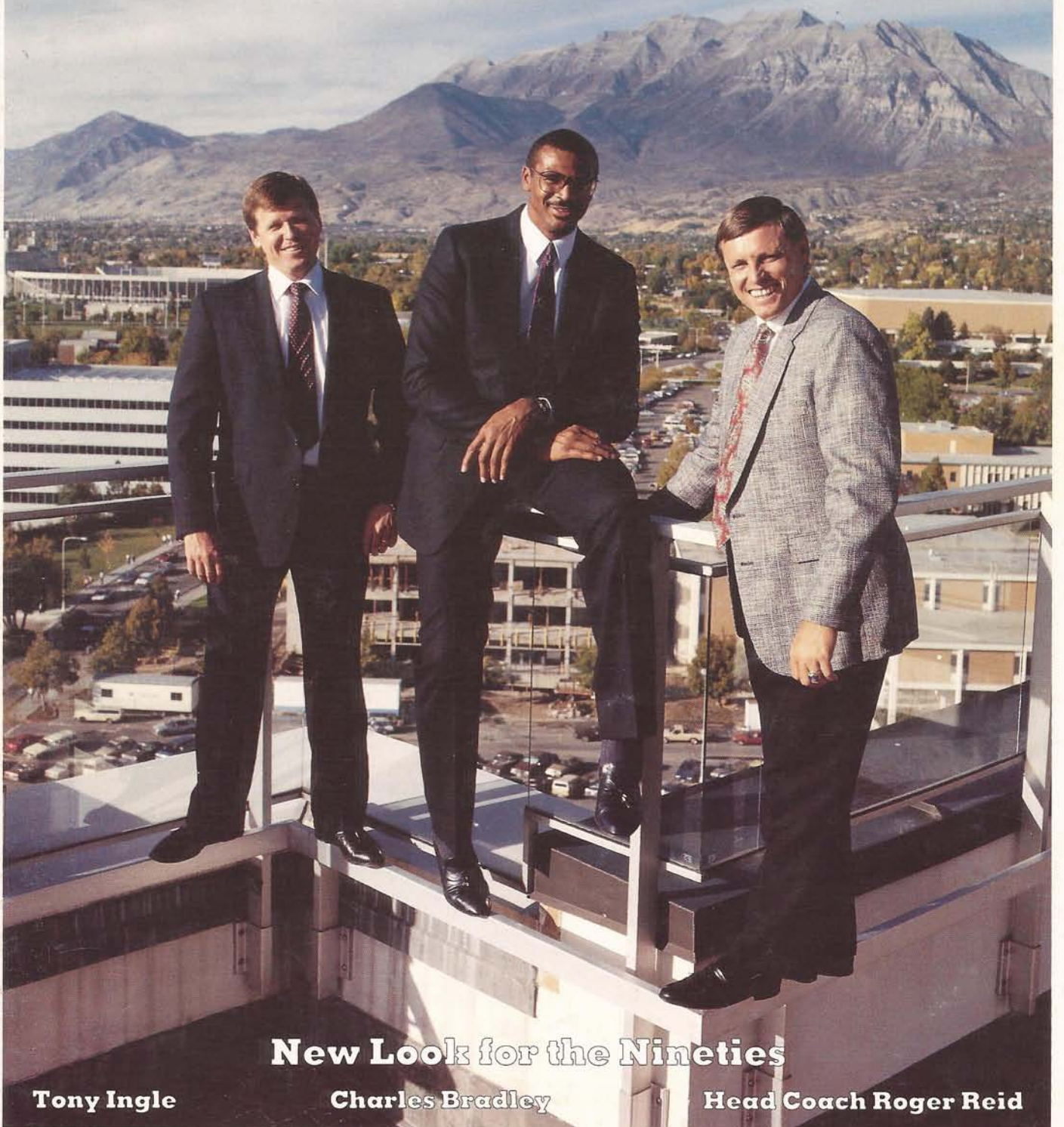

Season Outlook

BYU begins the 1989-90 basketball season with an enthusiastic new coaching staff and four starters returning. An ideal situation? Not quite.

This season's Cougars don't have much height and very little experience on the bench. And the one missing starter, 6-10 All-America offensive machine Michael Smith, averaged 26.4 points and 8.6 rebounds.

He was the first round pick (13th overall) of the Boston Celtics and won the three-point contest at the Final Four shootout. Besides being a top-notch passer, Smith's absence is compounded by the loss of three front-line reserves.

John Fish, a talented 6-9 freshman a year ago, left on an LDS mission; steady 6-7 reserve Alan Astle graduated; and 6-9 David Wolfe left school.

On the plus side, speedy guard Marty Haws could be one of the best in the conference. The 6-2 senior averaged 14 points and 5.1 assists last year.

Though Haws is often mentioned as a pro football prospect, Coach Reid thinks he will get consideration as an NBA possibility.

The other honors' candidate is 6-6 senior Andy Toolson, last year's second-leading scorer with a 15.3 average and 6.6 rebounds. Toolson will play forward and guard and the Cougars will look to him for leadership and consistency.

Steve Schreiner, a 6-7 junior, averaged 11.2 points and 4.9 rebounds last year, and could improve on that this year with the Cougars looking for more balanced scoring.

The other starter back is Kevin Santiago, a 6-2 senior, who walked on a year ago. He averaged 4.8 points and his confidence improved noticeably over the course of the season.

BYU's only other lettermen saw very limited action. Mark Heslop, a 6-5 sophomore, scored 32 points in 19 games while averaging 5.2 minutes. And 6-9 senior Steve Andrus had four points in averaging 2.3 minutes in 11 games.

Both have a chance to play a lot more this season. Heslop will battle 6-2 redshirt freshman Alan Frampton and 6-5 returned missionary freshman Todd Gentry for backup duty on the guard line.

Three other possibilities are 6-3 senior Paul Briggs, who played a lot with the junior varsity last year, 6-1 JC transfer Scott Moon and 6-2 super shooter Randy Reid.

Moon, who is a walk-on from Utah Valley Community College, probably won't make the impact Santiago (also from UVCC) did a year ago but he could help in the backcourt. He turned down offers from several four-year schools to test his talents at BYU.

Reid, the coach's oldest son, averaged 30 points in high school last year and was a crowd-pleaser type with both three-point ability and passing wizardry.

However, he practiced with the BYU baseball team during the fall which might put him behind in the guard scramble.

