

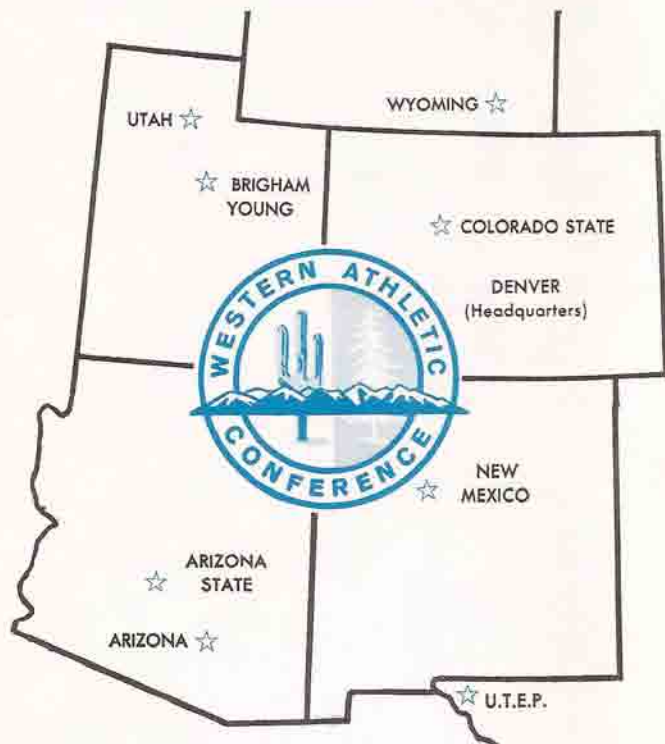

EIGHT TEAMS IN SIX STATES

This fall, when the Western Athletic Conference begins its seventh year, the league will have a new commissioner and two new member institutions.

The new commissioner is Wiles Hallock, former NCAA Director of Public Relations and Director of Special Services, who replaced Dr. Paul Brechler this summer. Brechler had served in this post since the WAC was founded on July 1, 1962.

July 1, 1968, is the date the Western Athletic Conference officially expanded to eight teams. New member schools are Colorado State University of Fort Collins, Colo., and University of Texas at El Paso. Charter members are Arizona State University, University of Arizona, Brigham Young University, University of New Mexico, University of Utah, and University of Wyoming.

The eight schools in the Rocky Mountain-Southwest region are spread over six states. Conference headquarters are located in Denver, Colo., with offices at 1515 Cleveland Place (Denver-Hilton).

THE UNIVERSITY

Brigham Young University, the fountainhead of learning for The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints is among the largest church-related institutions of higher learning in the country. Within the University there are 13 colleges, and the graduate school offers the doctoral degree in 14 departments.

The school is located in beautiful Utah Valley on a bench overlooking Provo, Utah, a community of almost 42,000 people. Rugged mountains in the Wasatch range border the valley on three sides, the Utah Lake forms a border on the west.

Forty-five miles to the north is Salt Lake City, capital of Utah and historic center of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, (commonly called the Mormon Church).

This is the setting. But the school is more than this. It is a center of higher learning which places special emphasis on spiritual values, on friendly association, and on knowledge. But in any setting, the school would be unique because of its atmosphere.

DR. ERNEST L. WILKINSON UNIVERSITY PRESIDENT

If any one individual can be credited as the driving force behind BYU's dramatic growth, it is Dr. Ernest L. Wilkinson who has served as the president of the University since 1951. It is generally accepted that no other person has played such a significant role in building the school into the institution it is today.

Born and raised in Ogden, Utah, Dr. Wilkinson attended Weber College before transferring to BYU. He was editor of the campus newspaper and was a formidable debater at BYU prior to his graduation in 1921. He pursued his education at George Washington Law School, graduating summa cum laude. He continued graduate work, receiving the degree of juridical science from Harvard.

