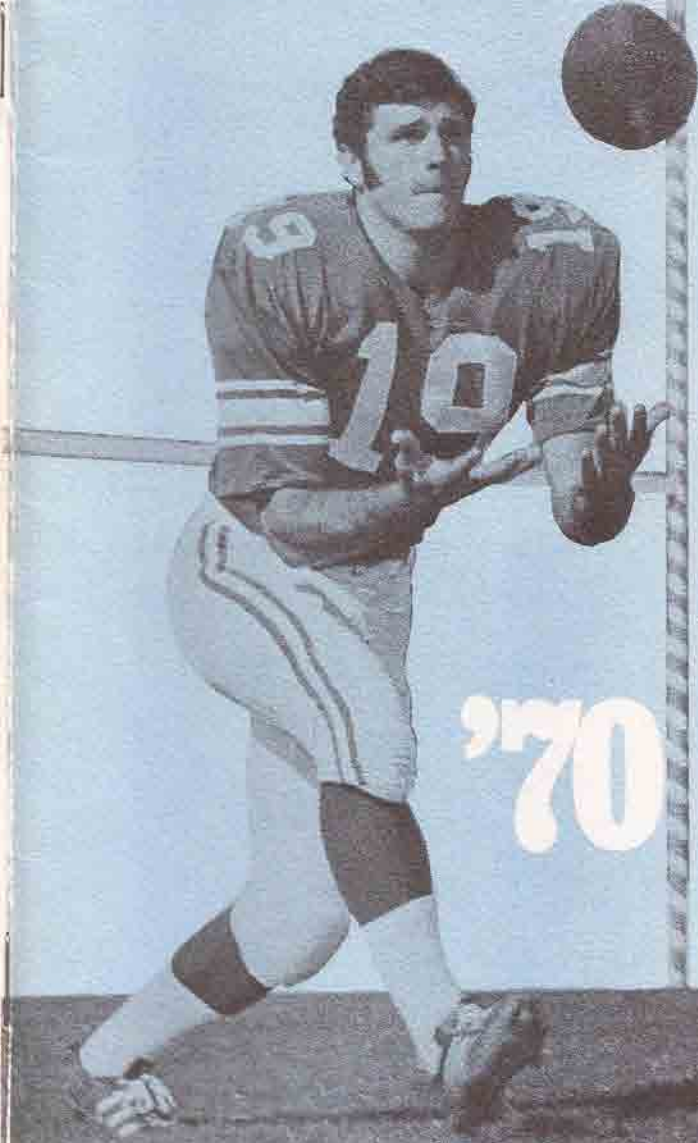
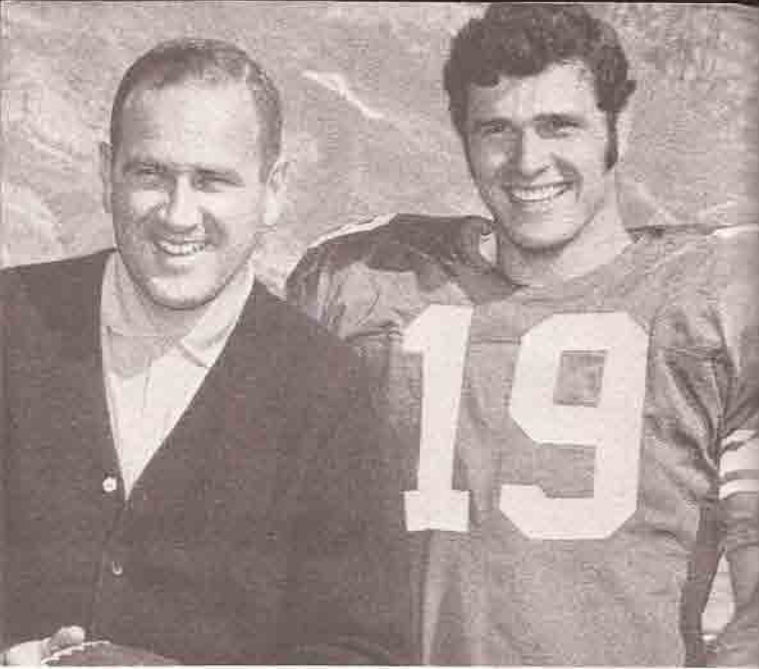