The other starter on the front line might well be 6-8 junior Todd Crow from Dixie College. Crow had a great career at Dixie, finishing as the Rebels' number two all-time scorer (he averaged 20.5 last year with eight rebounds per game).

Crow could play a lot as the Cougars battle taller opponents for rebounds. Besides Andrus, help on the front line will depend on the development of three freshmen—6-9 Kirk Davidson, 6-8 John Lloyd and 6-7 Mark Durrant.

Durrant, whose brother, Devin, was an All-WAC performer before going on to European success, averaged 25 points last year while Lloyd had 18 and Davidson 15.

The other roster player can't be counted out, either. He is 6-9 David Astle, who is trying to get back in shape from two years as a church missionary.

Coach Reid says the battle for positions is "wide open" and undoubtedly some of the younger players will figure in the player rotation before too long. Of the 14 scholarship players, seven are freshmen.

"For the first time since I've been here (his 12th year), we have no All-America candidate and no All-WAC player back so we'll have to play well together," says Reid.

"If we are team-oriented, have good chemistry and adjust to the change in coaching style, we could surprise some people. I'm always optimistic.

"I know one thing. No one will out-hustle us."

Schedule-wise, the Cougars have seven of their first 10 games at home (plus exhibitions with Holland and Athletes in Action). As for the WAC race, Reid sees BYU in more of a spoiler role than that of a challenger for league honors.

"New Mexico and UTEP are legitimate top twenty teams and Wyoming returns almost everyone plus some redshirts. Hawaii should be good and Colorado State will be competitive with its style of play. The Rams won't beat themselves.

"Utah has a great nucleus in Josh Grant and Air Force will be as good or better with Raymond Dudley. San Diego State has a lot of talent, which is hard to evaluate because there are so many junior college players.

"BYU probably doesn't have the depth to be a contender but we're looking forward to being part of another great WAC race."

Coach's Comments

You spent five years working under Frank Arnold and six with Ladell Andersen. What are your thoughts about being the head coach?

First, it's something I've always dreamed about. A year ago I could have gone to UCLA as an assistant but BYU is where I wanted to be. Inside I've felt someday I would be a head coach. I'm thrilled it will be in Provo.

I learned a great deal from Coach Arnold and Coach Andersen. There are a lot of facets of a major college program besides the strategy during the game. I hope I can incorporate some of their strengths in our program.

Also, I think to be successful you have to be a student of the game. In that regard, there are things you can learn from coaches nationally and even from other sports. I've learned from LaVell Edwards on how to deal with people and with the media, for example.

You had a reputation of being very intense as an athlete and then as a high school coach. Will that carry over to your college coaching?

I hope so. I expect a lot from our players. I'm not going to shortchange them. I'll stand up for our players during a game.

I believe in pushing players to their maximum. How does a player know how good he can become unless he is taken to his limits? Our players are like my family. I love them and want the best for them.

Beyond that, I can only say, as I'll say many times, no one will out-hustle us.

What qualities did you look for in assistant coaches?

I wanted people who were hard-working and enthusiastic with experience in recruiting. I needed guys who didn't need training and we got some excellent people.

Tony Ingle was the head coach at Alabama-Huntsville and really has a way with kids—with everyone for that matter. He makes friends instantly. He's been high school coach of the year in Georgia and junior college coach of the year. He's an excellent coach and recruiter.

Charles Bradley had worked with me at camps during the summer. He played against us at Wyoming and coached against us at San Diego State and Wyoming but was always a class guy.

Being our first black coach was never an issue with him. It's like he has always been part of BYU. He's as excited about making the Cougars winners as anyone I've seen.

Their efforts have paid off already. In a few months, we've been in the homes of some real quality players. I feel good about the response we're getting.

You've been an assistant coach for 11 years and you've had a son go through a major recruiting blitz. Has that affected your attitude about recruiting?

Obviously, recruiting is the lifeblood of the program. We need to continually evaluate our methods and their effectiveness. Yes, I have learned many things over those years and with Randy's experience.

Most of all, I've learned there's a lot of competition for the top players. And it demands a year-around effort from the entire coaching staff. It's not fair to designate one person as the "recruiter." We're all going to be involved in recruiting and, when the rules allow, we'll all be making visits to prospects.

We're excited about the groundwork which has been accomplished so far and we're looking forward to upgrading our talent and being competitive year in and year out.

Will BYU's recruiting change under Roger Reid?

Yes and no. We'll continue to concentrate on the top LDS players and then the best Utah kids. In those two groups we have a loyal following and youth knowledgeable about our standards and our expectations of them on and off the court.

Then we go wherever we need to for good players. California has been a prime area for all our sports because of the relative proximity and because we have so many students from all parts of the state.

It's logical to think we will look at the South more because of Coach Ingle's connections and at the Washington, D.C. area because of Coach Bradley's connections.

As I said, we need to upgrade our program with the right kind of people and without compromising our integrity.

What is your philosophy for offense and defense?

In a sentence, it is to have an up-tempo offense and to change defenses. We use lots of statistics and analysis to complicate the fact we want our best shooters to have a good shot every time down the floor.

At the same time, we want to force the opponent's players to take poor percentage shots. Having the same players involved in both aspects in a real challenge. They have to change from finesse to be able to score to aggressive to be able to play defense. It's a contradiction which has to take place in a split second hundreds of times in a game.

We would like to push the ball up the floor every chance we get but to fast break you need rebounds. Eventually, we'd like to be able to full court press and use half-court traps.

To summarize, we'll use multiple offenses and try to keep opponents off balance by changing up our defenses as well.

Some people say the missionary program is a big benefit for BYU. How would you evaluate it?

The missionary program definitely is a big benefit for the Church and for the individual. There's a great deal of mental discipline and maturing which takes place.

Basketball-wise, missions take a physical toll because most missionaries aren't involved in a regular conditioning program and have only limited time available to play any ball.

It's also a challenge planning-wise for the coaches because an athlete has a freshman year or redshirt year adjusting to major college ball, two years on a mission and, in most cases, a year to get back in shape and regain his playing skills.

So it's three or four years from when you recruit a player until he's contributing to the program. It's just one of those aspects which makes BYU such a great place that we have to work around.

As much as I'd love to have Nathan Call, Gary Trost and John Fish here as potential starters, I'm happy for them and for the missionary experience.

What is your philosophy about the term "student-athlete" and the challenge to have players graduate?

