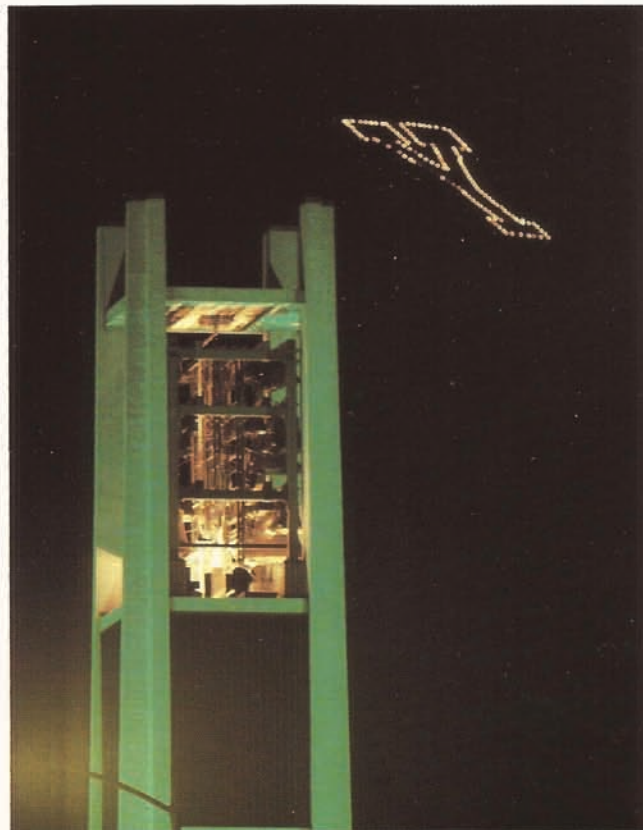

# 1990-91 Season Outlook

Coach Roger Reid has things all backwards. His second season should be easier, not harder. And his team should improve, right? Not necessarily.

First, Reid created a tough act to follow when he took a team picked sixth in the Western Athletic Conference and won a share of the championship.

He did have four starters back but the tallest, Steve Schreiner, was only 6-7. And there was a young, inexperienced bench.

This time around Schreiner is the only starter back and there is virtually a whole new group around him. Fans joke that on picture day, the players--not just the media--needed rosters to get to know the team.

Reid did make part of his job more difficult in landing one of BYU's most publicized recruiting classes ever. This group could be the school's most talented from top to bottom.

"If we started today, only Schreiner would be definite," says Reid, last year's District Coach of the Year. "We don't know who'll play and who won't. We could be juggling combinations right up to the start of the league season. It's one thing to look good in practice and another to produce in front of 23,000 people."

Schreiner, Academic All-WAC, averaged 10.6 points and 5.2 rebounds a year ago. He'll move from center to forward to make way for 7-6 Shawn Bradley.

Regarding Bradley, Reid warns not to expect too much too soon.

"He hasn't scored a single point yet, grabbed a rebound or blocked a shot. I've waited a long time to see him in a BYU uniform but he's not going to be a superstar as soon as the first ball is tossed up."

If Bradley needs to rest knees which were sore (ten-donitis) during the pre-season, the call might go to sophomore Jared Miller, a 6-8 center at Ricks College prior to going on a church mission.

Miller is physical and gets up and down the floor very well. Also in the picture at center are 6-9 squad man Kirk Davidson, who saw only limited action last season as a freshman, and 6-10 Gary Trost, who played very well in a reserve role three years ago.

Trost is strong underneath but could be hampered by a shoulder injury suffered in a freak frisbee-game accident just before school started.

Gone are Andy Toolson (Utah Jazz) and Marty Haws (CBA), who were two of the top players in school history. Their spots will be hard to fill but there's plenty of competition.

Six-one senior Scott Moon, the WAC high jump champion, looks like a good bet to play a lot at the guard

position. He has worked hard over the summer.

Another candidate for the point-guard spot is 5-11 Nathan Call, who started some games before his church mission. A good ball-handler and leader, Call was seriously burned in June just before he left Bolivia and regaining the complete use of his legs was a big question mark over the summer. But he's getting back in shape and could play a lot.

Sharp-shooting reserve Mark Heslop, a 6-5 junior, would give the Cougars some height on the guard line. Another 6-5 prospect is Keegan Kane, who averaged 18.7 last year at Ricks College.

Deciding on the rotation at the other forward spot is one of the priorities of the staff during fall practice.

David Astle, a 6-9 defensive standout who was impressive in spot roles last year as a freshman, has proven his worth. Robert Jones, who went from playground status in Chicago to star at Lon Morris Junior College, is a good shooter and leaper.

But it's the three freshmen who are drawing most of the raves from dedicated practice watchers. Kenneth Roberts, the 6-7 brother of NBA (and former BYU) player Fred Roberts, has great tools. Jeff Campbell, a 6-9 battler from Alabama, could find himself contributing as the season progresses. Shane Knight, a fluid 6-8, is a good outside shooter and scrapper around the basket.

To review the status of last year's championship squad, Haws, Toolson, Kevin Santiago, Steve Andrus and Paul Briggs were seniors. Starter Mark Durrant is on a mission in Kentucky. Todd Crow and Alan Frampton transferred to BYU-Hawaii. Todd Gentry went to Utah State.

Forward John Lloyd decided to concentrate on academic work this year. Ryan Cuff, the 6-4 guard who committed to the Cougars during the early signing period, is in Argentina on a church mission.

The schedule is both good and challenging. The Dodge NIT starts in Provo against East Tennessee State and there are six home games in December.

Even if it doesn't get to the NIT semifinals, BYU has two appearances in the Northeast--Dec. 4 at La Salle and Dec. 27 and 29 at Madison Square Garden in the Holiday Festival. The Cougars play 13 teams which were in post-season tournaments last year.