19 — Chris Farasopoulos, defensive back and return specialist, 6-0, 190, 22, Senior, Torrence, Calif. The Player pictured above with Coach Tom Hudspeth, and the man on the cover is Chris Farasopoulos, BYU's All-America candidate . . . the Galloping Greek from Brigham Young led the nation in punt returns last fall and was also ranked in the top ten in kickoff returns . . . Chris also set an NCAA record, rolling up more combined yardage (punt and kickoff returns) in one season than any other player on record . . . the old mark of 966 yards was set by Bill Geyer of Colgate in 1941 . . . Chris had a total of 1,075 (527 on punts, 548 via kickoff returns) . . . Farasopoulos won first-team berth on all-conference selection in the WAC . . . only four other players, offense and defense, polled more votes . . . besides being a spectacular return specialist, he was outstanding on defense with a team known for its defense . . . he led the BYU in unassisted tackles and pass deflections . . . Chris was sprinter on track team this spring . . . ran a 9.8 100-yard dash . . . was an outstanding baseball player at North High in Torrence . . . drafted by Orioles out of high school . . . was tired of baseball, however . . . signed to play football at BYU without seeing the campus . . . born in Athens, Greece 7/20/49 . . . along with family moved to Los Angeles in 1955 . . . zoology major . . . single.

THE UNIVERSITY

Brigham Young University, the fountainhead of learning for The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints is among the largest church-related institutions of higher learning in the world. Within the University there are 13 colleges, and the graduate school offers masters degrees in 85 fields and doctoral degrees in 40 fields.

The school is located in beautiful Utah Valley on a bench overlooking Provo, Utah, a community of almost 50,000 people. Rugged mountains in the Wasatch range border the valley on three sides, the Utah Lake forms a border on the west.

Forty-five miles to the north is Salt Lake City, capital of Utah and historic center of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, (commonly called the Mormon Church).

This is the setting. But the school is more than this. It is a center of higher learning which places special emphasis on spiritual values, on friendly association, and on knowledge. But in any setting, the school would be unique because of its atmosphere.

BYU is a member of the Western Athletic Conference and is consistently a powerful contender in both conference and national intercollegiate sports.

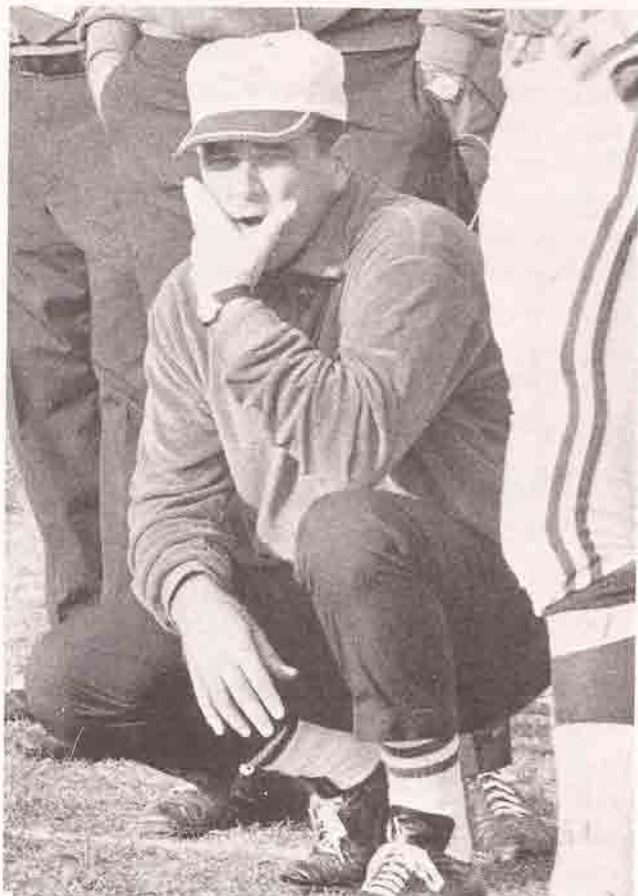

TOMMY HUDSPETH



It may sound a little corny, but Tommy Hudspeth can be described fairly accurately as the coach who has it all; and if not all, certainly a good share of it.

The 39-year old former Kansan, who looks like something you would see in an Arrow shirt ad, has crammed a lot of coaching and playing into his hyper-active career. Fortunately for the Cougars, many of the highlights have come while Tom has been at the BYU helm in a period of six years. His teams at Cougarville have swung from 2-8 seasons to 8-2 campaigns in that six-year span, and the overall record is 31-28-1.