That's a good question. Above everything else, including winning, we are serious about education. And we aren't just giving lip service to it. We probably met more on academics during the summer than anything else. We're telling that to the players and their parents right up front.

We want a player at BYU to become a better person—to be more qualified to meet life. Some of that we can accomplish through athletics and the rest has to come through the classroom. We want our players to get a degree.

You talk a lot about the intangibles it takes to be winners. Can you elaborate?

The only way we're going to be truly successful is to be a happy family. We need to be team oriented and band together. How the players feel about their teammates, about the school and the program—all those things will determine how good we'll be.

Our coaching staff has that togetherness and, in time, I think our team will too.

We have a great Athletic Director in Glen Tuckett and Associate AD in Pete Witbeck. We have a great support system in the Sports Information Department. We have all the ingredients to be successful.

Roger Reid, Head Coach

Roger Reid has always been an advocate of "paying dues," and last March he received a dividend by becoming the 11th head coach in the 71-year history of BYU.

Reid, a 1968 graduate of Weber State, had his hard work pay off since coming to the BYU basketball program 11 years ago. He brought with him a wealth of experience both as an athlete and as a coach.

When he arrived in 1978, the Cougars were coming off five losing seasons. His first year as an assistant BYU won the WAC championship. In his 11 seasons, BYU has averaged 20 wins a year and won four WAC titles.

The 42-year-old Reid also has been coordinating BYU's recruiting efforts since he joined the staff. He worked under Frank Arnold as a graduate assistant for a few months and then was five seasons as an assistant coach.

In the six years with Ladell Andersen, Roger was responsible for BYU's defensive schemes as the assistant head coach.

He has served as chairman (1980-81) of the recruiting committee for the National Association of Basketball Coaches. In 1981, he helped give basketball clinics throughout Australia for three weeks.

In 1986, Roger was on the NABC committee to plan the national convention for the Final Four. This year he serves on the Awards Committee.

Born Aug. 3, 1947, Reid was a star athlete at Springville (Utah) High School, where he was studentbody vice-president and an all-state athlete. He was named MVP in the annual North-South all-star baseball game his senior year.

Reid enrolled at BYU and was a member of the freshman basketball team and the Cougar baseball squad which made a trip to Mexico City.

In order to pursue basketball, he transferred to Carbon College (now the College of Eastern Utah), where he was a standout in both baseball and basketball. He was the team's MVP in baseball and was named to the junior college All-America team in that sport.

Reid moved to Weber State College and was a member of the Big Sky Conference championship basketball team coached by Dick Motta. Reid also received all-conference honors in baseball for two seasons.

From Weber State, he was drafted into professional baseball and spent four years as a shortstop with the Chicago White Sox and Atlanta Braves organizations, advancing as far as AAA ball.

Reid began his coaching career in 1971 as a basketball and baseball coach at Payson (Utah) High School. His overall basketball record at Payson was 50-26. And the baseball team had a 35-11 mark under his direction.

In 1974, he joined the coaching staff at Clearfield High School, also in Utah. He took the basketball team to the state tournament for the first time in five years. Clearfield's overall record was 60 wins and 24 losses during that period.

Throughout his prep coaching career, Reid's teams were known as tough defensive squads, despite the fact that the tallest player was only 6-4.

Reid married Diane Gardner in 1966 and they have three sons and a daughter: Randy, 19; Robbie, 15; Darren, 10; and Kelli Ann, 8.

He has served as first counselor in a bishopric and also has served on a high council in the LDS Church.

Best time to call Coach Reid: 8-9 a.m.

Tony Ingle, Assistant Coach

Tony L. Ingle comes to the Cougars from Alabama-Huntsville and says there is only one reason he would give up a head coaching job to be an assistant coach—Roger Reid.

"There is nobody else I could be an assistant coach for on the collegiate level. Roger and I have the same values. I understand where he comes from and he understands where I am coming from. I really put a lot of faith in Roger Reid and where the BYU program is headed."

Their friendship started in Atlanta at the NCAA Regional in 1981, when Danny Ainge not only made the winning basket against Notre Dame but when Roger and Tony met.

Ingle was born June 11, 1952, in Dalton, Georgia. He graduated from North Whitfield High School there.

At Dalton Junior College he was student body vice president, team captain and won the best hustle and free throw shooting awards.

The 1971–72 team won 34 straight games and was ranked as high as second in the NJCAA polls. The 1972–73 team was ranked as high as fifth. In those two years his teams had a 61-10 record.

Transferring to Huntingdon College in Montgomery, Ala., Ingle was a captain for two years. He received a degree in physical education (1976) with a minor in biology and in 1980 got a master's degree (P.E.) from North Georgia College.

He returned to his old high school in Dalton in 1976 as an assistant. By then it had been renamed Northwest Whitfield. He went to Southeast Whitfield for a year as head coach before moving to Cherokee High (Canton, Ga.), where he was 107-47 in seven seasons from 1978–85. He was the Atlanta Journal and Constitution AAAA Coach of the Year in 1982.

In three years (1985–88) as head coach at Gordon Junior College (Barnesville, Ga.), he was 60-33, scoring more than 100 points 23 times and making the state playoffs each year.

After going 18-11, 21-10 and 21-12 and being named the Atlanta Tipoff Club Junior College Coach of the Year in 1988, he was selected as the head coach at Alabama-Huntsville.

His 10-18 first-year record was the school's most wins in five years and eight of the losses were to nationally ranked Division II schools or Division I teams.

Ingle has directed 20 basketball camps in recent years and has worked at the BYU camp several times.

Tony and his wife, Jeanne, were married in 1974. They have five children: Elliott (14), Sunshine (11), Golden (8), Tony, Jr. (7), and Israel (5). The Ingles live in Spanish Fork.

Charles Bradley, Assistant Coach

Charles Bradley might be new to the coaching staff but he's no stranger to BYU.

The former first-round draft pick of the Boston Celtics played four years at Wyoming (1977-81), coached a year for the Cowboys (1986-87) and coached two years at San Diego State (1987-89).

Add several years helping at the BYU's summer basketball camps and Bradley feels right at home in the Marriott Center.

"We got one of the finest basketball coaches in the area in Charles Bradley," says Coach Roger Reid. "He'll be a great addition to our program and he understands what it takes. Charles will be a great asset to Cougar basketball."

Charles W. Bradley was born May 16, 1959 in Havre de Grace, Maryland, and graduated from Edgewood (Maryland) High in 1977.