He had an illustrious career as a lawyer, and was widely respected in the field. But in 1951 he accepted a challenge in another field, education. Since his appointment, the enrollment has increased many fold, and more than 80 major, permanent buildings have been constructed on campus. In 1965, one of these buildings, the spacious new student activities building was named in his honor.

DR. MILTON F. HARTVIGSEN, COLLEGE DEAN

There is a reason why they call the Cougars' modern athletic complex "Milt's Miracle Mile." The tag put on the Y's extensive facilities alludes to some of the contributions made to the College of Physical Education by Dr. Milton F. Hartvigsen, dean of the college.

A former teacher, coach, principal and superin-

tendent of schools in Idaho. Dr. Hartvigsen came to BYU in 1956 after obtaining his Ed.D. at UCLA. He was a 1930 graduate of Utah State University and obtained his M.Ed. from the Logan school.

Since coming to BYU, Dr. Hartvigsen has helped shape one of the finest athletic complexes in the country. His programs, which have won wide-spread commendation, are the result of his own keen planning, careful design, and forceful administration.

Dr. Hartvigsen serves as chairman of the Athletic Advisory Council, and has served on several key NCAA assignments. He was voted professor of the year at BYU in 1963.

FLOYD MILLET, DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

Nobody—coach, athlete or fan—likes to win more than does Floyd Millet, the University's director of athletics since 1964. And the fact that some of the Cougars' greatest moments in sports have come within the last three years is by no means coincidental.

An all-round athlete and all-conference performer at BYU, Millet won a reputation as one of the hard-nosed set by the time he graduated in 1934. He entered coaching and obtained his M.A. degree from USC in 1939.

He served in a number of coaching capacities—football, track and basketball—and was director of athletics before resigning to enter private business. Even so, he kept a hand in athletics, serving as chairman of the athletic committee of the General Board of the YMMIA. He directed one of the largest athletic programs in the world in that capacity.

TOMMY HUDSPETH

It takes a special kind of person, one with a variety of talents, to reshape a football also-ran into a winner. But whatever it takes, Tommy J. Hudspeth has it. And BYU fans are quick to credit the Cougars' sudden emergence on the college football scene to the 37-year-old former pro coach who established a new dynasty at the Provo school.

When Hudspeth took the helm more than four years ago, football at BYU was at low ebb. The 1964 season found Tommy fighting for time as he sought to lay the ground work for a new program. The first season ended with a 3-6-1 record. The following fall Hudspeth and his staff took a team that was nearly everybody's choice for last place and guided it to a conference championship, the first football title in the school's history. Adding and refining along the way, Hudspeth's third season at BYU produced an 8-2 season record, the finest mark in a 45-year span of football at BYU. Then last fall the Cougars posted a 6-4 record for their third consecutive winning season.

Tom's record after four seasons as head coach is 23-16-1.

While winning is the name of the game, Tom's other contributions have been equally important. His brand of football is one of the most colorful and exciting found anywhere. His teams have been able to generate a wide-open type offense that fans thrive on. This renewed interest is reflected in the attendance figures. Average home attendance zoomed to 26,357 at home games in 1966, and last year's average at home was a respectable 24,840.

Born in Cherryvale, Kansas, Tom attended school in Afton, Oklahoma, where he was an all-state quarterback. He moved from Afton to the University of Tulsa, where he captained the freshman football team. In three seasons with the Hurricane varsity, he played on both the offensive and defensive units; quarterback and defensive safety. In his three years with the Hurricane varsity the team compiled a 26-5-2 record, and in his final season he was team captain. In his senior year he set a school record with six pass interceptions, a mark that stood 14 years until Jeff Jordan (Minnesota Vikings) picked off seven in 1964.

Tom and his teammates played in the Gator Bowl his senior year.

Following graduation, Tom launched his coaching career at Norman High School. This was interrupted by a two-year stint in the U.S. Air Force as a commissioned officer. He was discharged as a first lieutenant in 1955, and returned to the coaching ranks at Tulsa Central High. His team at Central posted a 6-2-1 record.



