Press Information

The BYU Football Media Guide is designed to provide the media with useful information about the 1991 BYU football team. The guide contains statistics, records, biographical data and historical facts. The following information also will help the media in covering the Cougars' during the 1991 season. Please review it and take note of changes.

Player Interviews

Please schedule all player and coach interviews through the Sports Information Office. To assure a better chance of obtaining the interview, please notify the Sports Information Office at least 24 hours in advance of the interview. Coach LaVell Edwards is available to media from 10-11 a.m. Members of the print media requesting interviews should contact Ralph Zobell, Sports Information Director. Requests for broadcast interviews should be made to Jay Mosen, Electronic Media Coordinator. **No player interviews will be given the day before, or on, game day.**

Big Four Huddle

Coach Edwards and two football players attend the Big Four Huddle at noon each Tuesday at the Red Lion Inn in Salt Lake City. The coach and players will be available for individual interviews immediately after the luncheon.

Home Game Coverage

Requests for press box and photography credentials should be made no later than **one week prior to the game**. These credentials will be issued to working members of the media only, with preference given to media representatives who regularly cover college football. No requests will be processed later than noon on the day prior to the game. Requests should be written on company letterhead and directed to: BYU Sports Information, 30 SFH, Brigham Young University, Provo, UT 84602. Phone (801) 378-4911.

Stadium Location, Media Parking

BYU's stadium is located on the northwest corner of the campus, just off Canyon Road and University Parkway (1430 North) in Provo. Press parking is in Lot #2, immediately west of the stadium near the ticket booth. Media parking passes must be requested. The press box is accessible via elevators located on the west side of Cougar Stadium.

Press Box Arrangements

The Sports Information staff will provide working media members with official statistics. A press box public address announcer will keep the media informed of play-by-play information, broken records and other interesting information. A meal will be served before each home game.

Several telephones (campus extensions) will be available in the main area of the press box. Collect or credit card calls can be made from these telephones. In the past, there have been sufficient phones to meet the needs of the

media. However, if guaranteed availability is desired, visitors may wish to order their own phones. Please notify the Sports Information Office in advance if FAX transmissions are necessary. The press box staff will be glad to assist in transmitting copy and statistics. Score updates are available by calling (801) 378-2609.

Photography Credentials

Photo credentials will be issued to newspapers and magazines which regularly cover college football. Mark Philbrick, BYU's photographer, will supervise the distribution of photo vests at the game. Photographers on the sidelines must wear the required vest at all times. Television photographers and still cameramen are not allowed on the sidelines between the 25-yard lines. Please use north elevator to access press box. Pick up photo vests at the press box and return them after the game.

Post-Game Interviews

In order to provide equal access to BYU athletes for post-game media interviews, **BYU's locker room will be closed** to all members of the media for both home and away games. Post-game interviews at home games will be conducted in the new Press Interview Room, located east of BYU's locker room (under the east stands). Interview requests should be made to members of the BYU Sports Information staff, who will accompany the media to the Press Room. With two minutes remaining in the game, the media group will take the south elevator to ground level.

The Press Interview Room will be equipped with an audio mixer for those desiring to record the interviews. Also, there will be sufficient lighting available for television cameras. Coach LaVell Edwards will speak to the media after the mandatory 10-minute cooling off period, which begins after the team enters the locker room. Media representatives can request that players be brought into the Press Room for interviews after Coach Edwards has finished speaking. Quotes from both coaches will be available as soon after the game as possible for those unable to get to the interview room.

Fan Hotline

BYU fans can get up-to-date Cougar sports information each day by calling 378-TEAM. The hotline is sponsored by Universal Campus Credit Union and features scores and statistics from previous athletic events, information about upcoming events, and general information about the men's and women's athletic programs.

1991 Outlook

Rebuilt lines and the toughest schedule in school history raise questions about Brigham Young University's 1991 football prospects despite the return of the top quarterback in college history.

For the first time since 1978, a Heisman Trophy winner returns for a chance to repeat. **Ty Detmer, who threw for the most yards ever with 5,188 while winning the Heisman Trophy** and a stadium full of other awards and

trophies, is recovering from shoulder surgery after two separations in the Holiday Bowl loss.

"Having Ty back is a great place to start," says Coach LaVell Edwards. Detmer should be ready to start throwing in May and **needs just 446 yards passing to set the NCAA career yardage record.** The senior passing wizard from San Antonio, Tex., has set 42 NCAA records and tied five others.

A key loss is consensus All-America tight end Chris Smith, who had 1,156 yards in receptions--the highest total ever by anyone at his position.

Add to the graduates four-year starter Matt Belini at halfback, four of the five offensive linemen and all three down linemen on defense.

Coach Edwards begins his 20th season

in the Disneyland Pigskin Classic against Florida State, a team expected to be ranked as high as first in a number of pre-season polls.

The Cougars then travel to UCLA and Penn State before getting into Western Athletic Conference rivals like bowl winners Colorado State and Air Force along with Wyoming, a narrow loser in bowl competition.

A bright spot is finally getting to play Hawaii in Provo. Other reasons for optimism include the return of offensive guard **Bryan May** and fullback **Peter Tuipulotu.**

On defense, honors' candidates include linebacker **Rocky Biegel** and defensive backs **Tony Crutchfield** and **Derwin Gray.** Other starters returning are linebackers **Shad Hansen, Scott Giles** and **Jared Leavitt** (the latter two shared the 1990 season at one outside backer spot).

Punter/kicker **Earl Kauffman** returns for his senior year. He would have led the nation much of last year but didn't qualify because of too few kicks.

The Cougars do have a lot of size among the offensive linemen but not much experience. And the receiving corps--traditional unsung heroes in the Air Edwards formula--has only **Bryce Doman** who has started a game at BYU and he's been away from football two years on a church mission.

A large group of freshmen redshirts plus an excellent crop of frosh recruits, especially running backs, could help BYU's quest for its third straight WAC title. BYU has won the conference title 12 of the last 15 years.

Coach Edwards continues as the third winningest active coach (175-59-1) behind

Nebraska's Tom Osborne and Joe Paterno of Penn State.

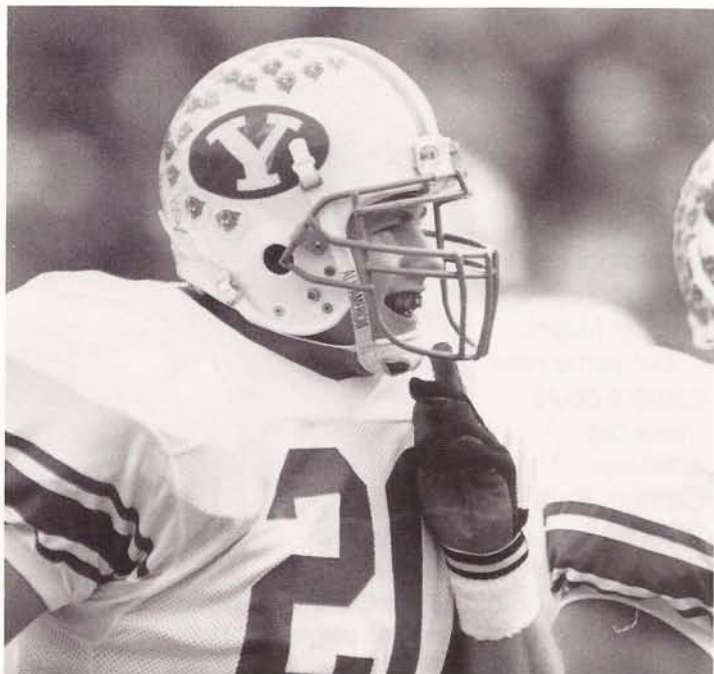
Here's a closer look at the Cougars:

OFFENSE Backfield

Detmer has the pins out of his throwing shoulder and is undergoing therapy. Without him, Cougar coaches got a look at backup senior **Joe Evans**, sophomore **Brock Spencer** (last year's JV signal caller), transfer **Garth Fennegan** (Clemson) and red-shirt freshman **Ryan Hancock**, the league's Freshman of the Year as a pitcher on the baseball team. Back from church missions are **Tom Young** and **Scott Shreeve.** In the fall, high school phenom **John**

Walsh will be here. Hancock was impressive in bouncing back and forth between football spring drills and baseball practice.

Tuipulotu was BYU's top rusher last year (637 yards). Although he averaged only 53.1 yards per game he scored nine touchdowns and had an impressive per-carry mark of 6.5. **Scott Charlton** has been moved from fullback to halfback to try Bellini's spot, which was primarily a pass-catching role last season.

Eric Mortensen seems at full strength after a series of injuries and could spell either starter. Looking good in the spring were **Jason Schmidt**, **Steve Christensen** and **Hema Heimuli**, highly recruited before going on a mission out of high school.

Some standout incoming freshmen also could make the traveling squad from a group Edwards calls, "as good a group of athletes as we've recruited."

Offensive Line

Only **Bryan May** returns but there are 12-15 players vying for starting spots and the competition in the spring was intense.

May probably will move to guard and the other guard could be redshirt freshman **Evan Pilgrim**, returned missionary **Mike Empey** (6-6, 280) or senior **Garett Tujague**.

The center job is a battle between **Mike Jenkins** (6-7, 340) and squad member **Garry Pay**. Returned missionary **Ron Simmons** is another possibility at a position which is a concern for the Cougars after the loss of three-year starter Robert Stephens.

Redshirt transfer **Scott Brumfield** (6-8, 320) is battling letterman **Kent Griffith** for one tackle spot. Brumfield was a JC All-American but broke his wrist

last fall and then sprained an ankle and missed half of spring practice. At the other tackle spot letterman **Tom Ladd** will try and hold off star of the future **Eli Herring** (6-6, 310), a returned missionary. Line coach Roger French says, "There aren't many athletes in the country better than Herring and Empey."

Receivers

Trying to replace Smith won't be easy at tight end. The candidates are **Matt Zundel** with good hands and **Byron Rex** with good speed. BYU might go with three wide receivers more often than in recent years. **Micah Matsuzaki** and **Nati Valdez** should have good years and **Eric Drage** has worked hard to make the conversion from halfback to wideout. **Erik Hughes** from the track team provides speed and two of the best frosh receivers ever--Doman and **Tyler Anderson**--will be back from missions but missed spring practice.

Kicking Game

Earl Kauffman, a three-year kickoff man and two-year punter, returns and should be an honors' candidate. Deep snapper **Bruce Jenne** returns.

DEFENSE

Defensive Line

"Interesting," is the way Coach Edwards refers to his biggest problem area--at least on paper. The top four players are gone and part-timer **Brad Hunter** had ankle surgery in the spring. Chris Conners played well in limited action last year but newcomers could determine how strong the Cougars are on defense.

Redshirts **Randy Brock** (6-7, 260) and **Scott Sral-la** (6-4, 265) are battling for the tackle spots as are freshmen returned missionaries **Greg Pitts** and **Doug Stone**.

Another redshirt, sophomore **Lenny Gomes**, could start at nose guard backed up by freshman **Harland Ah You**. Conners has switched to nose guard and could be a factor.

Linebackers

The strength of the team going into 1991 is the linebacking corps, where only Alema Fitisemanu is gone. **Jared Leavitt** is back at one outside spot after neck surgery and his replacement, **Scott Giles**, could be on the other side.

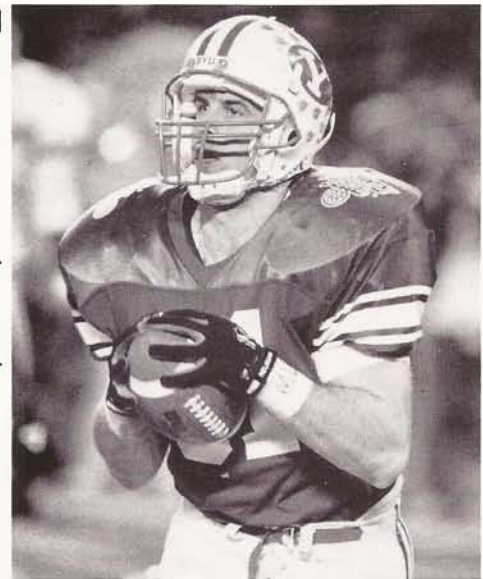
Rocky Biegel will be starting for the fourth year and **Shad Hansen** is back at the other inside spot. **Kevin Nicoll**, a transfer who redshirted last year, had a good spring as did squad member **Mike Hoggan** and **Todd Herget**. Redshirt freshmen **Justin Yarro** and **Travis Hall** also could see action.

Secondary

Three players who started at the end of the season are back although cornerback **Tony Crutchfield** is coming off knee surgery. **Josh Arnold** looks set at

strong safety and **Derwin Gray** at weak safety. In addition, **Ervin Lee** played a lot last year in the nickel defense and had a key interception against Miami.

But some newcomers could make big splashes. Corners **Paul Pitts** and **Courtney Overstreet**, both from Pasadena City College, have excellent speed and incoming frosh **Hassan-Kareem McCullough** brings standout credentials. Add to the list freshman **Karlos Rhodes** and there's good depth in the defensive backfield. Rhodes was on campus for spring practice and could make a big contribution if he regains top speed after knee surgery.

Special Teams

Stacey Corley, who had most of the kickoff returns is gone but the next four--Mortensen, Charlton, Gray and **Brad Clark**--are back. The two punt returners--Bellini and Mike Salido --are gone so the Cougars are looking at Clark, Matsuzaki, **Kapi Sihakema** and **Patrick Mitchell**, a redshirt freshman who also could see action as a defensive back.

The "Other" Tie

The only tie in LaVell Edwards' career came in his 26th game as head coach on Oct. 5, 1974, at Fort Collins. A 26-6 lead had dwindled to 33-27 with six seconds left and BYU had the ball. But the final snap was bobbled and Colorado State got a chance for one more play--which went for a touchdown. The ensuing celebration caused a 15-yard penalty and resulted in the PAT barely missing. However, confusion resulted when Rams' players and fans misinterpreted the official's end-of-game signal as indicating the kick was good. Ironically, BYU went from 0-3-1 to win seven straight and make its first post-season appearance--in the Fiesta Bowl.

On the sidelines he stands—arms folded, temples thinning, hair graying—gazing outward, in pursuit of victory.

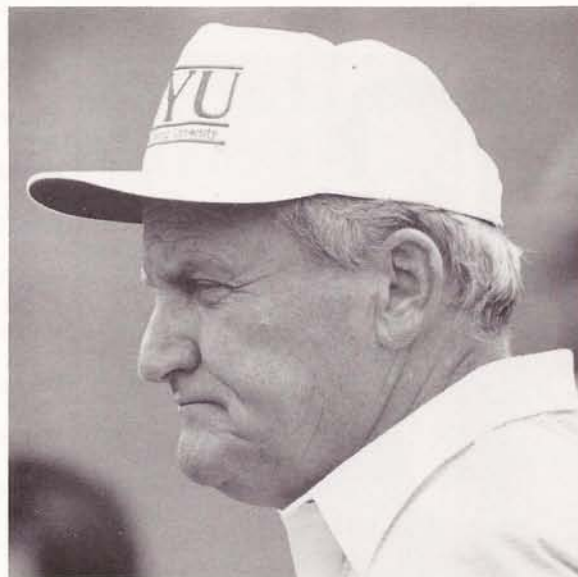
His are many. From the early days of his career as a high school coach, through “The Edwards Era” at Brigham Young University, his contests have proven themselves to be reflections of the man, his character.

His has been portrayed in the dignity with which he has savored victory, for he realizes that in another locker room, is another coach and team, whose efforts have fallen short of stopping his frightening offense and relentless defense.

He knows the fruits of victory are bittersweet, for often have been the times that he, too, has returned to a silent locker room, disappointed though graceful in the face of defeat. He has understood as well as any that a win and a loss are to be accepted with equal courage, knowing that only one is desirable, though both are inevitable.