By his senior year at Wyoming in 1981 he was 6-5, 215 pounds and earned All-America and Academic All-America honors. He was MVP at the Pizza Hut All-Star Game after earning All-WAC honors three times.

A four-year starter who averaged 17 points and shot 53 percent from the field, Bradley earned a B.A. degree in elementary education in 1981 and received a teacher's certificate but went on to professional basketball instead.

He spent two years with the Boston Celtics and one with the Seattle SuperSonics. He also spent some time with the Wyoming Wildcatters (Casper) of the Continental Basketball Association.

Charles and his wife, Suzanne, settled in Denver after their marriage in 1984 and he coached the freshman team at Mullen High School for a year and was involved in sales and marketing for Pizza Hut.

In 1986, Jim Brandenburg hired him as an assistant at Wyoming and the Cowboys won the WAC Tournament with a 24-10 record. They defeated Virginia and UCLA before bowing to top-ranked Nevada-Las Vegas in regional action.

Bradley went to San Diego State with Brandenburg in 1987 and his recruits helped turn a 5-25 team to one which went 12-17 and upset the nationally-ranked Cougars.

When Coach Reid was appointed in April, he contacted Bradley about becoming the first assistant ever to coach at three WAC schools.

"I've always been impressed by the BYU players, fans and people in the community," says Bradley. "The University has a great basketball tradition and I look forward to working with Coach Reid and Coach (Tony) Ingle."

Charles' older brother, Dudley, starred at North Carolina and currently plays for the Atlanta Hawks.

The Bradleys have two daughters: Taryn, 4, and Alexa, 1. They live in Orem.

Hansen served an LDS Church Mission in Tokyo and then finished his studies at BYU. He graduated in 1984 with a degree in physical education and a minor in history.

After teaching seminary for a year at Pocatello High School, he returned to Provo in 1985 to serve as a part-time coach under Ladell Andersen.

He completed his master's degree in 1988 in athletic administration and decided to remain with the basketball program. He has been involved in putting the summer camp program together.

Hansen and his wife, Laurie have been married six years.

Ron Barker, 26, is the graduate assistant in the program this year, replacing Tom Kelly, who was hired as the head coach at Western Oregon State College.

Barker was born in Long Beach, Calif., and was an all-around athlete at Kennedy High in La Palma, Calif.

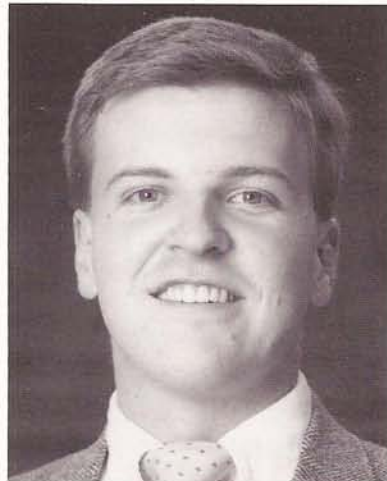

1988-1989 Season Summary

For retiring Coach Ladell Andersen's final season, the 1988-1989 BYU Cougars had a first-round draft choice in Michael Smith, led the nation in free throw shooting with a .815 percentage and were one of six teams to average more than 18,000 fans.

Injuries proved costly in the 14-15 campaign in which BYU placed fifth—the exact position the Cougars had been picked for by coaches and sportswriters.

Marty Haws had foot problems early in the season, and then Andy Toolson broke his left hand. Toolson missed three games (two of them losses) and had to wear a protective device when he returned to the lineup. Toward the end of the season, the Cougars lost the services of John Fish, the 6-9 freshman who had been playing well.

Only one other school in history (Harvard's .822 in 1982) had a better free throw shooting year than BYU. Michael Smith finished with the best season (.925) and career (.878) free throw shooting marks.

He also moved into the number-one spot in career rebounding with 922 and in three-point shots made (116), attempted (270) and in percentage (.430).

Smith finished second only to Danny Ainge in career field goals made (886), field goals attempted (1,749) and points (2,319). He was All-WAC three years and a GTE Academic All-America first teamer for three years.

Exposure-wise, BYU may have reached an all-time high. CBS, ESPN and USA Cable all carried games nationally. BYU was featured three times on the regional WAC Game of the Week telecasts. Twelve games were carried live by Salt Lake City stations and four others by KBYU-TV. Also, three other games were put up on the LDS Church satellite system.

The nemesis for the Cougars was Hawaii, the only team to beat the Cougars more than once during the season. The Rainbows won three games by a total of nine points—two in the WAC season and one in the post-season tournament in Salt Lake City.

Four of BYU's losses came to teams in the NCAA Tournament—UCLA, St. Mary's, UTEP and Colorado State and five were to NIT teams (Hawaii, St. John's and New Mexico).

BYU beat three NIT teams (Wichita State, California and New Mexico) and one other (Penn State) played in the Cougar Classic.

The Cougars won three straight games twice—mid January and mid February while losing four in a row in early February.

In a strange twist, the Cougars beat WAC champ Colorado State by 15 on the road but lost by 17 in the Marriott Center.

In spite of a losing season, BYU drew an average of 18,149 fans. The only five which averaged more were Syracuse (28,313), Kentucky (21,895), Louisville (19,392), Tennessee (19,313) and North Carolina (18,457).

Cougar Basketball History

The roots of BYU's basketball program extend back to near the turn of the century, although it wasn't until 1917 that the Cougars joined the Rocky Mountain Faculty Athletic Conference and started keeping track of wins and losses.

A look back at the humble beginning of BYU basketball reveals a completely different set of events than exist today. For instance, in those days, the Cougars played their home games in the gym on the third floor of the Training School building on lower campus.

Seating capacity in that gym was about 700. For the "big" games, fans would perch themselves in windows, on ladders and on top of lockers along the wall.

E.L. Roberts was coach of the Cougars from 1918–20 and compiled a 14-7 record. He was followed by Alvin Twitchell, who coached from 1921–25 and had a 44-20 record.

Roberts again took the reins of the Cougar program for the 1926–27 season and helped champion the change that eventually eliminated the center jump after every basket. He also is credited with originating the zone defense in basketball a decade earlier.

In 1928, BYU moved its home games to the Women's Gym on University Avenue, where the seating capacity was nearly double that of the other facility. Provo's local radio station (KOVO) carried one of the first-ever broadcasts of a basketball game. Two-handed push shots were in vogue. And BYU landed its first All-American, Elwood Romney.