As for BYU, Coach Reid says, "We are much taller than last season. But we don't have much time to teach our system and philosophy to so many new players. Our challenge is to find people who will play well together. I know one thing, if someone's not productive on the floor, we'll find someone who is."



# Head Coach Roger Reid

Roger Reid probably will be trying to prove himself all over again this season. It's just his nature--a fiesty scrapper who never learned what it's like to give less than 100 percent.

After becoming the 11th head coach in BYU history in March, 1989, he promptly went out and won 21 games (21-9, 11-5) with a 6-7 center.

He took a team picked sixth and tied for the Western Athletic Conference title. He was WAC Coach of the Year and District Coach of the Year by both the coaches and media.

His team set a school record for three-point shooting and was eighth in the nation in that category. Home attendance averaged more than 19,000 to watch a 15-0 season.

His team had wins over NCAA participants Alabama-Birmingham, Texas-El Paso and Colorado State and victories over NIT participants Arizona State, Hawaii, New Mexico and Tulsa. Six of the nine losses were to teams in post-season action.

Only an errant alley-oop shot in the final seconds kept the Cougars from upsetting heavily favored Clemson in the NCAA Tournament.

And, if all that wasn't enough, Coach Reid and his able assistants had one of the country's top recruiting classes, led by 7-6 all-everything Shawn Bradley.

Reid, a 1968 graduate of Weber State, arrived at BYU in 1978--when the Cougars were coming off five losing seasons. His first year as an assistant BYU won the WAC championship. In his 11 seasons as an assistant, BYU averaged 20 wins a year and won four WAC titles.

The 43-year-old Reid also coordinated BYU's recruiting efforts since he joined the staff. He worked under Frank Arnold as a graduate assistant for a few months and then spent five seasons as an assistant coach.

In the six years with Ladell Andersen, Roger was responsible for BYU's defensive schemes as the assistant head coach.

He has served as chairman (1980-81) of the recruiting committee for the National Association of Basketball Coaches. In 1981, he helped give basketball clinics throughout Australia for three weeks.

In 1986, Roger was on the NABC committee to plan the national convention for the Final Four. This year he serves on the Awards Committee.

Born Aug. 3, 1947, Reid was a star athlete at Springville (Utah) High School, where he was student body vice-president and an all-state athlete. He was

named MVP in the annual North-South all-star baseball game his senior year.

Reid enrolled at BYU (1964) and was a member of the freshman basketball team and the Cougar baseball squad (which made a trip to Mexico City).

In order to pursue basketball, he transferred to Carbone College (now the College of Eastern Utah), where he was a standout in both baseball and basketball. He was the team's MVP in baseball and was named to the junior college All-America team in that sport.

Reid moved to Weber State College and was a member of the Big Sky Conference championship basketball team coached by Dick Motta. Reid also received all-conference honors in baseball for two seasons.

From Weber State, he was drafted into professional baseball and spent four years as a shortstop with the Chicago White Sox and Atlanta Braves organizations, advancing as far as AAA ball.

Reid began his coaching career in 1971 as a basketball and baseball coach at Payson (Utah) High School. His overall basketball record at Payson was 50-26. The baseball team had a 35-11 mark under his direction.

In 1974, he joined the coaching staff at Clearfield High School, also in Utah. He took the basketball team to the state tournament for the first time in five years. Clearfield's overall record was 60 wins and 24 losses under Reid's direction.

Throughout his prep coaching career, Reid's teams were known as tough defensive squads and his tallest player was only 6-4.

Reid married Diane Gardner in 1966 and they have three sons and a daughter: Randy, 20, who redshirted last year and is now on a church mission in New Jersey; Robbie, 16, who started in both basketball and baseball as a ninth grader last year at Spanish Fork High; Darren, 11; and Kelli Ann, 9.

He has served as first counselor in an LDS Church bishopric and also functioned on a stake high council.

In April, 1990, he had both hips replaced and is now almost fully recuperated.

## Assistant Coach Tony Ingle

Tony L. Ingle came to the Cougars after a year at Alabama-Huntsville and says there is only one reason he gave up a head coaching job to be an assistant--Roger Reid.

"There is nobody else I could be an assistant coach for on the collegiate level. Roger and I have the same values. I understand where he's coming from and he understands where I am coming from. I really put a lot of faith in Roger and the BYU program."

Their friendship started in Atlanta at the NCAA Regional in 1981, when they met the day Danny Ainge made the winning basket against Notre Dame.

Ingle was born June 11, 1952, in Dalton, Georgia. He graduated from North Whitfield High School there.

At Dalton Junior College he was student body vice president, team captain and won the best hustle and free throw shooting awards.

The 1971-72 team won 34 straight games and was ranked as high as second in the NJCAA polls. The 1972-73 team was ranked as high as fifth. In those two years his teams had a 61-10 record.

Transferring to Huntingdon College in Montgomery, Ala., Ingle was a captain for two years. He received a degree in physical education (1976) with a minor in biology and in 1980 earned a master's degree (P.E.) at North Georgia College.

He returned to his old high school in Dalton in 1976 as an assistant. By then it had been renamed Northwest Whitfield. He went to Southeast Whitfield for a year as head coach before moving to Cherokee High (Canton, Ga.), where he was 107-47 in seven seasons from 1978-85. He was the Atlanta Journal and Constitution AAAA Coach of the Year in 1982.

In three years (1985-88) as head coach at Gordon Junior College (Barnesville, Ga.), he was 60-33. His teams scored more than 100 points 23 times and made the state playoffs each year.

After going 18-11, 21-10 and 21-12 and being named the Atlanta Tipoff Club JC Coach of the Year in 1988, he moved to Alabama-Huntsville.