A coaching job on the college level opened up at Tulsa in 1956, and Tom joined his alma mater as freshman coach under Bobby Dobbs. He remained an assistant there from 1957 to 1960. When Dobbs was named head coach of the Calgary Stampeders, Hudspeth, then 28, went with him as an assistant. In the three years he spent with the Stampeders they were conference contenders every season.

At age 32, after six seasons in the college and professional ranks, Tom was chosen to head the football program at BYU. Starting virtually from scratch, he moved BYU football rapidly to the forefront. The Cougars won the WAC championship in 1965, and Tom captured UPI Coach of the Year honors, and was named **Coach and Athlete's Rocky Mountain Coach of the Year**.

Hudspeth's leadership qualities extend beyond the football field. In college he was president of the senior class, and he has served as a member of the high council in one of the BYU campus stakes.

In addition to his coaching duties, Tom also serves as assistant director of athletics at BYU. He has completed most of the requirements for his master's degree in counseling.

Tom is married to the former Ruth Ann Sandmire, and they have three children: Max (13), Phil (10), and Melissa (2).

COACHING STAFF

LaVell Edwards (Utah State '52)

Of the changes made on the BYU coaching staff this year, none is more significant than the selection of LaVell Edwards as assistant head coach. Edwards, who is now in his eighth year on the Cougar staff, will continue to work with the defensive line.

It would appear that Edwards has perfected the play in the Cougars' defensive line. Last year BYU held opponents to an average of 87.4 yards rushing per game, a school defensive record. In three games, opponents had 16 or less yards rushing for the entire game. The year before, when BYU had an 8-2 record, two opponents had minus-yardage rushing. In 1966 the Cougars were ranked among the top 25 in rushing defense, and last fall they moved up to 12th in that department.

A coach who maintains good rapport with the players, LaVell joined the Cougar staff in 1961.

Edwards' football career commenced almost within the shadows of BYU. He won all-state honors as a lineman at Orem High School, which is just a few miles from the BYU campus. He attended Utah State University where he was team captain and an all-conference player for two years.

Called into the service soon after graduation from USU, Edwards spent two years in the Army at Fort Mead, Maryland. In 1954 he returned to his home state to take the position of head coach at Granite High School in Salt Lake City.

LaVell is married to the former Patti Covey, and they have three children—Ann (12), John (10), and James (6). Edwards is also bishop of the BYU 36th Ward.

CHRIS APOSTOL (Utah State '50)

The veteran member of the BYU staff is Chris Apostol, who has been a member of the football staff since 1959. In recent years Chris' assignment has been with the defensive backfield. But this year Apostol will concentrate on the offensive line.

To use an old cliché, to know him is to like him. Chris was once described as "Will Rogers Revisited." He has a dry kind of humor, and he is easy-going on the exterior.

Born and raised in copper-mining country, Chris won all-state honors in football at Bingham High where he was also student body president. He played his college ball at Utah State University under E. L. "Dick" Romney and George Melinkovich.

Soon after graduation from Utah State in 1950, Chris joined the staff at Ogden High School. He

spent a total of nine years on the Ogden staff, and his record as head coach was 44-13-2. The last team he coached at Ogden won the state class "A" championship and was 11-0 for the season. Seven of these games were shutouts.

Chris is married to the former Marva Funk, and they have five children ranging in age from 17 to 8—Kristine, Konn, Kip, Kurt, and Kami.

WAYNE STARTIN (BYU '59)

This season finds the Cougars offensive backs under the direction of Wayne Startin. Last year Wayne served as chief scout and worked with the offense, and for two years prior to that he coached the freshman footballers to a 7-1 record. Needless to say, Wayne has demonstrated an unusual knowledge of the game of football.

Startin's grasp of the game comes quite naturally. As a prep star at Murray High School just outside of Salt Lake City, Wayne was hailed as one of the finest quarterbacks ever to play in the Beehive State. He was selected all-state as a junior and as a senior.

