

PRESS BOX—is located in the West stands. Quickest entry will be through sections G and F or GG and FF. The main press section is on the main level, while radio and scouts will be located on the top level.

PRESS PARKING—is located in parking area No. 1, which is immediately south of the West stands. Cars should enter from Canyon Road (the northsouth artery) or from 1650 North (east-west artery). These passes will be issued along with the working passes.

PRESS SERVICES—will be provided at all games. Complete game statistics—lineups, play-by-play, scoring and yardage reports, team and individual statistics—will be supplied. Post-game interviews with the coaches will be arranged on request.

ADMINISTRATION

DR. ERNEST L. WILKINSON, UNIVERSITY PRESIDENT

There is no way to accurately estimate the full impact Dr. Ernest L. Wilkinson has had on the University's stature, but it is generally accepted that no other person has played a more significant role in its growth and expansion. Since his appointment in



1950, the school has undergone dramatic expansion that has made it the largest university in the Great Bas-

in region.

A native of Ogden, Dr. Wilkinson attended Weber College before transfering to BYU where he graduated in 1921. He pursued his education at George Washington Law School,

where he graduated summa cum laude, and Harvard, where he received the degree of doctor of juridicial

science.

He practiced law in New York and Washington, forming his own firm in the capitol city before accept-

ing the post he now holds.

Since his appointment in 1951, the enrollment has increased many fold and more than 80 major, permanent buildings have been constructed on campus. In 1965, one of these buildings, the spacious new student activities building was named in his honor.

DR. MILTON F. HARTVIGSEN. COLLEGE DEAN

There is a reason why they call the Cougars' modern athletic complex "Milt's Miracle Mile." The tag put on the Y's extensive facilities alludes to some of the contributions made to the College of Physical

Education by Dr. Milton F. Hartvigsen, dean of the col-

A former teacher, coach, principal and superintendent of schools in Idaho, Dr. Hartvigsen came to BYU in 1956 after obtaining his Ed. D. at UCLA. He was a 1930 graduate of Utah State University and obtained his M. Ed. from the Logan school.

Since coming to BYU, Dr. Hartvigsen has helped shape one of the finest athletic complexes in the country. His programs, which have won wide-spread commendation, are the result of his own keen planning,


careful design, and forceful administration.

Dr. Hartvigsen serves as chairman of the Athletic Advisory Council, and has served on several key NCAA assignments. He was voted professor of the year at BYU in 1963.

FLOYD MILLET, DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

Nobody—coach, athletic or fan—likes to win more than does Floyd Millet, the University's director of athletics since 1964. And the fact that some of the Cougar's greatest moments in sports have come within

the last three years is by no means coincidental.



He served in a number of coaching capacities—football, track and basketball—and was director of athletics before resigning to enter private business. Even so, he kept a hand in athletics, serving as chairman of the athletic committee of the General Board of the YMMIA. He directed one of the largest athletic programs in the world in that

Returning to athletics and athletic administration, Floyd was appointed director of athletics at BYU in

November, 1964.

THE STADIUM

Football fans at BYU still refer to their playing field as the "new" football stadium, and this feeling reflects the new gridiron spirit at Cougarville.

Built in 1964 at a cost of over \$1,500,000, the BYU Stadium originally had a capacity of 26,812. When it was inaugurated on Oct. 2, 1964, over 33,000 fans were crammed into every possible corner to watch the Cougars play New Mexico.

The sudden rise in popularity of BYU football, coupled with BYU's first football championship in history, prompted university officials to authorize the

addition of 4,080 new seats.

Total seating capacity will now be 30,000. With the addition of temporary bleachers in the north and south ends of the football field, total capacity will be in the neighborhood of 35,000. Parking facilities are more than adequate with space for 2,698 cars on the immediate Stadium grounds and an additional 2,000 within easy walking.

The completion of the stadium is a classic example of community effort. A good part of the \$1,500,000 construction costs were gained from personal donations from students, faculty, staff, interested residents and business houses in Provo, and alumni and friends.

Ground was broken for the stadium in October, 1963. A year later it was in use. Total area involved for the construction was 36.5 acres, over 20 acres of which are being used for parking.

The lighting for the stadium is the best available. The towering light standards are over 16 stories high, and when the lights are turned on, about 576,000 watts

of electricity are directed to the playing field.

Surrounding the playing field is a rubberized asphalt track, recognized as one of the best in the nation. It was site of the 1966 WAC track and field championships and the 1967 NCAA championships.

TOMMY HUDSPETH

Long-time football fans at BYU who savor that sweet taste of success look at Tommy Hudspeth like something that dropped out of heaven. After many seasons of so-so football, the Cougars suddenly emerged as a griding force under the guidance of the 36-year old former pro coach.

