizona, Arizona State, Brigham Young, New Mexico, Utah, and Wyoming. In September 1967, Colorado State and Texas-El Paso were added to make the WAC an eight-team league.

Based in Denver, Colorado, the WAC is led by Commissioner Joe Kearney, who assumed his current position in 1980. Kearney, former athletic director at Arizona State, Michigan State, and Washington, is the fourth conference commissioner since the formation of the league.

Nordy Jensen serves as director of information for the WAC; John Adams is supervisor of football officials, and Irv Brown is supervisor of basketball officials.

The Marriott Center

"Sold Out" is a phrase frequently used at the Marriott Center Ticket Office.

The 22,700-seat arena, now in its tenth season, is the largest on-campus arena in the nation. While the seating capacity is listed at 22,700, a record crowd of 23,084 was in attendance for last year's BYU-Utah basketball game. Last season's total attendance record of 300,713 was also a new school record.

Basketball fever is rampant at BYU, in Utah and in the Western Athletic Conference. In fact, the state of Utah leads the nation in per capita attendance and the WAC was third overall in attendance, drawing over 1,000,000 fans for the fifth year in a row.

The J. Willard Marriott Center surpassed the 2,000,000 mark last season.

No wonder, then, that University officials thought big when the time came to build a new multi-purpose arena several years ago. The new center had to be located as close to the center of campus as possible, had to be flexible enough to serve other major activities, and had to seat as many spectators as possible.

Named after the nationally known businessman who was the major contributor, the Marriott Center houses

crowds for basketball, commencement exercises, concerts, pageants, devotionals and many other activities.

Twice the Marriott Center has served as the host facility for the NCAA Far West regional playoffs, 1977 and 1979.

The building was opened on schedule on December 3, 1971, and has met the above expectations since then.

Physically, the building covers three acres. The outside dimensions are 280 x 340, or the equivalent of two football fields placed side by side. The roof covers 130,000 square feet and encloses 8-million cubic feet. From the playing floor to the top of the roof the height is nearly ten stories.

There are roughly 10,100 chair seats in the building with the balance being bleacher seats. About 40 percent of the seats are below the concourse level.

Besides the usual locker rooms, training facilities, etc., the Marriott Center serves as ticket headquarters for most major campus events. It also provides offices for the basketball coaching staff.

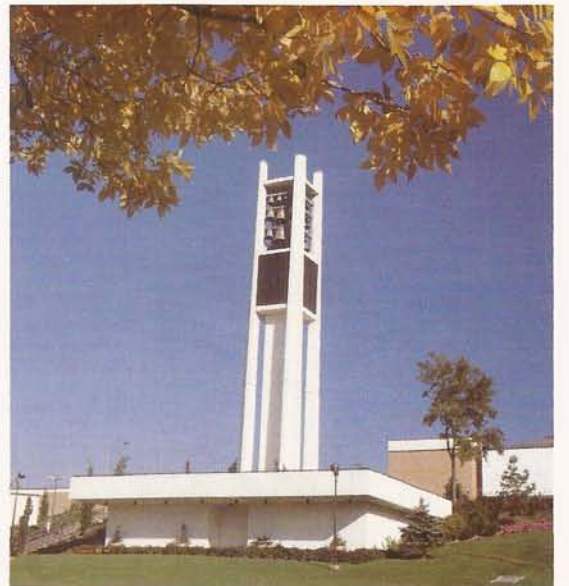
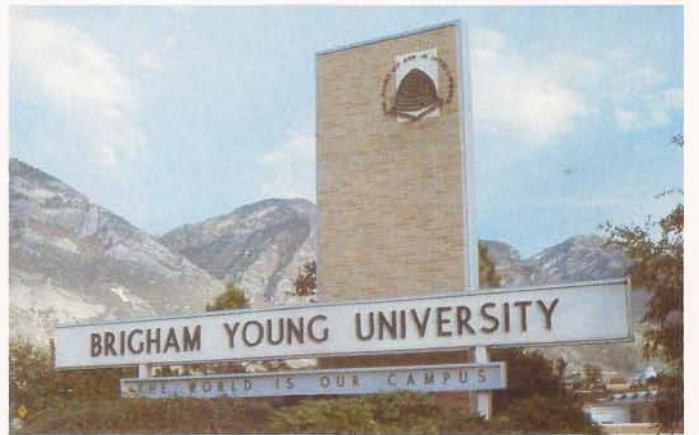
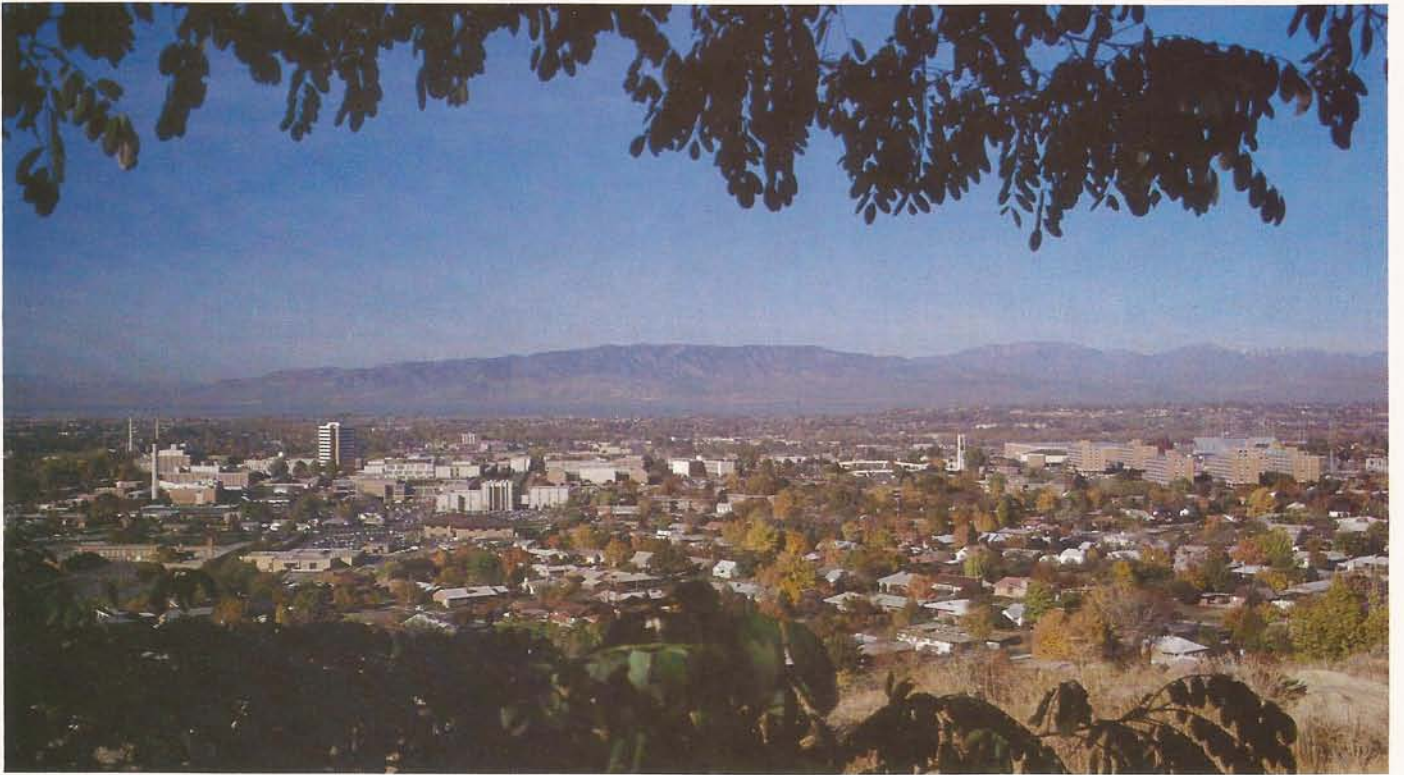

'80-81 Prospectus

Time--a few more weeks of time--is going to be the key in bringing together the BYU squad which Coach Frank Arnold feels is as talented as last year's conference champions.

