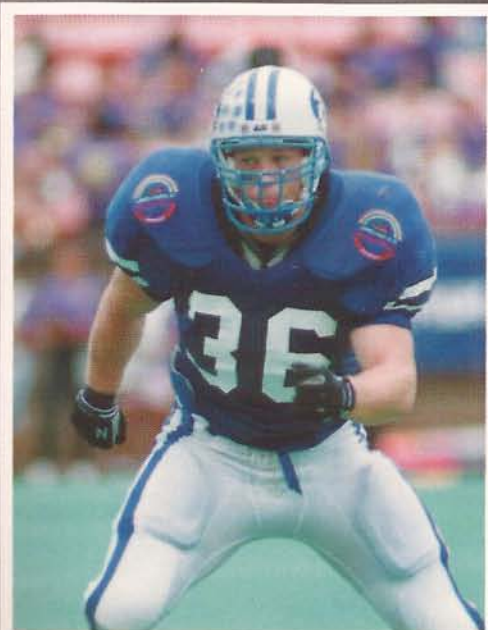
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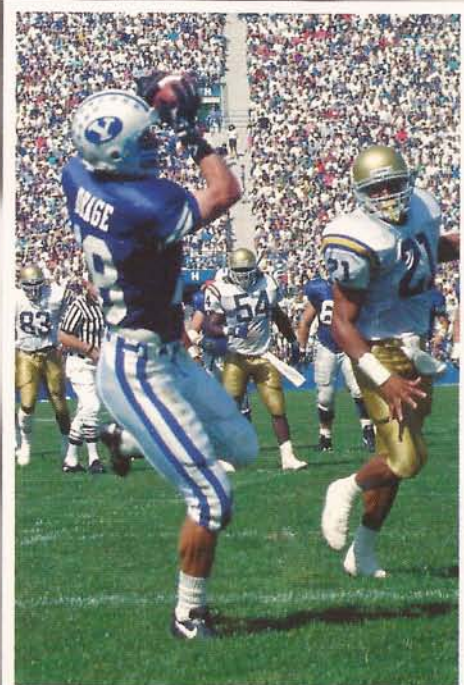

Outlook for 1993



Jamal Willis: Rushed for 1,004 Yards

Coach LaVell Edwards begins his 22nd season as head coach needing nine victories to reach 300 career wins. And he's doing it with the same cautious optimism which has produced 17 bowl appearances (15 straight) and 15 conference titles in 21 years.

Last season might have been the best coaching effort for Coach Edwards and his staff. They began the post-Ty Detmer era with three losses by a touchdown or

less during September and then, after losing two quarterbacks, bounced back to tie for the Western Athletic Conference title and nearly beat Kansas in the Aloha Bowl with a fourth quarterback who began the season fifth on the depth charts.

Coach Edwards saw three quarterbacks go down with season-ending injuries. Then Ryan Hancock, who finished the regular season third nationally in total offense and passing efficiency, decided to forego his final two years of football eligibility after being drafted in baseball (second round) by the California Angels.

Even so, this should be a very productive year. The Cougars return 13 starters among 49 lettermen, brought in a talented crop of junior college transfers and have a good group which red-shirted a year ago.

Here's a look at the Cougars by position:

OFFENSE Offensive Line

The guards, Evan Pilgrim and Jim Edwards return, as does honors' candidate tackle Mike Empey (6-7, 290). Scott Brumfield is gone but the other tackle is nearly as big--6-6, 300-pound Eli Herring, who sat out last season with a knee injury. He started in 1991. Garry Pay's replace-

ment at center in the spring was Ron Simmons but he could be pushed by JC transfer Troy Stoddard. Morris Unutoa, back from a church mission, has been moved from guard to center. Two other transfers also could see action in Coach Roger French's system. They are 6-6, 300-pound Marty Van Rosendaal and Elia Faupula, 6-4, 275.

Receivers

Drage is definitely the Rage. That would be two-year starter Eric Drage, who has been nothing short of spectacular his previous two seasons and needs just two touchdown passes to break a career record. Behind him is Micah Matsuzaki, who saw lots of time as a starter for two years before redshirting last year. On the other side are sprinter Tyler Anderson and sure-handed Bryce Doman. Those four and letterman Tim Nowatzke figure to carry in most of the plays in the Cougars' alternating system. The new kid on the block is redshirt freshman Jason Cooper, voted Utah's top high school player prior to a mission.

At tight end, Terence Saluone takes over for Byron Rex. He's not as big as recent versions but has more speed. Reserve Todd Jorgensen and transfer Tom Baldwin will vie for playing time.

Running Backs

Halfback Jamal Willis is the man to watch. He's the first Cougar in 20 years to go over 1,000 yards rushing. The shifty junior has started since midway through his freshman year. He should have an all-star season.

Kalin Hall, who rushed for 742 yards, returns at fullback and provides a potent one-two punch. Speedster Hema Heimuli also will see action from a running back spot. Lettermen Steve Christensen and Chad Knowles provide depth and freshmen Tony Hicks, Tefua Bloomfield and Rob Morris are highly touted backs.



Eric Drage Nears Career Record

Quarterback

The top candidates are John Walsh, who earned the starting job last August only to suffer a shoulder separation in the third game; Tom Young, who was co-MVP of the Aloha Bowl; and Steve Clements, who started at Hawaii before suffering a dislocated shoulder in the first quarter. Walsh and Young were healthy for spring practice and both had excellent springs while Clements, who required surgery, participated in non-contact drills. With Hancock (who required knee surgery after the final regular-season game) and Paul Shoemaker (mission) gone, fourth in line would be freshman Ryan Webber.

DEFENSE Defensive Backs

Patrick Mitchell begins his third year at right corner and Vic Tarleton returns at the other corner, where Hassan McCullough also saw playing time a year ago. Frank Christianson moves into Brad Clark's spot at strong safety and will get pushed by transfer Jack Damuni. Likewise, transfer Cory Cook will push Casey Mazzotta for the free safety post held three years by Derwin Gray. Lettermen Jeff Lindstrom, Jon Pollock, Kyle Roberts and Ron Simpson provide depth.

Linebackers

The two outside backers return in Nathan Hall and Todd Herget. Transfer Brian Hughes, who redshirted last season, appears set to take over for three-year starter Shad Hansen at middle linebacker. Veteran Ted Dawson and Royal Chamberlain, who saw a lot of action as a freshman, have the most experience of the reserves. Defensive coordinator Ken Schmidt also will take a long look at freshmen Alema Atuaia, Wayland Hickman and Shay Muirbrook. Hickman redshirted and Muirbrook was in school for spring practice.

Defensive Line

The three down linemen of the past two years--Randy Brock, Lenny Gomes and Greg Pitts--return, as does veteran backup nose guard Scott

Slalla. Joining them in Kevin Nicoll's position as an end will be Travis Hall, backed by transfer Mike Ulufale. Another transfer, John Raass, could see playing time and depth will be provided by lettermen Duaine Williams and Matt Redden.

Special Teams

Joe Herrick, who punted nearly half the time last year and who does place kicking, is back although the two who finished the season, kicker David Lauder and punter Brad Hunter, are not. Freshmen Kirk Conners and Alan Boardman got a look in the spring and available in the fall will be transfers Steve Evans and Bill Hansen. Morris Unutoa and Scott Slalla will compete for the deep snapper spot manned the last three years by Bruce Jenne.

The top three kickoff return men--Steve Christensen, Hema Heimuli and Jamal Willis--are back as are the top two punt returners, Mike Johnston and Eric Drage.

Head Coach LaVell Edwards

When LaVell Edwards was named BYU's head football coach in 1972, Cougar football fortunes skyrocketed.

BYU had averaged less than three wins a year in the school's 47 football seasons. The Cougars could claim only one Western Athletic Conference championship (1965) and had never been to a bowl game.

Since that time, however, BYU has won 191 games, 15 WAC championships (including 10 in a row from 1976-85) and played in 17 bowl games (including a current streak of 15 in a row). Honors and recognition have rolled in as the football program has risen to national prominence.

In 1984, Edwards led the Cougars to their first-ever football national championship and along the way picked up NCAA Coach-of-the-Year honors from the American Football Coaches, the Football Writers and the Pigskin Club of Washington, D.C. In 1979, he won the Bobby Dodd National Coach of the Year Award.

Six times in his 20 years as head coach, the 62-year-old Edwards has been selected WAC Coach-of-the-Year, and five times he has been named Kodak District Eight Coach-of-the-Year. The post-season games that LaVell has coached include the Hula Bowl (three times), the Blue-Gray Classic (twice), the East-West Shrine game (three times), the Japan Bowl (twice) and the Coaches' All-America Game.

In 1988, LaVell completed a term as president of the 5,700-member American Football Coaches Association (AFCA).

Such accolades are justly deserved for one of the great minds in the coaching profession who also is a husband, father, grandfather, church leader, author, teacher and doctor of education.

With John Robinson (USC) and Danny Ford (Arkansas) back coaching, LaVell's winning percentage (.738) ranks sixth among the nation's active college coaches. Under Edwards, BYU averaged over 10 wins a season in the 1980's. In 1986, LaVell passed Frank Kush as the all-time leader in WAC coaching victories.

Having roots in Orem, Utah, LaVell was born and raised not far from BYU's stadium. He graduated from Lincoln High School and attended Utah State, where he was a three-year letterman and captain of the football team. Twice he earned all-conference honors at center for the Aggies.

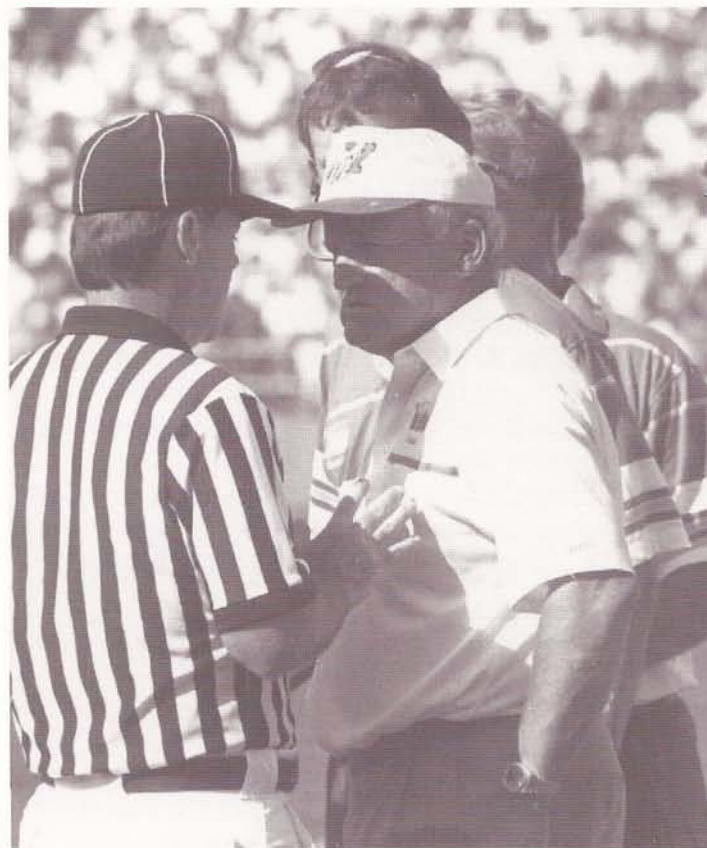
At USU he met his wife-to-be, Patti Covey. LaVell entered the Army, where he played on two service football teams: Fort Lee, Va., in 1952 and Fort Mead, Md., in 1953 as a player-coach with a 6-3 record.

From there, LaVell went into his first full-time coaching job at Granite High School in Salt Lake City, where he coached from 1954-61 before joining the BYU staff in 1962. Ten years after becoming part of the Cougar staff, Edwards was named head coach, succeeding Tommy Hudspeth.

The football philosophy practiced by Coach Edwards is one of high-powered offense and rugged defense. Under his guid-

ance, BYU has led the nation in passing eight times, in total offense five times and in scoring.

A 1952 graduate of Utah State, Edwards has added to his academic honors a master's degree from the University of Utah (1960) and an Ed.D. from BYU (1978). His attitude toward education is contagious, and several of his assistants have gone on to attain doctorate degrees.

Edwards has coached more years, won more games and had a better winning percentage than any coach in Cougar football history. His wife, Pat, is completing her degree at BYU. They have three married children: Ann Edwards Cannon, a writer, Salt Lake City; John, a doctor, Bountiful, Utah; and Jim, a lawyer, Henderson, Nevada.

Gary's career completion percentage is fourth on the all-time list . . . Bartkowski's final pass completion edged Sheide (182-181) for title. LaVell wins first WAC championship and a trip to the Fiesta Bowl against Oklahoma State.

1975 A year of adjustment, the Cougars falter through the first part of the season, then win six of their last eight games . . . **Gifford Nielsen**, a sophomore reserve, comes off the bench in the fourth game (New Mexico) to spark a come-from-behind victory . . . Giff sets WAC record with 10-of-12 passing in that game . . . becomes starter . . . Cougars finish 10th in team passing.

1976 Gifford Nielsen places fourth in NCAA passing (18.8) with only one-tenth completion separating him from Jack Thompson (Washington State) in second place . . . Giff finishes second to Tommy Kramer (Rice) in total offense . . . Cougars finish first in passing, sixth in total offense and eighth in NCAA scoring (424.4 total, 307.8 passing and 31.9 scoring) . . . Nielsen voted first team All-American . . . Cougars tie for WAC championship and play Oklahoma State in the Tangerine Bowl.

1977 Gifford Nielsen unexpectedly exits scene with injury in fourth game (Oregon State) and Marc Wilson takes over . . . by the end of the year, the two have combined for 40 TD passes, 3,585 yards passing and a .605 completion percentage . . . Wilson finishes eighth in passing and third in total offense . . . Cougars lead nation in passing (341.6), finish second in scoring (39.4) and third in total offense (470.2) . . . BYU's 341.6 yards per game is third highest in history, and 41 TDs second . . . Cougars top the nation in "takeaways" with a total of 56 defensive takes (fumbles recovered or interceptions) . . . Cougars tie for first in WAC and make post-season trip to Japan.

