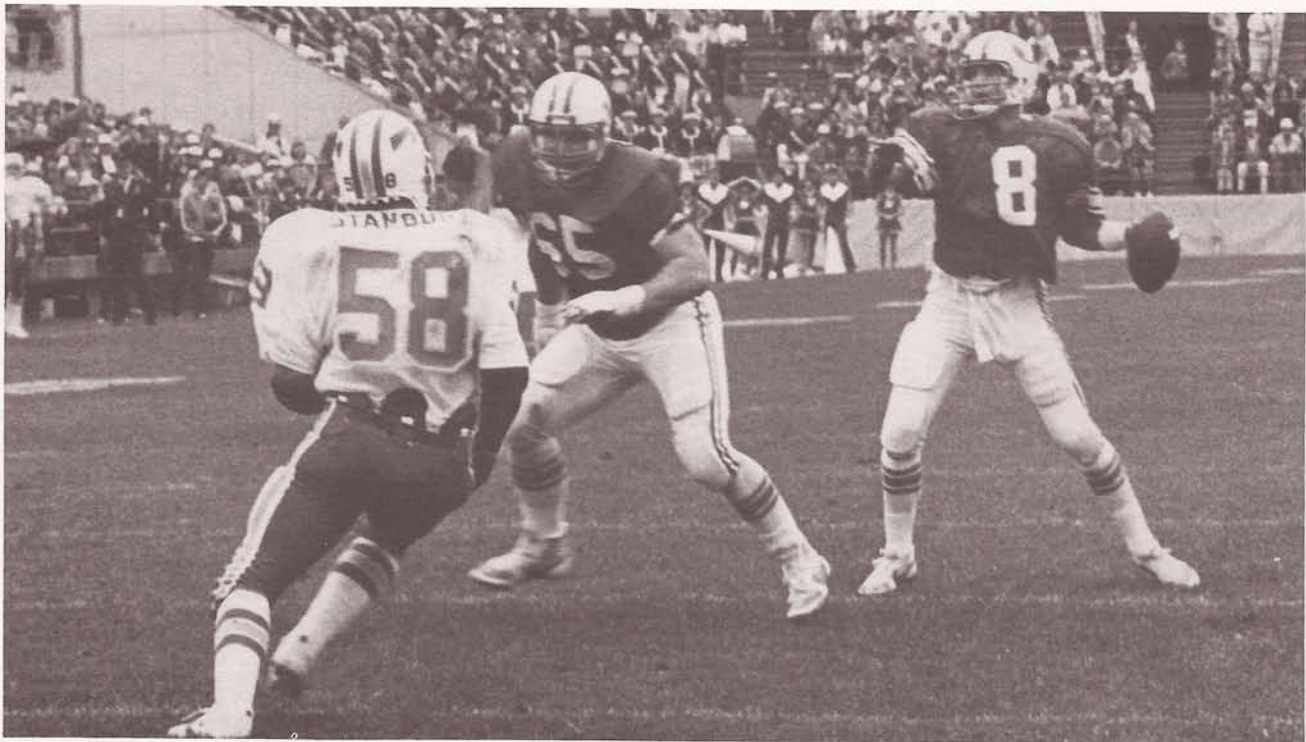

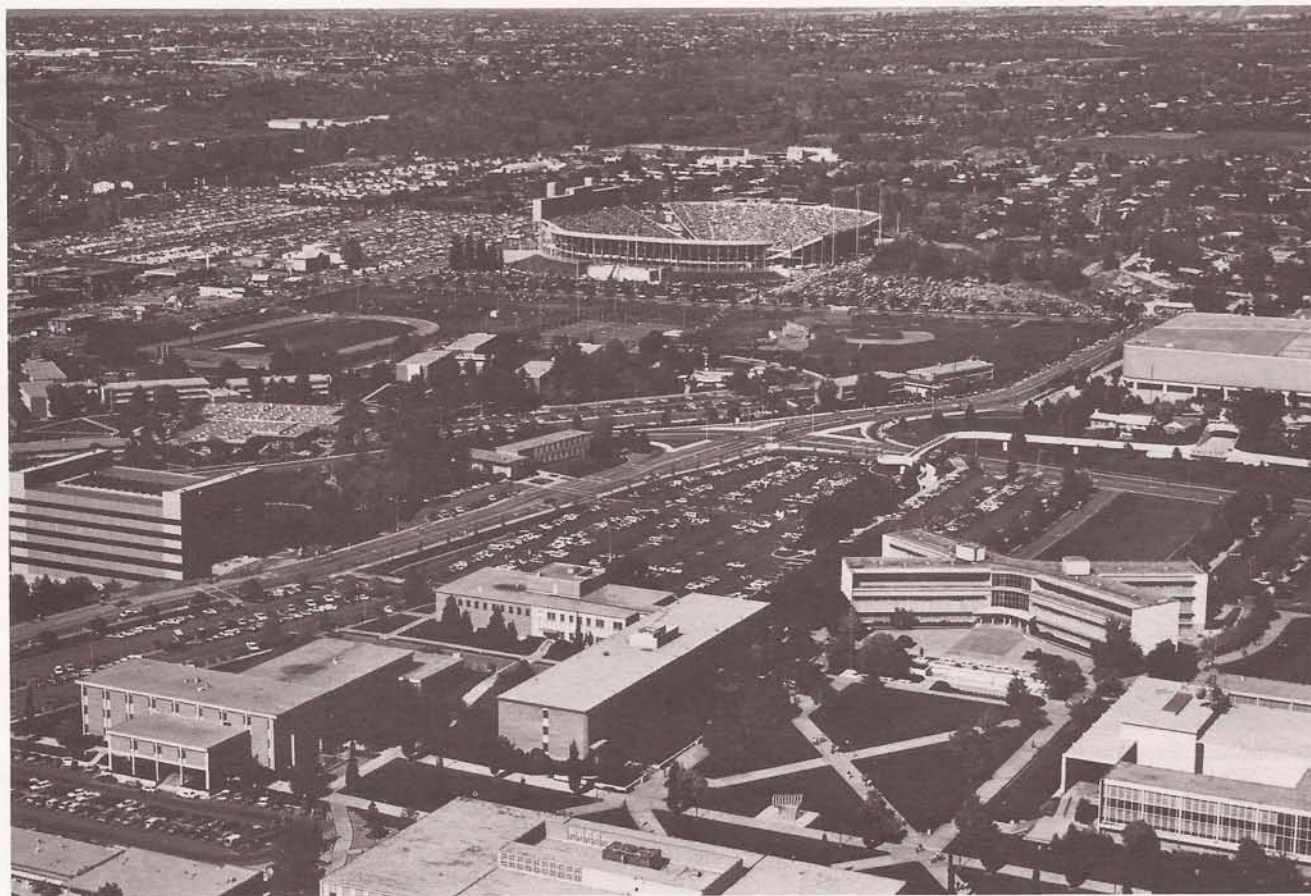

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Founded in 1875 and dedicated to the education of the whole person, Brigham Young University strives to prepare its students for successful professional careers and personal lives by providing a proper balance between academia and religious instruction.

BYU is sponsored by The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints (Mormon) and, with its enrollment of 26,000 students, is the largest privately owned university in the country.

More than 1,250 full-time faculty, 67 percent of whom hold doctorates from colleges throughout the United States and several foreign countries, instruct in 150 subject areas in the university's 13 colleges and graduate schools.

BYU is on a three-semester system (4-4-2-2) with Fall and Winter semesters each being four months long and the summer semester being divided into Spring and Summer terms.

Utah Valley, located approximately 45 miles south of Salt Lake City, provides the backdrop for the 646-acre BYU campus. The 12,000-foot-high Wasatch Range rises immediately to the east of the campus, and Utah Lake can be seen only a few miles to the west.

Although 98 percent of the studentbody is Mormon, admission is open to those of any race, color, creed, or national origin, provided they meet the university's academic requirements

and their conduct conforms to the standards of the LDS Church.

Nonmormons come from over 25 other denominations, and around 22 percent of the student body is married. The Provo campus is also very cosmopolitan, with students coming from every state (30 percent from Utah) and more than 70 countries. Over 8,000 students are bilingual, having learned a foreign language while serving a two-year mission for the Mormon Church in another country.