His has been portrayed as he has sought to instill in each player integrity for self, respect for opponent and regard for spectator. Such has taken him from the ranks of obscurity to the pinnacle of prominence as he and his Cougars have placed themselves among the elite in college football. From his devotion to principle, those who see him on the sidelines know that he looks beyond the scoreboard and the record book to measure success.

The passing of each season of football marks for him a passing of a season of life—full of adversity and triumph. As he exemplifies that one must conquer both to be a champion, all regard him as a man of



stature as well as statistics; a family man as well as a coach; a citizen as well as a competitor. His reflection shows all that the victories on the field are of the moment, and the greatest victory of all is to master life itself.

Silently he stands, the intensity of the moment reflected in his gaze. The mantle of his character, the mark of a champion.

LaVell Edwards, Head Coach

When LaVell Edwards was named BYU's head football coach in 1972, Cougar football fortunes skyrocketed.

Prior to '72, BYU had averaged less than three wins a year in the school's 47 football seasons. The Cougars could claim only one Western Athletic Conference championship (1965) and had never been to a bowl game.

Since that time, however, BYU has won 175 games, 13 WAC championships (including 10 in a row from 1976-85) and played in 15 bowl games (including 13 in a row). Honors and recognition have rolled in as the football program has risen to national prominence.

Six times in his 19 years as head coach ('72, '79, '80, '83, '84 and '90), the 60-year-old Edwards has been selected WAC Coach-of-the-Year, and five times he has been named Kodak District Eight Coach-of-the-Year ('74, '77, '79, '80 and '84). The post-season games that LaVell has coached in include the Hula Bowl (twice), the Blue-Gray Classic (twice), the East-West Shrine game (three times), the Japan Bowl (twice) and the Coaches' All-America Game.

In 1988, LaVell completed a term as president of the 5,700-member American Football Coaches Association (AFCA). He was the 64th president in the association's history.

In 1984, Edwards led the Cougars to their first-ever football national championship and along the way, picked up NCAA Coach-of-the-Year honors from the American Football Coaches, the Football Writers and the Pigskin Club of Washington, D.C.

Such accolades are justly deserved for one of the great minds in the coaching profession who also is a churchman, husband, father, grandfather, author, teacher and doctor.

LaVell's winning percentage (.747) ranks third among the nation's active college coaches. And under Edwards, BYU has averaged over 10 wins a season in the 1980's. In 1986, LaVell passed Frank Kush as the all-time leader in WAC coaching victories.

Having roots in Orem, Utah, LaVell was born and raised not far from BYU's stadium. He graduated from Lincoln High School and attended Utah State, where he was a three-year letterman and captain of the football team. Twice he earned all-conference honors at center for the Aggies.

At USU he met his wife-to-be, Patti Covey. LaVell entered the Army, where he played on two service football teams: Fort Lee, Va., in 1952 and Fort Mead, Md., in 1953 as a player-coach with a 6-3 record.

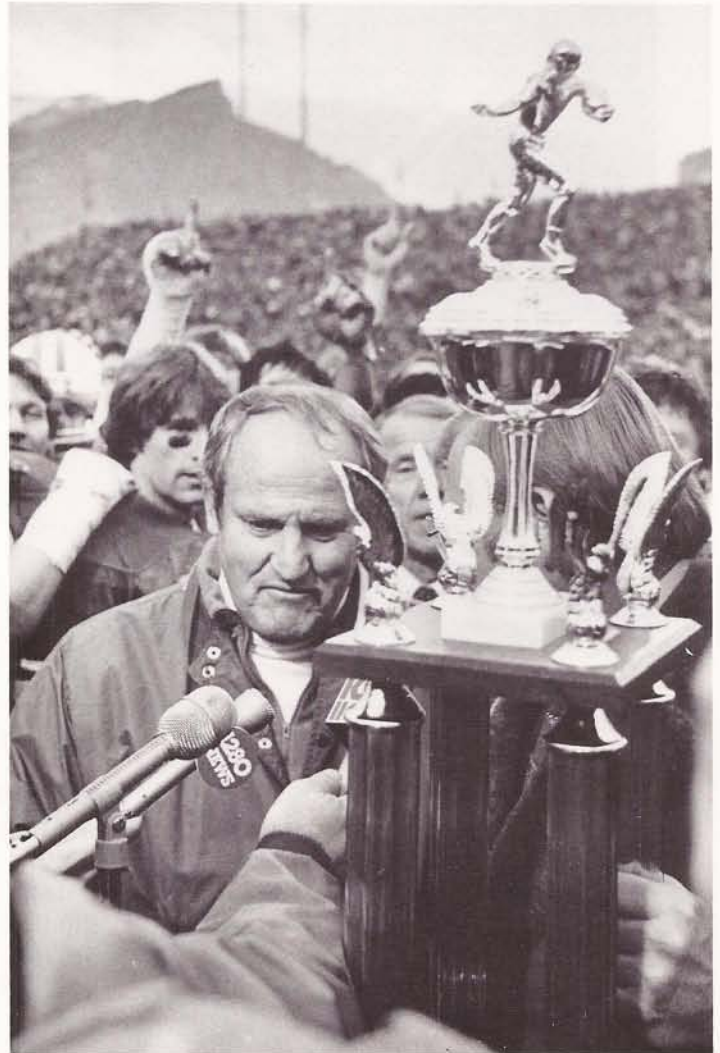
From there, LaVell went into his first full-time coaching job at Granite High School in Salt Lake City, where he coached from 1954-61 before joining the BYU staff in 1962. Ten years after becoming part of the Cougar staff, Edwards was named head coach, succeeding Tommy Hudspeth.

The football philosophy practiced by Coach Edwards is one of high-powered offense and rugged defense. Under his guidance, BYU has led the nation in passing eight times ('76, '77, '79, '80, '81, '83, '84 and '85), in total offense five times ('79, '80, '83, '84 and '85) and in scoring ('79).

A 1952 graduate of Utah State, Edwards has added to his academic honors a master's degree from the University of

Utah (1960) and an Ed.D. from BYU (1978). His attitude toward education is contagious, and several of his assistants have gone on to attain doctorate degrees.

Edwards has coached more years, won more games and had a better winning percentage than any coach in Cougar football history. His wife, Pat, writes columns for the *Provo Daily Herald*. They have three married children: Ann Edwards Cannon, a writer, Salt Lake City; John, a doctor, New York City; and Jim, a lawyer, Las Vegas.

LaVell's Career Highlights

1972 LaVell Edwards, defensive coordinator for the Cougars is named head coach in January . . . had been a member of the BYU staff since 1962 . . . halfback **Pete VanValkenburg** wins NCAA rushing title with a 138.6 yards-per-game average . . . the Cougars also lead the league in defense against the rush.

1973 The Cougars begin to move offensively . . . quarterback **Gary Sheide** is runnerup in NCAA passing and No. 3 in total offense . . . teammate **Jay Miller** leads the nation in pass receiving (100 receptions for 1,181 yards) . . . Cougars finish second nationally in passing and eighth in total offense . . . Miller sets an NCAA record for most pass receptions (22) in one game (record still stands).

1974 Team ranks high in two NCAA statistical categories; seventh in passing offense, fourth in rushing defense . . . **Gary Sheide** is runnerup in passing for the second year in a row (behind Steve Bartkowski of California) . . . Gary's career completion percentage is fourth on the all-time list . . . Bartkowski's final pass completion edged Sheide (182-181) for title. LaVell wins first WAC championship and a trip to the Fiesta Bowl against Oklahoma State.

1975 A year of adjustment, the Cougars falter through the first part of the season, then win six of their last eight games . . . **Gifford Nielsen**, a sophomore reserve, comes off the bench in the fourth game (New Mexico) to spark a come-from-behind victory . . . Giff sets WAC record with 10-of-12 passing in that game . . . becomes starter . . . Cougars finish 10th in team passing.

1976 Gifford Nielsen places fourth in NCAA passing (18.8) with only one-tenth completion separating him from Jack Thompson (Washington State) in second place . . . Giff finishes second to Tommy Kramer (Rice) in total offense . . . Cougars finish first in passing, sixth in total offense and eighth in NCAA scoring (424.4 total, 307.8 passing and 31.9 scoring) . . . Nielsen voted first team All-American . . . Cougars tie for WAC championship and play Oklahoma State in the Tangerine Bowl.

1977 Gifford Nielsen unexpectedly exits scene with injury in fourth game (Oregon State) and Marc Wilson takes over . . . by the end of the year, the two have combined for 40 TD passes, 3,585 yards passing and a .605 completion percentage . . . Wilson finishes eighth in passing and third in total offense . . . Cougars lead nation in passing (341.6), finish second in scoring (39.4) and third in total offense (470.2) . . . Cougars win WAC and play in first Holiday Bowl against Navy.

1979 With two all-conference quarterbacks to choose from, Edwards decides to redshirt **McMahon** in favor of senior **Wilson** . . . Cougars upset Texas A&M in season opener

and go on to record 11 straight wins . . . Wilson leads the nation in total offense (325.5) and is fourth in pass efficiency (147.1) . . . finishes the year as consensus All-American with 10 NCAA records to his credit . . . Cougars lead the nation in four categories: passing (368.3), total offense (521.4), scoring (40.6) and kickoff returns (26.3) . . . also, the Cougars are 11th in scoring defense (11.4) and sixth in punting (40.1) . . . McMahon is the first Division I player to pass for more than 4,000 yards in a season (4,571) . . . he set or tied 26 NCAA records, most in total offense and passing . . . his pass efficiency (176.9) was the highest ever . . . he also led the nation in total offense (385.6) . . . after losing the first game to New Mexico, BYU wins 12 straight . . . 1981 Another 11-win season for the Cougars . . . have a 17-game win streak and rank eighth in the polls before losing to Nevada-Las Vegas . . . BYU leads the nation in passing for the third consecutive year . . . **McMahon** earns All-America honors and finishes his career with 71 NCAA records (plus the first Davey O'Brien Award) and sets record with all-time high in career pass efficiency (156.9) . . . LaVell coaches West team to a victory in the Hula Bowl . . . also coaches in the Japan Bowl . . . Cougars win WAC again and play Washington State in Holiday Bowl IV . . . Edwards' 86-32-1 record ranks among top ten in the nation.

1982 BYU expands Cougar Stadium to 65,000 seats and sells out each game . . . lose home opener to Air Force (39-38) but come back to win seventh straight WAC title and play Ohio State in Holiday Bowl V . . . **Gordon Hudson** is named consensus All-America . . . BYU finishes third nationally in total offense . . . **Steve Young** is named WAC offensive player-of-the-year.

1983 Another 11-win season . . . Cougars are ranked No. 7 in final polls, highest ever for a BYU team . . . quarterback **Steve Young** and tight end **Gordon Hudson** both named consensus All-Americans . . . after losing to Baylor in the opening game, BYU wins final 11 games . . . once again, BYU leads the nation in passing and total offense and is second in scoring . . . Cougars set NCAA total offense record with 584.2 yards-per-game . . . BYU wins eighth straight WAC title and defeats Missouri in Holiday Bowl VI . . . Edwards surpasses the 100-victory milestone.

1984 Cougars win the National Championship by becoming only the third team in NCAA history to win 13 games in a season . . . win streak is extended to 24 games . . . quarterback **Robbie Bosco** leads the nation in passing and finishes second to **Doug Flutie** in pass efficiency (151.8) . . . defensive back **Kyle Morrell** named first team All-America . . . team leads the nation in passing (346.2) and total offense (486.5) . . . defensively, Cougars finish 10th in scoring defense . . . another WAC championship and victory over Michigan in

Holiday Bowl VII . . . Edwards named NCAA coach-of-the-year by most organizations.

Cougars rebound to rank ninth nationally in passing offense and 22nd in scoring offense . . . after offensive line is decimated in pre-season camp, Cougars bounce back from 1-2 start to win eight of final nine regular season games . . . young backfield shows promise of things to come in getting within a two-point conversion of another WAC title . . . **Chuck Cutler** begins the first of two years as a GTE Academic All-America first teamer . . . **Leonard Chitty** sets career records for consecutive conversions (42) and for field goals (34) . . . Cougars win Gridiron Bowl in

Melbourne, Australia, but injuries prove costly in All American Bowl loss to Virginia.

1988 Cougars win seven straight but drop to third in WAC race . . . He finishes the year with 5,188 yards passing—the most ever and increases his NCAA records to 47 . . . **Chris Smith** is a consensus All-America and has more reception yards (1,156) than any tight end in history . . . **Andy Boyce** gains more yards receiving (1,241) than anyone who has played at BYU . . . **Matt Bellini** breaks the career record for catches with 204 . . . Assistant Coaches

Claude Bassett (BYU '78) Inside Linebackers



Claude Bassett enters his ninth year with the Cougar football program. He was named an assistant coach in 1985 after working as a graduate assistant with the Cougars for two years.

Prior to coming to BYU, Bassett was a coach and teacher at Mountain View High School in Mesa, Ariz. There he worked under Coach Jess Parker and helped the team win the state title twice. He also taught and

coached at Pleasant Grove High (1976) and Spanish Fork High (1978) in Utah County.

Born in Reno, Nev., Bassett attended Enterprise High School in Redding, Calif., where he participated in football and baseball. He also attended Shasta Junior College in Redding.

Before transferring to BYU (where he graduated in 1978), he served a two-year mission for the LDS Church in Rome, Italy. He is married to the former Leslie Johnson of Orem, and they have four children: Jed, Annette, Camille and Rebecca.

Robbie Bosco (BYU '86) Offensive Assistant



Robbie Bosco begins his second year as a full-time assistant after being a graduate assistant in 1989. The Roseville, Calif., native is best known for leading BYU to the national championship in 1984, when he guided the Cougars to a 13-0 record and led the nation in passing.

In 1985, he finished second in NCAA total offense and was third in the Heisman Trophy balloting for the second straight year. He set 10 NCAA record at BYU, was a second team All-America, and finished third in voting for the Davey O'Brien Trophy.

Drafted by the Green Bay Packers, Bosco had his pro career cut short by an arm injury. He graduated with a degree in communications and is now working on a master's degree in physical education. He is

married to Karen Holt and they have two children, Amber and Karissa.

Norm Chow (Utah '68) Quarterbacks, Receivers



Norm Chow has been an integral part of BYU's successful offense for the past 14 seasons. He coaches the receivers and the quarterbacks and is the coach who calls BYU's plays. For several years, Chow coordinated BYU's recruiting efforts.

Prior to joining the BYU coaching staff fulltime, he spent two years as a graduate assistant. Chow graduated from Punahou High ('64) in Honolulu, where he was named "Athlete of the Year."

He then attended the University of Utah, where he achieved All-WAC (1967-68) and honorable mention All-America honors as an offensive guard. He graduated in 1968.

A career in the Canadian Football League was cut short after one year when Chow injured his knee. He then became head coach for three years at Hawaii's Waiialua High School.

Chow received a master's degree in special education from the University of Utah and a doctorate in educational psychology from BYU in 1979. He and his wife, Diane, have four children: Carter, Maile, Cameron and Chandler.

Dick Felt (BYU '58) Asst. Head Coach, Secondary

After an outstanding college career at BYU and a seven-year stint in professional football, Dick Felt returned in 1967 to become a coach.



This is his 24th year on the staff. After returning from heart surgery at the start of last season, Felt's responsibilities continue to be with the defensive backs.

Dick lettered in five sports at Lehi High School in Utah and was an all-state football player. He went to BYU where, as a

sophomore, he came off the bench in a game with San Jose State to score a record four touchdowns in one quarter. He won all-conference honors as a senior.

After graduating in 1958, he played for Bolling Air Force Base (1958-60), where he earned all-service honors and was named MVP in the Air Force (1960). He was a first lieutenant.