After his enrollment at BYU, Startin was a regular for three seasons, and in his senior year he was co-captain of the team that beat Utah for the second time in the long Beehive series. He graduated with a B.S. degree in 1959.

Wayne returned to the Salt Lake City area where he was head coach at Olympus High School. He spent three years with the Titans before moving to the new Skyline High School in 1962. Two years later he joined the staff at BYU.

Coach Startin is married to the former Janice Nelson, and they have four children—Bryant (13), Judith (11), Nancy (9), and Jill (4).

DICK FELT (BYU '55)

As new defensive backfield coach, Dick Felt should feel right at home with his assignment this fall. Dick joined the Cougar staff last year, guiding the freshmen to a 3-1 season record. His frosh rolled up 152 points to their opponents' 50.

Prior to joining the Hudspeth staff as an assistant, Felt spent seven years in the American Football League. As a defensive back, he served two years with the old New York Titans and the balance of his pro career with the Boston Patriots.

During his college days at BYU, Felt was one of the Cougars' all-time greats. He was an all-conference halfback his senior year.

At native of Lehi, Utah, he played with the Cougar varsity from 1951-54. He was called on a church mission in 1955, and thereafter returned to campus to graduate in 1958. Having accepted a commission in the U.S. Air Force, he was fortunate enough to spend two years playing ball with Boeing Air Force Base in Washington. In 1959 he was named the most valuable player in the Air Force.

Dick is married to the former Dayleen Hobson, and they have three children—Karen (7), Curtis (4), and Kristie (2).

H. G. LINFORD (Utah '59)

Newest member of the varsity staff is H. G. Linford, former head coach at Skyline High School in Salt Lake City. Linford, who joined the staff this year, will work with the offensive line.

To say the 31-year-old Linford has already tasted his share of success is putting it mildly. His teams at Skyline lost only three games in his last four seasons. In 1964 his team finished with a 9-1 record. In 1965 the Eagles came up with another 9-1, and they duplicated that mark again in 1966. Last year Skyline won the state class "A" title with a 12-0 season record.

Linford graduated from Jordan High School in 1955 and four years later had his degree from the University of Utah. He worked his way up in the

coaching ranks, eventually joining Wayne Startin's staff at Skyline.

At 6' 5", Linford seems to tower over the other members of the staff. He is married to the former Kathleen Clark, and they have two children—Scott (5) and Jill (3).

LES MILLER (Kansas State College '58)

The responsibility of coaching the BYU freshman team in '68 will fall to Les Miller, a 31-year-old veteran coach and scout who joined the staff this fall. He comes to BYU from Memorial High School in Joplin, Missouri.

Born and raised in Oklahoma (Tommy Hudspeth's old stomping grounds), Miller was an all-state quarterback and all-state basketball player. He played one year at Oklahoma State, then moved to Kansas State College where he graduated in 1958. He served as an assistant coach at KSC.

In 1958-59 he coached at Afton, Oklahoma, then spent 1960-62 at McLain High School in Tulsa. In 1963 he coached at Memorial High in Tulsa, then left coaching to enter private business. In the meantime, he remained active in sports by scouting teams in the Midwest area. After his return to coaching last year, his team at Memorial in Joplin had a 5-3-2 record.

Les is married to the former Joyce Holmquist, and they have two children—Mike (12) and Debra (9).

TRAINERS

The training chores for this year's team will be shared by **Rod Kimball**, veteran of 29 years with Cougar teams, and comparative newcomer **Marv Roberson**.

Rod grew up in Jordan, Utah, where he was an outstanding athlete. He graduated from BYU, and has spent most of his life in service to the school and the Mormon church. He and his wife have 12 living children.

Marv Roberson will be remembered by many BYU fans as a large-size shot putter on Cougar track teams of several years ago. He graduated from BYU in '57, then moved to Stanford where he picked up his M.A. degree and was assistant trainer for the Indians for four years.

Marv became head trainer at Foothill College in 1962. He joined the BYU staff in 1966. He is a native of Long Beach, California, and he and his wife, Doris, have three children.