Two years ago Tom took a team that was nearly everybody's choice for last place and directed it to a conference championship, the first such title in the school's history. Then, last year, the Cougars went on an offensive rampage that carried them to an 8-2 record, the finest ever in the 45-year span of

football at Brigham Young University.

Born in Cherryvale, Kans., Tom attended high school in Afton, Okla., where he was an all-state quarterback. From the high school ranks, he moved to the University of Tulsa, where he was captain of the freshman team. In three seasons with the Hurricane varsity, he was a two-way player; quarterback and defensive back.

Playing in the heyday of football at Tulsa, Tom was an important part of the Hurricane teams that won championships in 1950 and 1951. He was a regular for the three seasons he was with the varsity. Moreover, he was able to cap his career at Tulsa when elected captain of the 1953 team that played in the Gator Bowl.

Following graduation from Tulsa in 1953, Tom launched his coaching career at Norman High School. There followed a two-year stint in the U.S. Air Force as a commissioned officer. Discharged as a first Lieutenant in 1955, he returned to the coaching ranks at Tulsa Central. His team at Central posted a 6-2-1 record.

The following year. Tom accepted an offer to move into the college coaching ranks as freshman coach at Tulsa under Bobby Dobbs. He remained as an assistant there from 1957 to 1960, When Dobbs was tagged as head coach of the Calgary Stampeders, Hudspeth, who was then 28, went with him as an assistant. The Stampeders were conference contenders the three years Tom was with them.

At age 32 after six seasons in the college and professional coaching ranks. Tom was selected as head coach at Brigham Young University. Starting from scratch, Tom and the Cougars managed to put together a 3-6-1 season. The following year BYU surprised everyone by winning the WAC championship. Tom won his share of honors, including UPI Coach of the Year in the WAC, Coach and Athlete Magazine's Coach of the Year in the Rocky Mountain Region. All of these honors, plus more, came to

While the '65 season was a great one, last fall's campaign was even better. Uncorking a dazzling offense, the Cougars rolled up an 8-2 win-loss record that was the best in BYU history. In addition, the Cougars ranked second in the nation in total offense; over 400 yards per game. His overall record in three years at BYU is 17-12-1.

It should be noted that Hudspeth's leadership qualities were in evidence before he came to BYU. He served as president of his senior class at Tulsa, and captained the Hurricane's frosh and varsity teams

at Tulsa,

He has completed most of the requirements for his master's degree in counseling, and he has served as a member of the High Council of the BYU Fifth Stake.

He is married to the former Ruth Ann Sandmire, and they have three children: Max (12), Phil (9), and Melissa (9 mo.).

CHRIS APOSTOL (USU '50)

Talk with defensive backfield coach Chris Apostol very long and it becomes "Will Rogers Revisited." Dry, yet droll, Chris has an easy-going manner behind a serious countenance.

The veteran member of the Cougar football staff, Chris has been with BYU since 1959, at least two years ahead of any other current staff member.

Born and raised in the mining community of Bingham Canyon (southwest of Salt Lake City), Chris was student body president and an all-state lineman at Bingham High. He played his college ball at Utah

State, and graduated from USU in 1950.

Launching a career in coaching, he joined the staff at Ogden High. In the nine years he was at Ogden, Chris' teams compiled a 44-13-2 record. His last team at Ogden won the state Class "A" championship and had an 11-0 record. Seven of the wins were shutouts, which indicates Chris' defensive know how.

Chris is married to the former Marva Funk, and they have five children; Kristine, Konn, Kip, Kurt, and

Kami.

LAVELL EDWARDS (USU '52)

Twice during last year's 8-2 campaign, BYU opponents were held to minus yardage rushing. Much of the credit for this must go to LaVell Edwards, the Cougars' defensive line coach. What's more, the Cougars were ranked among the top 25 teams in the nation in rushing defense.

Edwards" schooling in football began practically within the shadows of BYU. Orem High School, where

he was an all-state player, from there he moved to Utah State University where he was team captain

and an all-conference player for two years.

LaVell graduated in 1952 and spent two years in

the Army at Fort Mead, Maryland, In 1954 he returned to his home state to coach at Granite High School in Salt Lake City. In 1961 he came to BYU as

an assistant coach under Hal Mitchell.

Coach Edwards is married to the former Patti Covey and they have three children: Ann (11), John (9), and James (5). Edwards is bishop of the BYU 36th Ward on campus.