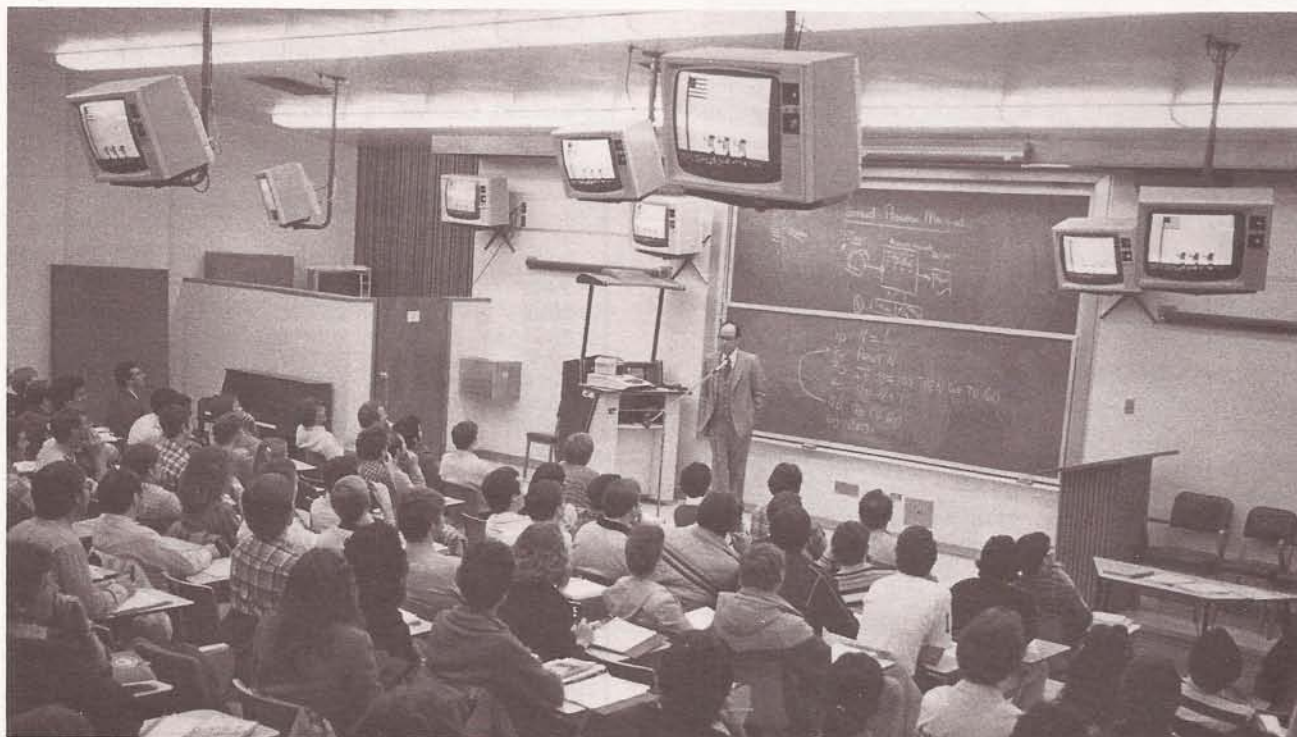
Of the ethnic groups on campus, the American Indians have the largest representation, numbering more than 500 and coming from 61 tribes. There are also Chicanos, Blacks, Orientals, and others, all applying their own particular perspective of life to their academic programs, and providing a rich, intercultural learning atmosphere for all students.

In addition to the regular student body on the Provo campus, BYU serves other students at the BYU-Hawaii Campus in Laie, Hawaii, through the Study Abroad programs supervised by BYU faculty members in Austria, England, Israel, and Hawaii, and through the BYU Division of Continuing Education, which enrolls more than 350,000 in its courses each year.

The university is supported from funds appropriated by the LDS Church and from tuitions and gifts.

Cougar Stadium



Football at BYU entered a new era last year with the expansion of Cougar Stadium to 65,069 seats.

The facility has been applauded by fans, players and the media as one of the best in the entire country. Among its many features are a box-bowl seating configuration, a natural-turf playing surface and a four-level press box.

Prior to last year, Cougar Stadium seated 35,000 comfortably, but as many as 47,000 would attend a game. Expansion efforts included lowering the field about eight feet, adding end zone seating, constructing the press box facility and adding box seating.

Each of the end zone stands contains approximately 4.3 million pounds of steel and seats about 15,000 people. More than 15,000 yards of concrete were used in the expansion effort.

The playing field has a special drainage system that can dispose of up to 13 inches of rainfall per hour. In fact, the sand base provides better footing once it is wet.

Perhaps the most impressive feature of the stadium is the new press box, which runs the entire length of the west stands and sits over 10 stories high.

It contains 42 loges (glass-enclosed booths capable of seating up to 12 people) on the first two levels. The third level is reserved for the media, and the fourth level is the TV deck. Two elevator towers transport guests to the press box.

The Football Writers Association of America cited BYU for its "Outstanding Press Box working Area" at the conclusion of the 1982 football season.

Last year, BYU's average attendance at home game was 64,691—16th best in the Country. The Cougars also led the nation in increased football attendance, up 24,051 from 1981.

The single game attendance record is 65,172 last season against Hawaii—the fourth largest crowd ever to personally witness a BYU sporting event (Georgia 80,207, Wisconsin 71,496, and Arizona State 70,311). The BYU-Hawaii contest is also the largest crowd ever for a Western Athletic Conference event.

Cougar Stadium is the 24th largest on-campus football facility in the nation and is the fourth-largest university-owned stadium in the West (Stanford, California, and Arizona State).

The Western Athletic Conference enters its third decade in 1983 and will attempt to repeat the success of the past 20 years. The league spreads from the 7,000 foot heights of Laramie, Wyo., to the sea level sprawls of Hawaii and San Diego, Calif. Each of the league's nine members has a distinct personality, and each adds to the flavor of the most geographically diverse conference in the nation.

The biggest change in the league's makeup came in July 1978, when Arizona State and Arizona left for the Pac-10. But on the same day, San Diego State made its official entry on the scene. Hawaii became the eighth member the following year and the Air Force Academy entered in 1980.

One of the rewards of WAC membership is the league's affiliation with the Holiday Bowl in San Diego. The conference grid winner receives an automatic bid to the post-season bowl against a ranking at-large team.

Founded July 1, 1962, the charter members included Arizona, Arizona State, Brigham Young, New Mexico, Utah and Wyoming. In September 1967, Colorado State and Texas-El Paso were added to make the WAC an eight-team league.

Based in Denver, Colorado, the WAC is led by Commissioner Joe Kearney, who assumed his current position in 1980. Kearney, former athletic director at Arizona State, Washington and Michigan State, is the fourth conference commissioner since the formation of the league.

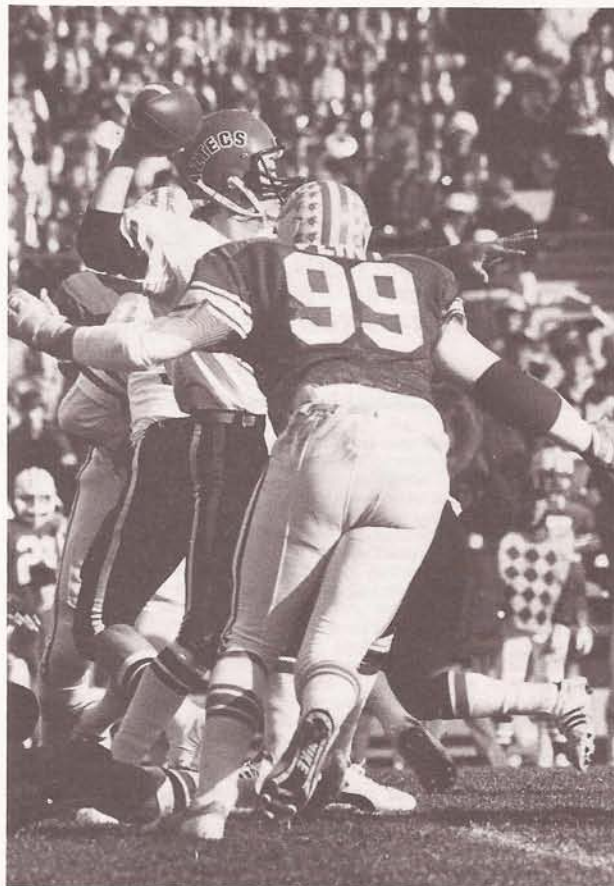

LaVell Edwards 94-36-1 Record 12th Year (Utah State '52)

**Best time to call Coach Edwards:
10 a.m.**

Last December before the Nebraska-Hawaii matchup in Honolulu, LaVell Edwards was on the island at a dinner show when an entertainer paid tribute to a man who changes young men's lives for the better.

Edwards and his wife Patti searched the audience of Husker fans for Nebraska Coach Tom Osborne. The entertainer then asked the audience to recognize LaVell Edwards.

Plaudits such as this are not uncommon for the coach of one of the most potent offensive machines in college football. But it is the molding of men that is just as important to Edwards.

Going into his 12th year as BYU's head man, Edwards sports a 94-36-1 record (.721), seven straight Western Athletic Conference Championships, ranks sixth among the nation's active college coaches in the nation and has been invited to coach in the Hula Bowl again in 1984.

The 52-year old Edwards is a 1952 graduate of Utah State, but has added to his academic honors a master's degree from the University of Utah (1960) and an Ed.D. from BYU (1978).