1978 Both **Marc Wilson** and sophomore quarterback **Jim McMahon** see action in 10 games as they share quarterback duties . . . Wilson is injured in the third game of the year . . . neither quarterback is mentioned in NCAA stats, but Cougars

are eighth in passing and fourth in fumble recoveries . . . Cougars win WAC and play in first Holiday Bowl against Navy.

1979 With two all-conference quarterbacks to choose from, Edwards decides to redshirt **McMahon** in favor of senior **Wilson** . . . Cougars upset Texas A&M in season opener and go on to record 11 straight wins . . . Wilson leads the nation in total offense (325.5) and is fourth in pass efficiency (147.1) . . . finishes the year as consensus All-American with 10 NCAA records to his credit . . . Cougars lead the nation in four categories: passing (368.3), total offense (521.4), scoring (40.6) and kickoff returns (26.3) . . . also, the Cougars are 11th in scoring defense (11.4) and sixth in punting (40.1) . . . BYU becomes first Division I school to pass for more than 4,000 yards in a season . . . LaVell receives the Bobby Dodd coach-of-the-year award . . . Cougars win WAC again and play Indiana in Holiday Bowl II.

1980 The school's first 12-win season . . . also, BYU leads the nation in three statistical categories; total offense (535.0), scoring (46.7) and passing (409.8) . . . Quarterback **Jim McMahon** is named to the Kodak All-America team along with tackle **Nick Eyre** . . . McMahon is the first Division I player to pass for more than 4,000 yards in a season (4,571) . . . he set or tied 26 NCAA records, most in total offense and passing . . . his pass efficiency (176.9) was the highest ever . . . he also led the nation in total offense (385.6) . . . after losing the first game to New Mexico, BYU wins 12 straight . . . Cougars win WAC again and play SMU in Holiday Bowl III.

1981 Another 11-win season for the Cougars . . . have a 17-game win streak and rank eighth in the polls before losing to Nevada-Las Vegas . . . BYU leads the nation in passing for the third consecutive year . . . **McMahon** earns All-America honors and finishes his career with 71 NCAA records (plus the first Davey O'Brien Award) and sets record with all-time high in career pass efficiency (156.9) . . . LaVell coaches West team to a victory in the Hula Bowl . . . also coaches in the Japan Bowl . . . Cougars win WAC again and play Washington State in Holiday Bowl IV . . . Edwards' 86-32-1 record ranks among top ten in the nation.

1982 BYU expands Cougar Stadium to 65,000 seats and sells out each game . . . loses home opener to Air Force (39-38) but comes back to win seventh straight WAC title and play Ohio State in Holiday Bowl V . . . **Gordon Hudson** is named consensus All-America . . . BYU finishes third nationally in total offense . . . **Steve Young** is named WAC offensive player-of-the-year.

1983 Another 11-win season . . . Cougars are ranked No. 7 in final polls, highest ever for a BYU team . . . quarterback **Steve Young** and tight end **Gordon Hudson** both named consensus All-Americans . . . after losing to Baylor in the opening game, BYU wins final 11 games . . . once again, BYU leads the nation in passing and total offense and is second in scoring . . . Cougars set NCAA total offense record with 584.2

yards-per-game . . . BYU wins eighth straight WAC title and defeats Missouri in Holiday Bowl VI . . . Edwards surpasses the 100-victory milestone.

1984 Cougars win the National Championship by becoming only the third team in NCAA history to win 13 games in a season . . . winning streak is extended to 24 games . . . quarterback **Robbie Bosco** leads the nation in passing and finishes second to **Doug Flutie** in pass efficiency (151.8) . . . defensive back **Kyle Morrell** named first team All-America . . . team leads the nation in passing (346.2) and total offense (486.5) . . . defensively, Cougars finish 10th in scoring defense . . . another WAC championship and victory over Michigan in Holiday Bowl VII . . . Edwards named NCAA coach-of-the-year by most organizations.

1985 Cougars' defense of the National Championship begins with win over Boston College in the **Kickoff Classic** . . . defensive tackle **Jason Buck** is named third team All-America and WAC defensive player-of-the-year . . . **Mark Bellini** earns second-team All-America honors . . . team ties with Air Force for the WAC championship . . . quarterback **Robbie Bosco** finishes the season ranked second in total offense and seventh in pass efficiency . . . he finishes third in the Heisman Trophy balloting . . . BYU defense ranks 19th against the rush and 18th overall . . . Cougars lose to Ohio State in the Florida Citrus Bowl and end the season ranked 16th in both polls.

1986 Edwards passes **Frank Kush** as the winningest coach in WAC football history . . . **Jason Buck** becomes only the third player in the Western United States to win the Outland Trophy and is named consensus All-American . . . **Shawn Knight** is also named to several All-American teams . . . **Lakei Heimuli** comes on strong toward the end of the season to break Jeff Blanc's record for career rushing yards . . . Cougars fail to win WAC championship for the first time in 11 years but still post an 8-5 record and play UCLA in the Freedom Bowl.

1987 BYU leads the nation with 50 turnovers (28 interceptions and 22 fumble recoveries) with **Troy Long** getting the most defensive points . . . Cougars rebound to rank ninth nationally in passing offense and 22nd in scoring offense . . . after offensive line is decimated in pre-season camp, Cougars bounce back from 1-2 start to win eight of final nine regular season games . . . young backfield shows promise of things to come in getting within a two-point conversion of another WAC title . . . **Chuck Cutler** begins the first of two years as a GTE Academic All-America first teamer . . . **Leonard Chitty** sets career records for consecutive conversions (42) and for field goals (34) . . . Cougars win Gridiron Bowl in Melbourne, Australia, but injuries prove costly in All American Bowl loss to Virginia.

1988 Cougars win seven straight but drop to third in WAC race . . . Punter **Pat Thompson** named All-America and

finishes second nationally while team is first in punting and net punting . . . behind quarterbacks **Sean Covey** and **Ty Detmer**, BYU is fourth in passing, 10th in total offense and 13th in scoring . . . Cougars play second-ranked Miami on even terms for three quarters . . . **Bob Davis** is a finalist for the Butkus Award as the country's top linebacker . . . 11th straight bowl trip is 20-17 upset over Colorado.

1989 BYU returns to the top in the WAC winning the conference title for the first time since 1986 . . . Offensive lineman **Mohammed Elewonibi** becomes the second BYU player to win the Outland Trophy in the past four years and is named consensus All-America . . . **Bob Davis** and **Chris Smith** are also named to several All-America teams . . . **Freddie Whittingham** is named to the first team Academic All-America team . . . Sophomore quarterback **Ty Detmer** breaks 11 NCAA records and ties two others . . . Cougars make 12th straight bowl appearance, but drop a tough game to Penn State in the Holiday Bowl.

1990 **Ty Detmer**, a consensus first team All-America, becomes the first player in the Intermountain area to win the Heisman Trophy. He finishes the year with 5,188 yards passing—the most ever, and increases his NCAA records to 47 . . . **Chris Smith** is also consensus All-America and has more reception yards (1,156) than any tight end in history . . . **Andy Boyce** gains more yards receiving (1,241) than anyone who has played at BYU . . . **Matt Bellini** breaks the career record for catches with 204 . . . The Cougars shock the nation by **upsetting top-ranked Miami** but lose a shot at a number-one ranking with a loss at Oregon . . . **BYU wins the WAC** and goes to its 13th straight **bowl game**.

1991 Cougars go undefeated in the final 10 games as **Ty Detmer** finishes his incredible career with 62 NCAA records including an amazing 15,031 yards passing and career passing efficiency at 162.7 (nearly five points past Jim McMahon's previous record) . . . **BYU ties seventh-ranked Iowa**, 13-13, in its 14th straight bowl game . . . **Shad Hansen** sets a school record with 325 defensive points . . . **Peter Tuipulotu** winds up with the all-time best career rushing average (5.5) . . . **BYU** plays top-ranked Florida State in the Pigskin Classic and third-ranked Penn State (in front of a record crowd of 96,304).

1992 Cougars are forced to use three different quarterbacks (and a fourth in the bowl game) but finish **fifth nationally in passing** and **seventh in total offense** . . . **BYU** also was 23rd in rushing defense . . . among the highlights were **beating powerful Penn State** (30-3 until the closing minutes), a first-ever game against Notre Dame, finally leading the series against Utah State and the 19th win in 21 games under Coach Edwards against Utah . . . **WAC title** was the **fourth straight** and his 15th . . . **Ryan Hancock** finished third in total offense and passing . . . **Eric Drage** was 37th in reception yards per game and **Brad Hunter** would have been second in punting with a few more attempts . . . bowl appearance was the **15th straight**.

Assistant Coaches

Claude Bassett (BYU '78) **Inside Linebackers**



Claude Bassett is in his 11th year with the Cougar football program. He was named an assistant coach in 1985 after working as a graduate assistant two years.

Prior to coming to BYU, Bassett was a coach and teacher at Mountain View High School in Mesa, Ariz. There he worked under

Coach Jesse Parker and helped the team win the state title twice. He also taught and coached at Pleasant Grove High (1976) and Spanish Fork High (1978) in Utah.

Born in Reno, Nev., Bassett attended Enterprise High School and Shasta College in Redding, Calif. He participated in football and baseball.

Before transferring to BYU, he served a church mission in Rome, Italy. He is married to the former Leslie Johnson and they have four children.

Robbie Bosco (BYU '86) **Offensive Assistant**



Robbie Bosco is in his fourth year as a full-time assistant after being a graduate assistant in 1989.

The Roseville, Calif., native is best known for leading BYU to the national championship in 1984, when he guided the Cougars to a 13-0 record, led the nation in passing and was second in voting for the Davey O'Brien Award.

In 1985, he finished second in NCAA total offense and was third in the Heisman Trophy balloting for the second straight year. He set 10 NCAA records and was a second team All-America.

Drafted by the Green Bay Packers, Bosco had his pro career cut short by an arm injury. He graduated with a degree in communications and has a master's degree in physical education. He is married to Karen Holt and they have three children.

Norm Chow (Utah '68) **QBs, Receivers**



Norm Chow has been an integral part of BYU's successful offense for the past 16 seasons. He coaches the receivers, quarterbacks and calls the plays.

Prior to joining the BYU coaching staff full time, he spent two years as a graduate assistant. Chow graduated from Punahou High ('64) in

Honolulu, where he was named "Athlete of the Year."

He then attended the University of Utah (1968), where he achieved All-WAC (1967-68) and honorable mention All-America honors as an offensive guard.

A career in the Canadian Football League was cut short after a year due to a knee injury. He then became head coach for three years at Hawaii's Waialua High School.

Chow received a master's degree in special education from the University of Utah and a doctorate in educational psychology from BYU in 1979. He and his wife, Diane, have four children.

Dick Felt (BYU '58) **Assistant Head Coach, Secondary**



After an outstanding career at BYU and a seven-year stint in pro football, Dick Felt returned in 1967 to become a coach.

This is his 26th year on the staff. After returning from heart surgery at the start of the 1990 season, Felt's responsibilities continue to be with the defensive backs. He was defensive coordinator from 1982-90.

Dick lettered in five sports at Lehi High School in Utah and was an all-state football player. He went to BYU where, as a sophomore, he came off the bench in a game with San Jose State to score a record four touchdowns in one quarter. He won all-conference honors as a senior.

After graduating in 1958, he played for Bolling Air Force Base (1958-60), where he earned all-service honors and was named MVP in the Air Force (1960).

Felt played two seasons with the New York Titans (1960-61), the second year attaining all-pro second-team honors as a defensive back. He was traded to the Boston Patriots and was all-pro in 1962. He played in the first two AFL all-star games. Felt came to BYU in 1967, a year after leaving pro ball.

Dick is married to Dayleen LaVon Hobson and they have four children.

Roger French (Minnesota '58) Offensive Coord., Line



Roger French has been in charge of BYU's offense for the past 13 years.

French joined Edwards' staff in 1980 and has since helped produce numerous All-WAC and All-America offensive linemen, including 1989 Outland Trophy winner Moe Elewonibi.

Before coming to BYU, Roger coached at Minnesota and Wisconsin for 14 years. His responsibilities at Minnesota included the offensive line and receivers.

Since French came to BYU, the Cougars have won the National Championship (1984) and set the NCAA total offense record of 584 yards per game (1983). They also led the nation in passing and total offense three times.

Born in Minneapolis, French played linebacker, tight end and fullback at Minnesota, graduating in 1956. He obtained a master's degree and played with the Philadelphia Eagles and the Cleveland Browns.

He began coaching at Memphis State, where he was defensive coordinator. In 1962, MSU finished second in the nation defensively. He has coached several All-American linemen in his career, and more than 35 have gone on to play pro ball.

Roger and Dody have two daughters.

Chris Pella (Utah State '66) Recruiting, Kickers, Tight Ends

Chris Pella joined the BYU coaching fraternity in 1986 after spending 18 years as a coach at



Utah State. He was head coach of the Aggies from 1983-85.

A native of Brigham City, Utah, Pella attended Box Elder High School and Dixie Junior College, where he was team captain and a junior college All-American. He then joined the Utah State Aggies

as a fullback, offensive lineman and kicker, setting a school record with nine PATs against New Mexico State.

After graduating in 1965, Pella was hired as an assistant coach, a position he held for 15 years under coaches Tony Knap, Chuck Mills, Phil Krueger and Bruce Snyder.

Over that time, he worked with every position on the team. He also was head wrestling coach for two years. Pella worked for the U.S. Navy in Yokosuka, Japan, as the athletic director and football coach at the Navy base from 1969 to 1972. His 1971 team won the Interservice Championship and played in the Rice Bowl.