Some of the coaches who handled the Cougar program during the "Women's Gym" era were G. Ott Romney (1928–35), Edwin R. Kimball (1936, 1939–41), Fred "Buck" Dixon and Floyd Millet (1942–49).

An unforgettable chapter in the chronicle of BYU basketball was written between 1946 and 1950, when the Cougars played their home games on the floor of the Springville High School gymnasium. Seating capacity in that gym was listed at 1,200, although officials discovered it could actually hold 1,700 with some scrunching together of bodies.

Despite the handicaps, the Springville Gym was the site for some outstanding basketball. Some of the players who displayed their skills in the old gym were Joe Nelson, Mel Hutchins, Roland Minson, Utah's Arnie Ferrin and Vern Gardner, Denver's Vince Boryla, and Utah State's Ladell Andersen, just to mention a few.

Forced out of the Springville Gym in 1950, the Cougars had to go searching for a temporary home while the George Albert Smith Fieldhouse was under construction. The University of Utah graciously of-

fered its home floor—the 6,000-seat Einer Nielsen Fieldhouse.

Pre-season games were played in the Springville Gym that year, but once Skyline Conference action began, all games were played 45 miles away in Salt Lake City.

As transients, the Cougars didn't suffer much. They split with the Utes, 2-2, and captured the conference championship. They also went on to win the National Invitational Tournament in Madison Square Garden.

That was only the second year for Coach Stan Watts, a man who molded BYU's program into one of the nation's finest. Coach Watts was inducted into the Basketball Hall of Fame in Springfield, Mass., in 1986.

At long last, BYU's team moved into the 10,200-seat Smith Fieldhouse in December of 1951. Coach Watts coached every one of the 246 games played in the Fieldhouse over the next 20 years. Large crowds enjoyed some of the finest basketball teams in the country during that era, including another NIT championship team from BYU in 1966.

The demand for more seats prompted school officials to begin planning construction of the 23,000-seat Marriott Center which, at the time, was the largest on-campus basketball arena in the nation. It opened officially in December 1971 with a sellout crowd. Average attendance at home games that year was more than 21,000.

Some of the BYU players to receive All-America honors in recent years include Dick Nemelka, Kresimir Cosic, Danny Ainge, Devin Durrant and Michael Smith. Ainge also won the Eastman and Wooden Awards, given to the outstanding collegiate basketball player in the country. And Smith was the first Academic Player of the Year chosen by GTE and the College Sports Information Directors of America.

With a seating capacity of 22,700, the Marriott Center is one of the nation's largest on-campus basketball arenas. Only the 28,000-seat Carrier Dome, used by Syracuse for football and basketball, is larger.

Kentucky's Rupp Arena is also a 23,000-seat facility, but is owned by the city of Lexington. Two new arenas—at Tennessee and North Carolina—also are in the 23,000-seat range.

In the past BYU has been one of the best drawing teams in America. Since the Marriott Center opened in 1971, the crowds have averaged 18,473 per game. More than four million fans have watched BYU basketball games in the Marriott Center. The BYU single-season record for average attendance is 22,505, set during the 1980-81 season.

Last season, BYU ranked sixth nationally with an average of 18,149 per game. Only Syracuse, Kentucky, Louisville, Tennessee and North Carolina drew more fans than the Cougars.

A six-year-old addition to the Marriott Center is the four-sided scoreboard/message center. The board has capabilities of scorekeeping, timing, etc., in addition to an animated message board that will relay messages to the crowd. The Marriott Center also has acquired a lighting system capable of providing 250 foot candles of illumination.

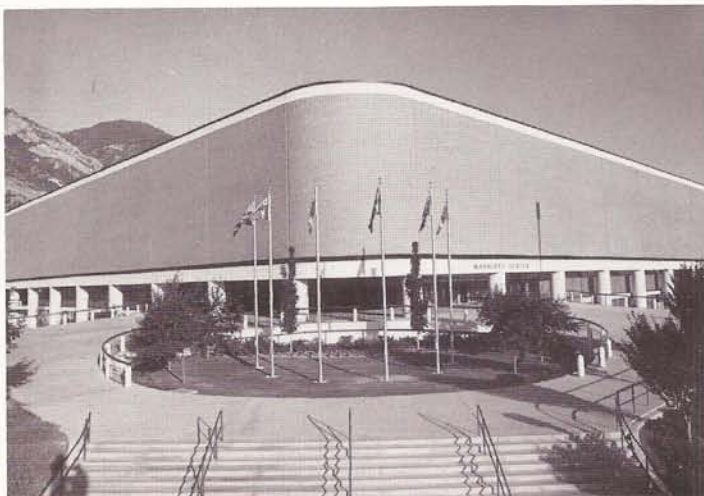
Named after the nationally known businessman who was the major contributor, the J. Willard Marriott Center houses crowds for basketball, commencement exercises, concerts, pageants, devotionals and many other activities.

In 1972, 1977, 1979 and 1982, the Marriott Center served as the host for the NCAA Far West Regional playoffs.

Physically, the building covers three acres. The outside dimensions are 280 X 340, or the equivalent of two football fields placed side by side. The roof covers 130,000 square feet and encloses 8 million cubic feet. From the playing floor to the top of the roof, the height is nearly 10 stories.

There are roughly 10,100 chair seats in the building with the balance being bleacher seats. About 40 percent of the seats are below the concourse.

Besides the usual locker rooms, training facilities, etc., the Marriott Center serves as ticket headquarters for most major campus events. It also provides offices for the basketball coaching staff.



