A BYU diploma is a beginning, not an end, pointing the way to a habit of constant learning.

Most recently, linebacker Bryan Kehl was taken in the fourth round of the 2008 NFL Draft by the New York Giants, the reigning Super Bowl Champions.

Since 1982 BYU has consistently ranked among the top five in attendance in the West. Thanks to its affiliation with the LDS Church, BYU has a strong national and international following. In 2007, the Cougars produced an average of 64,497 fans per game -- that's an average of 100.71 percent of capacity which ranked 16th nationally. All totaled, 386,980 fans attended games in Edwards Stadium last season, ranking fifth in the west in total attendance.

For BYU football, the past 33 years have been packed full of championships, bowl games and national honors. Since 1974 BYU has played in 26 bowl games, won a National Championship, claimed 22 Conference Championships and earned 16 national top-25 finishes, including four top-10 finishes. In 2008, BYU will enter the season with the nation's longest active winning streak at 10 straight games, including a victory over UCLA in the Las Vegas Bowl. Over the past two seasons, BYU has posted a record of 22-4 and has won 22 of the last 25 games it has played. The Cougars have been to three straight bowl games and is currently on a two-game win streak in the post-season. (Both victories came against teams from the Pac-10.)

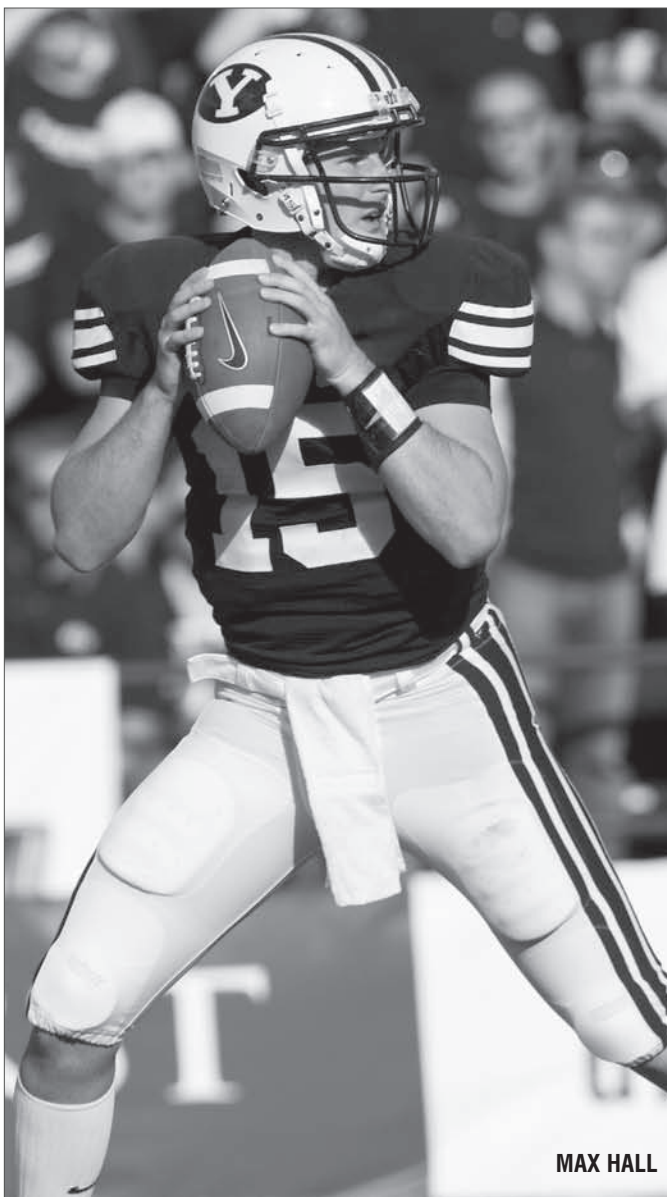

2008 COUGAR FOOTBALL SEASON PREVIEW



MAX HALL

Coming off another 11-2 season, including a streak of 10 straight wins to close out the 2007 campaign, the Cougars are now looking to take another step – the step that takes the program from good to great. And so, “The Quest” for 2008 begins.

“We’re not satisfied with being 11-2,” All-America candidate Jan Jorgensen says. “There are a lot of teams out there that would love to be 11-2. We’ve been good the last two seasons, and now, we’re looking to be great. Anybody who wants to be great will never be satisfied with being 11-2.”

Having only four losses over the past two seasons, and entering the 2008 season with the longest, active winning streak in the country, BYU head coach Bronco Mendenhall says he believes there is room to improve the program and take another step.

“We’re constantly looking to improve,” he says. “We’re looking at each player to improve position mastery, execution and competitive will. When each individual improves, we improve as a team.

“Our focus is on accomplishing our personal best and how our personal best improves our collective efforts,” he adds. “Our focus will not be on an undefeated season or on going to a BCS game. While that pressure may already be there, our focus will be—it has to be—on doing our personal best, and doing it as a collective unit on a daily basis.”

OFFENSIVE OVERVIEW

Over the years, BYU has developed a national reputation for being an offensive power. This year—with nine of 11 starters returning—will be no exception. With an emphasis on position mastery, execution and competitive will, the Cougar offense is poised to improve on its Mountain West Conference leading 442.8 yards-per-game and 30.1 points-per-game averages.

When your senior-laden offensive unit consists of six legitimate All-America candidates including, quarterback Max Hall, running back Harvey Unga, receiver Austin Collie, tight end Dennis Pitta and offensive linemen Dallas Reynolds and Ray Feinga, expectations will be high.

“It’s a veteran group and they know what they’re doing,” quarterbacks coach Brandon Doman says. “These guys know exactly what to do, and they’ve worked their tails off.”



QUARTERBACK

Max Hall, who was one of the nation's top quarterbacks last season as a sophomore, will lead the BYU offense in 2008. Hall racked up a MWC record 3,848 yards, passing for more yards than any other sophomore quarterback in the nation, including last year's Heisman Trophy winner, Tim Tebow from Florida. With Tebow as the standard, Hall then had Heisman-like numbers and will likely appear on a number of Heisman watch lists.

Junior Brenden Gaskins, who saw action in six games last season, is expected to play as the primary back-up to Hall, while Kurt McEuen made a strong showing during spring camp. Steven Covey, who recently returned from a church mission, could also figure in to the back-up mix.

RUNNING BACK

The running back position will be somewhat of a problem for BYU coaches this season – albeit a very, very, very good problem.



BRONCO MENDENHALL

Freshman All-American Harvey Unga returns for his sophomore season after posting record numbers last season as a freshman. Unga, the 2007 Mountain West Conference Freshman of the Year set the league freshman rushing record with 1,227 yards, averaging 94.4 yards rushing per game. He led the Cougars with 13 touchdowns, set the BYU freshman record with seven 100-yard games and became the first-ever running back in BYU history to run for over 1,000 yards. Unga is a difference maker and

Senior Fui Vakapuna is also expected to play a significant role. Slowed by injury last season, Vakapuna had a tremendous spring and appears to be ready to pick up where he left off. Vakapuna had 252 yards rushing last season and was credit

with two touchdowns. Vakapuna is a big, punishing back with notable athletic ability and speed. He can (and will) lay down the lumber.

Junior Wayne Latu will also see playing time this season after recovering from an injury last season. A relative newcomer, J.J. DiLuigi had an impressive spring

camp and is also expected to see playing time this season. Others who will add depth to the backfield include Bryan Kariya and Isaac Taylor.

WIDE RECEIVER

For those who may be unfamiliar with the BYU football program, remember this name – Austin Collie. A first-team All-Mountain West selection, Collie enters his junior season and is poised to have another stellar season. Collie led the Cougars with 946 yards last season and totaled a team-best seven touchdown receptions.

Senior Michael Reed had a break-out season a year ago and will be one of Hall's top targets in 2008 as well. Reed posted 449 yards and four touchdowns last season.

Spencer Hafoka has recently returned from church mission and will play a significant role this season. Hafoka is a sure-handed receiver who has impressed Mendenhall with his willingness and ability to lay it all out to make a play. Only a freshman, the future looks extremely promising for Hafoka.

Reed White and Tyler Kozlowski are two more receivers who have a valuable year of experience under their belts. Both White and Kozlowski saw playing time last season and, as sure-handed, sturdy receivers, will be expected to contribute again in 2008.



MICHAEL REED

Football bench press record by lifting 540 pounds, returns for his senior season with 26 games of experience over the past two seasons. Bright suffered a broken leg during the Las Vegas Bowl and did not participate in Spring Camp; however, Bright is expected to be ready for Fall Camp in August. David Oswald, who seems more like a Goliath than a David (at 6-foot-8 and a lean 330 pounds), returns for his senior season with 34 games to his credit.

The newcomer to the group, Tom Sorensen, is expected to start at center, replacing Sete Aulia who was the only offensive player lost to graduation. Sorensen has been in the program for two years after transferring from Vanderbilt where he earned All-SEC Freshman honors before serving a church mission. Sorensen played in seven games as a sophomore last season.

Junior R.J. Willing, who started in 11 games as a red-shirt freshman back in 2004, played in all 13 games for the Cougars last season and is expected to see plenty of action on the offensive line. Willing has played at tackle, guard and center during his career.

TIGHT END

Many have given credit to BYU for producing some of college football's top quarterbacks. It's also getting out that BYU has produced some of the top tight ends in the game as well. This year is no exception with two of the top tight ends in the Mountain West Conference on the roster.

Junior Dennis Pitta is not only the top tight end in the MWC, he could possibly be the best tight end in college football this season. Pitta returns after posting 813 yards and five touchdowns a year ago. He earned first-team All-MWC honors as the nation's second ranked sophomore tight end, averaging nearly 63 yards per game. Pitta has bulked up to 250 pounds, but at 6-foot-5, he is extremely athletic and has exceptional speed.

Andrew George had a break-out season last year, posting 200 yards on 17 receptions. George will be a significant contributor in the BYU offense that often runs double-tight formations. Like Pitta, George is a tremendous athlete and has the ability to run with the ball after the catch.

Defensively, the Cougars lost a total of eight starters, including seven to graduation and one to a church mission; however, under Mendenhall's system, 2008 represents yet another year with solid, position-mastery minded players.

You will have to flip back several years to find an offensive line that has as much experience as this year's starting five. Senior Dallas Reynolds has started 37 straight games, dating back to his freshman season. DEFENSIVE LINE

The one position that will benefit from two returning starters is the defensive line. All-America candidate Jan Jorgensen anchors the defensive line that led the charge in last year’s bid to post one of the country’s stingiest rush defenses. The Cougars ranked ninth in the nation last year, allowing just over 97 yards per game. In fact, BYU did not allow a single 100-yard rusher until the final game of the season – a 17-16 win over UCLA.

Jorgensen returns as the MWC sack leader, racking up 14 sacks as a sophomore. He also finished the season with 77 tackles, including 20 tackles for a combined loss of 115 yards.

The other end of the defensive line will be anchored by junior Ian Dulan and Brett

LINEBACKERS

Filling the void left by the absence of Bryan Kehl, Kelly Poppinga and Markel Staffieri will be no easy task, but again, under Mendenhall’s proven system, there appears to be others ready to step in and take it to the next level.

Senior David Nixon is the lone returning starter to the linebacking corps. Nixon racked up 66 tackles a year ago, including 10 tackles for a loss. Nixon will be joined at linebacker by a number of players who return with valuable playing experience under their belts.

Junior Shawn Doman returns after totaling 38 tackles in 11 games last season. Junior Matt Bauman has 24 games under his belt, including four starts as a true freshman in 2004. Bauman was credited with 34 tackles last season. Grant Nelson played in all 13 games last season and posted 22 stops, while Dan Van Sweden and Matt Ah You are expected to make significant contributions in the linebacking rotation.

BYU’S OFFENSIVE LINE



Denney. Dulan returns after starting 12 of 13 games last season and totaling 24 tackles. Denny earned his first start against Wyoming a year ago and was credited with 29 tackles on the season, including four sacks.

Russell Tialavea returns for his junior campaign after missing the 2007 season due to a knee injury. Tialavea started seven games at nose tackle in 2006 and saw action in 12 of 13 games. He was credited with 22

tackles and had three tackles for a loss. Moses Foketi, who played in nine games last season, returns for his senior season and will help anchor the line at nose tackle.

Others expected to add depth and make significant contributions include sophomore Rick Wolfley, senior Brock Richardson and Snow College transfer Tevita Hola.

Junior Vic So’oto will be a new face on the defensive side of the ball this season. After playing tight end the past two seasons, So’oto asked Mendenhall what he could do to better contribute to the team. For So’oto, the move made sense, and after a solid performance during spring camp, So’oto is looking at making an immediate impact as an outside linebacker.

Junior college All-American Coleby Clawson, a transfer from Snow JC, will also figure in to the mix at linebacker.

Terrance Hooks, who showed a great deal of promise during spring game, and was slated to enter Fall Camp as a contender for a starting position, suffered a knee injury during spring camp and is not expected to return until mid-season.

SECONDARY

Possibly the biggest question mark entering spring camp was who will be able to replace the solid and steady performances of Ben Criddle and Kayle Buchanan at the cornerback positions. Remember, the names change but the system doesn't. After catching a glimpse at the athletes who will contribute the most at cornerback, it doesn't appear the results will be any different this season.

While juniors Scott Johnson and Brandon Howard saw the most action with the first-team defense during spring camp, redshirt freshman G Pittman and sophomore Brandon Bradley will also see plenty of action in the rotation.

At safety, Kellen Fowler stepped in to start the final five games of the season after Quinn Gooch went down with a season-ending knee injury. Fowler made a solid contribution in his role last season, totaling 28 tackles. Fowler is slated to start at safety as a senior, along with David Tafuna, who missed last season with a foot injury. While Tafuna was held out of contact drills during spring, both saw significant playing time and will enter Fall Camp prepared to hold down the secondary.

Redshirt freshman Jordan Pendleton is also expected to contribute at safety, along with Snow College transfer Andrew Rich. Gary Nagy, Brannon Brooks, Chris Warner and Steven Thomas are all expected to contribute in the BYU secondary during the 2008 season.

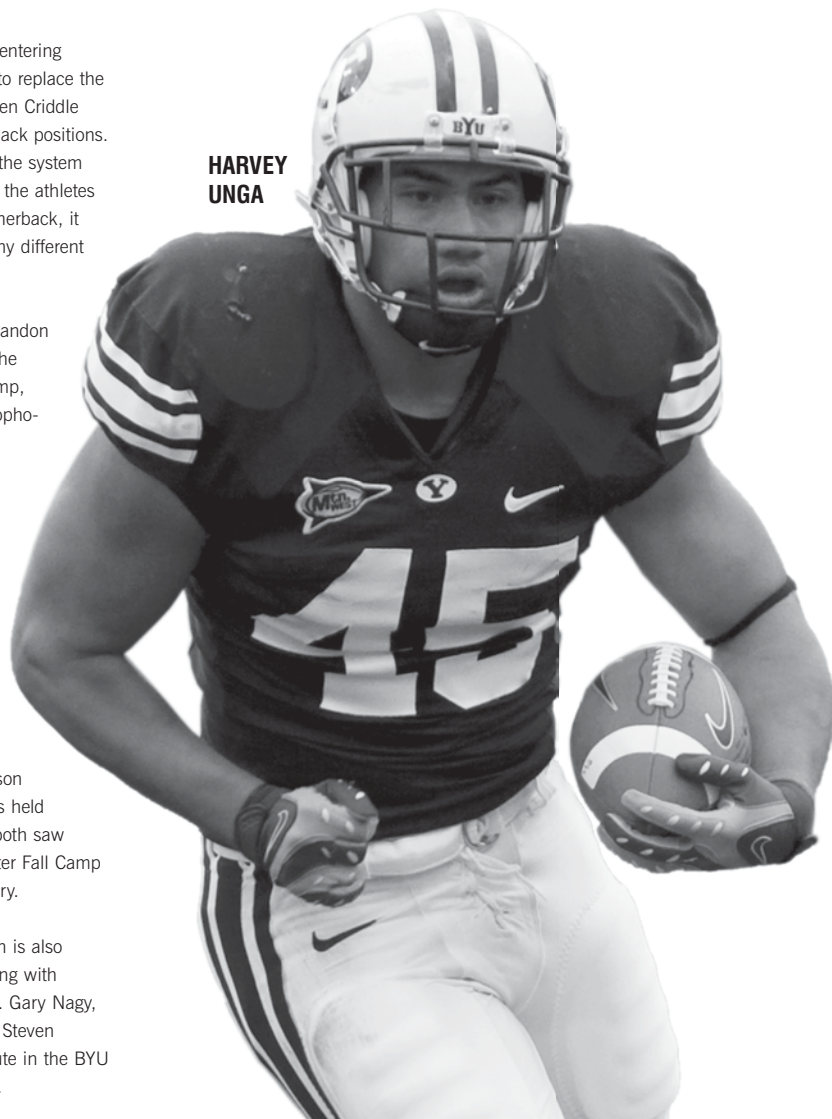
SPECIAL TEAMS

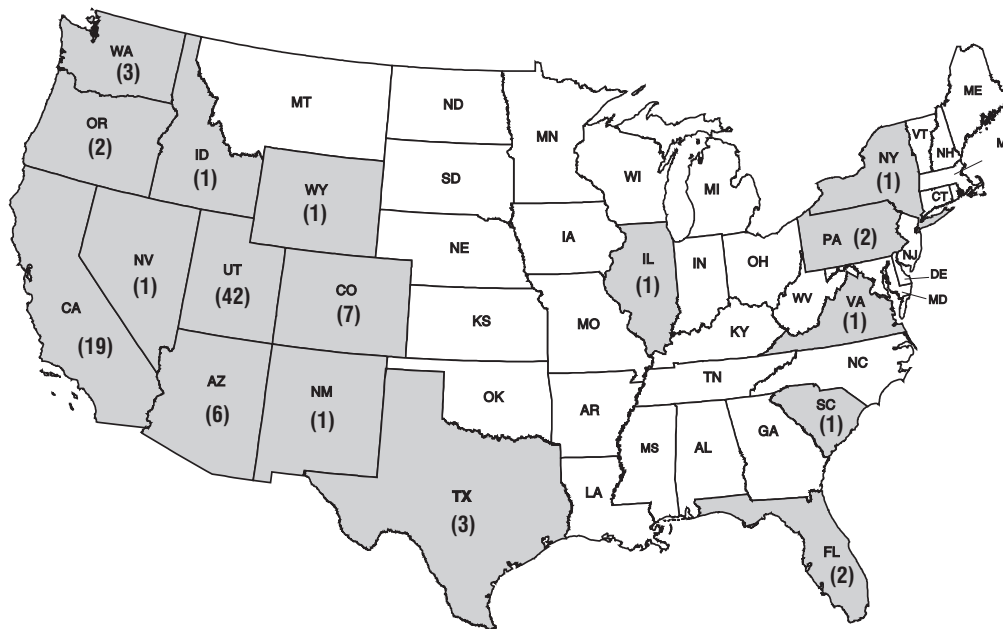

BRONCO MENDENHALL

BRIGHAM YOUNG UNIVERSITY'S 14TH HEAD FOOTBALL COACH



After only his third season as the head coach at Brigham Young, Bronco Mendenhall has taken a program that had not enjoyed a winning season since 2001 and has turned it back into the Mountain West Conference's premier football program, and is steadily rebuilding the national prominence the Cougars once enjoyed. After posting a 6-6 record in 2005, Mendenhall's Cougars have won 22 of their last 26 games over the past two seasons, including a 17-16 victory over UCLA in the 2007 Pioneer Las Vegas Bowl.

In his first season, Mendenhall led BYU to a 6-5 regular-season record and earned an invitation to the Las Vegas Bowl -- the team's first post-season bowl appearance in three seasons. Since then, he has coached the Cougars to back-to-back, 11-win seasons and claimed consecutive MWC titles with a combined record of 16-0 against league opponents. Under his direction, the Cougars have not lost a league game—at home or on the road—in two years and have finished the regular-season ranked among the nation's top-20 programs in the Bowl Championship Series standings.

With an invitation to attend the 2007 Pioneer Las Vegas Bowl, Mendenhall became the first coach in BYU football history to take a team to a bowl game in three straight seasons during his first three years as a head coach. On November 17, 2007, Mendenhall led the Cougars to a 35-10 victory over Wyoming to record his 25th career win. With the victory, Mendenhall became the only coach in BYU football history to win 25 games in his first 35 attempts.

Building on the success of his first-ever season as a head coach in 2005, Mendenhall and the Cougars posted an 11-2 record in 2006, winning the outright Mountain West Conference Championship with a perfect 8-0 record. As a result, BYU returned to the Las Vegas Bowl to represent the MWC. In dominating fashion, and with a swagger similar to that of the glory years of BYU football, the Cougars handed Oregon a 38-8 defeat in the Las Vegas Bowl.

Throughout the 2006 season, BYU climbed the national polls by winning nine straight games to finish the regular season. As a result, the Cougars earned top-20 rankings in the Associated Press Top-25, the USA Today Coaches Poll, the Harris Interactive Poll and the BCS rankings. The Cougars' nine-game win streak was the third longest in the country and marked only the seventh time in BYU football history the Cougars had recorded at least nine consecutive wins in a single season.

Following the 2006 season, Mendenhall was named the American Football Coaches Association Region IV Coach of the Year. In addition, Mendenhall was named by the Football Writers Association of America one of nine finalists for the prestigious Eddie Robinson Coach of the Year Award.

The 2007 season started out in similar fashion, winning just one of the team's first three games; however, under Mendenhall's direction, the Cougars rebounded to win the final 10 games of the season, and like the previous year, garnered the attention of local, regional and national voters. BYU finished the season ranked No. 17 in the final BCS standings—three places higher than the 2006 Cougars. In the final polls of the season, BYU finished ranked 14th in both the Associated Press and USA Today Coaches Poll, marking the highest finish for the Cougars since finishing No. 5 following the 1996 season.

Like the 2006 season, BYU ranked among the nation's leaders in several statistical categories. The Cougars led the MWC and ranked 14th in passing offense, averaging 298.4 yards per game. The Cougars also led the league and ranked 25th in total offense, averaging 442.8 yards per game.

Defensively, the Cougars ranked 10th nationally in total defense, allowing just 307.9 yards per game. During the regular season, the Cougars did not allow a single 100-yard rusher. BYU finished the year ranked 9th nationally, allowing an average 97.5 yards rushing per game. One of Mendenhall's jobs as the head coach and defensive coordinator is to manage points. Defensively, BYU ranked 9th in the nation, allowing just 18.5 points per game.

From his first day as a head coach, Mendenhall has stressed the importance of winning at home. After finishing 3-3 in Provo during the 2005 season, Mendenhall and the Cougars registered a perfect 6-0 record at home in 2006 and another perfect, 6-0 mark in 2007. In 2006, the Cougars finished the season as the most dominate home team in the country, and the most dominate home team in BYU football history, winning games by an average 35.16 points per game. In 2007, the Cougars outscored opponents at Edwards Stadium by an average 17.3 points per game. BYU allowed just 11.3 points



per game, marking the best scoring defense effort since the 1988 season when BYU held opponents to just 10.2 points per game.

A native of Alpine, Utah, Mendenhall began his coaching career as a graduate assistant in 1989 at his alma mater, Oregon State. After earning his master's degree in 1990, he moved to Snow College in Ephraim, Utah, where he served as the secondary coach and defensive coordinator from 1991-92 under current BYU assistant coach Paul Tidwell. Following two seasons with the Badgers, Mendenhall became the secondary coach at Northern Arizona, where the Lumberjacks boasted the top-ranked defense in the Big Sky Conference. He was elevated to co-defensive coordinator for the 1994 season.

In 1995, Mendenhall returned to Oregon State to become the defensive line coach under then defensive coordinator Rocky Long. When Long left to become the defensive coordinator at UCLA, Mendenhall was promoted to defensive coordinator for the 1996 season. At just 29 years of age, Mendenhall was the youngest defensive coordinator in Pac-10 history.

In 1997, Mendenhall became the secondary coach at Louisiana Tech where he helped the Bulldogs to a remarkable 9-2 record as his defensive unit was credited with 17 interceptions, allowing just 15 touchdowns on the season.

In 1998, Mendenhall moved to Albuquerque, N.M., to become the defensive coordinator and secondary coach at the University of New Mexico. Over the next five seasons, the Lobos improved from just three wins in 1998 to seven wins and an invitation to the Las Vegas Bowl in 2002. In the Lobos' 27-13 loss against UCLA in the Las Vegas Bowl, the Mendenhall-led defense held the Bruins to a season-low 167 yards.

Under Mendenhall, the Lobos led the Mountain West Conference in rushing defense for three straight seasons. In 2001, New Mexico gave up just 87.4 yards per game over the season. In his final season in Albuquerque, Mendenhall led the Lobos to a top ranking against league opponents in total defense, allowing just 316.4 yards per game. The Lobos also led the MWC in sacks in both the 2000 and 2002 season, totaling 46 and 38, respectively.

At New Mexico, Mendenhall played a valuable role in the development of the 1999 Mountain West Player of the Year, Consensus All-American and first-round NFL Draft pick Brian Urlacher. The

ninth overall selection in the 2000 NFL Draft, Urlacher was voted the NFL's Defensive Rookie of the Year and was a Pro Bowl selection. Urlacher was one of two rookies to play all 16 games, starting at middle linebacker the final 14 games to establish a team record for starts at the position by a rookie. He shattered Bears rookie records with 165 total tackles and eight sacks, making him the second Chicago first-year player to lead the team in tackles. Urlacher finished his collegiate career ranked third on New Mexico's all-time list with 442 tackles.

As a player, Mendenhall was a two-year starter at cornerback for Snow College from 1984-85. In his second season, Mendenhall captained the Badgers to a perfect 11-0 record and the NJCAA National Championship. That same season, he earned many accolades, including first-team all-conference, all-region, second-team NJCAA All-America and JC Gridwire Academic All-America honors.

Mendenhall transferred to Oregon State and was a two-year starter, playing free safety, strong safety and linebacker for the Beavers. Mendenhall was a team captain as a senior and received the Leo Gribkoff Memorial Award, given to the team's most inspirational player.

Mendenhall was raised in Alpine, Utah, and graduated from American Fork High School in 1984. He received a bachelor's degree in education from Oregon State in 1988 and a master's degree in education with an emphasis in exercise physiology also from OSU in 1990.

His older brother, Mat, played football at BYU from 1975-79, before spending four years in the NFL with the Washington Redskins. Another brother, Marty, was a former Mr. Utah bodybuilder. Mendenhall's father, Paul, was a defensive end at BYU from 1953-54.

Mendenhall, who resides in Alpine, Utah, is married to Holly Johnston of Missoula, Mont. The couple has three sons.

Located 45 miles south of Salt Lake City, Provo, Utah, is a city of more than 115,000 situated 4,500 feet above sea level. 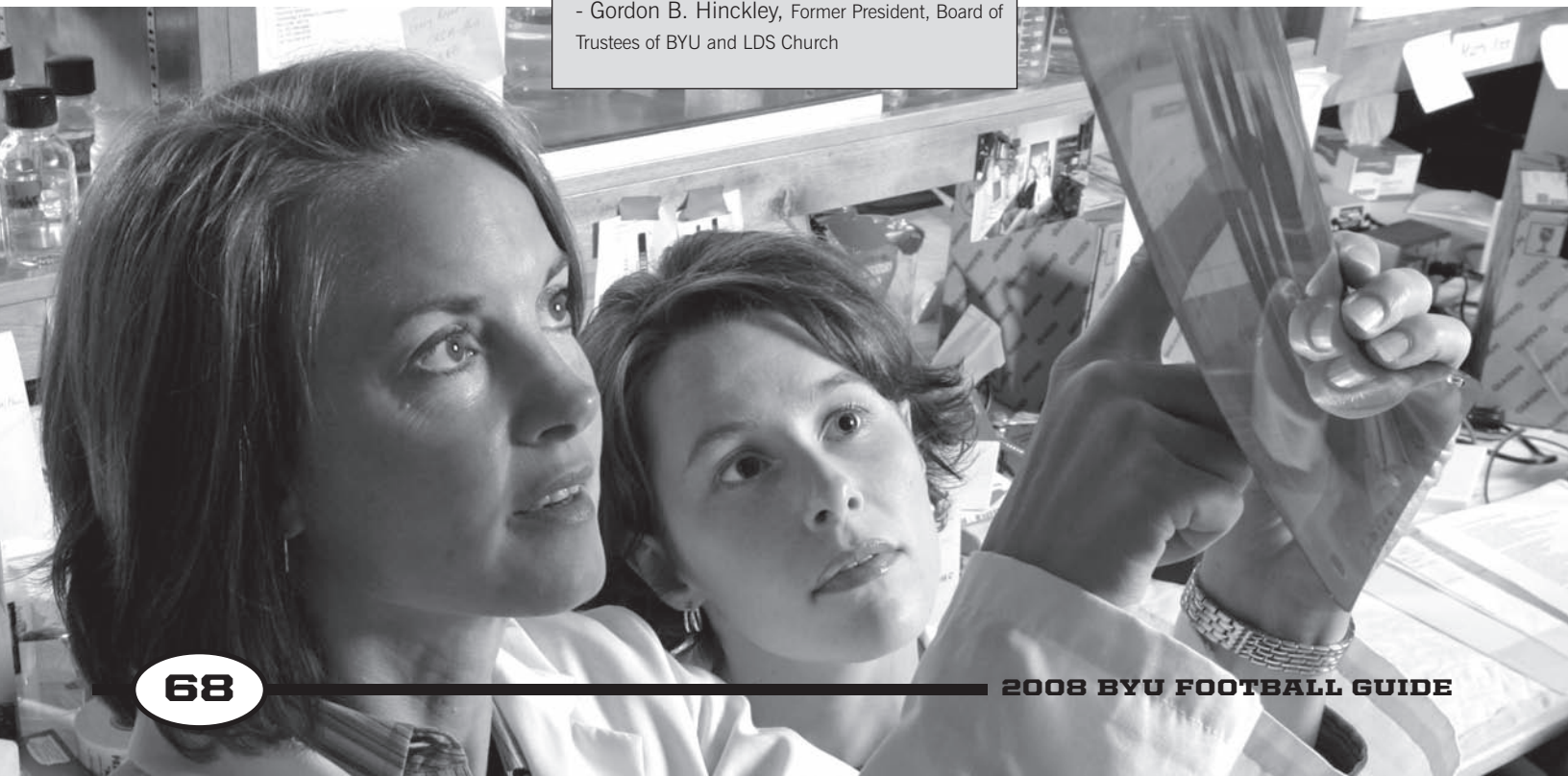

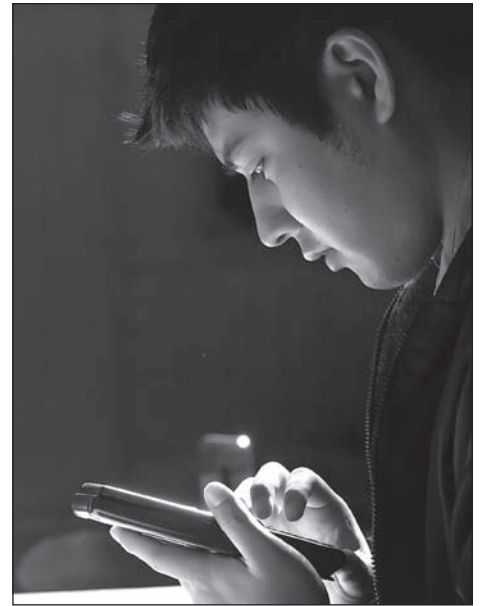
the Church, often gaining fluency in a second language from the experience.

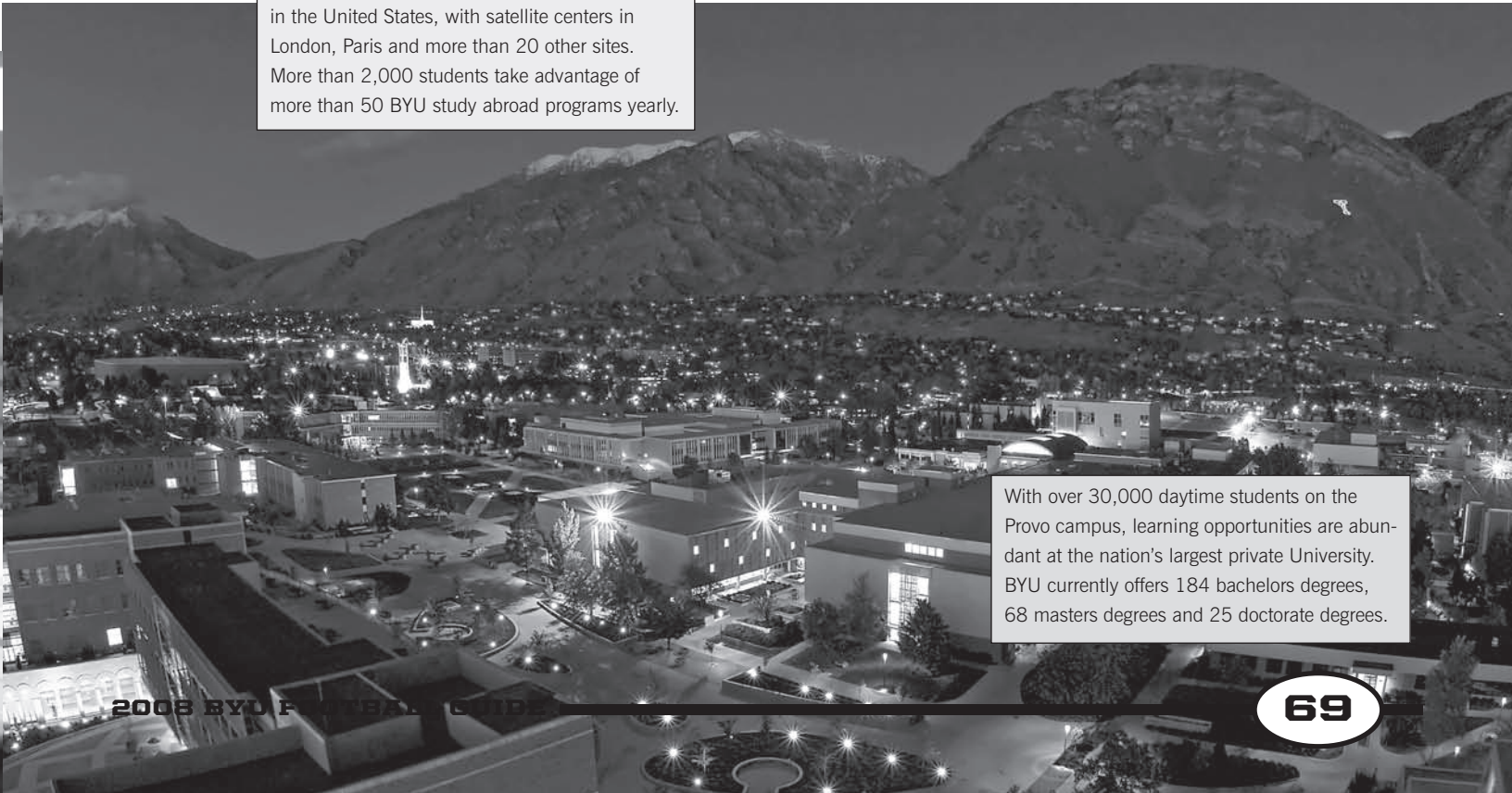

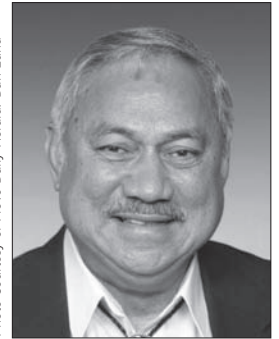

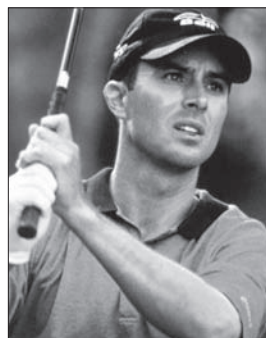

One of the first questions Bronco Mendenhall was asked after becoming the head coach at BYU was what he thought about the missionary program and if he felt it helped or hurt the BYU football program.

"Serving missions is what makes this team, this university and the Church unique," Mendenhall said. "These unique characteristics are based upon sound principles and values. Why would we not embrace them?"

Brigham Young University is owned and operated by The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. The missionary emphasis of the Church is perhaps one of its most recognized characteristics. Since the organization of the Church in 1830, over one million missionaries have served.

The Church operates 347 missions around the world in 145 nations speaking 164 languages. A mission covers a geographic area and has a central headquarters. Each is presided over by a mission president who is called from the ranks of the Church membership to serve for a period of three years. The mission president directs the work of the missionaries assigned to his mission.

More than 53,000 missionaries representing The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints are serving proselytizing missions in 330 missions around the world. Seventy-five percent of the Church's proselytizing missionaries are young men between the ages of 19 and 26. A substantial number of young women and older couples also serve proselytizing missions.

Missionaries work long hours—seven days a week for two years or 18 months for women and couples—teaching the Gospel of Jesus Christ and participating in community service.

In addition, about 5,100 individuals (including couples) are given special service assignments. Health specialists and doctors go to developing countries where the Church's health services program teaches preventive care. Craftsmen, artisans and construction supervisors train members in local building projects. Agricultural experts train people to produce food more effectively and economically. Other mission assignments include education, family history research and leadership training.