He returned to Utah State in the fall of 1972. In 1983 he was named head football coach.

Pella and his wife, Rita, are the parents of three children.

Tom Ramage (Utah State '57) Defensive Line, Special Teams



Tom Ramage has perhaps the most varied football coaching background in the state of Utah. He joined the BYU staff 20 years ago after coaching high school, junior college and at a four-year school.

Since Ramage was hired, the Cougars have traditionally ranked high in the WAC in

rushing defense.

Ramage came to BYU from Dixie College in St. George, Utah, where he was head coach for two seasons (13-7 overall). He was born in Price, Utah, and enrolled at Utah State, where he won All-Skyline Conference and All-America honors as a tackle in 1956 and lettered in wrestling four years. He graduated in 1957.

He began his coaching career at Bear River, Utah, then returned to USU, where he served as an assistant four years and obtained his M.S. degree (1962).

He left Logan in 1965 to serve as chief assistant and defensive coordinator at Weber State

under Sark Arslanian. In 1971 he took the head job at Dixie College. Sandwiched into his stay at Weber, he served as a commissioned officer in the Army and was discharged as a captain in 1967. Tom has coached two Outland Trophy winners: Merlin Olsen (Utah State) and Jason Buck (BYU).

Tom and his wife, Winona, have six children.

Lance Reynolds (BYU '77) Running Backs



For more than a decade, Lance Reynolds has played a key role in BYU's football successes as a player and as a coach. He joined the BYU staff in 1983 after a successful coaching jobs at Snow College and Ricks College.

A Salt Lake native, Lance was all-state at Granite High. He played both offensive

tackle and guard at BYU before serving an LDS mission to Seattle.

When he returned for his final two years, he earned All-WAC honors at offensive tackle and played in the East-West Shrine game and the Senior Bowl. After graduating in 1970, he played one season with both the Pittsburgh Steelers and Philadelphia Eagles.

Ken came to BYU in 1982 after successful high school and junior college coaching.

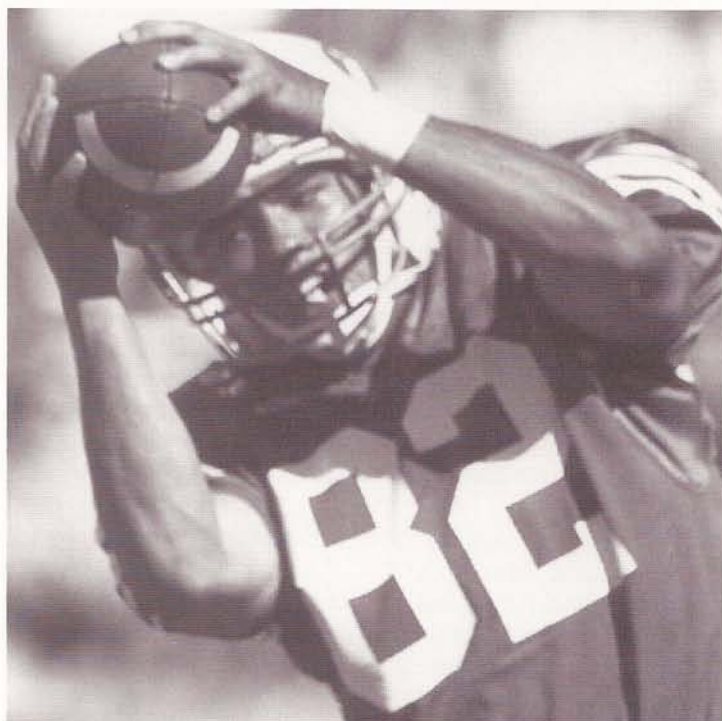

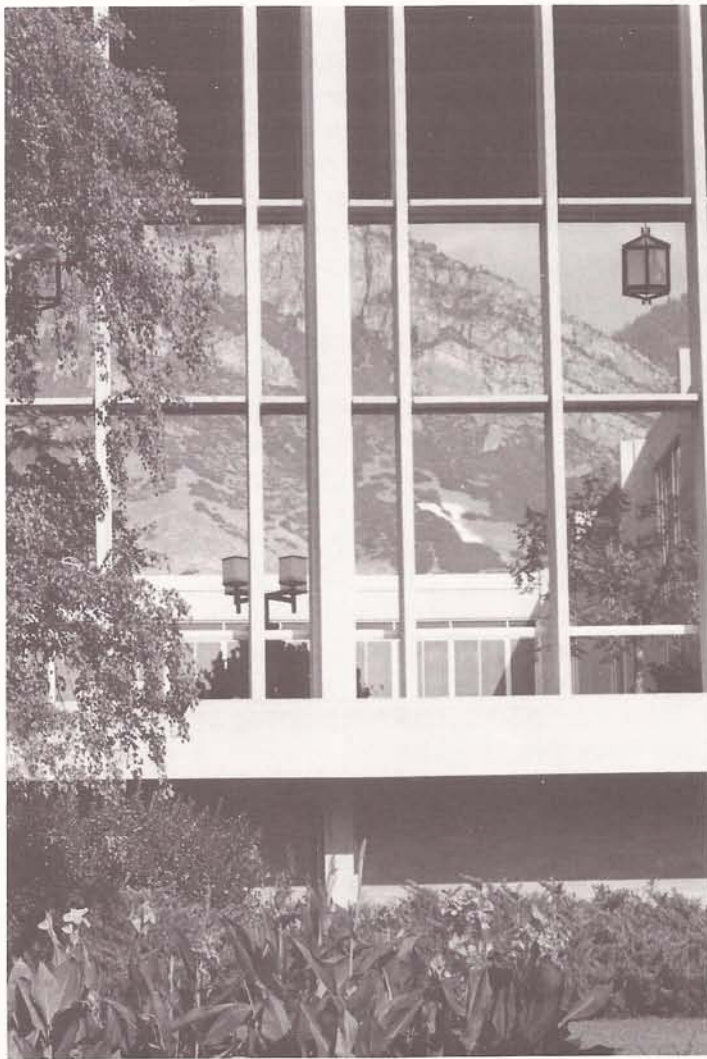

Brigham Young University



Brigham Young University is a private, church-sponsored institution which has earned an admirable reputation for successfully blending scholarly learning with moral and spiritual education.

BYU began modestly in 1875 as Brigham Young Academy with 29 elementary school students. It is now a fully accredited, internationally recognized university with a student body of 27,000, making it the largest private university in the nation in terms of full-time students.

Academic excellence is increasingly evident as students and faculty show their competence. Almost three-quarters of the 1,300 full-time faculty hold doctoral degrees, and the university is accredited by more than 100 education, business, professional and government organizations.

Admission standards for students continue to rise as competition for acceptance increases. The average ACT composite score for entering BYU freshmen is

now 27, and the average grade point for new students is 3.7. BYU is in the top 10 rankings for National Merit Scholars in attendance.

The J. Reuben Clark Law School is establishing a reputation as one of the elite top-40 law schools in the nation, with three of its graduates already selected as clerks to the U.S. Supreme Court.

Other highly respected programs include the School of Management, with its fifth-ranked accountancy department and top-rated MBA program; the computer-aided design/computer-aided manufacturing program, with state-of-the-art computer ability and a reputation for innovation; a large team of researchers in several disciplines studying coal's promise as an alternative to oil; the Ezra Taft Benson Agriculture Food Institute, which is contributing knowledge to help solve the world's food problems.

The music and drama departments are also particularly noteworthy, as are its language programs, with their unusually extensive course offerings, and a large number of faculty researching family issues.

To fill the 14 semester hours of religion required, students can take courses ranging from the history of the LDS Church to comparative world religions. Four of the 14 credit hours are spent in study of the Book of Mormon, a text regarded by Mormons as scripture, along with the Bible.

The 631-acre campus is a superb facility. It is unusually clean and well-kept, with beautiful landscaping and spacious quads. The Lee Library, with more than two million volumes and a seating capacity of 4,000, is at the heart of the campus.

The Harris Fine Arts Center features five theatres, two art galleries, nine pipe organs, 65 music practice rooms, a National Public Radio station and a Public Broadcasting Service television studio. Laboratories all over campus boast up-to-date equipment and full computerization. A new art museum was recently completed.

In addition to the Utah and Hawaii campuses, BYU maintains Study Abroad programs in China, Austria, England, France, Italy, Canada, Mexico, Brazil and Jerusalem.

Academic accomplishments and physical facilities aside, many BYU students and faculty point to the character of its people and their commitment to traditional values as the school's most important attributes. Each student signs a Code of Honor, promising to abstain from alcohol, tobacco, tea and coffee and to be honest and chaste—all in accord with tenets of the LDS Church.

Although 98 percent of the student body is Mormon, admission is open to those of any race, color, creed or

national origin, provided they meet the university's academic requirements and their conduct conforms to the standards of the LDS Church.

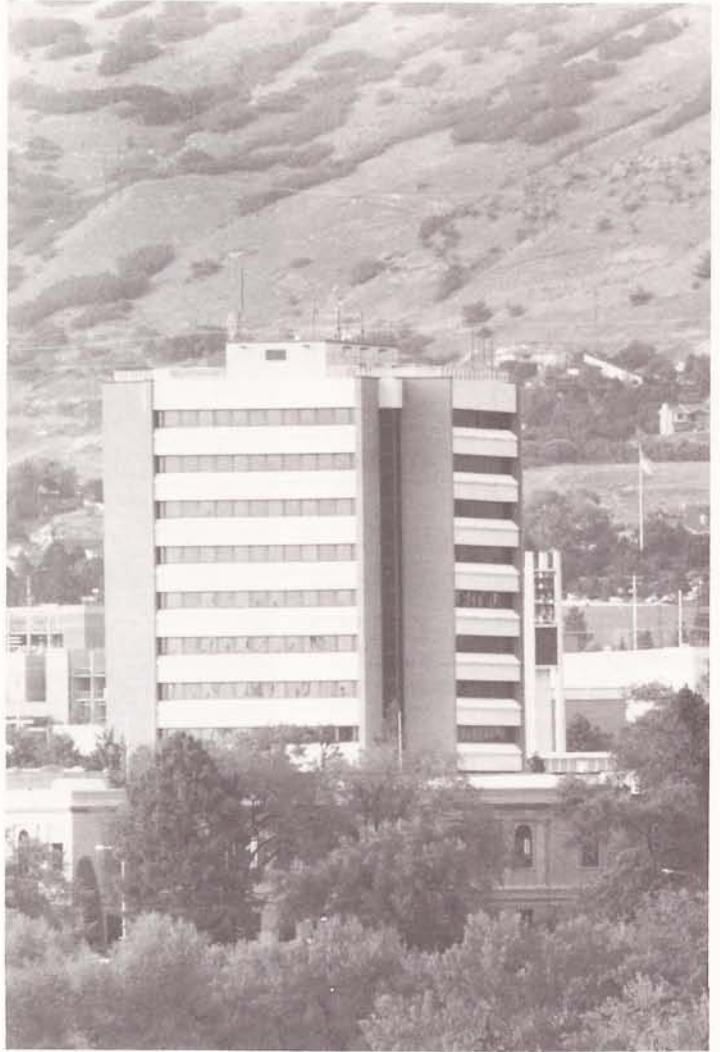
Non-Mormons come from over 25 other denominations, and about 22 percent of the student body is married. Students come from every state (32 percent from Utah) and more than 70 countries. More than 8,000 students are bilingual, having learned a foreign language while serving a mission for the LDS Church in another country.

BYU is on a three-semester system (4-4-2-2) with fall and winter semesters each being four months long, and the summer semester being divided into spring and summer terms.

The university traces its roots to Utah's rich pioneer heritage. In establishing the original school on October 16, 1875—first known as Brigham Young Academy—on a little over one acre of land in what is today downtown Provo, Brigham Young, then second president of the LDS Church, charged that all secular learning at the institution should be fused with teachings from the scriptures. No longer an obscure primary school in a little pioneer town, BYU is a world-renowned center of learning that remains true to that original charge from its namesake.

One of the academy's first principals, Karl G. Maeser, echoed President Young's directive in his own belief that even the multiplication tables should be taught with the Spirit of God. Despite steady growth during those early years, the fledgling institution was nearly overcome by a series of setbacks, including persistent financial problems and the destruction by fire of the school's original building in 1884. The campus eventually moved to a new location on Provo's University Avenue, where new facilities were completed in 1891.

As its high school and college curriculum improved and strengthened, the academy officially became Brigham Young University on Oct. 23, 1903. In 1909, under the administration of George H. Brimhall, work began on the Maeser Memorial Building, the first of



many structures on "Temple Hill," the university's present site. Throughout the administrations of Franklin S. Harris and Howard H. McDonald, the university gradually increased its enrollment and facilities.

President Ernest L. Wilkinson, who began his tenure in 1951, oversaw the university's greatest era of physical growth, greatly increasing both the number of buildings and the size of the student body. He also inaugurated the school's first doctoral program in 1957. President Dallin H. Oaks' administration, begun in 1971, saw a deepening and refining of the scholastic mission of BYU, which by then had an enrollment of 26,000. His commitment to academics continued during the administrations of Presidents Jeffrey R. Holland and Rex E. Lee as the university maintains its quest to provide excellent instruction in a gospel-centered atmosphere.

BYU is located 45 miles south of Salt Lake City in Provo, Utah, a city of 87,000 in a valley of 275,000, is situated 4,560 feet above sea level. The campus sits at the western base of the Wasatch Mountains, part of the Rocky Mountain Range. The valley offers a beautiful setting, with 11,750-foot Mount Timpanogos on the east and 23-mile-long Utah Lake on the west.