"We will struggle in December because of a much more difficult schedule (i.e. Oregon State, Michigan State, Illinois, Tennessee) and because this group of players hasn't played that much as a unit," says Arnold.

Nine lettermen return (four lettermen were lost), one transfer, and two freshmen make up the Cougar roster. The two remaining starters have received national and/or regional acclaim.

By the time Western Athletic Conference play begins (Jan. 8), Arnold thinks his team will be ready to defend two previous WAC titles (1979 and 1980). Graduated are experienced pivot-man Alan Taylor, backcourt leader Scott Runia and passing-shooting whiz Devin Durrant (now on an LDS mission in Spain).

Returning is all-time BYU scorer (1,685 points) and All-American Danny Ainge. Ainge, 6-5, signed a new contract with the Toronto Blue Jays, and will devote his full attention to baseball at the conclusion of his senior year. Joining Ainge is power forward Fred Roberts, a 6-10 junior, who is a sure bet for this third season as a starter.

"It will be difficult for us to defend the WAC title," says Arnold. "The conference favorite on paper should be Utah, who appears to have two of the top 12 players in America (Vranes and Chambers). Utah has "final four" (NCAA) potential, but we accept the challenge."

To bid for the title, individual struggles for the three open starting spots must refine, not scar, the talent, according to Arnold.

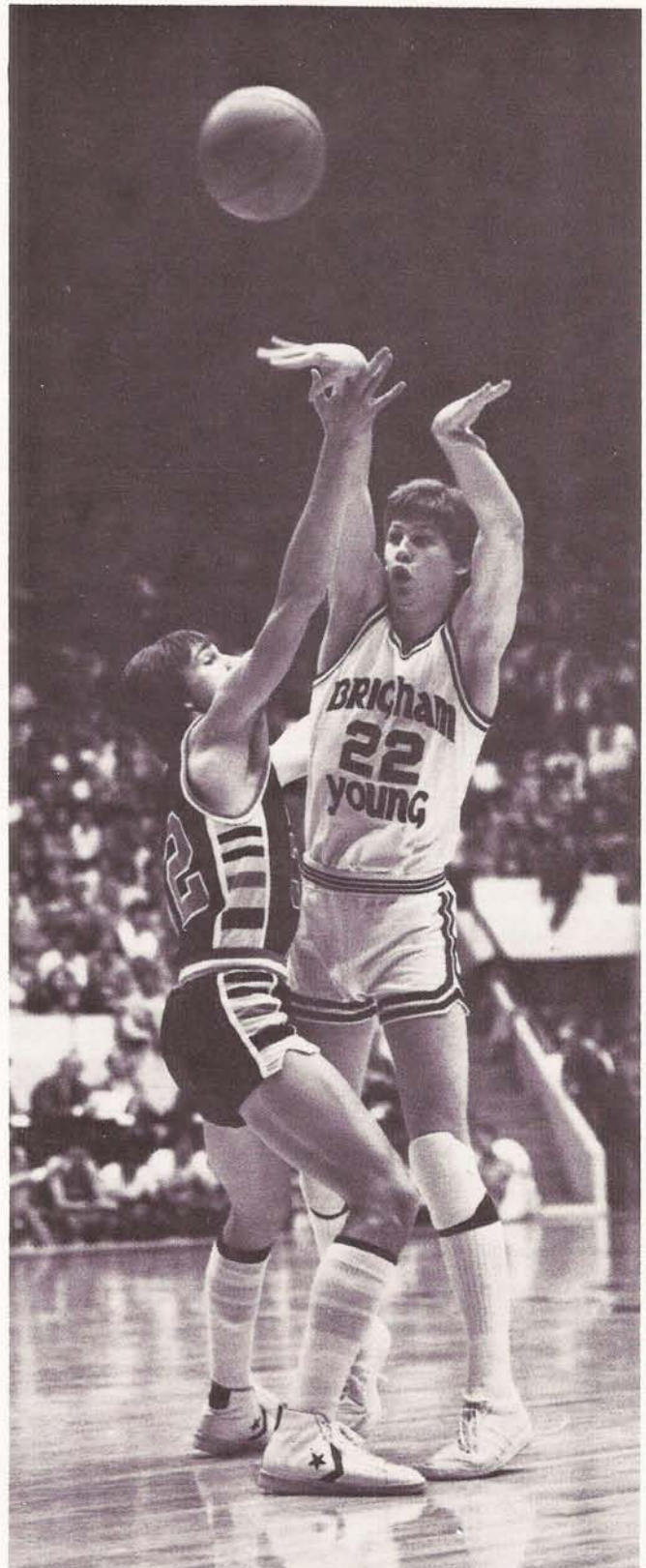
The battle for center is led by sophomore Greg Kite, a player of great physical proportions (6-11, 255), who vastly improved his game over the summer. Challenging Kite, last year's backup center, is 7-0 Dave McGuire, the 1978 reserve and 6-8 swingman Steve Trumbo.

In the battle for the small forward, Trumbo is the leading candidate. Newcomers vying for the position include Finnish freshman Timo Saarelainen, (6-6), and Utah State transfer Gary Furniss (6-8), who just returned from a South Pacific mission.

In the struggle at point guard, senior Steve Craig (6-3), and junior Greg Ballif (6-3) are the front runners. However, 6-4 redshirt Craig Christensen and 6-4 freshman Richie Webb can't be taken lightly. Injury-prone Craig saw the most action of the bunch last year and has started a number of games since his freshman year.

"It's too bad we can't play four guards at the same time," says Arnold. "If the forward battle proves unsatisfactory then we will think seriously about putting Ainge there--we will likely do both (use Ainge as a swingman)."

This year's personnel provides Arnold with good rebounding, defensive play, excellent depth, and more size and strength. An area where the Cougars may now be weak is ball handling (dribbling and passing).



"Virtually all of our players except Danny Ainge had a good summer of individual workout in basketball, and Ainge (who spent the summer in major league baseball) is already good enough."

Arnold Answers Questions on 1980-81 Team

How do you plan to replace players like Alan Taylor, Scott Runia and Devin Durrant?

- Obviously, this won't be an easy task, but we have several athletes who can, in time, replace these losses. Greg Kite is bigger, stronger and faster than Alan Taylor, and he spent more time improving his skills this summer than all the centers who have played for me in the past five years. He could become one of the finest centers we've had at BYU.

In Dave McGuire, who has always had the ability to shoot, we sense real improvement. Dave's put on between 15-20 pounds. The one thing lacking, of course, is playing experience, and that will come in time.

Filling the shoes of Runia won't be easy, but we have fine players in Steve Craig, Greg Ballif and Mike Maxwell.