The missionaries and/or their families donate money to the Church to pay for their personal expenses. When his or her assignment is completed, the missionary returns home to pursue vocational, academic or other personal goals. Aside from their brief orientation at a missionary training center, missionaries receive little formal training for their ministry. Missionary preparation comes primarily from personal study and, in many cases, from examples taught in the home from childhood.

The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints was officially organized on April 6, 1830 with six members. Today, congregations of the Church are found in more than 160 nations and territories. With over 13 million members, it is one of the fastest growing religions in the world and one of the largest Christian churches in the United States.

The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints is Christian, but is neither Catholic nor Protestant. Rather, it is a restoration of the original church established by Jesus Christ. For more information on the beliefs of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, visit www.lds.org.

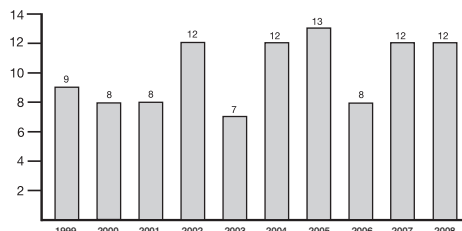

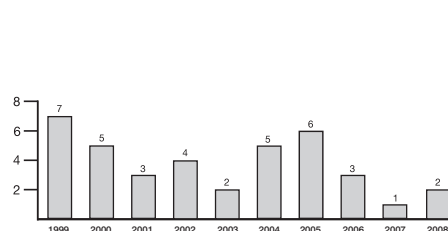
BYU TEAMS IN NATION'S TOP 25



A DECADE OF SUCCESS

BYU's 21 athletic teams consistently rank among the best in nation. The past nine years have brought numerous successes in Cougar athletics. BYU teams have finished their respective seasons ranked in the nation's top 25 on 89 occasions and in the nation's top 10 on 37 different occasions. During that span, BYU averages 9.9 top-25 finishes and four top-10 finishes each year. BYU has also produced six national champions in the last decade. In the nine-year history of the Mountain West Conference, the

Cougars have won 80 of 151 conference championships. That is 53 percent of all championships, or more than all other conference schools combined. In 2000-2001, BYU won all but three conference championships (16 of 19). BYU also dominated the Western Athletic Conference from 1962-1999, winning more championships than any other WAC school. In fact, during the last three decades in the WAC, the Cougars won 60 percent of the WAC Championships. For the fifth-straight season, BYU teams claimed at least eight MWC Championships in 2007-08.

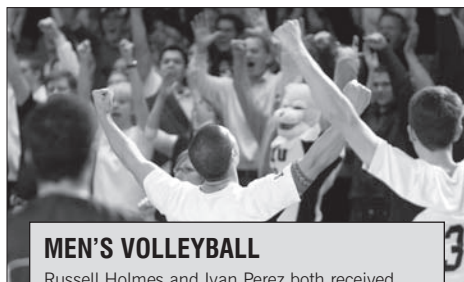


CROSS COUNTRY

In 2007 the BYU men overcame obstacles both on and off the course to earn a 22nd-place finish at the NCAA National Championships and secure their fourth-consecutive MWC title. BYU's women's team owns four national titles (1997, 1999, 2001, 2002)

SOFTBALL

The Cougars once again earned statement victories against top opponents, including a win over No. 13 North Carolina at the NCAA Regional. 2008 marked the team's fourth-straight NCAA Regional Tournament appearance.



MEN'S VOLLEYBALL

Russell Holmes and Ivan Perez both received their third All-America honor as the Cougars closed out the 2008 season with a 25-5 record and No. 3 national ranking. BYU has won three national titles (1999, 2001, 2004).



WOMEN'S VOLLEYBALL

Led by All-Americans Chelsea Goodman and Rachel Dyer, the Cougars posted an impressive 24-8 record in 2007, reaching the Elite Eight of the NCAA Tournament and finishing with a No. 12 national ranking. As a senior, Goodman set the MWC career double-double record with 57.

MEN'S TRACK AND FIELD

The Cougars continued their tradition of success in 2008, winning their 11th-straight league title, including nine straight MWC championships. Leif Arrhenius earned a fourth-place finish at the 2008 NCAA Track & Field Championships.



SOCCER

After capturing the MWC Tournament Championship, the Cougars made their 10th appearance in the NCAA Tournament in 11 years. All-American Katie Larkin (No. 18) led BYU with a team-high 15 goals on the season.

EQUIPMENT AND LOCKER ROOMS

The 75-yard-long locker room is patterned after the NFL's Philadelphia Eagles. There is also a special locker room for former BYU players who want to train in Provo during the offseason.

TRAINING FACILITIES

Sponsored by Dynatronics, this area features a rehabilitation room and a hydro area with a cold pool, a hot tub with power jets, a treadmill pool with two cameras and a doctor's office. Trainers provide electrical stimulation and ultra sound treatments as well as bikes, treadmills and Cybex machines.

STRENGTH AND CONDITIONING CENTER

Most of the Strength and Conditioning Center's equipment was custom built by Free Motion and is sponsored by Icon Health and Fitness. Among the features are 12 full power racks with platforms, seven half racks, three jerk racks, Sorinex hurricane racks, reverse hypers, Agaton Fitness Systems, an outdoor mondo plyometric warmup area, two super leg drive sleds, two different dumbbell areas and a medicine ball wall. The first floor also has a nutrition area sponsored by Pharmanex. The second floor is the speed development area and has Tomahawk spinning bikes and TVs, five Nordic Track incline trainers, three Versaclimbers, two Scifit upper body bikes, Woodway force treadmills, H/P Cosmos treadmills with Pneu Weight devices, vibratory boards, a step mill, a turf agility drill area with resistance and a testing area.

STUDENT ATHLETE ACADEMIC CENTER

Tutors and mentors work through these offices. Athletes have access to 42 computer stations, an interactive classroom, 10 small study areas and one large quiet room. Also on staff are a sports psychologist and a nutritionist.

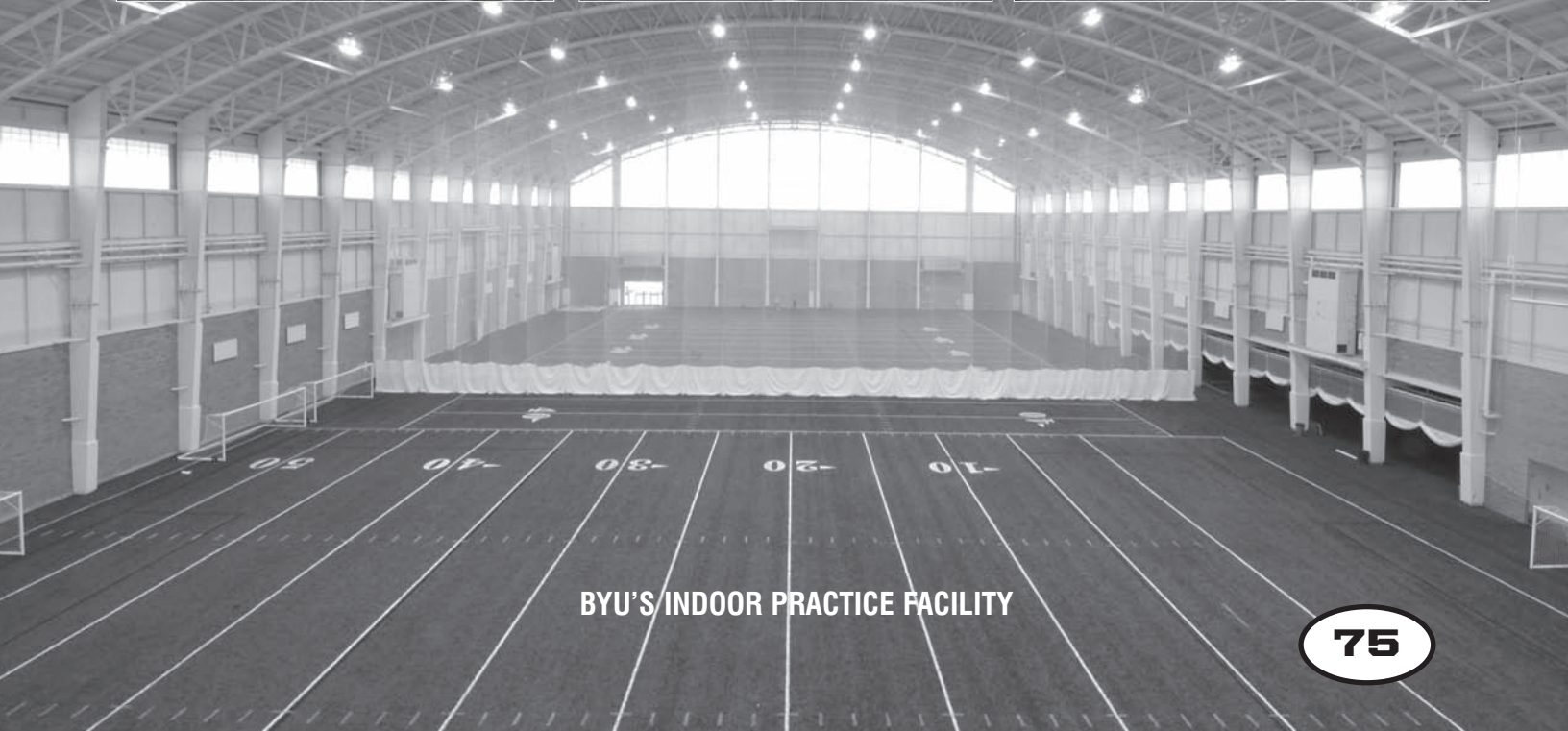

Fans, coaches and athletes can view 11 plasma TV screens, a ticker tape with world wide sports scores or view specialty events on a projection screen while catching a bite to eat.



INDOOR PRACTICE FACILITY

The IPF is 422 feet wide and 222 feet deep with a height of 86 feet at the center (106,000 square feet). Among its features are two artificial turf fields (55 yards & 65 yards), retractable goalposts on each end, a sideline staging facility for offensive linemen and four batting cages. The indoor surface is field turf and the building features four video platforms located 40 feet above the playing surface. The IPF serves as an indoor practice arena for the football, soccer, golf, baseball and softball teams and a variety of other sports programs, including extramurals and intramurals.



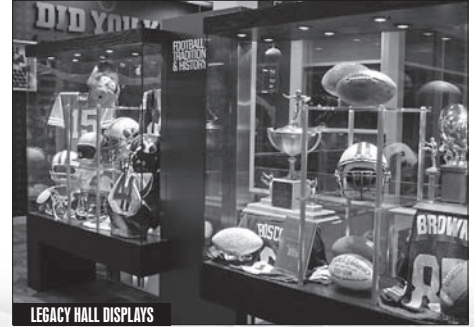

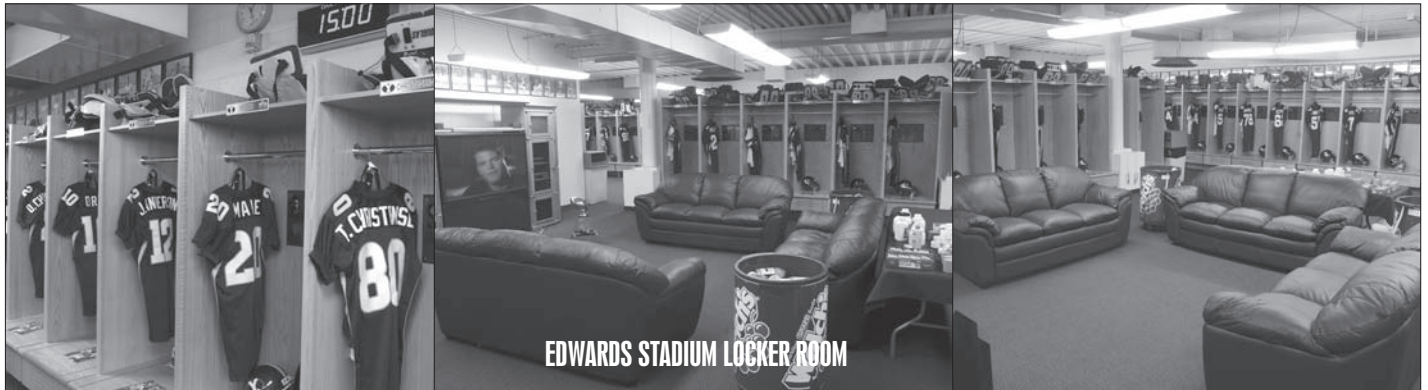

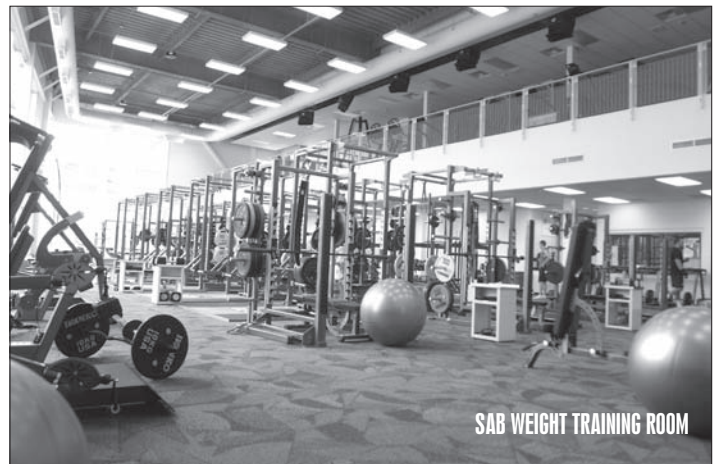

Conditioning encompasses all facets of physical performance. From speed and quickness to cardiovascular endurance and brute strength, BYU's strength and conditioning head coach Jay Omer creates programs designed to increase them all. Training programs are sport-specific and position-specific within each sport, allowing athletes to focus on what they need to succeed in their individual competitive endeavors.

In no sport is the need for strength more evident than in football. Each game, each play, can be decided by who tires first. Week in and week out, players give and take a beating and are expected to come back for more of the same the next week. Less than a year after his arrival in 2001, Omer's subjects were seeing huge returns on their investment. Most players had increased their personal lifts 15-25 percent. Mike Tanner, a line-backer who was bench-pressing 330 pounds when Omer arrived, was lifting 400 at summer's end.

Conditioning also increases the production of athletes as it helps to prevent injury. Although football is a contact sport where injuries are common, proper conditioning can help to avoid major injuries and reduce the recovery time of minor injuries. An athlete in top condition tends to recover faster and is better able to withstand the rigors of physical activity.

Not only does the conditioning program improve each player as an individual, but it also improves the team as a whole. Working and sweating with each other in the weight room helps bring the players together. Seeing each person sacrifice and succeed in the off-season builds a camaraderie that carries over to the field as players work to make each other and the team better.

"He (Omer) has brought us a feeling of team chemistry, working out together and being accountable," said Teag Whiting, a former offensive lineman. "There's nothing we're going to see on the football field this season that's any tougher or harder than we're facing in our workouts. It makes us close."

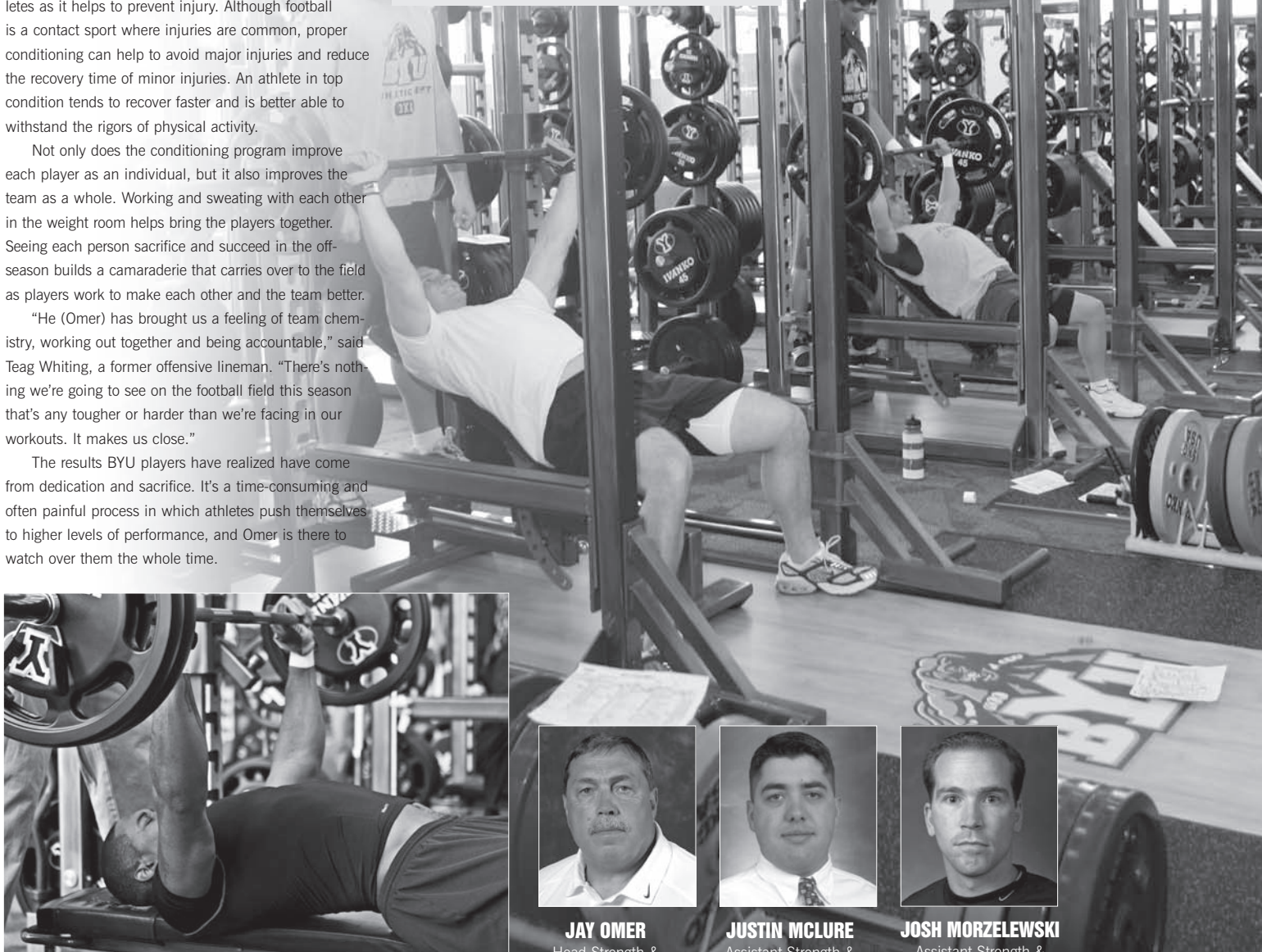
The results BYU players have realized have come from dedication and sacrifice. It's a time-consuming and often painful process in which athletes push themselves to higher levels of performance, and Omer is there to watch over them the whole time.

"I like to see kids work hard, make something of themselves and improve their abilities. That's the joy of this job. I'm also on the same page with Coach Mendenhall. We believe a team can only be successful if it prepares well and has team chemistry. You can have a team of super stars, but I'd rather have a team of less talent that works hard, cares about each other, has team chemistry and will go to war because they believe in each other. That's what it's all about, and that's what we're trying to get done here."

"The man is a sadist," said former offensive guard Jason Scukanec, "[but] you find yourself doing it. You find yourself pushing yourself and you don't know why. You don't want to disappoint him because it means something to you and your teammates."

Each fall when the Cougars take the field, they carry with them the hopes of BYU fans across the nation. With each passing week and after every win, those hopes get bigger and weigh more on the players. Arriving at the gym before most people are out of bed and staying until long after most people have gone home for the night, Jay Omer takes those hopes very seriously. It's his job to make sure the players are strong enough to carry those hopes to one more victory, one more title, one more bowl.

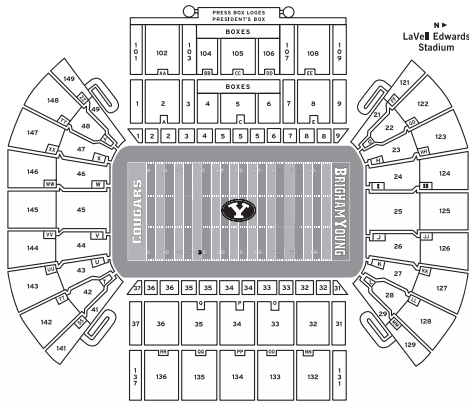

PICTURE PERFECT

With its 64,045-seat capacity, huge video scoreboards and immaculate press boxes, LaVell Edwards Stadium is home to legendary BYU football. Since its expansion in 1982, the stadium has consistently ranked among the nation's top 30 in attendance every year. Some of the stadium's well-known features include a box-bowl seating configuration, a grass playing surface and a four-level press box.



THE FIELD

The field is covered with a sand-based natural turf capable of draining eight inches of rain per hour. The well-kept grass field is consistently deemed one of the best in the country.

LAST EXPANSION

As a result of increased seating demands, BYU made yet another renovation in 1982, adding stands to the north and south end zones, lowering the field eight feet and removing the track surrounding the field (which hosted the 1967 and 1975 NCAA Track and Field Championships). The stadium expansion increased the seating capacity to over 65,000. The crowd of 64,253 that gathered for BYU's first game in the expanded stadium on September 25, 1982 was reportedly "the largest gathering ever in Utah history" at the time. In 2003 BYU added a luxury "Club Seating" area to the east stands taking the capacity of Edwards Stadium down to 64,045.

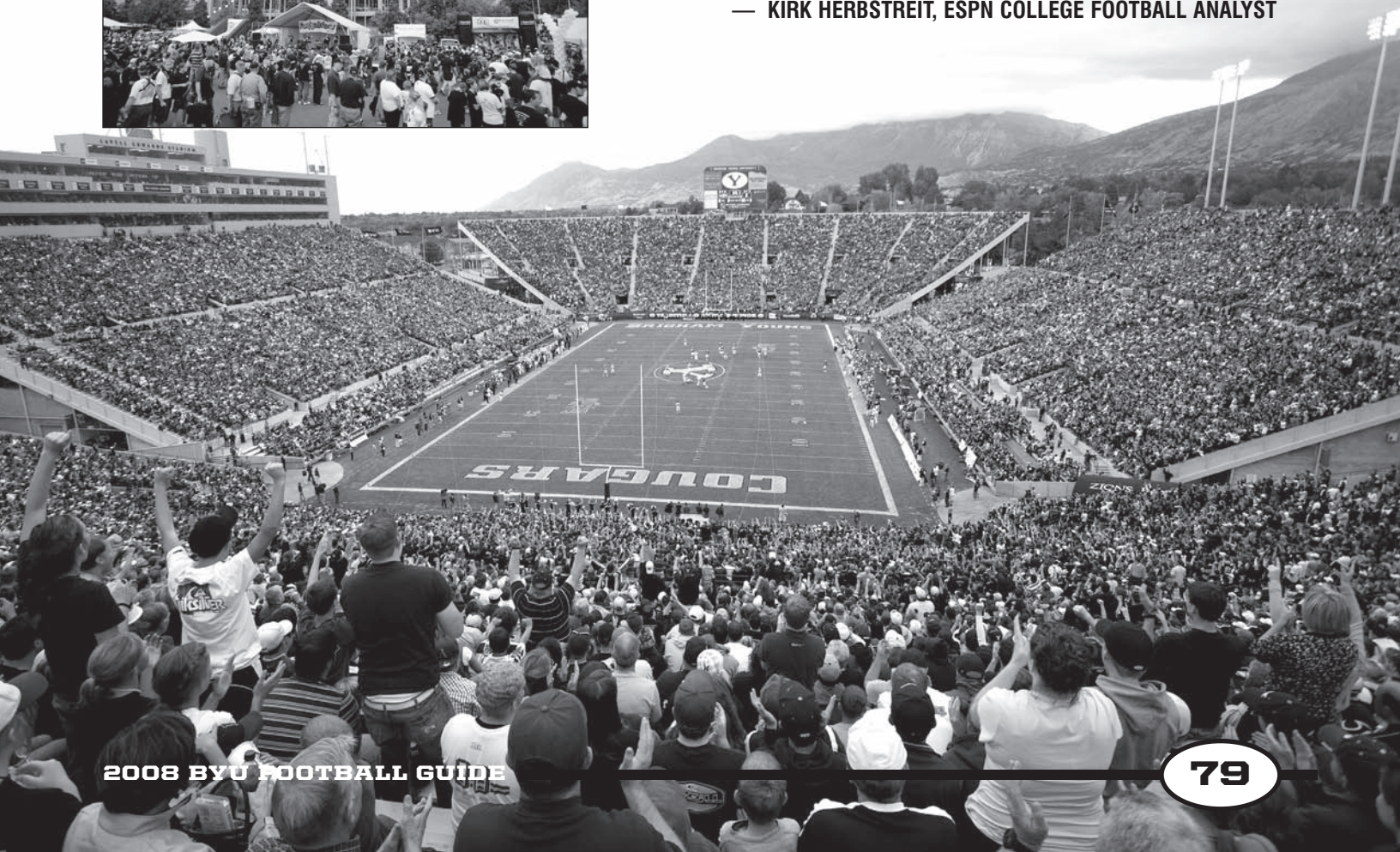
PRESS BOX

In 1982, 1988 and 1997, the Football Writers Association of America cited BYU for its "outstanding press box working area." Rising over 10 stories high, the four-level press box is located on the west side of the stadium and runs the entire length of the stands. Levels one and two of the press box contain 42 private loges, each equipped with 12 padded chairs, a television, radio, telephone, refrigerator, sink and game programs. The BYU President's box, which includes 163 padded chairs, five television sets and a buffet area, is also located on the first floor. Level three is reserved for the print and electronic media along with all the game operators. The statistics, public address, sound and scoreboard controls are all located on the third level. Altogether, approximately 300 people work on the third level during games. Level four is used for television game filming.

THE EDWARDS STADIUM EXPERIENCE

Hours before kickoff, fans gather across the street from LaVell Edwards Stadium for food and soft drinks, sharing stories of past football heroics and anticipating another triumphant victory. With the Wasatch Mountains serving as a picturesque backdrop, the stadium is filled with 64,045 of some of the nation's best fans, young and old alike. The BYU marching band entertains the blue and white clad crowd with spirited tunes and the Cougar Fight song, amplified by the voices of BYU fans. The BYU cheerleading squad, Cosmo the BYU mascot and halftime shows with the Cougarettes, the defending national champion dance team, all help make LaVell Edwards Stadium one of a kind. The offense is high-powered and the fans await the boom of the Army ROTC cannon after every scoring play.

Y MOUNTAIN

Preparations for placing the initials BYU on the mountainside began in April of 1906 when president George H. Brimhall commissioned surveyors for the letters “B,” “Y” and “U.” The letter “Y” was first laid out to ensure that the initials were properly centered on the mountain. Beginning in the early morning, students formed a line that zigzagged up the mountain. Standing eight feet apart, each student would carry a load up to the next and then return for another.

The project, which many expected to be completed by 10 a.m., lasted until 4 p.m. and only the “Y” was covered. After such a laborious day of work, plans to fill in the other two letters were scrapped. Covered with a thin layer of lime powder, the letter was in need of constant repair. Hoping to make it more permanent, a layer of rock was added in 1907. The next year, 20,000 pounds of sand and cement were carried up the mountain to form a three-foot high wall around the letter to hold it together. Several years later the letter underwent a face lift as the blocks, or serifs, were added to it to give it its current appearance.

A nationally recognized symbol of BYU, Y Mountain is a featured shot of almost every Cougar game broadcast on television. Located about half a mile east of campus and halfway up the mountain, the “Y” looks out over the valley and is one of its most prominent features.

COSMO

The cougar, chosen as BYU’s mascot by former coach Eugene L. Roberts in the early 1920s, has undergone a tremendous evolution since its inception to become what is now known as the feline phenomenon of Cosmo the Cougar. Beginning in 1924 when BYU purchased a pair of cougar cubs for 50 cents each to excite BYU fans at athletic events, live cougars prowled the sidelines of BYU games on a regular basis through the late ‘40s and on special occasions through the ‘60s.

The original cubs were housed on the south side of campus until 1929 when they managed to break out of their cage, kill two dogs and begin stalking livestock on nearby farms. Both were recaptured later the same

day. Three weeks later, one cougar died and the other was taken to the old Salt Lake Zoo. BYU procured its mascots from nearby zoos and local bounty hunters but never owned its own cougars again.

Cosmo the Cougar, the brainchild of pep chairman Dwayne Stevenson, made his first official appearance before BYU fans on Oct. 15, 1953. At a cost of 73 dollars for the costume, Daniel T. Gallego, Stevenson’s roommate, became the first man under the fur. The name given the big cat was derived from BYU’s diverse student body.

“BYU was a very international, cosmopolitan school and that is where we got the name Cosmo,” said Gallego.

With over a half-century of service to the BYU community, Cosmo has become an icon of Cougar sports to fans and foes across the country. Through Cosmo’s Kids Club and Cosmo’s Corner, he is helping raise another generation of BYU fans. Prowling the sidelines for the Cougars, his antics add to the experience of game day at BYU. Cosmo brings out the best of Cougar spirit in fans at athletic competitions both home and away.

THE BEEHIVE BOOT

First instituted in 1971, the Beehive Boot is the symbol of gridiron supremacy in the state of Utah. The idea for the rotating trophy originated with Dave Schulthess, former Sports Information Director (SID) of BYU, and was agreed upon by SIDs from Utah, Utah State and Weber State. As the trophy would represent dominance within the confines of the Beehive State, it was decided that the trophy should be symbolic of the people Utah was built by—the Mormon pioneers.

Finding a suitable pioneer boot for use as a trophy proved to be a difficult task. As pioneers wore their boots until there simply wasn’t much left of them, there weren’t many pioneer boots lying around. After an arduous search that included numerous personal calls and

radio announcements, Tom Beasley, an antique dealer living in Cache Valley donated a pair of boots for use as the trophy. Estimated to be 100 or more years old, the Beehive Boot is an authentic piece of Utah history.

Awarded to the team with the best record against in-state opponents, the Beehive Boot lived its first four years at Utah State University. BYU then began a dominant run as it ascended into the realms of football’s elite, claiming the Boot 19 times in the past 30 years. Utah has won the boot nine times. The longest streak in the history of the Beehive Boot is a five-year span from 1983 to 1987 by BYU. After a four-year stint in Salt Lake, the Boot was brought back to Provo in 2006. The Cougars look to keep it at home for the third straight year this season.

If Utah’s teams should end the season with identical records against in-state opponents, a winner is chosen by vote of the in-state media who covered the schools’ games. This situation has occurred twice in the history of the boot (1973 and 1997), and Utah State was given the trophy each time.



THE COUGAR FAN

Be it a home game or a distant rival, BYU fans prove faithful to the Cougar cause. Rain or shine, the blue and white cheers faithfully on through the best fans collegiate sports has to offer.

THE VICTORY BELL

The original Y bell traveled across the plains with the early pioneers of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints and was used to call meetings among the saints and to announce any deaths in the community. Donated to the Brigham Young Academy in 1875, it was used to begin and dismiss classes until it was destroyed in a fire in 1884. The Academy went without a bell for the next 28 years, using instead a variety of instruments as a class bell.

Rung after each BYU victory, the bell was quieted in 1949 after a basketball win over rival Utah. Several overzealous students climbed the tower and vigorously beat upon the bell until it cracked. Repaired with a bronze patch in 1954 by Frank Hemingway, the bell was removed from the education building and mounted on a trailer so it could travel with BYU's teams to away games.

Its mobility proved its downfall as it was stolen in 1958 to be found six months later in nearby Springville. The theft prompted the construction of a bell tower on BYU's upper-campus overlooking the Smith Fieldhouse. Dedicated in 1959, the tower served well until 1973 when the bell fell while ringing in the dedication of the

Marriott Center. The supporting yoke above the bell was broken and the bell shattered. The bell was soon repaired by Ray Mortenson of the BYU Maintenance shop using electric welding—miraculously maintaining its previous tone—and was remounted in the tower.

In 1978, the bell was moved to its current home on the southwest corner of the Marriott Center. The open arch tower was designed by BYU landscape architect Boyd Dawler and is made of the same cast stone as the exterior pillars of the Marriott Center. Although the old bell tower above the Smith Fieldhouse no longer stands, the massive steel I-beams that supported the tower have now been converted into the strongest park benches in the Intermountain West.

Over the years, the ringing of the bell has come to represent honor, achievement and spirit, and has inspired several poems and songs from BYU faculty and alumni. Clyde D. Sandgren, who composed the Cougar Fight Song, penned a verse that was sung at the dedication of the upper-campus bell tower. As BYU victories have become more and more commonplace in recent decades, the ringing of the "Y bell" after each win has renamed it the "Victory Bell."

THE DESERET FIRST DUEL

In 2007-08 BYU and the University of Utah formally began a rivalry series named the Deseret First Duel presented by Deseret First Credit Union. The rivalry series includes competition in the 12 sports the two universities compete head-to-head during regular-season play. The Deseret First Duel uses a system that awards points to the winner of each head-to-head competition. Points won by the individual sports will count toward each school's overall total. At the conclusion of each school year, a granite traveling trophy is awarded to the overall rivalry series champion. In the first year of the competition BYU took home the bragging rights with 34-30 victory.

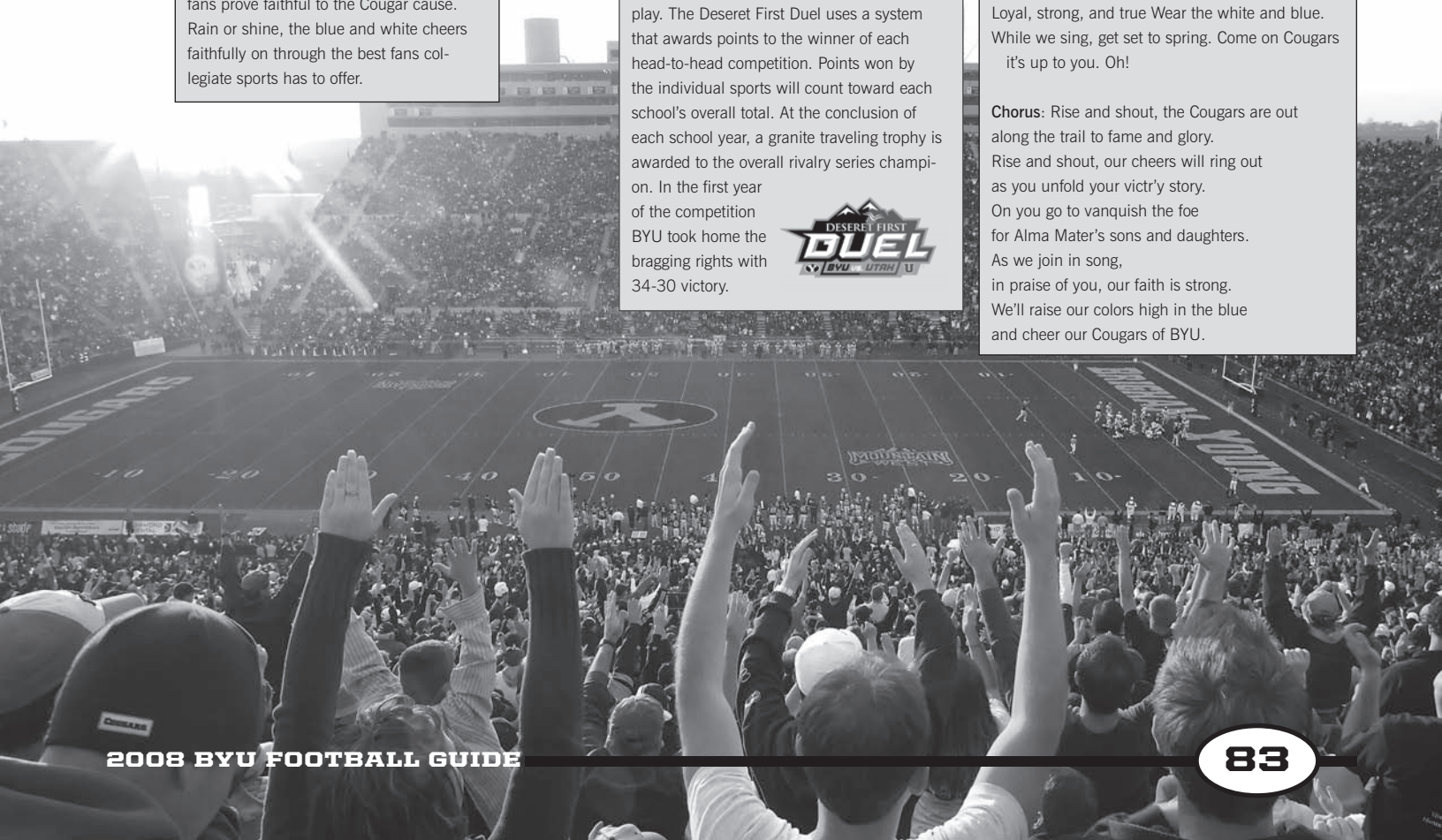


THE COUGAR FIGHT SONG

THE BRIGHAM YOUNG UNIVERSITY ATHLETICS DEPARTMENT IS COMMITTED to abiding by all National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) and Mountain West Conference (MWC) rules and regulations. The BYU Compliance Office seeks to assist administrators, coaches, faculty, student-athletes and representatives of the University's athletics interests, in understanding the rules and regulations of NCAA athletic participation. Early and frequent education is a key component of compliance to all rules and regulations.