The word "dull" can never be used to describe Tom or any of his teams. In fact, the Cougars are keyed to the kind of action that football fans love, and the workmanship is always professional.

Soon after Tom came onto the scene at BYU (1964), the Cougars developed an outstanding offen-

sive machine, finishing among the nation's leaders in that phase of the game. The past two or three have found the Cougars producing the stout defensive show again.

A year after Tom arrived, the Cougars, who were nearly everybody's last place pick, pulled a major upset by winning the WAC championship. This was the first football title ever for the Cougars. The following year (1966) the Cougars produced an 8-2 season record, the finest in the school's history.

Hudspeth, who was born in Cherryville, Kansas, attended school in Afton, Okla., where he was an all-state quarterback. He moved from Afton to Tulsa University, where he was captain of the freshman team. In his three seasons with the Hurricane varsity he played on both the offensive and defensive units (quarterback and defensive safety), and Tulsa had a 26-5-2 overall record. He was team captain his final year, and the club played in the Gator Bowl.

Following graduation, Tom launched his coaching career at Norman (Okla.) High School. This was interrupted by a two-year stint in the U.S. Air Force. He was discharged as a first lieutenant in 1955, and returned to coaching at Tulsa Central High.

A coaching job on the college level opened up at Tulsa in 1956, and Tom joined his alma mater as freshman coach under Bobby Dobbs. He remained an assistant there from 1957 to 1960. When Dobbs was named head coach of the Calgary Stampede, Hudspeth, then 28, went with him as an assistant. In the three years he spent with the Stampede they were conference contenders every season.

At age 32, after six seasons in the college and professional ranks, Tom was chosen to head the football program at BYU. Tom captured UPI Coach of the Year honors, and was named **Coach and Athlete's** Rocky Mountain Coach of the Year in 1965.

In addition to his coaching duties, Tom also serves as assistant chairman of athletics at BYU. He has completed most of the requirements for his master's degree in counseling.

Tom is married to the former Ruth Ann Sandmire, and they have three children: Max (14), Phil (12), and Melissa (3).

ASSISTANT COACHES

LaVELL EDWARDS (Utah State '52)

Top assistant on the Cougar staff, and the club's defensive coordinator, is LaVell Edwards who is entering his tenth year at BYU. Edwards is a thoughtful, steady coach who gets along well with everybody, especially his fellow coaches and the players.

As far as this 39-year old native of Orem, Utah, is concerned, defense is the game. And the Cougars' defensive record for the past three seasons is truly remarkable. Three years ago BYU was ranked 12th in the nation in rushing defense. Two years ago BYU held one opponent to minus-29 yards and last fall the Cat defense went nearly three games without giving up a TD.

LaVell joined the staff in 1961, leaving the head coaching job at Granite High in Salt Lake City, where he had been head coach for eight years. Prior to that time he spent two years in the army, much of it at Fort Mead, Maryland.

Born and raised in Orem, Utah, Edwards was an all-state center at Lincoln High. He launched his college career at Utah State, winning all-conference honors two years in a row.

Coach Edwards is married to the former Patti Covey of Big Piney, Wyo., and they have three children: Ann (13), John (11), and James (7).

CHRIS APOSTOL (Utah State '50)

Chris Apostol is a mixture of Mark Twain, Will Rogers and dry coaching wit. Of course Chris has plenty of experience to draw from, since he is the veteran member of the BYU staff (1959).

Coach Apostol's assignment is with the linebackers, although he has coached all phases of the game.

Born and raised in Utah's copper-mining area of Bingham, Chris won all-state honors as a lineman at Bingham High. He continued his career at Utah State where he played under E. L. "Dick" Romney and George Melinkovich.

Not long after graduation from USU in '50, Chris joined the staff at Ogden High, spending a total of nine years there. His record with the Tigers was 44-13-2, and his final team there won the state class "A" title and finished with a 11-0 season. Seven of the wins were shutouts.

Chris is married to the former Marva Funk, and they have five children ranging in age from 10-19—Kristine, Konn, Kip, Kurt and Kami.