In 1982, the coach-churchman-husband-father-grandfather-author-teacher-doctor and dean of WAC coaches was the head coach at the Hula and Japan Bowls, won the BYU Alumni distinguished Service Award, was named Outstanding Man-of-the-Year by the Provo Ameri-



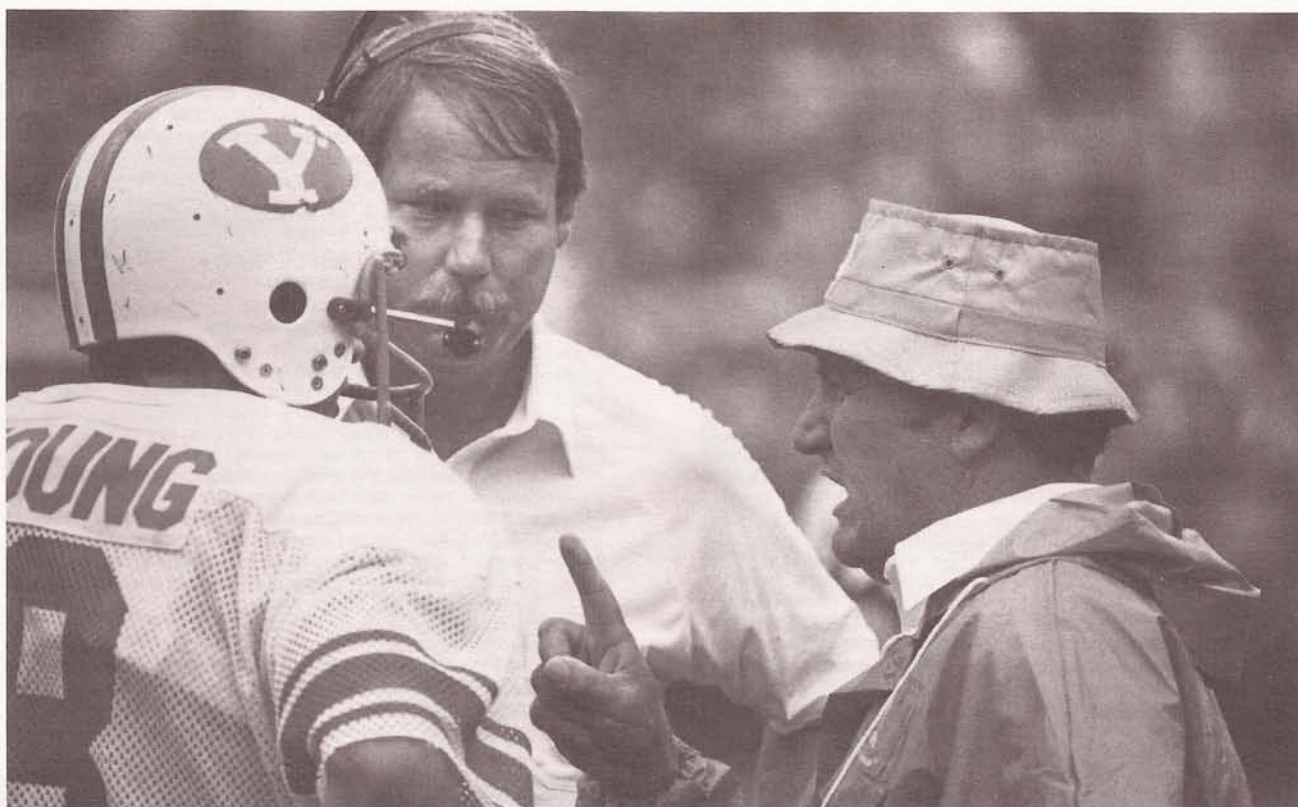
can Freedom Festival, and guided BYU to an 11-2 record.

The Cougars are often nationally ranked, under Edwards' guidance and BYU has led the nation in passing (1976, 1977, 1979, 1980, 1981), scoring (1979), and total offense (1979, 1980).

Since becoming BYU's head coach in 1972, after joining the cougar staff in 1962, Edwards has led BYU to seven bowl appearances—the Fiesta Bowl (1974), the Tangerine Bowl (1976), and five appearances in the Holiday Bowl (1978-82).

In 1979, LaVell was recognized as national coach-of-the-year by two organizations: the Bobby Dodd Award Board and the Churchmen's Hall of Fame.

Three times (1972, 1979, and 1980) he has been selected WAC Coach-of-the-Year, and four times he has been Kodak District Eight Coach-of-the-Year (1974, 1977, 1979, and 1980). He has also coached in post-season action at the Blue-Gray Classic (twice), the East-West Shrine Game and the Coaches' All-America game.

The Orem, Utah native was raised on a farm not far from BYU's stadium.

A graduate of Lincoln High School in Orem, Edwards attended Utah State where he was a three-year letterman and captain of the football team. Twice he earned all-conference honors at center for the Aggies. At USU he met his wife-to-be, Patti Covey. LaVell entered the Army, where he played on two service football teams, Fott Lee, Va., in 1952 and Fort Mead, Md., in 1953 as a player-coach with a 6-3 record.

His first coaching job was secured at Granite High School in Salt Lake City where he coached from 1954-61 before joining Hal Mitchell's BYU staff in 1962. LaVell succeeded Tommy Hudspeth as the head coach in 1972.

"It's almost as if Brigham Young sat there waiting patiently for one of its own to come out of the church and assume his responsibility," wrote Furman Bisher of the Atlanta Constitution

concerning LaVell's appointment as head coach.

He has coached more years, won more games and had a better winning percentage than any coach in Cougar football history, ranking only behind Frank Kush (Arizona State) in winning percentage and games won in the WAC.

Edwards is an active member of the College Football Association. His wife, Patti, writes an occasional sports column for the (Provo) *Daily Herald*.

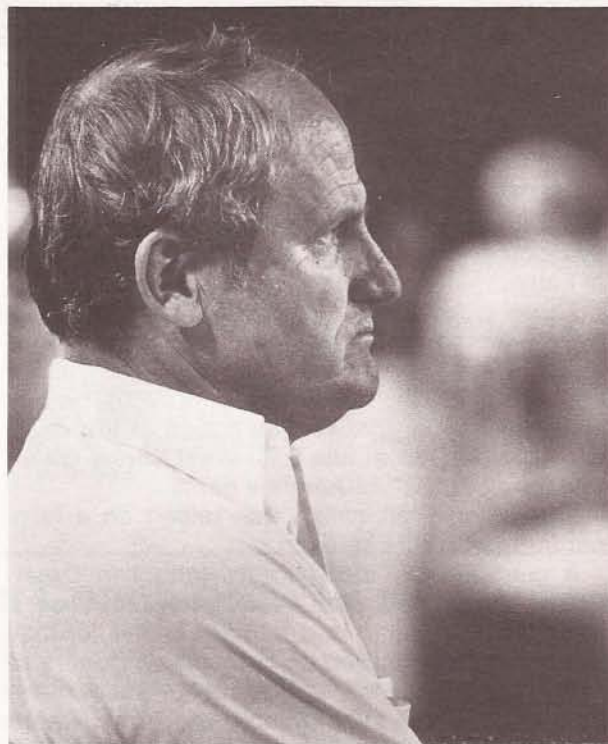
Born Oct. 11, 1930, in Provo, Utah . . . attended schools in nearby Orem . . . was all-state at Lincoln High School (now Orem High) in 1946 and 1947 . . . three-year regular at center . . . also lettered two years each in basketball and track . . . enrolled at Utah State in 1948, played center and linebacker . . . three-year letterman as center for the Aggies . . . was captain and all-conference for two years (1950-51) . . . played service ball for the Army (1952-54) at Fort Lee, Va. . . . was player-coach for 6-3 team at Fort Meade, Maryland . . . returned to Utah and joined staff at Granite High in Salt Lake City (1954), serving as head football coach, wrestling coach, golf coach for a period of eight years . . . also tennis and basketball (1954-55) for two seasons . . . he joined the BYU staff in 1962 . . . in 1979 he was selected as the Bobby Dodd National Coach of the Year and Churchmen's Hall of Fame coach for 1979 . . . 11 seasons at BYU . . . his teams have completed an overall record of 94-36-1 (7-4 in 1972, 5-6 in 1973, 7-4-1 in 1974, 6-5 in 1975, 9-2 in 1976, 9-2 in 1977, 9-4 in 1978, 11-1 in 1979, 11-2 in 1981, and 8-4 in 1982) . . . in 1974 he was recipient of the coveted Dale Rex Memorial Trophy and was also honored as the Utah Sportsman of the Year . . . LaVell obtained his M.S. degree from the University of Utah in 1960, and he received his Ed.D. from BYU in 1978 . . . married former Patti Louise Covey of Big Piney, Wyoming, and they have three children: Ann, now married; John, former member of the Cougar track team (800-M), who is now in medical school at Utah; James, a wide receiver for the Cougars, who recently returned from a church mission in Sweden . . . LaVell is one of the better golfers among the nation's football coaches . . . also enjoys gardening . . . home phone 375-0487.

