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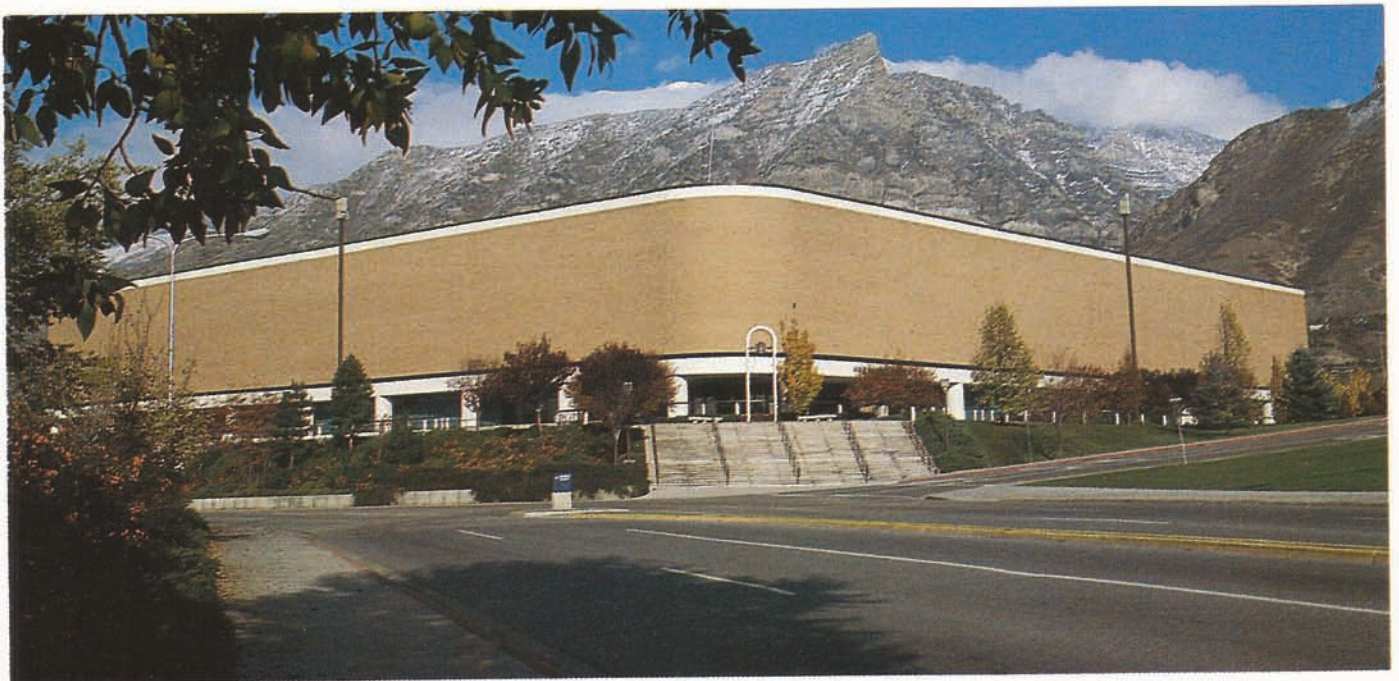

SEASON OUTLOOK

What to do for an encore after winning the Western Athletic Conference Championship and achieving a 17-game winning streak is the question for the 1988-89 Cougars.

BYU, 26-6 and ranked 14th (UPI) and 17th (AP) last season, were within one game of being ranked number one in early February.

Sixth-year head coach Ladell Andersen welcomed seven returning lettermen and six new faces.

Andersen is in his 16th year of coaching with a 276-151 overall record and a 100-56 mark in five years with the Cougars.

"Our offensive style will remain up-tempo," Andersen says. "We led the league in seven of 10 categories last year, so we don't want to change something that has been good to us."

The Western Athletic Conference champion Cougars led the league in scoring offense, field goal percentage, free throw percentage, scoring margin, rebound margin, three point field goal percentage, and three-point-defense en route to a 17-game winning streak and a number-two ranking at one point last season.

All-America Smith, a 6-10 senior, heads the list of starters for BYU with a pair of talented juniors in point guard Marty Haws, 6-2, and swingman Andy Toolson, 6-6.

"We will rely on these three players because of their experience," says Andersen. "They are strong and we expect them to contribute more than last year."

"Smith will play a lot at center, and he can be one of the best post men I've coached. The inside players I've had all were heavy scorers. He can play anywhere."

Smith was named the GTE Academic All-America of the Year, second team All-America by UPI and the U.S. Basketball Writers, and WAC Player of the Year. He led the WAC in scoring and has a good shot at becoming the number two scorer in BYU history.

Smith has helped BYU to the NCAA post-season tournament each of his three years and hopes to continue that string. Last year in the NCAA tournament the Cougars defeated North Carolina-Charlotte, 98-92, in overtime, then lost to Louisville, 97-76. Smith led BYU in scoring and rebounding for both those games.

The other senior on the team is 6-7 forward Alan Astle. The only other upperclassman on the front line is junior college transfer Steve Andrus, a 6-9 swingman from Dixie College.

"Andrus has good size and we are looking for him to be one of three big men to emerge and help with rebounding chores."

Another transfer from Dixie, Steve Schreiner, a 6-6 sophomore who redshirted last season after returning from a mission, will be counted on heavily for playing time and experience.

"We're expecting Schreiner to play a vital role and take up some of the slack," says Andersen. "He will see a lot of playing time. He is a relentless worker, a good outside shooter and a powerful inside player."

Three other sophomores are more familiar faces on the Cougar scene: Vince Bryan, 6-6; Mike Herring, 6-4; and David Wolfe, 6-9.

Two of the freshman trio have returned from LDS missions: Mark Heslop, 6-5 (The Netherlands) and Alan Frampton, 6-2 (Argentina). True freshman John Fish, at 6-9, will be needed for his height sooner than usual, because of depth.

The other transfer, 6-2 Kevin Santiago from Utah Valley Community College, provides some experience on the guard line.

"We will lack depth again, but we didn't have a lot of depth last year either," says Andersen. "Smith, Haws, and Toolson should start, but we need to find four others in the remaining 10 players to make us effective."