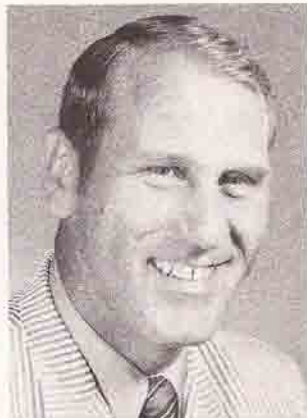

ASSISTANT COACHES

DICK FELT (BYU '58)

In his seven years with the pros, Dick Felt was always very much at home in the defensive secondary. Small wonder, then, that Dick is doing an excellent job as he enters his third season with BYU's defensive secondary.

Dick's career has gone nearly full cycle since he started as a prep at Lehi, Utah; going from there to BYU, to service ball, to pro ball, and back to BYU.

One of his most memorable moments in college ball came in his sophomore year, when, as a reserve, he scored four touchdowns in one quarter in a game with San Jose State. The record still stands at BYU.

Dick continued to spark the Cougars, winning all-conference honors as a tailback. He graduated in '58, obtained an ROTC commission in the Air Force along with his diploma. He was assigned to Boeing Air Force Base where he played two years and was named MVP.

Following his stint in the service, Dick was signed by the New York Titans of the AFL, where he played two seasons. He played five more years with the Boston Patriots as a defensive halfback before joining BYU in '68.

Dick is married to the former Dayleen Hobson of Boise, Ida., and they have four children, Karen (9), Curtis (7), Kristie (4), and Nancy (1).

DAVE KRAGTHORPE (Utah State '55)

The newest member of the staff, Kragthorpe came aboard last spring, leaving the post as head coach at South Dakota State to become the Cougars' offensive coordinator.

Prior to coming to BYU, Dave acquired a broad background in the coaching profession. He coached prep ball in Idaho and Michigan (Idaho Falls in 1958-59, Wyandotte, Mich., 1960-63), before becoming an assistant at University of Montana (1964-66). From Missoula, Dave moved to South Dakota State University, where he was an assistant (1967-68) before taking over as head coach in 1969.

A native of Mound, Minn., Dave was a three-sport letterman and all-state football player. He moved west to Utah State where he was an all-Skyline Conference lineman for two years. He also lettered as a catcher on the Aggie baseball team. Dave graduated from USU in 1958, and three years later received his M.Ed. from the same school.

Coach Kragthorpe is married to the former Barbara Ann Barnson of Kearns, Utah, and they have two children; Kurt (9) and Steven (5).

ASSISTANT COACHES

LES MILLER (Kansas St. College '58)

A good measure of Midwest warmth and good humor can be found in the personality of Les Miller, coach of the Y's offensive backs. The 33-year old coach is from the same hometown as Hudspeth—Afton, Okla.

Les played ball at Commerce and Miami High schools in Oklahoma, winning all-state honors in three sports, plus all-American merit in football. The all-conference honors continued at KSC, where he graduated in '58. Les also spent two seasons in the N.Y. Yankee farm system before turning to coaching.

Miller coached at Afton (Okla.) for two seasons (1958-60), three years at McLain in Tulsa (1960-63), and two years at Memorial in Tulsa (1963-64), before moving to Joplin (Mo.) his last stop before coming to BYU in '68.

Les is married to the former Joyce Holmquist of Miami, Okla., and they have three children; Mike (14), Debra (12), and Martin (2).

J. D. HELM (Kansas '66)

A newcomer on the coaching scene who is destined for big things, 29-year old J. D. Helm is now in his second season as freshman coach. His first year at the helm ended in a 2-2 season, and he will combine these chores with an assignment as coach of the varsity receivers.

J. D. got his first taste of football in his hometown of El Dorado Springs, Mo. He also lettered in baseball and track, but won all-state honors in football. He lettered in football and track at Kansas before graduating in 1966 and assisted with the KU frosh one year.

Helm coached two years at Shawnee Mission East High School in Kansas (1966-67), and he spent the '68 season as an assistant frosh mentor at BYU.

J. D. is married to the former Sarah Elizabeth Barker of Kansas City, and they have one daughter; Heather Ann (six months).

DR. ERNEST L. WILKINSON, President

Much of the credit for BYU's rise as a major institution of higher learning must be given Dr. Wilkinson. He has provided much of the driving force behind the school's dramatic growth. He left a successful law practice to head the institution in 1951.