EARL LINDLEY (USU '54)

A hard taskmaster when it comes to shaping an effective offensive backfield. Earl Lindley has worked with and helped develop some of the Y's great backfield stars—Eldon Fortia, Virgil Carter, John Ogden and Phil Odle.

In 1965 the Cougars were fourth in the nation in total offense, and last year they moved into second place second only to Houston with over 400 yards

per game.

Earl comes by offensive talent naturally. In 1953, while playing at Utah State, he led the nation in scoring.

A native of Wellsville. Utah, he was all-state at South Cache. He went on to Utah State where he

was an all-conference halfback.

Following graduation, he was signed by the Edmonton Eskimos in the Canadian League. He was a regular for four years, but an injury cut short his playing career.

Moving into the coaching ranks, he developed some successful teams at Idaho Falls High School. He

joined the staff at BYU in 1962.

Earl is married to the former Marilyn Jensen, and they have four children: Greg (13), Teresa (11), Lance (6), and Corey (3).

JOHN PAYNE (OSU '55)

The 1966 season was John Payne's first as offensive line coach at Brigham Young University, The team's record is a pretty good indication of John's efforts in that direction.

Payne came to BYU a year ago last spring from Central State College in Edmand, Okla., where he

was defensive coach at Central.

A native of Wewrite Okla. John was all-state guard and a participant in the Texas-Oklahoma Shrine All-Star game. He enrolled at Oklahoma State University and won All-Missouri Valley honors as a senior.

He coached three years at Tulsa Central High and became acquainted with another coach new to the profession, Tom Hudspeth. He moved to McLain High School as athletic director and head football coach, a post he held for five years. He took the post at Central in 1964, and his team tied for the conference title the following year.

John is married to the former Dorothy Robinson, and they have four children; Jenifer (8), Jeff (6),

Heather (3) and Robby (1).

WAYNE STARTIN (BYU '59)

In two seasons as freshman coach, Wayne Startin's team compiled a 7-1 record. Perhaps that is one reason Coach Hudspeth moved Startin to the varsity staff for the 1967 season. In his new capacity, Wayne will serve as chief scout and offensive coach.

A native of Murray, Utah, Wayne was acclaimed as one of the finest quarterbacks ever to come out of the Beehive State. He was all-state as a junior and senior. He enrolled at BYU and was a regular for three varsity seasons. He was co-captain of the team that

beat Utah in 1958.

Swinging into high school coaching in 1959 at Olympus High, he spent three years with the Titans before joining the staff at the new Skyline High School in 1962, He joined the staff at BYU in 1964.

Wayne is married to the former Janice Nelson, and they have four children: Bryant (12), Judith (10),

Nancy (8), and Jill (3).

DICK FELT (BYU '55)

The man who will take over the job as freshman coach at BYU this fall is Dick Felt, seven-year veteran in the American Football League, who retired from the pro ranks earlier this year.

One of the all-time greats at BYU, Felt was an all-conference halfback for the Cougars in the early

50's.

A native of Lehi. Utah, he played with the Cougar varsity from 1951-54. He was called on a church mission in 1955, and returned to BYU at the completion of his mission. He graduated from BYU in 1958 and was commissioned an officer in the U.S. Air Force. For two years he played with Boeing Air Force Base in Washington, and in 1959 was named the most valuable in the Air Force and outstanding back in service ball.

Launching his career with the pros. Dick was signed by the New York Titans. He played two seasons with the Titans and was then traded to the Boston Patriots where he spent the balance of his pro career.

Dick is married to the former Dayleen Hobson, and they have three children; Karen (6), Curtis (4) and Kristie (1).

TRAINERS

The training chares for this year's team will be shared by Rod Kimball, veteran of 28 years with Cougar teams, and comparative newcomer Marv Roberson.

Rod just recently returned from a 50-day tour of the Orient-Pacific with the BYU basketball team, but should be back with the gridiron troops before the

first game.

Without doubt, Rod is the most traveled man on the BYU campus, and his trips abroad with BYU teams include four tours to Europe and two to South America.

Rod grew up in Jordan, Utah, where he was an outstanding athlete. He graduated from BYU, and has spent most of his life in service to the school and the Mormon church. He and his wife have 12 living children.

Mary Roberson will be remembered by many BYU fans as a large-size shot putter on Cougar track teams of several years ago. He graduated from BYU in '57, then moved to Stanford where he picked up his M.A. degree and was assistant trainer for the Indians for four years.

In 1962 he was named head trainer at Foothill College in Los Altos, and it was during this period that he picked up additional experience with the pros and served as a trainer at the East-West Shrine game.

Mary left Footh? in 1966 to join the staff at BYU. He is a native of Long Beach, Calif., and he and his wife, Doris, have three children.