With the likes of UCLA, Miami (Fla.), and Wichita State, the 1988-89 schedule is one of the toughest seasons in recent years. The Cougars also could meet St. John's in the Joe Lapchick Tournament, host the 15th annual Cougar Classic and face instate foes Utah, Utah State, and Weber State.

Key losses include automatic scorer Jeff Chatman, center Jim Usevitch, and passing whiz Brian Taylor. The Cougars also have five players currently serving LDS missions: guards Nathan Call (Bolivia), Dave Reeves (Scotland), and Todd Gentry (Pennsylvania), along with frontline players Gary Trost (Pennsylvania) and Dave Astle (Spain).

WESTERN ATHLETIC CONFERENCE

As the Western Athletic Conference moves into its 28th year, it is enjoying increased national attention as a result of the successful athletic programs of its member institutions.

The league is the most geographically diverse in the country, spreading from the 7,000-foot heights of Laramie, Wyoming, to the sea-level sprawls of Honolulu and San Diego. Each of the league's nine members adds to the flavor of the conference with its distinctive features.

The WAC traditionally ranks with the top conferences in the nation in per-capita attendance at basketball games. And last year, BYU ranked fifth nationally in per-game attendance. New Mexico was ninth while Utah and UTEP ranked in the top 25 nationally.

Founded July 1, 1962, the charter members included Arizona, Arizona State, Brigham Young, New Mexico, Utah, and Wyoming. In September 1967, Colorado State and Texas-El Paso were added to make the WAC an eight team league.

A major change occurred in July 1978, when Arizona and Arizona State left for the Pac-10. But on the same day, San Diego State made its official entry into the conference. Hawaii became the eighth member the following year, and the Air Force Academy entered in 1980.

Based near Denver, Colorado, the WAC is led by Commissioner Joe Kearney, who assumed the post in 1980. Kearney, former athletic director at Arizona State, Washington, and Michigan State, is the fourth conference commissioner since the formation of the league.

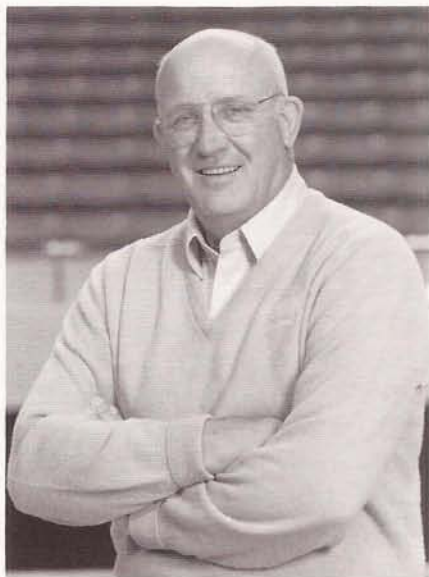

LADELL ANDERSEN, HEAD COACH



Winning seasons and post-season success have become synonymous with BYU head basketball coach Ladell Andersen. Consider:

In 15 seasons as a collegiate head coach, Ladell has produced 13 teams with winning records and nine teams with 20 wins or more. In 10 of those seasons, Andersen's teams have gone on to post-season play.

As head coach of the Utah Stars in the American Basketball Association (ABA), Andersen compiled the best two-year mark in ABA history 115-53 (.685), and his Stars won the Western Division championship twice.

Ladell's BYU report card reads: 1) 5 national tournament appearances, 3 NCAA and 2 NIT (1 post season, 1 pre-season). 2) 17-game winning streak (school record). 3) Winningest percentage in WAC history (57/23/5 seasons). 4) WAC Coach of the Year (1987-88) and District Seven Coach of the Year (1985-86). 5) Coached the West Team to first place in the Olympic Festival in Houston, the first time in five years that had occurred.

Almost 40 years ago, Ladell began his career in college basketball at Utah State on a make-good scholarship. Not content with simply making the starting five, he went on to become a two-time All-Skyline selection at guard.

In 1952, Ladell graduated from Utah State and played basketball in the Air Force while he was stationed at Sandia, New Mexico. In his two years there, Andersen accumulated more honors as he was selected All-Service. In 1952, he played in the Olympic playoffs at Madison Square Garden.

After Air Force ball, Ladell went on to play with the Denver Bankers of the National Industrial League and was named All-League twice before he retired as a player and took up coaching at the University of Utah in 1956.

Andersen's first coaching experience came as an assistant to Ute head basketball coach Jack Gardner. In addition to his basketball duties, Ladell coached the Ute golf team. He is a

scratch golfer with a handicap that has been as low as two. After five years at Utah, Andersen got his first crack at head coaching at Utah State in 1961.

He coached Aggie greats such as Wayne Estes, Cornell Green, Marv Roberts, Nate Williams, Shaler Halimon and Robert Loriski while becoming Utah State's all-time winningest coach (176-95/.649). His Aggie teams competed in five NCAA tournaments and one NIT.

In 1971, Andersen moved to the professional ranks and coached the ABA's Stars. In addition to winning two division championships, Ladell also was asked to coach the ABA all-stars twice. After the 1972-73 season, Ladell accepted Utah State's athletic directorship. At that point in time, it looked as if Andersen's outstanding coaching career was over.

During the next 10 years, Andersen still managed to make his mark on basketball. As the Aggie A.D., he championed Utah State's admission into the Pacific Coast Athletic Association. And for five years during that span, he also served on the important NCAA Division I Basketball Tournament Committee.

The 59-year-old Andersen has been BYU's head basketball coach since April, 1983. His record is 100-56.

He is a member of the National Association of Basketball Coaches' Board of Directors and serves as chairman of the prestigious All-America committee. Andersen, the originator of summer basketball camps in the Rocky Mountain area, still runs his own camp each summer at BYU. He also invented an adjustable basketball standard, called the "quick adjust." He is a volunteer worker at Utah State Prison.

Ladell and his wife Donna have five sons—Clint (co-owner of a construction company in Mesa, Arizona), Larry (head basketball coach at Snow College), Richie (a counselor at a youth detention center and an outstanding artist in Mesa, Arizona), Bob (runs a collegiate scheduling service out of Provo) and Jim (student at BYU). They also have 12 grandchildren.

ROGER REID, ASST. HEAD COACH

Roger Reid came to the BYU basketball program 11 years ago and brought with him a wealth of experience both as an athlete and as a coach.