ARE YOU A REPRESENTATIVE OF BYU'S ATHLETICS INTERESTS (BOOSTER)?

- If any of these apply to you, then you are a booster:
- Been a member of Cougar Club or any other group that supports athletics;
 - Made any financial contributions to the athletics department;
 - Provided benefits, such as summer jobs, to enrolled student-athletes or their families;
 - Been a season ticket holder; or
 - Been involved in promoting BYU's athletics program in any way.

RECRUITING DO'S AND DONT'S

- Only BYU coaches may be involved in the recruiting process. Boosters may not make any recruiting contact with prospective student-athletes (prospect or recruit). Boosters are prohibited from the following:
- DO NOT telephone, write or make in-person contact with a prospect for recruiting purposes.
 - DO NOT contact a prospect's coach, principle or counselor in an attempt to evaluate the prospect.
 - DO NOT become involved in making arrangements for a prospect, the prospect's relatives or friends to receive money or financial aid of any kind.

- DO NOT visit a prospect's school to acquire films or transcripts in an attempt to evaluate the prospect's academic or athletics eligibility.
- DO NOT have contact with a prospect, their relatives or friends during any of their visits to BYU's campus.
- DO NOT contact student-athletes enrolled in other four-year institutions regarding the possibility of transferring to BYU.

Even though there are many rules prohibiting your involvement with prospects and the recruiting process, as a booster you are permitted to do the following:

- Notify BYU coaching staff about noteworthy prospects in your area.
- Attend a prospect's athletics event on your own initiative, provided no contact with the prospect, the prospect's parents or coach occurs.
- Continue existing friendships, provided solicitation of a prospect's enrollment does not occur.

WHAT IS AN EXTRA BENEFIT?

An extra benefit is any special arrangement by an institutional employee or booster to provide a prospect, student-athlete or their relatives or friends a benefit not expressly authorized by the NCAA.

Examples of impermissible "extra benefits" include, but are not limited to:

- providing cash, loans or co-signing for a loan
- gifts of any kind
- special discounts for goods and services
- the use of an automobile
- free or reduced-cost services, purchases or rentals
- entertainment on- or off-campus
- free or reduced-cost rent or housing

STUDENT-ATHLETE EMPLOYMENT

Student-athletes may have a job during the academic year, but information must be provided to the Compliance Office.

NCAA Bylaw 12.4.1:

- Compensation may be paid to a student-athlete:
- Only for work actually performed; and
 - At a rate commensurate with the going rate in that locality for similar services.

Also, student-athletes may not be hired because of their athletic ability or reputation.

BYU student-athletes are seeking to excel academically, athletically, and are preparing for life after they graduate. The transition into university life can be challenging for any student. This is especially true for student-athletes who are expected to be good students and outstanding athletes. They are also under obligation to understand and comply with a variety of NCAA rules and regulations in order to be eligible to compete. The Student Athlete Academic Center was created to provide a place where student-athletes can receive support and resources as they pursue their goals.

One of the main priorities of the Center is to assist student-athletes as they transition into the BYU culture and the world of college athletics. Student-athletes are assigned an academic advisor to help them register for classes and monitor their progress toward graduation. The advisor is the contact person for student-athletes who have academic or eligibility questions and concerns.

ACADEMIC ADVISEMENT

The main focus of the Student Athlete Academic Center is to help student-athletes graduate on time. To achieve this goal, academic advisement is provided to all student-athletes. Advisors are available to help student-athletes register for classes, monitor athletic eligibility, secure tutorial help, and provide on-going support and encouragement. The academic advi-

sors assist student-athletes by having them set weekly and semester goals, teaching them time management and academic success strategies and helping them communicate effectively with their professors. Advisors also assist the coaching staff in monitoring the day-to-day progress of student-athletes who struggle academically.

TUTORING

Personal tutors are available for every student athlete through the Student Athlete Academic Center with funds made available by the Cougar Club. Tutors are hired to tutor multiple subjects. To obtain a tutor, student-athletes may contact their academic advisor.

MENTORS

Mentors are available for any student-athlete through the Student Athlete Academic Center. Incoming freshmen will be assigned a mentor for their first semester. Mentors are most often fifth-year student-athletes or graduate students. Mentors provide time management help, study skills, test taking tips, help adjusting to college, etc. To obtain a mentor, see the academic advisor assigned to your team.

COMMITMENT TO ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

A primary goal of the Student Athlete Academic Center is to ensure that every student-athlete graduates with a Bachelor's degree in their chosen field of study. To achieve this goal, the Center provides a team advisor as part of the comprehensive academic support program. Each athlete has regular visits with his/her team advisor who assists with registration and monitors progress toward graduation.

COMMITMENT TO PERSONAL DEVELOPMENT

Student Athlete Academic Center personnel are also active in teaching classes designed to promote leadership, emotional well-being, personal growth and decision-making skills. Student-athletes are taught about some of the unique issues they face in the world of college athletics and how to thrive in the university setting and beyond.

COMMITMENT TO CAREER DEVELOPMENT

A career specialist is available to assist student-athletes with a variety of career issues. They receive help in choosing a major, building their resume, establishing a career network and preparing for their transition from college athletics into the world of work. These services are available through individual consultation, workshops, computer programs and University courses. Career exploration and career transition classes are highly recommended to all student-athletes. Internship and employment opportunities are also made available through the Career Network, which is made up of Varsity Club and Cougar Club members.

Cecil O. Samuelson began his work as the 12th president of Brigham Young University on May 1, 2003.

President Samuelson is a Salt Lake City native who has served at the University of Utah as professor of medicine, dean of the School of Medicine and vice president of health sciences. Prior to his call as a full-time General Authority of The Church of Jesus Christ

of Latter-day Saints, he was senior vice president of Intermountain Health Care. He holds a bachelor of science degree, a master's degree in educational psychology and a medical degree from the University of Utah.

Dr. Samuelson fulfilled his residency and held a fellowship in rheumatic and genetic diseases at Duke University Medical Center in Durham, North Carolina. He has received numerous scholastic honors and is the author or co-author of 48 original publications, eight books or chapters of books and 13 abstracts. He also has served as a director, officer or member of several national medical and hospital organizations.

Elder Samuelson was called in 1994 to serve the Church of Jesus Christ as a member of the First Quorum of the Seventy. At the time of his assignment to BYU, he was a member of the Presidency of the Seventy. He has served the Church of Jesus Christ also as a regional representative, stake president, stake high councilor, branch president and missionary and as an area president in the Utah North Area and the Europe North Area. He and his wife, Sharon Giauque Samuelson, have five children and nine grandchildren.



KEVIN J WORTHEN
Advancement Vice President

Kevin J Worthen enters his first year as the Advancement Vice President at BYU after serving as the dean of the J. Reuben Clark Law School. He oversees the areas of Alumni and External Relations, Athletics, Philanthropies, and University Communications.

Prior to being named the dean of BYU's Law School, Worthen served as a professor of law and also was BYU's faculty athletic representative to the NCAA for four years.

Worthen is the Hugh W. Colton Professor of Law at BYU and has particular expertise in federal Indian law. He is a former Fulbright scholar and clerked for Justice Byron R. White of the U.S. Supreme Court and Judge Malcolm R. Wilkey of the U.S. Court of Appeals for the D.C. Circuit. He also worked for the law firm of Jennings, Strouss & Salmon in Phoenix.

Worthen earned his bachelor's and juris doctor degrees from BYU. A native of Carbon County, Utah, Worthen earned an associate degree from the College of Eastern Utah, where he was co-captain of the varsity basketball team. While at CEU, he also worked during the summer months as an underground coal miner in the Plateau Mine in Wattis, Utah. He and his wife Peggy have three children.



TOM HOLMOE
Director of Athletics

Tom Holmoe was named Director of Athletics at Brigham Young University on March 1, 2005. He oversees a nationally recognized program with 21 intercollegiate sports, involving more than 600 student-athletes and a 150-person staff.

Since Holmoe's appointment, BYU has captured 30 Mountain West Conference championships, and more than 100 student-athletes have earned All-America status. Over the past two seasons the football team has enjoyed tremendous success, capturing back-to-back conference titles while recording a perfect 16-0 record in MWC play.

A former Cougar defensive back from 1978-82, Holmoe returned to BYU in July 2001 as Associate Athletics Director for Development. As part of his responsibilities, he supervised the Cougar Club, served as the department's liaison with the LDS Foundation, served on the BYU Alumni Association Board of Directors and worked on the capital campaign to raise funds for the University's new athletic facilities. Holmoe currently serves on the BCS Athletics Directors Advisory Committee.

A native of La Crescenta, Calif., Holmoe came to BYU on a football scholarship in 1978. He became a starter as a sophomore and went on to earn first-team All-WAC honors as a senior in 1982. Holmoe was selected in the fourth round of the 1983 NFL Draft by the San Francisco 49ers. Over a seven-year NFL career, he played on three Super Bowl championship teams with the 49ers. After retiring from professional football, Holmoe returned to BYU to serve as a graduate assistant under LaVell Edwards from 1990-91. He then accepted an offer from Bill Walsh to become the Stanford secondary coach in 1992, where he remained for two seasons. In 1994, he returned to the 49ers as defensive backfield coach for two seasons, where he earned a fourth Super Bowl ring. Two years later Holmoe joined the University of California staff as defensive coordinator and later became the head coach from 1997-2001.

Holmoe graduated from BYU with a degree in zoology in 1983 and received a master's degree from BYU in athletic administration in 1995. He and his wife, Lori, have four children: Shannon Packard (24), Danny (22), Erik (20), and Lauren (14).

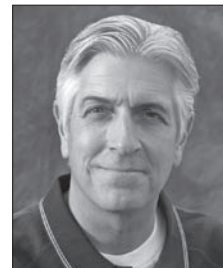

TOP OF THE MOUNTAIN WEST

From its inception in 1999, the Mountain West Conference has been committed to excellence in intercollegiate athletics, while promoting the academic missions of its member institutions. Progressive in its approach, the MWC continues to cultivate opportunities for student-athletes to compete at the highest level, while fostering academic achievement and sportsmanship. Now in its ninth year, the MWC has been assertive in its involvement with the NCAA governance structure and has taken a leadership role in the overall administration of intercollegiate athletics.

The Mountain West Conference is noted for its geographic diversity. Some of the most beautiful terrain and landscapes in the nation can be found within Mountain West Conference boundaries, including the majestic Rocky Mountain range, which borders four MWC schools (Utah, BYU, Air Force and Colorado State). The high plains of Wyoming (elevation 7,220 feet – the highest Division I campus in the nation) contrast with the desert city of Las Vegas (the fastest growing metropolitan area in the West) and the Pacific Ocean locale of San Diego State. The southwestern flavor of New Mexico complements the western heritage and culture of Fort Worth, Texas, home of the MWC's newest member, TCU.

The Mountain West Conference was conceived on May 26, 1998, when the presidents of eight institutions —

Air Force, BYU, Colorado State, New Mexico, San Diego State, UNLV, Utah and Wyoming — decided to form a new NCAA Division I-A intercollegiate athletic conference. The split from the former 16-team conference re-established continuity and stability among the membership within the new league and signaled the continuation of its tradition-rich, long-standing athletic rivalries. Five of the MWC's eight original members have been conference rivals since the 1960s (BYU, Utah, New Mexico, Wyoming, Colorado State), while San Diego State (1978) and Air Force (1980) were longtime members as well. UNLV entered the fold in 1996 and TCU began its first year of competition in 2005-06, completing the membership in the MWC as it stands today.

The 2007-08 campaign provided several notable moments for Mountain West teams and individuals. The MWC sent a record five teams to bowl games and posted a 4-1 mark in those contests to capture the Bowl Challenge Cup for the second time in four years, registering the best win percentage among the 11 conferences that make up the NCAA Football Bowl Subdivision. League champion BYU finished the season with an 11-2 record and national ranking for the

second consecutive year, closing out the year at No. 14 in both the Associated Press and USA Today Top 25 polls. The Cougars also ended the season with the nation's longest active home and overall win streaks at 12 and 10 games, respectively.

BYU became the first team to claim back-to-back outright MWC regular-season men's basketball crowns while finishing the year with the nation's longest active home win streak at 47 games. UNLV captured the MWC Tournament title and earned the league's automatic bid to the NCAA Tournament

for the second consecutive season, advancing past the first round for the second straight year. BYU earned an at-large bid to NCAA postseason play, marking the eighth

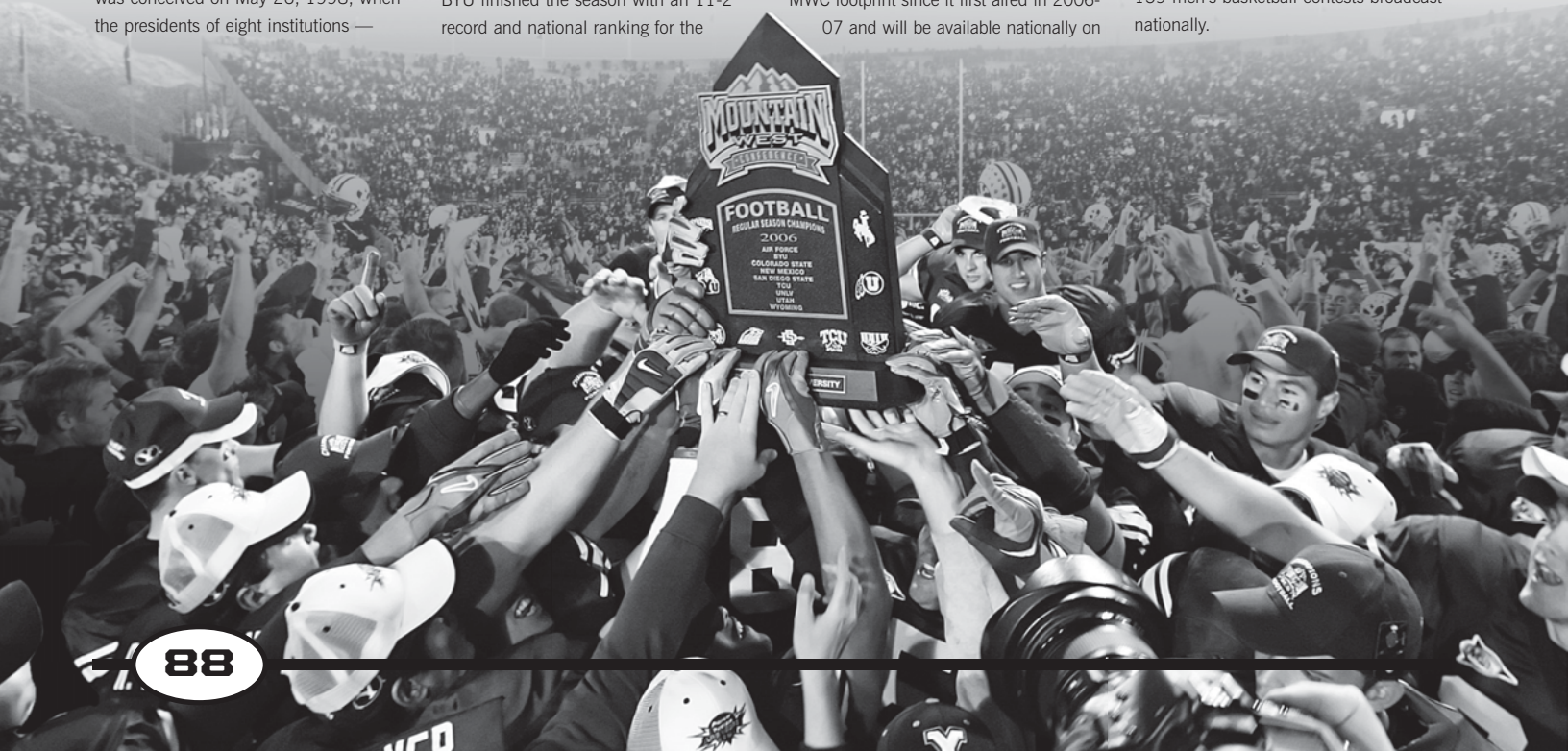
time in the last nine years the MWC has sent multiple teams to the NCAA Tournament.

The MWC television package will reach a national audience in 2008-09 through a combination of telecasts on The Mountain West Sports Network (The Mtn.), CBS College Sports Network (formerly CSTV) and VERSUS. The Mtn. has been available to cable subscribers in the MWC footprint since it first aired in 2006-07 and will be available nationally on

DIRECTV starting August 27, 2008.

In the summer of 2006 saw the historic launch of The Mtn. – the first sports network dedicated to serving a single collegiate athletic conference. The Mtn. provides sports fans blanket coverage of MWC athletics across multiple sports, including football, men's and women's basketball, and men's and women's Olympic sports. The Mtn. features more than just live games and has added its own original programming. Fans get a comprehensive array of news, features and analysis about their favorite MWC teams and players. In 2007-08, more than 250 MWC events were shown live on The Mtn., CBS C and VERSUS. CBS C is currently available in over 65 million homes, while VERSUS is in more than 73 million households.

The MWC has remained steadfast in its mission to promote the league's athletic events to national and regional television audiences and will continue to grow its new TV model. Previously, ESPN served as the league's inaugural official television partner, while in-house productions guaranteed coverage for several MWC Olympic sports. Through the league's first nine years, excluding institutional local packages, 1,200 football, volleyball, men's basketball and women's basketball events have aired on television, with 178 football games and over 159 men's basketball contests broadcast nationally.

MWC EARNS TOP BOWL WIN PCT.

For the second time in four years, the Mountain West Conference posted the best win percentage among the 11 conferences that make up the NCAA Football Bowl Subdivision. The Mountain West claimed the 2007-08 Bowl Challenge Cup after sending a league-record five teams into postseason action and finishing with a 4-1 (.800) mark. The Bowl Challenge Cup was created by ESPN in 2002 as a competition among the conferences in the Football Bowl Subdivision during the college bowl season. In order to qualify to win the trophy, a conference has to have the highest winning percentage with a minimum of three teams from that conference participating in a bowl game. The Mountain West earned its first Bowl Challenge Cup after registering a 2-1 record in bowl competition during the 2004 season and is the second conference (ACC) to win the trophy twice since the award's inception in 2002-03.

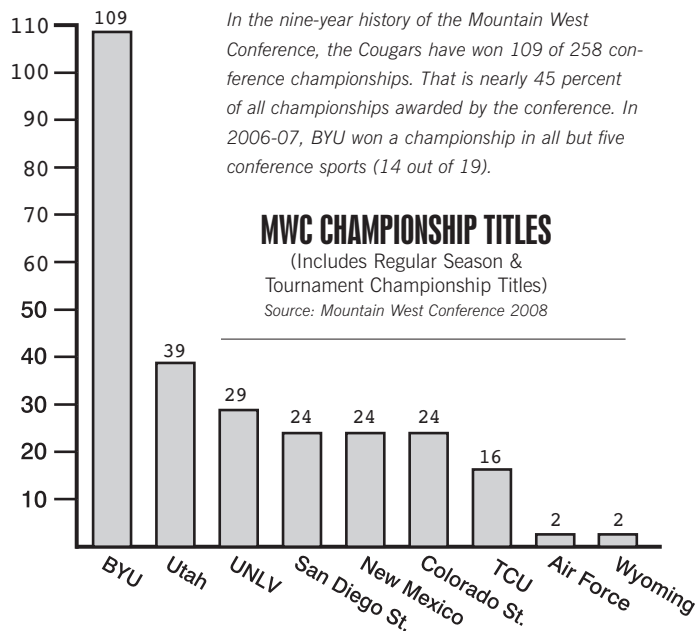
The Mountain West Conference is made up of nine universities from eight Western states. TCU was added to the conference on 2005.

A LOOK AT THE 2008 SCHEDULE

The 2008 Mountain West Conference football schedule is comprised of 72 games, including 36 conference match-ups. Fifty-two of the 56 MWC-controlled games are set for Saturdays (93 percent). The non-conference schedule features 13 contests against teams that earned bowl berths in 2007, including Arizona State, California, Colorado, Houston (2 games), Navy, Michigan, Nevada, Oklahoma, Oregon State, Tennessee, Texas A&M, Tulsa and UCLA. Five opponents finished ranked in last year's final Top 25 polls - #13/16 Arizona State, #8/8 Oklahoma, #12/12 Tennessee, #19/18 Michigan and #NR/25 Oregon State. The MWC will play seven games against the Pac-10 and Western Athletic Conferences, four against Big 12 and Conference USA schools, two against the Mid-American Conference and one each against the Big Ten and SEC. There are three games against Football Bowl Subdivision independents, including Army, Navy and Notre Dame, and seven match-ups with Football Championship Subdivision programs.

COUGARS LEAD MWC IN HOME ATTENDANCE

BYU, which boasts the largest on-campus home stadium in the Mountain West Conference, has led the MWC in home attendance in all nine years of the league's existence, averaging 64,497 in 2007 (27th best in the nation). In fact, Edwards Stadium has been the site of the league's all-time top-10 crowds.

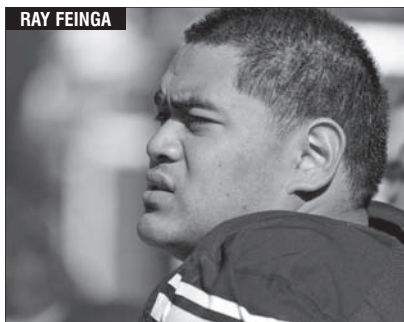

THE MWC AND THE BCS

With the addition of a fifth BCS bowl game in 2006, Bowl Championship Series officials announced modifications to the at-large qualification requirements. Instead of having to finish in the top 12 of the final BCS standings, teams finishing in the top 14 will now be eligible for a BCS game.

- Any Division I-A team is eligible for at-large consideration.
- Automatic qualifiers: No. 1 and No. 2 teams in the final BCS standings. Big East, Big Ten, SEC, PAC-10, Big 12 and ACC champions and Notre Dame (if it finishes in the top eight).
- A non-automatic qualifying BCS team that finishes in the top- 12, or in the top-16 if they're ahead of a BCS conference champion.

The BYU vs. Utah rivalry has become one of the most-heated and most-anticipated match-ups in the nation. The Utes and the Cougars have met 80 times since 1922. Utah dominated the rivalry until 1965 when the Cougars began to hold the advantage over the Utes. Since 1965 BYU is 28-15 against the Utes. Except for 2004, the last eight meetings in this rivalry have been decided by seven points or less including four last-minute comebacks by BYU in 2000, 2001, 2006 and 2007.

It all started on October 14, 1922. Well, according to BYU, anyway. Utah claims the first meeting between the schools was on April 6, 1896, when BYU was still Brigham Young Academy.

It's just one of many things the two schools don't agree on. The Academy played Utah six times between 1896 and 1898, before Provo could officially boast its own full-fledged university. Each team won three games.

The Cougars and the Utes have built a strong tradition of intense competition in the 83 years of the rivalry. With the exception of the war years from 1943-45, the two schools have faced each other every year since 1922.

The Utes dominated the series early on, avoiding defeat until 1942, when the Cougars finally won, 12-7, in Salt Lake City behind Coach Floyd Millet. The success was short-lived, however, as it took BYU another 16 years to win another contest, 14-7, again in Salt Lake City in 1958. In all, Utah won 34 of the first 40 contests, four of which were ties.

In 1965, the momentum began to turn in BYU's favor. The Cougars took three in a row from the Utes from 1965-67, and although Utah won the next four, the competition had become much more interesting.

In 1972, the series took on an entirely different feeling with the arrival of LaVell Edwards as BYU's new head coach. He took on a program that had gone 5-38-4 (.149) against its fiercest rival and proceeded to post a 22-7 (.757) record against Utah in 29 years, including wins in 15 of his first 16 meetings with the Utes. In the Edwards era, the Cougars outscored the Utes an average of 34.9 to 20.9 per contest. Coach Edwards' career included winning streaks of nine (1979-87) and six (1972-77) games against Utah.

The annual showdown generates considerable interest throughout the state, making it a virtual certainty that whatever stadium the teams play in will be sold out well in advance. In all, seven of Utah's top ten home crowds before the expansion of Rice-Eccles Stadium were for games against BYU.

Meanwhile, 45 miles south in Provo, the grudge match has accounted for five of the 20 largest crowds in the history of LaVell Edwards Stadium.

One of the more memorable moments in the rivalry was the 1989 contest in which the Cougars pasted the Utes, 70-31, in Provo. It was a game in which the home team scored touchdowns in each of its first seven possessions and in all eight with Ty Detmer as quarterback. In a move of mercy, Detmer was replaced by backup Sean Covey late in the second quarter.

Then there were the infamous back-to-back, 34-31, losses at the hands of the Utes in 1993 and 1994, giving rebirth to a rivalry that had become ridiculously lopsided in the 80s and early 90s. In all, the Utes won three in a row (1993-95) under coach Ron McBride.

The Cougars responded to the new aggression in 1996 with a dominating, 37-17, victory in Salt Lake City. BYU employed an extremely unconventional approach, gaining 376 yards in 63 attempts on the ground and attempting only 12 passes.

In 1998, a well-placed ESPN microphone picked up an audible “clank” as the potential game-winning kick bounced off the right goal post and BYU escaped with a, 26-24 victory. BYU let the Utes back into the game after having seemingly put the game away in the fourth quarter, allowing Utah to set up a 32-yard field goal to win the game. Mysteriously, the short chip shot hooked right at the last possible moment, giving the Cougars reason to celebrate.

In 2000 LaVell Edwards worked his magic for the last time as Brandon Doman's touchdown with 23 seconds remaining finished an amazing last minute come-

back to send the legendary BYU coach out a winner.

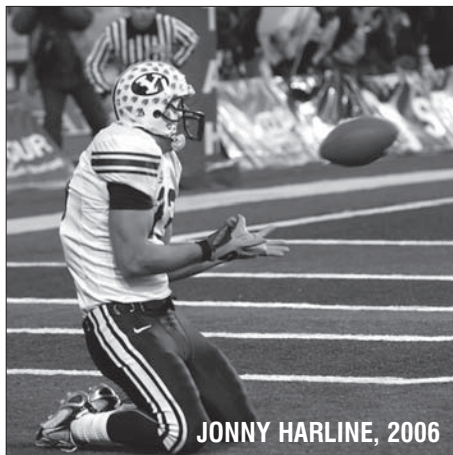
Lately home field advantage seems to have become less of a factor, as the Utes won three straight at Edwards Stadium (1995, '97, '99) and the Cougars won three in a row in Salt Lake City (1996, 1998, 2000).

In 2001, BYU changed the trend in a miraculous, come-from-behind victory in Provo. With less than four minutes left in the game and down 11 points, BYU's hopes for a perfect season seemed dim. But Luke Staley scored two touchdowns in just over two minutes to erase the deficit and give the Cougars the 24-21 victory. The game was far from over after Staley's 30-yard touchdown. Lance Rice led Utah on a final drive in the last minute. Rice converted a key fourth-and-10 with a trick play, advancing the ball to the BYU 30-yard line. But on the very next play, Jernaro Gilford stepped in front of a Rice pass and intercepted the ball to seal the game.

In 2003 BYU held Utah to just three points on a snowy day in Provo. Only problem was, BYU was without offensive threat Reynaldo Brathwaite and its top three quarterbacks. BYU's offense sputtered and the Utes gave BYU its first shutout since 1975 (Ending an NCAA record 361 consecutive games without a shut-out). Meanwhile the win also gave Utah its first outright league championship since 1957. In 2005 BYU erased a 21-point halftime deficit and forced the game into overtime only to come up just short. John Beck's fourth down pass just missed the fingertips of Michael Reed as BYU fell 41-34 in OT.

2006 may have been one of the greatest games in the history of the rivalry. With the lead switching hands several times in the final minutes, BYU drove 75 yards in 10 plays in the last 1:19 to win the game, responding to a nine-play, 83-yard Utah drive. All-American John Beck connected with wide open tight end Jonny Harline in the end zone on the game's final play in what has been deemed “the 13-second miracle” for Cougar fans. The 33-31 victory sealed a perfect league record for BYU and their first victory over Utah since 2001.

In 2007 both teams brought seven-game winning streaks into the matchup, causing temperatures to be at an all-time high. Reminiscent of its last-second victory against Utah in the 2006 season, No. 23 BYU defeated its archrival on the final drive to take a 17-10 win in front of a sellout crowd at LaVell Edwards Stadium. Austin Collie caught five balls for 126 yards, including a game-saving 49-yard reception on a fourth-and-18 situation during the Cougars' final drive. With the win the Cougars became the outright Mountain West Conference Champions for the second season in a row. The win also allowed Mendenhall's club to move ahead in the national polls to No. 19. Harvey Unga surpassed 1,000 yards on the season after rushing for 144 yards on 23 carries again the Utes, becoming the first freshman at BYU to reach the mark.



In 2006, the Cougars performed one of the most memorable plays in BYU football history when John Beck found Jonny Harline (above) all alone in the end zone as time expired, giving No. 21 BYU a 33-31 come-from-behind victory over rival Utah. Jonny Harline hauled in three touchdowns on the day but none were bigger than his final TD as time expired. The late-game heroics also gave BYU an unblemished conference record of 8-0.

2007 SEASON IN REVIEW

No. 17 BYU came into the 2007 season with the nation's second longest winning streak (10 games) thanks to a 2006 campaign in which the team went 11-2 overall and posted a perfect 8-0 Mountain West Conference record.

After their 2006 dominating Las Vegas Bowl victory over Oregon, the Cougars lost seven All-MWC performers, the 2006 MWC Offensive Player of the Year in John Beck, and the school's all-time leading rusher, Curtis Brown, to graduation.

The Cougars' 17-10 defeat of rival Utah was one of the biggest victories of the season for BYU.

Prognosticators picked BYU head coach Bronco Mendenhall's team to finish second in the MWC

in 2007. As it turned out, the more things changed, the more they stayed the same.

Mendenhall led the 2007 version of his Cougars to their second-straight outright Mountain West title behind another perfect 8-0 MWC season. Behind the arm of All-MWC sophomore quarterback Max Hall and the legs of Freshman All-American Harvey Unga, BYU's all-time leading freshman running back, the Cougars are the only team in Mountain West Conference history to win back-to-back outright league titles and to record back-to-back undefeated league records. BYU has won a record four Mountain West

Conference championships since the league's inception, including the 1999, 2001, 2006 and 2007 titles. To go along with their 16-game conference win streak, the Cougars boast the nation's longest overall winning streak at 10 games and have won 21 of their last 23 games.

At 11-2 on the season, BYU has posted its second-straight 10-win season and the 12th since the 1979 campaign. It is also the first time since the 1990-1991 seasons BYU has had back-to-back 10-win seasons. Mendenhall is the first coach in school history to lead

the Cougars to three consecutive bowl games in his first three years as head coach.

Hall, in his first year as a starter, put in the fourth best performance by a first-year quarterback at BYU to date and was the nation's top sophomore quarterback in terms of passing yards. On the season, Hall completed 298-of-496 passes for 3,848 yards and 26 touchdowns.

Freshman sensation Unga broke several BYU and MWC records in a breakout 2007 season. Unga, who compiled 1,227 rushing yards and 655 receiving yards, is the Cougars' all-time leading freshman running back and the first BYU freshman to eclipse the 1,000-yard mark in a single-season. He holds the school record for most 100-yard rushing games as a freshman with seven. Unga put together three-straight 100-yard rushing games, equaling the third highest consecutive 100-yard games in MWC history. Unga's 24 points against San Diego State is an MWC single-game freshman scoring record. His 1,227 rushing yards marks the most yards by a BYU running back since Doak Walker Award winner Luke Staley racked up 1,582 yards during the 2001 season. Unga's mark ranks fourth all-time in BYU history. With a combined 1,882 yards, the freshman broke the MWC single-season all-purpose yards record.

The BYU defense held up its end of the bargain this season as well. As the nation's 10th ranked defense, the Cougars allowed just 307.2 yards per game. Allowing only one 100-yard rusher all season, BYU was the ninth ranked rushing defense in all of college football. Sophomore defensive lineman Jan Jorgensen anchored the Cougar defense. An All-MWC First Team selection, Jor-

gensen led the MWC and ranked ninth nationally with 13.5 sacks. He produced at least one sack in six of BYU's seven games against MWC opponents, including a career-high three sacks in the Cougars' 35-16 win against Colorado State. Jorgensen was credited with 77 tackles on the season, averaging six takedowns per game and had at least one sack in six straight games.

BYU began its season at home at LaVell Edwards Stadium playing host to Arizona. The Cougar defense held the Wildcats scoreless through 59 minutes in a 20-7 victory to extend what was the nation's second-longest active win streak to 11 straight games. Hall went 26-39 for 288 yards with two touchdowns and no interceptions.

The Cougars also saw a big performance from Unga. He led BYU in rushing (68 yards on 15 carries) and receiving with 127 yards on nine receptions. Unga also had two touchdowns, one through the air and one on the ground.

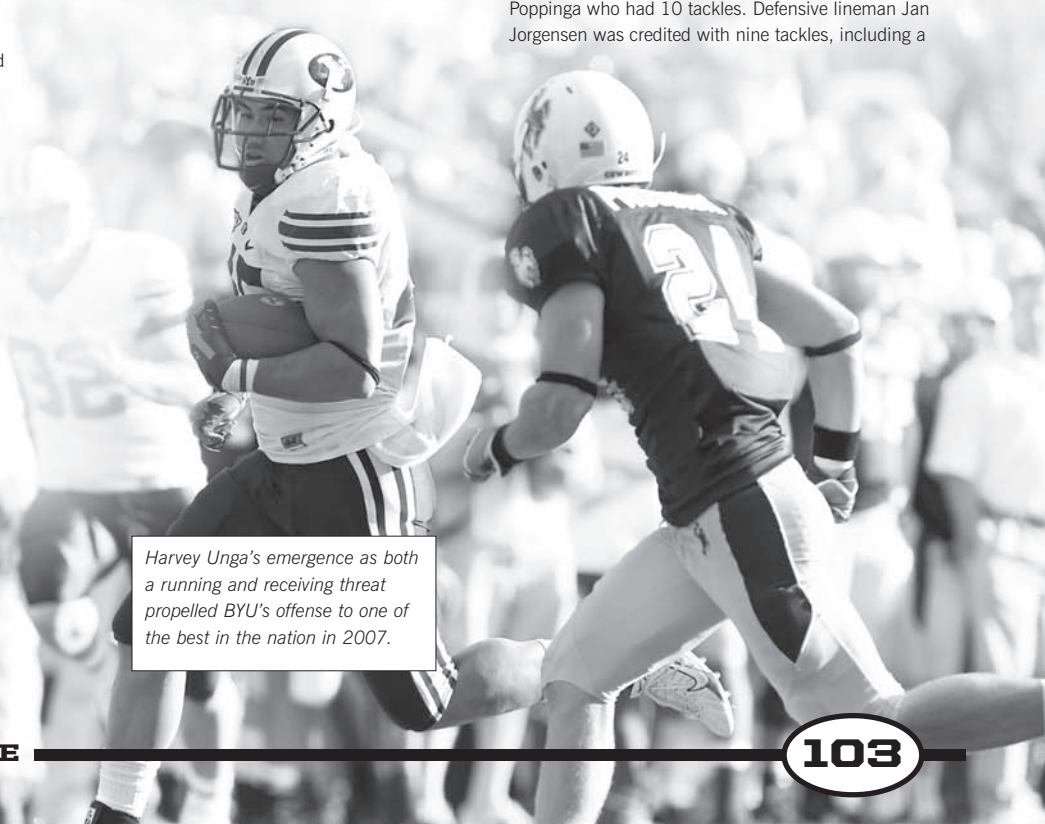
His performance earned him MWC Player of the Week honors.

Riding a two-game win streak against the PAC-10, BYU headed to the Rose Bowl looking to make it three straight against UCLA. Despite racking up 435 yards of total offense, including 391 yards passing, BYU saw its 11-game winning streak come to an end, as No. 11 UCLA beat the Cougars 27-17 in front of 72,986 fans. The Cougars held the Bruins to just 236 total yards but fell short in their bid to upset UCLA on its home field. Hall threw 30-of-53 attempts for 391 yards and two touchdowns, while a stifling defense held UCLA junior quarterback Ben Olson to just 126 passing yards.

Staying on the road, BYU looked to get back on the winning track against a team it had never lost to before – Tulsa. The game turned out to be a shootout. Hall threw a MWC-record 537 yards and four touchdowns, but Tulsa racked up 595 yards of total offense of its own on its way to a 55-47 victory over the Cougars. BYU committed 14 penalties and four turnovers in its second loss of the season. Unga rushed 21 times for 100 yards, while Austin Collie, Michael Reed and Dennis Pitta each had over 100 receiving yards. Hall completed 34 of his 57 pass attempts.

The surprising defeat at the hands of the Golden Hurricane was also the last time BYU tasted defeat. Returning to the friendly confines of Edwards Stadium, the Cougars began what is now a 10-game winning streak against Air Force. Hall threw for 293 yards and two touchdowns in a 31-6 victory to give the Cougars their eighth straight home victory. The game also marked the first loss of the 2007 season for the Falcons. BYU running back Manase Tonga recorded two rushing touchdowns on the afternoon, bringing his season total up to four to that point, which is the same amount of rushing touchdowns he had in all of 2006.