President Rex E. Lee

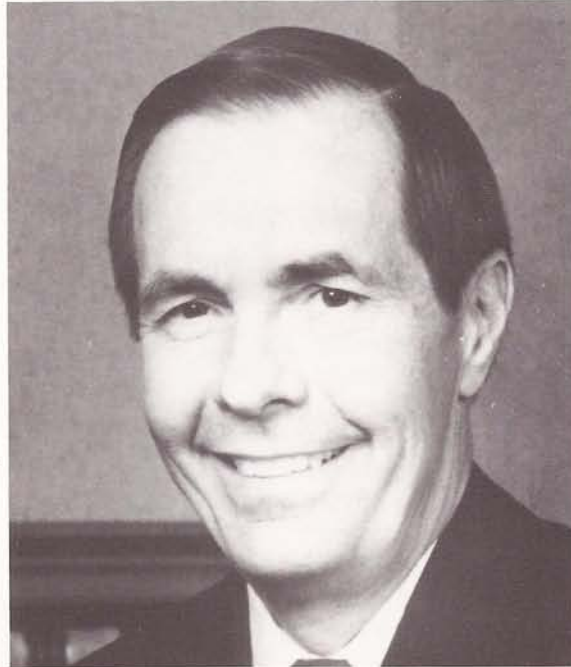
Rex E. Lee, a former Solicitor General of the United States, became the 10th president of Brigham Young University on July 1, 1989.

He currently chairs the NCAA committee to review rules enforcement and the infractions process. Among those serving under him is Warren E. Burger, former Chief Justice.

Prior to being named President of BYU, Rex Lee was a partner in the law firm of Sidley & Austin in Washington, D.C. He joined the firm June 1, 1985, after having served four years as Solicitor General.

President Lee was the founding dean of the J. Reuben Clark Law School at BYU from 1971 through 1975. He served as Assistant Attorney General in the Civil Division of the Department of Justice until 1977.

He has been the holder of the George Sutherland Chair of Law at BYU since returning to the Law School in 1985. He taught Constitutional Law and maintained a private appellate practice which has been almost exclusively before the



U. S. Supreme Court, where he has argued 57 cases.

Lee, 57, is a 1960 graduate of BYU and earned a juris doctorate from the University of Chicago in 1963.

He served as law clerk to Justice Byron R. White of the U.S. Supreme Court and then practiced law in Phoenix for eight years. He also holds five honorary Doctor of Law degrees.

President Lee served a mission for The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints in Mexico from 1955-58. He is married to the former Janet Griffin. They are the parents of seven children

and have six grandchildren.

One of their sons, Mike, is BYU's student body president this year.

As a young boy in St. Johns, Arizona, he earned the distinction of being the first boy in that community to become an Eagle Scout.

Rex Edwin Lee was born in Los Angeles, California, on Feb. 27, 1935, a son of Rex E. and Mabel Whiting Lee. His father died before President Lee was born and his mother married Wilford J. Shumway, now deceased, two years later.



Student Life VP, Athletic Director

Dr. R.J. Snow is entering his fourth year as Student Life Vice President. He accepted the position after returning from the South Africa Johannesburg Mission, where he was president from 1987-90.

Before his mission call, Dr. Snow was president and director of The Jacobsen Company from 1984-87. Prior to that, he served for nearly a decade as the Vice President of University Relations and Student Affairs at the University of Utah.

He also served as Director of the Hinckley Institute of Politics and as a member of the political science faculty during his tenure at Utah.

A native of St. George, Dr. Snow moved to Washington, D.C., at age 13 and attended junior high and high school there, returning to Utah to attend Dixie College, where he received an A.S. degree in 1957.

He served a mission in France and then enrolled at Utah, where he earned both his bachelor (1962) and master of arts (1964) degrees in history.

Dr. Snow continued his graduate education at Northwestern, where he completed his master of arts (1965) and doctoral degrees (1967) in political science. He also completed post-doctoral work at Oregon and Harvard.

In 1967, Dr. Snow moved to Santa Barbara, Calif., where he was on the political science faculty at UCSB until 1973. During his tenure there, he was assigned to direct the University of California's Education Abroad Program for two years at the University of Bordeaux and the University of Pau in southwest France.

Dr. Snow has been very active in civic and community service, having been on the committee for Executive Reorganization of the State of Utah, as a board member of the Utah Symphony, LDS Hospital and on task forces for the homeless and mentally ill.

His service with more than 25 other civic and charitable organizations includes board membership of the Salt Lake and Provo United Way, Provo-Orem Chamber of Commerce and board chairman for the Utah affiliate of the American Diabetes Association.

He married the former Marilyn Melville in the St. George Temple in 1962 and they are the parents of four children, including two current BYU students. They also have one grandchild.



Dr. Clayne Jensen, who replaced Glen Tuckett as Athletic Director in the summer of 1993, has served as a senior athletic administrator at BYU for 20 years.

He has been Associate Student Life Vice President with responsibility over the men's and women's athletic departments for the past two years and been the Faculty Representative to the NCAA since 1976.

Dr. Jensen was Dean of the College of Physical Education (1973-91), during which time the men's and women's programs reported through him. He served as Associate Dean for seven years and was a member of the Athletic Council 14 years, including eight years as its chair.

He was a member of the WAC Council 17 years, twice serving as its chair. He has been on a number of WAC committees and spent eight years on the High Country Athletic Conference Council.

In NCAA circles, Dr. Jensen has been a member or chair of seven NCAA committees and served a four-year term on the NCAA Governing Council (1985-89). In addition, he has been active in national and international Olympic programs for the past 20 years.

A native of Gunnison, Utah, Dr. Jensen obtained bachelor's and master's degrees from Utah (1952, 1956). He received his doctorate from Indiana (1963).

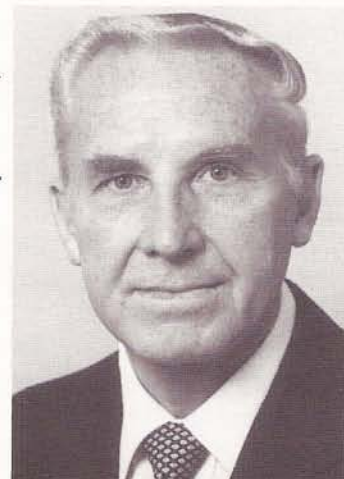
From 1953-55 he was a captain in the U.S. Marine Corps and coached two All-Marine championship teams in track and field. He was on the faculty at Utah State from 1956-64, a member of Phi Kappa Phi, and recipient of the Briethbard Athletic Foundation Award.

Dr. Jensen has held the academic rank of Full Professor for 26 years and taught a variety of professional courses during his first 20 years on the faculty.

He has authored many professional articles and written numerous textbooks (and revisions) totalling 5,000 pages of printed and copyrighted material. The books are used in 600 colleges and universities.

Dr. Jensen has been included in 17 national and international biographies, including *Who's Who in America*, *Who's Who in American Education*, *Outstanding Educators of America*, *Noteworthy Americans* and *2000 Outstanding Americans*.

He married the former Elouise Henrie and they have four sons (three were on BYU's football team).

Pete Witbeck, Associate AD

Associate Athletic Director Alan "Pete" Witbeck has been involved with BYU athletics 44 years.

Witbeck, a native of Raymond, Alberta, Canada, came to BYU in 1949 as a long distance runner on the track team.

While in Provo, he acquired bachelor's (1952) and master's (1954) degrees before joining the P.E. staff in 1955.

Three years later, Witbeck began six years as the freshman basketball coach. During that time, his teams posted a 62-9 record, losing only three times in his last three years.

The 1963-64 Kittens were undefeated and ranked first in the nation among freshmen teams. That group went on to win the NIT title in 1966.

Witbeck has received the Dale Rex Memorial Award, given annually to the person who has contributed most to amateur athletics in Utah.

As a member of that NIT championship team, he was inducted into BYU's Hall of Fame in 1980.

Witbeck joined the varsity staff in 1962 as Stan Watts' top assistant. During Witbeck's tenure, the team won five of 10 WAC championships and was nationally ranked.

He has been in the athletic director's office since 1972. Some of his responsibilities include eligibility, game management and serving as liaison between BYU, the NCAA and the WAC.

He is married to the former Kathy Pickering and they have three children.

Athletic Department

In keeping with the tradition of excellence established by the University's academic programs, BYU's Athletic Department has become known around the country for its successes in various sports.

BYU has finished in the top-20 in overall national rankings for 12 of the last 21 years. The Cougars have finished in the top-10 nine times and in the top-5 five times. Last year BYU had as many Western Athletic Conference titles as the other teams combined.

The University's athletic program boasts 12 NCAA-sanctioned sports: football, basketball, baseball, indoor and outdoor track, golf, cross country, tennis, gymnastics, swimming, wrestling and volleyball.

Besides football, the golf (1981) and track (1970) teams have won national championships. Cougar basketball teams have won the NIT twice (1951, 1966) and have been ranked in the top-20 several times. They reached the final eight in the NCAA playoffs in 1981. BYU's baseball team has won 20 WAC division titles in 21 years and was ranked as high as No. 1 nationally in 1983.

Part of the success of these teams can be attributed to the fine athletic facilities at BYU. The football team plays its games in the beautiful 65,000-seat Cougar Stadium. Practices are held on the field north of the George Albert Smith Fieldhouse. The practice area in-

corporates four full-size football fields and other workout stations. The team's locker room and training facilities are located inside the Smith Fieldhouse.

The fieldhouse contains facilities for nearly every sport. A one-fifth mile rubberized track surrounds three basketball courts, weight rooms and an artificial turf practice area. The west annex of the fieldhouse is used by baseball, football, track and golf teams for indoor practice.

Attendance at BYU basketball games consistently ranks among the best in the nation. Games are played in the spacious 23,000-seat Marriott Center, the second largest on-campus basketball arena in the country. The facility is also used for concerts, forums and other activities.

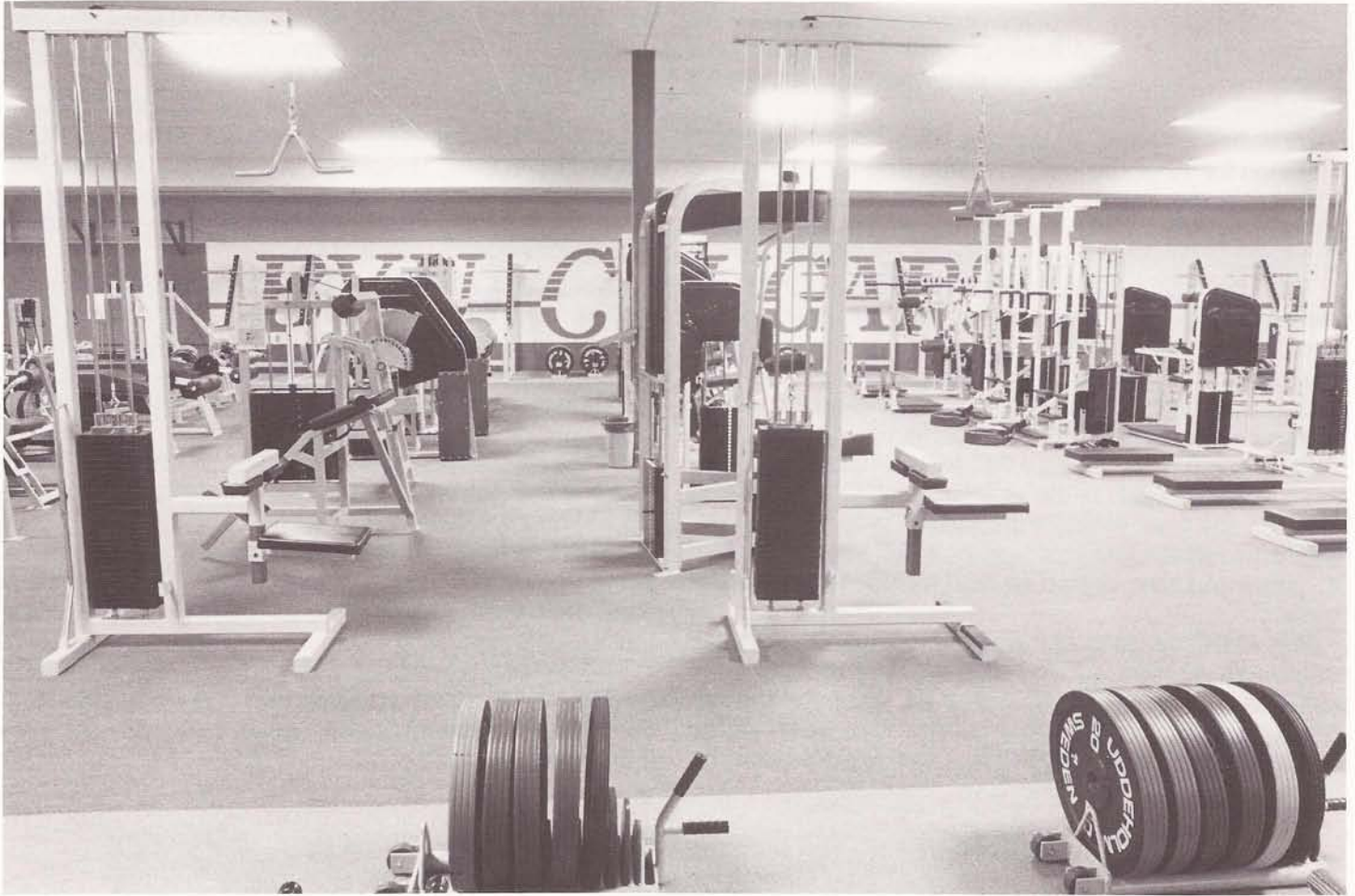
BYU's track is acclaimed by coaches and athletes as one of the finest in the nation. The NCAA track and field championships were held there in 1982 and 1989. All running and field events can be viewed from the grandstand area. An animated electronic scoreboard entertains fans and keeps athletes current with running times, splits, etc.

The BYU baseball diamond is adjacent to the Marriott Center, the football stadium and the track and field complex. Bleachers provide seating for as many as 4,000 people.