Under Coach Ladell Andersen, Roger has been responsible for BYU's defensive schemes. The 41-year-old Reid also has been coordinating BYU's recruiting efforts since he joined the staff in 1978. He has served as chairman (1980-81) of the recruiting committee for the National Association of Basketball Coaches. In 1981, he helped give basketball clinics throughout Australia for three weeks.

In 1986, Roger was on the NABC committee to plan the national convention for the Final Four.

Reid was a star athlete at Springville High School, where he was student body vice-president and an all-state athlete. He was named MVP in the annual North-South all-star baseball game his senior year.

Reid enrolled at BYU and was a member of the freshman basketball team and the Cougar baseball squad which made the trip to Mexico City.

He later transferred to the College of Eastern Utah, where he was a standout in both baseball and basketball. He was the team's MVP in baseball and twice was named to the junior college All-America team in that sport.

From CEU, he moved to Weber State College and was a member of the Big Sky Conference championship basketball team coached by Dick Motta. Reid also received all-conference honors in baseball for two seasons.

After college, he was drafted into professional baseball and spent four years as a shortstop with the Chicago White Sox and Atlanta Braves organizations, advancing as far as AAA ball.

Reid began his coaching career in 1971 as a basketball and baseball coach at Payson High School. His overall basketball record at Payson was 50-26. And the baseball team had a 35-11 mark under his direction.

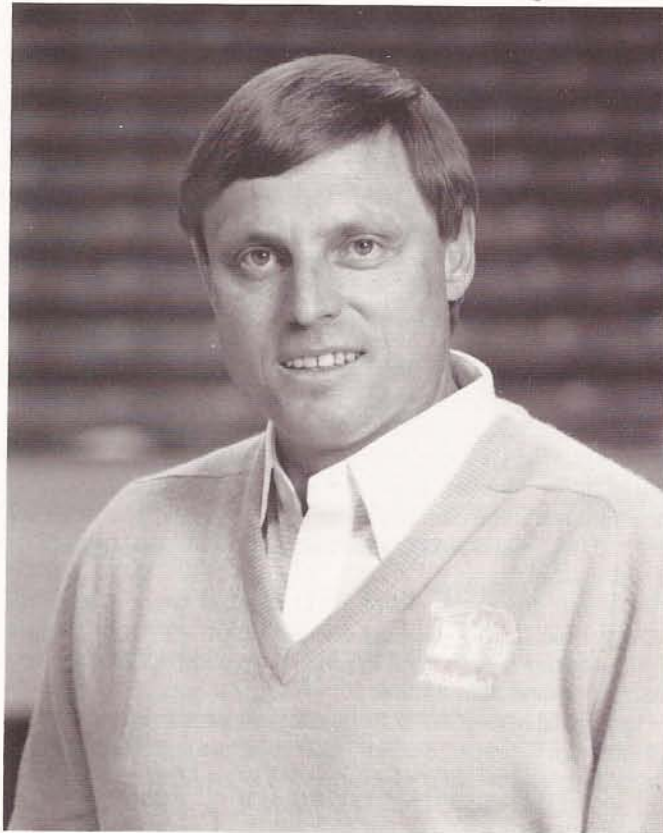
In 1974, he joined the coaching staff at Clearfield High School, where he took the basketball team to the state tournament for the first time in five years. Clearfield's overall record was 60 wins and 24 losses during that period.

Throughout his prep coaching career, Reid's teams were known as tough defensive squads, despite the fact that the tallest player was only 6-4.

Reid is married to the former Diane Gardner, and they have three sons and one daughter: Randy, 18; Robbie, 14; Darren, 9; and Kelli Ann, 7.

He has served as first counselor in a bishopric and also has served on a high council in the LDS Church.

In the 10 seasons Roger has been at BYU the teams have averaged 20 wins a year.

CARL INGERSOLL, ASSISTANT COACH

One of the most successful high school coaches in Utah during the 1970s was Carl Ingersoll, who joined the BYU staff eight years ago.

Carl, 55, built his reputation as a successful coach mainly at American Fork High, where he directed the team for eight years. During his last six years there, Carl's teams reached the championship round of the state tournament four times and won the state title twice (1976 and 1979).

Ingersoll received the *Provo Daily Herald* Coach-of-the-Year award in 1976 and 1979 and also received several awards for his involvement with the Utah Cerebral Palsy charity program.

After leaving American Fork, he spent a short time at Alta High School in Sandy, Utah, before joining BYU's staff as a graduate teaching assistant in 1980.

He was the 1986 recipient of the "Coaches Award," presented by the Utah High School Basketball Coaches Association in appreciation for outstanding service and dedication to youth. The award was presented at the annual high school all-star game.

Ingersoll graduated from BYU in 1958 with a degree in zoology. He taught biology for 18 years at American Fork High, where he also was an assistant football and baseball coach for several seasons.

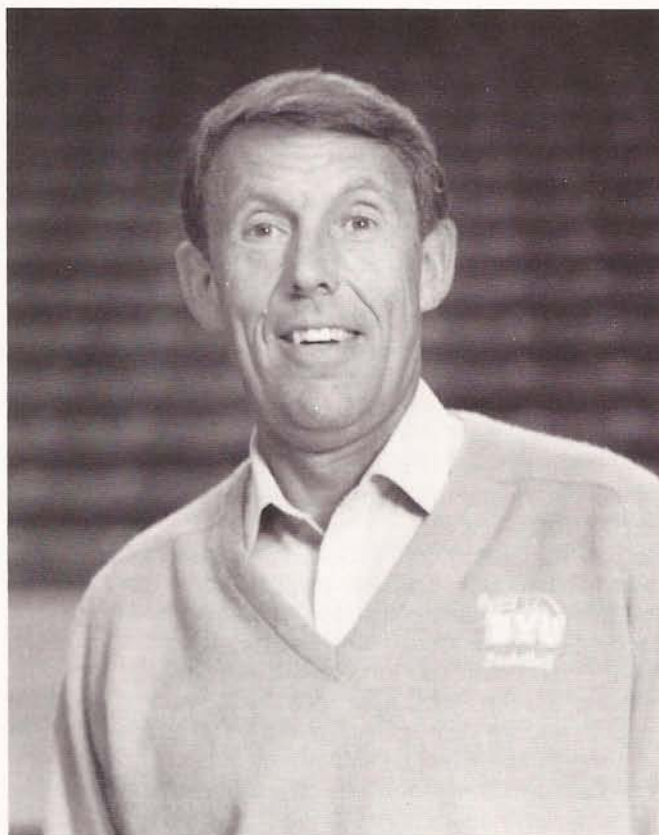
He played one collegiate basketball season at the Branch Agricultural College (Southern Utah State) in Cedar City. He played two years while serving in the U.S. Army at Fort Bragg, N.C.

