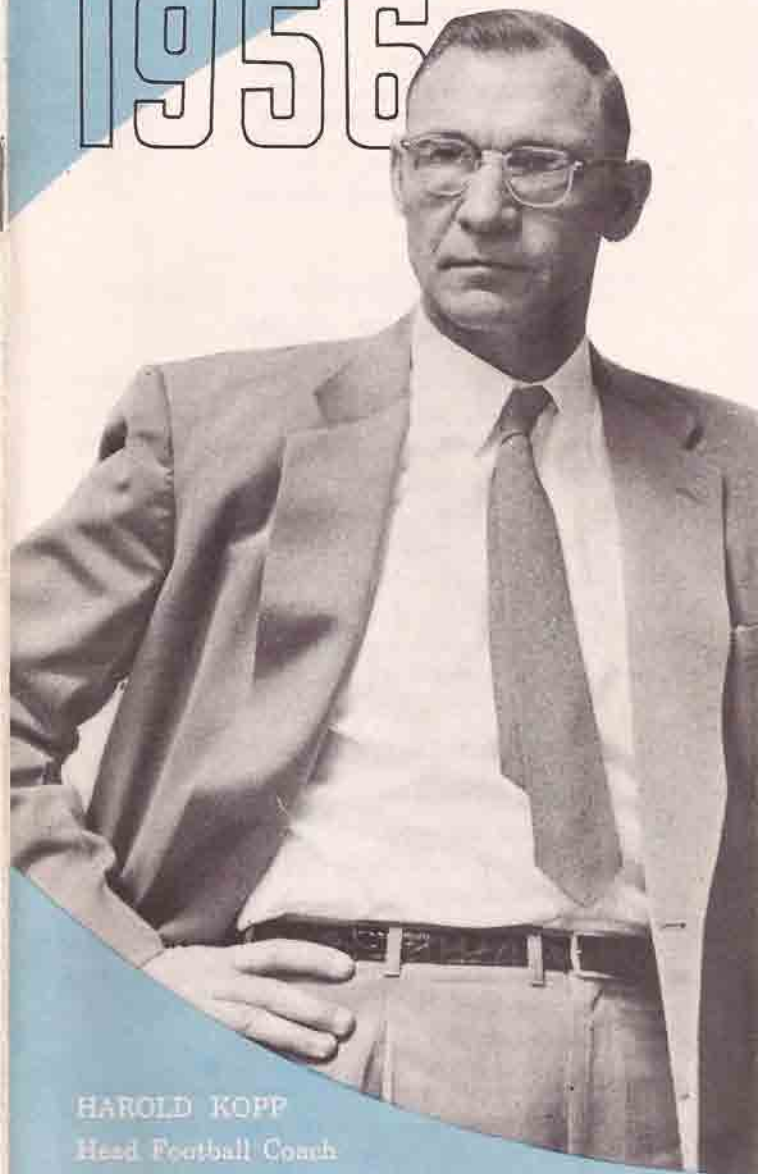

COACHING STAFF



Harold W. Kopp, Head Coach

Future sports historians in Utah, looking back on the 1956 selection of Harold W. Kopp as head coach at BYU, may very well regard the move as the turning point in football history at Cougarville. So contagious is Kopp's love of the game, so strong and deep-rooted his determination to build into a grid power, that fans have reason to sense a new era in football at the Church University.

The search for a replacement for Charles "Chick" Atkinson, who left the coaching game last winter for greener fields in private industry, was extensive and thorough. After months of exhaustive evaluations, the nod was given the very capable Hal Kopp, Rhode Island University head coach who has carried the Rams to an undefeated season and the Yankee Conference championship last fall. And the critics named him New England Coach of the Year at the end of the season.

Kopp's four-year tenure at Rhode Island typifies his ability as a coach. When he took over at RI in 1950 the Rams were all but out of the football picture. Under his command they defeated their state rival, Brown, three out of four times; the only other RI win over Brown was 17 years ago. They won the Yankee league crown in 1955 and shared the title in 1952 and 1953. His record for four seasons was 25-5-2.

Hal graduated from Western Maryland in 1933 and

began his coaching career at Northwestern University in 1937 as line coach. From 1940 to 1942 he coached varsity line at Brown, then served four years in the Army infantry in England, Scotland and Africa during World War II.

Back in the football business, he coached the varsity line at Harvard University from 1946 to 1948 and then moved to Yale University as line coach under Herman Hickman from 1948 to 1950. He took over at Rhode Island in 1950, but was called back into the armed services during the Korean conflict for additional duties.

He currently holds the rank of lieutenant colonel in the reserves.

On the national level, Kopp was a member of the coaching staff of the North team that defeated the South in 1949, and also a coach of the Eastern College All-Stars who defeated the New York Giants, 1949.

The new BYU coach is sometimes described as a combination of two great former coaches he has assisted—Richard C. Harlow of Harvard, and Herman Hickman, formerly of Yale.

Although he has coached the single wing, T-formation and split-T, he will use the split-T at Brigham Young.