His 10-18 first-year record was the school's most wins in five years and eight of the losses were to nationally ranked Division II schools or Division I teams.

Ingle has directed 20 basketball camps in recent years and has worked at the BYU camp several times.

Tony and his wife, Jeanne, were married in 1974. They have five children: Elliott (15), Sunshine (12), Golden (9), Tony, Jr. (8), and Israel (6). The children have performed as the "Little Nuggets" at halftime shows at a number of NBA games. They also have a half-hour video tape (Dribbling to Dreams) on basketball skills. The Ingles live in Spanish Fork.



## Assistant Coach Charles Bradley

It's no wonder Charles Bradley was such a hit in his first season at BYU. It was like he always had been a part of Cougar basketball.

The former first-round draft pick of the Boston Celtics played four years at Wyoming (1977-81), coached a year for the Cowboys (1986-87) and coached two years at San Diego State (1987-89).

Add several years helping at the BYU's summer basketball camps and Bradley feels right at home in the Marriott Center.

"We have one of the fine basketball coaches in the area in Charles Bradley," says Coach Roger Reid. "He's a great addition to our program and he understands what it takes. Charles is a great asset to Cougar basketball."

Charles W. Bradley was born May 16, 1959 in Havre de Grace, Maryland, and graduated from Edgewood (Maryland) High in 1977.

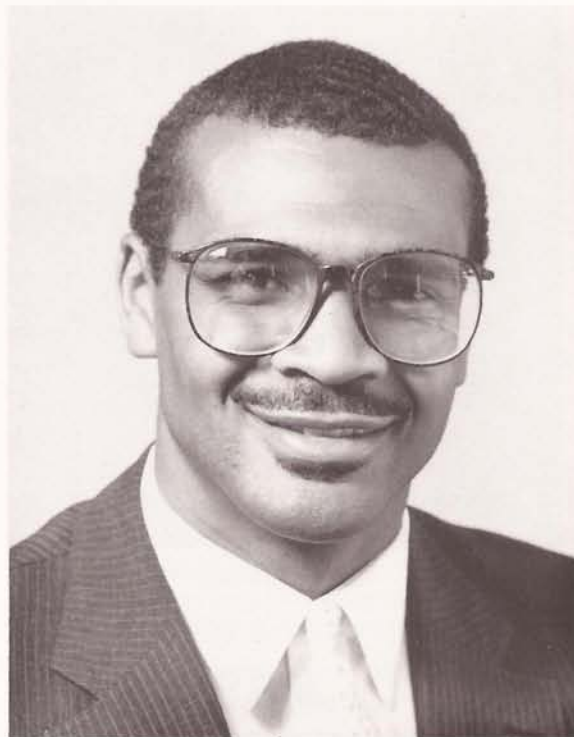
By his senior year at Wyoming in 1981 he was 6-5, 215 pounds and earned All-America and Academic All-America honors. He was MVP at the Pizza Hut All-Star Game after earning All-WAC honors three times.

A four-year starter who averaged 17 points and shot 53 percent from the field, Bradley earned a B.A. degree in elementary education in 1981 and received a teacher's certificate but went on to professional basketball instead.

He spent two years with the Boston Celtics and one with the Seattle Supersonics. He also spent some time with the Wyoming Wildcatters (Casper) of the Continental Basketball Association.

Charles and his wife, Suzanne, settled in Denver after their marriage in 1984 and he coached the freshman team at Mullen High School for a year and was involved in sales and marketing for Pizza Hut.

In 1986, Jim Brandenburg hired Bradley as an assistant at Wyoming. The Cowboys won the WAC Tournament and had an overall 24-10 record. They defeated Virginia and UCLA before bowing to top-ranked Nevada-Las Vegas in NCAA regional action.

Bradley went to San Diego State with Brandenburg in 1987 and his recruits helped turn a 5-25 team to one which went 12-17 and upset nationally ranked BYU.

When Coach Reid was appointed, he contacted Bradley about becoming the first assistant ever to coach at three WAC schools.

"I've always been impressed by the BYU players, fans and people in the community," says Bradley. "The University has a great basketball tradition and I enjoy working with Coach Reid and Coach Ingle."

Charles' older brother, Dudley, starred at North Carolina and currently plays for the Atlanta Hawks.

The Bradleys have two daughters: Taryn, 4, and Alexa, 2. They live in Orem and are expecting another child in January.





# Other Assistants

**John Hansen** is in his sixth year as the Cougars' part-time coach.

He scouts all BYU's opponents and is the junior varsity coach. In addition, he directs the office's computer system.

Hansen also keeps busy as the assistant director in the Orders' Department for the Provo-based Nu-Skin Corporation.

He and his wife Laurie spent the pre-season looking after new babies. They had premature quadruplets Aug. 1. David died Oct. 5 but John, Jason and Nathan gradually have improved at Utah Valley Regional Medical Center and could go home sometime during the season.

Hansen was born in Provo, where his parents were students. He competed in sports at Moscow High School in Idaho. After serving an LDS mission in Tokyo, he graduated from BYU in 1984 with an undergraduate degree in physical education and a minor in history.

Hansen worked a year as a teacher at Pocatello (Idaho) High School but returned to Provo when the opportunity developed to be a graduate assistant under Ladell Andersen.

He completed his master's degree in 1988 in athletic administration and decided to remain with the basketball program in a part-time capacity.

Hansen, 30, met his wife, the former Laurie Jordan of Alpine, Utah, as an undergraduate at BYU. They have been married seven years and live in Orem.

**T.J. Byrne** returned to BYU in 1989 after two years as the head trainer and assistant professor at Portland State.

A native of Boise, Idaho, he obtained a B.S. degree from Boise State in 1980 and an M.A. from BYU in 1983. After serving as a graduate assistant trainer at BYU, he spent four years as the trainer at Pepperdine.