Carl has been involved with Cougar Basketball Camps since 1973 and has also helped in Medalist Clinics. In 1981, he was invited to participate with Kresimir Cosic in a basketball clinic in Yugoslavia, sponsored by Converse.

His father, D. Grant "Rags" Ingersoll, was an all-conference center for BYU in the 1920's, and at 6-4 was the tallest player in the conference.

Carl has served as a bishop in the LDS Church. He is married to the former Gene Oborn of Payson, Utah. They have seven children.

Four are married: Jeff, Jan, Jody, and Julie. Jillinda is a junior at BYU. The two youngest sons are Jarod and Jason. The Ingersolls have 11 grandchildren. They live in American Fork.

JUNIOR VARSITY COACHES

John Hansen is a part-time coach in his third year over the junior varsity team and scouting. Hansen, a former basketball player at Moscow High School in Idaho, is familiar with Ladell Andersen's style of coaching.

In addition to serving as a graduate assistant coach at BYU in 1985-1986, Hansen has also worked under Ladell at the BYU summer basketball camps.

A sound fundamental player as a youngster, Hansen is an excellent teacher and leader. He graduated from BYU in 1984 with an undergraduate degree in physical education and a minor in history and immediately went to work as a teacher at Pocatello High School in Idaho.

Now back in Provo, Hansen finished a master's degree in professional leadership in August 1988. He is also responsible for automating the BYU basketball office with a computer system. Among other things, the system can be used to help recruiting.

Hansen met his wife, the former Laurie Jordan of Alpine, Utah, as an undergraduate at BYU. They now have been married five years.

As far as goals go, the junior varsity coach realizes his place in the overall picture at BYU. "I want to work with and develop those players that don't get a chance to play much with the varsity so they can help the program in the future," says Hansen. "But I also want to field a competitive junior varsity team."

He will be helped by graduate assistant **Tom Kelly** whose older brother, Steve, played for the Cougars from 1969-71.

Tom, a nephew of former BYU coach Stan Watts, played at Snow College in the mid-70s before serving an LDS mission in Thailand.

Kelly graduated from the University of Utah in 1981 (history) and then was an assistant coach for two years at Mesa State in his hometown of Grand Junction, Colorado. He spent three years as head coach at Montezuma-Cortez High School in Cortez, Colorado. A volunteer on the BYU staff two years ago, Kelly is married to the former Tracy Ralstin and they have three sons.

PRESIDENT JEFFREY R. HOLLAND

The eight-year administration of Brigham Young University President Jeffrey R. Holland has been characterized by commitment to excellence and the full realization of human potential.

In his mission statement for the University, Dr. Holland says all instruction, programs and services at BYU, "should make their own contribution toward the balanced development of the total person.

"Such a broadly prepared individual will not only be capable of meeting personal challenge and change but will also bring strength to others in the tasks of home and family life, social relationships, civic duty and service to mankind," he said.

The President considers sports and good sportsmanship as important elements in realizing full human potential. In his own career, he has successfully combined sports, scholarship and leadership responsibilities.

At Dixie High School in his home town of St. George, Utah, he was a student officer, a varsity athlete in football and basketball and a high honor graduate. He went on to become an honors' student at Dixie College where he also served as captain of the school's conference champion basketball team.

After serving a two-year mission in Great Britain for the LDS Church (1960-62), President Holland enrolled at BYU, where he obtained a bachelor's degree in English with highest honors and a master's degree in religious education, graduating with distinction. While at BYU, he was designated an E.S. Hinckley Scholar and was elected to Phi Kappa Phi honor society. More recently, he was honored as a recipient of the University's Distinguished Alumni Service Award.

Dr. Holland obtained a second master's degree and a doctorate in American Studies at Yale University in 1973. He wrote his dissertation on "Mark Twain's Religious Sense: The Viable Years—1835 to 1883."

Preceding his appointment as president of BYU in 1980, Dr. Holland served more than four years as Commissioner of Education for The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, with responsibilities for all of the Church's educational programs which reach more than 750,000 students worldwide. Prior to that, he was dean of Religious Instruction at BYU, and he has served as instructor and director at several LDS Institutes of Religion.

A popular speaker and writer, President Holland is noted for his keen sense of humor. He has had more than 50 articles and addresses published in both LDS and professional journals, including "Vital Speeches of the Day."

In the LDS Church, he has been a high councilor, a bishop, and a counselor in three stake presidencies. He also served as director of the Melchizedek Priesthood MIA program and as chairman of the Church's Young Adult Committee. He currently serves as a Regional Representative.

Dr. Holland is on the governing boards of the Deseret News Publishing Company, Commercial Security Bank and Bancorporation in Salt Lake City, and the Polynesian Cultural Center in Laie, Hawaii.

He is president of the American Association of Presidents of Independent Colleges and Universities (AAPICU) and is on the board of directors of the National Association of Independent Colleges and Universities (NAICU).

President Holland is married to his high school sweetheart, the former Patricia Terry of St. George, Utah. They are the parents of three children, Matthew, Mary Alice, and David.

DEAN, SPORTS INFORMATION DIRECTOR

Dr. Clayne R. Jensen, Dean and Faculty Representative

Dr. Clayne Jensen is in his 15th year as Dean of the College of Physical Education, which encompasses BYU athletics.

A respected and experienced administrator, Dr. Jensen served in the capacity of Professor and Assistant Dean for seven years before becoming Dean. He has been the BYU Faculty Athletic Representative since 1976 and was chairman of BYU's Athletics Advisory Board for seven years.

Dr. Jensen grew up in Gunnison, Utah. He obtained a bachelor's and master's degree from the University of Utah in 1952 and 1956, and his doctorate from Indiana University in 1963.