Felt played two seasons with the New York Titans (1960-61), the second year attaining all-pro second-team honors as a defensive back. He was traded to the Boston Patriots and was all-pro in 1962. He played in the first two AFL all-star games. Felt left pro ball in 1966 and came to BYU in 1967.

Dick is married to Dayleen LaVon Hobson of Boise, Idaho, and they have four children: Karen, Curtis, Kristie and Nancy.

Roger French (Minnesota '58) Offensive Coord., Off. Line

Roger French has been in charge of BYU's offense for the past 11 years, during which time the Cougars have traditionally led the nation in passing and total offense.



French joined Edwards' staff in 1980 and has since helped produce numerous All-WAC and All-America offensive linemen, including 1989 Outland Trophy winner Moe Elewonibi..

Before coming to BYU, Roger coached at Minnesota and Wisconsin for 14 years. His responsibilities at Minnesota included coaching the offensive line, tight ends and receivers. He was also defensive coordinator and line coach at Wisconsin and Memphis State.

Since French has come to BYU, the Cougars have won the National Championship (1984) and set the NCAA total offense record of 584 yards per game (1983). They also led the nation in passing and total offense three of the last seven years.

Born in Minneapolis, French played linebacker, tight end and fullback at Minnesota, graduating in 1956. He obtained a master's degree and played with the Philadelphia Eagles and the Cleveland Browns.

He began coaching at Memphis State, where he was defensive coordinator. In 1962, MSU finished second in the nation defensively. He has coached several All-American linemen in his career, and more than 35 have gone on to play pro ball.

Roger and his wife, Dody, have two daughters, Kathy and Gail.

Chris Pella (Utah State '66) Recruiting Coord., Kicking, TE's



Chris Pella joined the BYU coaching fraternity in 1986 after spending 18 years as a coach at Utah State. He was head coach of the Aggies from 1983-85.

A native of Brigham City, Utah, Pella attended Box Elder High School and Dixie Junior College, where he was team captain and a junior college All-American. He then joined the Utah State Aggies as a fullback,

offensive lineman and kicker, setting a school record with nine PATs against New Mexico State.

After graduating in 1965, Pella was hired as an assistant coach, a position he held for 15 years under coaches Tony Knap, Chuck Mills, Phil Krueger and Bruce Snyder.

Over that time, he worked with every position on the team. He also was head wrestling coach for two years. Pella worked for the U.S. Navy in Yokosuka, Japan, as the athletic director and football coach at the Navy base from 1969 to 1972. His 1971 team won the Interservice Championship and played in the Rice Bowl.

He returned to Utah State in the fall of 1972. In 1983 he was named head football coach, replacing Bruce Snyder.

Pella and his wife, Rita, are the parents of three children: Brian, Jake and Nicole.

Tom Ramage (Utah State '57) Defensive Line, Special Teams



Tom Ramage has perhaps the most varied football coaching background in the state of Utah. He joined the BYU staff 18 years ago after coaching in the high school, junior college and major college ranks.

Since Ramage was hired, the Cougars have traditionally ranked high in the WAC in defense against the rush.

Ramage came to BYU from Dixie College in St. George, Utah, where he was head coach for two seasons (13-7 overall). He was born in Price, Utah, and enrolled at Utah State, where he won All-Skyline Conference and All-America honors as a tackle in 1956 and lettered in

wrestling four years. He graduated in 1957.

He began his coaching career at Bear River, Utah, then returned to USU, where he served as assistant and obtained his M.S. degree (1962). For the next four years, Tom was line coach of the Aggies under Tony Knap.

He left Logan in 1965 to serve as chief assistant and defensive coordinator at Weber State under Sark Arslanian. In 1971 he took the head job at Dixie College. Sandwiched into his stay at Weber, he served as a commissioned officer in the Army and was discharged as a captain in 1967. Tom has coached two Outland Trophy winners: Merlin Olsen (Utah State) and Jason Buck (BYU).

Tom and his wife, Winona, have six children: John, an assistant coach at Utah State; Lorrie; Rochelle; Sherrie; Dedra; and Cory.

Lance Reynolds (BYU '77) Running Backs



For more than a decade, Lance Reynolds has played a key role in BYU's football successes as a player and as a coach. He joined the BYU staff in 1983 after a successful coaching job at Snow College (Ephraim, Utah).

A Salt Lake native, Lance was all-state at Granite High School. He played offensive tackle and guard at BYU before leaving on an LDS mission to Seattle,

Wash., after his sophomore year.

When he returned, he earned All-WAC honors at offensive tackle and played in the East-West Shrine

game and the Senior Bowl. After graduating in 1970, he played one season with both the Pittsburgh Steelers and Philadelphia Eagles.

Lance and his wife, Leslie, have five children: Brittany, Lance Jr., Dallas, Matthew and Houston.

Ken Schmidt (Utah '64) Def. Coord., Outside Linebackers



Ken Schmidt takes over the title of defensive coordinator after serving in that role last season while Dick Felt underwent heart surgery.

Ken joined the Cougars in 1982 after a successful high school and junior college coaching career.

A Murray, Utah, native, Schmidt enrolled at the University of Utah, where he was a center and linebacker under

Coach Ray Nagel. He graduated in 1964 and obtained his M.S. degree from Utah in 1969.

He began his coaching career as an assistant at Granger High School (1964-68). Later, he was named head coach at Skyline High School (Salt Lake City), where his teams posted a 105-24-1 record and won five state championships during his stay (1968-79).

In 1980, he was named head coach at Ricks College (Rexburg, Idaho). The Vikings won the conference championship both his years there and posted a 17-3 record. In 1981, Ricks defeated Arizona Western in the Valley of the Sun Bowl.

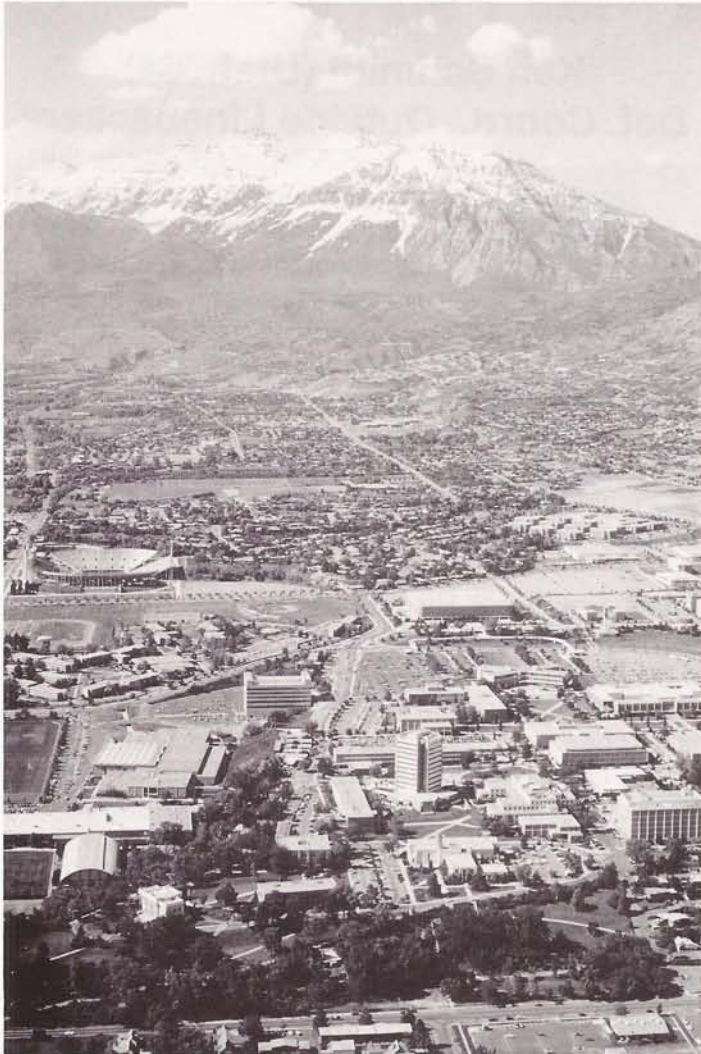
Ken and his wife, the former Yvonne Youngberg of Murray, have five children: Ryan, Craig, Jason, Shauna and Chad.

Brigham Young University



Brigham Young University is a private, church-sponsored institution which has earned an admirable reputation for successfully blending scholarly learning with moral and spiritual education.

BYU began modestly in 1875 as Brigham Young Academy with 29 elementary school students. It is now a fully accredited, internationally recognized university with a student body of 27,000, making it the largest private university in the nation in terms of full-time students.

Academic excellence is increasingly evident as students and faculty show their competence. Almost three-quarters of the 1,300 full-time faculty hold doctoral degrees, and the university is accredited by more than 100 education, business, professional and government organizations.

Admission standards for students continue to rise as competition for acceptance increases. The average ACT composite score for entering BYU freshmen is now 23, compared to the national average of 19. BYU graduated four Rhodes Scholars between 1975 and 1978, a record matched only by Harvard, Yale and Princeton. In 1976, it was one of two schools to place three Danforth fellows in a single year.

The J. Reuben Clark Law School is establishing a reputation as one of the elite top-40 law schools in the nation, with three of its graduates already selected as clerks to the U.S. Supreme Court.

Other highly respected programs include the School of Management, with its fifth-ranked accountancy department and top-rated MBA program; the computer-aided design/computer-aided manufacturing program, with state-of-the-art computer ability and a reputation for innovation; a large team of researchers in several disciplines studying coal's promise as an alternative to oil; the Ezra Taft Benson Agriculture Food Institute, which is contributing knowledge to help solve the world's food problems.

The music and drama departments are also particularly noteworthy, as are its language programs, with their unusually extensive course offerings, and a large number of faculty researching family issues.

To fill the 14 semester hours of religion required, students can take courses ranging from the history of the LDS Church to comparative world religions. Four of the 14 credit hours are spent in study of the Book of Mormon, a text regarded by Mormons as scripture, along with the Bible.

The 631-acre campus is a superb facility. It is unusually clean and well-kept, with beautiful landscaping and spacious quads. The Lee Library, with more than two million volumes and a seating capacity of 4,000, is at the heart of the campus.

The Harris Fine Arts Center features five theatres, two art galleries, nine pipe organs, 65 music practice rooms, a National Public Radio station and a Public Broadcasting Service television studio. Laboratories all over campus boast up-to-date equipment and full computerization. A new art museum is now under construction.

In addition to the Utah and Hawaii campuses, BYU maintains Study Abroad programs in China, Austria, England, France, Italy, Israel, Canada, Mexico, Brazil and Jerusalem.

Academic accomplishments and physical facilities aside, many BYU students and faculty point to the character of its people and their commitment to traditional values as the school's most important attributes. Each student signs a Code of Honor, promising to abstain from alcohol, tobacco, tea and coffee and to be honest and chaste—all in accord with tenets of the LDS Church.

Although 98 percent of the student body is Mormon, admission is open to those of any race, color, creed or national origin, provided they meet the university's academic requirements and their conduct conforms to the standards of the LDS Church.

Non-Mormons come from over 25 other denominations, and about 22 percent of the student body is married. Students come from every state (32 percent from Utah) and more than 70 countries. More than 8,000 students are bilingual, having learned a foreign language while serving a mission for the LDS Church in another country.

BYU is on a three-semester system (4-4-2-2) with fall and winter semesters each being four months long, and the summer semester being divided into spring and summer terms.



President Rex E. Lee

Perhaps the best example of President Rex E. Lee's national reputation came earlier this year to chair a committee to review the NCAA's rules enforcement and infractions process. Among those serving under him is Warren E. Burger, former Chief Justice of the United States.

Lee, 56, a former U.S. Solicitor General, became the 10th president of Brigham Young University on July 1, 1989. He was the founding dean of the J. Reuben Clark Law School at BYU, serving from 1972 to 1981. From 1985–1989 he was the law school's George Sutherland Professor of Law.

He was U.S. Solicitor General from 1981 to 1985. Previously, from 1975–1976, he had served as Assistant U.S. Attorney General in charge of the Justice Department's Civil Division.

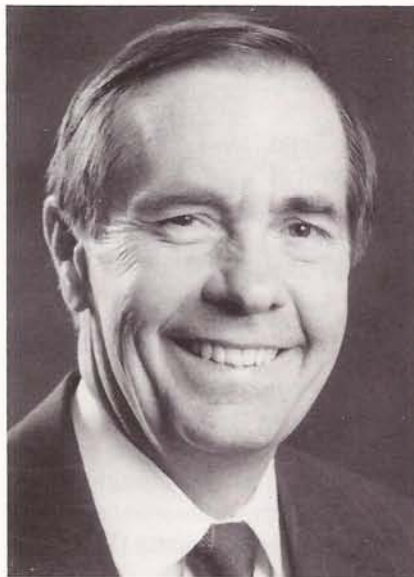
Lee is a 1960 graduate of Brigham Young University and earned a juris doctorate from the University of Chicago in 1963. He served as law clerk to Justice Byron R. White of the U.S. Supreme Court, 1963–1964, and then practiced law with the firm of Jennings, Strouss and Salmon in Phoenix from 1964–1972.

It was during his tenure as founding dean of the law school at BYU that Lee took a leave of absence to serve as Assistant U.S. Attorney General.

Since 1985, he has been a partner in the law firm of Sidley and Austin, working out of its Washington, D.C., office.

Earlier in his career, he served as a lecturer for the American Institute of Foreign Trade, 1966–1968, and from 1968 to 1972 he was on the faculty of the University of Arizona School of Law.

He has been admitted to the bar in Utah, Arizona and Washington, D.C., and is a member of the American Law



Institute. In late April, 1990, he argued his 50th case before the U.S. Supreme Court. He is one of only a handful of living lawyers to have reached that milestone.

The university president has served his church as a missionary in Mexico, where he was second counselor to the mission president; as a member of the Young Men General Board (1958–1960), and has been a bishop, stake president, stake high counselor, Sunday School

teacher, and in other administrative and teaching positions.

As a young boy growing up in St. Johns, Arizona, he earned the distinction of being the first boy in that community to become an Eagle Scout.

Rex Edwin Lee was born in Los Angeles, Calif., Feb. 27, 1935, a son of Rex E. and Mabel Whiting Lee. His father died before Lee was born, and his mother married Wilford J. Shumway two years later. Lee married Janet Griffin in the Mesa, Arizona, LDS Temple in 1959. They have seven children and five grandchildren.

R. J. Snow, Student Life Vice President

R. J. Snow is currently serving in his second year as Student Life Vice President at BYU. He accepted the position after returning from the South Africa Johannesburg Mission where he served as mission president from 1987–1990.

Before his mission call, Snow was president and director of The Jacobson Company from 1984–1987. Prior to that, he served for nearly a decade as the vice president of university and student relations at the University of Utah.

He also served as director of the Robert H. Hinckley Institute of Politics and as a member of the political science faculty during his tenure at Utah.

A native of St. George, Snow received his associate of science degree from Dixie College in 1957. He then enrolled at the University of Utah where he earned both his bachelor (1962) and masters of arts (1964) degrees in history.

Snow continued his education at Northwestern University



where he completed his doctoral degree (1965) in political science.

In 1967, Snow moved to California where he served on the political science faculty for the University of California, Santa Barbara, until 1973.

Snow has also completed post-doctoral work at the University of Oregon, Harvard University and has worked with the University of Pau and the University of Bordeaux as part of a UC Santa Barbara study abroad program.

Snow has been very active in civic and community service having served on the committee for Executive Reorganization of the State of Utah, as board member of the Utah Symphony and on task forces for the homeless and mentally ill.

His service on more than 25 other civic and charitable organizations include board membership of the Salt Lake United Way, and board chairman for the Utah affiliate of the American Diabetes Association.

Born in Cedar City as Reuben Joseph Snow on October 15, 1937, he and his family moved to St. George when he was six months old. In 1962, he married the former Marilyn Melville in the St. George Temple. They have four children.