He moved to Portland to get more football experience. He helps with football for the Cougars but his primary responsibility is basketball.

T.J. and his wife, Mary, have two boys, Brian, 8, and Tommy, 7. They are expecting a daughter in early December. They live in Lindon.

**Kurt Flygare** is in his second season as a BYU manager after playing junior varsity ball for the Cougars.

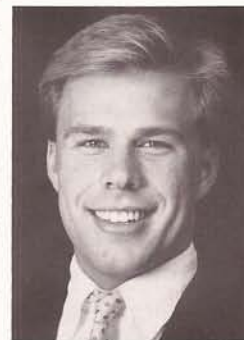

# President Rex E. Lee

Rex E. Lee, former U.S. Solicitor General, became the 10th president of Brigham Young University on July 1, 1989.

Lee, 55, was the founding dean of the J. Reuben Clark Law School at BYU, serving from 1972 to 1981. From 1985–1989 he was the law school's George Sutherland Professor of Law.

He was U.S. Solicitor General from 1981 to 1985. Previously, from 1975–76, he had served as Assistant U.S. Attorney General in charge of the Justice Department's Civil Division.

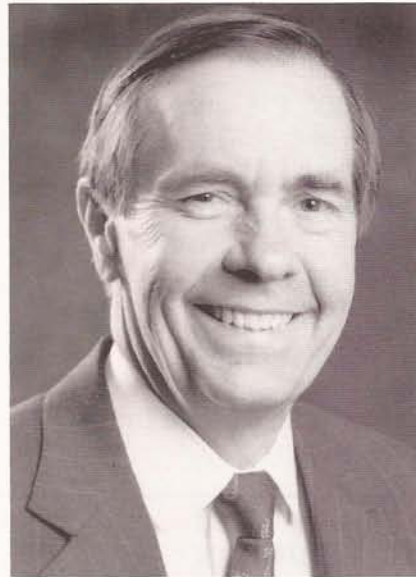
Lee is a 1960 graduate of Brigham Young University and earned a juris doctorate from the University of Chicago in 1963. He served as law clerk to Justice Byron R. White of the U.S. Supreme Court, 1963–1964, and then practiced law with the firm of Jennings, Strouss and Salmon in Phoenix from 1964–1972.

It was during his tenure as founding dean of the law school at BYU that Lee took a leave of absence to serve as Assistant U.S. Attorney General.

Since 1985, he has been a partner in the law firm of Sidley and Austin, working out of its Washington, D.C., office.

Earlier in his career, he served as a lecturer for the American Institute of Foreign Trade, 1966–1968, and from 1968 to 1972 he was on the faculty of the University of Arizona School of Law.

He has been admitted to the bar in Utah, Arizona and Washington, D.C., and is a member of the American Law Institute. In late April, he argued his 50th case before the U.S. Supreme Court. He is one of only a handful of living lawyers to have reached that milestone.



The university president has served his church as a missionary in Mexico, where he was second counselor to the mission president; as a member of the Young Men General Board (1958–1960), and has been a bishop, stake president, stake high counselor, Sunday School teacher, and in other administrative and teaching positions.

As a young boy growing up in St. Johns, Arizona, he earned the distinction of being the first boy in

that community to become an Eagle Scout.

Rex Edwin Lee was born in Los Angeles, California, Feb. 27, 1935, a son of Rex E. and Mabel Whiting Lee. His father died before Lee was born, and his mother married Wilford J. Shumway two years later. Shumway is the father that Lee has known all his life. Lee married Janet Griffin July 7, 1959, in the Mesa, Arizona, LDS Temple. They have seven children and two grandchildren.

# Dean, Athletic Director

## Dr. Clayne R. Jensen, Dean and Faculty Representative

Dr. Clayne Jensen is in his 17th year as Dean of the College of Physical Education, which encompasses BYU athletics. A respected and experienced administrator, Dr. Jensen served in the capacity of Professor and Assistant Dean for seven years before becoming Dean. He has served as BYU Faculty Athletic Representative since 1976 and was chairman of BYU's Athletics Advisory Board for nine years.



Dr. Jensen grew up in Gunnison, Utah. He obtained a bachelor's and master's degree from the University of Utah in 1952 and 1956, and his doctorate from Indiana University in 1963.

From 1953–55, he was a captain in the U.S. Marine Corps, and coached two all-Marine championship teams in track and field. He was a faculty member at Utah State (1956–64), member of Phi Kappa Phi, and recipient of the Briethbard Athletic Foundation award (1955).

He is author or co-author of 16 books currently in print and used in over 700 colleges and universities. He is a member and chairman of several professional boards and special committees dealing with physical education, athletics and related fields. He holds membership in five professional groups and has traveled in 44 states and 26 countries.

He served as a U.S. delegate to the International Olympic Academy in Olympia, Greece, and is on the advisory board of the United States Sports Academy.

He has been included in 17 national and international biographies, including *Who's Who in America*, *Who's Who in American Education*, *Outstanding Educators of America*, and *Noteworthy Americans*.

Dr. Jensen is married to the former Elouise Henrie and they have four sons: Craig, Mike, Blake and Chris (three are former members of BYU's football team).

## Glen Tuckett, Athletic Director

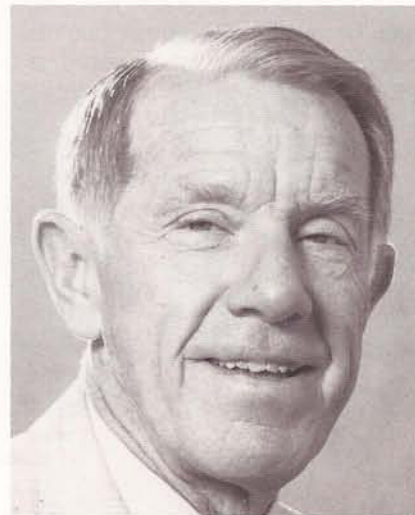
Every success story has a time, a place, and a person to bring it to fruition. In the case of Brigham Young University's giant leap forward, it was generated in great measure by the energetic drive of Glen Tuckett, the "kid from Murray," who is now in his 15th year as the Cougars' director of athletics.