LaVell's Career Highlights

- 1972**—LaVell Edwards, defensive coordinator for the Cougars, is named head coach in January . . . a member of the BYU staff since 1962 . . . Halfback **Pete Van Valkenburg** wins NCAA rushing title with a 138.6 yards per game average . . . the Cougars also lead the league in defense against the rush.
- 1973**—In LaVell's second season the Cougars begin to move offensively . . . Quarterback **Gary Sheide** is runner-up in NCAA passing, and number three in total offense . . . teammate **Jay Miller** leads the nation in pass receiving (100 receptions for 1,181 yards) . . . as a team the Cougars are second in the nation in passing, eighth in total offense . . . Miller sets an NCAA record for most pass receptions (22) in one game (record still stands).
- 1974**—Team ranks high in two NCAA statistical categories; seventh in passing offense, fourth in rushing defense . . . Individually, **Gary Sheide** is runner-up in passing for the second year in a row (to **Steve Bartkowski** of California, this time) . . . Gary's career completion percentage is fourth on all-time list . . . Bartkowski's final pass completion edged Sheide (182-181) for title.
- 1975**—A year of adjustment, the Cougars faltered through the first part of the season, then won six of last eight games . . . **Gifford Nielsen**, a sophomore reserve, came off the bench in the fourth game (New Mexico) to spark come-from-behind victory . . . Giff set WAC record with 10-of-12 passing in that game . . . was starter thereafter . . . Cougars were 10th as a team in passing.
- 1976**—**Gifford Nielsen** places fourth in NCAA passing (18.8) with only one-tenth completion separating him from **Jack Thompson** (Washington State) in second place . . . but he was second in total offense behind **Tommy Kramer** (Rice) . . . As a team, the Cougars were first in passing, sixth in total offense and eighth in NCAA scoring (424.4 total, 307.8 in passing and 31.9 scoring) Nielsen voted first-team All-America.
- 1977**—Nielsen unexpectedly exits scene with injury in fourth game (Oregon State) and **Marc Wilson** takes over . . . by the end of the season the two have combined for 40 TD passes, 3,585 yards passing and a .605 completion percentage . . . Wilson finished eighth in passing and third in total offense . . . as a team the Cougars led the nation in passing (341.6), were second in scoring (39.4) and third in total offense (470.2) in final NCAA figures . . . BYU's 341.6 yards per game was third highest in history, and 41 TDs second . . . surprisingly, the Cougars also topped the nation in "take-aways" with a total of 56 defensive (interceptions and opponents' fumbles recovered) takes.
- 1978**—Both **Wilson** and sophomore quarterback **Jim McMahon** see action in 10 games as they share quarterback duties . . . Wilson was injured in third game of season . . . Although neither is mentioned in NCAA statistics, the Cougars are eighth in passing, fourth in NCAA fumble recoveries . . . Cougars finish with WAC title, third straight 9-2 season and a bowl bid to Holiday I.
- 1979**—With two all-conference quarterbacks to choose from (**Wilson** in 1977, **McMahon** in 1978), the Cougars elect to redshirt junior **McMahon** in favor of senior **Wilson** . . . upset over Texas A&M starts 11-game win streak . . . **Marc** leads the nation in total offense (325.5) and is fourth in passing efficiency (147.1) . . . **Wilson** finishes senior year as **consensus All-America** with 10 NCAA records to his credit . . . As a team the Cougars lead the nation in four categories; passing (368.3), total offense (521.4), scoring (40.6) and kickoff returns (26.3) . . . also, the Cougars were 11th in scoring defense (11.4) and sixth in punting (40.1) . . . BYU was first Division I team to pass for more than 4,000 yards in season . . . LaVell receives the Bobby Dodd Coach of the Year Award.
- 1980**—For the second year in a row the Cougars post an 11-win season. Also, for the second consecutive season BYU leads the nation in three major statistical categories; total offense (535.0), scoring (46.7) and passing (409.8). Quarterback **Jim McMahon**, who was named to the Kodak All-America team along with offensive tackle **Nick Eyre**, had an amazing season. Jim

became the first NCAA Division I player to pass for more than 4,000 yards (4,571 to be exact), and he set or tied a total of 26 NCAA records, most of them total offense and passing. Among the marks: the highest passing efficiency ever (a 176.9 that topped the previous high of 172.6 by **Jerry Rhome** in 1964). **McMahon** also led the nation in total offense (385.6 yards per game, compared to 277.0 for runner-up **Mark Herrmann**). However, the Cougars had a poor start, losing to New Mexico (25-21) in the season opener.

- 1981**—Another 11-win season for the Cougars, who finished with a 10-2 record, sixth WAC championship and 38-36 win over Washington State in Holiday Bowl IV . . . Cougars ranked eighth in wire service poll before 17-game win streak came to an end . . . BYU led nation in passing for the third consecutive year, also tops in NCAA scoring for third consecutive year . . . **McMahon** claims All-America honors, finishes his career with 71 NCAA records (plus Davey O'Brien Trophy) and sets all-time high in career passing efficiency (156.9) . . . LaVell coached the West team to a victory in the Hula Bowl . . . also coached in the Japan Bowl . . . at the end of the season, Edwards career coaching record (86-32-1) was ranked among the top ten in the nation.
- 1982**—Cougars' first season in expanded BYU Stadium which was enlarged to permanent seating of over 65,000 . . . but drop opener, 39-38 thriller, to Air Force . . . overcoming league loss, the Cougars win an unprecedented seventh straight WAC football championship (7-1) . . . **Gordon Hudson** named consensus All-America . . . BYU third in nation in total offense . . . Cougars lose to Ohio State in Holiday Bowl V . . . Edwards joins nation's top 10 most successful active coaches.

Now entering his fourth season with the Cougars, Roger French serves as offensive coordinator and coach of the offensive line ... When a team as offensively explosive as the Cougars returns its starting quarterback and consensus All-America tight end, along with 42 other returning lettermen from a conference championship team, it would appear the outlook is on the rosy side. But such is not necessarily the case for Coach LaVell Edwards, the sixth winningest active coach in the nation.

The reason? Well, the Cougars lost five offensive starters from up front, three of whom—center Bart Oates, tackle Vince Stroth and guard Lloyd Eldredge—were first-team All-WAC. Here has to be a void and there were some key losses in the defense, too.

But this kind of situation isn't a new one for Edwards and his staff. Somehow, some way, they usually have new personnel ready and able for the coming season.

"Overall," says Edwards, "we have good experience at quarterback and receiver, along with our linebackers. And while we were hurt most in the line by graduation, we expect to be in good shape up front, offensively and defensively."

A total of eight starters are returning from the '82 squad; four on offense, four on defense. Of course, the Cougars have two highly regarded players who seem destined for national attention—tight end consensus All-American Gordon Hudson and all-WAC quarterback Steve Young. And there's no reason to believe this pair will not pick up where it left off last season. Young was ranked second in the nation in total offense (318.8 yards per game), and Hudson was nationally ranked in receptions (6.1 catches per game,

13.9 yards per catch).

With key people returning, the Cougar offense isn't expected to change very much. Opponents can look for a strong passing game augmented by some very able runners. Fullback Casey Tiumalu, the Cougars' leading rusher of last year (6.05 per carry) will anchor that position, and tailback Eddie Stinnett (5.8 per carry) is a top candidate for the other running spot.

Defensively, the Cougars will have good strength at the linebacker positions with lettermen like Todd Shell, Leon White, Marv Allen and Cary Whittingham teaming up behind down linemen like Brandon Flint, Jim Herrmann and Brad Smith. In the secondary the key people will be cornerback Greg Peterson and safety Kyle Morrell.

Place-kicker Kurt Gunther, who set NCAA records during his three years of putting the ball in the air, will likely be replaced by Lee Johnson, who could end up doing both the punting and place-kicking for the Cougars.

Not a lot can be reported at this writing on BYU's crop of freshmen, other than to list the collective group as one of the best the school has had in recent years. No doubt some of the first-year players will be heard from as the season progresses.

If there is a pivotal element in the mix, it has to come under the heading of "injuries to key personnel." Sideline a few of the top players, and the picture could change dramatically.

As for the outlook in the Western Athletic Conference, Edwards sees five or six schools in the race, including the Cougars. Air Force, New Mexico and Utah are in a good position, according to Edwards, with Colorado State a possible surprise team.

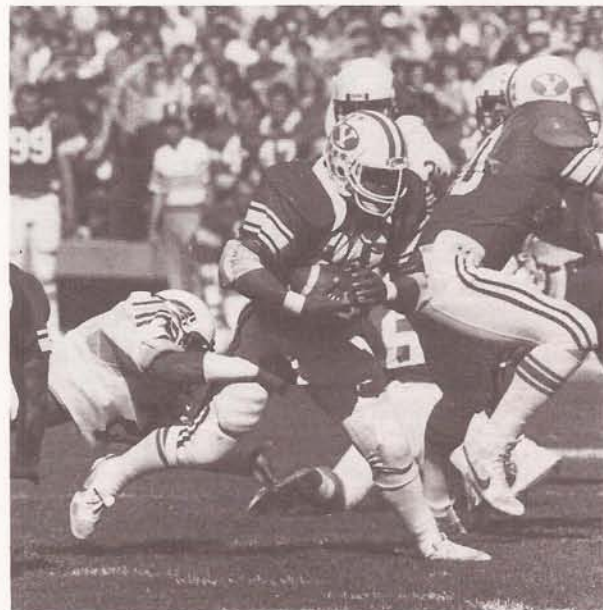

Gordon Hudson, Tight End Senior, 6-4, 228 Kennewick, Wash.

Tight end Gordon Hudson is the only BYU grid star to be named consensus All-America as a junior. The deft receiver from Kennewick, Wash., has set the standard for collegiate tight ends in each of the past two seasons.

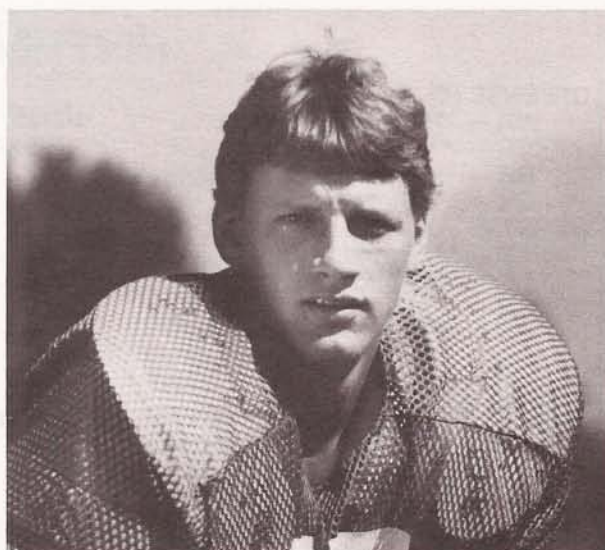
Hudson's skill lies in his marvelous ability to catch the ball, as well as run rampant after receptions.

He is quick enough to play wide receiver and stunned Ohio State in the Holiday Bowl with his acrobatic and one-handed grabs.

In both his sophomore and junior campaigns, Hudson grabbed 67 passes and amassed over 900 yards . . . and he still has another year.

Linking up with Jim McMahon against rival Utah in 1981, Hudson rolled up an NCAA-record 259 yards receiving.