A man with deep convictions about the destiny of BYU, Dr. Wilkinson was born and raised in Ogden, Utah. He attended Weber State, then transferred to BYU where he was editor of the campus newspaper and an outstanding debater. He attended George Washington Law School, graduating summa cum laude. At Harvard he received his judicial science degree.

Since his appointment in 1951 the school has flourished into one of the largest church-related schools in the world.

DR. MILTON F. HARTVIGSEN, Dean

Dean of the College of Physical Education is Milton F. Hartvigsen, key administrator and planner for things athletic at BYU. A former teacher, coach, principal and superintendent of schools in Idaho, he came to BYU in 1956 after obtaining his Ed.D at UCLA. He was a 1930 graduate of Utah State, and also obtained his M.Ed. from the Logan school.

Since coming to BYU he has helped shape one of the finest athletic complexes in the country. His programs have won wide-spread commendation, and are the result of careful design and administration.

Dr. Hartvigsen, who is also faculty adviser at BYU, has served on a number of NCAA assignments, and was voted professor of the year at BYU in 1963.

STAN WATTS, Athletic Chairman

Earlier this summer Stan Watts (Mr. Basketball) was named new chairman of the Department of Intercollegiate Athletics. He replaced Floyd Millet, who accepted a position in Campus Development. Stan will continue to serve as head basketball coach, a post he has held for the past 22 years.

No stranger to administration, Stan has served as acting chairman, and was assistant chairman at the time of his appointment. Last year he completed a term as president of the National Association of Basketball Coaches.

His teams have won two NIT championships and six conference championships. In addition he has taken BYU teams on two tours of South America, and one to the Orient-Pacific. Last year he held clinics in South Africa, and this year represented the NABC at the World Games in Europe.

TRAINERS

Training tandem for the Cougars consists of **Rod Kimball** and **Marv Roberson**. Rod is a veteran of more than 30 years service with BYU athletic teams, while Roberson has spent the last five years with the Cougars.

Rod is practically a fixture within the department, and his contributions to the teams and the school have been considerable. In fact, Rod, who is one of the most liked persons of campus, is the most traveled member on the BYU staff. He has been to Europe no less than four times, twice to South America, and once on an extended tour of the Orient-Pacific, not to mention thousands of miles on countless trips within the USA.

Marv, too, has seen some time on the road. During the '68 Olympics in Mexico he was trainer for the Finnish team, and twice in recent years he has been invited to Europe to conduct clinics on training techniques.

Born in Arizona, Rod was raised in Jordan, Utah, where he was an all-around athlete and student officer at Jordan High. He attended Utah State, and later transferred to BYU where he was to obtain his B.S. and M.S. degrees. Rod has spent most of his life serving the school and the LDS Church. He and his wife, LeNeve, have 12 living children.

Trainer Roberson will be remembered by many BYU fans as a shot putter on the Cougar track team of several years ago. He, too, graduated from BYU ('57), then moved to Stanford where he picked up his M.A. degree and was assistant trainer with the Indians for four years.

In 1962 Marv was named head trainer at Foothill College in California. He joined the BYU staff in 1966. He is a native of Long Beach, Calif., and he and his wife Doris have three children.

Marv Bateman, who kicked three field goals during the game, broke the tie in the fourth quarter, and the Utes punched over an insurance TD with 1:17 left in the game to win, 16-6.

THE OUTLOOK

Deception has been a big part of football since the introduction of the T-formation. And while the Cougars can't claim, either by nature or design, to be Machiavellian, they always manage to keep everybody—opponents, the experts and even themselves—guessing.

It was that way last fall when the Mountain Cats came off a 2-8 season to battle their way to a third place finish in the WAC with a 6-4 mark. At the start it would have been difficult to predict that the Cougars would be shutout for the first time in 52 games, or that they would bounce back so strong in the second half of the campaign. Who would have guessed that the Cougars' defense would go nearly three games without giving up TD?

To add to the confusion this fall, the Cougars are switching to an I-slot formation. It is believed that the change will provide the "go" that BYU has been missing the last few seasons.

As you may recall, last fall, the club leaned heavily on its defensive game, choking off offensive thrusts that could have cost BYU victories. And if there is one thing that can be predicted about the '70 squad, it is that the Cougar offense will come on stronger while the defense may, by former standards, fade a little.

There is another problem, as Hudspeth sees it: a thinness beyond the first units that could prove troublesome. Indeed, the key to the '70 season may be the team's ability to adjust to depth deficiencies. This question has taken some of the edge off what might otherwise be an optimistic outlook.