For Tuckett, the work is fun, entertaining, and rewarding; like the 12 consecutive post-season bowl games that the Cougars have participated in since 1978; or the post-season basketball playoffs; or the 13 athletic supremacy championships BYU has earned.

More than that, however, the bouncy athletic director has left his imprint in committee rooms and intercollegiate council chambers far from his office in the George Albert Smith Fieldhouse. His maneuvering and promoting in behalf of the Cougars and the Western Athletic Conference have helped put BYU among the nation's athletic elite. Glen has chaired and worked on NCAA and CFA committees that have been on the cutting edge of college athletics.

Glen's energetic efforts, besides providing some of the drive behind BYU successes, has brought him some distinguished honors. Six years ago he was awarded the Dale Rex Trophy, one of the highest awards given at the school. Two years later, he was inducted into the Utah Sports Hall of Fame, and he was also placed in the BYU Hall of Fame.

While many recent followers of BYU sports are inclined to view Tuckett as an administrator, long-time fans associate him with Cougar baseball. For 17 years Glen served as BYU baseball coach, and for 13 of those years his teams captured the WAC's northern division championship. Three times during that period his teams claimed the conference championship, and on two occasions they went all the way to the College World Series.



In 1974, Glen was named coach of the U.S. team in the World Amateur Baseball Tournament. For only the second time in the 27-year history of that international tournament, the USA team claimed the world title. Three years later Tuckett served as president of the American Association of Baseball Coaches, and two years after that he was inducted into the Collegiate Baseball Hall of Fame.

Glen graduated from Murray High School and spent nine seasons in professional baseball. He graduated from the University of Utah in 1953 and later obtained his M.S. and doctorate (1978) degrees from BYU. He launched his coaching career at West High (Salt Lake City) and then joined the Cougar staff in 1959, serving as head baseball coach and as an assistant on the BYU football staff.

A popular speaker, Glen is often asked to speak to business, public and church groups. He is married to the former Josephine Whittaker of Stockport, England, and they have four daughters: Alison, Shannon, Kendall and Erin.



# Athletic Department Staff

## Pete Witbeck, Associate Athletic Director

Associate Athletic Director Alan "Pete" Witbeck has been involved with BYU athletics either as an athlete, as a coach or as an administrator for 41 years.

Witbeck, a native of Raymond, Alberta, Canada, came to BYU in 1949 as a distance runner on the track team. While in Provo, he acquired bachelor's (1952) and master's (1954) degrees and began work on a doctoral degree before joining the P.E. staff in 1955.

Three years later, Witbeck was hired to coach the freshman basketball team, a position he held for six years. During that time, his teams posted a 62-9 record, losing only three times in the last three years Witbeck was coach.

The 1963-64 Kittens were undefeated and ranked first in



the nation among freshmen teams. This team went on to win three consecutive conference championships and the the National Invitational Tournament in 1966. For his outstanding coaching job, Witbeck was given the prestigious Dale Rex Memorial Award, awarded annually to the person who has contributed most to amateur athletics in the State of Utah. As a member of that NIT championship team, he was later inducted into BYU's Hall of Fame in 1980.

During Witbeck's tenure, the varsity won five out of 10 Western Athletic Conference championships and were nationally ranked each of those years. Pete became the assistant to the athletic director, Stan Watts, in 1972.

Some of his responsibilities include overseeing athlete eligibility, game management and serving as liaison between BYU, the NCAA and the Western Athletic Conference.

He and his wife, Kathy, have three children—Jill, Von and Ann.

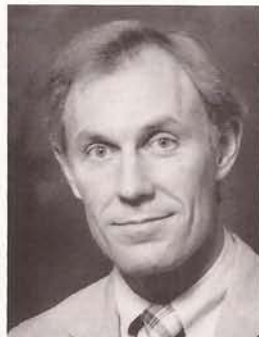

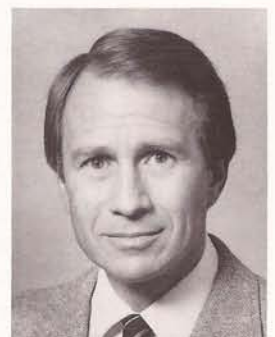

# Western Athletic Conference



Now in its 29th year, the Western Athletic Conference is enjoying increased national attention as a result of the successful athletic programs of the member institutions. This school year it also includes competition for women.

The league is the most geographically diverse in the country, spreading from the 7,000-foot heights of Laramie, Wyo., to the sea-level sprawls of Hawaii and San Diego. Each of the league's nine members adds to the flavor of the conference with its distinctive features.

The WAC traditionally ranks with the top conferences in the nation in per-capita attendance at basketball games. Last year, BYU ranked fifth nationally in per-game attendance and New Mexico was eighth.

Founded July 1, 1962, the charter members included Arizona, Arizona State, Brigham Young, New Mexico, Utah and Wyoming. In September 1967, Colorado State and Texas-El Paso were added to make the WAC an eight-team league.

A major change occurred in July 1978, when Arizona and Arizona State joined the Pac-10. On the same day, San Diego State made its official entry into the conference. Hawaii became the eighth member the following year, and the Air Force Academy joined in 1980.

The WAC is led by Commissioner Joe Kearney, who assumed the post in 1980. Kearney, former athletic director at Arizona State, Washington and Michigan State, is the fourth conference commissioner since the formation of the league.