Faculty Representative, Athletic Director

Clayne R. Jensen, Associate Vice President

Dr. Clayne Jensen completed his 17th year this spring as Dean of the College of Physical Education, which encompassed BYU athletics.

He was replaced as Dean by Elmo Roundy and elevated to a new post of Associate Vice President-Student Life, a role exclusively for men's and women's athletics. He remains as the Faculty Athletic Representative, a position he has held since 1976.



A respected and experienced administrator, Dr. Jensen was a Professor and Associate Dean for seven years before becoming Dean. He was chairman of BYU's Athletics Advisory Board for nine years.

Dr. Jensen grew up in Gunnison, Utah. He obtained a bachelor's and master's degree from the University of Utah in 1952 and 1956, and his doctorate from Indiana University in 1963.

From 1953-55, he was a captain in the U.S. Marine Corps, and coached two all-Marine championship teams in track and field. He was a faculty member at Utah State (1956-64), member of Phi Kappa Phi, and recipient of the

Briethbard Athletic Foundation award (1955).

He is author or co-author of 16 books currently in print and used in over 700 colleges and universities, and he is presently under commission to author a book on "Sports and Physical Education in the World Today."

He is a member and chairman of several professional boards and special committees dealing with physical education, athletics and related fields. He holds membership in five professional groups and has traveled in 44 states and 29 countries.

The former dean served as U.S. delegate to the International Olympic Academy in Olympia, Greece. He has served on numerous committees of the NCAA, and is a former member of the governing council of that organization. Also, he is on the advisory board of the United States Sports Academy.

He has been included in 17 national and international biographies, including Who's Who in America, Who's Who in American Education, Outstanding Educators of America, Noteworthy Americans and 2000 Outstanding Americans.

Dr. Jensen is married to the former Elouise Henrie and they have four sons: Craig, Mike, Blake and Chris (three are former members of BYU's football team).

Glen Tuckett, Athletic Director

A native of Murray, Utah, Glen Tuckett was an all-around athlete at Murray High School. Following prep school, he went on to play professional baseball for nine seasons and was selected to the Western International League all-star team in 1954. During this time he received his B.S. degree from the University of Utah in 1953.

Tuckett launched his coaching career at West High School in Salt Lake City where he was head football and baseball coach as well as assisting in basketball for six years. He also managed the Calgary Dodgers in the Western Canada League in 1957.

In 1959 he joined the staff at BYU, serving as assistant football coach and head baseball coach. He obtained a master's degree from BYU in 1962 and a doctorate in 1978.

Besides winning baseball games, Tuckett had a successful approach to classroom teaching. He was nominated for the "Professor of the Year" award.

A popular speaker, Tuckett also worked as a color commentator with KSL radio for 10 years.

As head baseball coach for 17 years, his teams won 13 division baseball titles, three WAC championships and two NCAA District 7 crowns. Two of his teams played in the College World Series.

Tuckett was chosen as coach of the 1974 U.S. team which won the World Amateur Baseball Tournament for only the second time in 27 years.

In July 1976, Tuckett retired as the ninth winningest

baseball coach in the NCAA to become BYU's athletic director. During his tenure at BYU, the Cougars have claimed 12 athletic supremacy titles in the Western Athletic Conference and consistently have been ranked among the top-10 athletic programs in the country.

He was president of the 1977 American Association of Baseball Coaches and was inducted into the Collegiate Baseball Hall of Fame in 1979.



He has served on the NCAA Television Committee, the College Football Association Executive Committee and the College Football Association Television Committee. Tuckett serves on the NCAA Post Season Football Committee and is on the NCAA Baseball Tournament Committee.

Tuckett has received several honors for the hours of service he has put in to BYU, the community and the nation. In 1983 he was given the Dale Rex Award, symbolic of the person who has contributed most to amateur athletics in the State of Utah and the highest athletic honor given by BYU.

In 1985 he was inducted into the Utah Sports Hall of Fame for his successful coaching career at BYU. He has also been inducted into the BYU Hall of Fame.

He is married to the former Josephine Whittaker of Stockport, England, and they have four daughters: Alison, Shannon, Kendall and Erin.



Athletic Personnel

Pete Witbeck, Associate AD

Associate Athletic Director Alan "Pete" Witbeck has been involved with BYU athletics either as an athlete, as a coach or as an administrator for 42 years.

Witbeck, a native of Raymond, Alberta, Canada, came to BYU in 1949 as a long distance runner on the track team. While in Provo, he acquired bachelor's (1952) and master's (1954) degrees before joining the P.E. staff in 1955.

Three years later, Witbeck was hired to coach the freshman basketball team, a position he held for six years. During that time, his teams posted a 62-9 record, losing only three times in the last three years Witbeck was coach.

The 1963-64 Kittens were undefeated and ranked first in the nation among freshmen teams. That group went on to win the NIT title in 1966.

Witbeck was given the prestigious Dale Rex Memorial Award, awarded annually to the person who has contributed most to amateur athletics in the State

of Utah. As a member of that NIT championship team, he was inducted into BYU's Hall of Fame in 1980.

After the successful stint with the freshman program, Witbeck joined the varsity staff in 1962 as Stan Watts' top assistant. During Witbeck's tenure, the team won five out of 10 Western Athletic Conference championships and were nationally ranked.

He has been the right hand to the athletic director since 1972. Some of his responsibilities include overseeing athlete eligibility and game management and serving as liaison between BYU, the NCAA and the WAC.

He is married to the former Kathy Pickering, an elementary school principal. They have three children.



Mike King, Asst. AD-Finance

Mike King has been the Cougars' business for 12 years and became an assistant AD in 1989. He came to BYU from BYU-Hawaii, where he was controller and director of financial services.

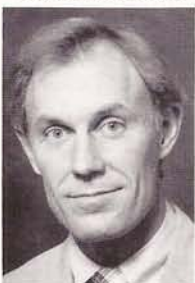

Athletic Department



Cougar fans will enjoy this 10th season in the expanded Cougar Stadium this fall.

In keeping with the tradition of excellence established by the University's academic programs, BYU's Athletic Department has become known around the country for its successes in various sports.

BYU has finished in the top-20 in overall national rankings for 12 of the last 20 years. The Cougars have finished in the top-10 nine times and in the top-5 five times. In the Western Athletic Conference, the Cougars have won the all-sports supremacy title 14 straight years.

The University's athletic program boasts 12 NCAA-sanctioned sports: football, basketball, baseball, indoor and outdoor track, golf, cross country, tennis, gymnastics, swimming, wrestling and volleyball.

Besides football, the golf (1981) and track (1970) teams have won national championships. Cougar basketball teams have won the NIT twice (1951, 1966) and have been ranked in the top-20 several times. They reached the final eight in the NCAA playoffs in 1981. BYU's baseball team won 19 WAC division titles in 20 years and was ranked as high as No. 1 nationally in 1983.

Part of the success of these teams can be attributed to the fine athletic facilities at BYU. The football team plays its games in the beautiful 65,000-seat Cougar Stadium. Practices are held on the field north of the George Albert Smith

Fieldhouse. The practice area incorporates four full-size football fields and other workout stations. The team's locker room and training facilities are located inside the Smith Fieldhouse.

The fieldhouse contains facilities for nearly every sport. A one-fifth mile rubberized track surrounds three basketball courts, weight rooms and an artificial turf practice area. The west annex of the fieldhouse is used by baseball, football, track and golf teams for indoor practice.

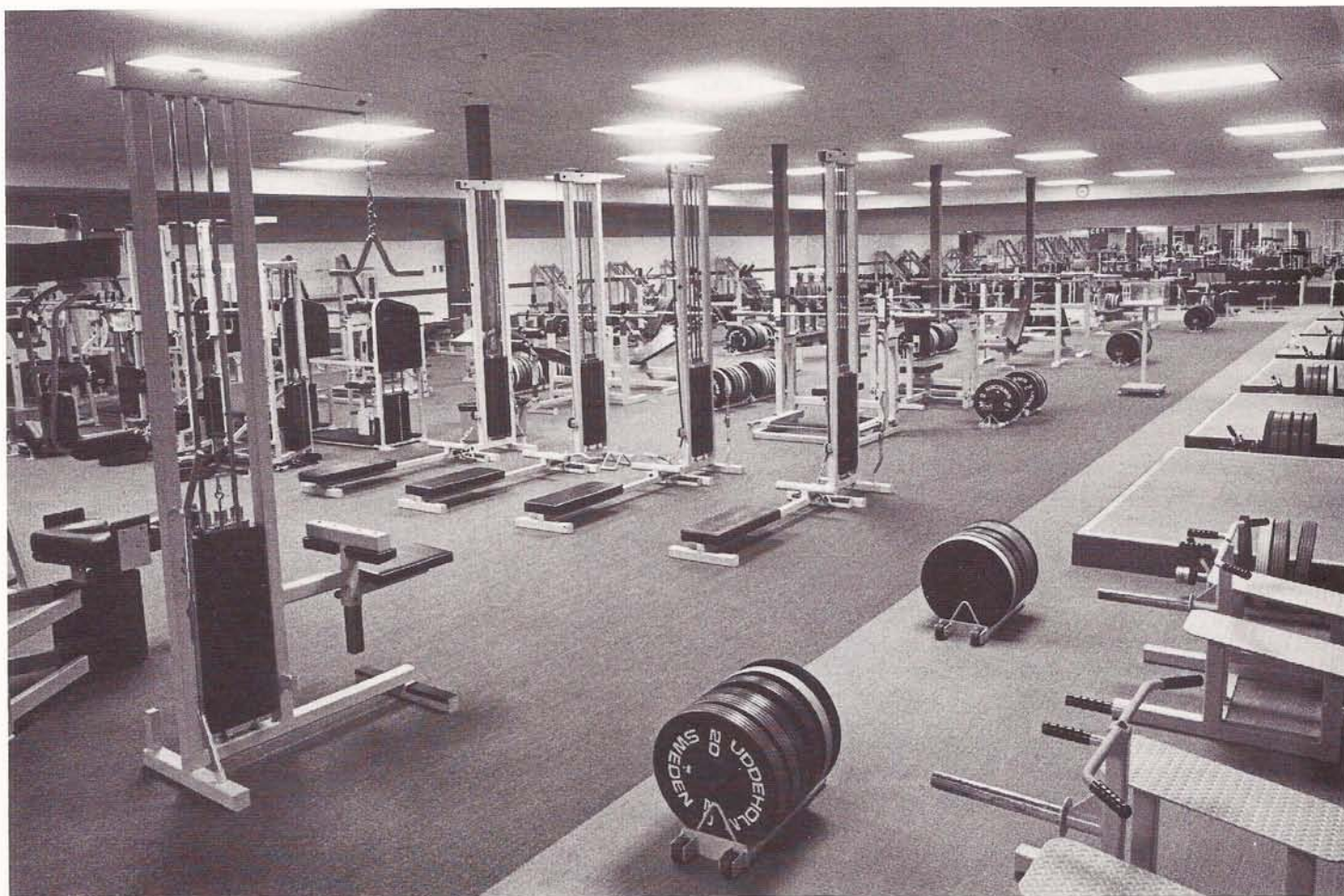
Attendance at BYU basketball games consistently ranks among the best in the nation. Games are played in the spacious 23,000-seat Marriott Center, the second largest on-campus basketball arena in the country. The facility is also used for concerts, forums and other activities.

BYU's track is acclaimed by coaches and athletes as one of the finest in the nation. The NCAA track and field championships were held there in 1982 and 1989. All running and field events can be viewed from the grandstand area. An animated electronic scoreboard entertains fans and keeps athletes current with running times, splits, etc.

The BYU baseball diamond is adjacent to the Marriott Center, the football stadium and the track and field complex. Bleachers provide seating for as many as 4,000 people.



Strength and Conditioning Center



BYU's strength and conditioning center is one of the best in the country.

BYU's conditioning facility ranks among the best in the country.

With nearly 10,000 square feet, the state-of-the-art center features 106 stations enhanced by beautiful blue and gray carpeting and by a stereophonic sound system with 40 speakers.

In short, it's an addition which looks good, sounds good and provides plenty of room for intercollegiate athletes to work out.

Patterned after the best features of weight rooms at other major football powers, the BYU facility is both functional and attractive. Its biggest advantages over previous conditioning areas for BYU athletes are that variety and ample space are provided.

Athletes no longer have to wait around for a certain piece of equipment. They can get more done in much less time than before and do not have to plan their weight training in early morning or late evening to get it all in.

That is especially helpful for athletes of other sports who have had a struggle finding equipment available during football season.

Another plus for the athletes is the motivational factor of getting caught up in conditioning fever by seeing so many others working out at the same time. Cougar athletes who tried the new facility shortly after it opened during the summer raved about how much more fun it was to work on strength and mobility in large, rather than small, groups.

Athletes also have been quick to point out the recruiting benefits of the new facility. They insist the BYU conditioning setup is far better than any they have encountered during visits to other universities.

Even coaches of sports where athletes traditionally don't look first at weight rooms feel the new facility will be of benefit. For one thing, it shows BYU is serious about conditioning and, once an athlete is here, he or she will improve by being more involved in weight training.

When BYU expanded its football stadium to 65,000 seats in 1982, it marked the beginning of a new era for the Cougar football program.

In each of its first nine seasons the stadium has been sold out with season tickets. Last year 396,011 fans watched the Cougars play at home, an average of 66,002 per game. BYU has ranked near the top 20 in the country in football attendance every year since the expansion. Arizona State is the only Western school which draws larger crowds than the Cougars.

The fan support has helped BYU schedule home-and-home non-league games with teams like Miami, UCLA, Texas, Penn State, Alabama, and Notre Dame.

Since its expansion, the facility has been applauded by fans, players and the media as one of the best in the country. Among its many features are a box-bowl configuration, a natural turf playing surface and a four-level press box.

Prior to 1982, the stadium seated 35,000 comfortably, but as many as 47,000 crammed into the facility to see a game. Expansion efforts included lowering the field eight feet, adding end zone seating, constructing the press box and adding box seating in the West stands.

More than 15,000 yards of concrete were used in the expansion effort. Each end zone contains about 4.3 million pounds of steel and seats about 15,000 people.

The playing field has a special sand-based drainage system capable of disposing two inches of rainfall per hour.

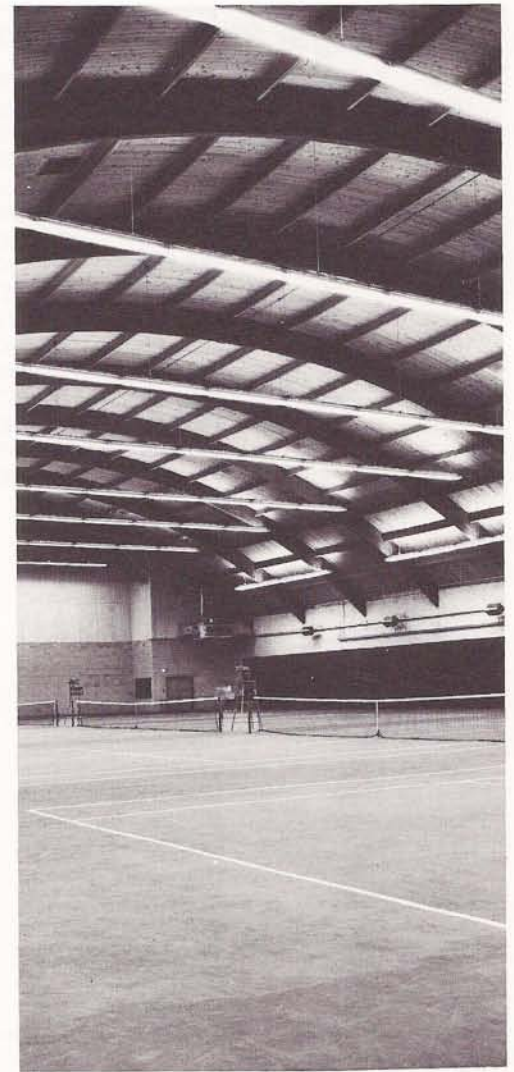
Perhaps the most impressive feature of the stadium is the press box, which runs the entire length of the west stands and rises over 10 stories high. It contains 42 loges (glass enclosed booths capable of seating up to 12 people) on the first two levels. The third level is reserved for working media, and the fourth level is the TV deck. Three elevators transport guests to the press box.