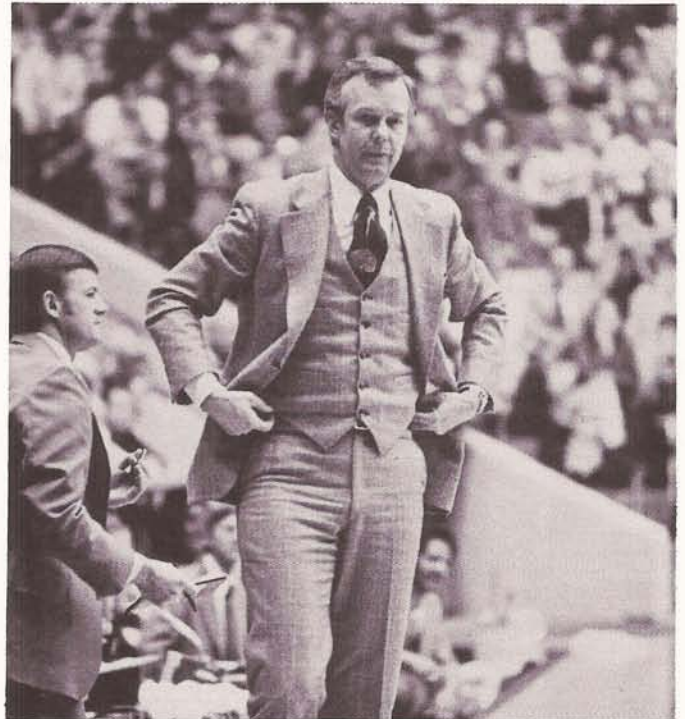
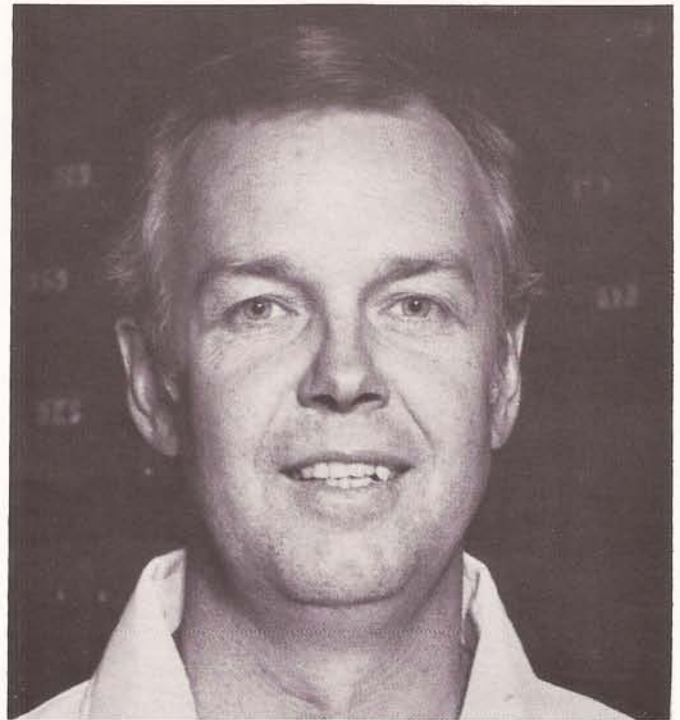
Devin's vacancy creates a somewhat bigger problem. We have great athletes in Steve Trumbo and two new players--Timo Saarelainen and Gary Furniss. In some areas they are stronger than Devin, in others weaker. For example some will give us better rebounding and better defense, but are not as good in shooting and passing. What it boils down to is this--we will simply have to develop our strategies around the personnel we have at hand, much as we have in the past. I'm confident we will come out of this adjustment with another strong club.

What strengths do you pick up from the new players on the team?

- We have three new players, plus the return of Dave McGuire. Richie Webb, I feel, will prove to be one of the finest guards we have recruited in the six years I've been here. Richie has the uncanny ability to pass the basketball at the right time to the right man, besides having great shooting accuracy and the quick release. Great guards possess all four attributes mentioned. However, he needs physical maturity and game experience.

Timo Saarelainen can best be described as an outstanding athlete. He shoots the ball exceptionally well, has good speed and jumping ability. But his limited experience in organized basketball may be a drawback.

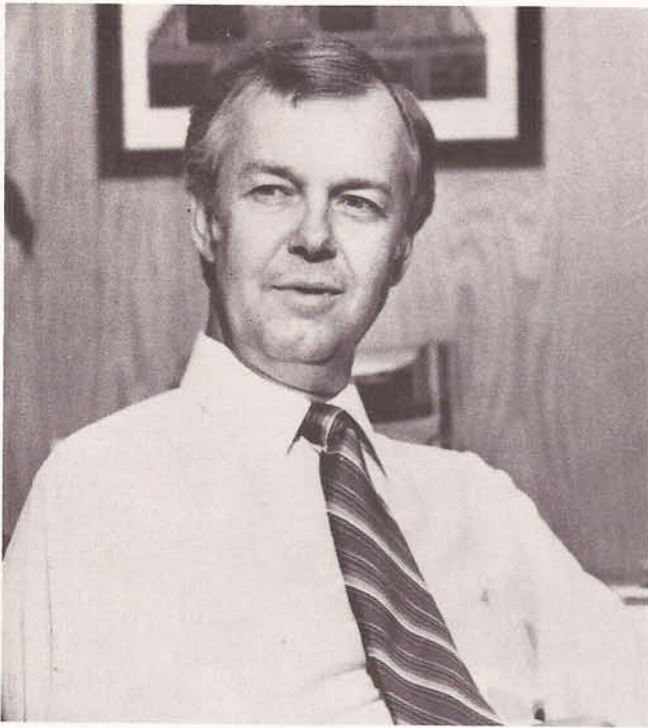
We regard Gary Furniss as potentially an outstanding forward prospect; big strong, very competitive, and an outstanding perimeter shooter for his size. His two-year



church mission, obviously, will slow him down a bit. But, again, time may solve any problems he may have.

Specifically, what do you regard as the strengths and challenges on your schedule?

- We feel a demanding schedule will help us, and we will open with three road games against teams with great basketball traditions. Two of the games will be against teams in the Pac-10--Washington and Oregon State.



In the Volunteer Classic in Knoxville, Tenn., we open against Illinois, another team from the Big Ten. This is the team that beat us by ten points in our opener at home. The Illini have a new player, Derek Harper, reportedly one of the top guard prospects in the nation.

All in all, we may take our lumps in December, but by the time we play our first conference game, I think we will have a very good basketball team.

Now that you are in your sixth year at BYU, would you comment on what you regard as your successes?

- While we are proud of two conference championships, and the NCAA tournament bids, a more important fact is that we now have a foundation that is very solid. We expect to have some very good--if not outstanding--teams for the immediate future. The fact we are drawing well in the Marriott Center tells us our fans are pleased with the program's growth. We expect to maintain this on a year-to-year basis.

As defending champion, how do you view the conference race?

- On paper, I'd have to say Utah will be the favorite this season. Danny Vranes is an exceptional ball player, and in Tom Chambers they have a center who was outstanding in the Olympic trials. Those two, along with their other standouts, should put Utah in a special class. However, in our Conference it's hard to count any team out, so some consideration should be given Wyoming and Texas-El Paso. And I look to Colorado State as a team on the rise.

The Air Force is a new entity, and I'm simply not familiar enough with their program to rank them. Hawaii, too, will be a better basketball team, which can also be said for San Diego State and New Mexico. That leaves the Cougars.

With the personnel returning, will you favor a quicker unit or a tall, power lineup for this season?

- As of right now, I really don't know what our lineup will look like. However, it is evident to me that we could have either or both. Therefore, our offensive strategies will be designed with both types in mind; an offense designed with big people up front or perhaps a three-guard system, similar to the one we used on occasion last year.

But I don't feel offense will be a problem. The question seems to be, how good a pressing team will we be; or how good a defense will we have, or how good a fast-break team will we have with the new personnel.

The answers, and the decisions, will come after 45 days of practice, plus some experimentation during the pre-season games in December. So by the time the WAC race rolls around, we will have the very best possible team, and we hope, the best strategic system on the floor.



OSU has everyone back, plus freshman Charles Sitton, one of the finest prep forwards in the country. The third game will be against Utah State, which is always a test, a hard-fought game.

We are fortunate to have Michigan State (NCAA champion of two years ago) on our home schedule. We also face Weber State on the road, in Ogden, where they have a phenomenal win-loss record at the Dee Special Events Center.