He grabbed ten passes during BYU's 17-14 loss at Georgia in 1982 and was averaging eight catches a game after four games. Defenses be-



gan concentrating on the big tight end, yet he still finished the year averaging six catches per game for 14 yards per grab.

The Cougar tight end needs any of the following to break NCAA records in 1983—49 receptions, 392 yards, or 9 touchdowns.

Steve Young took over the reins of the vaunted BYU offense in 1982 and performed admirably during his premier season on the Cougars' center stage.

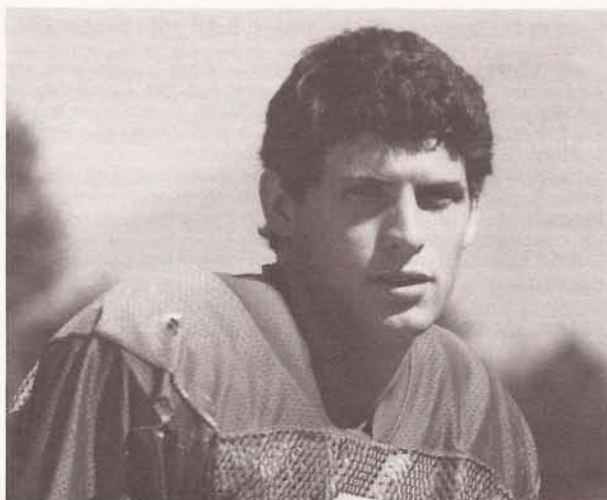
The Greenwich, Conn., native rolled up 3,507 yards in total offense, a number that ranks only behind Jim McMahon and Marc Wilson in the BYU books.

Young was named WAC player-of-the-year and honorable mention All-America (AP) in 1982, as well as WAC player-of-the-week twice.

Among Young's best performance in '82 were key games against New Mexico and Ohio State. The UNM game was for the lead and the Lobos were undefeated going into the contest in Albuquerque. Steve rushed for one touchdown and passed for two others to go along with 18-of-28 passing for 326 yards.

In the Holiday Bowl loss to the Buckeyes, Young connected on 27 passes (a personal best) for 341 yards.

The scrambling southpaw is as dangerous on



the run as he is through the air. Young rushed for 407 yards and ten touchdowns in '82 and kept the defense honest with his open-field jaunts.

Young's father lettered for BYU in '54, '58 and '59 and led the Cougars in rushing and total offense in '59.

Steve is also, by the way, the great-great-grandson of Brigham Young.

President Jeffrey R. Holland

Dr. Jeffrey R. Holland, the ninth president of Brigham Young University, took office Aug. 1, 1980, succeeding Dr. Dallin H. Oaks who now serves as a justice on the Utah Supreme Court.

A St. George, Utah, native, Dr. Holland was a varsity athlete, student officer and high honor graduate at both Dixie High School and Dixie College in his hometown. He served a volunteer mission for The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints in Great Britain from 1960–62. Upon returning to the United States, President Holland enrolled at BYU where he obtained a bachelor's degree in English with highest honors and a master's degree in religious education, graduating with distinction. While at BYU, he was designated an E. S. Hinckley Scholar and was elected to Phi Kappa Phi honor society. More recently, he was honored as a recipient of the University's Distinguished Alumni Service Award.

Dr. Holland obtained a second master's degree and a doctorate in American Studies at Yale University in 1973 where he was a Yale University Fellow. He pursued scholarly interests in Mark Twain, writing his dissertation on "Mark Twain's Religious Sense: The Viable Years—1835 to 1883."

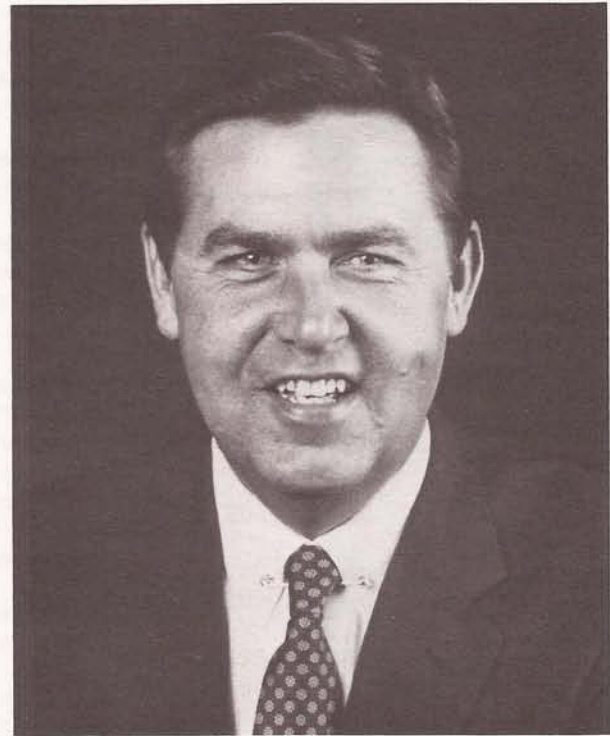
Before becoming president of BYU, Dr. Holland served more than four years as Commissioner of Education for the LDS Church, with responsibilities for all of the Church's educational programs which reach more than 750,000 students worldwide. Prior to that, he was dean of Religious Instruction at BYU, and he has served as an instructor or director at LDS Institutes of Religion.

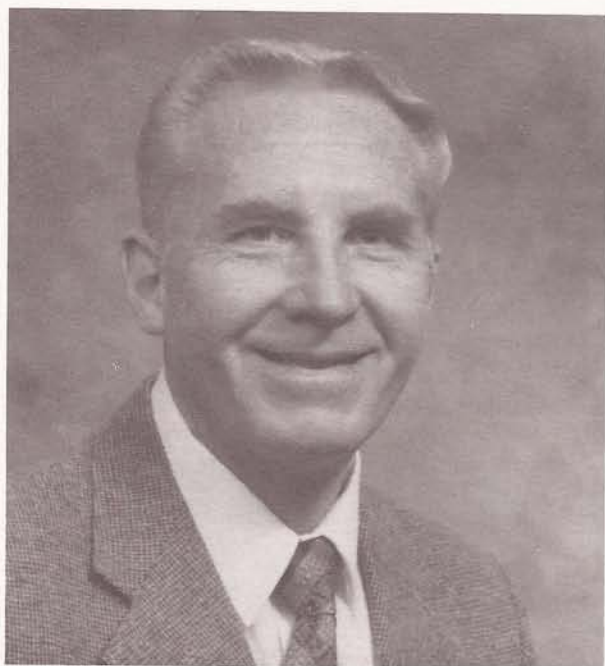
The BYU president is a popular speaker and is noted for his keen sense of humor. More than 30 of his articles and addresses have been published in LDS magazines and professional journals, including *Vital Speeches of the Day*.

President Holland serves on the governing boards of the Deseret News Publishing Co., the LDS Hospital and Intermountain Health Care, Inc., the Polynesian Cultural Center in Laie, Hawaii, Commercial Security Bankcorporation and Commercial Security Bank. He also is a director of the American Association of Presidents of Independent Colleges and Universities (AAP-ICU).

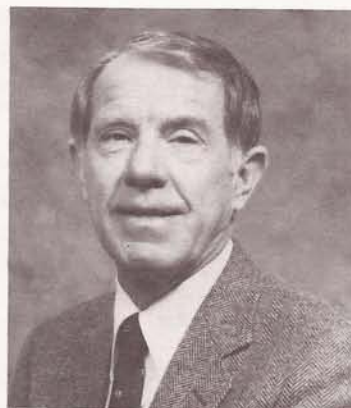
He and his wife, Patricia Terry Holland, also of St. George, have three children: Matthew, Mary Alice and David.

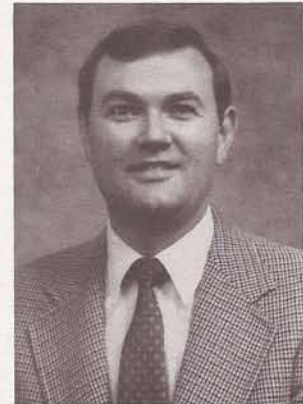

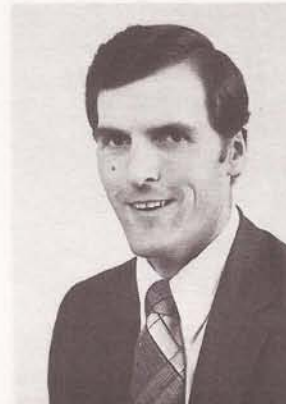

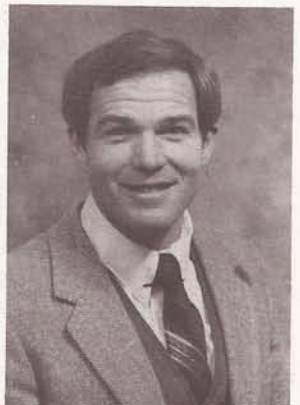

The Cougar Club

Along with BYU's rise to prominence in the world of college athletics has come a wave of enthusiasm among Cougar fans. And perhaps the best indication of "Cougarmania" is the BYU Cougar Club.

According to Executive Director Dale R. McCann, membership in the Cougar Club has multiplied by 400 percent over the past seven years, with the total number of boosters now exceeding 2,500 members.

"The contributions we receive," says McCann, "range from a \$50 associate member (age 25 and under) to the lifetime Golden Cougar (\$15,000 contributed over a three-year period). Resident membership is \$150 annually, and we have several classifications between resident member and the lifetime Golden Cougar."