In 1982 and 1988, the Football Writers Association of America cited BYU for its "Outstanding Press Box Working Area."



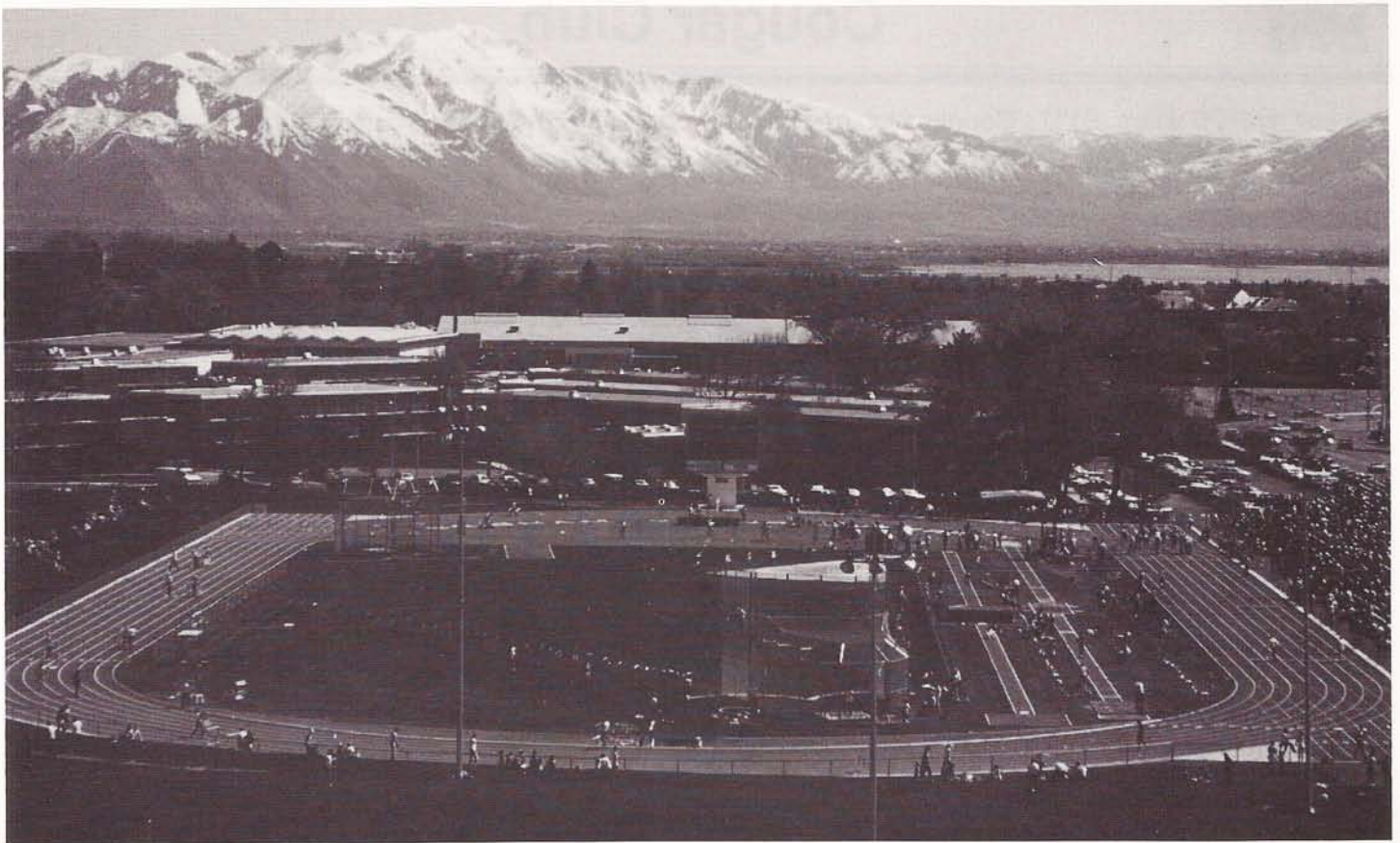


Athletic Facilities

Cougar Club

In just over 25 years, BYU's Cougar Club has grown into one of the nation's most prestigious and effective booster organizations.

Its membership of more than 4,000 also makes the Cougar Club one of the nation's largest booster clubs and nearly twice as large as any other booster organization in the Western Athletic Conference.

"Most of our members are avid sports fans and die-hard Cougar supporters," explains Dale R. McCann, Cougar Club executive director. "However, all our members agree that affecting the lives of young male and female athletes in a positive way is our first priority."

Some of the Cougar Club services include funding recruiting trips, sponsoring the spring football game and the "Varsity Preview" basketball game and honoring present and past athletes at the annual Awards Banquet and through the BYU Athletic Hall of Fame.

Cougar Club members donate annually to the BYU athletic program. There are numerous donor levels,

ranging from \$50 for Cougar "Cubs," children and teenagers, to \$1000 for Golden Cougars. Lifetime memberships are also available.

In return, contributors receive parking passes for home games, football and basketball press guides, monthly news releases, weekly press releases (out-of-state members only), the satisfaction of helping to build athletic excellence at BYU, and other benefits.

Under the new arrangement, sponsors may contact a single source, KSL/BYU Sports, for advertising opportunities associated with BYU athletic events.

Advertisers may purchase marketing "packages" that include television and radio exposure, as well as opportunities for in-arena exposure at athletic events.

The agreement is unique because BYU and KSL will share the advertising revenue derived from the partnership, whereas most universities negotiate a rights' fee on a per-game or a season basis.

"As far as we know, this cooperative approach to marketing broadcast rights for university athletics has not been tried before," says Glen Tuckett, BYU Athletic Director. "But with BYU and KSL continuing their 40-plus years of working together, we can make it a win for BYU, KSL, our fans and our advertisers."

The agreement between KSL and BYU affects local broadcast rights only. BYU is a member of the College Football Association and will honor all television and radio contractual obligations with that organization and with the Western Athletic Conference.

KSL TV

KSL Television, the CBS affiliate in Salt Lake City, has been televising BYU football games on a regular basis since 1984. Craig Bolerjack, a graduate of the University of Kansas, provides play-by-play for the fans.

Marc Lyons, a BYU quarterback from 1967-69 and a former coach at Olympus High in Salt Lake City, handles the color commentary.

Games Via Phone

For fans outside the Intermountain area who can't hear the games on KSL or one of its network stations, they can listen by telephone.

Once again, TRZ Sports Services, Inc., in Akron, Ohio, will provide the KSL broadcast of BYU games via telephone.

The toll-free number to reach TRZ via a Touch-tone phone in the United States or Canada is 1-800-225-5448. After giving a Visa or Mastercard number, callers will be connected to the broadcast.

Depending on how long they listen, fans are billed between 20 cents and 50 cents per minute. The cost of listening to a game for three hours is \$36.50.

KSL Radio

For more than 40 years, BYU fans have been following Cougar athletics via 50,000-watt KSL Radio (1160 AM), located in Salt Lake City.

The "Voice" of the Cougars has been play-by-play man Paul James, a veteran broadcaster with 41 years' experience. An Ogden native and University of Utah graduate, James began radio work in 1950.

For six years, he broadcast Utah basketball and football games before joining the staff at KSL Radio and Television in July of 1965. James has been at the microphone calling BYU games for the past 26 years.

Jim Braden is the sideline reporter for KSL Radio, and Chris Tunis mans Sports Central in the studio during broadcasts.

KBYU-TV

The tradition continues between KBYU and Cougar football. All home games are televised on a tape delay basis by Channel 11 with Jay Mosen doing the play-by-play.

An experienced sports crew and state-of-the-art equipment have enabled KBYU to develop a reputation for outstanding coverage of football, basketball and other major "remote" events in the western U.S.

Blue and White Network broadcasts (BYU and Air Force football) are produced for television by KBYU-TV's national production crews.

KBYU has won numerous awards for its sports productions and is frequently employed by ESPN, TBS Sports, Prime Ticket, the Utah Jazz Network, USA Network, SportsChannel and well as local affiliates of national networks.

KBYU owns and operates a fully-equipped, 48-foot, remote production truck, designed by experienced professionals to meet the most demanding standards.

Traveling with an experienced team of engineers and technicians, the KBYU truck has a full complement of on-board audio and video equipment with state-of-the-art cameras, long lenses, one-inch and 3/4-inch tape machines, video monitoring, special effects, Chyron graphics and a complete internal communication system.

Outlook

After finishing in the nation's Top Four the past four seasons, anticipation runs high for a determined run at the national championship.

The schedule isn't easy but three excellent recruiting years plus the 10-2 "rebuilding" season of 1990 has left the Seminoles deep in talent.

The entire backfield is intact--three deep at each spot--led by quarterback Casey Weldon, whose 152.7 passing efficiency ranks second to Ty Detmer (155.9) among returning signal callers.

Fullback Edgar Bennett can do it all and tailback Amp Lee was MVP against Penn State in the Blockbuster Bowl. The entire offensive line from the bowl returns.

The tight end and flanker are gone but FSU has a reputation for great receivers. The only other encouraging news for opponents is that the placekicker and deep snapper are new.

Inside linebackers Marvin Jones and Kirk Carruthers are exceptional and the three down linemen return. One cornerback, Terrell Buckley, is an All-American and great punt returner and the other, Errol McCorvey, is a three-year starter.

Series Notes

This will be the first meeting between the schools and Coach Bowden says, "I must be crazy after seeing what they did to Miami last year.

"But if you're ever going to play in one of those pre-season games you want to do it when you've got some experienced players returning. I'd say this would be the year if there ever was one."

Bowden, with six more years coaching than LaVell Edwards, has 30 more victories to put him in second place (205) compared to Edwards' 175.

Outlook

Quarterback Tommy Maddox and strong safety Matt Darby hope to lead the Bruins back into contention for a high Pac-10 finish.

Last year UCLA lost every other week to wind up tied for sixth in the tough Pac-10. However, only the Bruins were still in contention for a bowl game until suffering two losses in November--by four points to Oregon and by three to Southern Cal.

Of the Bruins' 54 lettermen, 33 started at least one game. The chief target for Maddox will be junior wide receiver Sean LaChapelle. Junior inside linebacker Arnold Ale also is an outstanding player.

Three starters are back in the secondary and shoulder surgery on defensive end Mike Chalenski should strengthen a defense whose main losses were at outside linebacker.

The offensive line returns which should help a group of experienced running backs.

Series Notes

Terry Donahue's seven straight bowl victories from 1982-88 tie him with Bobby Bowden and Pat Dye for the best percentage (.750) in bowl games.

His 116-51-8 record makes him the eighth winningest (.686) coach in Division IA. He is 2-1 against BYU. The Cougars won the first game in the series, 37-35, in Pasadena (1983), where Casey Tiumalu rushed for 137 yards and BYU sacked quarterback Steve Bono eight times.

The 1985 game also was shown on ESPN and that time it was the Bruins' turn to win a close one, 27-24, in Provo. A 62-yard bomb late in the game ended a 25-game BYU winning streak--the nation's longest.

The third game was a rout with UCLA crushing the Cougars, 31-10, in the 1986 Freedom Bowl at Anaheim. Gaston Green rushed for 266 yards to help UCLA break open a 7-3 halftime lead.

Loaded on defense but some question marks on offense summarizes the 1991 Nittany Lions, who rebounded from an 0-2 start to reel off nine straight victories, win their 20th Lambert Trophy and finish 10th and 11th in the polls.

Even though Penn State lost four of its five offensive linemen and the top two running backs, three-year starter Tony Sacca returns at quarterback.

Series Notes

The only previous meeting resulted in a 50-39 Penn State victory in the 1989 Holiday Bowl.

Ty Detmer's 576 yards passing--the most ever in a bowl game--weren't enough to offset 186 yards rushing by co-MVP Blair Thomas.

The Cougars got within 41-39 with two minutes left to play only to have a two-point conversion pass returned 102 yards by Andre Collins.

BYU then drove from its own 12 to the Penn State 38 only to have the ball stripped on a an apparent sack and returned for the deciding TD by Gary Brown.

The rematch pits the second and third winningest coaches in college football, Joe Paterno (.789) and LaVell Edwards (.747).

Last year, with a wind chill factor near zero, Ty Detmer completed 30 of 43 passes in three quarters as the Cougars went up, 47-7, and won, 54-7.

A BYU victory this year would even the series after USU dominated the first 20 years and the Cougars have dominated the last 20.

BYU has won eight straight and 11 of 12. Utah State's last win in Provo was 1978 (24-7).

Last year BYU bounced back from a 3-0 first quarter deficit for a 45-10 victory as Ty Detmer threw five touchdown passes (560 yards) and Josh Arnold returned an interception for a score.

The frustration of 10 straight losses to BYU was vented the last two years when the Rainbows romped to victories of 56-14 and 59-28. The party was over early in 1989 as Hawaii scored three quick touchdowns with a no-huddle offense and was in front, 35-7, at halftime.

Last year the Cougars had been excited all afternoon about the WAC's first ever Heisman Trophy winner but it was Hawaii which celebrated at night.

From a 7-7 deadlock, the Rainbows jumped on top 35-14 at halftime.

Despite losing a lopsided game in Provo last year, the Rams finished the season with wins over Hawaii and Oregon--teams BYU couldn't beat.

The Rams' first bowl appearance in 42 years was achieved with a school record 2,827 yards rushing and 5,250 total yards.

Coach Bruce ranks ninth among active coaches in winning percentage (.660) and 11th in total wins. Last year the Rams were ninth nationally in turnover margin and 18th in total offense.

The WAC's leading rusher, Brian Copeland, is back along with the team's top receiver, Greg Primus, and quarterback Kevin Verdugo.

CSU lost some key linemen and fullback Todd Yert. The front three on defense are gone but there's a great secondary.

Selwyn Jones already is the career interception leader with 15 and Robert Stratman and Harlan Carroll also return.

Punter Tim Luke must be replaced but Coach Bruce has some transfers and redshirts who could make CSU a factor again in the conference race.

Series Notes

Last year BYU bounced back from a loss at Oregon to overwhelm the Rams in Provo. BYU intercepted five passes and linebacker Scott Giles, making his first start due to an injury to Jared Leavitt, made six tackles.

The CSU game started a stretch in which punter Earl Kauffman had to kick only once in 12 quarters.

A bitter loss in the rivalry came in 1976, when Wyoming Coach Fred Akers devised a quarterback draw play which kept the Cougars off balance and resulted in a 34-29 victory, sending the Cowboys to the Fiesta Bowl.

In his four seasons Coach Roach was 35-15 and went to three bowl games.

Ends Jimmy Bellamy and Keith Embray return along with tackle Dave Chaytors and linebacker Pita Tonga.

The Utes play three Pac-10 teams in the first five games and they are on the road for three of the last four games.

Series Notes

BYU overcame a 10-7 first quarter deficit in 1990 to take a 35-10 halftime lead and won, 45-22.

Chris Smith caught eight passes for 125 yards and Brent Nyberg had four receptions for 116 yards. The win enabled BYU to clinch the WAC title and its 13th straight bowl appearance.

Ty Detmer became the first junior to go over 10,000 passing and the first quarterback ever to have back-to-back 4,000-yard seasons.

BYU has won 10 of the last 11 games and 17 of 19 under LaVell Edwards.

Thrifty Car Rental Holiday Bowl

The Western Athletic Conference champion plays in the Thrifty Car Rental Holiday Bowl at Jack Murphy Stadium in San Diego, Calif.