Craig's father is a member of the BYU Athletic Hall of Fame and played for the 1951 NIT championship team for the Cougars . . . Craig is the oldest boy in the family of seven children . . . his late grandfather, Dr. P. A. Christensen, was a professor of English and long-time member of the Athletic Council at BYU . . . served a two-year LDS mission to the Sydney, Australia mission . . . majoring in English, minoring in accounting . . . wants to go to law school.

High School: Played for Coach Larry Maxwell (Utah) at Highland High . . . during his sophomore year, Craig's team placed eighth in state, but during his junior and senior years, the team placed third both times . . . he averaged 23 points per game and was the leading 4-A scorer his senior year . . . the *Deseret News* and the *Salt Lake Tribune* named him to their all-state teams . . . he was senior class president . . . won the Nick Caputo Award for athletic scholarship and leadership . . . graduated in 1975.

The Head Coach: Frank Arnold

Sixth Year

80-60 Record

Entering his sixth season at BYU, Frank Arnold is now among the elite of Cougar coaches who have posted plus .500 records. His 80-60 record puts him among the top four coaches out of the 11 who preceded Arnold.

Since 1976 Arnold, 47, has steadily rebuilt the Cougar hardwood program to one of national prominence. The 1980 Cougar team compiled the best win-loss record in the history of BYU. Arnold this staff have built two consecutive 20-game seasons and NCAA Tournament berths, coaching strictly players they recruited. Arnold, the former assistant at UCLA from 1971-75, is well known in basketball circles for his technical knowledge of the game, his broad coaching background, and his dedication to the game. He has also participated in many basketball clinics at home and abroad. Most recently he conducted clinics in China, Italy, and Yugoslavia. The China tour was with the U.S. All-Star team in 1979 and the Italy-Yugoslavia tour was with the BYU squad a year and a half ago.

Among Arnold's past clinic itineraries are three clinics in Spain, two clinics in Yugoslavia, one in Peking and Shanghai, a few in Canada, and many throughout the United States.

The Italian Basketball Coaches Association reported the BYU clinic as being one of the finest they've ever had.

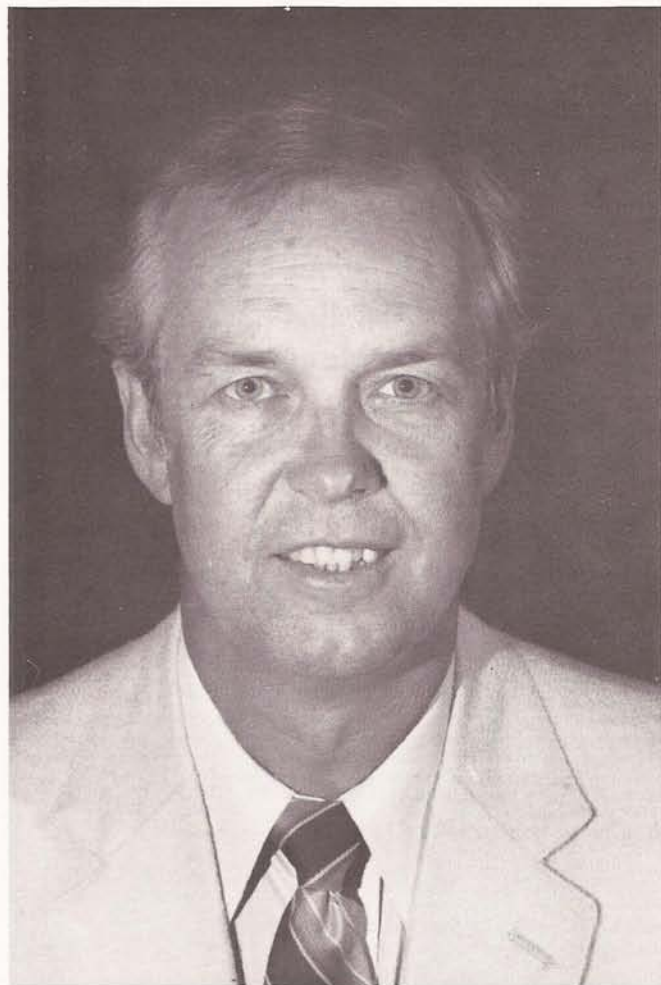
Frank has authored a technical book on man-to-man defense and a just released autobiography of his life in basketball entitled *Rise and Shout*. He was selected as Coach-of-the-Year in the Western Athletic Conference for both 1979 and 1980 by *Basketball Weekly*. He was also selected Coach-of-the-Year by the WAC coaches and athletic directors for 1980.

Arnold coached at UCLA from 1971-75 as an assistant to John Wooden. In his four seasons at UCLA, Arnold helped coach the Bruins to three NCAA titles. While at UCLA Arnold was responsible for much of the recruiting and scouting and was in charge of the junior varsity program.

Although Frank has altered some of his philosophies since coaching in the WAC, a lot of his ideas remain the same.

"I set forth three criteria for an athlete: outstanding ability, a sincere desire to get a degree, and fine citizenship."

Born October 1, 1934 in Ogden, Utah, Arnold graduated from Pocatello High School in 1952 and then graduated from Idaho State University in 1956. His first coaching job came at Payette, Idaho, in 1956-57. Arnold then accepted the head coaching job at Provo's B.Y. High in 1958 and began working on his master's degree. He obtained his master's in physical education in 1960 and coached at the BYU laboratory school through 1962.



Arnold began serving as a graduate assistant coach at the University of Oregon in 1962-63, working on his doctorate. He then accepted the head coaching job at Pocatello High for 1963-64.

In 1964 he took over as the head basketball coach at Clark Junior College in Vancouver, Wash., where he remained until 1966. From 1966-71, he served as an assistant basketball coach at Oregon before he began coaching at UCLA in 1971.

Frank has served as the chairman of the National Basketball Coaches Association Recruitment Committee and has recently been selected as the chairman of the NABC International Basketball Committee and as a member of a special subcommittee of the NCAA Recruiting Committee to review proposed recruiting legislation.

Arnold is married to the former Bee Wright of Provo. She obtained her bachelor's and master's degrees from BYU and is a former faculty member of the College of Family Living. Frank and Bee have five children: Kelley (20 and a sophomore at BYU), Kristyn (18), Kipline (15), Gibson (12), and Kaline (8).