THE OUTLOOK

Never one to dwell too long on victory or defeat, head coach Tommy Hudspeth is looking to the future—with major reservations, of course. It seems there are some tender areas in the football body where the Cougars could be hurting this season and the young mentor is concerned.

"We are going to be very inexperienced in critical spots this season due to the fact that our inside attack—the backbone of our offense—has been cleaned out. As a result, we can't be compared to the squad of last year."

The above might be classed as an understatement, since the loss of key personnel has been painful for all remaining behind. A dilemma stems from the question, what do you do when you lose two ball players who accounted for 8,730 yards and 70 touchdowns between then in three years with the varsity?

The two players in point are All-America quarter-back Virgil Carter, the nation's leader in total offense in 1966, and fullback John Ogden, the Western Athletic Conference's leading ground gainer for three consecutive seasons. Carter and Ogden are only two of 19 lettermen from last year's 8-2 squad that will not be returning.

Since the Cougar inside attack was a big factor in the team's recent successes, the critical spots are right down the middle—quarterback, fullback, center and offensive guard. This is the area, and these are the positions, that will be drawing most of the attention in 1967. There are only two returning lettermen in the entire BYU backfield.

The immediate task is to find a replacement for Carter at quarterback. Heading the list of candidates are two newcomers, neither of whom has played any varsity ball for the Cougars. John Erdhaus, a junior college All-American from Santa Monica City College, threw more touchdown passes than did Carter last year, and he was credited with over 2,300 yards total offense. The Cougars may also have a quarterback find in sophomore Terry Sanford, a slightly-built scrambler who stood out in spring practice while Erdhaus nursed an injured limb. Along with the two aforementioned, there is Marc Lyons, a '66 redshirt whose freshman pasing record rivaled that of Carter.

Regardless of who anchors the quarterback spot, the Cougars will have some outstanding passing targets in the likes of Phil Odle, All-America candidate at split end, and flanker back Casey Boyett. Between them, Odle and Boyett caught 99 pases good for 1,550 yards last year. For this reason alone, Cougar fans and opponents can be looking for a strong passing game from the '67 team.



Redoubtable Phil Odle, WAC lineman of the year in 1965, is one of the outstanding receivers and ball players in the nation. A strong All-American candidate, Odle is credited with 106 receptions for 1,577 yards in two years with the Cougars.

Lending balance to the offense will be ball carriers like Perry Rodrigue (third in rushing with 276 yards in 1966); Wally Hawkins, power-running junior; sophomore Ron Wakley, the fullback prospect who looked so good in spring practice; plus some new rushers, most of them sophomores.

If and when the Cougars are able to fortify the interior of the offensive line, they should have a fairly mobile offense, although it isn't expected to match the 400 yards per game rolled up by last year's club which ranked second in the nation in that department.

It's when attention shifts to defense that the Cougars strengths emerge. Defensively, the line is the deepest it has been since Hudspeth came to BYU. While the Cougars will miss the likes of Curg Belcher and Glen Gardner, the defensive unit remains formidable. Defensive halfback Bobby Roberts, co-captain and first team All-WAC choice in '66, will be the key man in the defensive secondary, and the line-backer spots will be anchored by veterans Sid Frazier and Craig Bozich.

As a whole, the team is fairly deep and experienced in all but the critical positions. There is no scatback, and the overall speed is, at best, average. Only heart, and the desire to excell, will keep this team from "suffering by comparison" with its fore-runner,

PHIL ODLE

Phil Odle, BYU's co-captain and senior split end, should be the class of the pass receivers in the Rocky Mountain-Southwest during the 1967 football season.

In 1965 Odle, then a sophomore, set a record pace for his college career at BYU by catching 46 passes for 657 yards and 11 touchdowns. Odle was the prime mover in BYU's drive to its first football championship.

Odle was subsequently named Lineman of the Year in the Western Athletic Conference, the only sophomore to date to receive that distinction.

Last year as a junior and with several other outstanding receivers alternating in the lineup. Odle not only improved his sophomore performance, but he nearly doubled his 1965 statistics.

Odle caught a record 60 passes and accounted for 920 yards to lead BYU receivers for the second consecutive season. Odle's two year total makes him the WAC career record holder in passes caught (106), total yards pass receiving (1577), and touchdown passes caught (16).

An all-WAC first team end for the past two years, Odle holds every pass receiving record in the BYU record book.

On the basis of Odle's performance and leadership qualities he must be considered as a strong candidate for 1967 all-American football honors.