This year's 14th annual Holiday Bowl, in the first year of a three-year national advertising agreement with Thrifty, takes place on Monday, Dec. 30.

Kickoff is expected at either 4:30 p.m. or 5:30 p.m. Pacific Time. This will be only the second non-Friday game in bowl history. Last year's game was played on Saturday.

It is played at the 60,409-seat stadium which hosted the 1988 Super Bowl.

The bowl has been in existence since 1978, when Navy edged BYU, 23-16, in what was then called San Diego Stadium. The name was changed in 1981 to honor the San Diego Union sports editor who had led the campaign to have the stadium constructed in 1967. Murphy died in 1980.

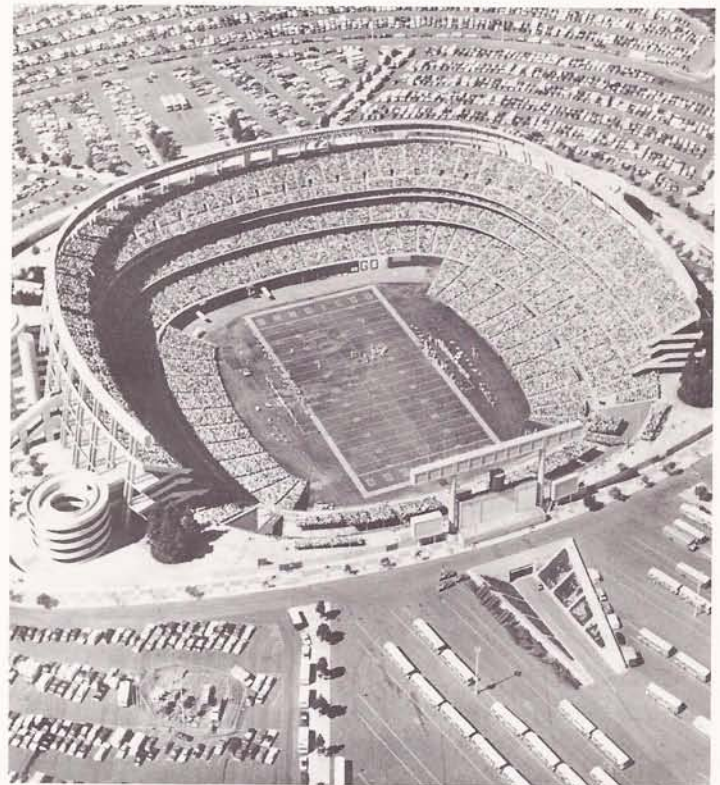
In 1985, the stadium was expanded from 52,675 for football and a \$6.5 million, 300,000 pound Diamond Vision scoreboard was added with a 66 by 100-foot scoreboard and screen for replays.

WAC teams have played in the Holiday Bowl every year except 1985, when Arizona State and Arkansas played. Since then, the bowl has resumed its tie-in with the WAC and the current contract runs through the 1992 season.

The WAC is 4-8 games with close games generally prevailing. An exception was last year's 65-14 romp by Texas A&M over BYU. In 1989, Penn State scored in the final minutes on a 102-yard interception return and a 53-yard fumble recovery to beat BYU, 50-39.

In 1986 and 1987, Iowa defeated San Diego State (39-38) and Wyoming (20-19). Oklahoma State belted Wyoming, 62-14, in 1988.

The second year (1979), BYU lost to Indiana, 38-37. In the Miracle Bowl of 1980, BYU scored three touchdowns in the final two minutes and 33 seconds

to edge Southern Methodist, 46-45.

In 1981, BYU beat Washington State, 38-36, but lost to Ohio State, 47-17, in 1982. In 1983, it was BYU 21, Missouri 17, and the Cougars defeated Michigan, 24-17, to win the national championship in 1984.

Even the non-WAC game was a squeaker with Arkansas nipping Arizona State, 18-17.

A major change in the Holiday Bowl came in 1988, when Sea World became the sponsor and the bowl name was changed to Sea World Holiday Bowl.

That relationship changed this year when negotiations for a new title sponsor were completed.

Cougar Bowl History

Holiday Bowl XIII, 1990

Texas A&M 65, BYU 14

December 29

San Diego

Led by quarterback Bucky Richardson and All-American running back Darren Lewis, underdog Texas A&M was out to show it could play with the Cougars. The Aggies were able to prove that point and a lot more as they stunned the Cougars.

Going into the game, the Cougars were fighting injury problems. Tony Crutchfield and Norm Dixon weren't able to suit up, and Ty Detmer was playing with a slight separation in his left shoulder.

The second largest Holiday Bowl crowd ever (61,441) watched the Aggies march 80 yards in 13 plays to take a 7-0 lead. The Cougars were able to tie the score on an eight-yard Ty Detmer to Chris Smith touchdown pass, but after that, the game was all Texas A&M. The Aggies went on to score 23 points in the second quarter en route to a 37-7 halftime lead.

With the game out of hand, the big story was William Thomas' crunching sack that separated Detmer's right shoulder and put him out of the game early in the third quarter. After playing valiantly with one separation, this one proved to be too much. Detmer would have surgery a few days later to fix the damage.

The Aggies continued to dominate by racking up nearly 200 yards rushing in the second half. The fact that Texas A&M's Lewis was still in the game with eight minutes to go and a 58-14 lead caused a slight stir among Cougar fans. A bright spot for BYU was Joe Evans' first touchdown pass as a Cougar quarterback.

Texas A&M's Richardson would go on to be named the Offensive Player of the Game by racking up 344 yards in total offense. Thomas was named the top defensive player with six tackles, two sacks and an interception.

BYU finished the season ranked 17th by UPI, 20th by USA Today/CNN and 22nd by AP. The Cougars had been as high as fourth prior to their first loss.

Obvious highlights were a win in BYU's first-ever meeting with a number-one team (Miami) and the first Heisman Trophy ever in the WAC.

Two very unusual plays late in the game kept BYU from toppling the East's best team, Lambert Trophy-winner Penn State. Two stunning defensive plays offset 576 yards passing by Ty Detmer--the highest total ever in a bowl game.

For his heroics, Detmer had the rare privilege of sharing Most Valuable Player honors despite being on the losing team. The other co-MVP was the Nit-tany Lions' Blair Thomas, who rushed for 186 yards and picked up some key first downs for Joe Paterno's team.

BYU, which trailed, 41-26, with nine and a half minutes remaining, scored twice to cut the lead to 41-39 with two and a half minutes left to play. But a two-point conversion pass, which would have tied the game, was intercepted by linebacker Andre Collins and returned 102 yards to give Penn State two points.

The Cougars tried an on-side kick but Penn State fell on the ball at the BYU 46-yard line. Two tackles behind the line of scrimmage by Bob Davis forced the Lions to punt and the Cougars got the ball at their own 12 with two minutes remaining.

Passes to Brent Nyberg, Matt Bellini, Chris Smith and Andy Boyce moved the ball to the Penn State 38 with a minute left to play. Then what most BYU fans thought was a sack by safety Gary Brown became a score for Penn State. He stripped the ball from Detmer at the Penn State 47 and raced 53 yards with 45 seconds left.

The Cougars moved from their own 32 to the Penn State 40 in the final 30 seconds before time ran out.

Penn State finished the season ranked 14th by UPI and 15th by AP and USA Today/CNN. BYU was 18th in the UPI poll and 22nd in the other two polls.

A tough second-half defense, Ty Detmer coming off

the bench to earn Most Valuable Player honors and two fourth-quarter field goals by Jason Chaffetz enabled the Cougars to upset Colorado.

Cool weather (42 degrees) by southern California standards didn't hamper diminutive Eric Bieniemy, who rushed 33 times for 144 yards and two touchdowns.

But his heroics couldn't offset Detmer's 11 for 19 and 129 yards in the second. Scott Peterson made a key pass interception to set up the game-winning field goal.

It was an exciting contest for the 35,941 fans (49,694 tickets were sold) although a big show failed to materialize in a matchup of the nation's top two punters. Colorado's Keith English averaged only 39 yards on two punts and BYU's Pat Thompson had four punts for a 33.5 average.

A fumble at midfield led to the Buffaloes' first score and then Sean Covey found Mike Salido to tie the score. An interception in the end zone stopped a BYU drive early in the second quarter and the Cougars trailed at the half, 14-7.

A Detmer to Chuck Cutler pass tied the game in the third quarter but Colorado took a 17-14 lead early in the final quarter.

The Cougars then moved from their own four to the Colorado 14 and tied the game with 4:11 left on a 31-yarder by Chaffetz. Three plays later, Peterson's interception and a 15-yard penalty put the ball at the Colorado 32. With 2:33 left, Chaffetz booted a 35-yarder for the victory.

A key performer for BYU was halfback Matt Bellini, who carried eight times for 78 yards and caught four passes for 41 yards. A sad note for the Buffs came early in 1989 when quarterback Sal Aunese was hospitalized with stomach cancer. He died during the 1989 season, when Colorado went unbeaten during the regular season and went into the Orange Bowl ranked number-one in the country.

All American Bowl, 1987

The 11th annual All American Bowl was cool (temperature in the high 40s after two days of rain) and the Cougars never got warmed up despite taking a 3-0 lead.

BYU's 10th consecutive bowl appearance saw several records set but the Cougars were edged, 22-16, in their initial game with Virginia. Sean Covey attempted 61 passes, David Miles had 188 yards in receptions and Pat Thompson only had to punt once--all bowl records--but the Cougars fell just short several times.

Covey, who had led the Cougars to five straight wins as a starter, thought he had a first down at the BYU 46 with four minutes remaining but the ball was marked just short on a fourth-down play.

Darren Handley, BYU's leading receiver for the season, dropped a touchdown pass in the first quarter before BYU settled for a 20-yard field goal by Leonard Chitty. However, Chitty, who set a season mark for field goals (18) and consecutive PATs (29), missed 51 and 47-yarders in the second quarter as the Cavaliers took a 14-3 halftime lead.

BYU got to the Virginia two-yard line midway through the third quarter only to have a fourth-down pass tipped at the last second. Kyle Whittingham scampered eight yards to cut the lead to 14-9 at the end of the third quarter.

Virginia, behind quarterback Scott Secules, the game MVP, made a crucial 76-yard drive to go ahead, 22-9, with 11 minutes left. BYU then went the same distance to score on a one-yard pass to Whittingham with seven minutes remaining.

The Cougars were hurt by the absence of running back/returner Mike O'Brien and linebacker Thor Salanoa, who both suffered knee injuries in the Australia game. Salanoa's loss was magnified when linebacker Richard Hobbs was sidelined in the first half of the bowl game.

Ironically, nine years earlier on the same date (his wedding anniversary), Virginia Coach George Welsh had led his Navy team to a 23-16 win over BYU in the inaugural Holiday Bowl.

Although BYU failed to win the WAC title, the Cougars kept alive an impressive streak of nine bowl appearances in a row by being invited to the third annual Freedom Bowl. There they met familiar foes UCLA and Gaston Green.

The two teams had met in 1985 when the Bruins came from behind to win a closely contested struggle in Provo, 27-24. Green, UCLA's outstanding tailback, was limited to 59 yards in that game and much of UCLA's offense came as a result of John Lee's four field goals.

The Freedom Bowl, however, proved different as UCLA and Green broke open a close game in the third quarter and went on to win 31-10. He finished with 266 yards on 33 carries.

The first half was marked by defensive struggle. The two teams punted nine times in the first 30 minutes with the only scores coming after a turnover and a trick play.

BYU struck first. Linebacker Andy Katoa recovered a UCLA fumble at the Bruin 47 early in the first quarter, and after a Bob Jensen to Mark Bellini pass, Leonard Chitty put the Cougars ahead 3-0 with a 32-yard field goal. Soon afterward, UCLA stormed ahead to stay with a 71-yard touchdown drive highlighted by a 49-yard run on a reverse by Bruin receiver Karl Dorrell.

From there on out, it was UCLA most of the way. Midway into the third quarter, Bruin fullback David Greenwood dashed 70 yards through the BYU defense and set up Green's one-yard touchdown run. David Franey followed with a 49-yard UCLA field goal and later, Green bolted 79-yards with 52 seconds left in the period.

Cougar quarterbacks Bob Jensen and Mike Young managed to pass for over 200 yards, but UCLA and Green did most of the damage. Costly injuries to BYU standouts Mark Bellini (ankle) and Andy Katoa (knee) also hindered the Cougar effort. On the evening, Jensen completed 18 passes in 31 attempts for 124 yards with three interceptions, and Young was on target seven times in 12 attempts for 97 yards.

In what promised to be an offensive showdown between pass-happy BYU (11-2) and rough and tumble Ohio State (8-3), two of the nation's top defenses took center stage. In fact, the game's only touchdowns were produced by a noseguard on an interception and a reserve wide receiver on a broken play.

The rest of the contest was marked by intense hitting, and as is the case with most defensive struggles, the team that made the fewest mistakes won the ball game.

Buckeye kicker Rich Spangler tallied the first points of the game with a 47-yard field goal early in the second quarter to give Ohio State a 3-0 lead. BYU attempted to answer with a long drive of its own, only to come away empty after Vai Sikahema fumbled on an apparent touchdown plunge.

Before the first half ended, however, the Cougars again mounted a long drive and finally hit paydirt when quarterback Robbie Bosco rolled left, whirled right and found wide receiver David Miles on a 38-yard scoring strike to give the Cougars a 7-3 halftime lead.

When the teams returned to the field for the second half, misfortune immediately struck the Cougars. Deep in his own territory, Bosco attempted to throw a short pass underneath the dropping Buckeye linebackers and instead found Ohio State noseguard Larry Kolic who snatched the errant pass and took it in for an OSU touchdown and a 10-7 lead.

On the day, Bosco was 26 for 50 and a touchdown, but miscues told the story. Ohio State was the benefactor of six Cougar turnovers, and the Big-10 Buckeyes went home the victor.

Holiday Bowl VII, 1984

Holiday Bowl VII lived up to all the glamour and excitement of the previous six bowls, plus it had a new dimension--national championship luster--thanks to BYU's undefeated, untied season and No. 1 ranking. The 24-17 Cougar victory marked the first time in years that a non-New Year's Day bowl game determined the national championship.

The contest was played in typical Holiday Bowl fashion. After a scoreless first quarter in which Cougar quarterback Robbie Bosco was forced to the sideline with an injured knee and ankle, the game began to develop drama.

BYU scored first with 8:37 left in the first half on a five-yard run by Kelly Smith. The touchdown was set up when a limping Bosco returned to the lineup and

engineered an 80-yard scoring drive.

The Wolverines responded by putting together an 80-yard drive of their own, culminating on Rick Rogers' five-yard touchdown run up the middle. The PAT tied the score at 7-7. The tie was short-lived, however, as a 31-yard field goal by Lee Johnson with time running out in the first half gave BYU a 10-7 lead.

Midway through the third period, Michigan went on top for the first time at 14-10 on a 10-yard scoring strike from Bob Zurbrugg to Bob Perryman. The Wolverines added to their lead when Bob Bergeron nailed a 32-yard field goal to make it 17-10 with 14:14 to play in the game. The Cougar offense then produced an 80-yard drive that culminated with a seven-yard Bosco-to-Glen Kozlowski touchdown pass to tie the game at 17-17 with 10:51 to go.

Bosco's 13-yard scoring toss to Smith with 1:23 remaining made it 24-17 and clinched a 13-0 season and the Cougars' first-ever national championship.

Yet another chapter was added to the saga of impossible, thrilling Holiday Bowl finishes when BYU defeated Missouri, 21-17. The game was billed as a classic matchup between Missouri's stubborn defense and BYU's explosive offense, led by quarterback Steve Young.

For most of the game the defenses were in control. Missouri held BYU to just 167 yards of total offense in the first half and gave up only one touchdown to the Cougars. BYU's defense, however, allowed the Tigers only 157 yards of offense and 10 points in the first half. Missouri got its first-half points on a two-yard run by Eric Drain and a 37-yard field goal by Brad Burditt.