Strength and Conditioning Center



Personalized programs are a tradition at the strength and conditioning center.

BYU's conditioning facility ranks among the best in the country.

With nearly 10,000 square feet, the state-of-the-art center features 106 stations enhanced by beautiful blue and gray carpeting and by a stereophonic sound system with 40 speakers.

In short, it's an addition which looks good, sounds good and provides plenty of room for intercollegiate athletes to work out.

Patterned after the best features of weight rooms at other major football powers, the BYU facility is both functional and attractive. Its biggest advantages over previous conditioning areas for BYU athletes are that variety and ample space are provided.

Athletes no longer have to wait around for a certain piece of equipment. They can get more done in much less time than before and do not have to plan their weight training in early morning or late evening to get it all in.

That is especially helpful for athletes of other sports who have had a struggle finding equipment available during football season.

Another plus for the athletes is the motivational factor of getting caught up in conditioning fever by seeing so many others working out at the same time. Cougar athletes rave about how much more fun it is to work on strength and mobility in large, rather than small, groups.

Athletes also have been quick to point out the recruiting benefits of the facility. They insist the BYU conditioning setup is far better than any they have encountered during visits to other universities.

Even coaches of sports whose athletes traditionally don't look first at weight rooms feel the strength and conditioning complex is beneficial. For one thing, it shows BYU is serious about conditioning and, once an athlete is here, he or she will improve by being more involved in weight training.

Cougar Club, KSL, KBYU

BYU's Cougar Club has grown into one of the nation's most prestigious and effective booster organizations. Its membership of more than 4,000 makes it twice as large as any other booster organization in the conference.

Some of the Cougar Club services include funding recruiting trips, sponsoring the spring football game and pre-season basketball game and honoring present and past athletes at an annual banquet and with an Athletic Hall of Fame.

Cougar Club members donate annually to the BYU athletic program. In return, contributors receive passes for parking, football and basketball yearbooks, monthly newsletters and other benefits.

The executive director since 1975 has been Dale McCann, a business management graduate of BYU (1966). He attended West High in Salt Lake City and worked for General Dynamics and at Signetics prior to his current job. He is married to the former Andrea Schmidt and they have 10 children.

KSL and the Cougars

The BYU Athletic Department and KSL Radio and Television entered into an agreement two years ago to market broadcast rights to BYU athletic events.

The agreement is designed to help advertisers reach BYU's large sports audience via electronic media and in-arena promotions.

Under the arrangement, sponsors may contact a single source, KSL/BYU Sports, for advertising opportunities associated with BYU athletic events.

Advertisers may purchase packages which include television and radio exposure, as well as opportunities for in-arena exposure.

The agreement between KSL and BYU affects local broadcast rights only. BYU is a member of the CFA and honors all contractual obligations with that organization and with the WAC.

KSL-TV

KSL Television, the CBS affiliate in Salt Lake City, has been televising BYU football games on a regular basis since 1984. Craig Bolerjack, a graduate of the University of Kansas, provides play-by-play for the fans.

Blaine Fowler, a former BYU quarterback, provides commentary for telecasts.

The sports director is Doug Miller.

KSL Radio

For more than 42 years, BYU fans have been following Cougar athletics via 50,000-watt KSL Radio (1160 AM), located in Salt Lake City.

The "Voice" of the Cougars is play-by-play man Paul James, a veteran broadcaster with 43 years' experience. An Ogden High and Utah graduate, James began radio work in 1950.

For six years, he broadcast Utah basketball and football games before joining the staff at KSL Radio and Television in July of 1965. James has been calling BYU games 28 years.

Marc Lyons, a BYU quarterback from 1967-69 and a former coach at Olympus High in Salt Lake City, does the commentary. Assisting with the broadcasts will be Chris Tunis, Greg Wrubell and Tim Lewis.

KBYU-TV

The tradition continues between KBYU and Cougar football. All home games are televised on a tape delay basis by Channel 11 with Jay Monsen.

An experienced sports crew and state-of-the-art equipment have enabled KBYU to develop a reputation for outstanding coverage of football, basketball and other major "remote" events in the western U.S.

KBYU has won numerous awards for its sports productions and is frequently employed by ESPN, TBS Sports, Prime Ticket, the Utah Jazz Network, USA Network, SportsChannel and local affiliates of national networks.

KBYU owns and operates a fully-equipped, 48-foot production truck, designed by experienced professionals for demanding standards.

Traveling with an experienced team of engineers and technicians, the KBYU truck has a full complement of on-board audio and video equipment with state-of-the-art cameras, long lenses, one-inch and 3/4-inch tape machines, video monitoring, special effects, Chyron graphics and a complete internal communication system.

Games Via Phone

For fans outside the Intermountain area who can't hear the games on KSL or one of its network stations, they can listen by telephone.

The toll-free number to reach TRZ via a Touch-tone phone in the United States or Canada is 1-800-225-5448. After giving a Visa or Mastercard number, callers will be connected to the broadcast.

Depending on how long they listen, fans are billed between 20 cents and 50 cents per minute. The cost of listening to a game for three hours is \$36.50.

Cougar Stadium

A new era in BYU football began in 1982 with the expansion of Cougar Stadium to 65,000 seats.

Originally built in 1964, the stadium has been sold out for season tickets each of its 11 seasons. BYU has ranked in the top 20 in the country in attendance since the expansion.

Last season, BYU was 15th in attendance with its 65,079 average. The record is 66,002 set during the 1990 season, which began with the single-game record of 66,235 (Miami).

Fan support helped BYU schedule home games last year with UCLA and Penn State and

this year with Notre Dame. Among the teams coming to Provo in upcoming years are Washington and Arizona State. Home-and-away games with national champion Alabama had to be cancelled due to the expansion of the Southeastern Conference.

Since its expansion, the facility has been applauded by fans, players and the media as one of the best in the country. Among its many features are a box-bowl configuration, a natural turf playing surface and a four-level press box.

In 1982 and 1988, the Football Writers of America cited BYU for its "Outstanding Press Box Working Area."

The press box runs the entire length of the west stands, rising more than 10 stories high. It contains 42 loges (glass enclosed booths capable of seating up to 12 people) on the first two levels.

The third level is reserved for working media and the fourth level is the deck for television coverage and game filming. Three elevators assist guests.

Originally, the stadium seated 30,000 but as many as 47,000 crammed into the stands and hillside. Expansion included lowering the field eight feet, taking out the track (which hosted the 1967 and 1975 NCAA Championships), adding end zone seating and placing box seats along the west stands.

Each end zone contains 4.3 million pounds of steel and seats 15,000 people. Concession and picnic areas are on the ground level.

The playing field has a special sand-based drainage system capable of disposing of two inches of rain per hour.

Besides fall and spring football, the stadium is used for the July 4th spectacular, Stadium of Fire, which is part of America's Freedom Festival at Provo.

The stadium also houses the Athletic Hall of Fame in the Cougar Club Room, which is used for pre-and post-game activities as well as for meetings and banquets throughout the year.

In addition to office areas, the stadium has a great deal of storage space, including one of North America's largest Jurassic dinosaur collections.

It also is used for popular monthly sales of surplus campus equipment and furniture.

Western Athletic Conference

The 1993 season is the 32nd in the history of the Western Athletic Conference and is the second year each team will not play one of the other schools.

Again this season the WAC regular season champion will participate in the Thrifty Car Rental Holiday Bowl. This year's game is on Thursday, Dec. 30 (6 p.m. MST), against the third-place finisher from the Big Ten Conference.

Last year, a record five WAC teams played in bowl games--Air Force (Independence), BYU (Aloha), Fresno State (Freedom), Hawaii (Holiday) and Utah (Copper).

For five consecutive years, the Western Athletic Conference has produced at least three bowl teams. Since 1986, nine of the WAC's 10 teams have participated in at least one bowl game.

Currently, the WAC sponsors 11 championships in men's sports and 10 in women's sports. For the men, there are championships in baseball, basketball, cross country, football, golf, gymnastics, indoor track, outdoor track, swimming and diving, tennis, and wrestling.

The women have championships in basketball, cross country, golf, gymnastics, indoor track, outdoor track, softball, swimming, tennis and volleyball.

Founded July 1, 1962, charter members of the WAC included Arizona, Arizona State, BYU, New Mexico, Utah and Wyoming. The two Arizona schools had been members of the Border Conference while the others were members of the Skyline Conference.

Texas-El Paso and Colorado State became members in September, 1967, and the Arizona schools went to the Pac-10 in 1978.

Other additions include San Diego State (1978), Hawaii (1979), Air Force (1980) and Fresno State (1992).

Paul Brechler was the WAC Commissioner from 1962-68, Wiles Hallock from 1968-71, Stan Bates from 1971-80 and Dr. Joe Kearney since 1980.

Jeff Hurd is Associate Commissioner while Dee Anne Menzies and Jim Trego are Assistant Commissioners. John Adams is supervisor of football officials and Bobby Dibler and Kathy Garms are supervisors for basketball.

On July 1, 1990, the WAC merged with the women's High Country Athletic Conference to form a single league under one administrative structure. HCAC Commissioner Margie McDonald became WAC Deputy Commissioner.

In 1992, the WAC had five of the nation's top 20 passing teams (BYU 5, Utah 14, Fresno State 16, Wyoming 17, SDSU 20) and three of the top nine in rushing (Hawaii 2, Air Force 7, Colorado State 9). In total offense, it was Fresno State 2, BYU 7, SDSU 13, Utah 19, CSU 22 and Hawaii 26.

Fresno State led the nation in scoring (40.5) with Hawaii 8, SDSU 14 and BYU 16. Air Force was 11th in net punting, Hawaii 13th in turnover margin and BYU 23rd in rushing defense.

Three WAC players led the nation. SDSU's Marshall Faulk won his second consecutive rushing title (1,630 yards), Air Force's Carlton McDonald led in interceptions (8) and UTEP's Ed Bunn was the punting leader (47.7).

The WAC office is located in Littleton, Colo. (suburban Denver) and has been in that area since the league's beginning with the exception of a two-year stay in Phoenix from 1964-66.

Thrifty Car Rental Holiday Bowl

The Western Athletic Conference champion plays in the Thrifty Car Rental Holiday Bowl at Jack Murphy Stadium in San Diego, Calif.

This year's 16th annual Holiday Bowl, the second year of a three-year national advertising agreement with Thrifty, takes place on Thursday, Dec. 30 (6 p.m. MST).

It is played at the 60,409-seat stadium which hosted the 1988 Super Bowl.

The bowl has been in existence since 1978, when Navy edged BYU, 23-16, in what was then called San Diego Stadium. The name was changed in 1981 to honor the San Diego Union sports editor who had led the campaign to have the stadium constructed in 1967. Murphy died in 1980.

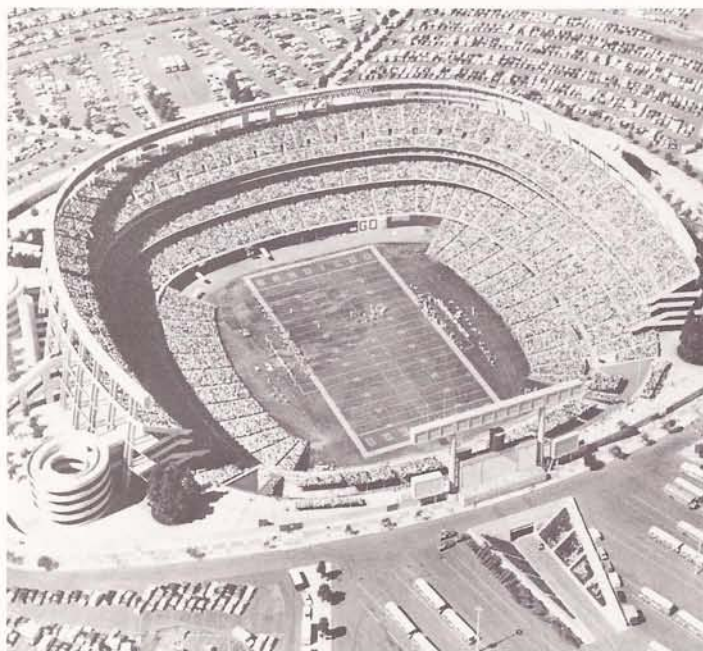
In 1985, the stadium was expanded from 52,675 for football and a \$6.5 million, 300,000 pound Diamond Vision scoreboard was added with a 66 by 100-foot scoreboard and screen for replays.

WAC teams have played in the Holiday Bowl every year except 1985, when Arizona State and Arkansas played. Since then, the bowl has resumed its tie-in with the WAC.

The WAC is 5-9 at the Holiday Bowl after last year's 27-17 victory by Hawaii over Illinois. Close games generally have prevailed, such as the 13-13 tie between BYU and Iowa in 1991.

An exception was the 65-14 romp by Texas A&M over BYU in 1990. Penn State scored in the final minutes of the 1989 game on a 102-yard interception and a 53-yard fumble recovery to beat BYU, 50-39.

In 1986 and 1987, Iowa defeated San Diego State (39-38) and Wyoming (20-19). Oklahoma State belted Wyoming, 62-14, in 1988.

The second year (1979), BYU lost to Indiana, 38-37. In the Miracle Bowl of 1980, BYU scored three touchdowns in the final 2:33 to edge Southern Methodist, 46-45.

In 1981, BYU beat Washington State, 38-36, but lost to Ohio State, 47-17, in 1982. In 1983, it was BYU 21, Missouri 17, and the Cougars defeated Michigan, 24-17, to win the national championship in 1984.

Even the non-WAC game was a squeaker with Arkansas nipping Arizona State, 18-17.

A major change in the Holiday Bowl came in 1988, when Sea World became the sponsor and the bowl name was changed to Sea World Holiday Bowl.

That relationship changed last year when negotiations for a new title sponsor were completed.