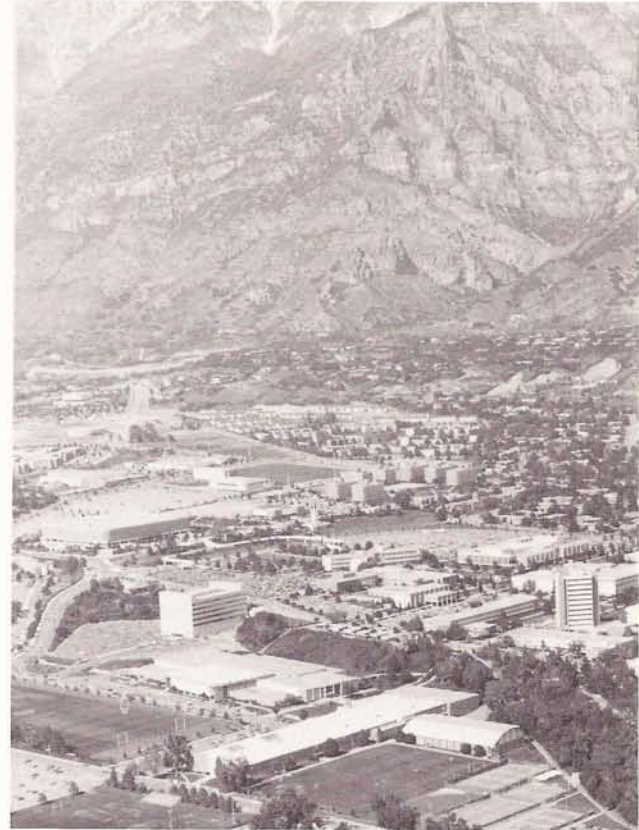

President Rex E. Lee



Rex E. Lee, former U.S. Solicitor General, became the 10th president of Brigham Young University on July 1, 1989.

Lee succeeded Elder Jeffrey R. Holland, who served the past nine years and who was called by the Church in April to serve in the First Quorum of the Seventy.

Lee, 54, was the founding dean of the J. Reuben Clark Law School at BYU, serving from 1972 to 1981, and since

1985 has been the law school's George Sutherland Professor of Law.

His service as U.S. Solicitor General was from 1981 to 1985. He had earlier served as Assistant U.S. Attorney General in charge of the Justice Department's Civil Division from 1975 to 1976.

Lee is a 1960 graduate of Brigham Young University and earned a juris doctorate from the University of Chicago in 1963. He served as law clerk to Justice Byron R. White of the U.S. Supreme Court, 1963–1964, and then practiced law with

the firm of Jennings, Strouss and Salmon in Phoenix from 1964–1972.

It was during his tenure as founding dean of the law school at BYU that Lee took a leave of absence to serve as Assistant U.S. Attorney General.

Since 1985, he has been a partner in the law firm of Sidley and Austin, working out of the Washington, D.C. office.

Earlier in his career, he served as a lecturer for the American Institute of Foreign Trade, 1966–1968, and from 1968 to 1972 he was on the faculty of the University of Arizona School of Law.

He has been admitted to the Bar in Utah, Arizona and Washington, D.C., and is a member of the American Law Institute. In late April, he argued his 50th case before the U.S. Supreme Court and is one of only a handful of living lawyers to have reached that milestone.

The new university president has served his Church as a missionary in Mexico, where he was second counselor to the mission president; as a member of the Young Men General Board, 1958–60; as a bishop, stake president, stake high counselor, Sunday School teacher, and in other administrative and teaching positions.

As a young boy growing up in St. Johns, Arizona, he earned the distinction of being the first boy in that community to become an Eagle Scout.

Rex Edwin Lee was born in Los Angeles, California, Feb. 27, 1935, a son of Rex E. and Mabel Whiting Lee. His father died before Lee was born, and his mother married Wilford J. Shumway two years later. Shumway is the father that Lee has known all his life. Lee married Janet Griffin July 7, 1959, in the Mesa, Arizona, LDS Temple. They have seven children and two grandchildren.

Dean, Athletic Director

Dr. Clayne R. Jensen, Dean and Faculty Representative



Dr. Clayne Jensen is in his 16th year as Dean of the College of Physical Education, which encompasses BYU athletics. A respected and experienced administrator, Dr. Jensen served in the capacity of Professor and Assistant Dean for seven years before becoming Dean. He has served as BYU Faculty Athletic Representative since 1976 and was chairman of BYU's Athletics Advisory Board for eight years.

Dr. Jensen grew up in Gunnison, Utah. He obtained a bachelor's and master's degree from the University of Utah in 1952 and 1956, and his doctorate from Indiana University in 1963.

From 1953–55, he was a captain in the U.S. Marine Corps, and coached two all-Marine championship teams in track and field. He was a faculty member of Utah State (1956–64), member of Phi Kappa Phi, and recipient of the Briethbard Athletic Foundation award (1955).

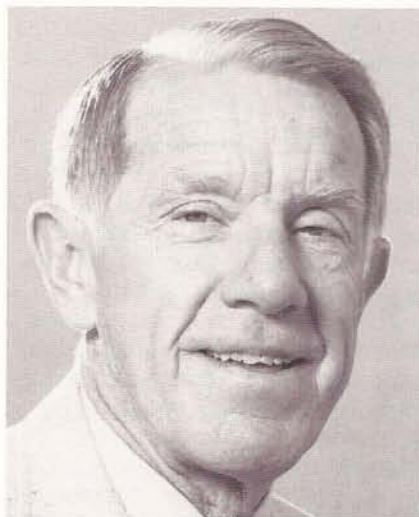
He is author or co-author of 16 books currently in print and used in over 700 colleges and universities. He is a member and chairman of several professional boards and special committees dealing with physical education, athletics and related fields. He holds membership in five professional groups and has traveled in 44 states and 26 countries.

He served as a U.S. delegate to the International Olympic Academy in Olympia, Greece, and he is currently a member of the governing council of the NCAA, and is on the advisory board of the United States Sports Academy.

He has been included in 17 national and international biographies, including *Who's Who in America*, *Who's Who in American Education*, *Outstanding Educators of America*, and *Noteworthy Americans*.

Dr. Jensen is married to the former Elouise Henrie and they have four sons: Craig, Mike, Blake and Chris (three are former members of BYU's football team).

Glen Tuckett, Athletic Director



Every success story has a time, a place, and a person to bring it to fruition. In the case of Brigham Young University's giant leap forward, it was generated in great measure by the energetic drive of Glen Tuckett, the "kid from Murray," who is now in his 14th year as the Cougars' director of athletics.

For Tuckett, the work is fun, entertaining, and rewarding;

like the 11 consecutive post-season bowl games that the Cougars have participated in since 1978; or the post-season basketball playoffs; or the 12 athletic supremacy championships BYU has earned.

More than that, however, the bouncy athletic director has left his imprint in committee rooms and intercollegiate council chambers far from his office in the George Albert Smith Fieldhouse. His maneuvering and promoting in behalf of the Cougars and the Western Athletic Conference have helped put BYU among the nation's athletic elite. Glen has chaired and worked on NCAA and CFA committees that have been on the cutting edge of college athletics.