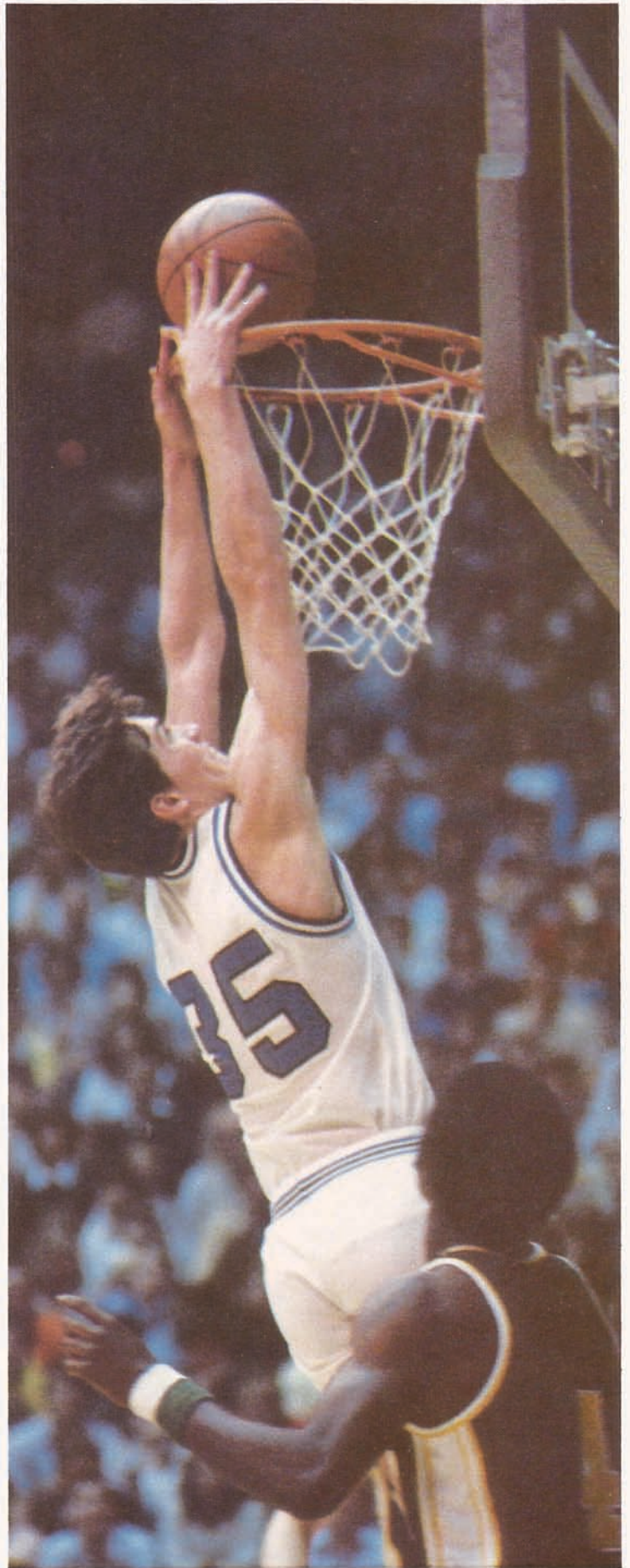

Harry Anderson

An original member of Frank Arnold's staff, Harry Anderson is now in his sixth season as an assistant coach. He came to BYU from Orem High School and Utah Trade Tech where he had very successful teams at both schools.

During his 10 years at Orem, Coach Anderson's teams were perennial contenders for league honors. In his last eight seasons his teams won 144 games and lost only 28. They were in the semifinals or finals of the state tournament his last five years. His final two teams placed second in the state, losing each time by a single point to arch-rival Provo.

Coach Anderson left Orem High on sabbatical leave in 1974 and soon after was offered the head coaching job at Utah Tech. At UTC he produced the school's first winning record in its four-year history. He was timed in the 100 in 9.7 in high school and recorded a 9.5 in a college meet while running for BYU.

Coach Anderson averaged 12 points per game in college basketball and also lettered four years in track.

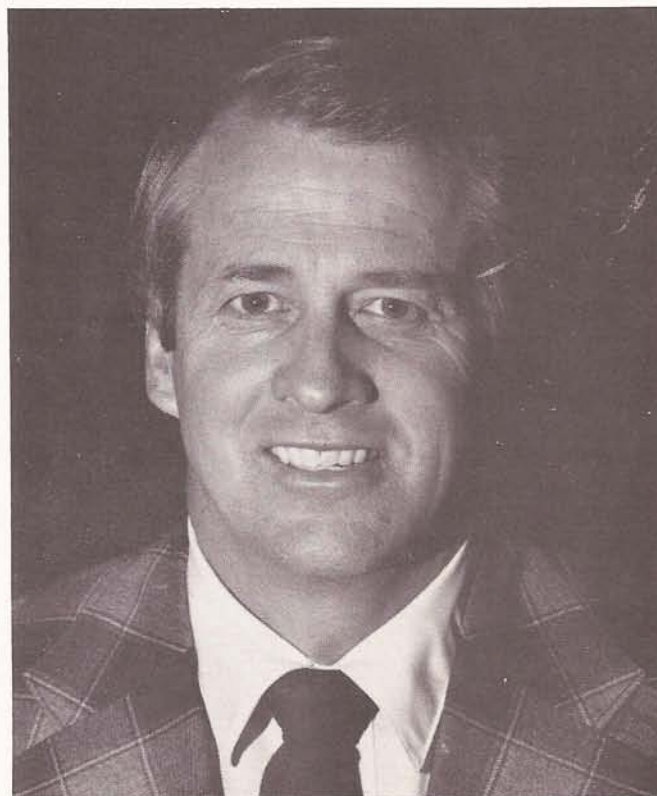
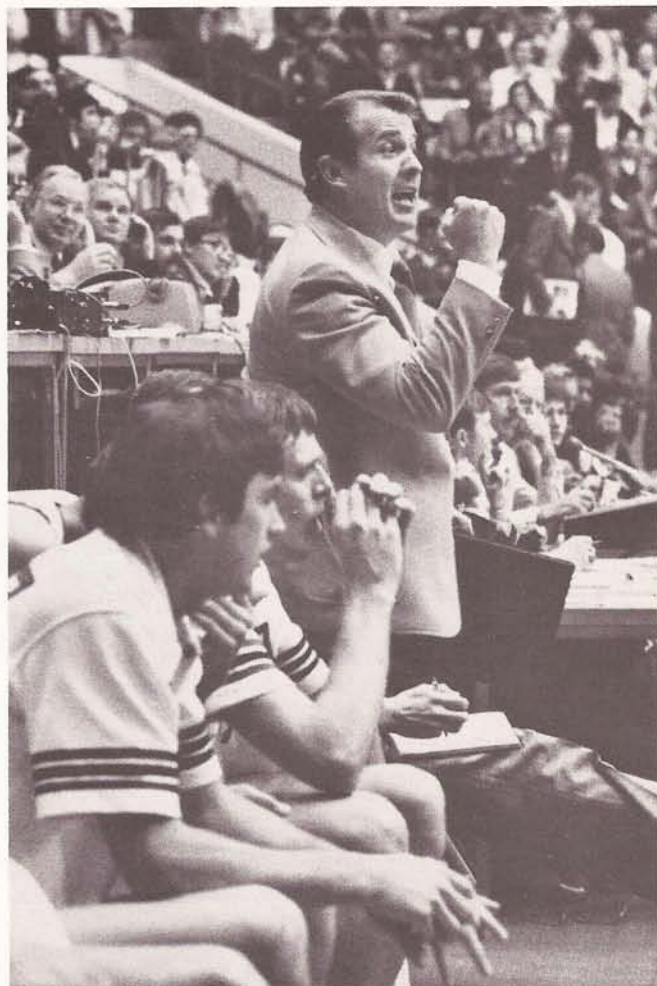
He started his junior and senior years (1955-57) and the final team he played on won the Skyline Conference championship under coach Stan Watts, former Director of Athletics at BYU.

After his college career Coach Anderson served two years in the British Mission for the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. After returning he was a graduate assistant under Pete Witbeck with the freshman team for a year, then served as head coach in St. Anthony, Idaho, for a year.

From there he went to Hillcrest High School in Midvale, Utah, where he coached a year under Art Hughes, a legend in Utah prep circles. His next stop was Orem where he also served as head basketball coach.

Harry currently serves as a bishop for the LDS Church.

Coach Anderson is married to the former Judy Rasmussen of Bountiful, Utah. They met while both were students at BYU. They have three children—Tamara, 16, Mathew, 14, and Ryan, 8—and make their home in Orem.



Roger Reid

Now in his third year as a member of the Cougar basketball staff, Roger Reid, a 33-year-old graduate of Weber State ('68) was named assistant coach during the 1978-79 BYU season.

Reid, who had coached at Clearfield High since 1974, took a leave of absence to work on his Master's degree. He quickly found his plans changed when he was awarded a graduate teaching assistantship at BYU and has been associated with the program since then.

This season he has been elected chairman of the recruiting committee for the National Association of Basketball Coaches.

"Because of this involvement," said Arnold, "he was the logical choice for the opening created by Coach McMullen's departure."