1967 IN REVIEW

What do you call a team that kills the giant-killers?

It's hard to say, but BYU's football team might qualify for such a title, since they beat the team (Oregon State) that knocked over some of college football's major powers in the 1967 season.

Looking back on their '67 efforts, the Cougars decided that the 31 - 13 win over the Beavers has to be the high-point of the year. Oregon State beat Purdue and USC and tied UCLA. All of this happened after the Cougars had scored their big win at Corvallis.

"It was the best performance we have had from a BYU team since I've been here," said head football coach Tommy Hudspeth.

The overall record will be listed in the books as six wins against four defeats, but all of the losses came against teams that had extraordinary seasons.

As a matter of fact, the combined win-loss record of the four teams that defeated BYU was 31 victories, six defeats and two ties.

Bowl-bound Wyoming, the team that gave the Cougars their first loss of the season, finished with a 10-0 record, the only major undefeated, untied team in the nation.

Texas Western, also bowl-bound, handed the Cougars their second defeat and had an overall 6-2-1 record. Utah State, after a slow start, stopped BYU at Logan, then went on to finish with a 7-2-1 mark. Arizona State, also mentioned for a bowl bid, watched the sun go down on a very fine 8-2 record.

Plagued by injuries, the Cougars might have fared a little better with the team at full strength. As it turned out, the Cougars went into the final game of the season against San Jose with both the offensive and defensive units paper-thin. And, surprisingly, the Cougars rolled up one of the highest scores in the school's history, 67-8, in the finale against the Spartans.

In terms of scoring, the '67 season was the best on record as the Cougars piled up 278 points, nine more than they had in 1966.

Like the other teams Hudspeth has had in tow, last year's club flourished on a wide-open offense. For the third year in a row the Cougars were ranked among the nation's leaders in total offense.

In '65 BYU was fourth in the nation (369.1 yards per game), and in '66 was ranked second in the country (400.6 yards per game). Last year the Cougars placed sixth among the nation's offense teams with 396.2 per game average.

But BYU's success was more than offense. Defensively, the Cougars held up well in the rushing department. From the start the BYU defenders were among

the nation's leaders in rushing defense, and they finished the season as 12th in that category. Over a 10-game route they gave up an average of 87.4 yards per game in rushing.

ODLE MAKES THE DIFFERENCE

It's by no means coincidental that BYU's three years among the nation's offensive leaders came during the same period split end Phil Odle was a member of the Cougar varsity.

Only one other player in the history of NCAA football has caught more passes over a three-year playing career, and only two other players in college football annals have accounted for more yardage on pass receptions.

Here's where Odle ranks in the all-time NCAA pass receiving statistics:

3. 2,548 - Phil Odle, Brigham Young (1965-67)

On the conference level Odle holds virtually all of the pass receiving marks in the WAC. As a sophomore he was good enough to win WAC lineman of the year honors, and he is one of only a few players to be named to the official WAC all-conference team three consecutive years.

PATERA SCORES

One of the best things to happen to BYU football last season was kicking specialist Dennis Patera. The senior track star donned a BYU football uniform for the first time early last fall.

The net result for the Cougars was 62 points on field goals and extra points.

THE OUTLOOK

Everybody knows that 1968 is a political year. But as far as the Cougars are concerned, the football field is no place for platitudinous platforms or campaign promises. As BYU sees it, it's going to be a time for hard-nosed grubbing at the grass-roots level.

This may seem strange for those football buffs who size up a team by its lettermen count, because the Cougars look impressive when reduced to figures on paper. After all, a total of 30 lettermen are returning from the '67 team that was the highest scoring in the school's history. This group includes two quarterbacks who alternated as starters most of last year, plus the seven leading rushers of 1967. That is a nice bundle of talent, but it is not evenly spread.