BYU's touchdown came on a 10-yard quarterback draw by Young. In the second half, Young hit Eddie Stinnett with a 33-yard pass. But Missouri came right back with another two-yard plunge by Drain. A valiant goal-line stand by BYU's defense gave the offense the ball on the six yard line with 3:57 left in the game.

The Cougars marched down field until, with a first-and-10 situation on the Missouri 15 yard line, Young

handed the ball to Stinnett, who faked a sweep and lofted the ball back to Young. The ball barely cleared the outstretched hands of Missouri's Bobby Bell, but Young hauled in the throw and rambled into the end zone. The extra point gave BYU the lead 21-17 with only 23 seconds left.

Kyle Morrell then intercepted a Missouri desperation pass. Casey Tiumalu picked up 57 yards on 27 carries.

The Cougars had their two-game Holiday Bowl win streak snapped by Ohio State, 47-17.

The BYU bubble burst at the outset of the third quarter, when the Buckeyes reeled off 17 unanswered points, while BYU only got one snap--an interception at that. The OSU damage came mainly on the ground, as the Buckeyes won their seventh consecutive game.

Tim Spencer was the main gun for the Bucks, as he blew through the Cougar defense for 167 yards, including a record-setting 61-yard touchdown run in the second quarter that put OSU up 10-7.

As usual, the BYU quarterback rolled up impressive marks, but the Cougars had trouble making points out of Steve Young's 341 yards passing on 27 of 45 accuracy. The Cougars turned the ball over to OSU three times inside the 30 and saw the Bucks convert each turnover into a score.

The Cougars' two touchdowns were at each end of the game, with the first, a seven-yard strike to Neil Balholm, coming in the opening quarter and the final tally, a 16-yard Young-to-Hudson connection.

Holiday Bowl IV, 1981

The 1981 edition of the Holiday Bowl fit the mold of its predecessors. This time it was the Cougars of BYU versus the Cougars of Washington State playing before a crowd of 52,419. Again it was like two different games. BYU held a 24-7 lead at halftime, then pushed the score to 31-7, as Tom Holmoe intercepted a pass and returned it 35 yards to give the WAC team a comfortable 31-7 edge.

But as the second half progressed, it appeared BYU would be the come-from-behind victim in this one. With only 59 seconds left in the third period, WSU brought the score to 31-28, and from there the team from Provo had to hold on for its life.

In a crucial third-and-12 situation on BYU's 18 yard line with 30 seconds remaining in the third period, McMahon began completing passes that covered 82 yards and put BYU in the end zone again to stretch the lead to 38-28.

Statistically, it was a typical McMahon game: 27 of 43 with no interceptions, 342 yards and three touchdowns. But he will be remembered most, perhaps, for turning a fumbled snap into a carry for a first down.

Tight end Gordon Hudson had seven receptions for 126 yards and a TD.

One observer said the 1980 Holiday Bowl was actually two ball games--the first a contest that lasted most of four quarters, the other that was of four minutes duration. SMU seemed in control the first game, while the Cougars, behind 20 points with only minutes remaining, surged to a stunning 46-45 win.

Unfortunately, many fans either turned off their TV sets or left the stadium in San Diego before the "second game" began. For 56 minutes the Mustangs taught the Cougars a lesson in running the football. The Mustang's two great runners, Craig James and Eric Dickerson, rushed for a combined total of 335

yards.

With 4:07 remaining in the game, SMU scored to go ahead, 45-25. From there, the Cougars connected on a TD pass, recovered an on-side kick, scored on a one-yard scamper by Scott Phillips, blocked a punt and, finally (with three seconds left on the clock), scored on a "Hail Mary" pass of 46 yards from Jim McMahon to Clay Brown. With the score tied, Kurt Gunther kicked the extra point to send BYU fans streaming onto the field.

Statistically, McMahon completed 32 of 49 passes for 446 yards. It may have been the most exciting bowl game ever with the Cougars getting 21 points in the final two minutes and 33 seconds.

The 1979 season ended with BYU leading the nation in three major categories: scoring, passing and total offense. Moreover, the Cougars were one of the few undefeated, untied teams in the nation with an 11-0 mark.

Those kinds of credentials, plus their national rankings in the polls (9th UPI and AP), made the Mountain Cats favorites over the at-large entry, Indiana. It was BYU's first-ever meeting with a Big Ten school, and the net result was one of the most exciting bowl games of the season.

The opportunistic Hoosiers played BYU even in the first quarter, then carried a 21-17 lead at the half. BYU spurted ahead in the third period, 34-31, on a 15-yard pass from All-American Marc Wilson to fullback Eric Lane.

But midway through the fourth quarter, Indiana's Tim Wilber returned a punt 62 yards to push the Hoosiers ahead 38-37. With 2:06 remaining, the Cougars moved the ball 69 yards to the Indiana 10 yard line.

Then, with 11 seconds left, Brent Johnson missed a 27-yard field goal that would have made the score 40-38. Marc Wilson was voted the MVP on offense (28 of 43 for 380 yards) and Indiana's cornerback, Tim Wilber, won the honor on defense. Attendance: 52,200.

The inaugural game of the Holiday Bowl pitted two teams with local drawing power, the Naval Academy and Brigham Young. Despite chilly temperatures, (for San Diego that is), the two teams engaged in a hard-hitting battle.

The Cougars had a 16-3 lead at one point, even though the score was 9-3 at the end of the first half. Defense dominated the first two quarters. Brent Johnson put the Cougars on the scoreboard first with a 33-yard field goal with 8:26 left in the first quarter. But Navy's Bob Tata boomed through a 40-yard field goal to tie the score at 3-3.

Jim McMahon sent the Cougars ahead with a 10-yard pass to Mike Chronister, but Johnson missed the extra point. McMahon ran another in from two-yards out in the third period before the Middies took charge. Navy scored two field goals in the fourth quarter, but it was a 65-yard pass to Phil McConkey that did the Cougars in.

Some 48,003 witnessed the game in person. McConkey was named Best Offensive Player, BYU's Tom Enlow won Best Defensive Player honors for the game. Navy finished the year with a 9-3 record, BYU with a 9-4 mark.

Powerful Oklahoma State, sparked by All-American Terry Miller (173 yards rushing on 23 carries), used four pass interceptions and a fumble recovery to capture the Tangerine Bowl contest. Defensively, the Cowboys yielded only 46 yards rushing.

The Cougars, however, stayed close in the first half, which ended 28-14. But Dave Lowry returned

the second-half kickoff 102 yards (a Tangerine Bowl record) to bring the score to 21-28. The crowd of 37,812 fans saw the two teams roll up 70 points between them.

Quarterback Gifford Nielsen completed 23 of 34 passes for 209 yards and one touchdown, but the Cougars could only roll up 255 total yards to 402 for OSU. BYU's record was 9-2 prior to the Tangerine Bowl game.

Oklahoma State had tied for the Big Eight title but missed out on the Orange Bowl due to the league's tie-breaking formula.

Fiesta Bowl, 1974

Competing in its first post-season bowl game ever, BYU played Western Athletic Conference host to the Cowboys of Oklahoma State before a crowd of 50,878.

The Cougars got off to a quick start with two field goals during the first quarter before All-WAC quarterback Gary Sheide was injured in the last moments of the first quarter. He was replaced by junior reserve Mark Giles.

The Cowboys took the scoring lead during the second quarter on a TD run around left end, so the halftime score was OSU 7, BYU 6. OSU regained possession of the ball on the Cougars' 17 yard line after intercepting a Giles-to-Tom Toolson pass, but was unable to convert on the turnover.

A field goal from 32 yards out put the Cowboys in front 10-7 at the end of the third quarter. With 1:14 remaining in the game, OSU scored another TD on a 40-yard halfback pass to complete the scoring.

The Cougars outgained the Cowboys in total yardage 301 to 214. Giles was 11 out of 26 for 138 yards. BYU's record was 7-3-1 prior to the Fiesta Bowl.

Historical View

Being recognized as one of the country's top programs--not to mention winning a national championship--seemed out of the realm of possibility for BYU.

After all, it was 26 years ago that the Cougars won their first Western Athletic Conference football title. And the team had managed only 171 victories and 16 winning seasons before the 1972 season.

It was in 1972, however, that BYU's football program shifted gears. LaVell Edwards was named head coach in that year, and things have not been the same since. The Cougars have won 175 games and been to 15 bowl games. Thirteen times BYU has won the WAC title under Edwards' direction, including 10 in a row from 1976-85. And the Cougars won the national championship in 1984.

Things weren't always so rosy in BYU's program, however. Football got its beginning at BYU in 1922. That first season, BYU won only one game and scored a total of 10 points during the season. Now, BYU is traditionally one of the nation's leaders in scoring and offense.

Football was introduced at BYU near the beginning of the century, but a fatality prompted its discontinuance. The game returned in 1922 and, minus three years during World War II, the Cougars have played a total of 67 seasons. BYU initially joined ranks with the old Rocky Mountain Conference and later became part of the Mountain States, Skyline and Western Athletic Conferences.

Some of the more noted athletes who have helped propel BYU into the national limelight have been quarterbacks. **Virgil Carter** (1966), **Gary Sheide** (1974), **Gifford Nielsen** (1976), **Marc Wilson** (1979), **Jim McMahon** (1981), **Steve Young** (1983) and **Robbie Bosco** (1984-85) have all left their mark on BYU's record books. And **Ty Detmer** (1988-) is still leaving his.

Nielsen, Wilson, McMahon, Young and Bosco were

All-American quarterbacks, and each erased marks set by his predecessor. McMahon, Wilson and Bosco were third-place finishers in the Heisman Trophy balloting, while Steve Young finished second. Both McMahon and Young were recipients of the Davey O'Brien Award, given to the outstanding collegiate quarterback.

While passing has been the name of the game at BYU since Edwards took over, there also have been some impressive running backs. **Eldon "The Phantom" Fortie** (1961-62), a single-wing back, won All-America honors in 1962. **"Fleet Pete"**

VanValkenburg (1970-71), led the nation rushing his senior year and was second-team All-America.

Fullback **John Ogden** (1964-66) was the leading rusher in the WAC for three consecutive years. And fullback **Todd Christensen** (1975-77) did such a good job running with and catching the football he later became an all-pro tight end. He was the leading receiver on BYU's team for three years. **Lakei Heimuli** (1983-86) is the school's rushing leader.

A good passing team must have good personnel on the offensive line, and BYU has had its share of honors recipients in that area.

Mohammed Elewonibi (1988-89) won the Outland Trophy in 1989, BYU's second such honor in four years. Other line standouts include **Gordon Gravelle** (1970), **Paul Howard** (1972), **Brad Oates** (1973-75), **Orrin Olsen** (1972-75), **Tom Bell** (1974-79), **Nick Eyre** (1977-80), **Bart Oates** (1977-82) and **Trevor Matich** (1979-84).

There also have been several outstanding tight ends at BYU, most recently **Clay Brown** (1978-80), **Gordon Hudson** (1979-83) **David Mills** (1980-84), **Trevor Molini** (1985-86) and **Chris Smith** (1987-90).

Top defensive players include **Wayne Baker** (1972-74), **Paul Linford** (1972-74), **Mekeli Ieremia** (1975-77), **Glen Titensor** (1978-80), **Glen Redd** (1976-80), **Kyle Whittingham** (1979-81), **Todd Shell** (1980-83), **Kyle Morrell** (1980-84) and **Jason Buck** (1985-86). Buck, the 1986 recipient of the Outland Trophy, was only the third player in the western United States to win the award.

At various times in the last 20 years, the Cougars have had some great return specialists. **Chris Farasopoulos** (1968-70), the Galloping Greek, led the nation in punt returns and set two NCAA records. **Golden Richards** (1970-71) is still listed as a holder of several NCAA records. **Vai Sihakema** (1980-85) set an NCAA record for most punt returns and later earned All-Pro status with the Cardinals.

New Mexico claimed a pair of first place finishes in gymnastics and tennis. Utah finished first in basketball and swimming. Air Force finished first in wrestling and Hawaii was first in baseball.

BYU finished second in basketball and gymnastics, third in baseball, fourth in wrestling and fifth in tennis.

National finishes by the football, golf and indoor and outdoor track were indicators of BYU's overall athletic strength.

In football, the Cougars finished 17th in the final United Press International poll. BYU, who was ranked as high as fourth in both wire service polls after a 4-0 start, finished with a 10-3 record and defended the WAC title. It was the 14th WAC football title for BYU and its 13th in the 19-year rein of Coach LaVell Edwards.

Golf took the first round lead in the NCAA Championships at Pebble Beach, Calif., with an all-junior team. The Cougars, who had missed qualifying the last three seasons for the NCAA, placed fifth in that tourney after winning their 18th WAC title in the 30-year rein of Coach Karl Tucker.

Sprinter Frank Fredericks, a 13-time All-American, was largely responsible for BYU's eighth place finish in

indoor track at Indianapolis, Ind., and a fourth place finish in outdoor track at Eugene, Ore. Indoors, Fredericks won the 200 meters and was third in the 55 meters.

Outdoors, the Cougar senior became the first sprinter since 1978 to win both the 100 and 200 meters. Indoors BYU defended its title and won the WAC crown for the eighth time. Outdoors it was the 11th title for the Cougars, the seventh in a row.

Other track All-Americans in addition to Fredericks were: Brent Patera (fourth in discus), Per Karlsson (third in the hammer), and the 4 X 100 relay team of Jim Waite, Erik Hughes and Oluyemi Kayode which Fredericks anchored to a fifth place finish.

Heisman Trophy winner Ty Detmer was a consensus All-America, being named to six first-teams and tight end Chris Smith was a unanimous All-American.

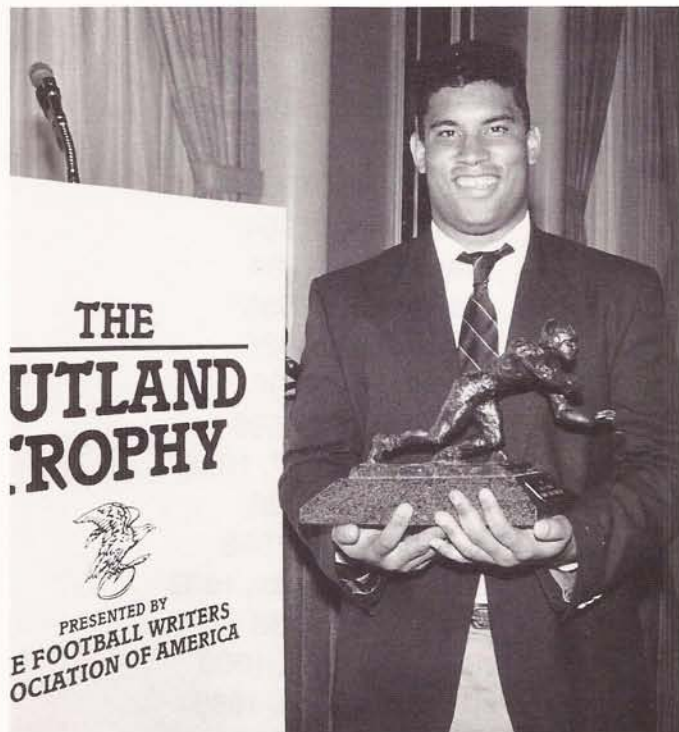
Junior Jason Brown placed fifth in the floor exercise to earn All-America honors in gymnastics. Center Shawn Bradley, 7-6, was an honorable mention All-America by Associated Press and WAC Freshman of the Year. Middle blocker Ethan Watts was named to the all-freshman team by Volleyball Monthly. And Cougar quarterback-pitcher Ryan Hancock was named WAC Freshman of the Year in baseball.

The Cougars' Academic All-Americans from the men's teams were Andy Boyce (football) Carl Hanson (cross country) and Doug Hobbs (cross country).