The Cougars were led defensively by linebacker Kelly Poppinga who had 10 tackles. Defensive lineman Jan Jorgensen was credited with nine tackles, including a



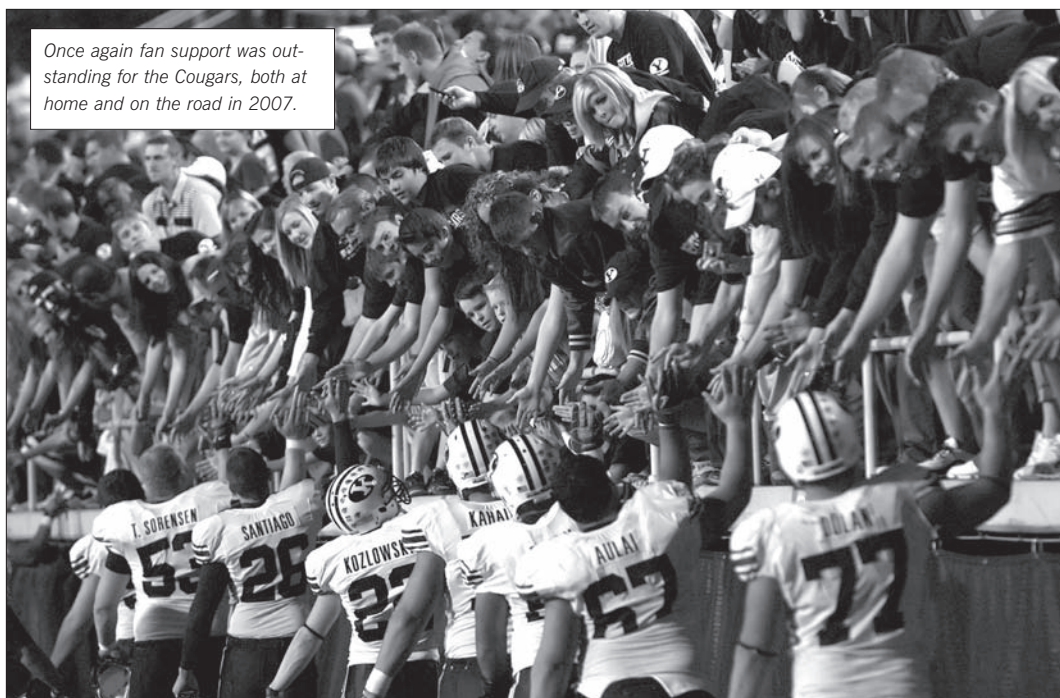
Harvey Unga's emergence as both a running and receiving threat propelled BYU's offense to one of the best in the nation in 2007.



sack and two hurries against the Falcons. The BYU defense held Air Force to just 231 yards of total offense, marking the third time in four games the Cougars have held their opponents to under 240 yards of total offense. Tight end Dennis Pitta picked up his second straight game with over 100 yards receiving, marking the first time a BYU receiver had back-to-back 100-yard games since Jonny Harline had consecutive 100-yard games to end the 2006 season.

BYU improved to 3-2 on the season and collected its first road victory of the season the very next week, defeating New Mexico 31-24. The Cougars got their 10th consecutive Mountain West Conference win and eighth straight MWC road victory behind Hall's 18-for-40, 251-yard night. Hall also threw two touchdown passes on the night. Sophomore Austin Collie caught four balls for 98 yards, including a season-long 59-yard touchdown reception with 9:23 left in the third quarter to give the Cougars a 21-6 lead. The defense came up big, collecting five turnovers, including three fumble recoveries and two interceptions. Senior linebacker Bryan Kehl had his first-career interception, returning it 36 yards to give BYU an early 7-0 lead in the contest. All totaled, BYU scored 24 of its 31 points as a result of turnovers.

Despite four turnovers, including a career-high three interceptions from sophomore Max Hall, BYU remained undefeated in the Mountain West Conference with a 24-14 victory over UNLV on Oct. 13. Hall was 21-for-33 for 214 yards and one touchdown pass to go along with his three interceptions. Meanwhile, freshman running back Harvey Unga had a career night of his own, carrying the ball 25 times for 177 yards—both career-highs. In the second half alone, Unga rushed 18 times for 118 yards.



Once again fan support was outstanding for the Cougars, both at home and on the road in 2007.

BYU finished with 441 total yards to the Rebels' 217. The Cougars rushed for 227 yards, while holding UNLV to just 96 yards rushing.

Unga led the Cougars in both rushing (146) and receiving (57) yards for a total of 202 all-purpose yards, as BYU defeated Eastern Washington 42-17 in Provo on Oct. 20. Unga, who also scored two touchdowns on the day, became the first freshman running back to rush for 100 yards or more in four different games during his freshman season. Hall was 15-for-30 for 156 yards and threw one touchdown pass to go along with his first career rushing touchdown. BYU finished with 377 total yards while limiting Eastern Washington to just 266 total yards.

Raging wildfires in San Diego caused the postponement of BYU's next scheduled game at San Diego State, forcing the Cougars into a bye week. Holding a 5-2 record at this point, BYU now had the opportunity to achieve one of its goals at home against Colorado State – becoming bowl eligible. BYU seized the day with a 35-16 win against the Rams. Unga's 51 rushing yards moved him into the top spot on the list of BYU's all-time freshman rushing leaders, surpassing Ronney Jenkins' previous record of 733 yards. Hall led the Cougars, completing 22-of-30 passes for 355 yards and three touchdowns. Hall connected with Collie for a total of 111 yards, Collie's second 100-yard game this season. BYU had a second 100-yard receiver in Unga, who racked up 110 yards.

Playing in its second game at Edwards Stadium in five days, the Cougars notched another conference win, defeating TCU 27-22. Hall threw 26-of-44 for a total of 305

yards and one touchdown. The game marked Hall's third overall 300-or-more passing yard performance. Collie led all receivers with 109 yards, his third 100-yard game of the season. Unga scored two rushing touchdowns. The Cougars' second consecutive win over TCU set them up for another milestone at Wyoming the following week.

BYU clinched a share of its second consecutive Mountain West Conference title with a convincing 35-10 victory over Wyoming at War Memorial Stadium on Nov. 17. Hall recorded his fifth-career game with 300 or more passing yards thanks to a 26-for-37, 331-yard outing. He also threw three touchdown passes. Hall's performance allowed him to break former Wyoming quarterback Casey Bramlet's MWC passing record for a sophomore. Bramlet threw for 3,069 yards as a sophomore in 2001.

Meanwhile, freshman running back Harvey Unga turned in his fifth 100-yard rushing performance with 110 yards on the ground against the Cowboys. Collie caught eight balls for 103 yards. As a team, BYU racked up 497 yards of total offense while limiting Wyoming to just 277 yards, including only nine rushing yards on 24 carries. The following Sunday, BYU was ranked for the first time in 2007 at No. 23.

The Cougars returned home from Wyoming to play the most highly anticipated game in the state of Utah. The BYU/University of Utah rivalry is one of the most heated in the nation, and with both teams bringing seven-game winning streaks into this year's matchup, temperatures seemed to be at an all-time high. Reminiscent of its' last-second victory against Utah in the 2006 season, No. 23 BYU defeated its archrival on its final drive to take a 17-10 win in front of a sellout crowd at LaVell Edwards Stadium.

With the win the Cougars became the outright Mountain West Conference Champions for the second season in a row. Unga surpassed 1,000 yards on the season after rushing for 144 yards on 23 carries against the Utes, becoming the first freshman at BYU to reach the mark. Collie caught five balls for 126 yards, including a game-saving 49-yard reception on the Cougars' final drive. Following the game, the Cougars were awarded the MWC Championship trophy. The win also allowed Mendenhall's club to move ahead in the national polls at No. 19.

No. 19 BYU wrapped up its second consecutive undefeated Mountain West Conference season defeating San Diego State 48-27 on Dec. 1 at Qualcomm Stadium. Unga scored a career-high four touchdowns (three rushing and one receiving). Unga also racked up 161 rushing yards on 23 carries. Hall threw 19-for-26 for 227 yards and three touchdowns. As a team, BYU gained 538 yards of total offense to SDSU's 356. Additionally, the Cougar defense kept up its season-long tradition of not allowing an individual rusher to go for 100 yards. BYU now entered the Las Vegas Bowl as the No. 17 team in the nation.

After winning its second-straight league championship with a perfect 8-0 record, BYU accepted an invitation to play UCLA in the 16th Annual Pioneer Las Vegas Bowl on Saturday, Dec. 22 at Sam Boyd Stadium. The invitation marked the third straight appearance for the Cougars in Las Vegas and the team's 26th overall bowl appearance since the 1974 season. The game also provided a rematch of BYU's 27-17 loss to the Bruins earlier in the season.

BYU reached its second consecutive Las Vegas Bowl victory, 17-16, in dramatic fashion – with a block on the Bruins' potential game-winning field goal attempt as time expired. With BYU up by one point, and 2:02 to go, UCLA lined up at its own two-yard line to began the game's final drive. The Bruins would march nearly the entire length of the field, taking the ball 87 yards in 12 plays. UCLA's freshman kicker Kai Forbath successfully kicked three field goals on the night, including two 50-yarders, before taking the field one final time. With only three ticks on the clock, Forbath looked poised to knock down his fourth field goal of the night, a 28-yard shot, and give his team the win. However defensive lineman Eathyn Manumaleuna would not allow BYU to taste defeat, as the freshman blocked Forbath's kick as the clock ran to triple zeroes.

A pair of sophomores led BYU in the win, as Hall threw 21-for-35 for 231 yards and two touchdowns, while Collie led all receivers with 107 yards on six catches. Collie also recorded a touchdown reception and was named the Las Vegas Bowl Most Valuable Player. The win marked the first time BYU has won back-to-back bowl games since the 1994 Copper Bowl and the 1996 Cotton Bowl, and was the first time since the 1983 and 1984 seasons that the team has won back-to-back bowl games in consecutive years.

Following its win in the Las Vegas Bowl, BYU's second straight 11-win season was capped with a No. 14 national ranking in both the Associated Press Top-25 and USA Today Coaches Poll. The 2007 season marked the highest finish for the

Cougars in the national polls since beating Kansas State, 19-15, in the Cotton Bowl to finish the 1996 season ranked No. 5 in both polls.

Not only will the Cougars enter the 2008 season coming off its highest national ranking in 11 years, but also the team will begin the season riding the nation's longest active winning streak at 10 games. Interestingly, the Cougars have also put together a 12-game home win streak. Over the past two seasons, the Cougars have not lost a single home game or a Mountain West Conference game. In fact, BYU has not lost a conference road game since October 1, 2005, marking a streak of 11 straight games.

BYU, which returns 9 of 11 offensive starters in 2008, finished the 2007 season ranked 25th in total offense, averaging 307.9 yards per game. First-team All-Mountain West quarterback Max Hall averaged 296 yards passing per game, finishing the season as the nation's top-ranked sophomore quarterback. Running back Harvey Unga picked up Freshman All-America and MWC Freshman-of-the-Year honors after leading the Cougars with an average of 94.4 yards per game. Sophomore Austin Collie ranked among the nation's top receivers, averaging over 73 yards receiving per game and sophomore tight end Dennis Pitta averaged nearly five receptions and 63 yards per game. Overall, the Cougars averaged 30.1 points per game and held opponents to just 18.5 points per contest to rank ninth nationally. Defensively, BYU ranked 10th, holding opponents to just over 307 yards per game. The Cougars ranked 9th in rushing defense, and allowed just one 100-yard rusher all season.

IN GOOD COMPANY

BYU was one of 18 teams ranked in the top-25 that made its third straight post-season bowl appearance.

VERSUS THE PAC-10

BYU's victory over UCLA marked the third win (in five tries) over teams from the Pac-10 over the past two seasons. Including the 2006 season, the Cougars are 1-1 against Arizona, 1-1 against UCLA and 1-0 against Oregon. Interestingly, BYU has outscored Pac-10 opponents 120-93 over the past five match-ups.

RECORD SETTER

Freshman running back Harvey Unga became the Mountain West Conference's all-time freshman running back in 2007. Unga racked up 1,227 yards rushing on the season. During the season he produced a BYU freshman record seven, 100-yard games.

ANOTHER 11-WIN SEASON

The Cougars' 11-win season in 2007 marks the ninth time in BYU football history the Cougars have recorded 11 or more wins in a single season. It is also the first time since 1983-84 that BYU has posted 11 or more wins in back-to-back seasons.

NATION'S LONGEST WIN STREAK

With BYU's 17-16 win over UCLA in the Pioneer Las Vegas Bowl, the Cougars extended their win streak to 10 straight games, which marks the nation's longest, active winning streak. The Cougars have won 22 of their last 24 games and have posted a 22-4 record over the past two seasons.

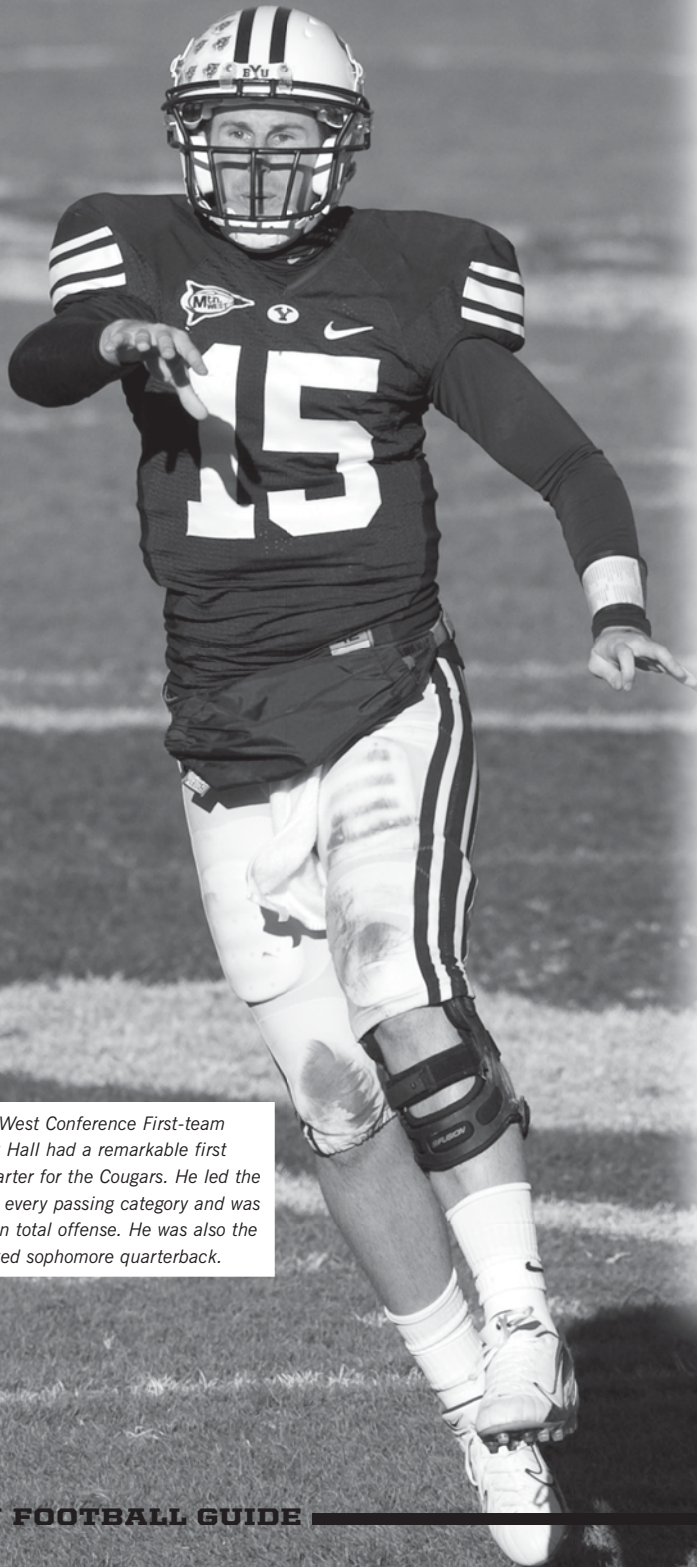

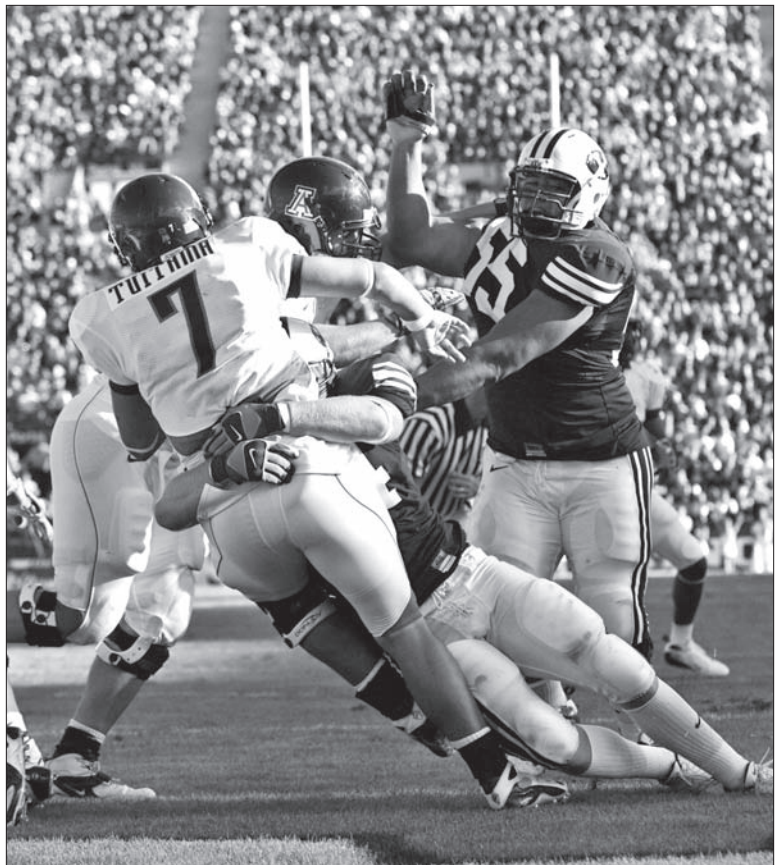

While freshman running back Harvey Unga hosted his coming-out party with 194 yards of total offense and two touchdowns, the defense was sensational as it held Arizona scoreless through the first 59 minutes of play and held the Wildcats to just 11 first downs in the Cougars' 20-7 win.

BYU VS. ARIZONA GAME RECAP

The Cougar defense held the Wildcats scoreless through 59 minutes in a 20-7 victory to extend what was the nation's second longest active win streak to 11 straight games. Hall went 26-39 for 288 yards with two touchdowns and no interceptions. The Cougars also got a big performance from Unga. He led BYU in rushing (68 yards on 15 carries) and receiving with 127 yards on nine receptions. Unga also had two touchdowns, one through the air and one on the ground. His performance earned him MWC Player of the Week honors. After converting one first down in their first drive the Wildcats faced a fourth-and-five at the BYU 30. They decided to go for it with a hand off to Chris Jennings up the middle, but he was stopped three yards short of the first down. The Cougars took over at their own 28-yard line and scored on a 27-yard pass to Unga seven plays later. BYU took a 7-0 lead on that 72-yard drive. Later in the second quarter BYU took advantage of great field position from Arizona's 36-yard line by putting together a seven-play drive for another Cougar score. This time it was a two-yard pass from Hall to tight end Dennis Pitta. Facing a third-and-five with just under five minutes remaining in the third quarter, Unga caught the ball coming out of the backfield across the middle and was hit by a few Wildcats. It appeared as though he was down but no whistle was blown and Unga kept pumping his feet and eventually broke it outside for a 45-yard gain.

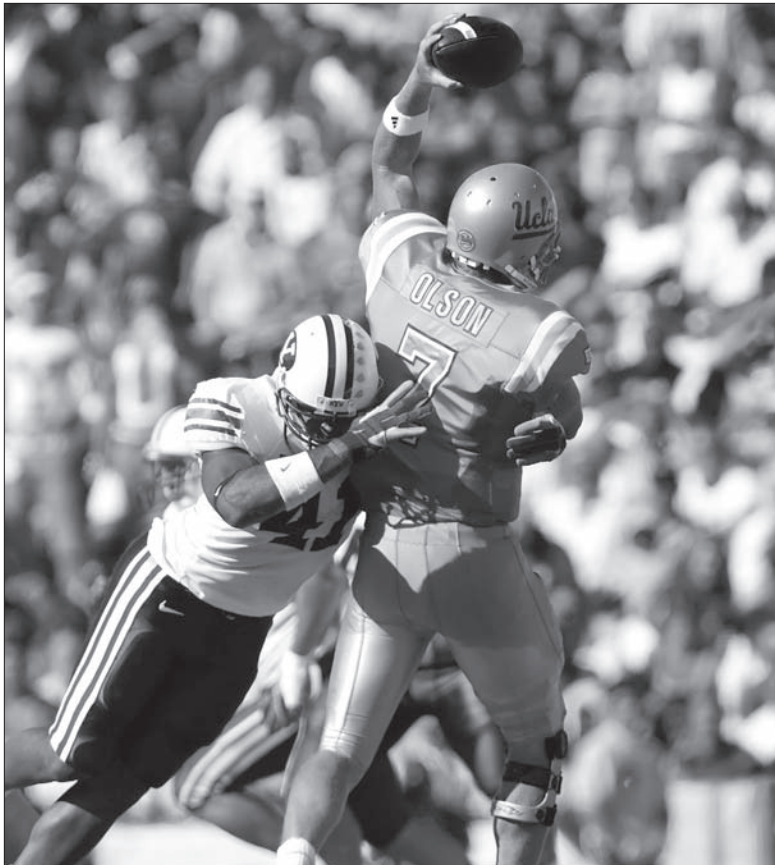

Despite outgaining the Bruins by 200 yards of total offense, the Cougars fell to No. 13 UCLA in the Rose Bowl. BYU's defense showed its strength in holding UCLA to just 236 yards of offense and only two touchdowns, but it wasn't enough to overcome the Cougars' three turnovers.

BYU VS. UCLA GAME RECAP

Despite racking up 435 yards of total offense, including 391 yards passing, BYU saw its 11-game winning streak come to an end, as No. 13 UCLA beat the Cougars 27-17 in front of 72,986 fans. The Cougars held the Bruins to just 236 total yards but fell short in their bid to upset UCLA on its home field. Hall threw 30-of-53 attempts for 391 yards and two touchdowns, while a stifling defense held UCLA junior quarterback Ben Olson to just 126 passing yards. A total of 11 penalties were called against BYU compared to the Bruins' four. The most crucial penalty came late in the fourth quarter when the Cougars were called for pass interference on a play that should have been blown dead because the 25-second play clock had expired. The pass interference penalty gave UCLA a first-and-10 from the BYU 27-yard line. A few plays later Chris Markey put the game out of reach with a three-yard touchdown run with 1:12 left in the game. On BYU's first play of the second half, Harvey Unga took a pass from Hall and ran it up the sideline for a gain of 18-yards. That play was followed by a 23-yard reception up the middle by Andrew George. Two plays later Hall hooked up with George once more for a 28-yard completion that fell one yard short of the end zone. Hall found Austin Collie in the end zone to cut the gap down to 20-10. It was the Cougars' defense that came up big on UCLA's ensuing drive when Kayle Buchanan intercepted an Olsen pass. It took only two plays for Hall to connect with Collie again on a lob at the corner of the end zone to put BYU within three points at 20-17. However, that would be as close as the Cougars would get, as Markey sealed the game for the Bruins with a three-yard touchdown run that gave the game its final score of 27-17.

The Cougar offense racked up 694 total yards and 47 points, but it wasn't enough against the nation's top offense, Tulsa, on the road. Austin Collie set a BYU and MWC record with 366 all-purpose yards, including 245 combined return yards and 121 receiving yards.

BYU VS. TULSA GAME RECAP

Hall threw a MWC record 537 yards and four touchdowns, but Tulsa racked up 595 yards of total offense of its own on its way to a 55-47 victory over the Cougars. BYU committed 14 penalties and four turnovers in its second loss of the season. Unga rushed 21 times for 100 yards, while Austin Collie, Michael Reed and Dennis Pitta each had over 100 receiving yards. Hall completed 34 of his 57 pass attempts. Unga scampered one yard into the end zone for a 7-0 lead. The touchdown capped an 8-play, 57-yard drive that featured two receptions for 34 yards from Reed. The Golden Hurricane scored 14 unanswered points on two touchdown passes to take a 14-7 lead heading into the second quarter. Hall and Collie evened things up when the two connected on a 45-yard touchdown reception. However, Tulsa would one-up the Cougars on its very next play. TU quarterback Paul Smith found junior wide receiver Brennan Marion for a 75-yard touchdown pass that once again gave the Golden Hurricane the lead at 21-14. The play was the longest touchdown reception BYU had given up since the 2003 season against San Diego State. Hall had two interceptions to start the second half that put BYU behind, 34-45, at the 10:45 mark of the third quarter. A 6-yard touchdown carry from Manase Tonga that cut the deficit to five points after the PAT was missed was followed by a Hall fumble that led to another Tulsa score. Hall responded to his miscues by hitting Reed with a 36-yard touchdown pass in the fourth quarter. But BYU still could not find a way to stop the Golden Hurricane from scoring, as a field goal put Tulsa ahead 55-47 with 4:15 remaining.

The Cougars set the tone for the MWC season with a convincing 31-6 victory over eventual MWC second-place finisher Air Force. The Cougars rebounded from two tough road losses with a strong showing at home.

BYU VS. AIR FORCE GAME RECAP

Hall threw for 293 yards and two touchdowns in a 31-6 victory to give the Cougars their eighth straight home victory. The game also marked the first loss of the 2007 season for the Falcons. BYU running back Manase Tonga recorded two rushing touchdowns on the afternoon bringing his season total up to four to that point, which is the same amount of rushing touchdowns he had in all of 2006. The Cougars were led defensively by linebacker Kelly Poppinga who had 10 tackles. Defensive lineman Jan Jorgensen was credited with nine tackles, including a sack and two hurries against the Falcons. The BYU defense held Air Force to just 231 yards of total offense, marking the third time in four games the Cougars have held their opponents to under 240 yards of total offense. Tight end Dennis Pitta picked up his second straight game with over 100 yards receiving, marking the first time a BYU receiver had back-to-back 100-yard games since Jonny Harline had consecutive 100-yard games to end the 2006 season. The Cougars were able to get on the scoreboard first for the 15th time in their last 16 games when the team took advantage of an early turnover and scored six plays later on a one-yard run by Tonga. BYU safety Quinn Gooch came up with the interception, his first of the year, on Air Force's first drive of the game to give his team the ball on the Falcons' 43-yard line. The Cougars went into the locker room up 17-0 after a second quarter that saw a nine-yard connection from Hall to Matt Allen and a Mitch Payne field goal from 42 yards out. A 29-yard completion to Harvey Unga in the third quarter opened up BYU's largest lead of the season, 24-0. This scoring drive took 10 plays and had three passing plays of over 18 yards. The Falcons scored their only points of the game with 3:13 left in the third quarter when quarterback Shaun Carney ran the ball in from eight yards out. The Cougars stopped Air Force's two-point conversion attempt after the touchdown.

BYU VS. NEW MEXICO GAME RECAP

The Cougars got their 10th consecutive Mountain West Conference win and eighth straight MWC road victory behind Hall's 18-40, 251-yard night. Hall also threw two touchdown passes on the night. Sophomore Austin Collie caught four balls for 98 yards, including a season-long 59-yard touchdown reception with 9:23 left in the third quarter to give the Cougars a 21-6 lead. The defense came up big, collecting five turnovers, including three fumble recoveries and two interceptions. Senior linebacker Bryan Kehl had his first-career interception, returning it 36 yards to give BYU an early 7-0 lead in the contest. All totaled, BYU scored 24 of its 31 points as a result of turnovers. With nine and a half minutes to go in the third quarter and facing a third-and-10, Hall found Collie open along the right sideline. The two connected for a 59-yard touchdown that gave the Cougars a 21-6 lead. The scoring drive, which began as a result of a Kehl forced fumble, appeared to put BYU firmly in the driver's seat. However, a Hall fumble deep in BYU territory late in the third quarter allowed Lobo running back Rodney Ferguson to score on a 5-yard carry four plays later. A little over a minute later it was Ferguson again trouncing into the end zone, this time on a 71-yard touchdown reception. New Mexico converted the two-point conversion to even the game at 21-all heading into the final quarter. With the Lobos driving, the Cougar defense applied enough pressure to force another New Mexico fumble. Defensive end Ian Dulan recovered the loose ball, setting up a 14-yard touchdown reception for tight end Dennis Pitta that put BYU ahead 28-21. UNM responded with a 43-yard field goal to cut its deficit to four points, but the Lobos would not get any closer. New Mexico safety Frankie Solomon fumbled a punt return with 6:25 remaining in the game. The turnover led to what looked to be an Andrew George game-sealing, 11-yard touchdown catch in the back of the end zone. However, after an official's review that lasted well over five minutes, the score was nullified, and BYU had to settle for a field goal.

BYU VS. UNLV GAME RECAP

Despite four turnovers, including a career-high three interceptions from sophomore Max Hall, BYU remained undefeated in the Mountain West Conference with a 24-14 victory over UNLV on Oct. 13. Hall was 21-for-33 for 214 yards and one touchdown pass to go along with his three misfires. Meanwhile, freshman running back Harvey Unga had a career night of his own. Unga carried the ball 25 times for 177 yards—both career-highs. In the second half alone, Unga rushed 18 times for 118 yards. BYU finished with 441 total yards to the Rebels' 217. The Cougars rushed for 227 yards, while holding UNLV to just 96 yards rushing. With BYU clinging to a 7-6 lead coming out of the break, Unga took control in the third quarter, as the Cougars marched up the field on a 10-play, 66-yard drive that was topped off with a four-yard touchdown reception by tight end Vic So'oto. So'oto's first-career touchdown gave BYU its largest lead of the night to that point at 14-6. During the drive, Unga had seven rushes for 54 yards. After a Cougar defensive stand that resulted in a UNLV punt, Unga again took over. The freshman carried the ball four times for 36 yards. Mitch Payne ended the 63-yard drive with a 27-yard field goal to put BYU up 17-6. As time expired on the third quarter Pitta, who finished with seven receptions for 97 yards, caught a pass from Hall, broke two tackles and scampered across the field for a gain of 39 yards. The effort went for naught though, as Hall threw a goal line pick, his third of the night, on the first play of the fourth quarter. The BYU defense once again held, allowing the offense to put the game away for good on a 15-play drive that took nearly nine minutes. Unga trotted into the end zone five yards for the touchdown.

BYU VS. EASTERN WASHINGTON GAME RECAP

Unga led the Cougars in both rushing (146) and receiving (57) yards for a total of 202 all-purpose yards, as BYU defeated Eastern Washington 42-17 in Provo on Oct 20. Unga, who also scored two touchdowns on the day, became the first freshman running back to rush for 100 yards or more in four different games during his freshman season. Hall was 15-for-30 for 156 yards and threw one touchdown pass to go along with his first career rushing touchdown. BYU finished with 377 total yards while limiting Eastern Washington to just 266 total yards. Corby Hodgkiss, Bryan Kehl and Quinn Gooch all helped the Cougars defensively as they all came up with interceptions to mark the first time BYU has totaled three interceptions since racking up four picks against UNLV on October 21, 2006. It was the defense that got on the board first for the Cougars, as Hodgkiss intercepted the ball on the third play from scrimmage and returned it 39 yards to give BYU an early 7-0 lead. BYU has scored first in the last 17 of 19 games. Then with 7:31 left in the first quarter, Hall connected with Unga for a 22-yard touchdown catch. The score marks the first 14-point first quarter of the season for the Cougars. The Eagles drew their only blood of the game in the second quarter with 10:15 left in the half. It was a 28-yard pass from senior quarterback Matt Nichols to wide receiver Aaron Boyce. Eastern Washington drove the ball 71 yards on that scoring drive. BYU senior Bryce Mahuika took the second-half opening kick-off 61 yards all the way to the Eagles' 19. Two plays later the Cougars got back on the board just 41 seconds into the half with a seven-yard touchdown run by Manase Tonga. BYU's next possession came as a result of Kehl's interception, his third in as many games. Hall capitalized on the turnover by taking the ball in on a quarterback keeper from two yards out. Junior running back Fui Vakapuna completed the scoring on the day with a three-yard run with 13:38 left in the game.

BYU VS. COLORADO STATE GAME RECAP

BYU became bowl eligible for the third straight season with a 35-16 win against the Rams. Harvey Unga's 51 rushing yards moved him into the top spot on the list of BYU's all-time freshman rushing leaders, surpassing Ronney Jenkins' previous record of 733 yards. Hall led the Cougars completing 22-of-30 passes for 355 yards and three touchdowns. Hall connected with Collie for a total of 111 yards, Collie's second 100-yard game this season. BYU had a second 100-yard receiver in Unga, who racked up 110 yards. Other high notes for BYU included Jan Jorgensen recording a career-high 2.5 sacks against CSU. With junior running back Fui Vakapuna back from injury, the Tongan Trio was reunited and running full force. Vakapuna and Unga combined for four carries and 32 yards, which were capped off by Manase Tonga's three-yard touchdown run. The Cougars then went up 20-3 with 8:18 to play in the half after a 45-yard touchdown pass from Hall to Collie. Collie's fifth touchdown reception leads the team this season. Coming out of the break, Hall connected with Collie for a 19-yard reception, which then set up a 35-yard pass to Unga over the middle. On second-and-goal, Unga recorded his first touchdown of the day and eighth on the year. The Rams' first touchdown came halfway through the fourth quarter on a three-yard run by Michael Myers. CSU's attempt at a two-point conversion failed. Hall connected with Dennis Pitta for a 45-yard reception, which put the Cougars on CSU's 6-yard line. A five-yard touchdown pass to Joe Semanoff and Mitch Payne's extra point put another seven points on the board for the Cougars.

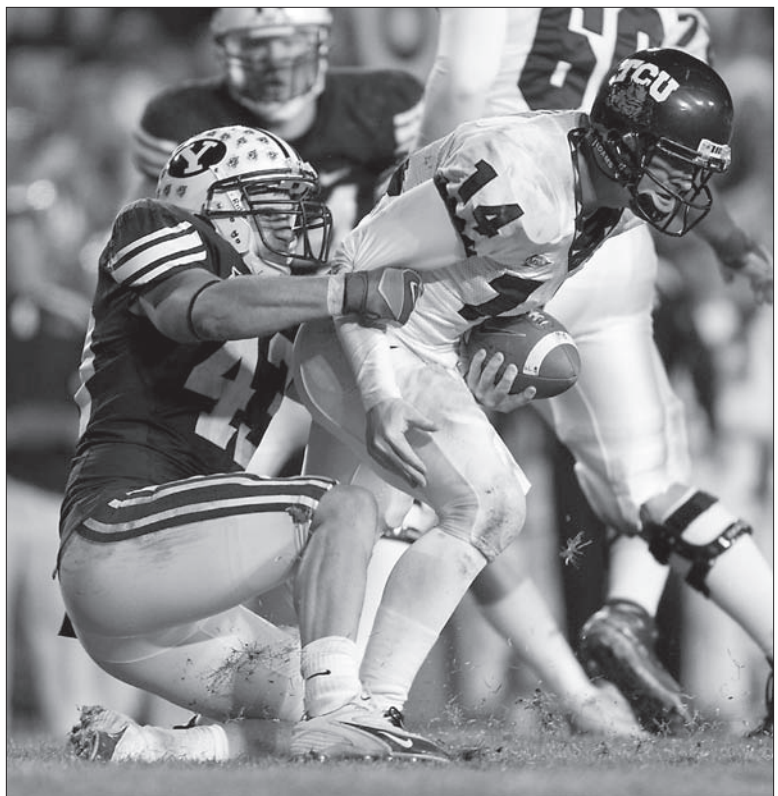

BYU VS. TCU GAME RECAP

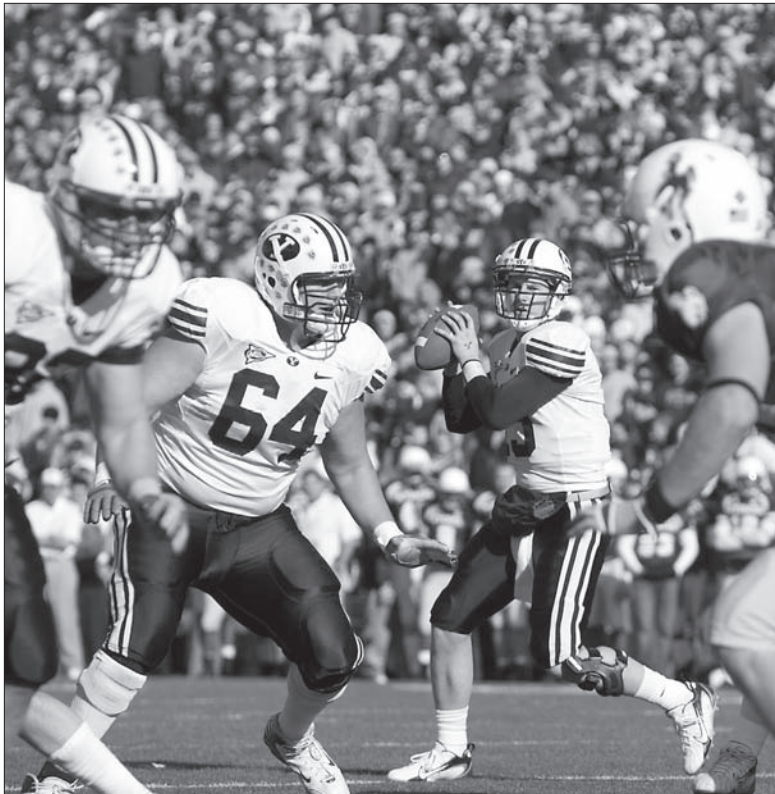
Playing in its second game at Edwards Stadium in five days, the Cougars notched another conference win, defeating TCU 27-22. Hall threw 26-44 for a total of 305 yards and one touchdown. The game marked Hall's third overall 300-or-more passing yard performance. Collie led all receivers with 109 yards, his third 100-yard game of the season. Unga scored two rushing touchdowns. With the Cougars facing a third-and-10 situation in the second quarter, Hall connected with Collie again for a 29-yard gain. A touchdown catch by Dennis Pitta was taken away on a BYU holding call, forcing the Cougars to settle for a 33-yard field goal by Mitch Payne giving them a 17-6 lead. For the first time this season, a challenge call went the Cougars way. Still in the second quarter, with the Horned Frogs on their own 15-yard line, BYU's Corby Hodgkiss was called for pass interference in the end zone. Mendenhall challenged the call, as replays indicated that the ball was tipped before the infraction. After review, the ruling on the field was reversed. Senior linebacker Kelly Poppinga's first interception of the season came on a pick from TCU's Andy Dalton with 14:02 to play in the third quarter. His 22-yard return set up Unga's second touchdown of the night--a three-yard run. Trying to cut BYU's lead down to seven points, the Horned Frogs attempted a two-point conversion following their second touchdown but came up short. Payne kicked a second field goal for the Cougars to begin the fourth quarter. Late in the fourth quarter, and down by five points, TCU regained control of the ball with less than three minutes to play in the game. However, the BYU defense stepped up and made crucial stops to prohibit a comeback for the Horned Frogs. An initial sack by junior linebacker David Nixon pushed TCU to third-and-16. Senior linebacker Bryan Kehl put the Horned Frogs away for good with a sack of his own on fourth down.