Outlook

New Mexico, which lost four games by four points or less, enters its second season under Dennis Franchione, who had his first losing season in 10 years of coaching in 1992.

But the Lobos allowed two fewer touchdowns and 111 fewer yards per game than the year before while the New Mexico running game more than doubled its output.

This is the first time in 17 years the coaching staff has returned intact and New Mexico is scheduled to have a new locker room and weight training building in time for the season opener against BYU.

It is scheduled for expansion to three floors for coaches offices and team meeting rooms. There also are plans to expand the stadium capacity to 60,000.

Stoney Case, a junior, enters his third season as the quarterback and he can throw to Carl Winston, who has 35 straight games with a reception. Winslow Oliver was the top freshman rusher in the country last year.

The Lobos led the league in sacks a year ago with 40 but lost their three down linemen. The honors' candidates are inside linebacker Tuli Mateialona and free safety Ray Wilson.

Outlook

If there's a lesson to be learned from last year, it's don't bet against the eighth-place pick. Hawaii had that distinction and went on to finish second nationally in rushing and 20th overall after an 11-2 record, a tie for the WAC title and a bowl victory over Illinois.

The defense was hit hard by graduation and kicker Jason Elam is gone but the offense has seven starters, including four linemen and quarterback Michael Carter.

Hawaii has to replace wide receiver Darrick Branch and running back Travis Sims but there are 45 lettermen, 43 redshirts and six transfers.

"I think we'll be solid on defense," says Coach Bob Wagner, who has been WAC Coach of the Year two of the last four seasons. "But we're certainly not in as good shape as we are offensively and the kicking game is a concern."

Ivin Jasper will return punts again and Zac Odom and Matthew Harding, the kickoff returners, are back.

There are eight home games but the away games are all league contests--including the other tri-champions, BYU and Fresno State.

The Sonny Lubick era opens at CSU. He has been the defensive coordinator at Miami four years. Prior to that he was an assistant at Stanford and offensive coordinator in Fort Collins from 1982-84 after being the head coach at Montana State four seasons.

He inherits a lot of players who started at one time last year due to a rash of injuries. Quarterback Anthony Hill will have to find someone besides Greg Primus to throw to but the offensive line is back, as is tailback Leonice Brown, who was instrumental in the upset over LSU.

The defense should be improved simply because so many players return. A year ago, Cougar fans didn't get to see safety Greg Myers, who was All-WAC as a freshman, or linebacker Brian Schneider, second team All-WAC.

CSU must find a new kicker and punter. Matt McDougal, who redshirted a year ago, might emerge doing both jobs.

The schedule is challenging--non-conference games against Oregon, Nebraska and Kansas--even with BYU and Fresno State at home.

The Rams figure to be a spoiler. Coach Lubick returns to the WAC with a strong reputation from his previous stint.

The lone returner on defense, tackle Curtis Sutton, played in every game as a sophomore and then started as a junior. But the Falcons definitely will be rebuilding on that side of the ball.

It might not be as hard as it looks on paper because Air Force uses a lot of players and has excellent Prep School and junior varsity programs.

Tackle Matt Newby and linebacker Steve Russ saw a lot of playing time last season. Obviously, the key loss is cornerback Carlton McDonald, a two-time WAC Defensive Player of the Year. He led the WAC in interceptions with eight.

Scott Teigen is the heir apparent at quarterback and has Obasi Onuoha and Wayne Young as the tailbacks. As usual, Air Force is hoping to improve its passing game to make the wishbone attack even more effective.

Up front, center Erik Mitchell, guard Jim Ramsey and tackle Chad Mathis are honors' candidates. Chris MacInnis is the WAC's top returning punter (41.5). He was 31st nationally a year ago. He also took over the place kicking duties last season in time to boot a field goal to beat Navy.

Heading the list are second team All-America tackle Vaughn Parker, linebacker Jamir Miller and strong safety Marvin Goodwin.

Of the Notre Dame players who scored against BYU last year, only Jeff Burris and Kevin Pendergast return. Burris is a safety who carried for a yard on the final touchdown but had two interceptions. Pendergast was the backup kicker who got the final PAT.

Outlook

Fresno State bounced back from a rocky start in its first year in the WAC to win its last six games, tie for the league title (with BYU and Hawaii) and embarrass Southern California in the Freedom Bowl.

The Bulldogs, the only team in the country to rank in the top 20 last season in rushing and passing (16th in both), now have the best winning percentage in the WAC, Pac-10 or Big West since 1985 (.798).

Questions about the defense are overshadowed by a potent offense led by 6-5, 225-pound Trent Dilfer, the All-WAC quarterback last year as a sophomore. He finished fifth nationally in touchdown passes, ninth in passing efficiency and 10th in total offense.

Fresno State has led the NCAA in scoring the past two years (40.5 during the regular season in 1992). The Bulldogs were second nationally in total offense a year ago.

Malcolm Seabron leads the group of five returning wideouts. Tailback Ron Rivers needs 538 yards to become the school's career rushing leader and kicker Derek Mahoney needs 67 points for the career scoring record.

Outlook

Last year, under a new coach, the Aggies came close to playing in the Las Vegas Bowl. They lost with six seconds left to San Jose State and blew a 19-point lead (midway through the fourth quarter) at Nevada.

This year, USU returns quarterback Anthony Calvillo (5-3 as a starter) and the Big West Defensive Player of the Year, Jermaine Younger.

Calvillo had 684 yards total offense in the Nevada game and most of his targets--Toney Jenkins, Mike Lee, Aubrey Thompson and Jim Ray--return. Abu Wilson ran for 795 yards--the most ever by a USU freshman. Tai Gordon also was impressive as a frosh.

The offensive line is solid again with all-league center Warren Bowers back from an injury along with veterans Jed DeVries, Jaceson Maughan, Rich Tylski and Ernie Howren.

Gary Brown joins Younger at linebacker and four defensive backs return but the defensive line is a concern with Joe Jacobs gone.

Another problem is the kicking game with the loss of Doug Beach and Sean Jones.

It looks like another battle with Nevada and San Jose State for Big West honors. And UNLV has lots of talent.

Outlook

The Aztecs are loaded with starters, second-teamers, superstars and a determination to bounce back from last year's frustrations. SDSU suffered upset losses to Air Force and Wyoming and still was within 14 seconds of the Holiday Bowl before bowing to Fresno State, 45-41.

Del Wight has left the Bulldogs to take over as defensive coordinator at San Diego State. Giving up points has been the one area Coach Luginbill, a former defensive coach, would like to change.

Heisman Trophy runner-up Marshall Faulk will attempt to become the first player to lead the nation in rushing three times. David Lowery looks forward to his senior season at quarterback and All-WAC receiver Darnay Scott is among the best.

About the only holes left to fill are for kicker Andy Trakas and punter Scott Oatsvall.

The defense lost Damon Pieri and will go with a third linebacker instead of the "dimeback" of recent years. La'Roi Glover will move from nose tackle to defensive tackle in the new alignment and will be joined by Sebastian Glaze and 6-7 ends Jamal Duff and Ramondo Stallings. SDSU returns five of the top six linebackers but recruited three junior college players to try and improve those positions.

Outlook

Mike McCoy, who completed 57 percent of his passes as Frank Dolce's understudy, looks like the quarterback of what could be a potent offense. The Utes were second only to BYU in WAC passing a year ago and 19th nationally in total offense.

The top three rushers--Pierre Jones, Keith Williams and Jamal Anderswon--return and transfer Rob Hamilton was impressive in the spring.

Two of the three top receivers, Henry Lusk and Greg Hooks, are back along with Bryan Rowley, who was a medical hardship last season.

End Luther Elliss, All-WAC as a sophomore, heads a defense which lost its linebackers but returns all the defensive backs, including Sharrieff Shah.

Outlook

After winning four games in his second and third seasons, Coach Lee saw the Miners slump to only one a year ago.

Statistics show the Miners were last in pass defense (a rating of 161.1 compared to 128.1 for San Diego State in ninth place), total defense (457.3) and in scoring defense (35.1). The return of defensive coordinator Charlie Bailey after a year in the World League should help. He is one of four new assistants since last year.

The defense will benefit from the return of line-backer Barron Wortham, a two-time all-WAC performer. He led the league in tackles per game last year with 11.4.

Also, end Pookie Floyd is back after concentrating on academics last season. All-WAC punter Ed Bunn is gone but kicker Marshall Young was second-team all-league last year as a freshman.

The offensive line returns three of the five players to protect quarterback Shawn Gray as he throws to J.J. Rowlett, who caught 33 passes.

A scheduling irony has UTEP playing the four teams right above it last year at home and the top teams from a year ago on the road.

But improved recruiting classes and a number of redshirts should start to pay dividends.

Aloha Bowl, 1992

Kansas kicker Dan Eichloff booted a 48-yard field goal with 2:57 left to play, giving the Jayhawks a victory over BYU, the Western Athletic Conference tri-champion.

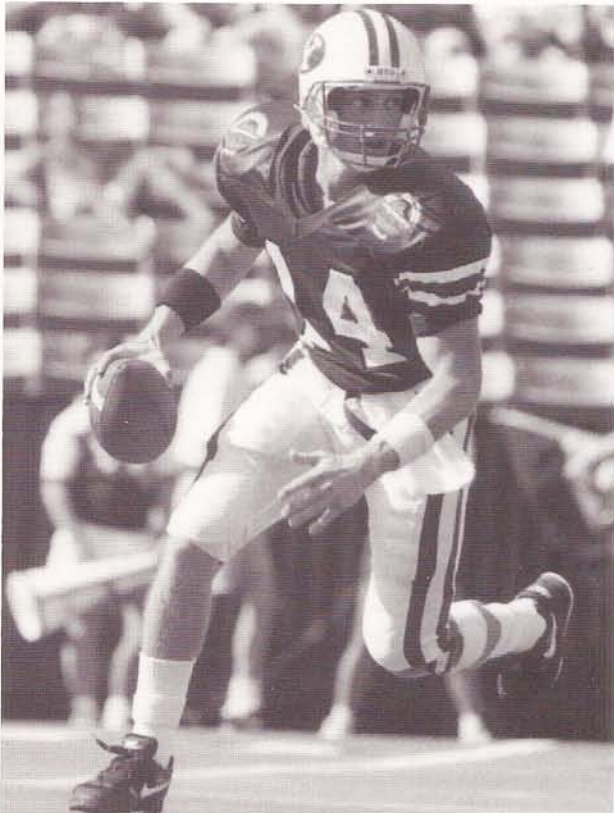
BYU got the Aloha Bowl nod over the hometown University of Hawaii when Fresno State came from behind to defeat San Diego State in the closing seconds.

That put Hawaii in the Holiday Bowl, Fresno State in the Freedom Bowl and sent the Cougars to the Islands.

Quarterback Tom Young, who completed 15 of 31 passes for 262 yards in his first varsity start, was named Most Valuable Player for BYU.

Tackle Dana Stubblefield, who had three of the six sacks on Young, won the honor for Kansas.

Young had been pressed into action when Ryan Hancock suffered knee ligament damage against Utah in the final regular-season game.

Hancock was the third quarterback to suffer a season-ending injury. The backup quarterback was Chris Gulstad, who had dropped out of football earlier in the season to concentrate on baseball but returned when injuries began to mount.

Special teams play helped the Cougars on the opening kickoff when Hema Heimuli scrambled 94 yards to score.

But the kicking game would prove the downfall as the Cougars missed a 36-yard field goal later in the quarter, missed a 31-yarder in the third quarter and misplayed an extra point attempt in the third quarter.

Kansas, which went 7-1 to start the season, tied the game two plays later when wide receiver Matt Gay threw a 74-yard touchdown pass to tight end Rodney Harris.

Another big play came midway through the quarter when Chris Maumalanga tackled Jamal Willis in the end zone for a safety. Those two points, coupled with BYU's kicking problems, would prove costly--especially after Kansas was successful on a two-point conversion attempt early in the fourth quarter.

BYU took a 14-9 lead with 10 minutes left in the second quarter when Willis ran 29 yards. Eichloff then cut the halftime score to 14-12 with a 42-yard field goal.

Young threw 10 yards to Otis Sterling for the only score of the third quarter. Kansas quarterback Chip Hilleary then tied the game by directing a 75-yard drive in a minute and a half, scoring a touchdown and on a conversion run.

After the field goal, Young hit Bryce Doman with a 31-yard strike. But two plays later Charley Bowen intercepted a pass at the Kansas 36 with 1:55 left to play.

Fullback Kalin Hall wound up with six carries for 62 yards and Doman caught four passes for 99 yards. Both teams punted for a 48.3 average.

The bowl appearance was the 15 straight for the Cougars and the 17th in 21 seasons under LaVell Edwards. He missed only his first two years (1971-72), 1975 and 1977.

Holiday Bowl XIV, 1991

BYU 13, Iowa 13

A tipped pass which was picked off in the endzone with less than 30 seconds remaining stifled BYU's hopes of knocking off seventh-ranked Iowa in a Holiday Bowl that will be remembered for Josh Arnold earning Defensive MVP honors.

Ty Detmer turned in another great performance in his last appearance as a Cougar, passing for 350 yards and two touchdowns against an team which led the Big 10 in defense and sacks.

Iowa quarterback Matt Rodgers led the Hawkeyes on a 74-yard scoring march on the game's opening drive. The score came on a 13-yard-run by fullback Mike Saunders.

Iowa scored after another long drive in the second quarter. Again it was Saunders who scored, this time on a five-yard dive.

Down 13-0, BYU finally got things rolling. After an Iowa punt put the Cougars on their own 22 with 4:43 to play in the first half, Detmer connected on five of six passes to move the Cougars to the Iowa nine. From there, he found fullback Peter Tuipulotu for the touchdown. The PAT failed and the halftime score was 13-6.