Margie McDonald, formerly in charge of the High Country Athletic Conference, is the deputy commissioner. Jeff Hurd serves as associate commissioner, while Dee Anne Menzies and Mark Hollis are assistant commissioners. Dean Cooper is administrative assistant. Guy Gibbs is supervisor of basketball officials.

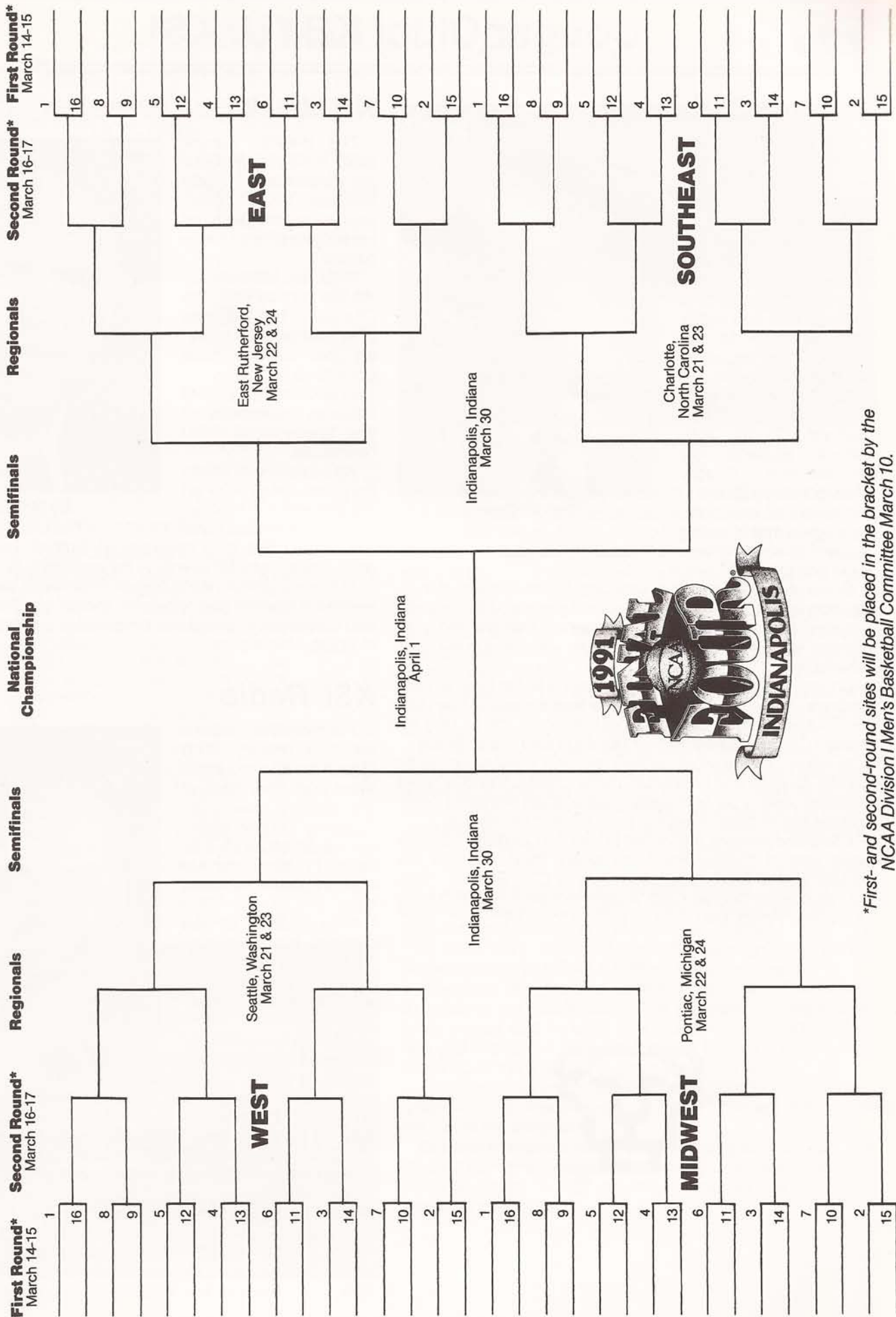

With a seating capacity of 22,700, the Marriott Center is one of the nation's largest on-campus basketball arenas.

Kentucky's Rupp Arena is also a 23,000-seat facility, but is owned by the city of Lexington. Two new arenas—at Tennessee and North Carolina—also are in the 23,000-seat range.

In the past BYU has been one of the best drawing teams in America. Since the Marriott Center opened in 1971, nearly five million fans have watched BYU basketball games in the Marriott Center. The BYU single-season record for average attendance is 22,505, set during the 1980-81 season.

Last season, BYU ranked fifth nationally with an average of 19,119 per game. Only Syracuse, Kentucky, North Carolina and Louisville drew more fans than the Cougars.

A seven-year-old addition to the Marriott Center is the four-sided scoreboard/message center. The board has capabilities of scorekeeping, timing, etc., in addition to an animated message board that will relay messages to the crowd. The Marriott Center also has acquired a lighting system capable of providing 250 foot candles of illumination.

Named after the nationally known businessman who was the major contributor, the J. Willard Marriott Center houses crowds for basketball, commencement exercises, concerts, pageants, devotionals and many other activities.

In 1972, 1977, 1979 and 1982, the Marriott Center served as the host for the NCAA Far West Regional playoffs.