Although the Cougar basketball, 21-13, team finished second in the WAC regular season, they did win the league post-season tournament and secured the school's first automatic berth in the NCAA post-season tournament.

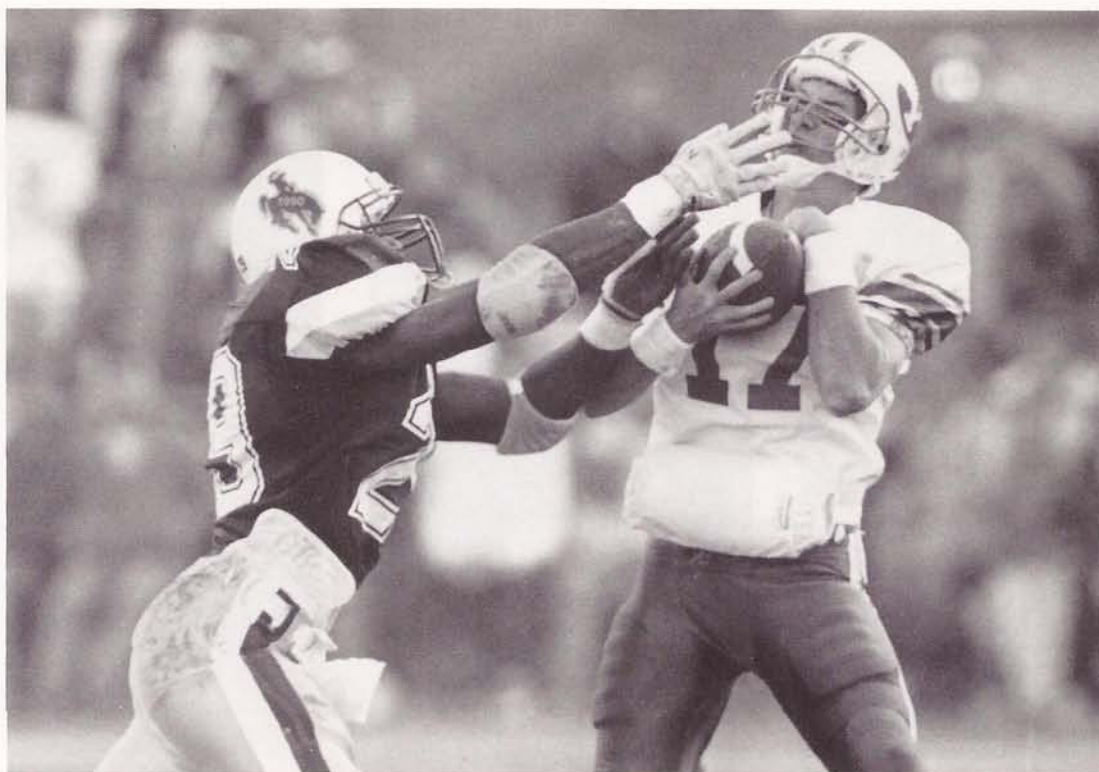

Sept. 1 1990--night game (89 degrees, partly cloudy, 40% humidity and 15 mph wind) at the Sun Bowl in El Paso, Texas (29,033)

Detmer hit Nati Valdez from 28 yards and a touchdown late in the fourth quarter. Kauffman's kick was blocked leaving the final score 30-10. Cougar Coach LaVell Edwards said "I think our defense is headed in the right direction." Edwards also added "It was a typical opening night with lots of mistakes but I'm satisfied with the victory." BYU is 1-0.

BYU 28, Miami 21

September 8, 1990--night game (93 degrees, fair and hot with a slight wind) at Cougar Stadium, Provo (66,235-stadium record)

Ty Detmer was showcased to the nation by an ESPN national telecast and the defense rose to the occasion against the defending national champion and top-ranked team. Miami started the scoring mid-way through the first quarter on a Stephen McGuire seven-yard run. Detmer then led the Cougars on a 60-yard, seven-play drive. Matt Bellini caught a 14-yard touchdown pass and Earl Kauffman's PAT tied the score at seven. Kauffman's 32-yard field goal with nine minutes left in the second quarter made it, 10-7, BYU. After a BYU turnover, Miami took the ball from the Cougar 43-yard line and scored on another McGuire run, of two yards, to lead, 14-10, with 1:42 in the half. Detmer then completed seven straight passes and marched the Cougars to the Miami two-yard line. He hit Andy Boyce for the touchdown and with the PAT, the Cougars went into halftime with a 17-14 lead. Miami quarterback Craig Erickson came out hot and led his team on an 80-yard drive that was capped by a Leonard Conley seven-yard run to open the second half. It gave the Hurricanes a 21-17 lead but that was all the points they would get. BYU narrowed the gap to 21-20 on a 29-yard Kauffman field goal with 9:26 remaining in the third quarter. With eight minutes left in the third, Miami elected to go for it on a fourth and one. McGuire was stopped for no gain by Rich Kaufusi and the ball went over to BYU. From there, Detmer directed a nine play, 43-yard drive that ended with a seven-yard touchdown pass to Mike Salido. BYU converted the two point conversion on a pass from Detmer to Boyce. Twice, late in the fourth quarter, Miami threatened but was held by the BYU defense. Ervin Lee intercepted an Erickson pass in the end zone to halt one drive and then after the Cougars stuffed Miami on a third and two, Lee broke up a fourth down pass and sealed the victory. Detmer threw two touchdown passes, 16 yards to Brent Nyberg and 32 yards to Andy Boyce. BYU tied the score at 29-29 when Chris Smith dove into the end zone with the two-point conversion after the Boyce touchdown. On the next series, WSU was forced to punt. The Cougar drive started on the 16 and 13

plays later Detmer found Stacey Corley who scampered in from the nine-yard line. It was Detmer's fifth touchdown pass of the game and made the score 36-29. WSU came right back with a five play, 80-yard drive and scored on a seven-yard touchdown pass that tied the score at 36. BYU put the game away with touchdown runs of 23 yards by Tuipulotu and five yards by Corley in the final minutes that made the final score 50-36. BYU is now 3-0.

In a game telecast nationally by CBS, Ty Detmer threw for 514 yards in leading the Cougars to their fourth straight win. Early on it was evident that it would be a big offensive day for both squads. BYU took a 21-0 lead early in the second quarter, but SDSU came roaring back on the arm of quarterback Dan McGwire to score 24 second-quarter points. BYU got another touchdown to give the Cougars a 28-21 halftime lead. Touchdown runs by Cougar running

Oregon jumped out to a first quarter lead of 12-0.

The Ducks' Bill Musgrave connected with Sean Burwell for a 31-yard touchdown pass, Ty Detmer was sacked in his own end zone for a safety and Oregon kicker Gregg McCallum split the uprights from 26 yards to give the Ducks the early advantage. The Cougars got on the board midway through the second quarter when Detmer, who hadn't practiced all week due to a ligament sprain in his throwing hand, hit reserve running back Scott Charlton on a two yard scoring pass. Earl Kauffman's 40-yard field goal at the start of the third quarter cut the lead to 12-10, but that is as close as it would get. Oregon scored on touchdown passes of 12 and 30 yards in the third quarter then got one more touchdown in the final period when Musgrave scored on a three-yard plunge. One bright spot for the Cougars came in the fourth quarter when Detmer and Micah Matsuzaki hooked up on a 69-yard touchdown pass. It was the longest Cougar pass play so far this year. Matt Bellini had five catches and moved past Phil Odle as the all-time Cougar leader in pass receptions. Odle's previous mark was 183, Bellini now has 185. The game was telecast by ABC Sports with Brent Musburger and Dick Vermeil calling the action. BYU is now 4-1 overall and 2-0 in the WAC but drops from fourth to ninth and 10th in UPI and AP.

After a bye week, the Cougars used a good balance of passing and rushing to run away with this one from the start. Peter Tuipulotu, Mike Salido and Scott Charlton all caught touchdown passes from Ty Detmer in the first half and Cougar rushers amassed 117 yards by the break. They finished the game with 197 yards on the ground. Detmer broke the NCAA record for most consecutive games with 300 yards total offense. This was Detmer's 19th outing in which he has amassed over 300 yards. Andy Boyce had a career day receiving with nine catches for 235 yards and two touchdowns. Derwin Gray picked off three Lobo passes and returned one of them 17 yards for a touchdown. His three interceptions ties a school record held by five others. New Mexico kept the game close until mid-way through the second quarter thanks to three touchdown passes by Jeremy Leach. An emotional day in which Ty Detmer became the first Heisman Trophy winner ever from BYU and the Western Athletic Conference seemed to take its toll as, for the second straight year, Hawaii jumped to a big early lead and dominated play. The Rainbows, behind the passing of Garrett Gabriel and the running of Dane McArthur, broke a 7-7 tie to lead, 28-7, after the first quarter and 35-14 at halftime. The Cougars closed to 41-28 at the end of the third quarter but the Rainbows reeled off 18 more points in the final period. Hawaii intercepted four passes, three of them by Kenny Harper. The Rainbows churned out 667 yards in total offense. Detmer passed for 319 yards to finish with 5,188 for the season--the most ever in college history. In the process he wound up the season with 42 NCAA records and a tie for five others. Andy Boyce caught seven passes for 106 yards and a school single season reception record with 1,241 yards. Chris Smith finished the season with 68 catches for 1,156 yards--an NCAA record for most yardage for a tight end. BYU finishes the regular season 10-2 and 7-1 in the WAC.

Now You Know

Goal Posts Narrowed: A rule change for this season is narrowing the goal posts from 23 feet, four inches to 18 feet, six inches. The increasing accuracy and proficiency of kickers on field goals and extra-point attempts prompted the change. Another change is letting the receiving team have the ball 30 yards downfield from the spot of a kick when a kick-off goes out of bounds (normally that would be the receiving team's 35-yard line). However, the receiving team can require the other team to kick over. Also, players are prohibited from writing words or numbers on their body, tape, wrist bands, etc.

Passing Efficiency: To determine passing efficiency rating points, multiply a player's yards per attempt by 8.4, add his completion percentage, add his touchdown percentage multiplied by 3.3, then subtract his interception percentage multiplied by 2. Maintain the decimal point selector in the floating position and carry out all final percentages to two decimal places. Good luck!

Talented Team: As in year's past, the 1991 BYU football team consists of players who have lived in all parts of the world. The number of returned missionaries in the program is 40 with another 19 currently on missions. Of the 40, 26 went outside the United States. Languages spoken on the team include Spanish, Africanz, Tahitian, Portuguese, Japanese, German, Samoan, Cantonese, Thai, Tongan, Italian and French. This year's team also includes 16 players who are married (there were five children at press time).

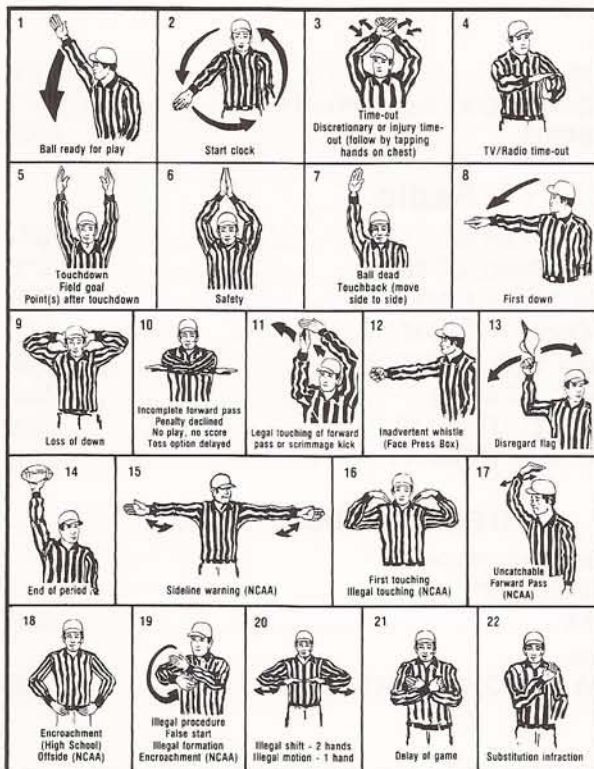

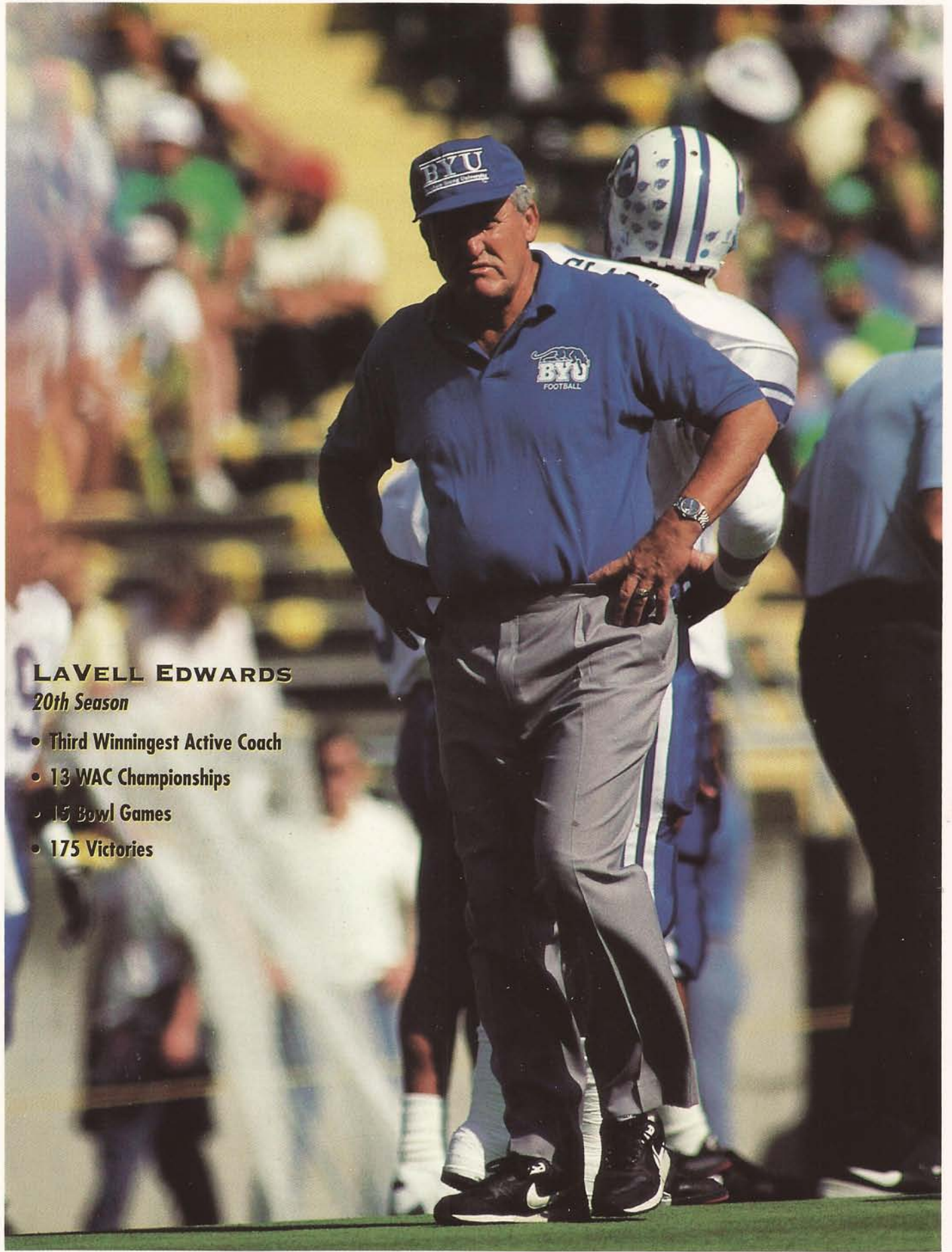