A native Utahn, Reid was an outstanding athlete at Springville (Utah) High School where he was student body vice-president and all-state athlete. He was named MVP at the annual North-South All-Star baseball game his senior year.

Reid enrolled at BYU where he was a member of the freshman basketball team and also made the trip to Mexico City with the Cougar baseball team.

Transferring to College of Eastern Utah, Reid was selected as the MVP on the school's baseball team and twice named to the Junior College All-America team in baseball.

From CEU he moved to Weber State College, where he was a member of the Big Sky Conference championship team coached by Dick Motta. Reid also received all-conference honors in baseball for two years.

Reid spent four years as a shortstop in professional baseball with the Chicago White Sox and Atlanta Braves organizations.

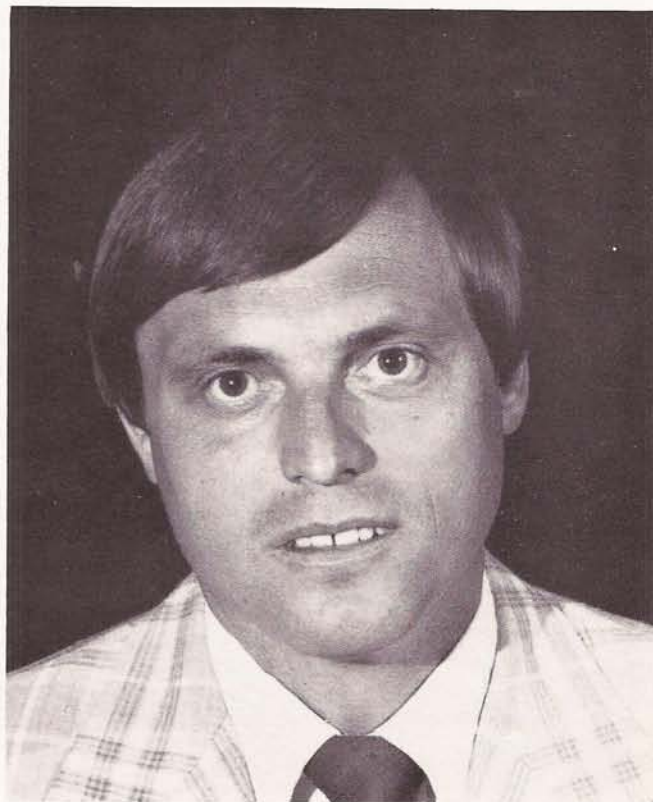
Reid began his coaching career in 1971 as a basketball and baseball coach at Payson High School. His overall basketball record at Payson was 50-26, and the baseball team had a 35-11 mark under his direction.

In 1974 he joined the coaching staff at Clearfield High School where he took the basketball team to the state tournament for the first time in five years.

Clearfield's overall record was 60 wins against 24 losses during that period.

Throughout his prep coaching career, his teams were known as tough defensive squads, despite the fact that the tallest player was only 6-4.

Reid is married to the former Diane Gardner, and they have three sons; Randy, 10; Robbie, 6; and Darren, 1½.



Carl Ingersoll

Carl "Rags" Ingersoll, a part-time assistant, is the newest addition to the BYU coaching staff. Ingersoll, 47, most recently coached at Alta High School (Sandy, Utah), but is well known for his coaching at American Fork High.

He served eight years as head coach at American Fork, and his teams reached the state championships in four of his last six years. His squad placed first in 1976 and 1979, second in 1974 and 1975, and third in 1978.

Ingersoll was named the Provo Daily Herald Coach of the Year in 1976 and 1979.

A graduate of BYU in Zoology, Ingersoll served two years in the Army. He has taught Biology for 17 years at American Fork and is teaching there this year on a part-time basis.

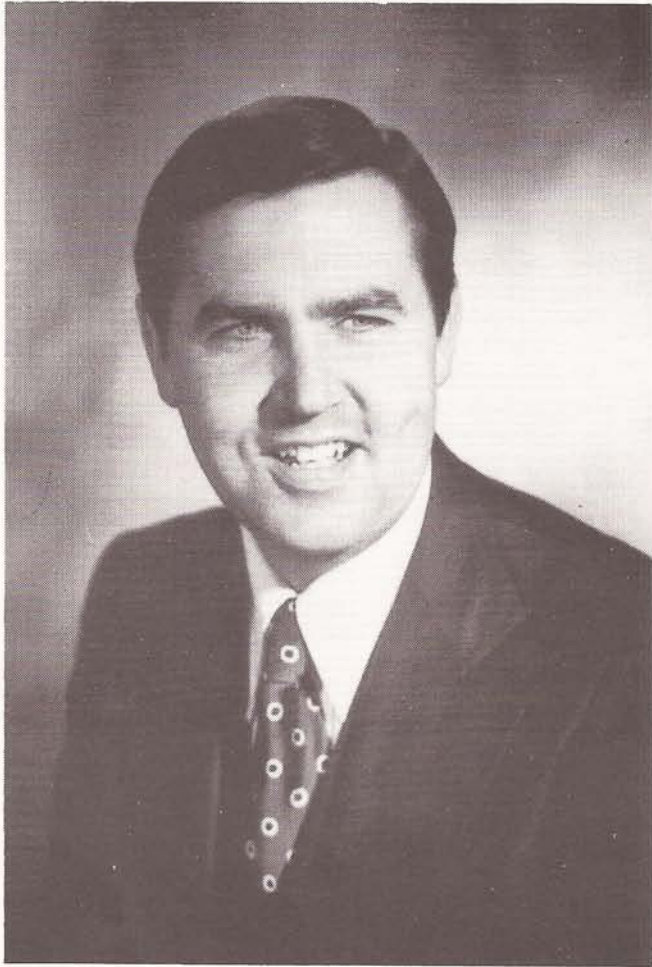
Carl's father, D. Grant "Rags" Ingersoll, was an all-conference center for BYU in the 1920's and at 6-4 was the conference's tallest player.

The Administration

BYU President Jeffrey R. Holland

Dr. Jeffrey R. Holland assumed the presidency of Brigham Young University August 1, 1980. Dr. Holland replaced Dr. Dallin H. Oaks, who had served in that position for nine years.

The St. George, Utah, native was a varsity athlete, student officer and high honor graduate at both Dixie High School and Dixie College in his hometown. From 1960 to 1962 he served a volunteer mission for The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints in Great Britain. Upon returning to the United States, President Holland enrolled at BYU where he obtained a bachelor's degree in English with highest honors and a master's degree in religious education, graduating with distinction. While at BYU, he was designated an E. S. Hinckley Scholar and was elected to Phi Kappa Phi honor society. More recently, he was honored as a recipient of the University's Distinguished Alumni Service Award.

Dr. Holland obtained a second master's degree and a doctorate in American Studies at Yale University in 1973 where he was a Yale University Fellow. He pursued scholarly interests in Mark Twain, writing his dissertation on "Mark Twain's Religious Sense: The Viable Years— 1835-1883."