Tally Stevens, End Coach

One of the first lieutenants acquired by Kopp was Tally Stevens, one of the finest prep coaches in Utah history, who will be working with the ends. Tally, a tall,



personable '49 graduate of the University of Utah, knows well the taste of coaching success. His last four seasons as head coach at East High School in Salt Lake City netted him a 33-3-1 record and three state Class "A" championships. His overall prep record: 49-11-3.

Tally, a native of Evanston, Wyo., was one of those exceptional athletes. He played football for the Fourth Air

Force, along with some of the finest players in the nation, during World War II.

Returning to the U. of U. campus following the war, he became one of the finest ends ever developed under Ike Armstrong. He also played basketball at the Hilltop school and was considered one of the U's finest athletes.

His first coaching assignment following graduation in '49 was at Morgan High School, and a year later he accepted the coaching post at East High School.

Owen Dixon, Line Coach

One of the two BYU graduates on Kopp's new staff is Owen Dixon, the man given the assignment of coaching the line. A devoted student of football, Dixon lives close to the game.

A native of Provo, Dixon is regarded as one of the better linemen produced at BYU. He won all-conference honors before and after service in the Army during World War II. Small as linemen generally go, Owen was respected throughout the conference for his play.

Following graduation from BYU in 1946, Dixon joined the coaching staff at Brigham Young High School. His teams were always in the running, and in 1952 his club won the regional title and moved into the state football playoffs, where they missed the championship by one touchdown.

He joined the staff at BYU in 1953, assuming duties as freshman coach in 1954, varsity line coach in 1955.



Allan Davis, Backfield Coach

In his pursuit for the best coaching talent in the state, the new BYU coach put a finger on Allen Davis, veteran helmetsman at Murray High School. Davis was added to the staff in March.



In seven years at Murray, Davis produced one of the state's top prep football powers. His record at Murray for the last three years was 27-4. His club reached the state finals in 1953, and came back in 1954 to win the state crown. Last year Murray was advanced to Class "A" and the Spartans reached the finals again, only

to be beaten by East High, a team coached by Tally Stevens.

Born in Salem, Davis attended Payson High where he was student body president. He was regular quarterback under Ike Armstrong at Utah, and won all-conference honors, graduating in 1947.

COACHING STAFF

Max Tolbert, Freshman Coach

Coach Kopp has said that the Y. will need two good freshman teams before they can be expected to knock over the bigger teams. The burden of bringing these frosh crews along is now the weighty responsibility of Max Tolbert. With this task in mind, Max has been a major force in the recruiting program.

A native of Fayetteville, Pa., where he won letters in four sports in high school, he came to BYU in 1948. He lettered three seasons for the Cougars, and in his senior year the Cougars chalked up a 6-3-1. Max played a total of 456 minutes, playing both offense and defense.

Max coached baseball and football at Murray High School for three years before joining the BYU staff last year. He is also varsity scout for BYU.



Rod Kimball, Trainer

Too often the forgotten man of the staff is the trainer, the man whose job it is to keep the athletic team in sound physical shape. At BYU the task of mending and readying the players falls to Rod Kimball.



Good natured Rod, who takes a ribbing from the players because of his balding head, was an outstanding athlete and student leader at Jordan High. He lettered at both Utah State and BYU during his college days and in 1937 was chosen as trainer for the Cougar teams.

As trainer he probably travels more than any man on campus. Besides his assigned junkets with the football and basketball teams he has accompanied the cage squad to South America, the football squad to Hawaii, and more recently the track team on their tour of Europe.

EVALUATION

ENDS—Left flank is well anchored with big Ray Neel, two year veteran, while right flank will be held down by Tom Clark, a JC transfer. Ron Zitting, a 214-pound sophomore, needs only speed and more polish. Other ends also look strong. **CONSENSUS:** Moderately strong, but injuries in this position would hurt the Cougars.

TACKLES—Figures to be the weak spot in the Y forward wall. Dave Hanks, who missed '55 season because of injury, is ready. Dick Ralph, 225-pound senior, lends experienced depth. Paul Eckel, top sophomore line prospect, has been moved over from guard. Best position on club for beef. **CONSENSUS:** Only fair but expected to improve as season progresses.

GUARDS—All-conference candidate Jay Weenig is top line prospect, while Hal Stapley, Jim Taylor, Bill Matthews, and others give the guards excellent balance, depth. Taylor is two-year veteran, and Matthews should come into his own this year. Four sophomores among the eight will need additional seasoning. **CONSENSUS:** Relatively strong spot in line.

CENTERS—A real worry for Coach Kopp and staff, the center slot doesn't have a senior. Only returning letterman is Paul Dalebout. To bolster the spot, Lynn Reading, a sophomore end, has been moved in. Jack Sawyer, a 210-pound, 6-3, junior from Tooele, has the size for the job, and could be part of the answer. **CONSENSUS:** Lacking experienced personnel, could prove vulnerable.