Neither team scored in the third quarter. BYU opened the fourth with an 87-yard drive that culminated with a Detmer to Tyler Anderson touchdown pass from 29-yards out. Earl Kauffman connected on the PAT to tie the score at 13.

Each team threatened to score late in the fourth. Iowa moved the ball to the Cougar 23, but missed on a 40-yard FG attempt with 4:19 left.

On the game's final drive, clutch receptions by Eric Drage, Jamal Willis and Tuipulotu helped the Cougars move inside the Iowa 20-yard-line with 33 seconds left.

Detmer scrambled left and threw a pass intended for tight end Byron Rex. The ball was tipped and picked off by Hawkeye safety Carlos James in the endzone.

BYU finished the season ranked 23rd in the Associated Press and the CNN/USA Today polls. Iowa finished 10th.

Holiday Bowl XIII, 1990

Texas A&M 65, BYU 14

December 29

San Diego

Led by quarterback Bucky Richardson and All-American running back Darren Lewis, underdog Texas A&M was out to show it could play with the Cougars. The Aggies were able to prove that point and a lot more as they stunned the Cougars.

Going into the game, the Cougars were fighting injury problems. Tony Crutchfield and Norm Dixon weren't able to suit up, and Ty Detmer was playing with a slight separation in his left shoulder.

The second largest Holiday Bowl crowd ever (61,441) watched the Aggies march 80 yards in 13 plays to take a 7-0 lead. The Cougars were able to tie the score on an eight-yard Ty Detmer to Chris Smith touchdown pass, but after that, the game was all Texas A&M. The Aggies went on to score 23 points in the second quarter en route to a 37-7 halftime lead.

With the game out of hand, the big story was William Thomas' crunching sack that separated Detmer's right shoulder and put him out of the game early in the third quarter. After playing valiantly with one separation, this one proved to be too much. Detmer would have surgery a few days later to fix the damage.

The Aggies continued to dominate by racking up nearly 200 yards rushing in the second half. The fact that Texas A&M's Lewis was still in the game with eight minutes to go and a 58-14 lead caused a slight stir among Cougar fans. A bright spot for BYU was Joe Evans' first touchdown pass as a Cougar quarterback.

Texas A&M's Richardson would go on to be named the Offensive Player of the Game by racking up 344 yards in total offense. Thomas was named the top defensive player with six tackles, two sacks and an interception.

BYU finished the season ranked 17th by UPI, 20th by USA Today/CNN and 22nd by AP. BYU had been as high as fourth prior to its first loss.

Obvious highlights were a win in BYU's first-ever meeting with a number-one team (Miami) and the first Heisman Trophy ever in the WAC.

Holiday Bowl XII, 1989

Penn State 50, BYU 39

Two very unusual plays late in the game kept BYU from toppling the East's best team, Lambert Trophy-winner Penn State. Two stunning defensive plays off-set 576 yards passing by Ty Detmer--the highest total ever in a bowl game.

For his heroics, Detmer had the rare privilege of sharing Most Valuable Player honors despite being on the losing team. The other co-MVP was the Nittany Lions' Blair Thomas, who rushed for 186 yards and picked up some key first downs for Joe Paterno's team.

BYU, which trailed, 41-26, with nine and a half minutes remaining, scored twice to cut the lead to 41-39 with two and a half minutes left to play. But a two-point conversion pass, which would have tied the game, was intercepted by linebacker Andre Collins and returned 102 yards to give Penn State two points.

The Cougars tried an on-side kick but Penn State fell on the ball at the BYU 46-yard line. Two tackles behind the line of scrimmage by Bob Davis forced the Lions to punt and the Cougars got the ball at their own 12 with two minutes remaining.

Passes to Brent Nyberg, Matt Bellini, Chris Smith and Andy Boyce moved the ball to the Penn State 38 with a minute left to play. Then what most BYU fans thought was a sack by safety Gary Brown became a score for Penn State. He stripped the ball from Detmer at the Penn State 47 and raced 53 yards with 45 seconds left.

The Cougars moved from their own 32 to the Penn State 40 in the final 30 seconds before time ran out.

Penn State finished the season ranked 14th by UPI and 15th by AP and USA Today/CNN. BYU was 18th in the UPI poll and 22nd in the other two polls.

A tough second-half defense, Ty Detmer coming off the bench to earn Most Valuable Player honors and two fourth-quarter field goals by Jason Chaffetz enabled the Cougars to upset Colorado.

Cool weather (42 degrees) by southern California standards didn't hamper diminutive Eric Bieniemy, who rushed 33 times for 144 yards and two touchdowns.

But his heroics couldn't offset Detmer's 11 for 19 and 129 yards in the second. Scott Peterson made a key pass interception to set up the game-winning field goal.

It was an exciting contest for the 35,941 fans (49,694 tickets were sold) although a big show failed to materialize in a matchup of the nation's top two punters. Colorado's Keith English averaged only 39 yards on two punts and BYU's Pat Thompson had four punts for a 33.5 average.

A fumble at midfield led to the Buffaloes' first score and then Sean Covey found Mike Salido to tie the score. An interception in the end zone stopped a BYU drive early in the second quarter and the Cougars trailed at the half, 14-7.

A Detmer to Chuck Cutler pass tied the game in the third quarter but Colorado took a 17-14 lead early in the final quarter.

The Cougars then moved from their own four to the Colorado 14 and tied the game with 4:11 left on a 31-yarder by Chaffetz. Three plays later, Peterson's interception and a 15-yard penalty put the ball at the Colorado 32. With 2:33 left, Chaffetz booted a 35-yarder for the victory.

A key performer for BYU was halfback Matt Bellini, who carried eight times for 78 yards and caught four passes for 41 yards. A sad note for the Buffs came early in 1989 when quarterback Sal Aunese was hospitalized with stomach cancer. He died during the 1989 season, when Colorado went unbeaten during the regular season and went into the Orange Bowl ranked number-one in the country.

The 11th annual All American Bowl was cool (temperature in the high 40s after two days of rain) and the Cougars never got warmed up despite taking a 3-0 lead.

BYU's 10th consecutive bowl appearance saw several records set but the Cougars were edged, 22-16, in their initial game with Virginia. Sean Covey attempted 61 passes, David Miles had 188 yards in receptions and Pat Thompson only had to punt once--all bowl records--but the Cougars fell just short several times.

Covey, who had led the Cougars to five straight wins as a starter, thought he had a first down at the BYU 46 with four minutes remaining but the ball was marked just short on a fourth-down play.

Darren Handley, BYU's leading receiver for the season, dropped a touchdown pass in the first quarter before BYU settled for a 20-yard field goal by Leonard Chitty. However, Chitty, who set a season mark for field goals (18) and consecutive PATs (29), missed 51 and 47-yarders in the second quarter as Virginia took a 14-3 lead.

BYU got to the Virginia two-yard line midway through the third quarter only to have a fourth-down pass tipped at the last second. Kyle Whittingham scampered eight yards to cut the lead to 14-9 at the end of the third quarter.

Virginia, behind quarterback Scott Secules, the game MVP, made a crucial 76-yard drive to go ahead, 22-9, with 11 minutes left. BYU then went the same distance to score on a one-yard pass to Whittingham with seven minutes remaining.

The Cougars were hurt by the absence of running back/returner Mike O'Brien and linebacker Thor Salanoa, who both suffered knee injuries in the Australia game. Salanoa's loss was magnified when linebacker Richard Hobbs was sidelined in the first half of the bowl game.

Ironically, nine years earlier on the same date (his wedding anniversary), Virginia Coach George Welsh had led his Navy team to a 23-16 win over BYU in the inaugural Holiday Bowl.

Although BYU failed to win the WAC title, the Cougars kept alive an impressive streak of nine bowl appearances in a row by being invited to the third annual Freedom Bowl. There they met familiar foes UCLA and Gaston Green.

The two teams had met in 1985 when the Bruins came from behind to win a closely contested struggle in Provo, 27-24. Green, UCLA's outstanding tailback, was limited to 59 yards in that game and much of UCLA's offense came as a result of John Lee's four field goals.

The Freedom Bowl, however, proved different as UCLA and Green broke open a close game in the third quarter and went on to win 31-10. He finished with 266 yards on 33 carries.

The first half was marked by defensive struggle. The two teams punted nine times in the first 30 minutes with the only scores coming after a turnover and a trick play.

BYU struck first. Linebacker Andy Katoa recovered a UCLA fumble at the Bruin 47 early in the first quarter, and after a Bob Jensen to Mark Bellini pass, Leonard Chitty put the Cougars ahead 3-0 with a 32-yard field goal. Soon afterward, UCLA stormed ahead to stay with a 71-yard touchdown drive highlighted by a 49-yard run on a reverse by Bruin receiver Karl Dorrell.

From there on out, it was UCLA most of the way. Midway into the third quarter, Bruin fullback David Greenwood dashed 70 yards through the BYU defense and set up Green's one-yard touchdown run. David Franey followed with a 49-yard UCLA field goal and later, Green bolted 79-yards with 52 seconds left in the period.

Cougar quarterbacks Bob Jensen and Mike Young managed to pass for over 200 yards, but UCLA and Green did most of the damage. Costly injuries to BYU standouts Mark Bellini (ankle) and Andy Katoa (knee) also hindered the Cougar effort.

In what promised to be an offensive showdown between pass-happy BYU (11-2) and rough and tumble Ohio State (8-3), two of the nation's top defenses took center stage. In fact, the game's only touchdowns were produced by a nose-guard on an interception and a reserve wide receiver on a broken play. The rest of the contest was marked by intense hitting, and as is the case with most defensive struggles, the team that made the fewest mistakes won the ball game.

Buckeye kicker Rich Spangler tallied the first points of the game with a 47-yard field goal early in the second quarter to give Ohio State a 3-0 lead. BYU attempted to answer with a long drive of its own, only to come away empty after Vai Sikahema fumbled on an apparent touchdown plunge.

Before the first half ended, however, the Cougars again mounted a long drive and finally hit paydirt when quarterback Robbie Bosco rolled left, whirled right and found wide receiver David Miles on a 38-yard scoring strike to give the Cougars a 7-3 halftime lead.

When the teams returned to the field for the second half, misfortune immediately struck the Cougars. Deep in his own territory, Bosco attempted to throw a short pass underneath the dropping Buckeye linebackers and instead found Ohio State nose-guard Larry Kolic who snatched the errant pass and took it in for an OSU touchdown and a 10-7 lead.

On the day, Bosco was 26 for 50 and a touchdown, but miscues told the story. Ohio State was the benefactor of six Cougar turnovers, and the Big-10 Buckeyes went home the victor.

Holiday Bowl VII lived up to all the glamour and excitement of the previous six bowls, plus it had a new dimension--national championship luster--thanks to BYU's undefeated, untied season and No. 1 ranking. The 24-17 Cougar victory marked the first time in years that a non-New Year's Day bowl game determined the national championship.

The contest was played in typical Holiday Bowl fashion. After a scoreless first quarter in which Cougar quarterback Robbie Bosco was forced to the sideline with an injured knee and ankle, the game began to develop drama.

BYU scored first with 8:37 left in the first half on a five-yard run by Kelly Smith. The touchdown was set up when a limping Bosco returned to the lineup and engineered an 80-yard scoring drive.

The Wolverines responded by putting together an 80-yard drive of their own, culminating on Rick Rogers' five-yard touchdown run up the middle. The PAT tied the score at 7-7. The tie was short-lived, however, as a 31-yard field goal by Lee Johnson with time running out in the first half gave BYU a 10-7 lead.

Midway through the third period, Michigan went on top for the first time at 14-10 on a 10-yard scoring strike from Bob Zurbrugg to Bob Perryman. The Wolverines added to their lead when Bob Bergeron nailed a 32-yard field goal to make it 17-10 with 14:14 to play in the game. The Cougar offense then produced an 80-yard drive that culminated with a seven-yard Bosco-to-Glen Kozlowski touchdown pass to tie the game at 17-17 with 10:51 to go.

Bosco's 13-yard scoring toss to Smith with 1:23 remaining made it 24-17 and clinched a 13-0 season and the Cougars' first-ever national championship.

Yet another chapter was added to the saga of impossible, thrilling Holiday Bowl finishes when BYU defeated Missouri, 21-17. The game was billed as a classic matchup between Missouri's stubborn defense and BYU's explosive offense, led by quarterback Steve Young.

For most of the game the defenses were in control. Missouri held BYU to just 167 yards of total offense in the first half and gave up only one touchdown to the Cougars. BYU's defense, however, allowed the Tigers only 157 yards of offense and 10 points in the first half. Missouri got its first-half points on a two-yard run by Eric Drain and a 37-yard field goal by Brad Burditt.

BYU's touchdown came on a 10-yard quarterback draw by Young. In the second half, Young hit Eddie Stinnett with a 33-yard pass. But Missouri came right back with another two-yard plunge by Drain. A valiant goal-line stand by BYU's defense gave the offense the ball on the six yard line with 3:57 left in the game.

The Cougars marched down field until, with a first-and-10 situation on the Missouri 15 yard line, Young handed the ball to Stinnett, who faked a sweep and lofted the ball back to Young. The ball barely cleared the outstretched hands of Missouri's Bobby Bell, but Young hauled in the throw and rambled into the end zone. The extra point gave BYU the lead 21-17 with only 23 seconds left.

Kyle Morrell then intercepted a Missouri desperation pass. Casey Tiunmalu picked up 57 yards on 27 carries.

The Cougars had their two-game Holiday Bowl win streak snapped by Ohio State, 47-17.

The BYU bubble burst at the outset of the third quarter, when the Buckeyes reeled off 17 unanswered points, while BYU only got one snap--an interception at that. The OSU damage came mainly on the ground, as the Buckeyes won their seventh consecutive game.

Tim Spencer was the main gun for the Bucks, as he blew through the Cougar defense for 167 yards, including a record-setting 61-yard touchdown run in the second quarter that put OSU up 10-7.