Glen's energetic efforts, besides providing some of the

drive behind BYU successes, has brought him some distinguished honors. Six years ago he was awarded the Dale Rex Trophy, one of the highest awards given at the school. Two years later, he was inducted into the Utah Sports Hall of Fame, and he was also placed in the BYU Hall of Fame.

While many recent followers of BYU sports are inclined to view Tuckett as an administrator, long-time fans associate him with Cougar baseball. For 17 years Glen served as BYU baseball coach, and for 13 of those years his teams captured the WAC's northern division championship. Three times during that period his teams claimed the conference championship, and on two occasions they went all the way to the College World Series.

In 1974, Glen was named coach of the U.S. team in the World Amateur Baseball Tournament. For only the second time in the 27-year history of that international tournament, the USA team claimed the world title. Three years later Tuckett served as president of the American Association of Baseball Coaches, and two years after that he was inducted into the Collegiate Baseball Hall of Fame.

Glen graduated from Murray High School and spent nine seasons in professional baseball. He graduated from the University of Utah in 1953 and later obtained his M.S. and doctorate (1978) degrees from BYU. He launched his coaching career at West High (Salt Lake City) and then joined the Cougar staff in 1959, serving as head baseball coach and as an assistant on the BYU football staff.

A popular speaker, Glen is often asked to speak to business, public and church groups. He is married to the former Josephine Whittaker of Stockport, England, and they have four daughters: Alison, Shannon, Kendall and Erin.

Pete Witbeck, Associate Athletic Director



Associate Athletic Director Alan "Pete" Witbeck has been involved with BYU athletics either as an athlete, as a coach or as an administrator for 40 years.

Witbeck, a native of Raymond, Alberta, Canada, came to BYU in 1949 as a long distance runner on the track team. While in Provo, he acquired bachelor's (1952) and master's (1954) degrees and began work on a doctoral degree before joining the P.E. staff in 1955.

Three years later, Witbeck was hired to coach the freshman basketball team, a position he held for six years. During that time, his teams posted a 62-9 record, losing only three times in the last three years Witbeck was coach.

The 1963-64 Kittens were undefeated and ranked first in

the nation among freshmen teams. This team went on to win three consecutive conference championships and the the National Invitational Tournament in 1966. For his outstanding coaching job, Witbeck was given the prestigious Dale Rex Memorial Award, awarded annually to the person who has contributed most to amateur athletics in the State of Utah. As a member of that NIT championship team, he was later inducted into BYU's Hall of Fame in 1980.

During Witbeck's tenure, the varsity won five out of 10 Western Athletic Conference championships and were nationally ranked each of those years. Pete became the assistant to the athletic director, Stan Watts, in 1972.

Some of his responsibilities include overseeing athlete eligibility and game management and serving as liaison between BYU, the NCAA and the Western Athletic Conference.

He is married to the former Kathy Pickering, and they have three children, two daughters and a son who is currently serving in the Oregon Portland Mission.

Val Hale

Val Hale was installed in the newly created position of assistant to the athletic director for public and media relations. He has the responsibility of overseeing the sports information operation and coordinating the athletic department's public relations efforts.

Prior to his new position, Hale was assistant director of BYU development, where he supervised and managed fund-raising efforts in several clubs and academic areas. Prior to that, he was athletic promotions and publications coordinator from 1982 through 1987.

Hale was a cum laude graduate at BYU in 1981, and he received his M.A. degree in communications in 1987. Val and his wife, the former Nancy Allred, have three children.

Mike King was given the new title of assistant to the athletic director for finance. King, who has been the Cougars' business manager for the past 10 years, is a 1970 graduate of Idaho State University. Western Athletic Conference



Now in its 28th year, the Western Athletic Conference is enjoying increased national attention as a result of the successful athletic programs of its member institutions.

The league is the most geographically diverse in the country, spreading from the 7,000-foot heights of Laramie, Wyo., to the sea-level sprawls of Hawaii and San Diego. Each of the league's nine members adds to the flavor of the conference with its distinctive features.

The WAC traditionally ranks with the top conferences in the nation in per-capita attendance at basketball games. Last year, BYU ranked sixth nationally in per-game attendance and New Mexico was eighth.

Founded July 1, 1962, the charter members included Arizona, Arizona State, Brigham Young, New Mexico, Utah and Wyoming. In September 1967, Colorado State and Texas-El Paso were added to make the WAC an eight-team league.

A major change occurred in July 1978, when Arizona and Arizona State left for the Pac-10. But on the same day, San Diego State made its official entry into the conference. Hawaii became the eighth member the following year, and the Air Force Academy entered in 1980.

The WAC is led by Commissioner Joe Kearney, who assumed the post in 1980. Kearney, former athletic director at Arizona State, Washington and Michigan State, is the fourth conference commissioner since the formation of the league.

Jeff Hurd serves as associate commissioner, while Mark Hollis and Dee Anne Menzies are assistant commissioners. New this year is Dean Cooper as an administrative assistant. Guy Gibbs is supervisor of basketball officials.

In addition, KBYU will serve as producer for all live telecasts of BYU basketball.

An experienced sports crew and state-of-the-art equipment have enabled KBYU to develop a reputation for outstanding coverage of football, basketball and other major "remote" events in the western U.S.

At Cougar games, KBYU regularly provides feed for visiting television stations and networks, special satellite broadcasts and Bonneville International Corporation's sports broadcasts in South America.

KSL Radio

For more than a quarter of a century, BYU fans in the Intermountain West and other parts of the country have been following Cougar athletics via 50,000-watt KSL Radio (1160 on the AM dial), located in Salt Lake City.

"The Voice" of the Cougars has been play-by-play man Paul James, a veteran broadcaster with 37 years' experience behind him. A University of Utah graduate, James entered broadcasting in 1950.

For six years, he broadcast Utah basketball and football games before joining the staff at KSL Radio and Television in July of 1965. James has been at the microphone calling BYU games for the past 24 years.

Live broadcasts of basketball games can be heard on stations in Idaho, Utah, Nevada and Arizona.