QUARTERBACKS—Young and green, the Y field generals nevertheless have fine potential. Don Dixon and Carroll Johnston saw plenty of action in '55, and they both showed vast improvement in spring game. Wayne Startin, a soph, will be pushing for starting berth, and both Rooks and Parque will also be in the scramble. **CONSENSUS:** Good depth but more experience needed.

HALFBACKS—With several promising backs at each half, the first string berths are wide open. Weldon Jackson, the sophomore who scored four TD's in the spring game, will be hard to beat out. Six lettermen and two JC transfers in the running. **CONSENSUS:** Plenty of scatback material, but big power runners are missing. Opponents will have to go some to outrun this crew.

FULLBACKS—Competition in this position very keen. Ron Jacobson, a transfer from Arizona University, has both speed and power for Kopp's Split-T. Scott Farmer and Dick Hunt both had their high moments last year and both looked good. Steve Campora and Karl Brooks are JC transfers. **CONSENSUS:** Looks pretty fair on paper, but still pretty much a question mark.

For the fifth consecutive year, Radio KSL will team with Phillips Oil in broadcasting all BYU football and basketball games.

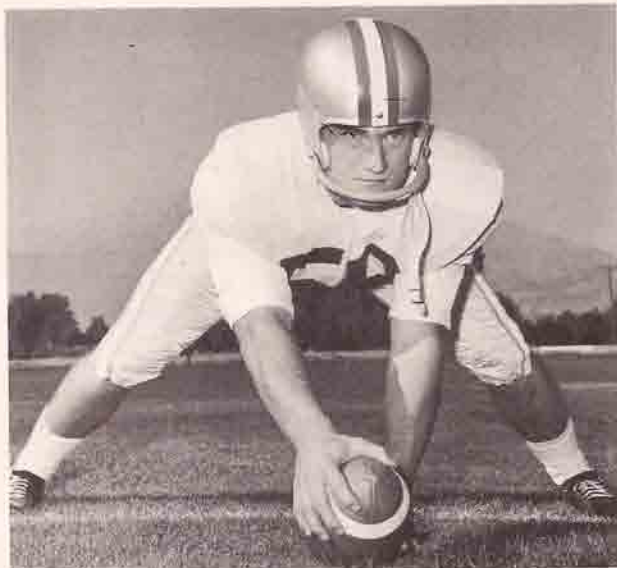

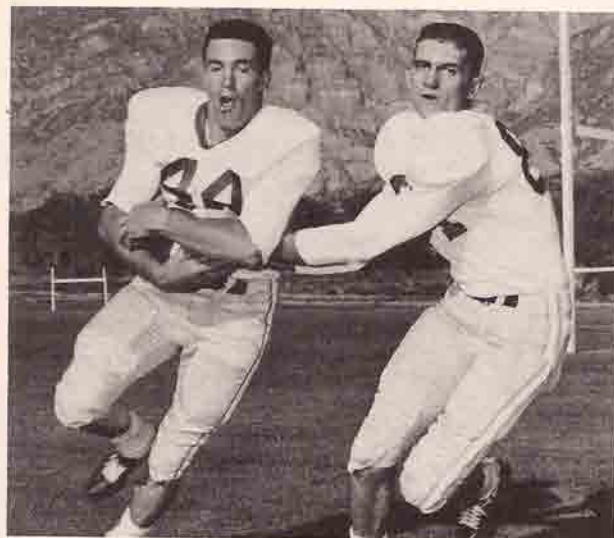

MORE ABOUT

BRIGHAM YOUNG UNIVERSITY

CAMPUS: Brigham Young University is located in Provo, Utah, a city of nearly 30,000 which increases considerably during the school year. Located in the northeast section of Provo, campus property covers nearly 600 acres. Provo is bordered by Utah Lake on the west, 12,000-ft. Mt. Timpanogos on the north, and the Wasatch mountains in the east.

FOUNDING: Established October 16, 1875, twenty-one years before Utah statehood, by the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints (Mormon).

ADMINISTRATION: Dr. Ernest L. Wilkinson president. The university is governed by a Church Board of Trustees.

ENROLLMENT: Over 8,200 total last fall. Co-educational.

STADIUM: The Y Stadium is located north of the campus proper. It is built on the side of University Hill, facing west. Seating capacity, including the temporary bleachers is 10,000.

SCHOOL COLORS: Royal Blue and White.

TEAM NICKNAMES: Cougars, Cats, etc.

CONFERENCE: Mountain States Intercollegiate Athletic Association, better known as the "Skyline Conference." The conference includes Wyoming University, Colorado A&M, Denver University, University of Utah, Utah State Agricultural College, Montana State University, and New Mexico University. The latter two joined the conference in 1951. E. L. Romney, conference commissioner, has offices in Hotel Utah, Salt Lake City, Utah.

SCHOOLS and COLLEGES: Graduate School, College of Applied Science, College of Arts and Sciences, College of Commerce, College of Fine Arts, College of Education, Division of Religion, Extension Division, School of Nursing, School of Engineering.

SCHOOL SONG: "The Cougar Song" is the official fight song.