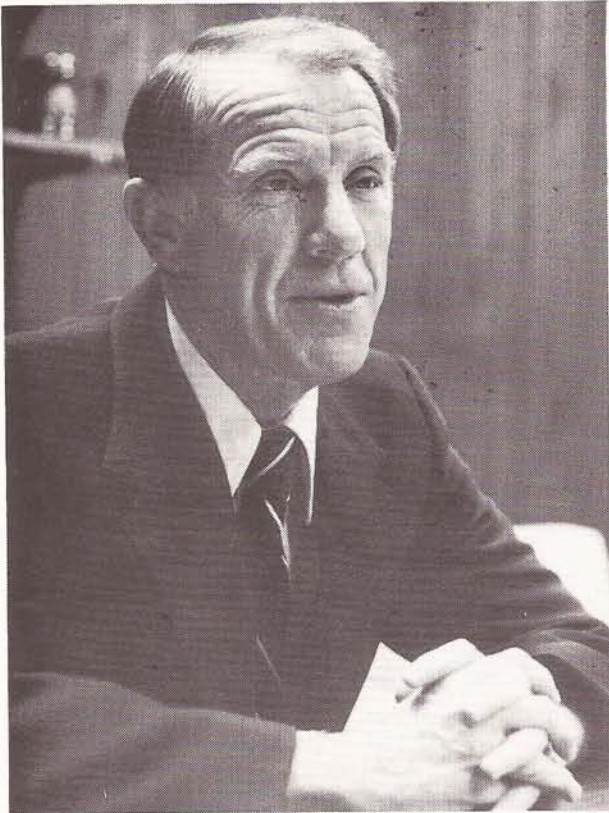
Before becoming president of BYU, Dr. Holland served more than four years as Commissioner of Education for the LDS Church, with responsibilities for all of the Church's educational programs which reach more than 750,000 students worldwide. Prior to that, he was dean of Religious Instruction at BYU, and he has served as an instructor or director at LDS Institutes of Religion in Hayward, Calif.; Seattle, Wash.; New Haven, Conn.; and Salt Lake City. The BYU president is a popular speaker and is noted for his keen sense of humor. More than 30 of his articles and addresses have been published in LDS magazines and professional journals, including *Vital Speeches of the Day*.

In the LDS Church, he has been a high councilman, a bishop's counselor, a bishop, and a counselor in three stake presidencies. He also served as director of the Melchizedek Priesthood MIA program and as chairman of the Church's Young Adult Committee.

President Holland is on the Advisory Board of the national Multiple Sclerosis Read-a-thon Committee and last year was chairman of the Scottsdale Conference on Church-Related Higher Education. He is a representative for the LDS Church to the National Congress on Church-Related Colleges and Universities and serves on the governing boards of the LDS Hospital in Salt Lake City and the Polynesian Cultural Center in Laie, Hawaii.

He and his wife, Patricia Terry Holland, also of St. George, have three children: Mathew, Mary Alice and David.



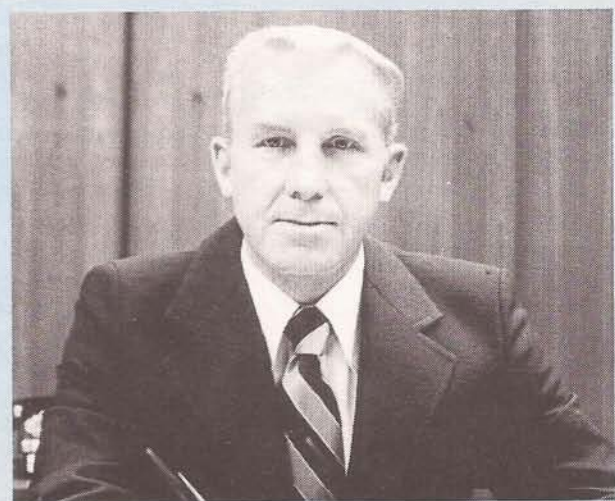


Dr. Glen Tuckett Athletic Director

The Cougars' athletic director likes to think the 1979-80 school year will be typical of things to come in the future at BYU . . . the Mountain Cats won four conference championships last year . . . Glen will be entering his fifth year as A.D. at BYU . . . Glen has invested himself in the very productive side of athletics . . . as an athlete (amateur and professional), as coach, as a teacher and as an administrator . . . he has brought vigor and vitality to his assignments, and he uses his varied talents to push the wholesome, worthwhile programs in athletics . . . he is acknowledged as one of the foremost leaders in his field . . . Tuckett is a native of Murray, Utah, where he was an all-around athlete at Murray High . . . he entered professional baseball after graduation, but continued his studies at the University of Utah where he obtained his B.S. degree in 1953 . . . Glen spent nine seasons in professional ball and twice was selected on all-star teams . . . he launched his coaching career at West High School in Salt Lake City, where he coached three sports . . . in 1959 he joined the staff at BYU . . . he served as assistant football coach for six years and head baseball coach for 17 years . . . his teams won 13 division titles, three conference championships, and two NCAA District 7 crowns . . . his teams went to College World Series in Omaha twice . . . one of the high points of his career came in 1974 when he was chosen as coach of the United States team which won the World Amateur Baseball Tournament for only the second time in the tourney's 22-year history . . . Tuckett was the 1977 president of the American Association of College Baseball Coaches . . . in January of 1979 he was inducted into the Collegiate Baseball Hall of Fame . . . used to be a color commentator for KSL Radio before his athletic director appointment . . . voted outstanding teacher at BYU . . . obtained his M.S. degree from BYU in 1962, and received his doctorate in 1976 . . . a former Bishop, Tuckett now serves as a counselor in the Edgemont Stake Presidency . . . Glen is married to the former Josephine Whittaker of Stockport, England, and they have four daughters: Alison, 20; Shannon, 18; Kendall, 14; and Erin, 6.

Dr. Clayne R. Jensen Dean and Faculty Representative

An experienced and respected administrator, Dr. Clayne Jensen is beginning his seventh year as dean of the College of Physical Education, which encompasses BYU athletics . . . Dr. Jensen served in the capacity of professor and assistant dean for six years before becoming dean . . . born March 17, 1930 in Gunnison, Utah, he graduated from the University of Utah in 1956, and obtained his doctorate from Indiana University in 1963 . . . from 1953-55 he was a captain in the U.S. Marine Corps, and coached two all-Marine championship teams in track and field . . . was faculty member at Utah State (1956-64), member of Phi Kappa Phi and recipient of Breithbard Athletic Foundation Award (1955) . . . he is author or co-author of 15 books currently in print and used in over 700 colleges and universities . . . member and chairman of several professional boards and special committees dealing with physical education, athletics and related fields . . . holds membership in five professional organizations . . . has traveled 44 states and 21 countries . . . This past summer he served as a U.S. delegate to the International Olympic Academy in Olympia, Greece . . . included in 12 national and international biographies, including *Who's Who in American Education*, *Outstanding Educators of America*, and *Noteworthy Americans* . . . married to former Elouise Henrie . . . they have four boys: Craig, 25; Mike (a defensive back on BYU football team, as was Craig), 22; Blake, 20; and Chris, 16.



Basketball: A Cougar Tradition

The home courts: Springville Gym, Utah's Nielsen Fieldhouse, the Smith Fieldhouse and the Marriott Center.

Some of the Players: Hutchins, Minson, Nemeika, Cosic and Ainge.

Some of the Coaches: Roberts, Romney, Watts and Arnold.

Tradition echoes for the Cougars in the names of the players and coaches and places they played.

For a starting point, it is safe to say that inter-collegiate basketball, by some standards, began at BU with the 1917-18 season. True, the school had basketball teams prior to this date under Coach E. L. Roberts. But this is the date when the BYU became a member of the Rocky Mountain Faculty Athletic Conference.

Subsequent conference affiliations included the Mountain States and Skyline Conferences, plus the Western Athletic Conference membership which began in 1962.

Looking at the "where" aspect of the game, the Cougars played their games on the third floor of the Training School building on lower campus from 1918-28. For the big games, the Cougar fans used to find themselves perched in window sills, on ladders and on top of lockers along the sides of the walls. In this manner as many as 700 could be accommodated for a game. And in 1925 the Cougars boasted the tallest player in the conference, Rags Ingersoll, a 6-4 center.

In 1928 the Cougars doubled their seating capacity by moving to the Women's Gym. Changes were taking place in the game, and it was during this period that E. L. Roberts, former coach, championed the change that eventually eliminated the center jump. It was also the era when Provo's local radio station (KOVO) carried one of the first ever broadcasts of a basketball game. It was also the day of the two handed push shot. BYU also landed its first All-American, Elwood Romney.