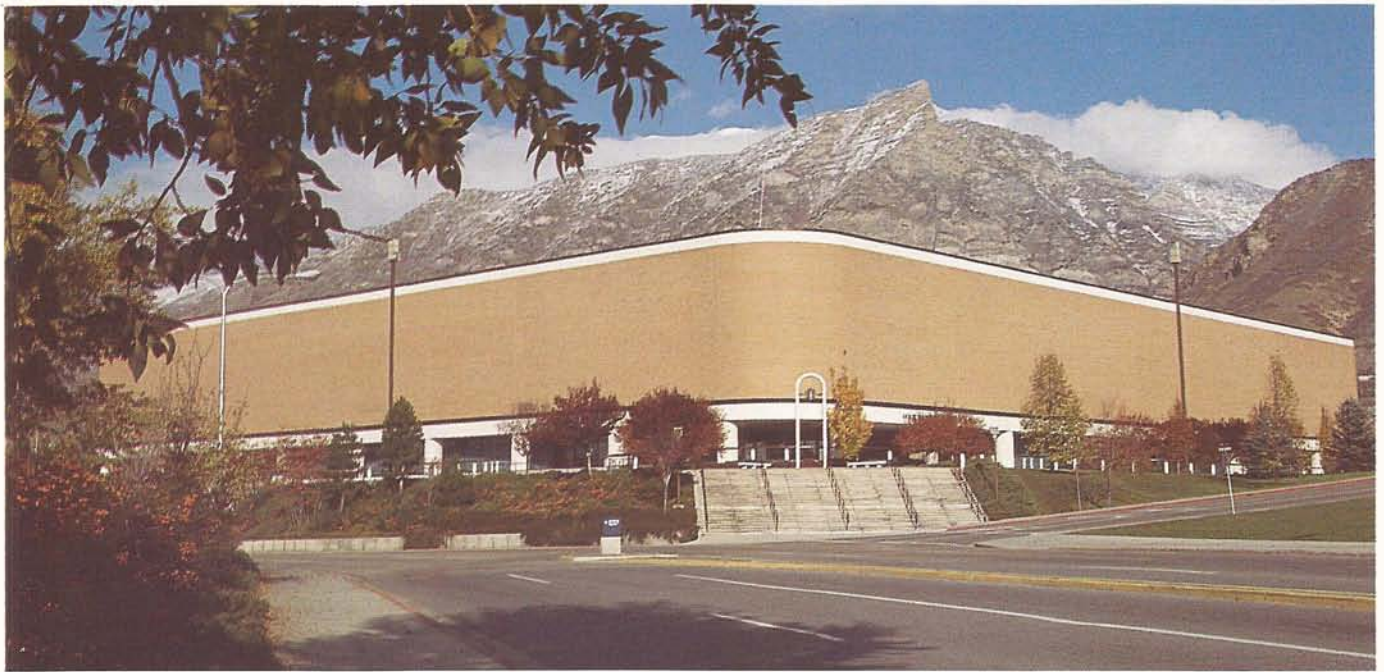

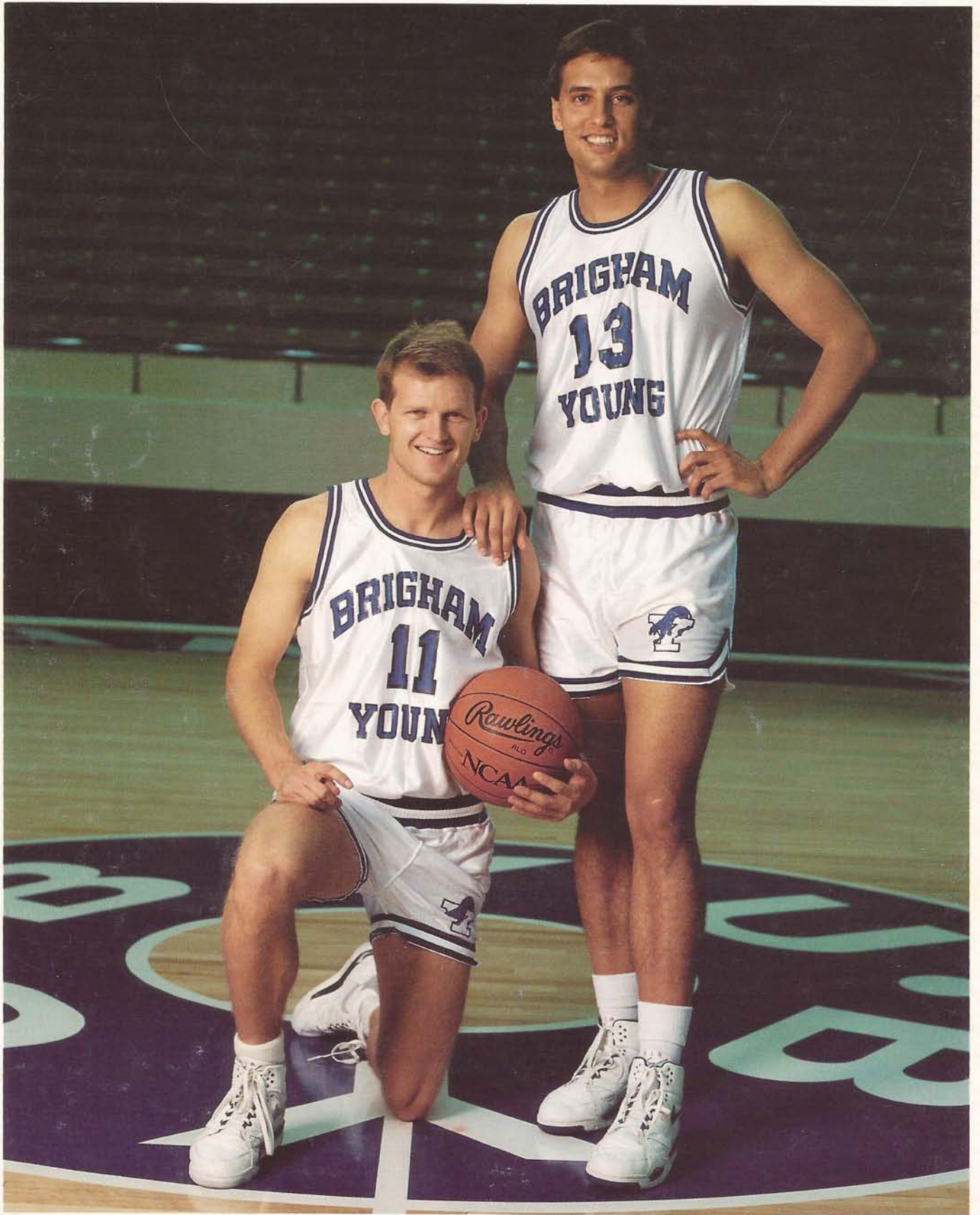