BYU VS. WYOMING GAME RECAP

BYU clinched a share of its second consecutive Mountain West Conference title with a convincing 35-10 victory over Wyoming at War Memorial Stadium on Nov. 17. Hall recorded his fifth-career game with 300 or more passing yards thanks to a 26-37, 331-yard outing. He also threw three touchdown passes. Hall's performance allowed him to break former Wyoming quarterback Casey Bramlet's MWC passing record for a sophomore. Bramlet threw for 3,069 yards as a sophomore in 2001. Meanwhile freshman running back Harvey Unga turned in his fifth 100-yard rushing performance with 110 yards on the ground against the Cowboys. Collie caught eight balls for 103 yards. As a team, BYU racked up 497 yards of total offense while limiting Wyoming to just 277 yards, including only nine rushing yards on 24 carries. Ahead 7-0 in the second quarter, the Cougars found themselves staring at a second-and-12 and backed up to their own end zone. Hall took the snap and scrambled to his left to avoid the pressure and found a wide open Collie for a first down. The drive turned into 11 plays and 90 yards, capped by a three-yard touchdown pass to Matt Allen. Hall threw his second touchdown pass of the day at the 4:42 mark in the first half when he connected with sophomore tight end Dennis Pitta on a 23-yarder. With the throw, Hall surpassed 3,000 yards passing on the season. Pitta's score also gave Hall his 20th career touchdown pass. A 20-yard field goal by Wyoming senior Billy Vinnedge cut BYU's lead to 21-3 at the break. With the Cougars leading by 18 at the start of the third quarter, Hall hit senior wide receiver Michael Reed for a 10-yard touchdown reception. The Cowboys responded with an 11-play, 83-yard drive that was topped off by a two-yard touchdown run from junior running back Wynel Seldon. BYU took the 28-10 advantage into the final quarter and quickly put the Cowboys away for good behind a two-yard scamper into the end zone from Unga, his second of the day.

Harvey Unga's 14-yard touchdown run with 38 seconds left in the game capped off another remarkable BYU comeback that included a fourth-and-18 conversion by Max Hall to Austin Collie. Unga finished the day with 141 yards rushing and 27 yards receiving to help the BYU offense outgain the Utes 424 yards to 244 yards in a 17-10 victory in Provo.

BYU VS. UTAH GAME RECAP

Reminiscent of its' last-second victory against Utah in the 2006 season, No. 23 BYU defeated its archrival on a final drive to take a 17-10 win in front of a sellout crowd at LaVell Edwards Stadium. With the win the Cougars became the outright Mountain West Conference Champions for the second season in a row. Unga surpassed 1,000 yards on the season after rushing for 144 yards on 23 carries against the Utes, becoming the first freshman at BYU to reach the mark. Collie caught five balls for 126 yards, including a game-saving 49-yard reception on the Cougars' final drive. Trailing the Utes 10-9, BYU regained control of the ball on its own 20-yard line with 1:34 remaining on the game clock. Sophomore quarterback Max Hall was hit for an eight-yard loss on first down, followed by two incomplete passes to sophomore tight end Dennis Pitta, which set up a final fourth-and-18. Hall connected with Collie for a 49-yard reception, putting the Cougars on Utah's 24-yard line. A personal foul and pass interference call against the Utes set up a first-and-10 situation for BYU. Junior running back Manase Tonga's gain of three yards was followed by Unga's 14-yard touchdown run to put the Cougars up by five points. Opting for the two-point conversion, Hall and Collie connected once again for a catch in the end zone. Following the game, the Cougars were awarded the MWC Championship trophy. The win also allowed Mendenhall's club to move ahead in the national polls at No. 19.

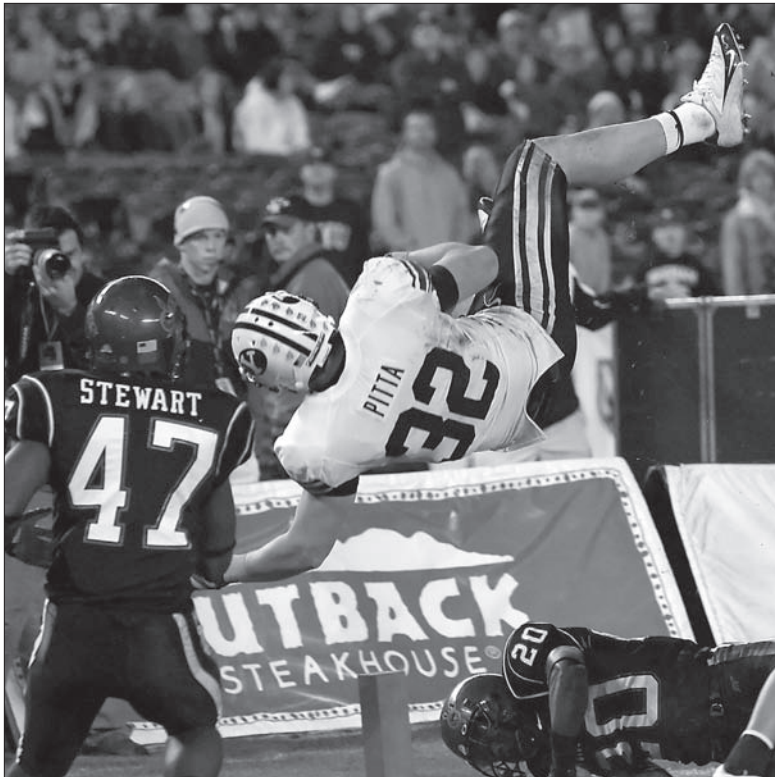

BYU VS. SAN DIEGO STATE GAME RECAP

No. 19 BYU wrapped up its second consecutive undefeated Mountain West Conference season defeating San Diego State 48-27 on Dec. 1 at Qualcomm Stadium. Unga scored a career-high four touchdowns (three rushing and one receiving). Unga also racked up 161 rushing yards on 23 carries. Hall threw 19-26 for 227 yards and three touchdowns. As a team, BYU gained 538 yards of total offense to SDSU's 356. Additionally, the Cougar defense kept up its season-long tradition of not allowing an individual rusher to go for 100 yards. Nursing a seven-point lead coming out of the break, BYU used a 14-point third quarter to take command of its final regular season game. Unga trotted seven yards into the end zone for his third score on the night putting the Cougars ahead 27-13 just two-and-a-half minutes into the second half. SDSU fullback Lynell Hamilton's three-yard touchdown catch at the 6:49 mark in the third quarter made it a seven-point game once again. However, Unga scored his career-high fourth touchdown of the game with less than a minute remaining in the third quarter to give the Cougars a 14-point cushion entering the fourth. Unga's three-yard scamper into the end zone was also his career-best third rushing score of the game. In the fourth quarter junior Fui Vakapuna scored his first rushing touchdown since the Cougars hosted Eastern Washington in October, while O'Connell scored on a two-yard rush. Vakapuna would finish with 97 rushing yards on 14 carries. With 4:20 remaining sophomore tight end Dennis Pitta took a screen pass 13 yards and dove into the end zone to give the game a final of 48-27.

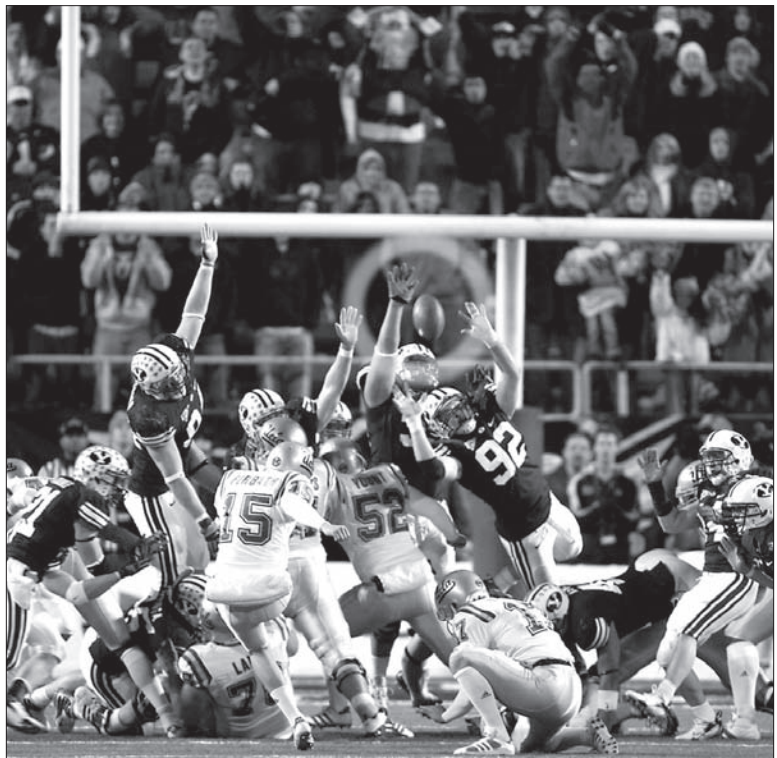

No. 17 BYU won its second-consecutive Pioneer Las Vegas Bowl, escaping with a 17-16 victory over UCLA after defensive lineman Eathyn Manumaleuna blocked a 28-yard field goal as time expired. The unlikely ending followed a record-setting night by Bruin place-kicker Kai Forbath, who made a bowl-record 52-yard kick, along with attempts of 50 and 22 yards that kept the Bruins in it.

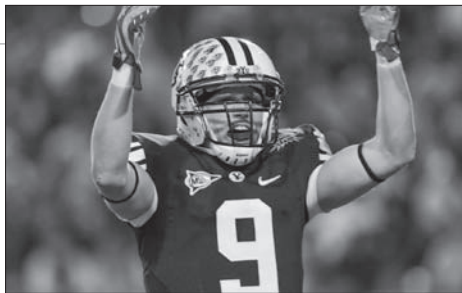

LAS VEGAS BOWL GAME RECAP

After winning its second straight league championship with a perfect 8-0 record, BYU played in its third straight Las Vegas Bowl and the team's 26th overall bowl appearance since the 1974 season. The game was a rematch of BYU's 27-17 loss to the Bruins earlier in the season. BYU reached its second consecutive Las Vegas Bowl victory, 17-16, in dramatic fashion – with a block on the Bruins' potential game-winning field goal attempt as time expired. With BYU up by one point, and 2:02 to go, UCLA lined up at its own two-yard line to began the game's final drive. The Bruins would march nearly the entire length of the field, taking the ball 87 yards in 12 plays. UCLA's freshman kicker Kai Forbath successfully kicked three field goals on the night, including two 50-yarders, before taking the field one final time. With only three ticks on the clock, Forbath looked poised to knock down his fourth field goal of the night, a 28-yard shot, and give his team the win. However defensive lineman Eathyn Manumaleuna would not allow BYU to taste defeat, as the freshman blocked Forbath's kick as the clock ran to triple zeroes. A pair of sophomores led BYU in the win, as Hall threw 21-for-35 for 231 yards and two touchdowns, while Collie led all receivers with 107 yards on six catches. Collie also recorded a touchdown reception and was named the Las Vegas Bowl Most Valuable Player. The win marked the first time BYU has won back-to-back bowl games since the 1994 Copper Bowl and the 1996 Cotton Bowl, and was the first time since the 1983 and 1984 seasons that the team has won back-to-back bowl games in consecutive years.

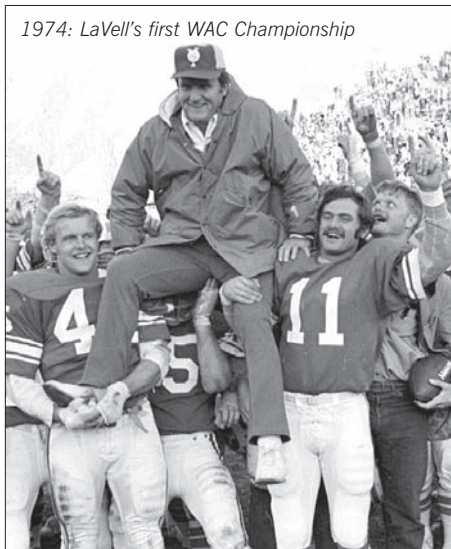
One of BYU's marquee victories came in 1990 when the Cougars opened the season by stunning top-ranked Miami in Provo. After the victory, fans stormed the field to celebrate another major victory for the BYU football program.



BYU's winning tradition was built by legendary Cougar head coach LaVell Edwards. After taking over the program in 1972, Edwards erected an offensive powerhouse that rewrote the record books and established itself among the nation's elite football programs. Edwards, a two-time NCAA National Coach of the Year and the sixth winningest coach in NCAA history, taught his players and the nation what a passing offense truly was. The Cougar offense passed 103,562 yards (about 59 miles) throughout Edwards' 29 seasons as head coach, and now BYU's football stadium is branded with a namesake worth a lifetime of amazing stories. Since 1972 the Cougars have won 20 conference championships, a national championship in 1984 and 23 postseason appearances.

1972 LaVell Edwards, defensive coordinator for the Cougars, is named head coach in January... had been a member of the BYU staff since 1962... halfback Pete Van Valkenburg wins NCAA rushing title beating out All-Americans Greg Pruitt and Otis Armstrong with a 138.6 yards-per-game average... the Cougars also lead the league in defense against the rush.

1973 The Cougars begin to move offensively... quarterback Gary Sheide is runner-up in NCAA passing and third in total offense... teammate Jay Miller leads the nation in pass receiving (100 receptions for 1,181 yards)... Cougars finish second nationally in passing and eighth in total offense... Miller sets an NCAA record for most pass receptions (22) in one game... running back Steve Stratton is named the first Academic All-American in school history.



1974 Team ranks high in two NCAA statistical categories: seventh in passing offense, third in rushing defense... Gary Sheide is runner-up in passing for the second year in a row (behind Steve Bartkowski of California) ... Sheide's career completion percentage is fourth all-time.. Bartkowski's final pass completion edged Sheide (182-181) for title... LaVell wins first WAC championship and a trip to the Fiesta Bowl against Oklahoma St.—BYU's first bowl.

1975 A year of adjustment: the Cougars falter through the first part of the season, then win six of their last eight games... Gifford Nielsen, a sophomore reserve, comes off the bench in the fourth game (New Mexico) to spark a come-from-behind victory... Nielsen sets WAC record with 10-of-12 passing... becomes starter... Cougars finish 10th nationally in team passing.

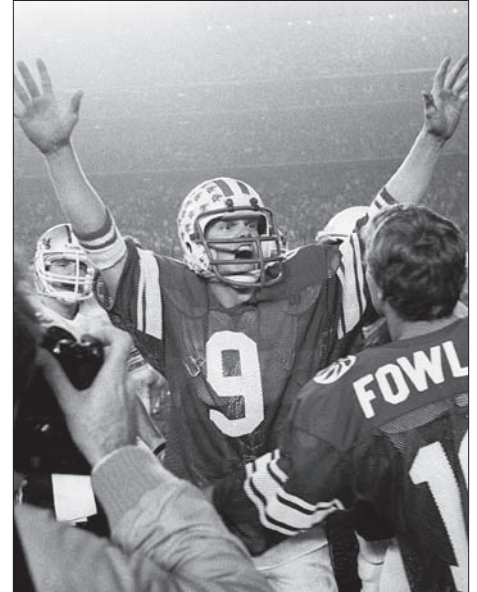
1976 Gifford Nielsen places fourth in NCAA completions per game (18.8) with only one-tenth completion separating him from Jack Thompson (Washington State) in second place... Nielsen finishes second to Tommy Kramer (Rice) in total offense... Cougars finish first in passing (307.8), sixth in total offense (424.4) and eighth in NCAA scoring (31.9)... Nielsen voted first team All-American... BYU ties for WAC title and plays Oklahoma State in the Tangerine Bowl.

1977 Gifford Nielsen unexpectedly exits scene with injury in fourth game (Oregon State) and Marc Wilson takes over... by the end of the year, the two have combined for 40 TD passes, 3,585 yards passing and a .605 completion percentage... Wilson finishes eighth in passing and third in total offense... Cougars lead nation in passing (341.6), finish second in scoring (39.4) and third in total offense (470.2)... BYU's 341.6 yards passing per game was third highest in NCAA history, and 41 TDs was second... Cougars top the nation in takeaways (fumbles recovered or interceptions) with a total of 56... Cougars tie for first in WAC and make a post-season trip to play two Japanese all-star teams.

1978 Both Marc Wilson and sophomore Jim McMahon see action in 10 games as they share quarterback duties... Cougars are eighth in passing and fourth in fumble recoveries... Cougars win the WAC, play their final regular-season game in Yokohama, Japan, against UNLV, and meet Navy in the first Holiday Bowl.

1979 With two all-conference quarterbacks to choose from, Edwards decides to redshirt McMahon and play senior Wilson... Cougars upset Texas A&M in season opener and go on to record 11 straight wins ... Wilson leads the nation in total offense (325.5) and is fourth in pass efficiency (147.1)... finishes the year as consensus All-American with 10 NCAA records to his credit... Cougars lead the nation in four categories: passing (368.3), total offense (521.4), scoring (40.6) and kickoff returns (26.3)... Cougars are 12th in scoring defense (11.4) and sixth in punting (40.1)... BYU becomes first Division I school to pass for more than 4,000 yards in a season... LaVell receives the Bobby Dodd Coach-of-the-Year award... Cougars win the WAC and play Indiana in Holiday Bowl II.

1980 The school's first 12-win season... BYU leads the nation in three statistical categories: total offense (535.0), scoring (46.7) and passing (409.8)... quarterback Jim McMahon is named to the Kodak All-America team along with tackle Nick Eyre... McMahon is the first Division I player to pass for more than 4,000 yards in a season (4,571)... sets or ties 26 NCAA records, most in total offense and pass-

ing... pass efficiency (176.9) was the highest ever... also led the nation in total offense (385.6)... after losing the first game to New Mexico, BYU wins 12 straight ... Cougars win WAC and defeat SMU in Holiday Bowl III by scoring 21 points in the final four minutes.

1981 Another 11-win season for the Cougars... have a 17-game win streak and rank eighth in the polls before losing to Nevada-Las Vegas... BYU leads the nation in passing for the third consecutive year... McMahon earns All-America honors and finishes his career with 70 NCAA records and sets record with all-time high in career pass efficiency (156.9) ... McMahon wins the first Davey O'Brien Award ... Cougars win WAC and play Washington State in Holiday Bowl IV... LaVell coaches West team to a victory in the Hula Bowl... also coaches in the Japan Bowl... Edwards' 86-32-1 record ranks among top 10 in the nation.

1982 BYU expands Cougar Stadium to 65,000 seats and sells out each game... loses home opener to Air Force (39-38) but comes back to win seventh straight WAC title and plays Ohio State in Holiday Bowl V... Gordon Hudson is named consensus All-American... BYU finishes third nationally in total offense... Steve Young is named WAC Offensive Player of the Year.



1983 Another 11-win season... Cougars are ranked seventh in final polls, highest ever for a BYU team... quarterback Steve Young and tight end Gordon Hudson both named consensus All-Americans... after losing to Baylor in the opening game, BYU wins final 11 games... BYU leads the nation in passing and total offense and is second in scoring... Cougars set NCAA total offense record with 584.2 yards per game... BYU wins eighth straight WAC title and defeats Missouri in Holiday Bowl VI... Edwards surpasses the 100-victory milestone... Young wins the Davey O'Brien Award and finishes runner-up for the Heisman.

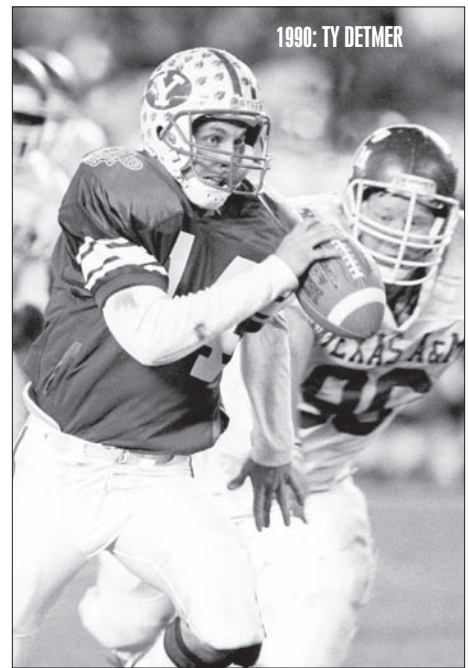
1984 Cougars win the National Championship by becoming only the third team in NCAA history to win 13 games in a season... win streak is extended to 24 games... quarterback Robbie Bosco leads the nation in passing

and finishes second to Doug Flutie in pass efficiency (151.8)... defensive back Kyle Morrell named first team All-American... team leads the nation in passing (346.2) and total offense (486.5)... defensively, Cougars finish 10th in scoring defense... another WAC championship and a victory over Michigan in Holiday Bowl VII... Edwards named NCAA Coach of the Year by most organizations ... Bosco is runner-up for the Davey O'Brien Award and third in the Heisman.

1985 Cougars' defense of the National Championship begins with win over Boston College in the Kickoff Classic... that game plus a bowl and playing at Hawaii allows BYU to become the only collegiate team to play 14 games in a season... defensive tackle Jason Buck is named third team All-American and WAC Defensive Player of the Year... Mark Bellini earns second-team All-America honors... a tie with Air Force for the WAC championship... quarterback Robbie Bosco ranks second in total offense and seventh in pass efficiency... finishes third in the Heisman Trophy balloting... BYU defense ranks 19th against the rush and 18th overall... Cougars lose to Ohio State in the Florida Citrus Bowl and end the season ranked 16th in both polls.

1986 Edwards passes Frank Kush as the winningest coach in WAC football history... Jason Buck becomes only the third player in the Western United States to win the Outland Trophy and is named consensus All-America ... Shawn Knight is also named to several All-American teams ... Lakei Heimuli comes on strong toward the end of the season to break Jeff Blanc's record for career rushing yards... Cougars fail to win WAC championship for the first time in 11 years but post an 8-5 record and play UCLA in the Freedom Bowl.

1987 BYU defense leads the nation with 50 takeaways (28 interceptions and 22 fumble recoveries) with Troy Long getting the most defensive points... after offensive line is decimated



in pre-season camp, Cougars bounce back from 1-2 start to win eight of final nine regular season games... Cougars come within a two-point conversion of another WAC title... Chuck Cutler begins the first of two years as a GTE Academic All-America first teamer... Leonard Chitty sets career records for consecutive conversions (42) and for field goals (34)... Cougars rank ninth nationally in passing offense and 22nd in scoring offense... Cougars win Gridiron Bowl (the final regular-season game against Colorado St.) in Melbourne, Australia, but injuries prove costly in the All American Bowl versus Virginia.

1988 Cougars win seven straight but drop to third in WAC race... punter Pat Thompson named All-America and finishes second nationally while team is first in punting and net punting... behind quarterbacks Sean Covey and Ty Detmer, BYU is fourth in passing, 13th in total offense and 13th in scoring... BYU plays second-ranked Miami even for three quarters... Bob Davis is a finalist for the Butkus Award as the country's top linebacker... 11th straight bowl trip (Freedom Bowl) is 20-17 upset over Colorado.

1989 BYU returns to the top of the WAC after a three-year absence... offensive lineman Mohammed Elewonibi becomes the second BYU player in four years to win the Outland Trophy and is consensus All-American... Bob Davis and Chris Smith are named to several All-American teams ... Fred Whittingham is first team Academic All-America... sophomore Ty Detmer breaks 11 NCAA records and ties two others... Cougars make 12th straight bowl appearance but drop a tough game to Penn State in the Holiday Bowl.

1990 Ty Detmer, a consensus first team All-American, becomes the first player in the Rockies to win the Heisman Trophy... also wins the Davey O'Brien Award... finishes with 5,188 yards passing—the most ever—and increases his NCAA records to 47... Chris Smith also is consensus All-





American and has more reception yards (1,156) than any tight end in history... Andy Boyce gains more yards receiving (1,241) than anyone who has played at BYU... Matt Bellini breaks the career record for catches with 204... BYU shocks the nation by upsetting top-ranked Miami but loses a shot at being number one with a loss at Oregon... BYU wins the WAC and goes to its 13th straight bowl.

1991 Cougars go undefeated in the final 10 games as Ty Detmer finishes his incredible career with 62 NCAA records, including an amazing 15,031 yards passing and a career passing efficiency of 162.7 (nearly five points above Jim McMahon's previous record)... BYU ties seventh-ranked Iowa, 13-13, at the Holiday Bowl, its 14th straight bowl game... Shad Hansen sets a school record with 325 career defensive points... Peter Tuipulotu winds up with the best career rushing average (5.5)... Detmer repeats as the Davey O'Brien Award winner.

1992 Cougars are forced to use three different quarterbacks (and a fourth in the bowl game) but finish fifth nationally in passing and seventh in total offense... 23rd in rushing defense... among the highlights were beating powerful Penn State (30-3 until the closing minutes), a first-ever game against Notre Dame, finally taking the series lead against Utah State and the 19th win by Coach Edwards in 21 games against Utah... Ryan Hancock finishes third in total offense and passing... BYU wins WAC title and goes to the Aloha Bowl...BYU's 15th straight bowl.

1993 BYU ties for the WAC title and goes to the Holiday Bowl (16th straight bowl game), nearly beating Big Ten co-champ Ohio State...Cougars win all four league games in September before injuries hit and team loses four games in October... BYU gains 20th straight non-losing season... team ranks second in passing and ninth in total offense and John Walsh is fifth in total offense and ninth in passing efficiency... freshman Alan Boardman finishes ninth nationally in punting and Eric Drage sets career records for touchdown receptions (29) and yardage (3,066)... BYU's NCAA record of 53-straight games with a touchdown pass ends at CSU, but Cougars extend the nation's longest streak without being shut out to 236 consecutive games.

1994 It's a historic season with victories over Notre Dame and Oklahoma to finish 10th in the final CNN/USA Today poll... five players are drafted, the most ever... Cougars win their first bowl game since 1988... BYU dedicates Copper Bowl effort to graduate assistant coach John Farley, who was sidelined in August with heart trouble and died in December... Cougars are third nationally in passing with John Walsh fifth in total offense... Jamal Willis becomes the all-time leading rusher and breaks the record for touchdowns...David Lauder sets a career record for consecutive PATs with 53.

1995 A first-ever multi-year contract for a BYU coach is given to Edwards... the string of 17 consecutive bowl games comes to an end... Cougars finish number two in NCAA in punt returns at

18.9, while James Dye is number one at 21.9... Steve Sarkisian is the first junior college player since 1973 to start as a BYU quarterback ... BYU finishes in a four-way tie for first in the WAC.

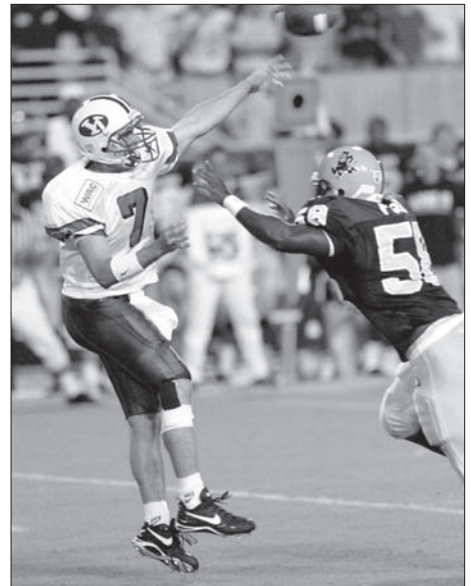
1996BYU completes the longest season in Division I college football history and plays in its first ever New Year's Day bowl game with a 19-15 Cotton Bowl victory over Kansas State... BYU finishes the season with a 14-1 record and a No. 5 national ranking in both polls, its highest ranking since 1984...QB Steve Sarkisian leads the nation in pass efficiency with a 173.6 rating...the Cougars finish sixth in the nation in total offense with 478 yards per game... the defense leads the WAC in rushing yards allowed (124.6), total yards allowed (316.3) and points allowed (18.7)...James Dye finishes second in the nation in punt returns with a 17.6 average...BYU wins the inaugural WAC Championship game with a 28-25 victory over Wyoming in Las Vegas, Nevada...BYU goes undefeated in the WAC, giving LaVell Edwards his 18th career title.

1997BYU finishes fifth in the WAC's Mountain Division with an overall record of 6-5 (4-4 in the WAC)... Cougars fail to receive

a bowl bid for only the second time in 20 years... Drew Miller becomes first ever true freshman to start at quarterback for BYU... starting QB role is never quite locked up as three different quarterbacks see considerable playing time throughout the season... Brian McKenzie becomes only the fourth Cougar to rush for more than 1,000 yards in a season and moves into sixth place on BYU's career rushing list with 1,954 yards.

1998BYU runs up a 7-1 conference record (9-5 overall) to win the WAC Pacific Division title ... The Cougars meet Tulane in their first-ever Liberty Bowl appearance ... BYU's season is highlighted by its defense, ranked No. 5 in the nation, allowing only 91.2 rushing yards and 273.9 total yards per game ... After a slow start, the Cougars won seven games in a row ... Season highlights included a 26-6 thumping of Arizona State, a 13-0 shutout of San Diego State and a 26-24 victory over Utah ... Rob Morris, John Tait, Brian Gray and Daren Yancey were all named to the All-WAC first team ... John Tait was selected in the first round of the NFL Draft (14th overall) by the Kansas City Chiefs ... Sophomore kicker Owen Pochman set a school record by connecting on 62 consecutive PATs.

1999 Won the first-ever Mountain West Conference Championship with an 8-4 season record (5-2 conf.) ... A 27-20 win over Air Force marks LaVell Edwards' 250th victory as head coach of the Cougars ... junior kicker Owen Pochman becomes the school's all-time leading scorer, picking up 90 points on the season to give him a career total 247 ... a six-game winning streak in the middle of the season has BYU ranked as high as No. 12 in the *USAToday/CNN Coaches' Poll* ... running back Luke Staley is named Freshman All-American and conference Freshman of the Year, leading the nation's freshmen in scoring average with 78 points in eight games ... Rob Morris returns from a four-game absence to earn All-America status ... Morris is picked in the first round with the 28th overall pick by the Indianapolis Colts ... The Cougars finish the season ranked first in the conference in total offense and rushing defense, as well as eighth in the nation in passing offense and 14th in the nation in rushing defense ... BYU makes its first-ever Motor City Bowl appearance against Marshall ... Edwards concludes the season with his 20th career conference title and 22nd bowl appearance in 28 years.

2000 BYU won its last two games, including a memorable thriller at Utah, to send coach LaVell Edwards out with a 6-6 record in his 29th and final year as a head coach...Playing one of its toughest schedules in history, the Cougars played Mississippi State, Syracuse, Virginia and national power Florida State in the Kickoff Classic...Against Utah, BYU trailed by one point but went 80 yards on nine plays, including two dramatic passes from quarterback Brandon Doman to wide receiver Jonathan Pittman, for the come-from-behind victory...Owen Pochman, Setema Gali, Jr., Justin Ena and Aaron Edmonds were all named to the All-Mountain West Conference first team... Pochman and Tevita Ofahengaue are both selected in the NFL draft with Ofahengaue being "Mr. Irrelevant" as the last player selected in the draft.

2001 In his first season after taking over the BYU football program Gary Crowton led the Cougars to 12 consecutive victories and an outright Mountain West Conference title thanks to a dramatic come-from-behind victory over rival Utah in Provo

... Luke Staley was named a consensus All-American and became BYU's first Doak Walker Award winner for the nation's top running back ... Staley led the nation in scoring at 15.45 points per game and was third nationally in rushing at 143.82 yards per game ... The Cougars led the nation in scoring offense with 46.77 points per game and in total offense with 542.85 yards per game ... BYU was the first MWC school to go undefeated in conference games and boasted eight players being named as first-team all-league ...

Staley was named Offensive Player of the Year in the Conference and set BYU single-season records for points scored, touchdowns scored and rushing yards ... injuries took Staley out of the Cougars final two games which resulted in loses at Hawaii and in the Liberty Bowl against Louisville ... BYU climbed the national polls to as high as No. 7 on Nov. 25th and finished the season ranked No. 24 in both polls ... First-Team All-MWC defensive end Ryan Denney was named to the Academic All-America team and was drafted in the second round by the Buffalo Bills ... All-MWC tight end Doug Jolley was also selected in the second round of the 2002 NFL draft by the Oakland Raiders.

2002 For the first time since 1973 the Cougars finished the regular-season with a sub-.500 record ... coincidentally, the '73 season was the second under legendary coach LaVell Edwards ... his replacement, Gary Crowton, just completed his second season at BYU...for the first time in the four-season history of the MWC, BYU failed to win a conference road game, going 0-3 ... the Cougars combined to post a 9-2 conference road mark through the league's first three seasons ... Matt Berry was the first redshirt freshman quarterback to start at BYU since Ty Detmer in 1988...Brady Poppinga led the MWC with eight sacks for minus 52 yards ... Matt Payne led the country with a punting average of 47.6 yards.

2003 BYU posted back-to-back losing seasons for the first time since 1970-71 before LaVell Edwards took over the reigns of the program ... John Beck became only the second true-freshman to start at quarterback for BYU when he started against Stanford ... Running back Reynaldo Brathwaite recorded the longest run from scrimmage in Cougar history, a 95-yard score against San Diego State ... Freshman tight end Daniel Coats was named to *The Sporting News* Freshman All-America team after posting 30 receptions for 378 yards and four touchdowns...The Cougars' NCAA-record scoring steak ended at 361 after being shut out 3-0 against Utah in the final game of the season. The last time BYU was shut out was when Arizona State blanked the Cougars 20-0 on September 27, 1975.

2004 BYU posted its third-consecutive losing season, the longest such streak since the Cougars were sub-.500 from 1959-64 ... Despite the losing 5-6 record, BYU finished third place in the Mountain West Conference at 4-3 ... The Cougars' schedule was one of the most difficult in team history, including games against Notre Dame, the defending national champions USC, then-undefeated Boise State and an undefeated University of Utah team ... John Beck and newcomer receivers Todd Watkins and Austin Collie combined to create one of the most potent passing attacks in the league ... Beck threw for 2,563 yards while Watkins, a transfer from Grossmont Junior College caught 52 passes for 1,042 yards and six touchdowns ... Collie, a true freshman, caught a team-high 53 passes for 771 yards and eight touchdowns ... Matt Payne finished his career as second on BYU's all-time scoring list with 312 and set an NCAA record for most consecutive field goals between 40-49 at 14, dating back to the 2002 season ... he also set the school record for most consecutive PATS with 67, dating back to 2002 ... Gary Crowton resigned at the end of the season and replaced by Bronco Mendenhall.

2005 Under the direction of first-year coach Bronco Mendenhall, the Cougars were 6-5 overall in the regular season and finished tied for second in the Mountain West Conference at 5-3 ... BYU earned an invitation to the Pioneer PureVision Las Vegas Bowl and played California ... The Cougars fell to California, 35-28 ... Mendenhall revamped the coaching staff prior to the season, adding Robert Anae (offensive coordinator), Brandon Doman (quarterbacks coach) and Patrick Higgins (wide receivers coach) ... BYU also switched back to the traditional uniforms, while maintaining the navy blue, worn by all of the great BYU teams with the traditional Y logo on the helmets ... John Beck, Jonny Harline and Curtis Brown led an offensive attack that was BYU's most potent since 2001, averaging 33.0 points per game (second in the MWC and 24th in the nation) and 462.4 yards of total offense per game ... Beck led the conference and was fifth in the nation in passing yards (309.1 per game) and led the conference in touchdown passes (27) ... Brown also added six 100-yard rushing games to give him 11 for his career, the most in BYU history ... Harline led the team and ranked among the top tight ends in the nation with 63 receptions for 853 yards and five touchdowns ... Beck, Brown and Harline were all named to the All-MWC First Team Cameron Jensen led the team in tackles for the second-consecutive year by recording 84.