From 1953–55, he was a captain in the U.S. Marine Corps, and coached two all-Marine championship teams in track and field. He was a faculty member at Utah State (1956–64), member of Phi Kappa Phi, and recipient of the Briethbard Athletic Foundation Award (1955).

He is author or co-author of 16 books currently in print and used in over 700 colleges and universities. He is a member and chairman of several professional boards and special committees dealing with physical education, athletics and related fields. He holds membership in five professional groups and has traveled in 44 states and 26 countries.

He served as a U.S. delegate to the International Olympic Academy in Olympia, Greece, and he is currently a member

of the governing council of the NCAA, and is on the advisory board of the United States Sports Academy.

He has been included in 17 national and international biographies, including *Who's Who in America*, *Who's Who in American Education*, *Outstanding Educators of America*, and *Noteworthy Americans*.

Dr. Jensen is married to the former Elouise Henrie and

they have four sons: Craig, Mike, Blake and Chris—all of whom have been excellent students and have excelled in athletics.

Dave Schulthess, SID

The University's only sports information director in its history is in his final academic year with the Cougars.

Dave Schulthess came aboard 37 years ago at a time when the size of the student body was relatively small and the school's athletic program very active but modest.

Born in Provo, he attended school in the Los Angeles suburb of Highland Park, where he was drafted into the

Armed Services during World War II. Schulthess spent three years in the U.S. Army (Infantry), including two years overseas in the South Pacific.

On his return home, he enrolled at BYU, where he was editor of the campus newspaper, the *Daily Universe*. He graduated in 1950, later working for three newspapers in Salt Lake City: the *Deseret News*, the *Salt Lake Telegram* and the *Salt Lake Tribune*.

In December of 1951 he accepted an appointment to the Public Relations staff at BYU with the specific assignment as sports publicist. Besides sports, his other duties included editing the school's *Alumnus* magazine.

An early member of CoSIDA (College Sports Information Directors of America), Dave served as president of the national organization in 1980. He is also a member of CoSIDA's Hall of Fame.

Dave is married to the former Fran Wood of Salt Lake City, and they have four grown children and six grandchildren.

ATHLETIC DIRECTOR, ASSOCIATE AD

Glen Tuckett, Athletic Director

Most of the large strides in BYU's athletic program have come during Glen Tuckett's tenure as athletic director.

Since he assumed the directorship in July, 1976, the Cougars have claimed 12 athletic supremacy titles in the Western Athletic Conference and consistently have been ranked among the top-10 athletic programs in the country.

In 1985, he was inducted into the Utah Sports Hall of Fame. He also has been inducted into the BYU Hall of Fame for his successful coaching of the BYU baseball team for 17 years, during which time his teams won 13 division baseball titles, three WAC championships and two NCAA District 7 crowns. Twice his teams went to the College World Series.

In 1983, he was given the Dale Rex award, symbolic of the person who has contributed most to amateur athletics in the State of Utah and the highest athletic honor given by BYU.

In 1977 Tuckett was president of the American Association of Baseball Coaches and was inducted into the Collegiate Baseball Hall of Fame in 1979. When he retired, he was the NCAA's ninth winningest baseball coach.

A native of Murray, Utah, Tuckett was an all-around athlete at Murray High School. He played professional baseball for nine seasons, during which time he returned to the University of Utah to obtain a B.S. degree in 1953.

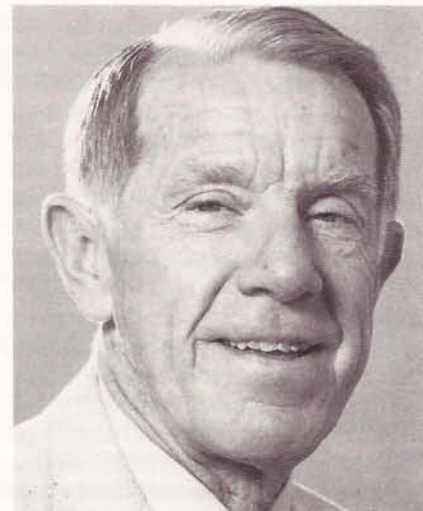
He launched his coaching career at West High School in Salt Lake City, where he worked with the football, basketball and baseball teams. In 1959 he joined the staff at BYU, serving as assistant football coach for six years and head

baseball coach for 17 years. He obtained a master's degree from BYU in 1962 and a doctorate in 1978. In addition to his coaching, Tuckett taught health classes and was voted an outstanding teacher at BYU.

Tuckett was chosen as coach of the 1974 United States team which won the World Amateur Baseball Tournament, only the second time a USA team had won in the tourney's 27-year history. He was a color commentator with KSL Radio for 10 years before his athletic director appointment.

Glen serves on a number of NCAA and CFA committees.

A popular public speaker, Glen is often asked to speak to business, public and church groups. He is married to the former Josephine Whittaker of Stockport, England, and they have four daughters: Alison, Shannon, Kendall and Erin.



AD Glen Tuckett

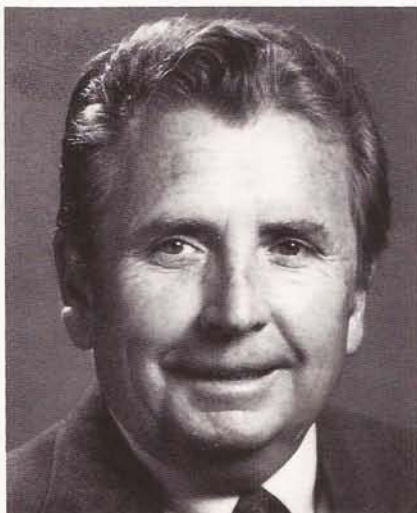
Pete Witbeck, Associate AD

Associate Athletic Director Alan "Pete" Witbeck has been involved with BYU athletics either as an athlete, as a coach or as an administrator for the past 39 years.

Witbeck, a native of Raymond, Alberta, Canada, came to BYU in 1949 as a long distance runner on the track team. While in Provo, he acquired bachelor's (1952) and master's (1954) degrees and began work on a doctoral degree before joining the P.E. staff in 1955.