Here's the prospectus for this fall:

Major Losses - Of the 15 lettermen not returning, the Cougars are likely to miss most defensive personnel like Jeff Slipp (voted outstanding lineman in the WAC in '69), linebacker Rick Dixon, and defensive backs Larry Echohawk and Paul Sutorius. All-WAC center Mel Olson and quarterback Marc Lyons (the most accurate passer in the school's history) will be key losses on offense.

Returning Lettermen - A sizeable chunk of lettermen—28 in all—will be back in uniform, mostly offensive players. The group includes five starters on offense, five starters from defensive unit of '69. Although the leading passer is missing, the returning vets include the three top rushers from last fall, all but one of the eight top pass receivers, all but one of the top five scorers, and practically all of the return specialists.

Offensive Formation — The Cougars, with assistant coach Dave Kragthorpe serving as offensive coordinator, will use the I-slot formation this fall. Chances are the ball will be put in the air more than in seasons past.

Running Game — With tailback Kip Jackson leading the pack, the Cougars should produce ample yardage in the rushing department. Jackson accounted for more rushing yardage than all of the other BYU carriers put together. The Cats will also have help from tailback Pete VanValkenberg, who was a red shirt last fall. Fullbacks Eddie Nichols and Chris Reading, both seniors, are also back, but backup support is otherwise lacking.

Passing Game — Total yardage last fall was fairly even, but there was slightly more yardage gained in passing. This season, however, the Cougars will likely rely on a strong passing attack. Lettermen Rick Jones and Don Griffin have the experience edge at quarterback, but sophomore Dave Coon looms as possible take-charge guy. Jones red-shirted last fall, and is only a junior. He can run and throw. If the QBs can hit the mark with any degree of accuracy, the cougars will definitely move the ball through the air. The team is not wanting for receivers, since practically all are returning from last year. Kip Jackson led them all with 25 receptions last fall, but split end Bill Miller, only a junior, had a total of 20 for 410 yards and three TDs. Add Larry Heaps, Dan Bowers, Lucky Fleming and others to the group, and you can see the Cougars have a top receiving corps. But the best of the lot could be a sophomore, Golden Richards. In four freshman games last fall Richards caught 25 passes good for 581 yards, and he may have the best speed of any player on the team.

Kicking Game — It won't be the same without punter Rich Adams (over 200 punts in three seasons) who punted them high and straight. But Joe Liljenquist, only a junior, will be back to handle the place kicking. Joe the Toe led the team in scoring with 42 points, all by kicking. Liljenquist hit seven of 15 field goals and was 21 for 24 on extra points. Liljenquist may also get the punting chores that otherwise will be shared by Larry Heaps or Don Griffin.

Speed — This is one area where the Cougars are lacking. Best of the group is Chris Farasopoulos, the Galloping Greek who can turn it on for punt and kickoff returns. Chris ran a 9.8 100 this spring.

New Personnel — Good help should be forthcoming from the ranks of sophomores, transfers and red shirts. Half a dozen players with good potential are among the red shirts, and there are fine prospects among the sophomores from the 2-2 frosh squad of last fall. There are only three transfers from other schools, so BYU won't be getting a lot of manpower from that reserve.

Summary — Look for a more wide open offensive game with more passing and dazzle. If connection between passer and receiver, can be made, BYU could be tough. The shift will be from defense to offense with depth of experienced personnel, especially in the two lines, being the biggest soft spot.

'69 SEASON REVIEW

If nothing else, the '69 campaign proved something a lot of fans suspected: the Cougars often come through when least expected.

Tom Hudspeth turned the tables first in '65, the year BYU was everybody's pick for last place but won the title. They did it again last fall, placing third in the WAC with more victories than even the most optimistic had hoped for.

After a faltering start, the Cats regained their balance and finished strong. In the last half of the season, with the offense picking up steam, the Cougars won four straight games before losing the season finale to Utah.

Low point of the season was the second game of the campaign when BYU was held to 42 yards total offense in the 0-10 shutout against Iowa State. Prior to that loss, the Cougars (and Tommy Hudspeth) had gone 51 straight contests without being shutout.

On the other hand, the '69 season was one of the Cougars' finest. Defensively, the Cougars gave up only one touchdown in the last three games of the season; and that one TD came with 1:17 left in the last game.