THREE-YEAR LETTERMEN

For example, of the 17 lettermen **not** returning, 10 are three-year lettermen, most of them regulars in the interior line. This list includes veterans like tackles Max Newberry (all-WAC), Max Huber (all-WAC second unit), Dick Banky, Tom Baltzer and Leo Presley. That's a pretty big chunk of experience to lose at the tackle positions.

Lettermen losses will also be felt in other specialized areas. Two of the departed are split end Phil Odle and place kicker Dennis Patera. Odle was the mainstay of BYU's pass receiving corps for three years, a span in which he won all-conference honors three consecutive seasons. Only one other receiver in the history of NCAA football has caught more passes than Odle. As for Patera, he led all Cougar scorers last year with a total of 62 points, kicking at least one field goal in each game.

LINE LOSS

These and other losses have thinned and weakened the Cougars in vital spots. The pinch will be felt the most in the offensive and defensive lines. It may also extend to the defensive backfield where the Cougars need more speed and depth to make up for the loss of a pair of three-year lettermen (safety Terry Colson and all-WAC halfback Bobby Roberts).

Last year the Y's offensive line did a commendable job in allowing the backs to rush and pass for an average of 396 yards per game. The defensive line, meanwhile, was limiting opponents to 87 yards per game rushing.

QUARTERBACKS

At this writing it would appear the Cougars' strong points will be in the offensive backfield and among its receivers. Quarterbacks Marc Lyons and Terry Sanford both won their spurs as sophomore signal callers last year. Lyons passed for 1,313 yards and nine touchdowns, setting a new school record



(best completion percentage for one season: .508) in the process. Sanford, who logged 228 yards rushing, threw eight TD passes. Backing these two juniors this fall will be sophomore Rick Jones, a 6-1 former all-stater from Pocatello, Idaho. Rick throws the ball very well.

This year's running backs all have respectable rushing averages. The group includes senior fullback Tom Rippee (4.3), Wally Hawkins (4.3), Ron Wakley (4.7), and Ken Call (4.7). The best of the sophomore backs will be fullback Chris Reading, tailback Kip Jackson, and wingback Neil Bingham.

NEW ENDS

Even die-hards have to admit that the Cougars won't be the same at split end. Nobody can match the departed Phil Odle. But the position should be adequate with Boyett in the lineup. Casey planned to forego his final year of college ball in order to turn professional, but since the draft last winter, has changed his mind. Boyett was second only to Odle in pass receiving in 1966 and 1967. Other candidates at split end are junior letterman John Paterson, transfer Ed Romero, and sophomores Chris Farasopoulos, Larry Heaps, and Dan Bowers.

Defensively, the Cougars will place a letterman in all but two of the starting positions. Sophomore Gerald Meyer (235) has the edge at the right tackle, and non-letterman Larry Echohawk, a junior, will likely get the nod at safety. Craig Bozich, all-WAC linebacker and Cougar tri-captain, is in a class by himself. He should rank with the nation's best in that position. A potential star in the defensive secondary is Paul Sutorius, a junior halfback.

KICKERS

As for the Cougars' kicking game, the points will be harder to come by in '68. Steve Christensen, a transfer from Ricks College, will do most of the place kicking. The punting chores will fall to Rich Adams, a junior who averaged 41.4 yards per kick last year.

Nobody likes to postpone a good season. And if the pieces fall into place at the right time, it may develop that the Cougars won't have to this fall. But with the WAC now expanded to eight teams, the chances are the Cougars will be caught in a stampede by bigger, stronger clubs.

CRAIG BOZICH, Linebacker, 213, 6-1, Senior, Aurora, Colorado. By far the finest all-around football player on the Cougar squad, Bozich looms as a definite All-America candidate. Craig has been a starter for the Cougars since the first game of his sophomore year. Last year he led the team in defensive statistics, and he was chosen to the first team of the All-WAC. An outstanding all-around athlete at Aurora Central High School, he won seven letters in three sports and was drafted by the Detroit Tigers in the first free agent baseball draft. A good student, he was also a member of the National Honor Society. Gifted with a special football sense, Craig is a natural. Last fall when the Cougars were routing an opponent, Bozich was switched to fullback. He carried the ball twice, setting a new stadium record for the longest run from scrimmage on his second carry.