Three years later, Witbeck was hired to coach the freshman basketball team, a position he held for six years. During that time, his teams posted a 62-9 record, losing only three times in the last three years Witbeck was coach.

The 1963-64 Kittens were undefeated and ranked first in

the nation among freshmen teams. This team went on to win three consecutive conference championships and the National Invitational Tournament in 1966. For his outstanding coaching job, Witbeck was given the prestigious Dale Rex Memorial Award, awarded annually to the person who has contributed most to amateur athletics in the State of Utah. As a member of that NIT championship team, he was later inducted into BYU's Hall of Fame in 1980.

After the successful stint with the freshman program, Witbeck joined the varsity staff in 1962 as Stan Watts' top assistant. His duties included coordinating the offense and heading up scouting and recruiting efforts. During Witbeck's tenure, the team won five out of ten Western Athletic Conference championships and were nationally ranked each of those years. He held that position until Watts retired from basketball in 1972 to become athletic director.

Witbeck also decided to leave basketball and try his hand at athletic administration, a new position as Stan Watts' assistant. After Watts' retirement, Pete continued to work under Glen Tuckett.

Some of his responsibilities include over-seeing athlete eligibility and game management and serving as liaison between BYU, the NCAA and the Western Athletic Conference.

He is married to the former Kathy Pickering, and they have three children, two daughters and a son who is currently serving an LDS Church mission.

1988 SUMMARY

In the 70-year history of basketball at Brigham Young University, there has been only one team more successful than the 1987–88 squad. The Cougars came within two wins of matching the 28-win record posted by the 1950–51 team. In terms of winning percentage, the '88 team had a .813 record, best ever in the school's history.

BYU's one-point win over the defending champions of the Big Sky began a string of victories unparalleled in BYU history—a total of 17 consecutive wins through the months of December and January. It was Feb. 6 before the string came to an end against UAB in Birmingham, Alabama.

Prior to that point (the loss in Birmingham) the Cougars had advanced in the wire service polls to second- and third-place rankings. A win against the Sun Belt team might have put the Cougars in the number one spot, since BYU was the only remaining undefeated major team in the nation. Even though they were soundly beaten by UAB, the Cougars managed a 20-1 record before they came back to reality.

Playing their first two WAC games at home, the Cougars got off to a blazing start with wins over Hawaii (+31) and San Diego State (+27). But BYU's greatest feat of the season may have come the following week when the team posted road wins over Wyoming (nationally ranked), UTEP, and New Mexico (a team that had upset #1 ranked Arizona earlier in the season at The Pit).

The wins at Laramie (+16), El Paso (+10), and Albuquerque (+7) gave the Cougars a grip on the WAC championship they never relinquished. Although they would lose a total of three WAC games on the schedule that followed, the margin of loss was only a combined seven points: two in overtime at San Diego State, two points at Utah, and three points to UTEP in the Marriott Center.

At one stretch in the second half of the season, the Cougars were on the road for 10 days; a swing from Provo to San Diego to Honolulu to Fort Collins to Colorado Springs to Salt Lake City. The Cougars finished the regular season with a 13-3 WAC record to win their ninth Western Athletic Conference championship.

As hosts of the fifth annual WAC basketball tournament, the Cougars beat Hawaii in the first round, but were upset by the Texas-El Paso Miners for the second time in less than a week. The tournament was won by Wyoming, one of three league schools to be among the 64 teams to be invited to the NCAA playoffs.

The Cougars were seeded fourth in the Southeast Regionals in Atlanta. In the first round, BYU was pressed into overtime before beating North Carolina-Charlotte, 98-92. They were then paired with Louisville in Saturday's next round. BYU suffered its widest margin of defeat of the season, a 97-76 loss to the Cardinals, thus becoming one of the 63 teams that would lose in the playoffs before a champion was crowned.

The '88 season provided more national exposure than the Cougars generally receive. Five games were carried nationally on television, either by cable or network television, and KBYU-TV, KSL-TV, and KUTV supplied live coverage of many road games during the season.

Attendance at home games in the Marriott Center, where the Cougars were 16-2 for the year, also took a significant jump. BYU drew an average of 20,200 fans per game. Overall the Marriott attendance was 363,602, the highest ever for one season (that figure, however, includes two home appearances during the WAC tournament). Counting the 151,037 who watched the Cougars on the road, this boosts BYU's overall attendance to over half a million—514,639, to be exact. Attendance since the opening of the Marriott Center (1971–72) will pass the 4.5-million mark midway through the 1988–89 season.

Final individual and team statistics for the season underscore the Cougars' success. For example, the offensive-defensive spread of 9.3 points per game is the highest since the 1980 team (11.0) and the second best in the past 20 years. BYU not only held a comfortable edge in all shooting categories, but out-boarded opponents by six rebounds per game as well.

1988 HONORS

Michael Smith led the team in scoring and rebounding (21.2 and 7.8 per game), and was also .434 effective from three-point range. Jeff Chatman had the best field goal percentage (.595) for the year. In the three-point column, Nate Call had the best percentage of the season, .532 percent, barely nosing out another sophomore guard, Marty Haws (.500).

Senior Brian Taylor was the most accurate player on the free throw line, dropping in .874 of his attempts. A great passer, Taylor also had the most assists (151), 20 more than Haws. Marty led the team in steals (45), and center Jim Usevitch had the most blocked shots (41).

BYU's front line combination—Usevitch, Smith, and Chatman—scored a combined total of 1,777 points. In the first half of the season when the Cougars were leading the nation in field goal shooting percentage, the threesome was averaging a combined average of nearly 60 points per game. Guards Taylor, Haws, and Call had a combined 378 assists over the 32-game stretch.

Individually, each player seemed to have some outstanding games. Michael Smith had the season's only triple-double when he accounted for 20 points, 12 rebounds, and 10 assists in BYU's first game with Colorado State. Smith also had back-to-back 39-point games against Utah State and La Salle.

Sophomore swingman Andy Toolson worked his way into the record book with 4-for-5 shooting from three-point range against Air Force. Smith's 11-for-11 free throw shooting against Weber State is also a new school record.

There were several times when the Cougars shot .600 or better from the field during a game: UCLA (.621), Weber State (.603), La Salle (.643), Utah (.667) and Colorado State

(.635). Only twice during the year did BYU shooting drop below the '40s, both against UTEP (.397 and .389). Also, the 17-game win streak ties a WAC record for most consecutive wins originally set by New Mexico 10 years ago.