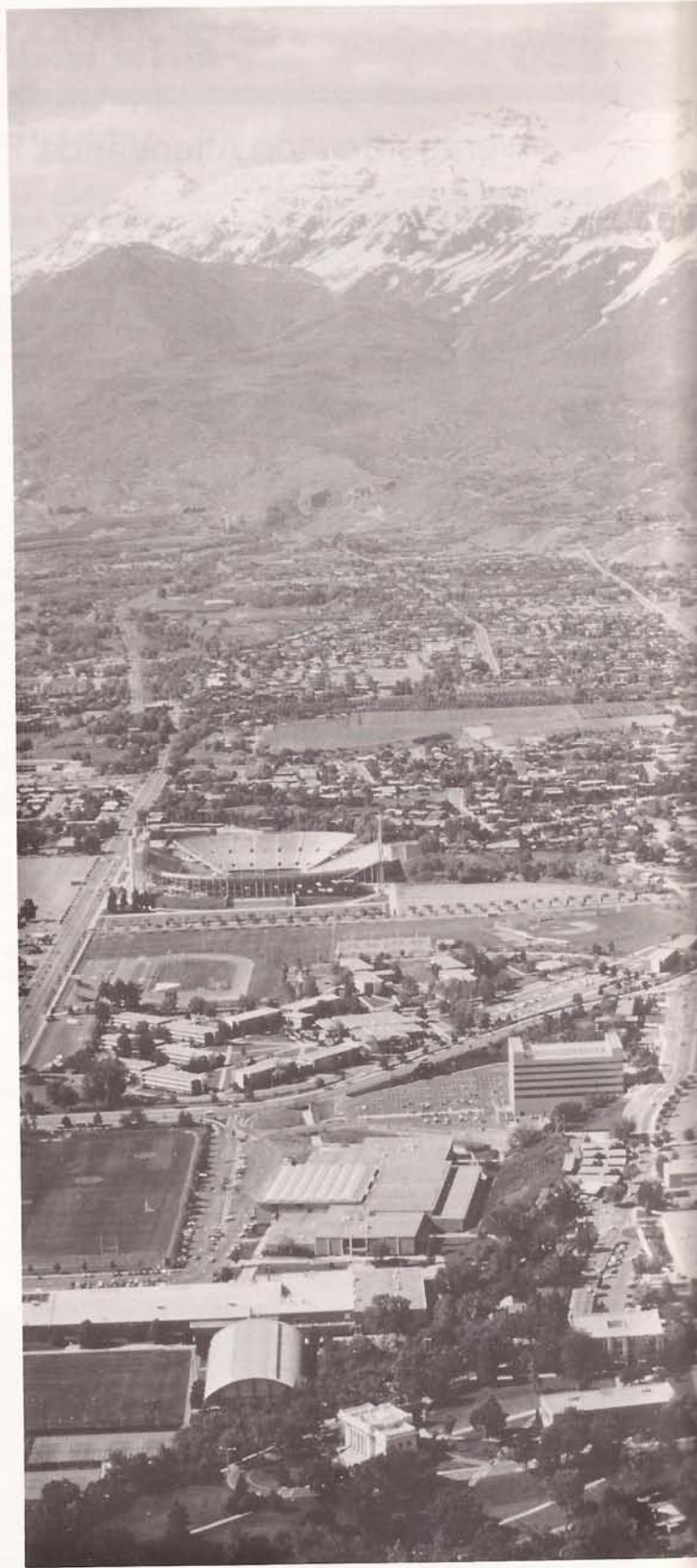
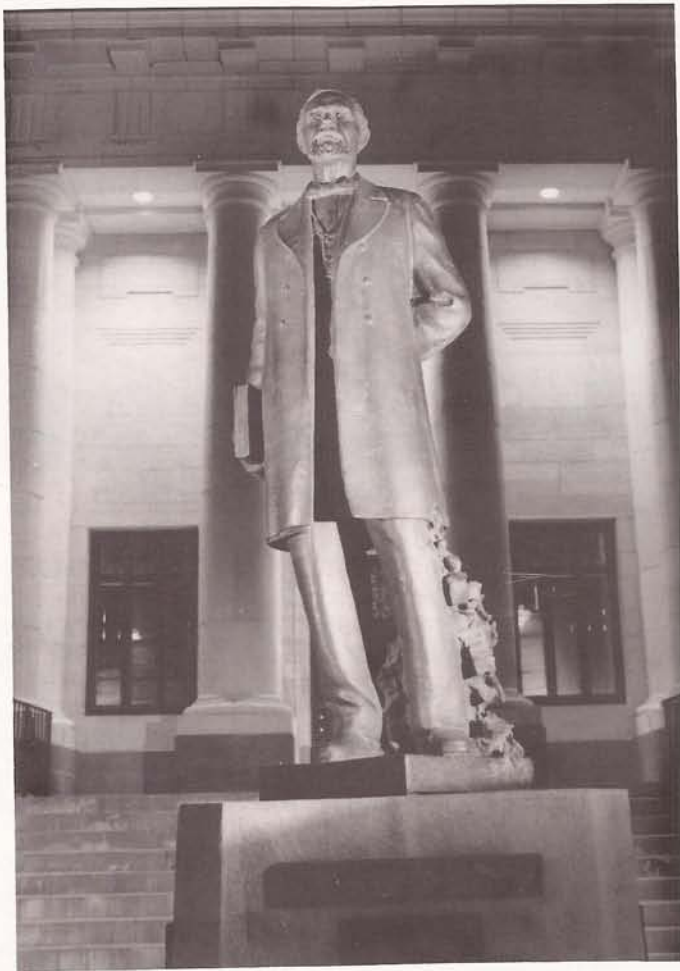
Physically, the building covers three acres. The outside dimensions are 280 X 340, or the equivalent of two football fields placed side by side. The roof covers 130,000 square feet and encloses 8 million cubic feet. From the playing floor to the top of the roof, the height is nearly 10 stories.

There are roughly 10,100 chair seats in the building with the balance being bleacher seats. About 40 percent of the seats are below the concourse.