While the campaign reflected excellent team effort, certain individuals seemed to stand out above the rest.

One such player was Jeff Slipp, the Y's all-conference defensive end, who, with his defense teammates, kept the Cougars alive while the offense gathered momentum. Slipp broke the old defensive point record set the year before by Craig Bozich. What's more, linebacker Rick Dixon came within five points of Bozich's mark.

Another standout was Chris Farasopoulos, a two-way performer selected first-team all-WAC. Chris ended up as the leading punt returner in the nation, and set a new NCAA record in most combined yardage for punt and kickoff returns.

But the success of the season was reflected best in the overall attendance figures. In all, the Cougars played before a record quarter-million fans (253,806, to be exact). In five games at home the Cougars drew an average of 28,605 fans, a new school record.

HISTORICAL

Although football—or what was known as foot-ball—was played at the Academy around the turn of the century, it was terminated soon after because of a player fatality. It was not resumed on campus as an intercollegiate sport until 1922.

In the 45 seasons that followed (no games during World War II) the Cougars had 10 coaches and played over 400 games. The Cougars haven't had any undefeated seasons, but Ott Romney had an 8-1 season (1932), and Tom Hudspeth logged an 8-2 record in 1966.

Several ball players have won national recognition, or have set national records that still stand. One of the most recent was **Eldon "The Phantom" Forte**, tailback who was named to several All-America teams in 1962.

A player of more recent vintage is **Virgil Carter**, outstanding quarterback in the mid-sixties (1964-66) who still holds three major NCAA records. Carter is credited with more yards total offense (6,354 yards) than any player in college football history. His 68 touchdowns is also a career record, and his 599 yards in a single game is also an NCAA high.

Another former player who is legend at BYU is **Phil Odle**, the Cougars' classy split end (1966-68) who is ranked as the number three NCAA receiver (181 receptions for 2548 yards) of all time.

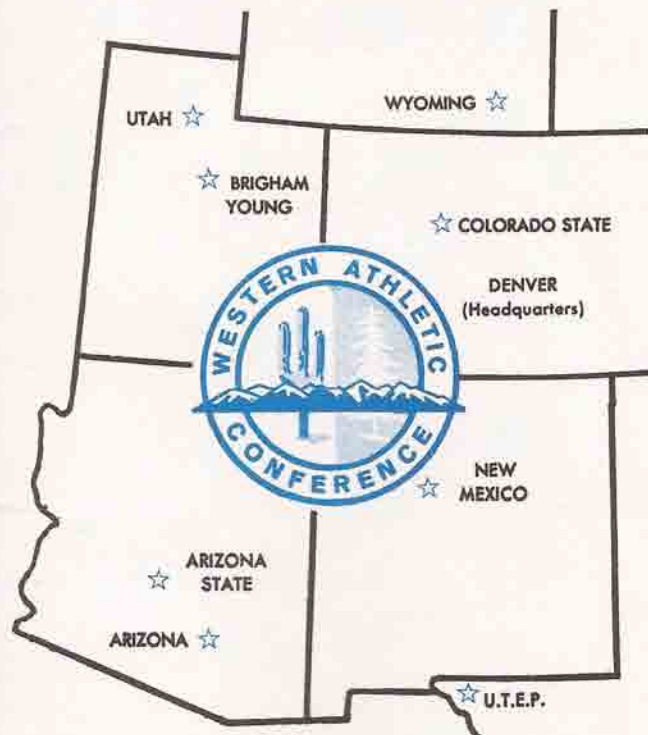

Boasting one of the finest all-around records in the country, the Western Athletic Conference is now entering its eighth year. Its eight team members extend into six states, and the league has its headquarters in Denver, Colo.

Wiles Hallock, former director of public relations and director of special services for the NCAA, is now in his third year as Conference Commissioner. He replaced Dr. Paul Brechler who held that office from its inception in 1962.

The WAC, which covers the Rocky Mountain-Southwest, came into being on July 1, 1962. There were six charter members; Arizona, Arizona State, Brigham Young, New Mexico, Utah and Wyoming. Two other schools, Colorado State University and Texas-El Paso were added on July 1, 1968.

Conference headquarters are located in Denver, Colo., with offices at 1515 Cleveland Place (the Denver-Hilton). Director of Information for the WAC is G. David Price.