Jeff Chatman, a favorite among Cougar fans for the past four years, has joined a select group of former players in the BYU record book. The Talladega, Alabama, senior finished his playing career at BYU with 1,824 points, fourth best in the school's history.

Chatman was only 18 point shy of overtaking Fred Roberts in third place. Chatman is behind Danny Ainge, Devin Durrant, and Roberts. As for his career shooting field goal percentage, Jeff is second only to Alan Taylor (1977–80) who had a 57% career mark, compared to Chatman's 55%.

Brian Taylor, another senior, finished four seasons with the Cougars tied for first place in career free throw shooting (83%). Taylor's shooting this season puts him among the top five or six free throw shooters in BYU history.

Team records set by the '88 team include: (all season marks) most consecutive wins—17 (old record was 13); best field goal percentage—.531 (old record was .528 in 1979); best free throw percentage—.763 (old record was .755 set in 1974); best three-point percentage—.452 (old mark was .399 set in 1987).

In the season opener, Montana State's Tom Domako set two new Marriot Center records with 8-for-16 shooting of three-pointers. Andy Toolson added his name to the record book with 4-for-5 three pointers against Air Force.

As a team, the Cougars set a new scoring record when they rolled up 121 points against Utah State back in December. The combined score of that game (233 points) was also a Marriott Center record.

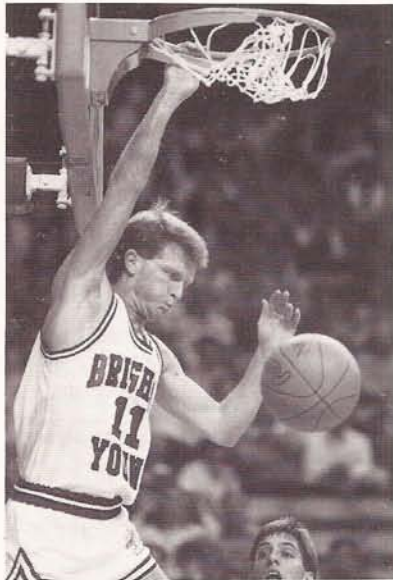

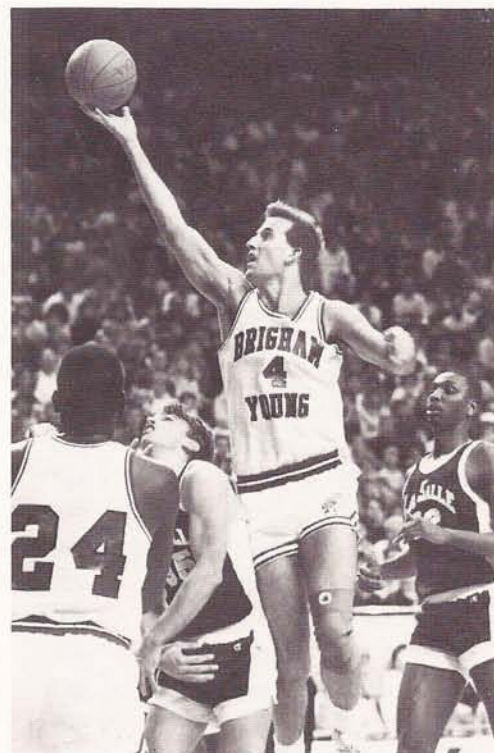

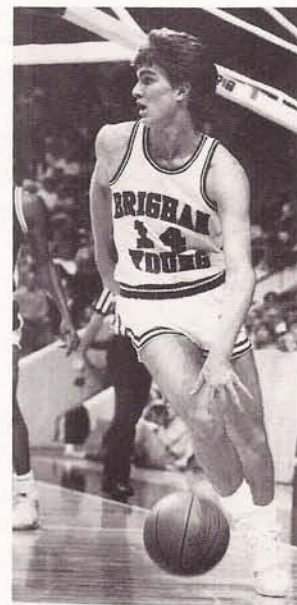

KSL Radio

For more than a quarter of a century, BYU fans in the Intermountain West and other parts of the country have been following Cougar athletics via 50,000-watt KSL Radio (1160 on the AM dial), located in Salt Lake City.

"The Voice" of the Cougars has been play-by-play man Paul James, a veteran broadcaster with 36 years' experience behind him. A University of Utah graduate, James entered broadcasting in 1950.

For six years, he broadcast Utah basketball and football games before joining the staff at KSL Radio and Television in July of 1965. James has been at the microphone calling BYU games for the past 24 years.

Live broadcasts of basketball games can be heard on stations in Idaho, Utah, Nevada, and Arizona.

KBYU-TV

The tradition continues . . . KBYU and Cougar basketball. Again this year, KBYU Television will provide delayed broadcasts of all home and selected road games.

With Jay Monsen doing the play-by-play, the Channel 11 broadcasts offer the insightful analysis that viewers have come to expect.

In addition, KBYU will serve as producer for all live telecasts of BYU basketball.

An experienced sports crew and state-of-the-art equipment have enabled KBYU to develop a reputation for outstanding coverage of football, basketball, and other major "remote" events in the Western U.S.

At Cougar games, KBYU regularly provides feed for visiting television stations and networks, special satellite broadcasts, and Bonneville International Corporation's sports broadcasts in South America.

The KBYU remote production system includes five Ikegami HL 79E cameras; a 2 ME, 16 input Grass Valley 1680 switcher; dual channel Chyron 4100 graphics system; shotgun sideline microphones; and other equipment all operated from KBYU's 48-foot-long aluminum body remote production trailer. Using this system, KBYU is accustomed to providing tailor-made television for as many as six different clients at one time.

COUGAR BASKETBALL HISTORY

The roots of BYU's basketball program extend back to near the turn of the century, although it wasn't until 1917 that the Cougars joined the Rocky Mountain Faculty Athletic Conference and started keeping track of wins and losses.

A look back at the humble beginning of BYU basketball reveals a completely different set of events than exist today. For instance, in those days, the Cougars played their home games in the gym on the third floor of the Training School building on lower campus.