In return, the contributor 1) has the satisfaction of knowing the contribution is building the program, directly supporting recruitment, and aiding significantly in funding the broadcast of road football and basketball games; 2) is the recipient of a Cougar Club medallion mounted on a walnut shield; 3) is given preferred parking for all BYU home games, with special passes for Golden and Silver Cougars; 4) is given priority seating consideration on season football tickets; 5) receives an official football and basketball press guide; 6) is invited with a partner to the annual Cougar Club banquet; 7) receives the twice-monthly sports newsletter, *Cougar Close-Up*; and 8) can take the contribution as a tax deduction on state and federal returns.

A new feature of the Cougar Club is the new Cougar Club room at the stadium. Club members attend monthly luncheons in the facility as well as pre- and post-game pep rallies.

1982 Season Summary

For several reasons, the 1982 season was a most memorable one for the Cougars, who won their seventh consecutive Western Athletic Conference football championship and fifth straight trip to the Holiday Bowl. The eight wins (8-4 overall) dropped below Coach LaVell Edwards' last six-year average of 10.2 wins per season, but the total margin of defeat in three games totalled only seven points (three points to Georgia, one point to the Air Force and three points to Utah State).

Also, this year's schedule included games against Georgia (then ranked sixth nationally) and Ohio State, the latter a big winner over BYU in Holiday Bowl V.

It will also be remembered as the year the Cougars opened their expanded 65,000-seat stadium with a dramatic 39-38 loss to Air Force Academy.

In five home games last year the Cougars averaged 64,621 fans per game.

Brigham Young University 27, Nevada-Las Vegas 0
Sept. 2—evening game (108 degrees, no wind, dry) in Silver Bowl (26,769)

The new-edition Cougars, ranked 19th by UPI, looked strong defensively as they limited the Rebels to 160 yards total offense; that included a meager 15 yards rushing. It was the first shutout by a BYU team since 1979. Cougar scores came on passes from Steve Young to Scott Pettis, an Eric Krzmarzick to Jimmy Jones pass, plus runs by Casey Tiunalu and Young. It was Young's first game as Jim McMahon's replacement, and he was 19-of-26 for 271 yards. This game,

which was played before the largest home opening crowd in UNLV history, found BYU with nearly twice as much possession time (39:59 to 20:01). Time after time the Cougars camouflaged their offense with running plays. (ESPN-TV) **BYU now 1-0.**

Brigham Young University 14, Georgia 17

Sept. 11—afternoon game (71 degrees, raining) in Sanford Stadium (80,207)

It took a 44-yard field goal with 1:11 left on the clock for the Bulldogs to defeat the Cougars. Afterward, Georgia Coach Vince Dooley called the game "a monumental struggle." The Bulldog Coach also called the BYU passing attack "one of the best we've ever seen in Sanford Stadium." Georgia scored first, marching 34 yards after intercepting a pass. Tom Holmoe then returned an interception 63-yards as the Cougars knotted the score, 7-7. The Cougars led much of the second half, their score coming on a 21-yard pass from Steve Young to Scott Collie. Herschel Walker picked up 51 of his 124 yards in the fourth quarter as Georgia scored on successive drives late in the game. First, a touchdown with 5:36 left and then the field goal. For BYU, Georgia marked the highest-ranked team the Cougars have played (sixth by Associated Press). BYU showed well statistically, edging the Dawgs 22-20 in first downs and 339-275 in totals offense. **BYU now 1-1.**

Brigham Young University 38, Air Force Academy 39

Sept. 25—afternoon game (63 degrees, showers) in Cougar Stadium (64,253)

The two teams were tied three times before Air Force marched 99 yards in the final 1:30 to claim the victory. The winning drive prompted Brad Rock of the Deseret News to write, "This may have been the fastest the U.S. government has moved in its history." After the touchdown, the Air Force, behind 38-37, completed a pass for a two-point conversion to pull off the upset and spoil the inaugural of the expanded Cougar Stadium. The crowd was the largest to witness a sporting event in the Intermountain area. Statistically, the two teams were almost even, each with 26 first downs and Air Force with a narrow 489-459 edge in total offense. Air Force coach Ken Hatfield called the game his most dramatic win. **BYU now 1-2 and 0-1 in the WAC.**

Brigham Young University 51, Texas-El Paso 3

Oct. 2—evening game (73 degrees, windy, clear) in Sun Bowl at El Paso (34,108)

After two consecutive losses, BYU looked to the UTEP game to even its record. The Cougars scored on two Steve Young passes, and TD runs by four different running backs. A 47-yard Miner field goal in the second quarter prevented a shutout. Young completed 24 of 32 (including ten in a row) for 399 yards and added another 97 yards on the ground. The Cougar defense shut down the UTEP passing game. BYU, registering its 12th consecutive win against UTEP, rolled for 677 yards total offense. Gunther's string of 35 consecutive successful PATs came to an end during the contest. The 34,108 fans marked the second-largest UTEP home crowd in history. **BYU now 2-2 and 1-1 in the WAC.**

After a big win over the University of Texas-El Paso, the Cougars needed another big win over the league-leading Lobos to stay alive in the Western Athletic Conference race. The largest crowd to see a football

game in New Mexico saw the Lobos take a 12-7 half-time lead. In the third quarter BYU turned the scoring around. The Cougars scored 33 points in the second half with 26 of them coming in the third-quarter. BYU also scored on a safety. Because of his offensive performance (18 of 28, two touchdowns) Steve Young was selected the WAC offensive-player-of-the-week, and linebacker Todd Shell was WAC defensive-player-of-the-week. **BYU now 3-2 overall and 2-1 in the WAC.**

Brigham Young University 39, Hawaii 25

Oct. 16—afternoon game (65 degrees, clear) in Cougar Stadium (65,172)

Home again after two road victories, the Cougars were looking for their first win in the newly-expanded stadium. Both teams put on an offensive performance in the first half with the Cougars taking a one-point lead, 19-18, at halftime. The second half saw the Cougars shut down the offense of the Rainbows. But BYU kept up its offensive performance of the first half in gear. Steve Young had over 500 yards total offense. **BYU now 4-2 overall and 3-1 in the WAC.**

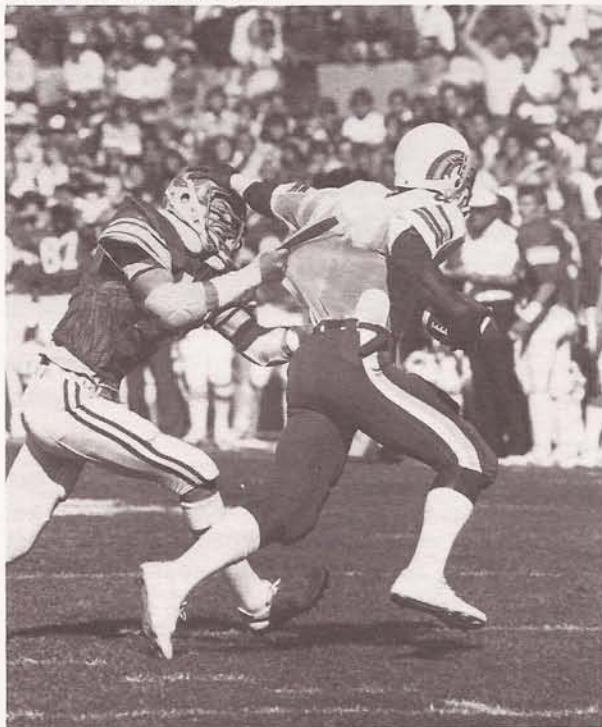
Brigham Young University 34, Colorado State 18

Oct. 23—afternoon game (67 degrees, clear) in Cougar Stadium (64,739)

No matter the size of the crowd because of the deer hunt, BYU won its fourth-straight WAC game. Steve Young put on another great offensive show as he ran for two touchdowns in the first half and threw for two more touchdowns in the second half. For the first time this season, the Cougars had a balanced offensive day with 258 yards rushing and 259 yards passing. This was the third time this season BYU had over 500 yards total offense. **BYU now 5-2 overall and 4-1 in the WAC.**

Brigham Young University 17, Utah State University 20

Oct. 30—afternoon game (45 degrees, overcast) at Romney Stadium (25,688)



BYU's defense went on something of a tear in '82, giving up only 186 yards per game rushing.