2006 BYU knocked off 10 straight opponents, over the final three months to finish the 2006 season with an 11-2 record ... The Cougars tallied a perfect clip against league opponents to win their first outright Mountain West Conference Championship since the 2001 season ... BYU went on to dismantle Oregon, 38-8, in the Pioneer PureVision Las Vegas Bowl ... The Cougars' 10-game win streak marked the longest since the 2001 season and only the seventh time in the program's history the Cougars have had nine or more consecutive wins in a single season ... BYU earned top-20 rankings in the Associated Press Top-25, the USA Today Coaches Poll, the Harris Interactive Poll and the BCS rankings ... With an impressive win over the Ducks in the Las Vegas Bowl, national

voters ranked BYU No. 15 in the final poll of the season ... Under head coach Bronco Mendenhall—the Mountain West Conference and AFCA Region 5 Coach of the Year—the Cougars led the MWC and ranked fourth in the nation in passing offense, averaging 323.5 yards per game during the regular season. The Cougars also led the league and ranked fourth in the country in total offense, producing an average 465.5 yards per contest. BYU also led the Mountain West and ranked fifth nationally in scoring offense, averaging 36.8 points per game. The BYU offense finished the regular season ranked second nationally in passing efficiency, posting a rating of

167.08 ... Defensively, the Cougars ranked fourth nationally and led the league in turnover margin, averaging +1.08 turnovers per game. BYU also made tremendous strides defensively, ranking 16th in the nation in pass efficiency defense (106.23) and 10th nationally in scoring defense, allowing just 14.7 points per game ... BYU outscored its opponents during the regular season by an average 36.8 to 14.7 (+22.1). More impressively, the Cougars posted 138 first-quarter points and held opponents to just 15 points in the opening quarter of play throughout the season. After finishing 3-3 in Provo last season, the Cougars registered a perfect 6-0 record at home in 2006. Not only did the 2006 Cougars finish the season as the most dominant home team in the nation, but also they finished as the most dominant home team in BYU Football history. BYU averaged 47.2 points per game at LaVell Edwards Stadium while holding opponents to just 12.0 points per contest. The +35.16 margin not only led the nation in home scoring margin, but also set a new BYU record, eclipsing the old mark of +34.2 set in 1979. LSU finished the season behind the Cougars in 2006, posting a +31.9 home-field scoring margin.

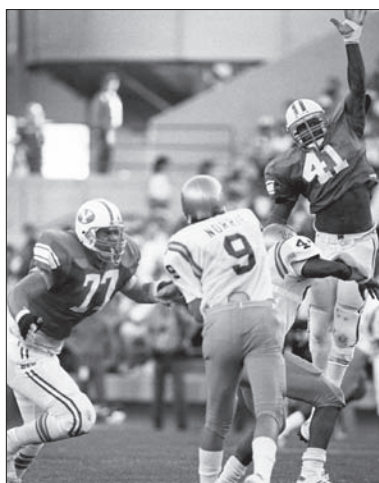
2007 Head coach Bronco Mendenhall led the 2007 BYU team to its second-straight outright Mountain West title behind another perfect 8-0 MWC season ... BYU's second straight 11-win season was capped with a No. 14 national ranking in both the Associated Press Top-25 and USA Today Coaches Poll ... The season marked the highest finish for the Cougars in the national polls since 1996 ... Behind the arm of All-MWC sophomore quarterback Max Hall and the legs of Freshman All-American Harvey Unga, BYU's all-time leading freshman running back, the Cougars are the only team in Mountain West Conference history to win back-to-back outright league titles and to record back-to-back undefeated league records ... To go along with their 16-game conference win streak, the Cougars boast the nation's longest overall winning streak at 10 games and have won 21 of their last 23 games ... Over the past two seasons, the Cougars have not lost a single home game or a MWC game ... BYU reached its second consecutive Las Vegas Bowl victory, 17-16, in dramatic fashion -- with a block on UCLA's potential game-winning field goal attempt as time expired ... Mendenhall is the first coach in school history to lead the Cougars to three consecutive bowl games in his first three years as head coach ... Hall, in his first year as a starter, put in the fourth best performance by a first-year quarterback at BYU to date and was the nation's top sophomore quarterback in terms of passing yards ... As the nation's 10th ranked defense, the Cougars allowed just 307.2 yards per game, allowing only one 100-yard rusher all season ... Unga picked up Freshman All-America and MWC Freshman-of-the-Year honors after leading the Cougars with an average of 94.4 yards per game ... Defensive lineman Jan Jorgenson ranked ninth nationally with 13.5 sacks on the season.

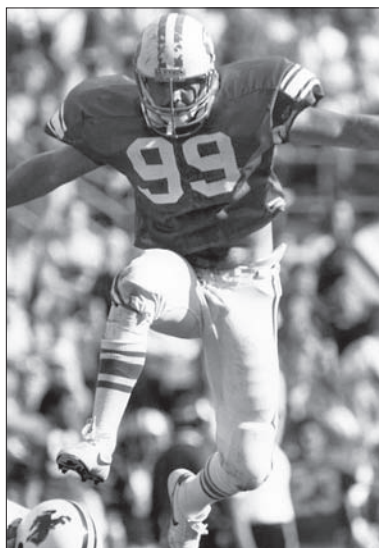

BYU'S NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP

After posting a perfect 13-0 season, the Cougars were awarded gold national championship rings after winning the 1984 National Championship.

The Cougars were named No. 1 by the *Associated Press*, the *United Press International*, *Sports Illustrated*, *CNN-USA Today* and the Football Writers of America. They won the Grantland Rice Trophy and the MacArthur Bowl. LaVell Edwards was selected as the NCAA National Coach of the Year and was invited to visit President Ronald Reagan in the White House.

The dream season featured plays like wide receiver Adam Haysbert's deep touchdown catch at third-ranked Pittsburgh, safety Kyle Morrell's timed leap over the center on a goal-line stand at Hawaii, tight end David Mill's catch with a clouded eye against Wyoming and running back Kelly Smith's winning TD catch against Michigan, who had been ranked second earlier in the season.

With a TV blimp in the sky over Jack Murphy Stadium, junior quarterback Robbie Bosco left the Holiday Bowl in the second quarter with an ankle injury and returned taped to play shotgun late in the second quarter. The 24-17 victory over Michigan was the first time a No. 1 team played in a non-New Year's Day bowl. Other injuries throughout the season were offensive lineman Craig Kozlowski, who came through time and again.

The Cougars ascended to the number one spot on Nov. 17 following a 24-14 victory at Utah combined with a Nebraska loss to Oklahoma and a Navy upset over unbeaten and then second-ranked South Carolina.

The Cougars rose from no ranking to 12th, sixth, fourth, down to eighth, to fifth for two weeks, back to fourth, then third, back to fourth, again to third and then first in the 1984 campaign. Baylor Coach Grant Teaff, whose team lost at BYU 47-13, in game two, was the first to cast a No. 1 vote for the Cougars.

Controversy was abundant as many of the so-called experts such as NBC announcer Bryant Gumbell and Oklahoma head coach Barry Switzer, accused BYU of playing a "Bo-Diddley Tech" schedule.

Fifteen players from the 1984 team were drafted by the National Football League. Seven different teams held the No. 1 spot in 1984, but in the end it belonged to undefeated BYU.

TY DETMER: 1990 HEISMAN TROPHY WINNER

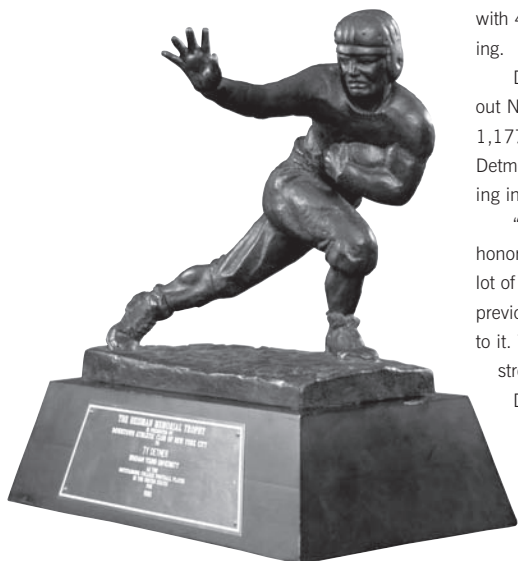

On December 1, 1990, Ty Detmer and his teammates gathered pool-side at the Princess Kaiulani Hotel just hours prior to kickoff with Hawaii. Via satellite hookup with national TV, Detmer and the BYU faithful waited patiently and listened as Downtown Athletic Club President C. Peter Lambos announced, “Ty Detmer, Ty Detmer of BYU,” — soon Ty was doused in the pool.

Detmer, a junior, became the first collegian from the Rockies to win the



Heisman Trophy. Named in honor of John Heisman, the coveted 25-pound honor has been awarded annually to the outstanding college football player of the year since 1935.

A 28-21 upset over No. 1-ranked Miami in Provo vaulted Detmer to the forefront in the Heisman race his junior season. Combined with a massive public relations “necktie” campaign for Ty, the 6-0, 175, gunslinger from San Antonio, Texas, guided BYU to a Holiday Bowl berth that season and a 10-3 record with 41 touchdowns and 5,188 yards passing.

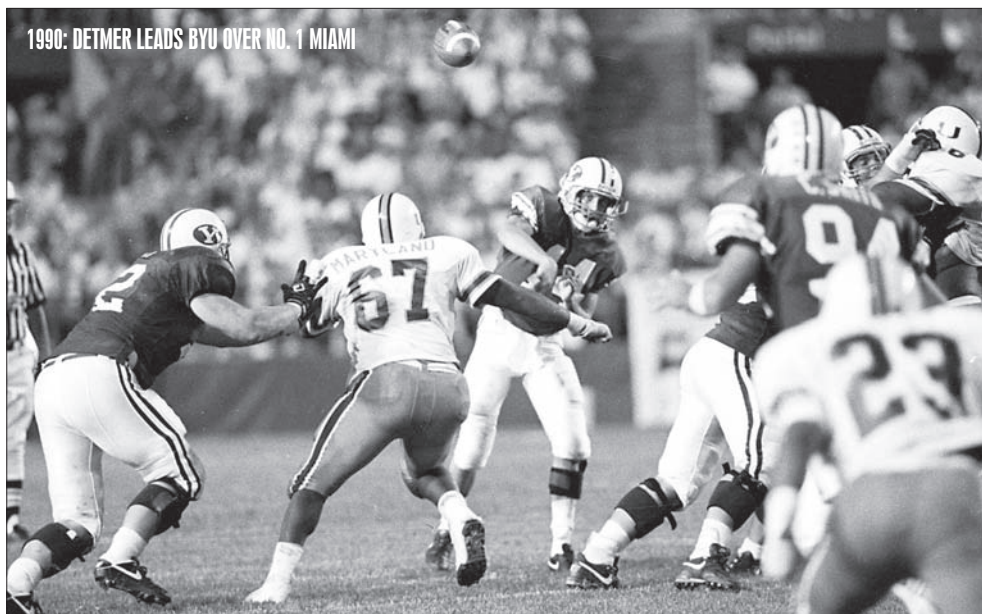
Detmer polled 1,482 points to beat out Notre Dame’s Raghib “Rocket” Ismail at 1,177 and finished first in all six regions. Detmer finished third in the Heisman ballot in 1991.

“Winning the Heisman was a great honor,” said Detmer. “There have been a lot of great players, like my teammates and previous BYU quarterbacks, that contributed to it. They opened the door. It shows the strength of the program at BYU.”

Detmer’s portrait hangs alongside other recipients on the third floor of the DAC of New York City. A duplicate portrait of Detmer also hangs on display in the Cougar Room of LaVell Edwards Stadium.



1990: DETMER LEADS BYU OVER NO. 1 MIAMI

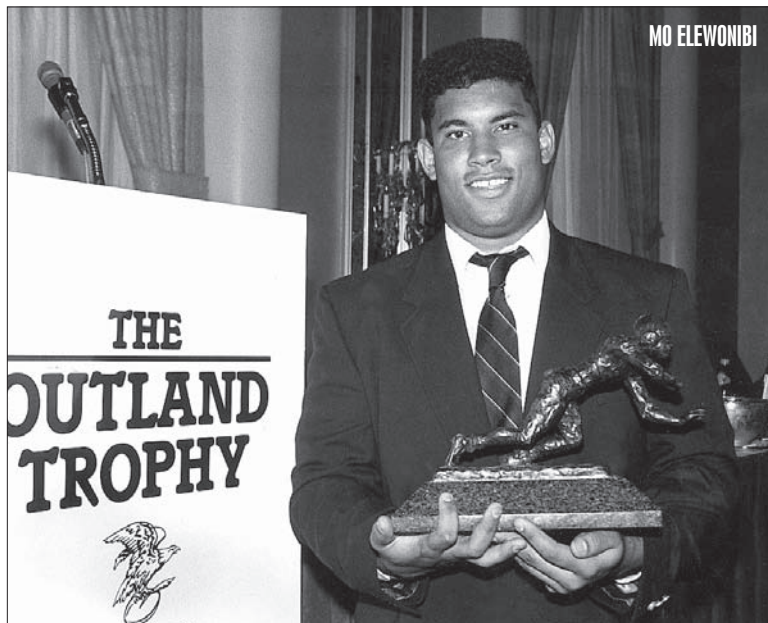

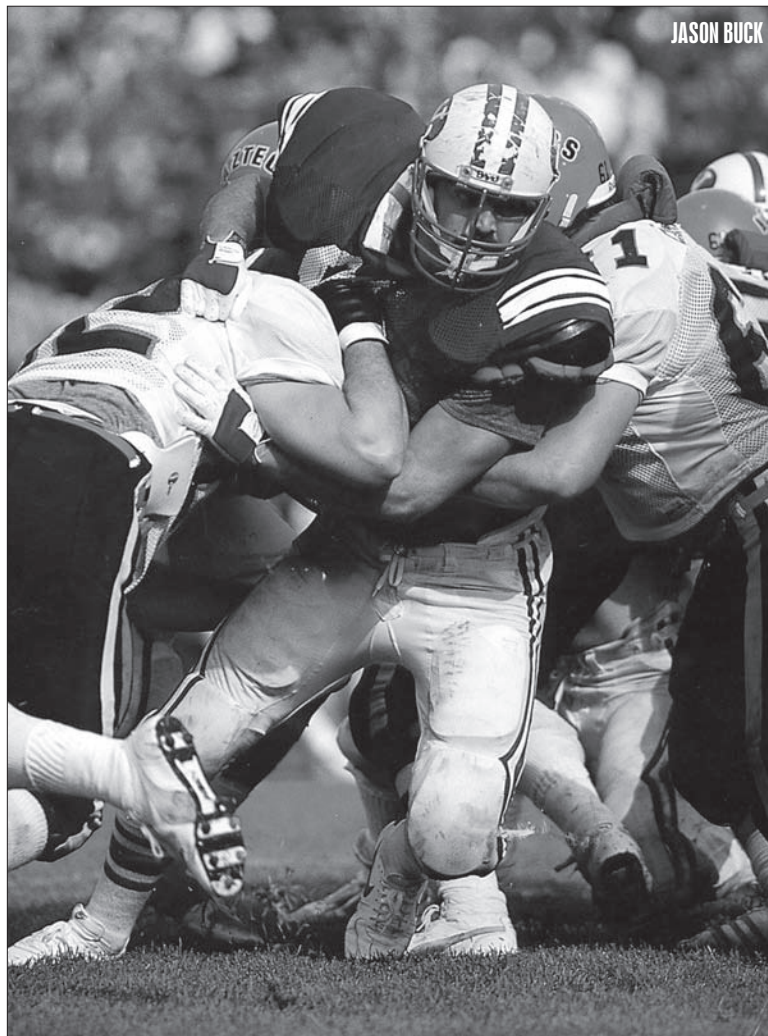

BYU'S TWO OUTLAND TROPHY WINNERS



BYU is one of only 11 schools to have two Outland Trophy winners, joining the likes of Notre Dame, Ohio State, Nebraska, Oklahoma and Texas.



JASON BUCK • 1986

Transfers Jason Buck, a defensive tackle, and Mohammed Elewonibi, an offensive guard, won the Outland in 1986 and 1989, respectively.

Buck, a 6-6, 270-pound senior from St. Anthony, Idaho, was a quarterback going into junior college at Ricks College. Buck led the 1986 Cougars with 218.5 defensive points and registered 26 unassisted tackles, 33 assisted tackles, 13 tackles for losses, 17 quarterback hurries and 12.5 sacks.

Buck rode a publicity campaign of "One Buck" dollar bills in leading BYU to an 8-5 record and a berth in the Freedom Bowl in 1986.

"For me it was just a thrill to be on the field every Saturday at BYU," said Buck. "To win the Outland Trophy was a dream come true."

MOHAMMED ELEWONIBI • 1989

Mohammed Elewonibi, a 6-5, 290, senior from British Columbia, Canada, spent his childhood in his native Nigeria and didn't play football until after high school, at Snow Junior College. "Mount Mohammed" led BYU to a 10-3 record, a berth in the Holiday Bowl in 1989 and graded out four times with perfect pass protection as a senior.

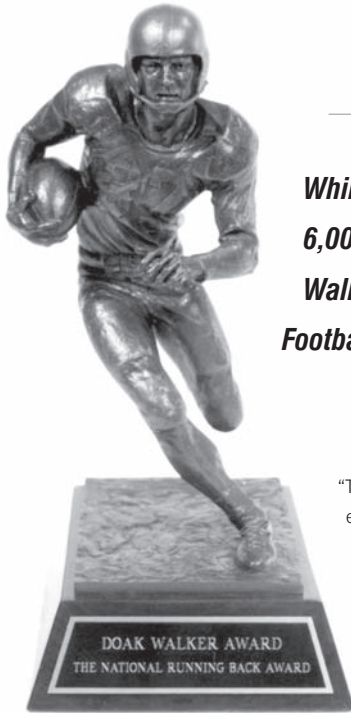
The Outland Trophy honors the outstanding interior lineman in the nation and was first presented in 1946 by the Football Writers Association of America.

The award is named for its benefactor, Dr. John H. Outland.

Two of BYU's greatest interior linemen, Mohammed Elewonibi (top left), an offensive guard, and Jason Buck (bottom left), a defensive tackle, earned the Outland Trophy award. Elewonibi won the award in 1989 because of his outstanding protection of future Heisman Trophy winner Ty Detmer. In 1986, Buck, an amazing pass rusher, anchored one of BYU's strongest defensive teams ever. Both players went onto successful professional careers in the NFL.



LUKE STALEY • 2001 DOAK WALKER AWARD WINNER



While his teammates and coaches were watching in their hotel rooms from Hawaii, over 6,000 miles away, BYU running back Luke Staley was named the winner of the 2001 Doak Walker Award. The annual award, which was presented on the ESPN Home Depot College Football Awards Show from Orlando, Fla., is presented to college football's top running back.

"This is a great honor," Staley said. "I can't express how grateful I am for my family, my teammates, my coach - everyone who made this possible."

In addition to winning the Doak Walker Award, Staley was also named as a first-team member of the prestigious Walter Camp Foundation All-America Team. Staley is the first BYU consensus All-American since

Ty Detmer was twice selected in 1990 and 1991. In addition to the Walter Camp Foundation All-America team, Staley was named a first-team All-American by the American Football Coaches Association, Football Writers Association of America, the Associated Press, The Sporting News, Football News and CNSI—just to name a few.

"We're very proud of Luke and all his accomplishments," BYU head coach Gary Crowton said. "Since we started this season back in August, we have been telling these guys to work hard, stay focused and great things will happen. This award, although presented to Luke, is a tribute to the hard work and commitment each and every player and coach has made this season. Luke is probably one of the best examples we have had, in terms of working hard and staying focused. This is a great tribute for a great athlete, a great teammate and a great young man. We couldn't be more proud of him."

Staley, from Tualatin, Ore., led the nation in scoring (15.5 p/game), yards per

carry (8.1 y/carry) and finished the 2001 season ranked third in the nation in rushing, averaging 143.8 yards per game. He helped pace the Cougars to a 12-2 record on the season, scoring a BYU single-season record 28 touchdowns. Staley also racked up a BYU single-season record 1,582 yards rushing on the season.

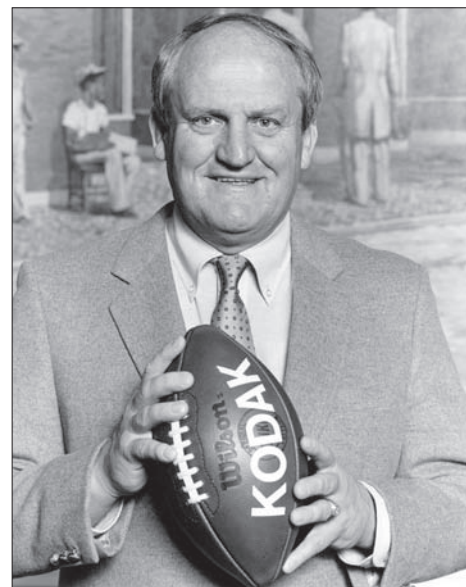
Legendary Cougar coach LaVell Edwards has twice been recognized as one the greatest coaches in college football. The sixth-winningest coach in NCAA football history earned the Bobby Dodd Coach of the Year Award in 1979 and the Kodak Coach of the Year Award in 1984.

Along with his teams' successes during his coaching tenure, LaVell Edwards accumulated many personal accolades to match. Edwards' first national recognition for his coaching prowess came in 1979 when he was honored with the Bobby Dodd Coach of the Year Award. A panel of 11 former college football coaches selected the BYU coach. On the heels of BYU's first national championship five years later, Edwards' coach-

ing peers honored him with what he then called his greatest personal accolade, the Kodak Coach of the Year Award.

As successful as his teams were on the field, Edwards' coaching philosophy did not reflect a win-at-all-costs mentality. He didn't bark orders or rule the sideline with an iron fist. Generally, the assistant coaches were delegated the duty of handling the Xs and Os while he saw to the administrative tasks of the program. His personal demeanor also gave him the ability to relate well with his players whether teaching them about football or other more personal matters.

"Just seeing how he handles himself with the media and with people in general ... he's always genuine with them.



He treats everybody well." Former BYU quarterback and current BYU athletic administrator Robbie Bosco said. "Those are the things he'll leave with me, more than winning football games."

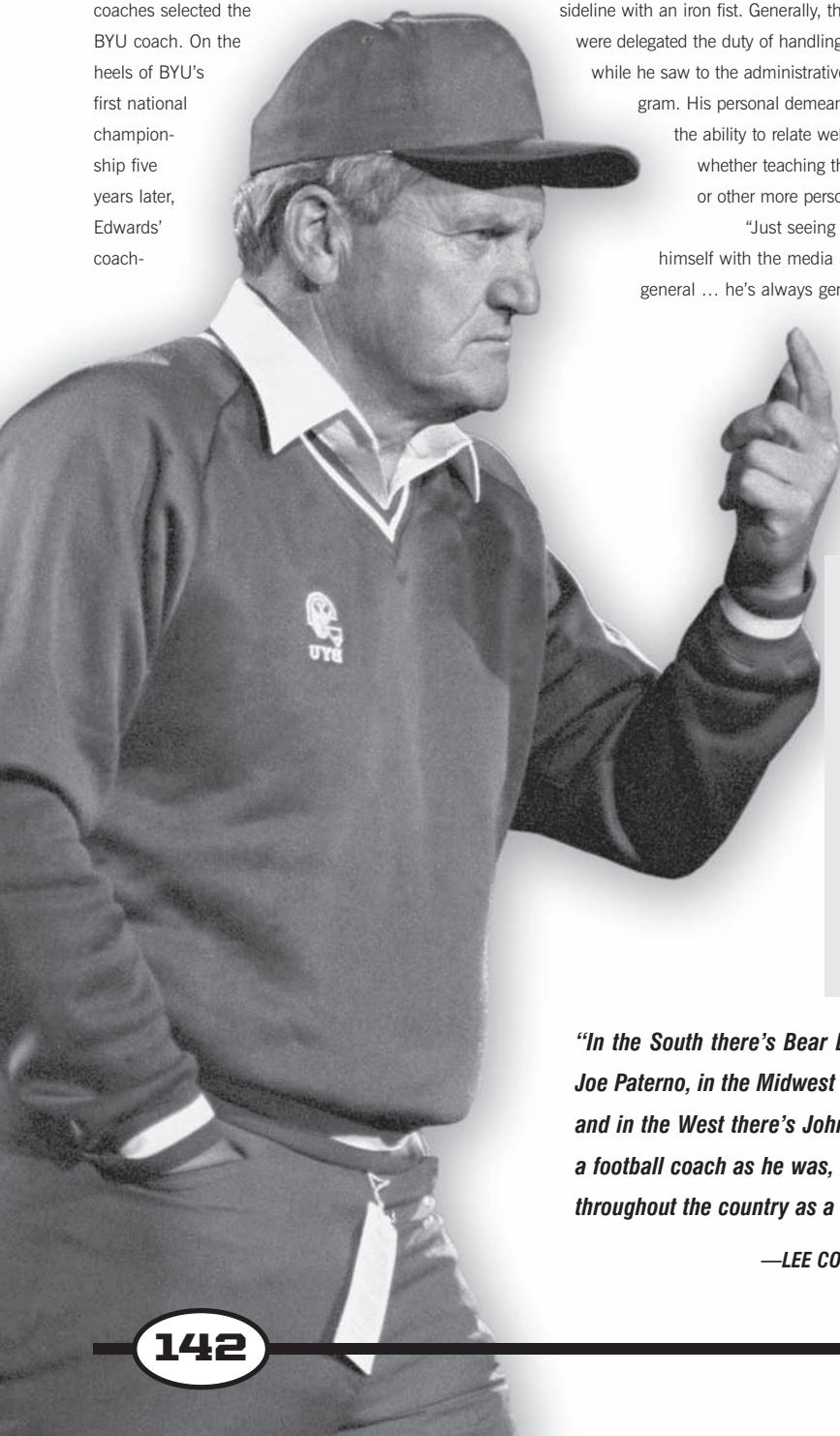

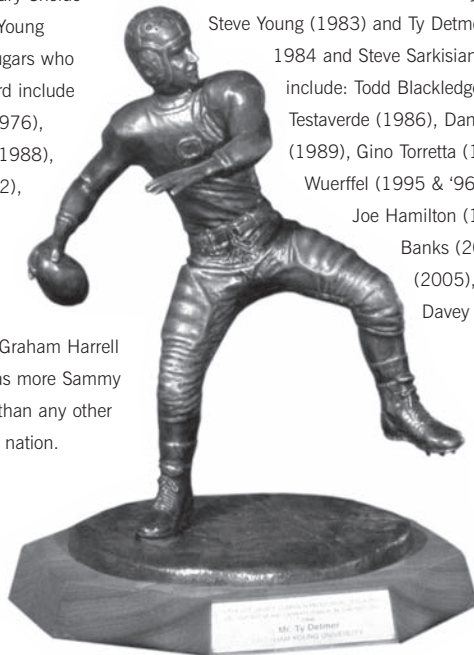
SAMMY BAUGH TROPHY

On February 21, 1997, Steve Sarkisian became the **seventh** BYU quarterback in the past 22 years to win the prestigious Sammy Baugh Trophy. Presented each year by the Touchdown Club of Columbus, the Sammy Baugh Award recognizes the college passer of the year. In winning, Sarkisian joined Gary Sheide (1974), Marc Wilson (1979), Jim McMahon (1981), Steve Young (1983), Robbie Bosco (1984) and Ty Detmer (1991) as Cougars who have won the award. Other notables who have won the award include Bob Griese (1966), Don Strock (1972), Tommy Krammer (1976), John Elway (1982), Vinny Testaverde (1986), Steve Walsh (1988), Jeff George (1989), David Klingler (1990), Elvis Grbac (1992), Trent Dilfer (1993), Kerry Collins (1994), Danny Wuerffel (1995), Ryan Leaf (1997), Daunte Culpepper (1998), Chad Pennington (1999), Chris Weinke (2000), David Carr (2001), Kliff Kingsbury (2002), B.J. THE DAVEY O'BRIEN AWARD

In 1981, the Davey O'Brien Educational and Charitable Trust of Fort Worth, Texas, named Jim McMahon the first recipient of the annual Davey O'Brien National Quarterback Award — honoring the nation's best quarterback. BYU quarterbacks have won the Davey O'Brien Award four times — more than any other school. In addition to winners McMahon (1981), Steve Young (1983) and Ty Detmer (1990 & '91), Robbie Bosco finished runner-up in 1984 and Steve Sarkisian finished third in 1996. Others who have won the award include: Todd Blackledge (1982), Doug Flutie (1984), Chuck Long (1985), Vinny Testaverde (1986), Dan McPherson (1987), Troy Aikman (1988), Andre Ware (1989), Gino Torretta (1992), Charlie Ward (1993), Kerry Collins (1994), Danny Wuerffel (1995 & '96), Peyton Manning (1997), Michael Bishop (1998), Joe Hamilton (1999), Chris Weinke (2000), Eric Crouch (2001), Brad Banks (2002), Jason White (2003 and 2004), Vince Young (2005), Troy Smith (2006), Tim Tebow (2007). STEVE SARKISIAN SPOTLIGHT: After tutoring a Heisman Trophy winner (Carson Palmer) and winning a national championship at USC, the former Sammy Baugh Trophy winner and BYU signal caller continues to excel in the football world. In 2004 he was the quarterbacks coach for the NFL's Oakland Raiders before returning to USC as the offensive coordinator, replacing former BYU assistant Norm Chow. While at BYU, Sarkisian had a record-setting two-year (1995-96) career. Sarkisian completed 549-of-824 passes (66.6 percent) for 7,755 yards and 55 TDs in his career. As a senior in 1996, he led the nation in passing efficiency (173.6, the seventh best mark ever) as the Western Athletic Conference champion Cougars went 14-1 and won the Cotton Bowl. He was the WAC Offensive Player of the Year in 1996 and a second-team All-American. As a junior, he was All-WAC and led BYU to the WAC title. Against Fresno State that season, he set an NCAA game completion percentage record when he hit 31-of-34 passes (91.2 percent)



EVER SINCE GARY SHEIDE IN 1973, BYU HAS PRODUCED AN ASSEMBLY LINE OF OUTSTANDING QUARTERBACKS IN PROVO THAT HAVE EARNED UNPRECEDENTED SUCCESS IN THE MARKET OF COLLEGE AND PROFESSIONAL FOOTBALL.

Volumes have been written about BYU's passing game and great quarterback tradition. BYU quarterbacks own the NCAA record books and have won the Davey O'Brien award for best quarterback in the nation four times with one runner-up and one third place finish. BYU's quarterback factory has also produced a Heisman Trophy winner in Ty Detmer and many other Heisman Trophy candidates.

Quarterbacks Gifford Nielsen, Marc Wilson, Jim McMahon and Steve Young have been inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame in recent years, and several other BYU quarterbacks will likely be added to the list. In the last 20 years, two different BYU quarterbacks (more than any other school) have led their teams to NFL championships (Jim McMahon and Steve Young).

On seven different occasions, BYU quarterbacks have finished as the NCAA total offense leaders. Three of the top five career passing efficiency leaders are from BYU. In the 29 years Edwards coached at BYU, the Cougars have led the nation in passing eight times and finished in the top five 17 times. In 2006 Mountain West Conference Player of the Year quarterback John Beck was the No. 4 passer in the nation as he helped lead a resurrection of the storied BYU offense of old.

When Edwards was named head coach at BYU in 1972, he realized he couldn't compete initially with the big schools for the big-time athletes. So he installed a passing attack that allowed smaller, less physical-type players to win with finesse, rather than muscle.

The offense worked, and the Cougars began passing the competition. BYU became one of the first universities to use the forward pass consistently and effectively in a time when throwing the football was a mere alternative to running the ball.

The pass has been good to BYU. Prior to Edwards, the program had won a total of 171 games and had only 16 winning seasons. Since 1972, BYU has won or tied for the WAC or MWC championship 20 times, played in 24 post-season bowl games and won the national championship in 1984.

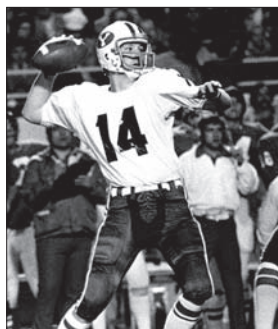

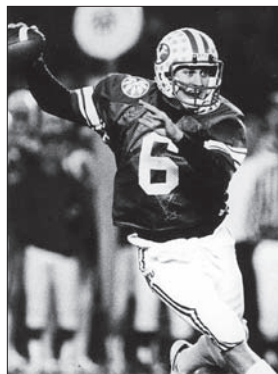

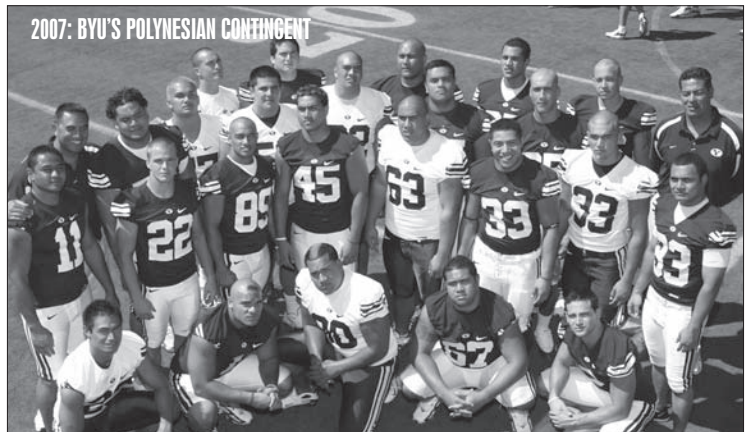
BYU's football program has tapped into the Pacific Islands to find players since 1951 when Harry Bray of Hilo, Hawai'i transferred from Weber College to play for the Cougars. Other Pacific Islanders who followed included: Famika Anae (1954-55; father of current BYU Offensive Coordinator Robert Anae), John Kapele (1957-59), John Kawaa (1962-1963); John Lupoi (1967-1969) and Henry Nawahine (1964-1965). Some of BYU's most celebrated and decorated players have come from the Pacific islands, including All-Americans, national record holders and players who have gone on to compete in the NFL.

Since 1951, over 100 Polynesian players have suited up for BYU, including 23 that will don the blue and white in 2006. The Cougars' Polynesian players have come from Hawaii, Tonga, Samoa and Fiji. Some of the most notable players include Vai Sikahema, the NCAA's career leader in punt returns, All-American and NFL veteran tight end Itula Mili and BYU's second all-time rushing leader Lakei Heimuli. Eight former BYU Polynesian players are currently on NFL rosters.

Of the more than 100 Polynesian players, several rank among the top statistical

leaders in BYU history. Two of the top-10 career rushers are Polynesian as are two of the top-10 leaders in career receiving yards. Since 1982, nine of BYU's season-rushing leaders have been Pacific Islanders.

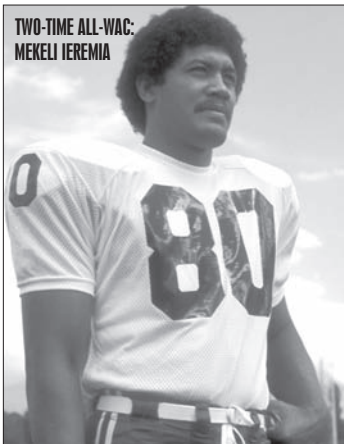

Although known as the Quarterback Factory, BYU signal callers wouldn't make the record books without someone on the receiving end of their throws. With BYU's tradition of wide-open offenses, the tight end position has thrived in its offensive scheme.

Tight ends have thrived in the BYU offensive system for years. Like no other school in the nation, BYU's tight ends have earned unprecedented success as a featured position in BYU's wide-open offense. Over the years, Cougar football has emerged as the home of some of the best pass-catching tight ends in NCAA history. Starting with "Miracle Bowl" hero Clay Brown in 1980, eight BYU tight ends have earned All-American status. Since 1976, 11 Cougar tight ends have received 17 First-Team All-Conference citations. In this decade alone eight different Cougar tight ends have made NFL rosters. Four former Cougars helped lead their teams to the Super Bowl—Doug Jolley with the Oakland Raiders in 2003, Chad Lewis with Philadelphia Eagles in 2005, Itula Mili with Seattle in 2006, and Gabriel Reid with Chicago Bears in 2007. Two former BYU tight ends Todd Christensen and Chad Lewis have been named to several Pro Bowl teams during their successful professional careers. For the past three seasons, tight ends have led the Cougars in receptions and a BYU tight end has been named first team all-conference (Jonny Harline in 2005 and 2006 and Dennis Pitta in 2007). This season BYU continues its storied tight end tradition as the Cougars return a plethora of talent at the position. Junior tight ends Dennis Pitta and Andrew George will once again lead the way for BYU.