Seating capacity in that gym was about 700. For the "big" games, fans would perch themselves in windows, on ladders and on top of lockers along the wall.

E.L. Roberts was coach of the Cougars from 1918-20 and compiled a 14-7 record. He was followed by Alvin Twitchell, who coached from 1921-25 and had a 44-20 record.

Roberts again took the reins of the Cougar program for the 1926-27 season and helped champion the change that eventually eliminated the center jump after every basket. He also is credited with originating the zone defense in basketball a decade earlier.

In 1928, BYU moved its home games to the Women's Gym on University Avenue, where the seating capacity was nearly double that of the other facility. Provo's local radio station (KOVO) carried one of the first-ever broadcasts of a basketball game. Two-handed push shots were in vogue. And BYU landed its first All-American, Elwood Romney.

Some of the coaches who handled the Cougar program during the "Women's Gym" era were G. Ott Romney (1928-35), Edwin R. Kimball (1936, 1939-41), Fred "Buck" Dixon and Floyd Millet (1942-49).

An unforgettable chapter in the chronicle of BYU basketball was written between 1946 and 1950, when the Cougars played their home games on the floor of the Springville High School gymnasium. Seating capacity in that gym was listed at 1,200, although officials discovered it could actually hold 1,700 with some scrunching together of bodies.

Despite the handicaps, the Springville Gym was the site for some outstanding basketball. Some of the players who displayed their skills in the old gym were Joe Nelson, Mel Hutchins, Roland Minson, Utah's

Arnie Ferrin and Vern Gardner, Denver's Vince Boryla, and Utah State's Ladell Andersen, just to mention a few.

Forced out of the Springville Gym in 1950, the Cougars had to go searching for a temporary home while the George Albert Smith Fieldhouse was under construction. The University of Utah graciously offered its home floor—the 6,000-seat Einer Nielsen Fieldhouse.

Pre-season games were played in the Springville Gym that year, but once Skyline Conference action began, all games were played 45 miles away in Salt Lake City.

As transients, the Cougars didn't suffer much. They split with the Utes, 2-2, and captured the conference championship. They also went on to win the National Invitational Tournament in Madison Square Garden.

That was only the second year for Coach Stan Watts, a man who molded BYU's program into one of the nation's finest. Coach Watts was inducted into the Basketball Hall of Fame in Springfield, Mass., in 1986.

At long last, BYU's team moved into the 10,200-seat Smith Fieldhouse in December of 1951. Coach Watts coached every one of the 246 games played in the Fieldhouse over the next 20 years. Large crowds enjoyed some of the finest basketball teams in the country during that era, including another NIT championship team from BYU in 1966.

The demand for more seats prompted school officials to begin planning construction of the 23,000-seat Marriott Center which, at the time, was the largest on-campus basketball arena in the nation. It opened officially in December 1971 with a sellout crowd. Average attendance at home games that year was more than 21,000.

Some of the BYU players to receive All-America honors in recent years include Dick Nemeika, Kresimir Cosic, Danny Ainge, Devin Durrant and Michael Smith. Ainge also won the Eastman and Wooden Awards, given to the outstanding collegiate basketball player in the country. And Smith was the first Academic Player of the Year chosen by GTE and the College Sports Information Directors of America.

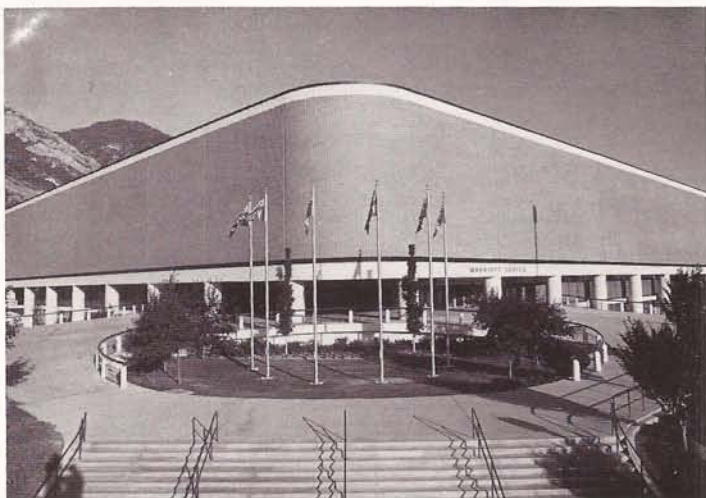

With a seating capacity of 22,700, the Marriott Center is one of the nation's largest on-campus basketball arenas. Only the 28,000-seat Carrier Dome, used by Syracuse for football and basketball, is larger.

Kentucky's Rupp Arena is also a 23,000-seat facility, but is owned by the city of Lexington. Two new arenas—at Tennessee and North Carolina—also are in the 23,000-seat range.

In the past BYU has been one of the best drawing teams in America. Since the Marriott Center opened in 1971, the crowds have averaged 18,494 per game. More than four million fans have watched BYU basketball games in the Marriott Center. The BYU single-season record for average attendance is 22,505, set during the 1980-81 season.

Last season, BYU ranked fifth nationally with an average of 20,200 per game. Only Syracuse, Kentucky, Tennessee and North Carolina drew more fans than the Cougars.

A five-year-old addition to the Marriott Center is the four-sided scoreboard/message center. The board has capabilities of scorekeeping, timing, etc., in addition to an animated message board that will relay messages to the crowd. The Marriott Center also has acquired a lighting system capable of providing 250 foot candles of illumination.

Named after the nationally known businessman who was the major contributor, the J. Willard Marriott Center houses crowds for basketball, commencement exercises, concerts, pageants, devotionals and many other activities.

In 1972, 1977, 1979 and 1982, the Marriott Center served as the host for the NCAA Far West Regional playoffs.

Physically, the building covers three acres. The outside dimensions are 280 X 340, or the equivalent of two football fields placed side by side. The roof covers 130,000 square feet and encloses 8 million cubic feet. From the playing floor to the top of the roof, the height is nearly 10 stories.

There are roughly 10,100 chair seats in the building with the balance being bleacher seats. About 40 percent of the seats are below the concourse.

Besides the usual locker rooms, training facilities, etc., the Marriott Center serves as ticket headquarters for most major campus events. It also provides offices for the basketball coaching staff.