An unforgettable chapter in the chronicle of BYU basketball was written between 1946 and 1950, when the Cougars played their home games on the floor of Springville High School. Built for a crowd of about 1,200, the Springville Gym, officials discovered, could actually hold 1,700. They were crunched in uncomfortable seating positions, but the local fans were often too delirious to care.

Despite the obvious handicaps, the Springville Gym was the site for some outstanding basketball. It was a day when fans were treated to the play of Joe Nelson, Mel Hutchins, Roland Minson; Utah's Arnie Ferrin and Vern Gardner; Denver's Vince Boryla; Utah State's LaDell Anderson, to mention only a few.

They all played in Springville.

Forced out of the Springville Gym in 1950, the Cougars began casting about for a temporary floor to be used while the George Albert Smith Fieldhouse was being constructed.

The University of Utah very graciously offered its home floor—the 6,000-seat Einer Nielsen Fieldhouse. So for one season, 1950-51, the Cougars had a new home; on a rival's floor 45 miles north of the BYU campus.

Preseason games that year were played in the Spring-

ville Gym, but the action moved to Salt Lake City when the Skyline Conference schedule began.

Judging from the overall results, the Mountain Cats didn't suffer much as transients. They split with the Utes, 2-2, in games played on the Einer Nielsen floor, captured the MSC title and went on to win the National Invitational Tournament crown in Madison Square Garden.

Not bad for a team dubbed the Homeless Cats.

It was Coach Stan Watts' second year at the helm of Cougar basketball, and it was one of his most talented crews: Mel Hutchins, Roland Minson, Jerry Romney, Harold Christensen, and Joe Richey.

It should be pointed out that the Cougars were used to travel, having toured South America the summer of '50.

After a long wait, the Cougars finally moved into their own arena—the George Albert Smith Fieldhouse (10,200)—in December of 1951. Basketball was just into the golden era for the Cougars, and in the 20 years that followed, the BYU drew large crowds. Coach Stan Watts, who coached every one of the 246 games played there, during that period scheduled some of the finest teams available for the local fans.

Little wonder, then, that this period of boom is closely associated with Stan Watts. Prior to his retirement in 1972 after 23 years as head coach, Watts' team won two National Invitational Tournament championships, plus eight conference titles.

In order to meet the growing demand of spectators, the Cougars needed a bigger facility. They got it in December of 1971, when the team opened the new Marriott Center, largest on-campus arena in the nation (just under 23,000 seats). The Cougars set attendance records that year, drawing an average of over 21,000 to home games.

Since its beginning in 1918, BYU basketball has had 11 coaches, a long list of All-Americans (data elsewhere in the guide), a record of playing some of the nation's finest, and a tradition that is still in the making.

1980 Basketball Summary

Beginning with the 89-81 upset of the Russians back in November through the 114-81 win over San Diego State in the final game of the regular season, it was a campaign of huge proportions for the Cougars. In fact, no basketball team in the history of the school has finished a schedule with a higher percentage of wins: (.857).

In 29 starts---not including the Russians---the BYU club came out on top in 24 games. In eight of those games the margin of victory was two or less points, but the Cougars squeezed through wins in seven of the eight close ones. Even more surprisingly, the Mountain Cats successfully defended the Western Athletic Conference championship won in 1979, and they turned the trick by winning all seven WAC games on the road, a first for a WAC team.

But there were some nights when Coach Frank Arnold must have wondered about his club. There was the season opener in Provo against Illinois when the Cougars, who had been ranked as high as fifth by one sports maga-

zine, dropped a humbling 86-76 decision to the Big Ten team before a house full of disappointed fans in the Marriott Center.

However, the Cougars righted themselves quickly and rattled off a string of six straight wins. Defeat number two came in a two-pointer on the road against Long Beach State. A few doubts surfaced again at the Far West Classic when Oregon State pounced on BYU, 86-71, in the biggest loss of the season. Thereafter, however, the Cougars lost only one remaining game, a 56-53 decision to Wyoming in a slowdown game employed by the Cowboys. BYU won 12 straight after that, and in five of those wins the Cougs rolled up more than 100 points.

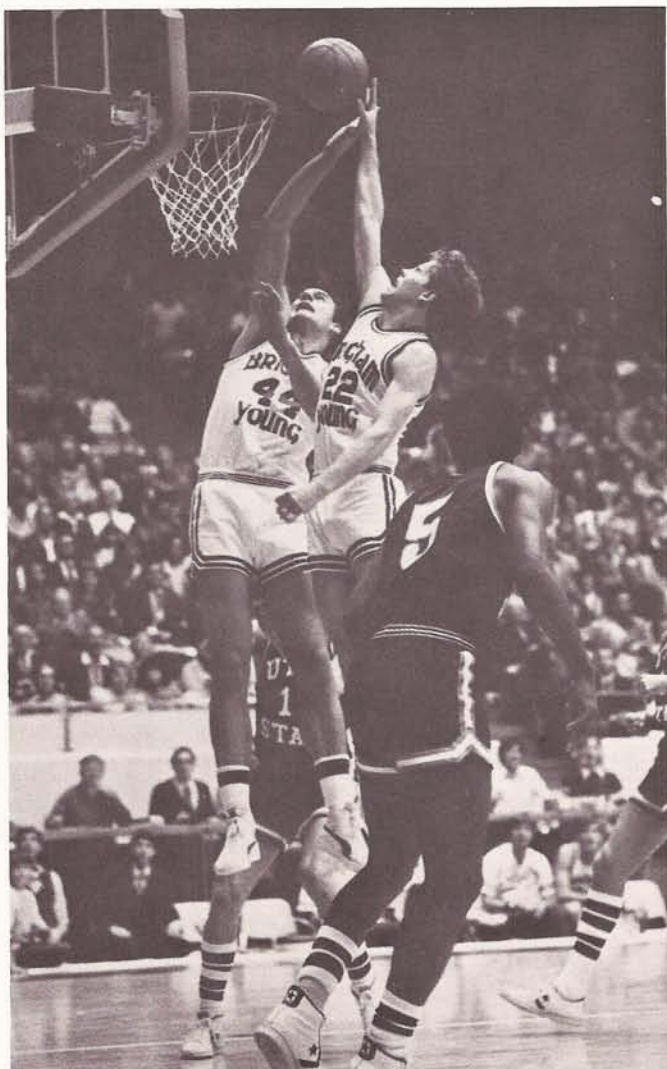
You don't have to buy a scouting report to learn the reasons for the Cougars' success. All of the starters from last year's 20-8 team returned last fall, and again they demonstrated good team balance (four starters in double figures) and good support on the bench. Indeed, the club's experience may have been a big factor in winning this year's close ones.

Individually, opponents can't overlook the performance---and the steadying influence---of All-American Danny Ainge. Ainge, who has already set two school records (632 points in a season, plus most points in a career), was picked all-WAC for the third year in a row. Danny topped the team in scoring, assists and steals.

Center Alan Taylor, one of only two seniors on the team, set a Marriott Center record in the season finale with 23 rebounds. Taylor, too, was named all-WAC first-team, and his work kept several wins alive. Senior guard Scott Runia, along with sophomore forwards Devin Durrant and Fred Roberts, completed the first five. And it should be mentioned that in junior guard Steve Craig the Cougars may have had the best "sixth man" in this part of the country.

Statistically, the Cougars had an impressive edge over opponents in all categories---field goal shooting, rebounding, points, etc.

It's been several years since the Cougars sported a stronger entry for a post-season tournament, but the season ended with a 66-71 loss to Clemson in the NCAA playoffs at Ogden.