Besides the usual locker rooms, training facilities, etc., the Marriott Center serves as ticket headquarters for most major campus events. It also provides offices for the basketball coaching staff.

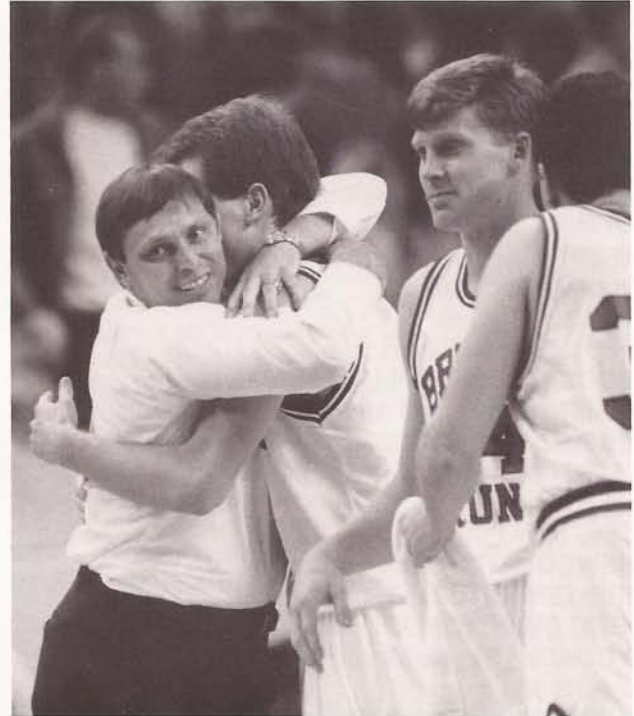

# Cougar Basketball History

The roots of BYU's basketball program extend back to near the turn of the century, although it wasn't until 1917 that the Cougars joined the Rocky Mountain Faculty Athletic Conference.

A look back at the humble beginning of BYU basketball reveals a completely different set of events than exist today. For instance, in those days, the Cougars played their home games in the gym on the third floor of the Training School building on lower campus.

Seating capacity in that gym was about 700. For the "big" games, fans would perch themselves in windows, on ladders and on top of lockers along the wall.

E.L. Roberts was coach of the Cougars from 1918-20 and compiled a 14-7 record. He was followed by Alvin Twitchell, who coached from 1921-25 and had a 44-20 record. Roberts again took the reins of the Cougar program for the 1926-27 season and helped champion the change that eventually eliminated the center jump after every basket.

In 1928, BYU moved its home games to the Women's Gym on University Avenue, where the seating capacity was nearly double that of the other facility. Provo's local radio station (KOVO) carried one of the first-ever broadcasts of a college basketball game. Two-handed push shots were in vogue. And BYU landed its first All-American, Elwood Romney.

Some of the coaches who handled the Cougar program during the "Women's Gym" era were G. Ott Romney (1928-35), Edwin R. Kimball (1936, 1939-41), Fred "Buck" Dixon (1937-38) and Floyd Millet (1942-49).

An unforgettable chapter in the chronicle of BYU basketball was written between 1946 and 1950, when the Cougars played their home games on the floor of the Springville High School gymnasium. Seating capacity in that gym was listed at 1,200, although officials discovered it could actually hold 1,700 with some scrunching together of bodies.

Despite the handicaps, the Springville Gym was the site for some outstanding basketball. Some of the players who displayed their skills in the old gym were Joe Nelson, Mel Hutchins, Roland Minson; Utah's Arnie Ferrin and Vern Gardner; Denver's Vince Boryla; and Utah State's Ladell Andersen, just to mention a few.

Forced out of the Springville Gym in 1950, the Cougars had to go searching for a temporary home while the George Albert Smith Fieldhouse was under construction. The University of Utah graciously offered

its home floor--the 6,000-seat Einer Nielsen Fieldhouse.

Pre-season games were played in the Springville Gym that year, but once Skyline Conference action began, all games were played 45 miles away in Salt Lake City.

As transients, the Cougars didn't suffer much. They split with the Utes, 2-2, and captured the conference championship. They also went on to win the National Invitational Tournament in Madison Square Garden.

That was only the second year for Coach Stan Watts, a man who molded BYU's program into one of the nation's finest. Coach Watts was inducted into the Basketball Hall of Fame in Springfield, Mass., in 1986.

At long last, BYU's team moved into the 10,200-seat Smith Fieldhouse in December of 1951. Coach Watts coached every one of the 246 games played in the Fieldhouse over the next 20 years. Large crowds enjoyed some of the finest basketball teams in the country during that era, including another NIT championship team from BYU in 1966.

The demand for more seats prompted school officials to begin planning construction of the 23,000-seat Marriott Center which, at the time, was the largest on-campus basketball arena in the nation. It opened officially in December of 1971 with a sellout crowd. Average home attendance that year was more than 21,000.

This will be the 20th season in the Marriott Center, praised by visiting teams and media for its cleanliness and upkeep.

Since the opening of the Marriott Center, five coaches have been at the helm. Stan Watts retired in 1972 after winning 431 games. He was followed by Glenn Potter (1972-75), Frank Arnold (1976-83) and Ladell Andersen (1984-89).

In March, 1989, the Roger Reid era began at BYU. The long-time assistant was elevated to the top spot when Coach Andersen retired.

Some of the BYU players to receive All-America honors in recent years include Dick Nemelka, Kresimir Cosic, Danny Ainge and Devin Durrant. Ainge also won the Eastman and Wooden Awards, given to the outstanding collegiate basketball player in the country. And Smith was the inaugural Academic Player of the Year selection by GTE and the College Sports Information Directors of America.

Last year, Andy Toolson was a first-team Academic All-America selection.