As usual, the BYU quarterback rolled up impressive marks, but the Cougars had trouble making points out of Steve Young's 341 yards passing on 27 of 45 accuracy. The Cougars turned the ball over to OSU three times inside the 30 and saw the Bucks convert each turnover into a score.

The Cougars' two touchdowns were at each end of the game, with the first, a seven-yard strike to Neil Balholm, coming in the opening quarter and the final tally, a 16-yard Young-to-Hudson connection.

The 1981 edition of the Holiday Bowl fit the mold of its predecessors. This time it was the Cougars of BYU versus the Cougars of Washington State playing before a crowd of 52,419. Again it was like two different games. BYU held a 24-7 lead at halftime, then pushed the score to 31-7, as Tom Holmoe intercepted a pass and returned it 35 yards to give the WAC team a comfortable 31-7 edge.

But as the second half progressed, it appeared BYU would be the come-from-behind victim in this one. With only 59 seconds left in the third period, WSU brought the score to 31-28, and from there the team from Provo had to hold on for its life.

In a crucial third-and-12 situation on BYU's 18 yard line with 30 seconds remaining in the third period, McMahon began completing passes that covered 82 yards and put BYU in the end zone again to stretch the lead to 38-28.

Statistically, it was a typical McMahon game: 27 of 43 with no interceptions, 342 yards and three touchdowns. But he will be remembered most, perhaps, for turning a fumbled snap into a carry for a first down.

Tight end Gordon Hudson had seven receptions for 126 yards and a TD.

One observer said the 1980 Holiday Bowl was actually two ball games--the first a contest that lasted most of four quarters, the other that was of four minutes duration. SMU seemed in control the first game, while the Cougars, behind 20 points with only minutes remaining, surged to a stunning 46-45 win.

Unfortunately, many fans either turned off their TV sets or left the stadium in San Diego before the "second game" began. For 56 minutes the Mustangs taught the Cougars a lesson in running the football. The Mustang's two great runners, Craig James and Eric Dickerson, rushed for a combined total of 335 yards.

With 4:07 remaining in the game, SMU scored to go ahead, 45-25. From there, the Cougars connected on a TD pass, recovered an on-side kick, scored on a one-yard scamper by Scott Phillips, blocked a punt and, finally (with three seconds left on the clock), scored on a "Hail Mary" pass of 46 yards from Jim McMahon to Clay Brown. With the score tied, Kurt Gunther kicked the extra point to send BYU fans streaming onto the field.

Statistically, McMahon completed 32 of 49 passes for 446 yards. It may have been the most exciting bowl game ever with the Cougars getting 21 points in the final two minutes and 33 seconds.

The 1979 season ended with BYU leading the nation in three major categories: scoring, passing and total offense. Moreover, the Cougars were one of the few undefeated, untied teams in the nation with an 11-0 mark.

Those kinds of credentials, plus their national rankings in the polls (9th UPI and AP), made the Mountain Cats favorites over the at-large entry, Indiana. It was BYU's first-ever meeting with a Big Ten school, and the net result was one of the most exciting bowl games of the season.

The opportunistic Hoosiers played BYU even in the first quarter, then carried a 21-17 lead at the half. BYU spurted ahead in the third period, 34-31, on a 15-yard pass from All-American Marc Wilson to fullback Eric Lane.

But midway through the fourth quarter, Indiana's Tim Wilber returned a punt 62 yards to push the Hoosiers ahead 38-37. With 2:06 remaining, the Cougars moved the ball 69 yards to the Indiana 10 yard line.

Then, with 11 seconds left, Brent Johnson missed a 27-yard field goal that would have made the score 40-38. Marc Wilson was voted the MVP on offense (28 of 43 for 380 yards) and Indiana's cornerback, Tim Wilber, won the honor on defense. Attendance: 52,200.

The inaugural game of the Holiday Bowl pitted two teams with local drawing power, the Naval Academy and Brigham Young. Despite chilly temperatures, (for San Diego that is), the two teams engaged in a hard-hitting battle.

The Cougars had a 16-3 lead at one point, even though the score was 9-3 at the end of the first half. Defense dominated the first two quarters. Brent Johnson put the Cougars on the scoreboard first with a 33-yard field goal with 8:26 left in the first quarter. But Navy's Bob Tata boomed through a 40-yard field goal to tie the score at 3-3.

Jim McMahon sent the Cougars ahead with a 10-yard pass to Mike Chronister, but Johnson missed the extra point. McMahon ran another in from two-yards out in the third period before the Middies took charge. Navy scored two field goals in the fourth quarter, but it was a 65-yard pass to Phil McConkey that did the Cougars in.

Some 48,003 witnessed the game in person. McConkey was named Best Offensive Player, BYU's Tom Enlow won Best Defensive Player honors for the game. Navy finished the year with a 9-3 record, BYU with a 9-4 mark.

The Cougars, however, stayed close in the first half, which ended 28-14. But Dave Lowry returned the second-half kickoff 102 yards (a Tangerine Bowl record) to bring the score to 28-21.

The crowd of 37,812 fans saw the two teams roll up 70 points between them.

Quarterback Gifford Nielsen completed 23 of 34 passes for 209 yards and one touchdown, but the Cougars could only roll up 255 total yards to 402 for OSU. BYU's record was 9-2 prior to the Tangerine Bowl game.

Oklahoma State had tied for the Big Eight title but missed out on the Orange Bowl due to the league's tie-breaking formula.

Fiesta Bowl, 1974

Competing in its first post-season bowl game ever, BYU played Western Athletic Conference host to the Cowboys of Oklahoma State before a crowd of 50,878.

The Cougars got off to a quick start with two field goals during the first quarter before All-WAC quarterback Gary Sheide was injured in the last moments of the first quarter. He was replaced by junior reserve Mark Giles.

The Cowboys took the scoring lead during the second quarter on a TD run around left end, so the halftime score was OSU 7, BYU 6. OSU regained possession of the ball on the Cougars' 17 yard line after intercepting a Giles-to-Tom Toolson pass, but was unable to convert on the turnover.

A field goal from 32 yards out put the Cowboys in front 10-7 at the end of the third quarter. With 1:14 remaining in the game, OSU scored another TD on a 40-yard halfback pass to complete the scoring.

The Cougars outgained the Cowboys in total yardage 301 to 214. Giles was 11 out of 26 for 138 yards. BYU's record was 7-3-1 prior to the Fiesta Bowl.

Historical View

Being recognized as one of the country's top programs--not to mention winning a national championship--seemed out of the realm of possibility for BYU.

After all, it was 28 years ago that the Cougars won their first Western Athletic Conference football title. And the team had managed only 171 victories and 16 winning seasons before the 1972 season.

It was in 1972, however, that BYU's football program shifted gears. **LaVell Edwards** was named head coach in that year, and things have not been the same since. The Cougars have won 191 games and been to 17 bowl games. Fifteen times BYU has won the WAC title under Edwards' direction, including 10 in a row from 1976-85.

Coach Edwards has won a national championship (1984), been national coach of the year, served as president of the Coaches Association, had a Heisman Trophy winner and coached two Outland Trophy winners in the past decade.

Things weren't always so rosy, however. Football got its beginning at BYU in 1922. That first season, BYU won only one game and scored a total of 10 points during the season. Now, BYU is traditionally among national leaders in scoring and total offense.

Football was introduced at BYU near the beginning of the century, but a fatality prompted its discontinuance. The game returned in 1922 and, minus three years during World War II, the Cougars have played a total of 68 seasons. BYU initially joined ranks with the old Rocky Mountain Conference and later became part of the Mountain States, Skyline and Western Athletic Conferences.

Some of the more noted athletes who have helped propel BYU into the national limelight have been quarterbacks. **Virgil Carter** (1966), **Gary Sheide** (1974), **Gifford Nielsen** (1976), **Marc Wilson** (1979), **Jim McMahon** (1981), **Steve Young** (1983) and **Robbie Bosco** (1984-85) have all left their mark on BYU's record books. And **Ty Detmer** (1988-91) finished his incredible career by achieving 15,031 yards passing--the first player ever to go over 12,000.

Nielsen, Wilson, McMahon, Young, Bosco and Detmer were All-American quarterbacks, and each erased marks set by his predecessor. McMahon, Wilson, Bosco were third-place finishers in the Heisman Trophy balloting, while Steve Young finished second.

Detmer won the school's first Heisman Trophy in 1990 and was third in the voting in 1991. Both McMahon and Young were recipients of the Davey O'Brien Award, given to the outstanding collegiate quarterback, and Detmer won it twice.

While passing has been the name of the game at BYU since Edwards took over, there also have been some impressive running backs.

Eldon "The Phantom" Fortie (1961-62), a single-wing back, won All-America honors in 1962.

"Fleet Pete" VanValkenburg (1970-71), led the nation in rushing and was second-team All-America.

Fullback **John Ogden** (1964-66) was the leading rusher in the WAC three consecutive

years. And fullback **Todd Christensen** (1975-77) did such a good job running with and catching the football he later became an all-pro tight end. He was the leading receiver on BYU's team for three years. **Lakei Heimuli** (1983-86) is the school's rushing leader.

A good passing team must have good personnel on the offensive line, and BYU has had its share of honors recipients in that area.

Mohammed Elewonibi won the Outland Trophy in 1989, BYU's second such honor in four years. Other standouts include **Gordon Gravelle** (1970), **Paul Howard** (1972), **Brad Oates** (1973-75), **Orrin Olsen** (1972-75), **Tom Bell** (1974-79), **Nick Eyre** (1977-80), **Bart Oates** (1977-82) and **Trevor Matich** (1979-84).

There also have been several outstanding tight ends at BYU, most recently **Clay Brown** (1978-80), **Gordon Hudson** (1979-83) **David Mills** (1980-84), **Trevor Molini** (1985-86) and **Chris Smith** (1987-90).

Top defensive players include **Wayne Baker** (1972-74), **Paul Linford** (1972-74), **Mekeli Ieremia** (1975-77), **Glen Titensor** (1978-80), **Glen Redd** (1976-80), **Kyle Whittingham** (1979-81), **Todd Shell** (1980-83), **Kyle Morrell** (1980-84) and **Jason Buck** (1985-86), the 1986 recipient of the Outland Trophy.

At various times in the past 25 years, the Cougars have had some great return specialists. **Chris Farasopoulos** (1968-70), the Galloping Greek, led the nation in punt returns and set two NCAA records. **Golden Richards** (1970-71) is still listed as a holder of several NCAA records. **Vai Sikahema** (1980-85) set an NCAA record for most punt returns and later earned All-Pro status with the Cardinals.

BYU was 15th nationally in attendance in 1992, averaging 65,079. Washington was the only school in the West (Pacific and Mountain time zones) which averaged more. Among schools below BYU were Oklahoma (64,166), Florida State (62,797), Notre Dame (59,075), Miami (55,675) and Texas A&M (55,407).

Press Information

The BYU Football Media Guide is designed to provide the media with useful information about the 1993 football team. The following information also will help the media in covering the Cougars during the season. Please review it.

Player Interviews

Please schedule all player and coach interviews through the Sports Information Office. To assure a better chance of obtaining the interview, please notify the Sports Information Office at least 24 hours in advance of the interview. Coach LaVell Edwards is available to media from 10-11 a.m. Members of the print media requesting interviews should contact Ralph Zobell, Sports Information Director. Requests for broadcast interviews should be made to Jay Monsen, Electronic Media Coordinator. **No player interviews will be given the day before, or on, game day.**

Big Four Huddle

Coach Edwards and two football players attend the Big Five Huddle at noon each Tuesday at the Red Lion Inn in Salt Lake City. The coach and players will be available for individual interviews immediately after the luncheon.

Home Game Coverage

Requests for press box and photography credentials should be made no later than **one week prior to the game**. These credentials will be issued to working members of the media only, with preference given to media representatives who regularly cover college football. No requests will be processed later than noon on the day prior to the game. Requests should be written on company letterhead and directed to: BYU Sports Information, 30 SFH, BYU, Provo, UT 84602. Phone (801) 378-4911.

Stadium Location, Media Parking

BYU's stadium is located on the northwest corner of the campus, just off Canyon Road and University Parkway (1430 North) in Provo. Press parking is in Lot #2, immediately west of the stadium near the ticket booth. Media parking passes must be requested. The press box is accessible via elevators located on the west side of Cougar Stadium.

Press Box Arrangements

The Sports Information staff will provide working media members with official statistics. A press box public address announcer will keep the media informed of play-by-play information, broken records

and other interesting information. A meal will be served before each home game.

Several telephones (campus extensions) will be available in the main area of the press box. Collect or credit card calls can be made from these telephones. In the past, there have been sufficient phones to meet the needs of the media. However, if guaranteed availability is desired, visitors may wish to order their own phones. Please notify the Sports Information Office in advance if FAX transmissions are necessary. The press box staff will be glad to assist in transmitting copy and statistics. Score updates are available by calling (801) 378-2609.

Photography Credentials

Photo credentials will be issued to newspapers and magazines which regularly cover college football. Mark Philbrick, BYU's photographer, will supervise the distribution of photo vests at the game. Photographers on the sidelines must wear the required vest at all times.

Television photographers and still cameramen are not allowed on the sidelines between the 25-yard lines. Please use north elevator to access press box. Pick up photo vests at the press box and return them after the game.

The BYU Sports Information staff will accompany the media to the locker room. With two minutes remaining in the game, the media group will take the south elevator to ground level.

Coach LaVell Edwards will speak to the media after the mandatory 10-minute cooling off period, which begins **after the team enters the locker room**. Quotes from both coaches will be available as soon after the game as possible for those unable to get to the interview room.

BYU fans can get up-to-date Cougar sports information each day by calling 378-TEAM. The hotline is sponsored by Universal Campus Credit Union and features scores and statistics from previous athletic events, information about upcoming events, and general information about the men's and women's athletic programs.