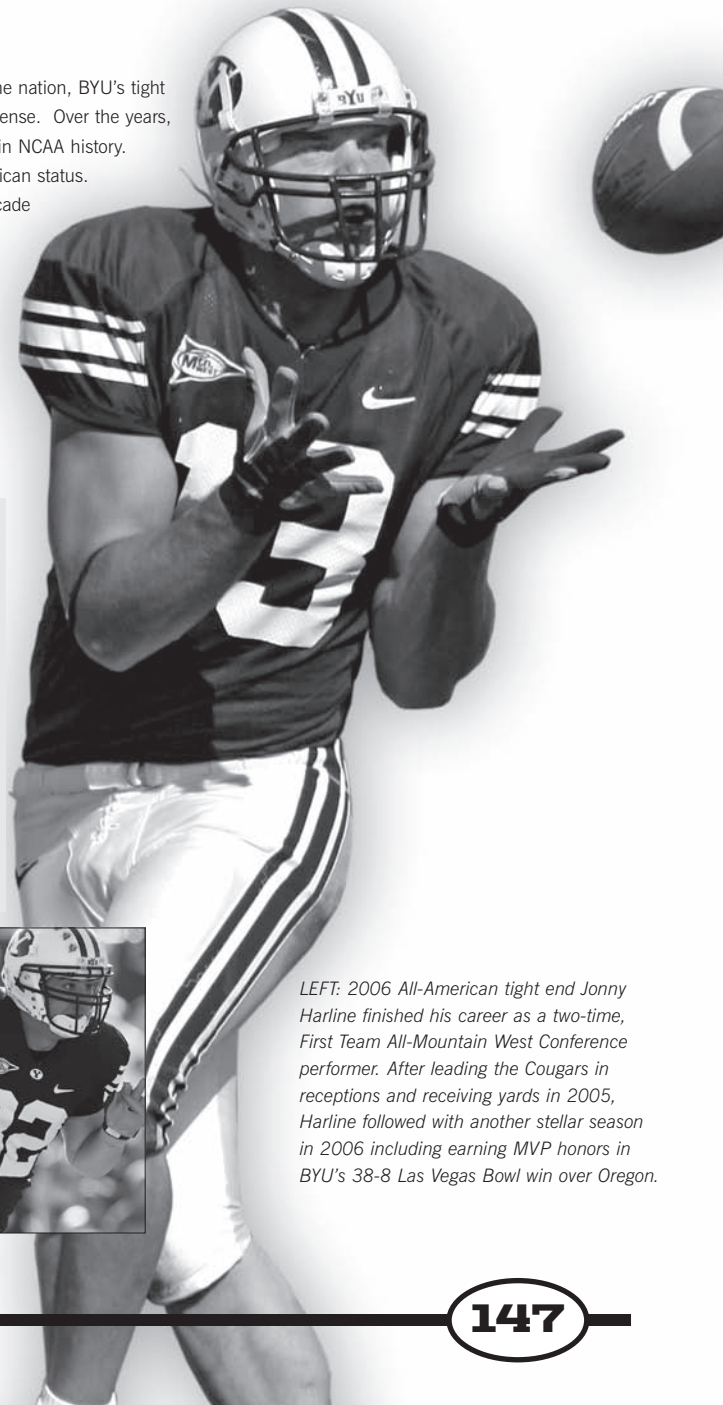

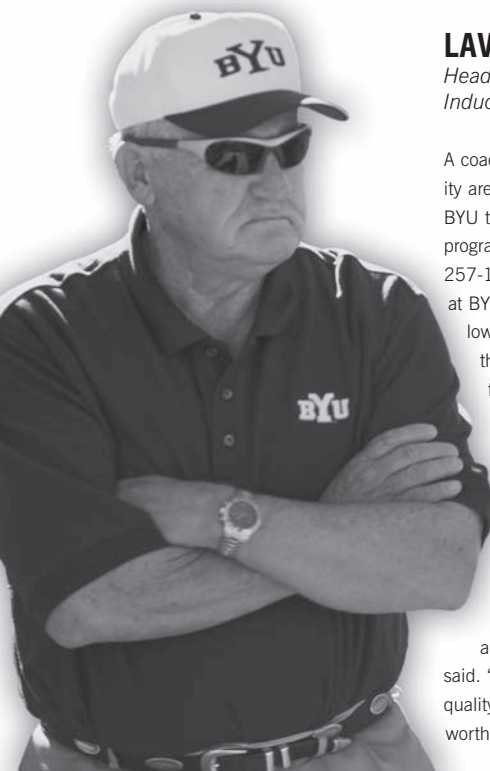

The fifth Cougar to be inducted into this prestigious hall is legendary BYU coach LaVell Edwards. Established in 1947 by the National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame, Inc., the first class was inducted in 1951. In order to be eligible for the Hall of Fame, a nominated player must be out of college at least ten years and a first team All-America selection by a major selector during his career. The voting is done by a 12-member panel made up of athletic directors, conference and bowl officials and media representatives. 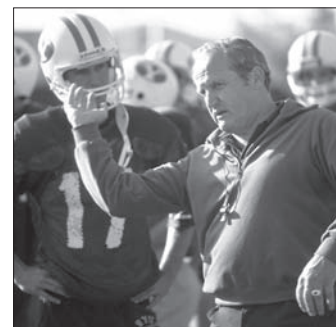
LAVELL EDWARDS

Head Coach: 1972-2000
Inducted: 2004

A coaching icon, whose success and longevity are paralleled by few, Edwards guided BYU to heights never before reached in the program's history. Edwards posted a record of 257-101-3 (.716) over a span of 29 seasons at BYU. From 1972 until his retirement following the 2000 season, Edwards roamed the sidelines at BYU--a tenure that ranks

fifth all-time among coaches at one school. In 20 of those 29 seasons, the Cougars claimed the league title. Guiding BYU to 22 bowl game appearances, including a streak of 17 straight bowl appearances, Edwards reached the pinnacle of coaching success in 1984 by winning the National Championship. His 257 wins rank him sixth in NCAA Division I-A history, and he has more victories than every other coach in BYU history combined. At the helm, Edwards compiled a program best .716 win percentage, coached one Heisman Trophy winner, two Outland Trophy recipients, four Davey O'Brien award winners and 32 All-Americans--not to mention countless players who went on to professional careers in the NFL.

BYU's success didn't come without personal reward for Edwards either. He was named NCAA District 8 Coach of the Year eight times, the Bobby Dodd National Coach of the Year in 1979 and AFCA National Coach of the Year in 1984. Named the State of Utah's Coach of the Century, Edwards is a member of the State of Utah Sports Hall of Fame. "A spectacular choice," Steve Young said. "When you think of the Hall of Fame, you think of longevity, excellence, leadership and quality. In my book, Hall of Fame and LaVell Edwards go hand in hand. He is definitely a worthy recipient of this honor."

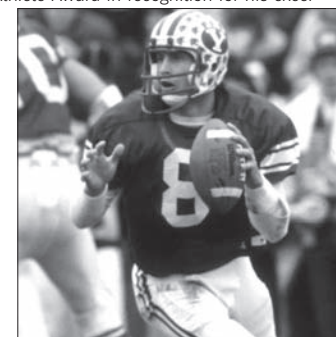
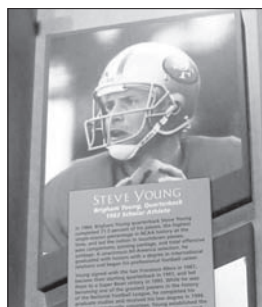
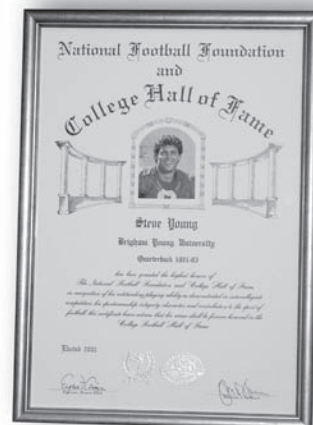

One of the greatest collegiate quarterbacks of all time, Steve Young was consistently at the top of all the nation's statistical categories for quarterbacks en route to setting 13 NCAA records. As a junior, he averaged 318.8 yards per game of total offense, earning All-Western Athletic Conference recognition and Conference Player-of-the-Year honors.

In his senior season, he repeated as a first-team All-WAC selection, completed 306-of-429 pass attempts for an impressive .713 percentage and led BYU to its second straight Holiday Bowl. His .713 completion percentage, 3,902 yards passing, 4,346 yards of total offense and 33 touchdowns all led the nation. Few rival Young's career totals. He completed 592-of-907 attempts for a .653 average, threw for 7,733 yards and 56 touchdowns and his 8,817 yards of total offense in only 31 games is among college football's all-time greatest career numbers.

A unanimous All-American and academic All-WAC selection, Young was the runner-up for the Heisman Trophy and received a National Football Foundation and College Football Hall of Fame Scholar-Athlete Award in recognition for his excellence on the field, in the classroom and in the community -- a tradition he maintains today with the successful Forever Young Foundation.

Young retired after 15 seasons in the NFL, where he earned two MVP awards, seven trips to the Pro Bowl and led the San Francisco 49ers to the Super Bowl Championship in 1995, earning most-valuable-player honors. Young will be inducted into the NFL Hall of Fame in 2005.





JIM MCMAHON

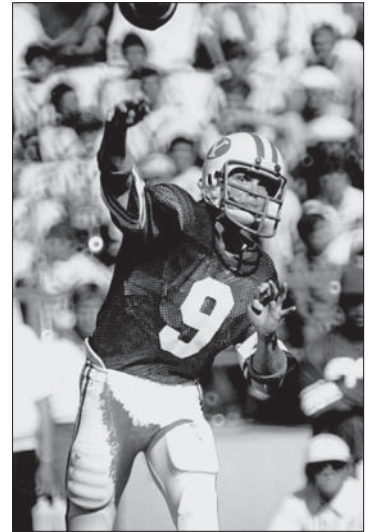

In 1998 Jim McMahon (1977-78, 80-81) joined former BYU quarterbacks Gifford Nielsen and Marc Wilson, who were inducted into the National Football Foundation Collegiate Hall of Fame in 1994 and 1996, respectively.

McMahon set 70 NCAA records at BYU, was a 1981 First Team All-American by Kodak (Coaches), College & Pro Weekly, Associated Press, UPI, Football Writers Association of America, and second team NEA. In 1980 he earned First team All-America from the FWAA. McMahon balloted third place for the Heisman Trophy in 1981 and fifth in 1980. In 1981, he won the Davey O'Brien Trophy, the

Baugh Award, the Utah Sportsman of the Year and the NCAA Co-Offensive Player of the Year with Marcus Allen (Pigskin Club of Wash., D.C.). He led the NCAA in pass efficiency (155.0) and total offense (345.8) in 1981 as well as pass efficiency (176.9) and total offense (385.6) in 1980. He set 29 Western Athletic Conference records and was three-time WAC Player of the Year and first team all-league. He broke 23 school records, was MVP of the 1980 and 1981 Holiday Bowls and has been inducted to the Holiday Bowl Hall of Fame. McMahon passed for 9,536 yards, threw 84 touchdowns and completed 653 of 1,056 passes during his career at BYU.

McMahon played for the Chicago Bears from 1982-88 (1985 Super Bowl Champions, 1985 Pro QB of the Year, and Pro Bowl); San Diego Chargers in 1989; Philadelphia Eagles from 1990-92; Minnesota Vikings in 1993; Arizona Cardinals in 1994; and Green Bay Packers from 1995-96 (1997 Super Bowl Champions).



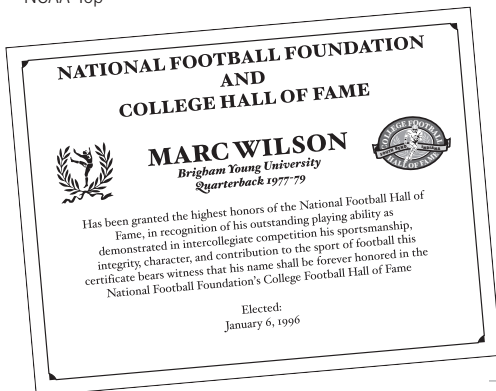
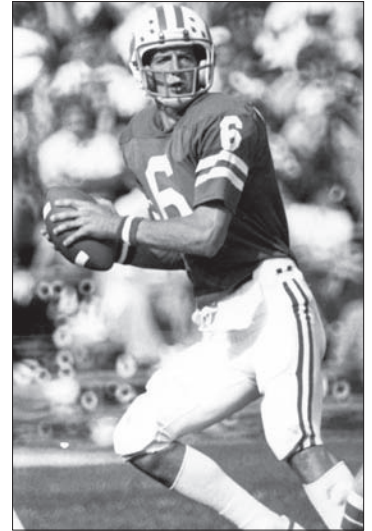
MARC WILSON

Quarterback: 1976-79
Inducted: 1996

One of the most celebrated quarterbacks in Cougar history, Marc Wilson earned consensus All-America honors in 1979 and was inducted into the Hall of Fame on Dec. 10, 1996. In Wilson's first game as a starter, he was 15 of 25 for 332 yards with seven touchdowns in a 63-17 triumph over Colorado State and was consequently named *Sports Illustrated's* Offensive Player of the Week. In Wilson's career at BYU, he set ten NCAA records. The 6-5, 204 pound quarterback ranked fourth in the nation in passing efficiency with a 147.1 rating in 1979. That same year, Wilson finished third in the Heisman balloting, led his team to an undefeated regular season, and was named the Holiday Bowl's Offensive MVP. A true student-athlete, Wilson was the recipient of the

Five Award and its Post Graduate Scholarship. A first round draft pick of the Oakland Raiders, Wilson played eight seasons before finishing his career with the New England Patriots.

Presently, Wilson is a land developer in the North Seattle area. He and his wife, Colleen, live in Woodinville, Washington with their four children.



GIFFORD NIELSEN

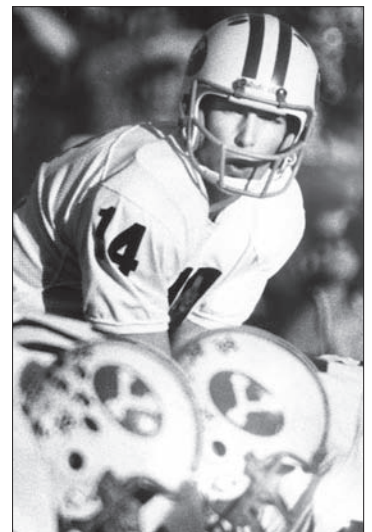

Nicknamed the "Mormon rifle," Gifford Nielsen became BYU's first Hall of Fame inductee in 1994. His prolific passing career began when he came off the bench in the third game of his sophomore season to lead the Cougars to a 16-15 come-from-behind win by completing 10 of 12 passes.

"From that point on," Nielsen said, "everything clicked, and it's just amazing what happened." As a junior, in 1976, Nielsen really made fans sit up and notice. He passed for 3,192 yards and 29 touchdowns, set 13 WAC records and made All-American. Next season promised even more. He threw five touchdown passes against New Mexico, six against Utah State and was twice named Player of the Week. For the first time, a BYU football team was nationally ranked.

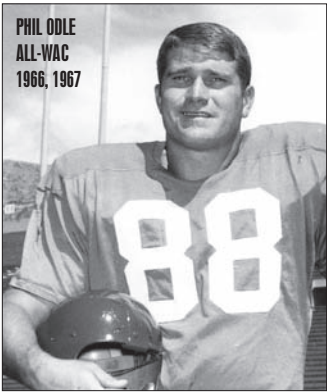
"It was like a little dream world," said Nielsen, a product of Provo High School. "The numbers were just mind-boggling. Everything you could ever dream of as a kid in Provo, Utah, was in the palm of my hand." On Oct. 8, 1977, his season and college career ended when he suffered a serious injury. He left a mark, however. Over three years Nielsen averaged an astounding 243 yards passing per game.

Nielsen played six years with the Houston Oilers and was the last quarterback to lead the Oilers to the AFC finals. He is currently a broadcaster in Houston. He and his wife Wendy have six children.

ELDON FORTIE- Nicknamed "The Phantom," Fortie broke 21 school records and is one of only two players in BYU football history to have his number retired. Rushed for 1,149 yards, an average of 5.8 per carry, and passed for 814 yards in 1962. Holds BYU record for most rushing yards in a game (272).

JAY MILLER- Led the nation in receiving with 100 receptions for 1,181 yards including eight touchdowns. Holds BYU record for most receptions in a game (22) and most receiving yards in a game (263).

WAYNE BAKER- Named second team All-American his senior season when he finished with 82 tackles (67 assisted, 15 solo). He also recorded nine quarterback hurries and 10 quarterback sacks as a senior.

BRAD OATES- He was All-Western Athletic Conference and co-captain his last two seasons at BYU, and was named second team All-American by the Associated Press, the highest honor ever for a BYU football player to that date.

JEFF BLANC- Finished his career as BYU career record holder for career rushes, touchdowns, points scored and most yards rushing. Still holds the record for most career rushes (625). Compiled 984 yards rushing and 10 touchdowns during his junior season when he was named honorable mention All-American by UPI.

ORRIN OLSEN- Started all 11 games. Brother of Merlin and Phil Olsen.

GIFFORD NIELSEN- Nicknamed the "Mormon Rifle," he threw 207 completions for 3,192 yards and 29 touchdown passes. Led nation in touchdown passes, second in total offense, fourth in passing. As a team, the Cougars finished first in passing (307.8), sixth in total offense (424.4) and eighth in NCAA scoring (31.9). 1994 College Football Hall of Fame inductee.

MARC WILSON- Threw 250 completions for 3,720 yards with 29 touchdown passes. Threw seven touchdown passes in first start. Led NCAA in total offense. Ranked fourth in the nation in passing efficiency with a 147.1 rating. 1979 Senior Bowl MVP. Finished third in Heisman voting. Set 10 NCAA records in his career. Winner of Sammy Baugh Trophy as College Passer of the Year. Led team to an undefeated regular season and was named the Holiday Bowl's Offensive MVP. 1996 College Football Hall of Fame inductee.

CLAY BROWN- Made game winning "hail mary" catch in 1980 Holiday Bowl against SMU. Had 1,009 receiving yards in 1980.

NICK EYRE- Nicknamed "The Bear." Was BYU's first consensus All-American lineman. Finished third in the

Outland Trophy voting. Was a three-year starter for 24 consecutive games.

JIM McMAHON- Led nation with 4,571 yards passing including 47 touchdowns in 1980. First Division I player to pass for more than 4,000 yards in a season. Set or tied 26 NCAA records. Led nation in total offense (385.6) and pass efficiency (176.9), which ranks fourth all-time in NCAA history. Finished fifth in Heisman voting. Won first-ever Davey O'Brien Award in 1981. Led nation with 3,555 yards passing including 30 touchdowns. Led the NCAA in pass efficiency (155.0) and total offense (345.8). Finished third in Heisman voting. Finished career with 70 NCAA records. 1998 College Football Hall of Fame inductee.

BART OATES- As a two-year starter on the offensive line, Oates earned Honorable Mention All-WAC in 1981 and All-WAC First Team in 1982. He was also named to the All-District VII team. Oates also enjoyed a successful career in the NFL.

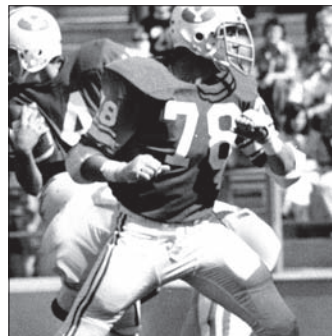

STEVE YOUNG- Won Davey O'Brien Award and finished runner-up for the Heisman. BYU led nation in total offense and was second in scoring. Cougars set NCAA total offense record with 584.2 yards per game.

ROBBIE BOSCO- Led BYU to only National Championship in school history. Led nation in passing and finished runner-up in passing efficiency (151.8). Runner-up for Davey O'Brien Award and third in Heisman voting.

KYLE MORRELL- As BYU's safety Morrell was honored as the WAC Defensive Player of the Year with 70 tackles, three interceptions and one sack.

LEON WHITE- Selected defensive MVP of the 1984 Holiday Bowl. Named second-team All-America by *The Sporting News* as a junior (1984) and honorable mention All-America as a senior (1985) by the AP. Had 10 pass deflections in 1984, including five against Utah State. Recorded 90 tackles, five tackles for loss and two sacks his senior season.

MARV ALLEN- A two-year starter and four-year letterman that played an integral part on the defensive unit of the 1984 National Championship team. He finished the season with 131 tackles and tied for the team lead in interceptions with four. His efforts earned him First-Team All-WAC honors, an honorable mention All-America nod from the AP. He was also named second-team Academic All-American.

DAVID MILLS- Led team in receiving during his senior season when he caught 60 passes for 1,023 yards and seven touchdowns. Played on four WAC championship teams, including the National Championship team in '84.

MARK BELLINI- A former walk-on, Bellini led BYU with 63 receptions for 1,008 yards, including 14 touchdowns his senior season in 1985. He was also 10th nationally in receiving average of 5.7 catches per game. Had 138 receptions, 2,267 yards receiving and 23 touchdowns in his career.

TREVOR MOLINI- Named third-team All-American as a tight end his sophomore season and received an honorable mention nod during his junior season. Caught 63 passes for 849 yards and three touchdowns as a sophomore. Caught 11 passes for 186 yards and two touchdowns against New Mexico in 1985.

JASON BUCK- Became only the third player in the western United States to win Outland Trophy. Had 59 tackles, 13 tackles for loss and 12.5 sacks in 1986.

PAT THOMPSON- Led conference in punting with 49 punts for 2,195 yards, an average of 44.8 yards per punt. Led the nation in punting for much of the season.

MO ELEWONIBI- Didn't play football until after high school. Led BYU to a 10-3 record, a berth in the Holiday Bowl and graded out four times with perfect pass protection as a senior.

BOB DAVIS- Had 137 tackles, including six sacks his senior season. A Dick Butkus Award candidate.

CHRIS SMITH- Led team with 60 catches for 1,090 yards, including five touchdowns in 1989. Set NCAA record for tight end with 1,154 yards receiving in 1990. Caught 67 passes and scored two touchdowns.

TY DETMER- 1990, 1991 First collegian from the Rockies to win the Heisman Trophy. Passed for 5,188 yards and 41 touchdowns. Member of the NCAA All-Decade team. Still holds 58 NCAA records. His career record of 15,031 yards passing is nearly 3,000 yards more than anyone else in Division I history.

BYRON REX- Named UPI Second Team All-American tight end in 1992. He was also a two-time All-WAC selection (1991-1992).

ALAN BOARDMAN- A four-year starter who recorded 204 punts for 8,636 yards, averaging 42.3 yards per kick. His freshman year he ranked ninth among punters nationally with a 43.13 average per kick.

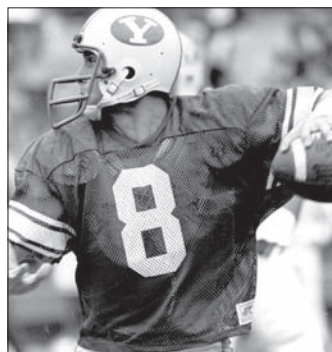
EVAN PILGRIM- A three-year starter on BYU's offensive line. In 1994, his senior season, Pilgrim anchored an offensive line that was fifth in the nation in total offense. He helped Jamal Willis become the all-time leading rusher in BYU history, while also leading BYU to a Copper Bowl victory over Oklahoma and No. 10 national ranking (final season ranking). Pilgrim was named a second team All-American guard by the *Associated Press* after his senior year.



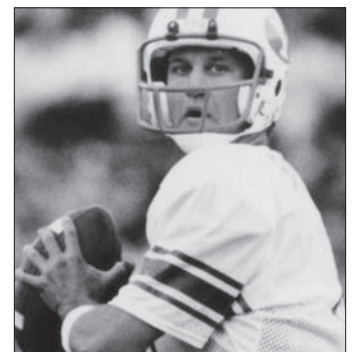

ITULA MILI- Had 46 catches for a nation-leading 692 yards and three touchdowns for tight ends. First-team All-WAC after senior season.

STEVE SARKISIAN- He had a record-setting two-year (1995-96) career at BYU. Sarkisian completed 549-of-824 passes (66.6 percent) for 7,755 yards and 55 TDs in his career. As a senior in 1996, he led the nation in passing efficiency (173.6, the seventh best mark ever) as the Western Athletic Conference champion Cougars went 14-1 and won the Cotton Bowl. He was the WAC Offensive Player of the Year in 1996 and a second-team All-American.

ROB MORRIS- Two-time all-conference selection. His 345 career tackles is eighth all-time at BYU. He was as a first round draft pick in 2000 by the Indianapolis Colts. Morris was named to the *Associated Press*, *The Sporting News*, *Football News* All-American first-teams after his senior year. He was also a semifinalist for Butkus Award, given to nation's top linebacker, and the WAC Defensive Player of the year in 1998 after posting 147 tackles during his junior season.

LUKE STALEY- NCAA leader in scoring (15.45 points per game) and third in the nation in rushing average at 143.82 yards per game. Set BYU single season records in touchdowns scored (28), most points scored (170) and rushing yards (1,596). He led BYU to 12-2 record and MWC Championship. He earned the nation's top running back award, the Doak Walker Award, after his outstanding junior season.

MATT PAYNE- In 2004 he was named AFCA and *Sporting News* First Team All-American and AP Second Team All-American as a punter. 2004 Ray Guy and Lou Groza Award Semifinalist. Led the nation with 51 punts for an average of 48.0 yards per punt while earning All-America honorable mention recognition in 2002. He was also an All-MWC First Team selection three times (2002-04).

DANIEL COATS- Set a BYU freshman tight end receiving record with 30 receptions for 378 yards and four touchdowns. Named a *Sporting News* Freshman All-American in 2003.

AUSTIN COLLIE- Named a *Sporting News* Second Team Freshman All-American in 2004 after leading the nation's freshman receivers with 4.82 catches per game and 70.1 yards per game. He was also the 2004 MWC Freshman of the Year.

DALLAS REYNOLDS- Named a *Sporting News* Third Team Freshman All-American and a Rivals.com Second Team Freshman All-American in 2005 after anchoring an offensive unit that was ranked No. 13 in the nation. He started in all 12 games as a freshman.

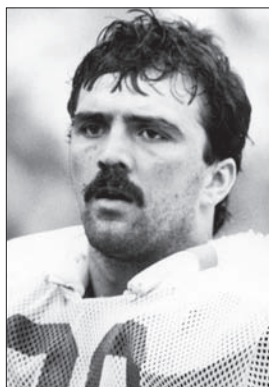

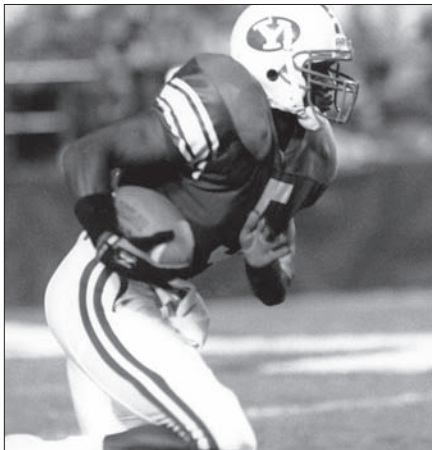

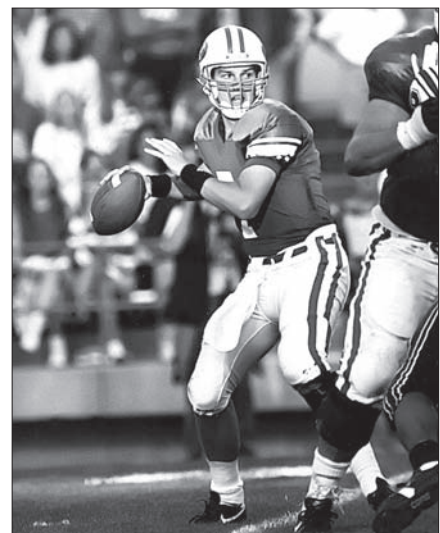

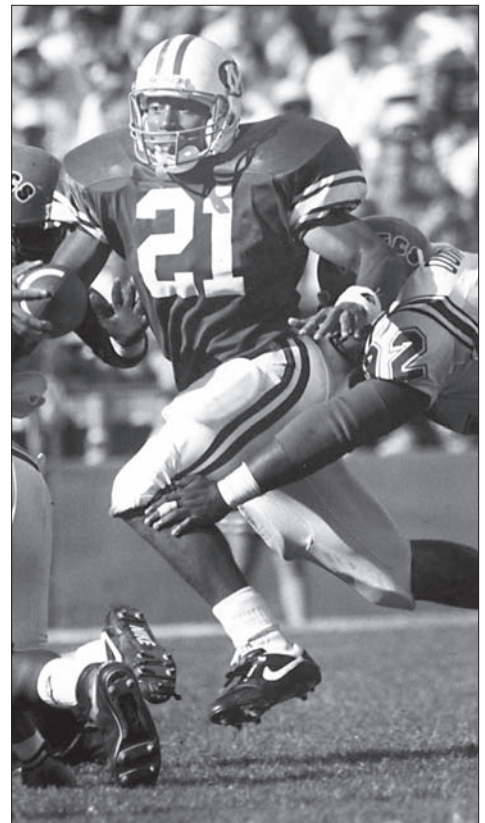

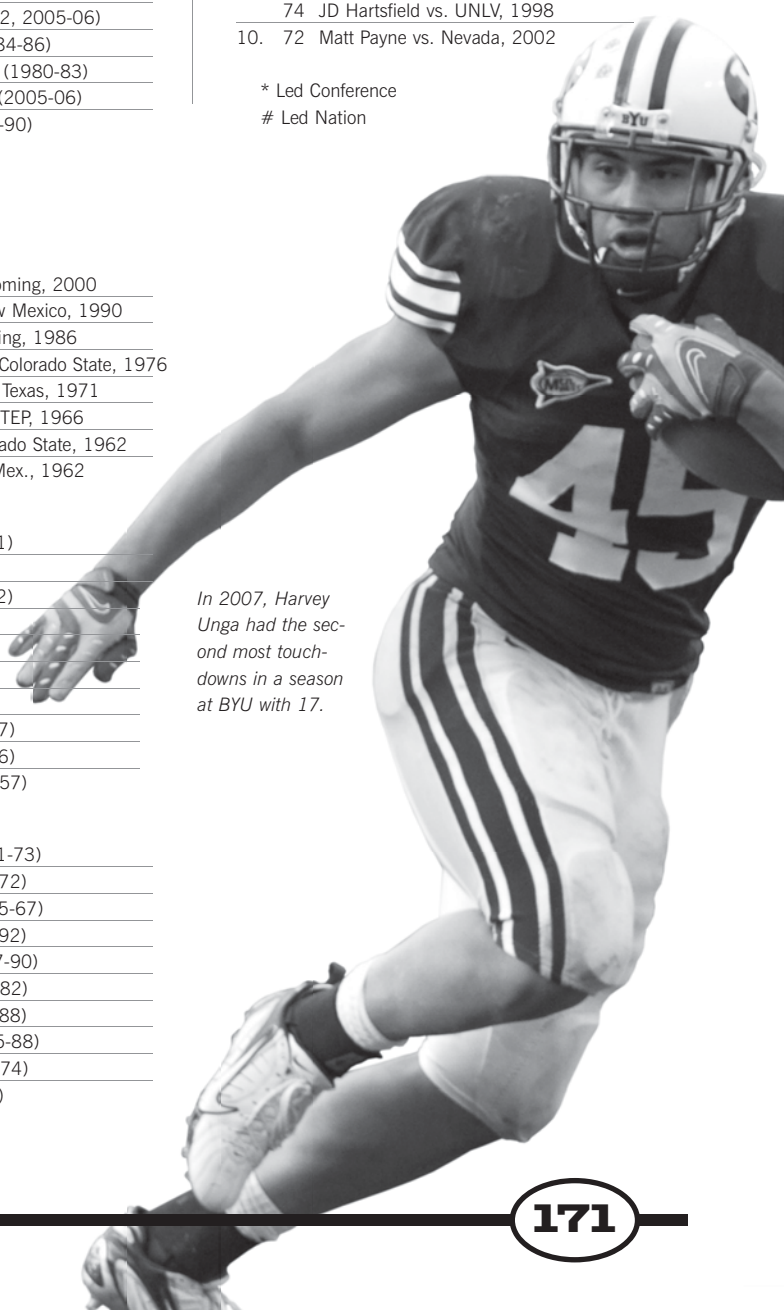

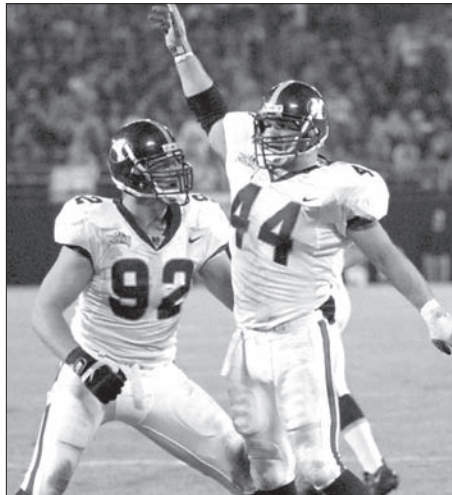

GAME SUMMARY:

Competing in its first post-season bowl game ever, BYU played Western Athletic Conference host to the Oklahoma State Cowboys before a crowd of 50,878. The Cougars got off to a quick start with two field goals during the first quarter before All-WAC quarterback Gary Sheide suffered a dislocated shoulder in the last moments of the quarter. He was replaced by junior reserve Mark Giles. The Cowboys took the scoring lead during the second quarter on a touchdown run around left end, giving Oklahoma State a 7-6 halftime advantage. OSU regained possession of the ball on the Cougars' 17-yard line after intercepting Giles, but the Cowboys were unable to convert on the turnover. A field goal from 32 yards out put the Cowboys in front 10-6 at the end of the third quarter. With 1:14 remaining in the game, Oklahoma State scored another touchdown on a 40-yard halfback pass to complete the scoring. The Cougars out-gained Oklahoma State in total yardage, 301-214. Giles was 11 of 26 for 138 yards. After three losses and a tie to open the season, the Cougars reeled off seven straight victories prior to the bowl game.

GAME SUMMARY:

Powerful Oklahoma State, sparked by All-American Terry Miller (173 yards rushing on 23 carries), used four pass interceptions and a fumble recovery to capture the 31st annual Tangerine Bowl contest. Defensively, the Cowboys yielded only 46 yards rushing. The Cougars, however, stayed close in the first half, which ended 28-14. Dave Lowry returned the second-half kickoff 102 yards (a Tangerine Bowl record) to move the Cougars to within seven at 28-21. From there, it was all Cowboys. BYU's Gifford Nielsen completed 23 of 34 passes for 209 yards and one touchdown, but the Cougars could only roll up 255 yards to Oklahoma State's 402. BYU entered the game with a 9-2 record, while Oklahoma State came in after tying for the Big 8 title. The Cowboys missed out on the Orange Bowl because of the conference tie-breaking formula. Later, the stadium was expanded and the name changed to the Florida Citrus Bowl.

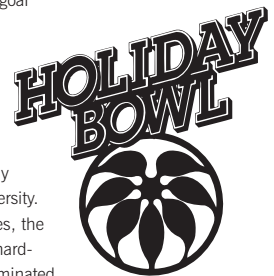

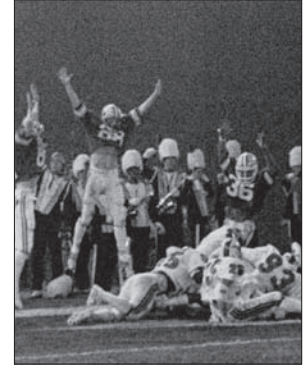
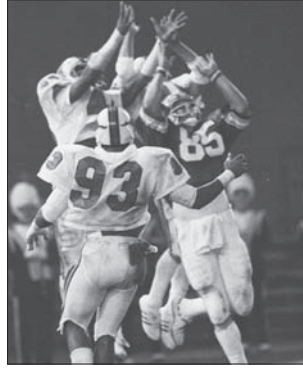

The inaugural Holiday Bowl pitted two teams with local drawing power, the Naval Academy and Brigham Young University. Despite chilly temperatures, the two teams engaged in a hard-hitting battle. Defense dominated the first two quarters. Brent Johnson put the Cougars on the scoreboard first with a 33-yard field goal with 8:26 left in the first quarter. But Navy's Bob Tata boomed a 40-yard field goal to tie the score at 3-3. Jim McMahon sent the Cougars ahead with a 10-yard pass to Mike Chronister, but Johnson missed the PAT. McMahon ran another in from two yards out in the third period for a 16-3 BYU lead. Navy cut the lead to 16-10 after three quarters and then tied the game on two field goals in the fourth quarter, but it was a 65-yard pass to Phil McConkey that did the Cougars in. Some 52,500 witnessed the game in person. McConkey was named Best Offensive Player and BYU's Tom Enlow won Best Defensive Player honors. Navy finished the year at 9-3, BYU at 9-4.