CASEY BOYETT, Split End, 6-1, 188, Senior, Jena, Louisiana. Casey represents half of the Cougars' great pass-catching team of Odle and Boyett. Although Odle had top billing, Boyett has displayed a lot of class of his own in two seasons. In his sophomore year he caught 39 passes for 630 yards and six TDs. Last year, although injured during part of the season, he caught 37 passes for 479 yards. He has excellent hands, great speed and maneuverability, and could play any position where speed is needed. Casey was drafted by the San Francisco 49ers at the end of last season, but still has one year of eligibility left in college ball. It now appears he will be with the Cougars this fall. He was selected to the WAC All-Academic team, and was also selected on one of the Academic All-American squads.

PAUL SUTORIUS, Defensive Halfback, 6-0, 175, Junior, Duarte, California. A relative newcomer, Sutorius had an excellent sophomore year. He intercepted three passes, working in the defensive secondary with Bobby Roberts. With Roberts graduating, Sutorius is sure to be one of the top defensive men in the league and the region. He has excellent reactions and good football sense, lacks nothing in moxie. A good student, Paul made the honor roll at Duarte High where he was also junior and senior class president.

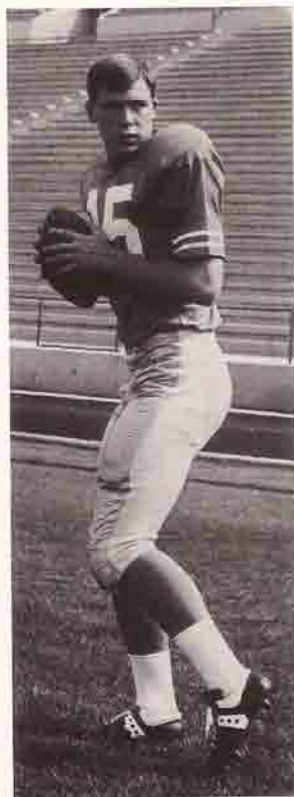

Last Meeting: September 23, 1967, at Provo, Utah. In the season opener for the Cougars, New Mexico fell hard, 44-14. Three BYU quarterbacks (Erdhaus, Lyons and Sanford) threw five touchdown passes between them. But the Lobos, with Stone doing the pitching, actually ran up more yardage passing; 27 of 51 for 386 yards. The weather was clear, and 26,558 fans watched the night game in Cougar Stadium.

San Jose's only TD came on a Munson to Blackledge pass late in the fourth quarter.

THE STADIUM

Football fans at BYU still refer to their playing field as the "new" football stadium, and this feeling still reflects the new gridiron spirit at Cougarville.

Built in 1964, the BYU Stadium originally had a capacity of 26,812. When it was inaugurated on Oct. 2, 1964, over 33,000 fans were crammed into every possible corner to watch the Cougars play New Mexico.

The sudden rise in popularity of BYU football, coupled with BYU's first football championship in 1965, prompted University officials to authorize the addition of 4,080 new seats.

Total seating capacity is currently 30,000. With the addition of temporary bleachers in the north and south ends of the football field, total capacity will be in the neighborhood of 35,000.

The completion of the stadium is a classic example of community effort. A good part of the construction cost was gained from personal donations from students, faculty, staff, interested residents, alumni, and friends.

Ground was broken for the stadium in October 1963. A year later it was in use. Total area involved for the construction was 36.5 acres, over 20 acres of which are being used for parking.

The lighting for the stadium is the best available. The towering light standards are over 16 stories high, and when the lights are turned on, about 576,000 watts of electricity are directed to the playing field.

Surrounding the playing field is a rubberized asphalt track, recognized as one of the best in the nation. The stadium was the site of the 1966 WAC track and field championships and the 1967 NCAA track and field championships.