In a non-league game the Cougars sought to maintain in-state pride. But as a team, BYU could not get on track the whole game. The Cougars were the first to get on the scoreboard with a field goal in the first quarter, and it looked like BYU would have a three-point halftime lead. In the last three minutes of the second quarter, Utah State scored 14 unanswered points to take a 14-3 lead. In the second half, BYU had its chances to get back into the game, but with mistakes, plus a strong Aggie defensive line, BYU was unable to take the lead in the game. For the first time this season a BYU running back had over 100 yards rushing as Eddie Stinnett ran for 106 yards. **BYU now 5-3 and 4-1 in the WAC.**

Brigham Young University 23, Wyoming 13

Nov. 6—afternoon game (62 degrees, clear) in Cougar Stadium (64,819)

After an in-state loss to Utah State the week before, BYU was now back in the WAC wars to seek another win. The Cougars were out to avenge the loss they suffered in Laramie last year. After a scoreless first quarter, BYU was the first to get on the scoreboard with a touchdown run by Casey Tiulalu in the second quarter. In the first half of the game, Steve Young set his first NCAA record by throwing 22 consecutive completions. Young threw eight pass completions in the Utah State game and 14 in the first half of the Wyoming game. Kurt Gunther put the game on ice with a career-long 48-yard field goal in the last two minutes of the game. **BYU now 6-3 and 5-1 in the WAC.**

Brigham Young University 58, San Diego State 8

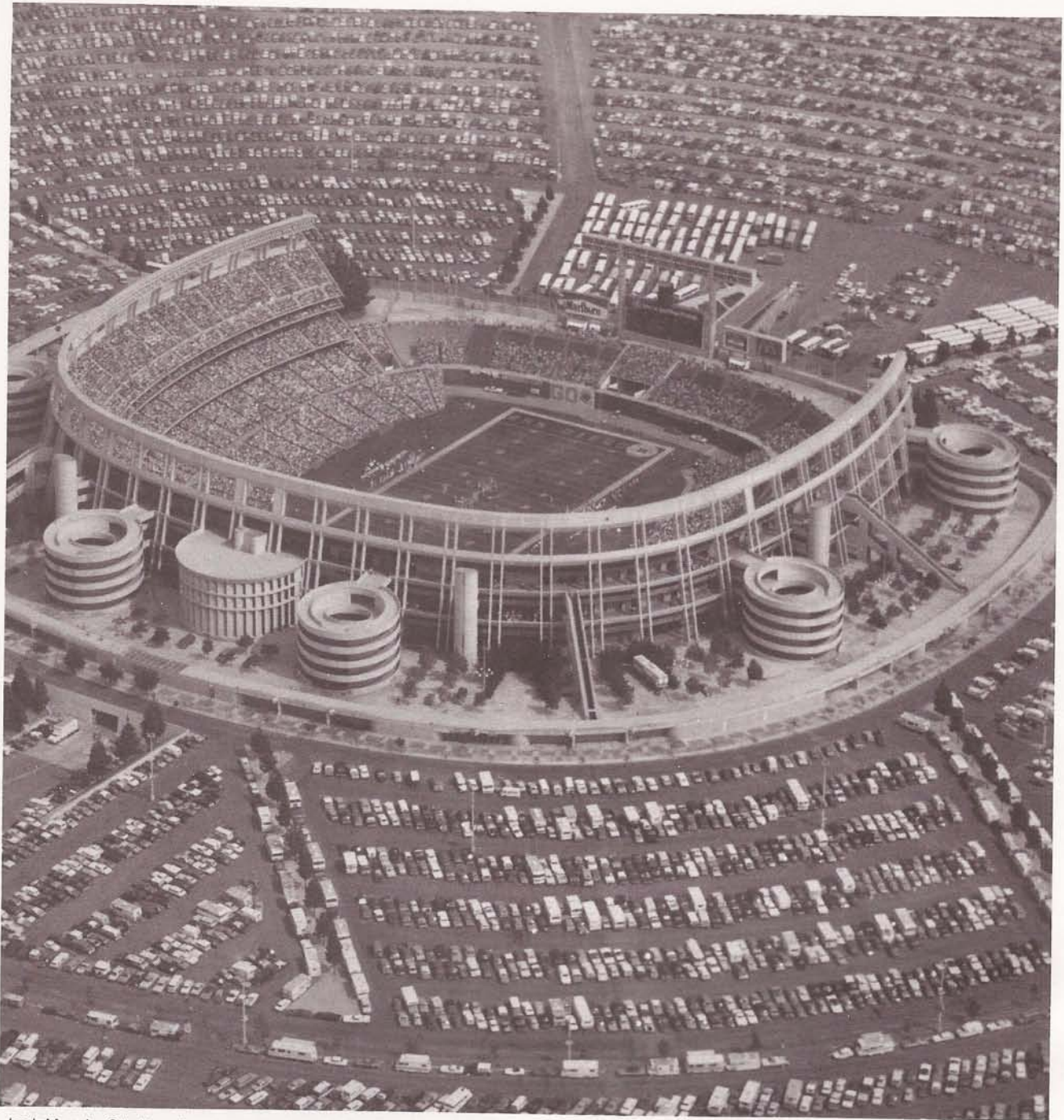
Nov. 13—afternoon game (39 degrees, cloudy, cold) in Cougar Stadium (64,471)

In the last home game of the season, BYU soundly defeated San Diego State for the fourth-straight year on either regional or national television. BYU was first to get on the scoreboard, when San Diego State fumbled on its first play of the game. The Cougars continued to score in the first half to up the score to 35-0. The Aztecs did not get on the scoreboard until late in the third quarter. BYU did not let up their offensive performance in the second half. Kurt Gunther set another NCAA record for the most career PAT attempts. Also, the Cougars saw Blaine Fowler, now second string quarterback, direct the team on a 70-yard scoring drive. Steve Young was selected as the Chevrolet MVP of the game and WAC player-of-the-week. **BYU now 7-3 and 6-1 in the WAC.**

Brigham Young University 17, University of Utah 12

Nov. 20—afternoon game (50 degrees, partly cloudy) in Rice Stadium (36,250)

Before the largest crowd ever for a University of Utah game, BYU, in its second series of plays, drove 80 yards for a touchdown in the first quarter. Not wanting to be outdone, Utah drove 70 yards for a touchdown, but missed the extra point to make the score 7-6. In the fourth quarter Utah controlled the ball game. BYU only had possession of the ball for three minutes in the final quarter. The Cougar's defense held off the Utes as they tried to score in the final three minutes of the fourth quarter. Several records were set by both teams. For Utah, Carl Monroe set a WAC record for the most yards gained rushing in a season. For BYU, Steve Young tied two NCAA passing records with 11 consecutive games over 200 yards passing and 11 games netting 200 yards in a season. Cougars finish the regular season with 8-3 record.

One of the more attractive post-season bowls in the country, the Holiday Bowl in San Diego has earned a reputation for close, exciting games, all of them, to this date, involving the Cougars.

This year's Holiday Bowl (VI) will be played at San Diego Jack Murphy Stadium on Friday, Dec. 23. Kickoff is set for 6 p.m., pitting the champion of the Western Athletic Conference against a nationally-ranked opponent.

As a result of a new television contract and

ticket price increase, team payoffs for the '83 Holiday Bowl will approach the \$400,000 range, according to word from bowl headquarters. Last year each of the participating teams received \$286,179 for playing in bowl.

In the five previous bowl games, the WAC representative has faced Navy, Indiana, Southern Methodist, Washington State and Ohio State. The winning margin of victory in the first four games was just 11 points, and just four points in a three-year span.

HOLIDAY BOWL V, 1982

Ohio State 47, BYU 17 Dec. 17, San Diego, Calif.

The Cougars had their two-game Holiday Bowl win streak snapped by Ohio State, 47-17, in a game that took the fun out of a usually raucous affair in San Diego. The BYU bubble burst at the outset of the third quarter when the Buckeyes reeled off 17 unanswered points, while BYU only got one snap . . . an interception at that. The OSU damage came mainly on the ground as Buckeye runners rolled up 329 yards en route to their seventh consecutive win. Tim Spencer was the main gun for the Bucks as he blew through the Cougar defense for 167 yards, including a record-setting 61-yard touchdown run in the second quarter that put OSU up 10-7. As usual, the BYU quarterback rolled up impressive marks, but the Cougars had trouble making points out of Steve Young's 341 yards passing on 27 of 45 accuracy. The Cougars turned the ball over to OSU three times inside the 30 and saw the Bucks convert each turnover into a score. The Cougars' two touchdowns were at each end of the game, with the first, a seven-yard strike to Neil Balholm coming in the opening quarter and the final tally a 16-yard Young-to-Hudson connection in the final stanza. In the fifth of an ongoing series of thrillers, BYU gave up the breaks and got a taste of the Big 10 elite.

HOLIDAY BOWL IV, 1981

BYU 38, Washington State 36
Dec. 18, San Diego, Calif.

Has there ever been a dull Holiday Bowl? Well, the 1981 edition fit the mold, and this time it found the two teams with Cougar mascots—BYU of the WAC and Washington State from the Pac-10—clawing away at each other before a crowd of 52,419. Again, it was like two different games. BYU held a 24-7 lead at halftime, then pushed the score to 31-7 as Tom Holmoe intercepted a pass and returned it 35 yards to give the WAC team a comfortable 31-7 edge. But as the second half progressed, it appeared BYU would be the come-from-behind victim in this one. With only 59 seconds left in the third period, WSU brought the score to 31-28, and from there the team from Provo had to hold on for its life. In a crucial third-and-12 situation on BYU's 18 yard line with 30-seconds remaining in the third period, McMahon began completing passes that covered 82 yards and put BYU in the end zone again to stretch the lead to 38-28. Statistically, it was a typical McMahon game: 27 of 43 with no interceptions, 342 yards and three touchdowns. But he will be remembered most, perhaps, for turning a fumbled snap into a carry for a first down. Tight end Gordon Hudson had seven receptions for 126 yards and a TD. WSU's first bowl appearance in over 50 years. BYU finished with an 11-2 overall record.

HOLIDAY BOWL III, 1980

BYU 46, Southern Methodist 45
Dec. 19, San Diego, Calif.

One pundit said the 1980 Holiday Bowl III was actually two ball games—the first a contest that lasted for most of four quarters, the other that was of four-minutes duration. SMU seemed in control the first game, while the Cougars, behind 20 points with only minutes remaining, surged to a stunning 46-45 win. Unfortunately, many fans either turned off their TV sets or left the stadium in San Diego before the "second game" began. For 56-minutes, SMU taught the Cougars a lesson in running the football. In fact, the Mustang's two great runners, Craig James and Eric Dickerson, rushed for a combined total of 335 yards. With 4:07 remaining in the game, the score was 45-25, SMU. From there, the Cougars connected on a TD pass, recovered an onside kick, a one-yard scamper by Scott Phillips, a blocked punt by Bill Schoepflin, and finally (with three seconds left on the clock) the "Hail Mary" pass of 46 yards from Jim McMahon to Clay Brown after time had expired. That tied the score, but Kurt Gunther's extra point sent BYU fans streaming onto the field. Statistically, McMahon completed 32 of 49 attempts for 446 yards. It may have been the most exciting bowl game ever, but one had to be there to feel the impact.