Victims of the BYLL offense included San Jose State Colorado State, Utah State, New Mexico. Arizona Texas Western, Utah and Pacific. The Cougars lost to Arizona State 10-7, and absorbed a 14-47 thrashing at the hands of Wyoming in a contest that decided the WAC championship.

A reflection of the '66 successes is found, in part, in the records set. At final count, more than 100 school and stadium records were either broken or tied.

exclusive of WAC marks.

In fact, the sweep of old gridiron standards was so complete that only a few prior to 1965 are remaining. Everything from attendance to PAT's went by the boards as the Cougars roared through a remarkable 8-2 season.

As was expected, quarterback Virgil Carter cut the biggest chunk out of the old record book. The brilliant senior also set or tied several NCAA all-time standards, including the following:

-Most offensive plays in a career, 1,059.

-Most yards total offense in a career, 6,354.

-Most touchdown passes thrown in a career, fied with 50.

—Most touchdowns responsible for in a career, 68.

-Most yards passing in one game, 513.

—Most yards total offense one game, 599.

When Carter's career yardage is combined with that of fullback John Ogden, the total is a whopping 8.730 yards, roughly five miles rushed and passed for during a three-year period. This may very well be the best figure ever put together by a pair of teammates in the history of the game.

Others to earn a spot in the record book include Phil Odle, who has caught over 100 passes in two seasons; Ben Laverty, who set four kicking marks; plus half a dozen other marks set by standouts like Kent Oborn.

Casey Boyett, etc.

But it wasn't all offense. The defense was responsible for stopping opponents and turning the ball over to the offensive unit. Last year BYU set a new school record in rushing defense by limiting opponents to 105 yards rushing per game.

The 1966 team also topped anything in the area in drawing power. BYU drew 158,139 fans to six home games, and the largest crowd ever to gather for an athletic event in Utah-38,333-was on hand for

the championship game with Wyoming.

In all, the Cougars played before 245,839 fans. not counting the thousands who watched them perform on a regional telecast or the Texas Western game that was telecast into El Paso, Texas.

Looking back on the 8-2 season, it appears the

Cougars were at their best against the Miners from Texas Western. In one of the greatest offensive shows ever played in college football, the two teams had a combined total offense of 1,014 yards. A total of 99 passes were thrown, and 86 points were scored by both clubs.

Carter threw five touchdown passes and amassed a total of 599 yards total offense, the most ever in

one game by a college football player.

By any standard of measurement, the 1966 football season at BYU has to be regarded as the most successful in the school's history. The overall record of eight wins against only two losses tops anything in Cougar history.

Moreover, the Cougars had a super-charged offense. According to NCAA statistics, only one other team—Houston—had a greater offensive average for the 1966 season, In ten games the Cougars piled up 4,006 yards offense, an average of over 400 yards

per game.

But there is one record that won't go into the books that should be noted: Biggest lump in the throat of a coach as he thinks about his departing seniors. Coach Tommy Hudspeth may have to wait a few seasons to top that one.

NO. 40 - Eldon Fortie Tailback, 1960-61-62

Eldon "The Phantom" Fortie became Brigham Young University's first Consensus All-American in 1962. Playing from the tailback position in the singlewing offense. Fortie led the nation in total offense for eight weeks, finishing second in the final NCAA statistics with 1,963 yards. At the time, this was the fifth highest total ever recorded in NCAA football history.

He was voted WAC Back of the Year and honorary captain of all-conference team, and he was among the top six in the nation in the UPI national poll for Back of the Year. Fortie was also among the top ten in the Heisman Trophy balloting, and during the 1962 season was voted Back of the Week by UPI and Sports Illustrated.

The first BYU player ever to have his jersey retired. Fortie participated in three post-season all-star games; North-South Shrine (Miami), All-America Bowl (Tucson), and Hula Bowl (Honolulu).

NO. 81 - Marion Probert End, 1952-53-54

The number worn by Marion Probert, co-captain of the 1954 squad, was retired in 1965 following a tragic air crash at Point of the Mountain, Utah, that claimed the lives of eight alumni football boosters who were en route to a championship game in New Mexico.

Probert, who was a high school All-America selection from Hawthorne, Calif., passed up scores of offers to other schools in order to attend BYU. Besides being a fine all-round player, Probert was generally acknowledged as the hardest-hitting player on the squad. He was an all-conference selection for two years.

An outstanding student as well, Marion had several quarters of straight-A work and was twice named to the Academic All-America team. He was student body president at Inglewood High, and during his areer at BYU he was division commander of the Air orce ROTC.

He attended the University of Pennsylvania Medical School and received the Doctor of Medicine degree in 1959, and was practicing in Salt Lake City at the time of his death.