HOLIDAY BOWL II, 1979

Indiana 38, BYU 37 Dec. 21, San Diego, Calif.

The 1979 season ended with BYU leading the nation in three major categories: scoring, passing, and total offense. Moreover, the Cougars were one of the few undefeated, untied teams in the nation with an 11-0 mark. Those kinds of credentials, plus their national ranking in the polls (9th in UPI and AP), made the Mountain Cats favorites over the at-large entry, Indiana. It was BYU's first-ever meeting with a Big Ten school, and the net result was one of the most exciting bowl games of the season. The opportunistic Hoosiers played BYU even in the first quarter, then carried a 21-17 lead at the half. BYU spurred ahead in the third period, 34-31, on a 15-yard pass from All-American Marc Wilson to fullback Eric Lane. But midway through the fourth quarter, Indiana's Tim Wilber returned a punt 62 yards to push the Hoosiers ahead, 38-37. With 2:06 remaining, the Cougars moved the ball 69 yards to the Indiana 10-yard line. Then, with 11 seconds left on the clock, Brent Johnson missed a 17-yard field goal that would have made the score 40-38. Marc Wilson was voted the MVP on offense (28-of-43 for 380 yards), and Indiana's cornerback Tim Wilber won the honor on defense. Attendance: 52,200.

HOLIDAY BOWL, 1978

Navy 23, BYU 16 Dec. 22, San Diego, Calif.

The inaugural game of the Holiday Bowl pitted two teams with local drawing power, the Naval Academy and Brigham Young University. Despite chilly temperatures (for San Diego, that is), the two teams engaged in a hard-hitting battle. The Cougars had a 16-3 lead at one point, even though the score was 9-3 at the end of the first half. Defense dominated the first two quarters. Brent Johnson put the Cougars on the scoreboard first with a 33-yard field goal with 8:26 left in the first quarter. But Navy's Bob Tata boomed through a 40-yard field goal to tie the score at 3-3. Jim McMahon sent the Cougars ahead with a 10-yard pass to Mike Chronister, but Johnson missed the extra point. McMahon ran another in from two yards out in the third period before the Middies took charge. Navy scored two field goals in the fourth quarter, but it was a 65-yard pass to Phil McConkey that did the Cougars in. Some 48,003 witnessed the game in person. McConkey was named Best Offensive Player, BYU's Tom Enlow won Best Defensive Player honors for the game. Navy finished the year with 9-3 record, BYU with 9-4 mark.

TANGERINE BOWL 1976

Oklahoma State 49, BYU 21
Dec. 18, Orlando, Florida

Powerful Oklahoma State, sparked by All-American Terry Miller (173 yards rushing on 23 carries), used four pass interceptions and a fumble recovery to capture the Tangerine Bowl contest. Defensively, the Cowboys yielded only 46 yards rushing. The Cougars, however, stayed close in the first half, which ended 28-14. But Dave Lowry returned the second-half kickoff 102 yards (a Tangerine Bowl record) to bring the score to 21-28. The crowd of 37,812 fans saw the two teams roll up 70 points between them. Quarterback Gifford Nielsen completed 23 of 34 passes for 209 yards and one touchdown, but the Cougars could only roll up 255 total yards to 402 for OSU. BYU's record was 9-2 prior to the Tangerine Bowl game.

FIESTA BOWL 1974

Oklahoma State 16, BYU 6
Dec. 28, Tempe, Arizona

Competing in their first post-season bowl game ever, BYU played Western Athletic Conference host to the Cowboys of Oklahoma State before a crowd of 50,878. The Cougars got off to a quick start with two field goals during the first quarter before All-WAC quarterback Gary Scheide was injured in the last moments of the first quarter. He was replaced by junior reserve Mark Giles. The Cowboys took the scoring lead during the second quarter on a TD run around left end, so the halftime score was OSU 7, BYU 6. OSU regained possession of the ball on the Cougars' 17 yard line after intercepting a Giles-to-Tom Toolson pass, but was unable to convert on the turnover. A field goal from 32 yards out put the Cowboys in front 10-7 at the end of the third quarter. With 1:14 remaining in the game, OSU scored another TD on a 40-yard halfback pass to complete the scoring. The Cougars out-gained the Cowboys in total yardage 301 to 214. Giles was 11 out of 26 for 138 yards. BYU's record was 7-3-1 prior to the Fiesta Bowl.

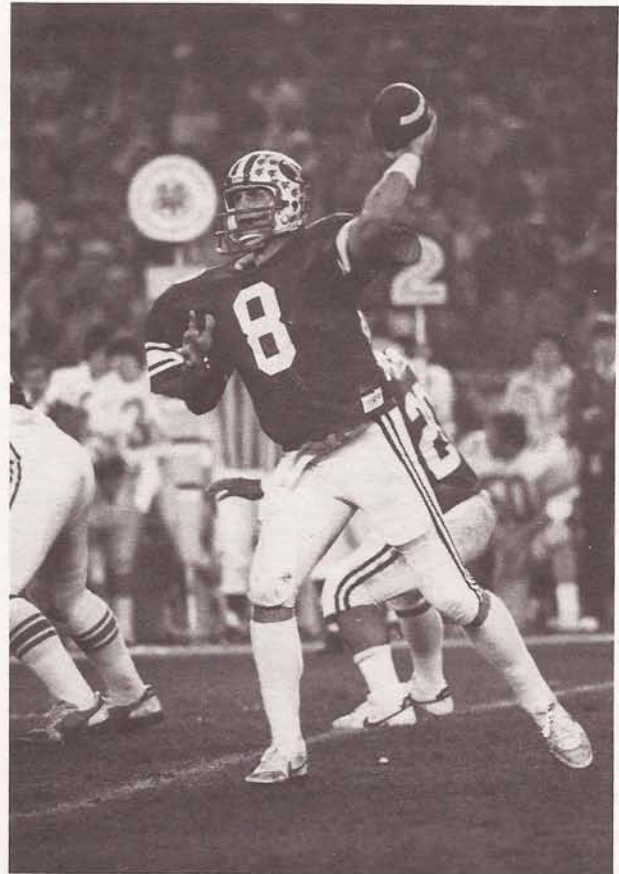

Only a few hardy souls are still around who remember the Cougars' entry into intercollegiate football in 1922. And the change—the transition from struggling beginner to respected power—has been a dramatic one, indeed.

That first season found BYU winning only one game and scoring a total of only 10 points for the season. Sixty years later the school is one of the champions of the forward pass, leading the nation in that category for five of the past six years. Moreover, in comparison to that inaugural season, the Cougars also led the nation in scoring with 465 points in 12 games (an average of 38.7 points per game) last season.

Most of the major growth, plus the largest share of national honors, have come under the direction of Coach LaVell Edwards, whose teams have won seven WAC championships and played in six post-season bowl games.

Football had its origin at BYU near the turn of the century, but a fatality prompted its discontinuance. The game was brought back in 1922, and, minus three years during World War II, the Cougars have played a total of 57 seasons of football. Joining ranks first with the old Rocky Mountain Conference, BYU teams were subsequently part of the Mountain States, Skyline and Western Athletic Conferences.

The current winning tradition, of course, was fueled by some very skilled athletes, and most of the attention focused on the Cougars came as the result of some very competent quarterbacks, QBs like **Virgil Carter** (1966), **Gary Sheide** (1974), **Gifford Nielsen** (1976), **Marc Wilson** (1979) and **Jim McMahon** (1981). The last three were all named All-American quarterbacks, and McMahon's accomplishments include 70 NCAA records, plus the first national Davey O'Brien Award. And all three finished sixth or higher in the Heisman Trophy voting.

Four BYU quarterbacks—Sheide, Nielsen, Wilson and McMahon—are listed among the top seven leaders in NCAA history in passing efficiency.

While passing has been a big factor in the school's football program, the running game has also produced some outstanding individual performers. **Eldon "The Phantom" Fortie** (1961–62), a single-wing tailback who used the option to perfection, won All-America notice in 1962. **"Fleet Pete" VanValkenburg** (1970–71) led the nation in rushing his senior year and was a second team All-American. Fullback **John Ogden** (1964–66) was the leading rusher in the Western Athletic Conference for three consecutive years. Moreover, to prove that running is an integral part of the Cougar attack, fullback **Todd Christensen** (1975–77) was the leading pass receiver on the BYU team for three seasons.

Offensive linemen of note include **Gordon Gravelle** (1970), **Paul Howard** (1972), **Brad Oates** (1973–75), **Orrin Olsen** (1972–75), **Tom Bell**

(1974–79), the winner of the national Swede Nelson Sportsmanship Award and **Bart Oates** (1977–82). Top defensive players include **Wayne Baker** (1972–74), **Paul Linford** (1972–74), **Mekell Ieremia** (1975–77), **Glen Titensor** (1978–80), **Glen Redd** (1976–80) and **Kyle Whittingham** (1979–81).

At various times in the last 15 years the Cougars have also had some great return specialists; **Chris Farasopoulos** (1968–70), the Galloping Greek, who led the nation in punt returns and set two NCAA records; and **Golden Richards** (1970–71), who is still listed as holder of five NCAA kick return records.