GAME SUMMARY:

The 1979 season ended with BYU leading the nation in scoring, passing and total offense. At 11-0, the Cougars were one of the few undefeated, untied teams in the nation. Those kinds of credentials, along with its No. 9 national ranking in the UPI and AP polls made BYU the favorite over the at-large entry, Indiana. The opportunistic Hoosiers played the Cougars tough, holding a 21-17 lead at the half. BYU jumped ahead in the third quarter, 24-21, on a 13-yard pass from All-American Marc Wilson to Homer Jones. The Cougars fell behind, 31-24, but regained the lead at 34-31 on a 15-yard pass to Eric Lane. With 12:14 left to play, BYU padded the lead on the third field goal of the game by Brent Johnson. But midway through the fourth quarter, Indiana's Tim Wilbur returned a punt 62 yards to push the Hoosiers ahead 38-37. With 2:06 remaining, the Cougars moved the ball 69 yards to the Indiana 10. Then, with 11 seconds left, Johnson missed a 27-yard field goal that would have won the game. Wilson was voted the MVP on offense (28 of 43 for 380 yards) and Indiana's Wilbur won the honor for defense. Clay Brown caught nine passes for 142 yards. Lane grabbed nine passes for 79 yards and also scored a rushing touchdown. Jones scored a touchdown and had 126 yards on seven kickoff returns.

GAME SUMMARY:

One observer said the 1980 Holiday Bowl was actually two ball games--a contest which lasted most of four quarters and another of four minutes duration. SMU controlled the "first game," leaving the Cougars behind 20 points with only minutes remaining. Unfortunately, many fans either turned off their TV sets or left the stadium in San Diego before the "second game" began. In the final four minutes, BYU surged to a stunning 46-45 win. For 56 minutes the Mustangs taught the Cougars a lesson in running the football. The Mustangs' two great running backs, Craig James and Eric Dickerson, rushed for a combined total of 335 yards. With 4:07 remaining in the game, SMU scored to go ahead, 45-25. From there the Cougars connected on a TD pass, recovered an on-side kick, scored on a one-yard run by Scott Phillips, blocked a punt. Finally, with three seconds left on the clock, Jim McMahon connected on a "Hail Mary" pass of 41 yards to Clay Brown. With the score tied, Kurt Gunther kicked the extra point to send BYU fans streaming onto the field. McMahon was 32 of 49 passes for 446 yards. It may have been the most exciting bowl game ever, with the Cougars getting 21 points in the final 2:33. Ironically, four passes on conversion attempts had failed before McMahon hit Phillips after the next-to-last touchdown to cut a 45-31 deficit to 45-39 and put the Cougars in a position to win the game with one more score. The 50-yard drive was set up when Todd Shell recovered a Brent Johnson on-side-kick at midfield. SMU got the ball back with 1:57 but had to punt. The kick was blocked by defensive back Bill Schoepflin and recovered by the SMU punter, Eric Kaifes, with 13 seconds left. McMahon threw one incomplete pass intended for Brown and another for Lloyd Jones before unleashing the famous pass to Brown in the end zone with no time left on the clock.

GAME SUMMARY:

The 1981 edition of the Holiday Bowl fit the mold of its predecessors. This time it was the Cougars of BYU versus the Cougars of Washington State, playing before a crowd of 52,419. BYU held a 24-7 lead at halftime, then pushed the score to 31-7 as Tom Holmoe intercepted a pass and returned it 35 yards to give the WAC champions a comfortable edge. As the second half progressed, it appeared BYU would be the come-from-behind victim in this one. With only 59 seconds left in the third quarter, Washington State scored to make it 31-28. But Jim McMahon took over moving BYU 82 yards for a score to stretch the lead to 38-28. Statistically, it was a typical McMahon game, 27 of 43 with no interceptions and three touchdowns. Tight end Gordon Hudson had an excellent game, collecting seven catches for 126 yards and a touchdown. Dan Plater also caught a touchdown pass and Waymon Hamilton scored on the ground. Washington State quarterbacks Clete Casper and Ricky Turner completed only eight passes for 106 yards but Turner had 82 yards rushing while Don LaBomme had 79. Each team scored five touchdowns, so the difference actually came midway through the second quarter when Kurt Gunther connected on a 20-yard field goal after a BYU drive stalled on the Washington State three.

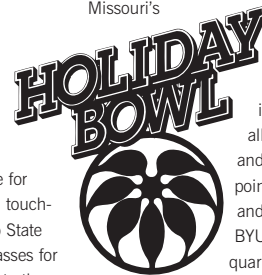
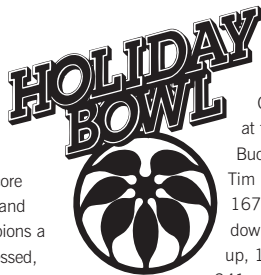

The Cougars had their two-game Holiday Bowl win streak snapped by Ohio State, 47-17. BYU's bubble burst at the outset of the third quarter, when the Buckeyes reeled off 17 unanswered points. Tim Spencer blew through the Cougar defense for 167 yards, including a record-setting 61-yard touchdown run in the second quarter that put Ohio State up, 10-7. Steve Young completed 27 of 45 passes for 341 yards, but BYU had a tough time getting into the end zone. The Cougars turned the ball over to Ohio State three times inside the 30 and saw the Buckeyes convert each turnover into a score. The Cougars took the lead early in the second quarter with a seven-yard strike to Neil Balholm. But Spencer's long gallop and a blocked punt put the Buckeyes up, 17-10, at halftime. Big fullback Vaughn Broadnax scored on the opening drive of the second half, and on the next play, Young was intercepted and Spencer ran 18 yards to put Ohio State in control for good. BYU's only other score came midway through the fourth quarter when Gordon Hudson caught a 13-yard pass. Ohio State quarterback Mike Tomzak had only 132 yards passing and no touchdowns, but his fleet of running backs scored six times on the ground. Ten different BYU players caught passes, led by Hudson with seven receptions for 81 yards and Balholm with 58 yards receiving.

GAME SUMMARY:

Yet another chapter was added to the saga of impossible, thrilling Holiday Bowl finishes when BYU defeated Missouri, 21-17. The game was billed as a classic matchup between Missouri's stubborn defense and BYU's explosive offense, led by quarterback Steve Young. Missouri held BYU to just 167 yards and seven points in the first half, while BYU's defense allowed the Tigers only 157 yards and 10 points. Missouri got its first-half points on a two-yard run by Eric Drain and a 37-yard field goal by Brad Burditt. BYU's touchdown came on a 10-yard quarterback draw by Young. In the second half, Young hit Eddie Stinnett with a 33-yard touchdown pass. But Missouri came right back with another two-yard plunge by Drain. A valiant goal-line stand by BYU gave the Cougars the ball on the six-yard-line with 3:57 left in the game. Led by Young, the Cougars moved down the field to the Missouri 15 with under a minute to play. On first-and-10 at the Tigers' 15, Young handed to Stinnett, who faked a sweep right and threw back across the field to Young. The Stinnett pass barely cleared the outstretched hands of Missouri's Bobby Bell allowing Young to gather it in and scramble 15 yards to the end zone. The PAT gave BYU a 21-17 lead with 23 seconds left. Kyle Morrell intercepted a Missouri desperation pass at the BYU two-yard line and returned it to the 17 to seal the win.

GAME SUMMARY:

Holiday Bowl VII lived up to all the glamour and excitement of the previous six bowls, plus it had a new dimension--national championship luster--thanks to BYU's undefeated, untied season and No. 1 ranking. The 24-17 Cougar victory marked the first time in years that a non-New Year's Day bowl game determined the national championship. The contest was played in typical Holiday Bowl fashion. After a scoreless first quarter in which Cougar quarterback Robbie Bosco was forced to the sideline with an injured knee and ankle, the game began to develop drama. BYU scored first with 8:37 left in the first half on a five-yard run by Kelly Smith. The touchdown was set up when a limping Bosco returned to the lineup and engineered an 80-yard drive. The Wolverines responded by putting together an 80-yard scoring drive of their own, culminating on Rick Rogers' five-yard touchdown run up the middle. The PAT tied the score at seven. The tie was short-lived however, as a 31-yard field goal by Lee Johnson with time running out in the first half gave BYU a 10-7 lead at the break. Midway through the third period, Michigan went on top for the first time at 14-10 on a 10-yard scoring strike from Bob Zurbrugg to Bob Perryman. The Wolverines added to their lead when Bob Bergeron nailed a 32-yard field goal to make the Michigan lead 17-10 with 14:14 to play. The Cougar offense then produced an 80-yard drive that culminated with a seven-yard Bosco-to-Glen Kozlowski touchdown pass to tie the game at 17 with 10:51 to go. Bosco's 13-yard scoring toss to Smith with 1:23 remaining made it 24-17. Two plays later Marv Allen intercepted a pass to clinch a 13-0 season and the Cougars' first-ever national championship. David Mills finished with 11 catches for 103 yards receiving and Smith had 10 for 88. Lakei Heimuli led BYU with 82 yards rushing while Bob Perryman had 110 for Michigan.

In what promised to be an offensive showdown between pass-happy BYU (11-2) and rough and tumble Ohio State (8-3), two of the nation's top defenses took center stage. In fact, the game's only touchdowns were produced by a noseguard on an interception and a reserve wide receiver on a broken play. Buckeye kicker Rich Spangler tallied the first points of the game with a 47-yard field goal early in the second quarter to give Ohio State a 3-0 lead. BYU attempted to answer with a long drive of its own, only to come away empty after Vai Sikahema fumbled on an apparent touchdown plunge. Before the first half ended, quarterback Robbie Bosco rolled left, whirled right and found wide receiver David Miles on a 38-yard strike to give the Cougars a 7-3 halftime lead. In the second half, Ohio State noseguard Larry Kolic intercepted Bosco and took it in for a touchdown to give the Buckeyes a 10-7 lead. Leon White and Kyle Whittingham recovered fumbles but Kolic got another interception and Terry White intercepted two in the end zone to stop BYU threats—one with 3:38 to play and again with three seconds left. Ohio State was the benefactor of six Cougar turnovers, and the Buckeyes went home the victor. Mark Bellini had 89 yards receiving while Lakei Heimuli added 10 receptions for 77 yards.

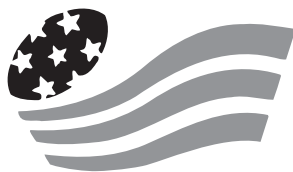

Although BYU failed to win the WAC title, the Cougars kept alive an impressive streak of nine bowl appearances in a row by being invited to the third annual Freedom Bowl. There they met familiar foe UCLA. The two teams had met in 1985 when the Bruins came from behind to win a tough game in Provo, 27-24. The Freedom Bowl, however, proved different as UCLA outstanding running back Gaston Green broke open a close game in the third quarter and the Bruins went on to win 31-10. Green finished with 266 yards on 33 carries. The first half was all defense as the two teams punted nine times in the first 30 minutes. BYU struck first when linebacker Andy Katoa recovered a UCLA fumble at the Bruin 47 and Leonard Chitty put the Cougars ahead 3-0 with a 32-yard field goal. UCLA stormed ahead to stay with a 71-yard touchdown drive highlighted by a 49-yard run on a reverse by Bruin receiver Karl Dorrell. From then on, it was UCLA most of the way. Cougar quarterbacks Bob Jensen and Mike Young managed to pass for over 200 yards, but UCLA and Green did most of the damage. Costly injuries to standouts Mark Bellini and Katoa hindered the Cougar effort, but Outland Trophy winner Jason Buck turned in another strong effort.

The 11th annual All-American Bowl began with temperatures in the 40s and BYU never warmed up. The Cougars' 10th consecutive bowl appearance included several records, but BYU lost 22-16 in its first-ever meeting with Virginia. Sean Covey attempted 61 passes, David Miles had 188 yards in receptions and Pat Thompson only punted once, but BYU fell short several times. Darren Handley, BYU's leading receiver, dropped a touchdown pass in the first quarter before BYU settled for a 20-yard field goal by Leonard Chitty. However, Chitty, who set a season mark for field goals (18) and consecutive PATs (29), missed from 51 and 47 yards as Virginia took a 14-3 lead into the intermission. BYU got to the Virginia two-yard-line midway through the third quarter only to have a fourth-down pass tipped away. Later, Freddie Whittingham scampered eight yards to cut the lead to 14-9 at the end of the third quarter. Virginia, led by quarterback Scott Secules, the game's MVP, made a crucial 76-yard drive to go ahead 22-9 with 11 minutes left. Then, BYU went the same distance to score on a one-yard pass to Whittingham with seven minutes remaining. But that was as close as the Cougars would get. Ironically, nine years earlier on the same date Virginia Coach George Welsh led Navy to a 23-16 win over BYU in the inaugural Holiday Bowl.

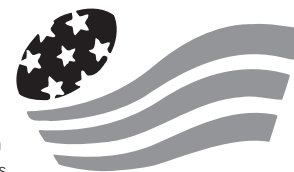

Scott Peterson made an interception to set up the game-winning field goal. It was an exciting contest for the 35,941 fans (49,694 tickets were sold) in attendance. A fumble at midfield led to the Buffaloes' first score, before Sean Covey found Mike Salido to tie the score. An interception in the end zone stopped a BYU drive early in the second quarter as the Cougars trailed at the half, 14-7. A Detmer to Chuck Cutler pass tied the game in the third quarter but Colorado took a 17-14 lead early in the final quarter. BYU then moved from its own four to the Buffalo 14 and tied the game with 4:11 left on a 31-yarder by Chaffetz. Three plays later, Peterson's interception and a 15-yard penalty put the ball at the Colorado 32. With 2:33 left, Chaffetz booted a 35-yarder for the victory. Halfback Matt Bellini carried eight times for 78 yards and caught four passes for 41 yards.

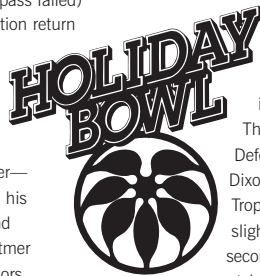

GAME SUMMARY:

Two unusual plays late in the game kept BYU from downing Penn State and offset 576 yards passing by Ty Detmer—the highest total ever in a bowl game. For his effort, and thanks to blocking from Outland Trophy winner Mohammed Elewonibi, Detmer had the rare privilege of sharing MVP honors despite playing on the losing team. BYU, which trailed 41-26 with nine and a half minutes remaining, scored twice to cut the lead to 41-39 with 2:30 to play. The Cougars went for a two-point conversion to tie the game, but Detmer's pass was intercepted in the end zone by Penn State linebacker Andre Collins and returned 102 yards for two points. Down 43-39, the Cougars, led by Bob Davis, forced the Lions to punt, giving BYU the ball on its own 12 with two minutes left. Passes to Brent Nyberg, Matt Bellini, Chris Smith and Andy Boyce moved the ball to the Penn State 38 with a minute left to play. Then, what appeared to be a sack by Penn State safety Gary Brown turned into a score for the Nittany Lions. Brown stripped the ball from Detmer at the Penn State 47 and raced 53 yards for the touchdown. Penn State finished the season ranked 14th by UPI and 15th by AP and CNN/USA Today. BYU was 18th in the UPI poll and 22nd in the others.

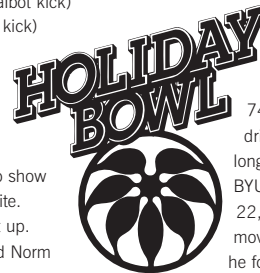

Led by quarterback Bucky Richardson and All-America running back Darren Lewis, underdog Texas A&M was out to show it belonged among the nation's elite. The Cougars entered the game beat up. Defensive backs Tony Crutchfield and Norm Dixon weren't able to suit up and Heisman Trophy winner Ty Detmer was playing with a slight separation in his non-throwing shoulder. The second largest Holiday Bowl crowd ever (61,441) watched the Aggies march 80 yards in 13 plays to take a 7-0 lead. The Cougars tied the score on an eight-yard Detmer-to-Chris Smith touchdown pass, but after that, the game was all Texas A&M. The Aggies went on to score 23 points in the second quarter en route to a 37-7 halftime lead. With the game out of hand, the big story was William Thomas' crunching sack that separated Detmer's throwing shoulder and put him out of the game early in the third quarter. The Aggies continued to dominate by racking up nearly 200 yards rushing in the second half. Texas A&M's Richardson would go on to be named Offensive Player of the Game by piling up 344 yards in total offense. Thomas was named the top defensive player. BYU finished the season ranked 17th by UPI, 20th by CNN/USA Today and 22nd by AP. BYU had been as high as fourth prior to its first loss.

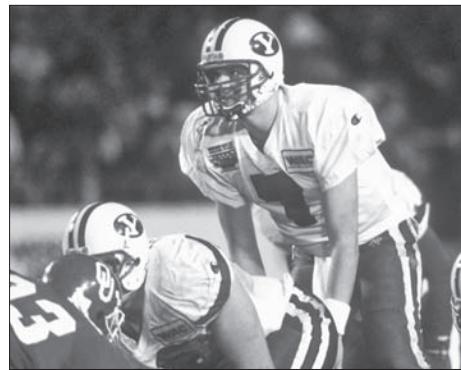
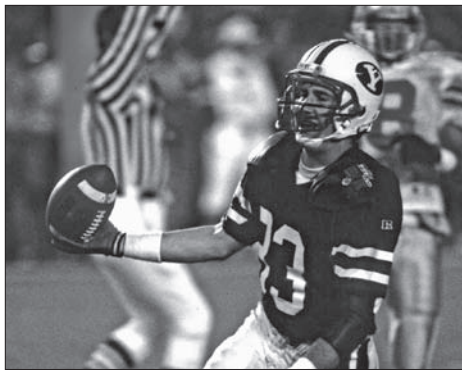

From there, he found fullback Peter Tuipulotu for the touchdown. The PAT failed and the halftime score was 13-6. BYU opened the fourth with an 87-yard drive that culminated with a Detmer-to-Tyler Anderson touchdown from 29 yards out. Earl Kauffman connected on the PAT to tie the score at 13. Each team threatened to score late in the fourth quarter. Iowa missed a 40-yard field goal with 4:19 left. On the game's final drive the Cougars moved inside the Iowa 20 with 33 seconds left to play, but Detmer's pass to tight end Byron Rex was tipped and picked off by Hawkeye safety Carlos James in the end zone to preserve the tie. Josh Arnold of BYU earned defensive MVP honors as BYU finished the season ranked 23rd in the AP and CNN/USA Today polls. Iowa was 10th in both polls.

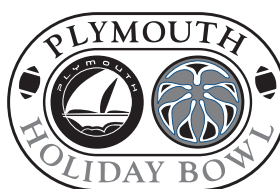

After forcing a rare Buckeye punt, BYU got the ball back on its own 42 with 43 seconds left. BYU's defense was dominating as it held Oklahoma to just 72 yards rushing and 163 yards passing—most of those in the last quarter. The Sooners did not cross midfield until their ninth possession on the second-to-last play of the third quarter. Jamal Willis caught seven passes for 103 yards and was chosen Offensive Player of the Game. Walsh was named MVP in what would be his final game at BYU. BYU finished 10th in the CNN/USA Today poll and 18th in the Associated Press poll.

The safety came when linebacker Shay Muirbrook, the game's defensive MVP, collected one of his six sacks. Kansas State took a half-time lead with a 41-yard Hail Mary pass and a successful two-point conversion with no time left on the clock. The Wildcats increased the lead to 15-5 in the third quarter when offensive co-MVP Kevin Lockett caught a 72-yard TD. Fueled by consecutive controversial interference no-calls, quarterback Steve Sarkisian engineered two fourth-quarter drives capped by touchdown passes of 32-yards to James Dye and 28-yards to K.O. Kealaluhi. Sarkisian, an offensive co-MVP, completed 21 passes to tie a Cotton Bowl record held by Roger Staubach of Navy. KSU drove the length of the field before Cougar cornerback Omarr Morgan juggled an interception from a Wildcat slant pattern at the 12 yard line to secure the game.

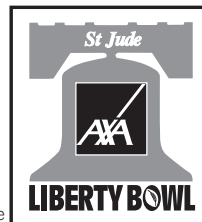

Just before the end of the third quarter, Marshall struck a big play when Chapman rushed 87 yards for a touchdown. Chapman, to cap off his MVP performance, scored Marshall's final touchdown. The Champions of the MWC faced Louisville, the champions of Conference USA. The Cardinals, led by quarterback Dave Ragone, took an early lead, scoring on a one-yard dive by Henry Miller that was set up by Zek Parker's 70-yard return of the opening kickoff.



Midway through the second quarter the Cougar offense came alive, driving to the Louisville 10-yard line. Quarterback Brandon Doman dropped back and rolled right as if to pass, then turned to his left and threw the ball to Dustin Rykert on a tackle-eligible play. All 6-foot-7, 305 pounds of offensive tackle outran the Cardinal defense to the corner and rumbled 10 yards to the end zone to tie the game 7-7. Louisville just managed to take a 14-7 lead into the break, scoring with only 14 seconds left. Louisville contained the Cougar attack for the remainder of the game while reaching the end zone twice more themselves. Although Louisville went on to win 28-10, BYU's defense played one of its best games of the season, holding the Cardinals' high-powered offense to 228 yards passing and only 58 yards rushing.

Trailing 35-14 in the fourth quarter, BYU stormed back with two touchdowns and had the ball with 2:20 remaining but John Beck was intercepted after he was hit when releasing the ball, ending the Cougars' comeback hopes. Beck had a record-setting performance, completing 35-of-53 attempts for 352 yards and three touchdowns. The 35 completions, 53 attempts and 352 yards were all Las Vegas Bowl records. Nathan Meikle caught a game-high 12 passes for 95 yards while Jonny Harline had seven receptions for 73 yards and one score and Todd Watkins added five catches for 95 yards and a touchdown. BYU fell behind 7-0 in the first quarter but scored early in the second when Beck found Curtis Brown for a 19-yard touchdown pass. California scored again but Fahu Tahj scored on a three-yard run to tie the game at 14 with 38 seconds left in the second quarter. The Golden Bears struck again before the half, going 58 yards in 27 seconds to take a 21-14 lead into the locker room. In the fourth, Beck engineered a 74-yard drive that ended with Harline scoring and then a 96-yard drive that ended with Watkins catching a nine-yard touchdown pass from Beck. California's ensuing drive ended with a missed field goal and the Cougars had a chance to tie but the drive ended on Beck's interception.

GAME SUMMARY:

The 2006 BYU championship run ended with a Pioneer PureVision Las Vegas Bowl championship as the Cougars (11-2) dominated Oregon (7-6), 38-8, to finish the season with a 10-game winning streak in front of a Sam Boyd Stadium record crowd of 44,615. The Mountain West Conference champion BYU team set a school record for margin of victory in a bowl game, beating the Ducks by 30 points. Previously, the largest margin of victory for a BYU team in a bowl game was a 25-point defeat of Oklahoma in the 1994 Copper Bowl. BYU dominated all facets of the game, out-gaining Oregon 548 total yards to 260 total yards. BYU passed for 375 compared to Oregon's 166 and rushed for 173 compared to the Ducks 94. BYU seniors John Beck, Jonny Harline and Curtis Brown finished their careers in style. Beck completed 28-of-46 passes for 375 yards and two touchdowns. Harline, who was named Pioneer PureVision Las Vegas Bowl MVP, caught nine passes for a career-best--and Pioneer PureVision Las Vegas Bowl record--181 yards and a touchdown. Brown had 17 carries for 120 yards and two touchdowns and also caught seven passes for 55 yards. Brown also became the first BYU runner to rush for over 1,000 yards in consecutive seasons. Beck and Brown became the first quarterback/running back combo to pass for 3,000 yards and rush for 1,000 in the same season twice.

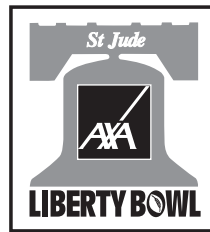

GAME SUMMARY:

No. 17 BYU (11-2) won its second consecutive Las Vegas Bowl, 17-16, against UCLA (6-7) in dramatic fashion -- by blocking the Bruins' potential game-winning field goal attempt as time expired. With only three ticks on the clock, true freshman Eathyn Manumaleuna extended his right hand at the right time to block UCLA's potential game-winning, 28-yard field goal as time expired to create what will be known as one of the most memorable bowl finishes in BYU Football history. The victory also avenged an early-season loss to the Bruins -- one of only two losses the Cougars suffered during the season. The Cougars, who finish the 2007 season on a 10-game winning streak, were led by sophomores Max Hall and Austin Collie. Hall threw 21-35 for 231 yards and two touchdowns. Sophomore receiver Austin Collie was named the 2007 Pioneer Las Vegas Bowl Most Valuable Player after racking up a game-high 107 yards on six receptions. Collie's 14-yard touchdown reception from Max Hall with 10:32 left in the second quarter gave the Cougars a 10-3 advantage. He was also credited with a game-high 195 all-purpose yards, including three kick returns for a total of 88 yards. The win marked the first time BYU has won back-to-back bowl games since the 1994 Copper Bowl and the 1996 Cotton Bowl. The win over UCLA extended the Cougars' win streak to 10 straight games, which marked the nation's longest, active winning streak.

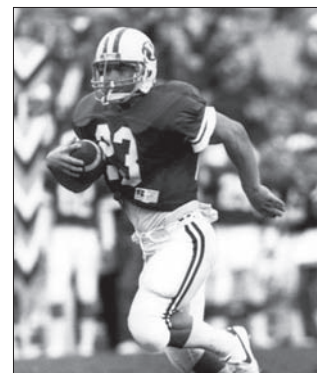


John Walsh had four touchdown passes in BYU's 31-6 blowout of Oklahoma in the 1994 Copper Bowl.

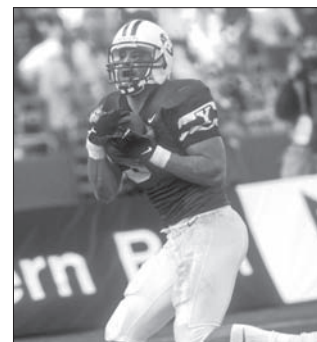


Margin Hooks caught the longest pass reception in BYU bowl history when he hauled in a 67-yard pass against Marshall in 1999.

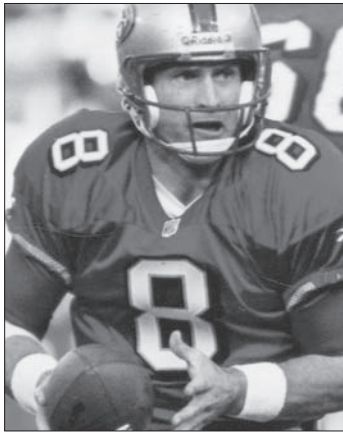

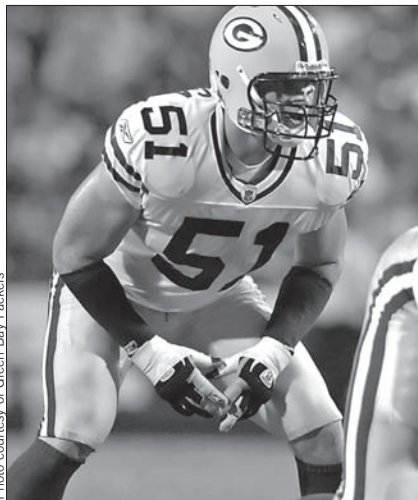

From the linebacker position, Brady Poppinga amassed 50 tackles, three sacks, two interceptions, and two forced fumbles in 2007.

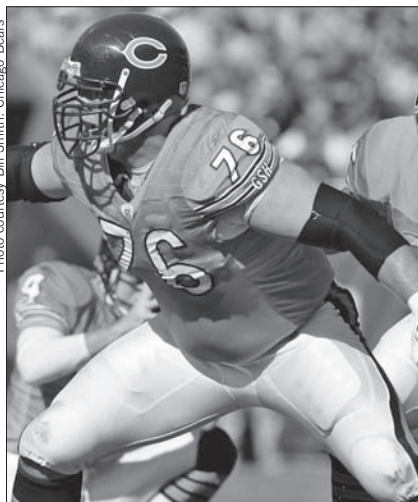

In nine NFL seasons, John Tait has opened holes at both tackle positions for five 1,000-yard running backs, including two straight in Chicago.

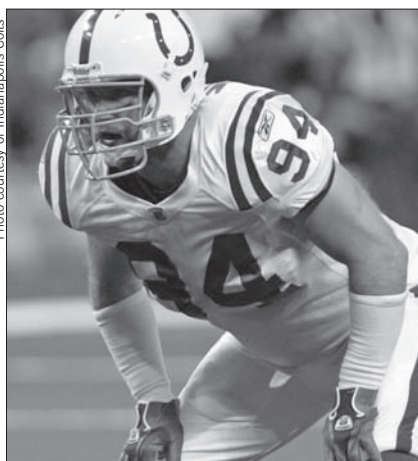

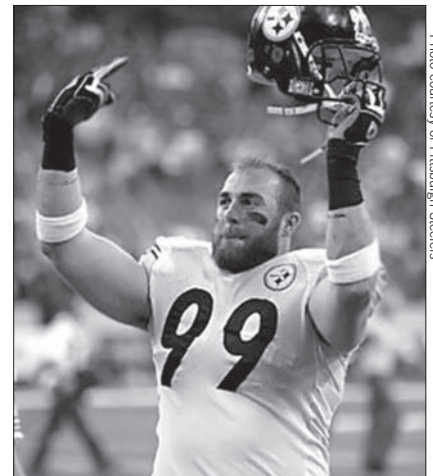

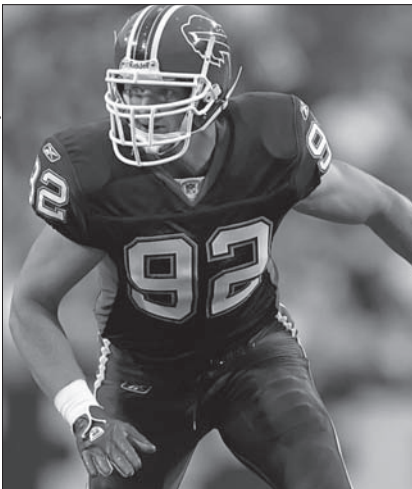

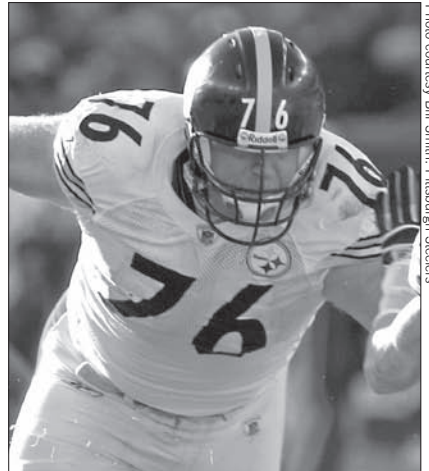

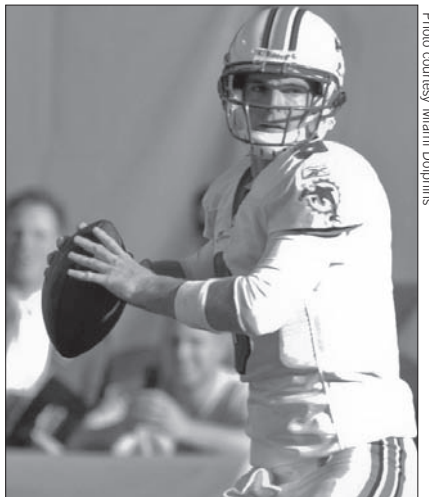

John Beck enters his second season in the NFL after being taken as the 40th pick in the 2007 NFL draft by the Miami Dolphins.

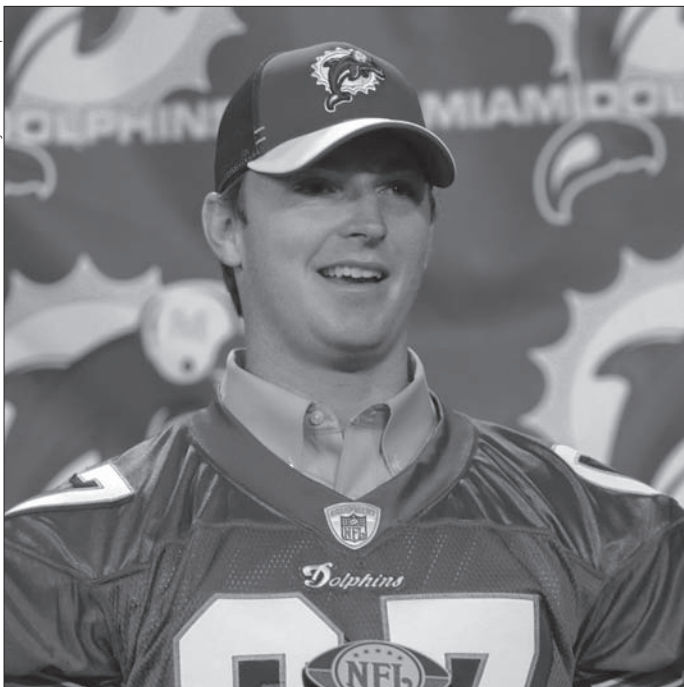

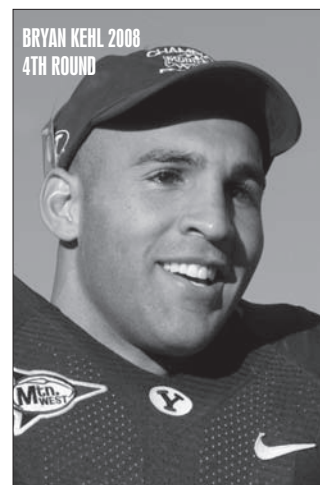

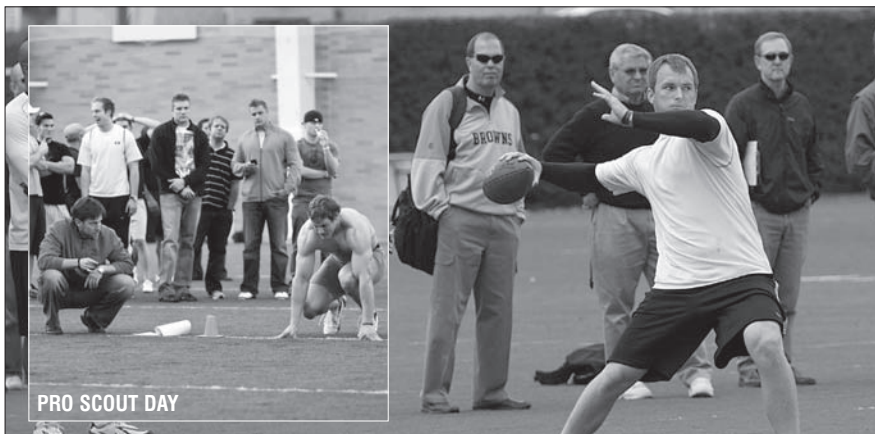
BYU'S NFL DRAFT FACTS

- The Cougars have had 10 players selected in the first round of the draft, including eight different players who were drafted in the first round of the NFL Draft, one player selected in the first round of the USFL Draft and one player selected in the first round of the CFL Draft.
- Bryan Kehl became the 14th BYU linebacker to be selected in the NFL Draft since 1972, and the first linebacker to be drafted since Brady Poppinga was picked by the Green Bay Packers in 2005. Interestingly, Poppinga and Kehl were both the 24th pick in the fourth round of their respective drafts. Since the 2004 NFL Draft, more linebackers have been drafted from BYU than any other position. Kehl is also the first player from BYU to be drafted by the Giants since David Futrell was selected in the 12th round in the 1988 draft.
- BYU has had 64 players drafted over the past 23 years, including 36 players over the past 17 years.
- Four members of the BYU coaching staff were selected in the NFL Draft, including Lance Reynolds (1978, Pittsburgh Steelers), Robert Anae (1985, New England Patriots), Steve Kaufusi (1988, Philadelphia Eagles) and Brandon Doman (2002, San Francisco 49'ers.) Additionally, two BYU athletic department administrators were also selected in the NFL Draft, including Robbie Bosco (1986, Green Bay) and Tom Holmoe (1983, San Francisco).
- Over the past 22 seasons, 35 offensive players from BYU have been drafted, as well as 27 defensive players and two special teams players.
- In 2007, John Beck became the first BYU quarterback drafted since current QB coach Brandon Doman was picked in the fifth round by the San Francisco 49'ers in 2002. He is also the first Cougar to be selected in the second round since Doug Jolley was picked in the second round by Oakland during the 2002 draft. Beck's second-round selection marks the highest draft position by a BYU quarterback in the NFL Draft since Jim McMahon was picked in the first round of the 1982 NFL Draft by the Chicago Bears.

John Tait proved why he was a first-round draft pick and one of the NFL's best in 2003 as he helped pave way for RB Priest Holmes to set the NFL single-season TD record while totaling 1,420 rushing yards for the NFL's top scoring offense (Kansas City). In 2006 he help lead the Chicago Bears to the Super Bowl as the starting left tackle.

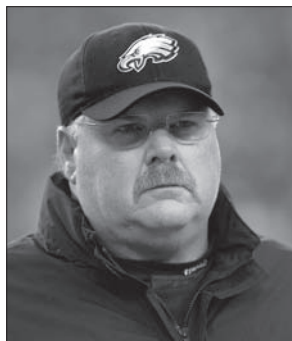

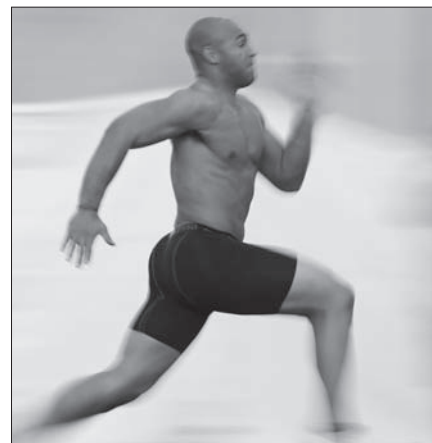
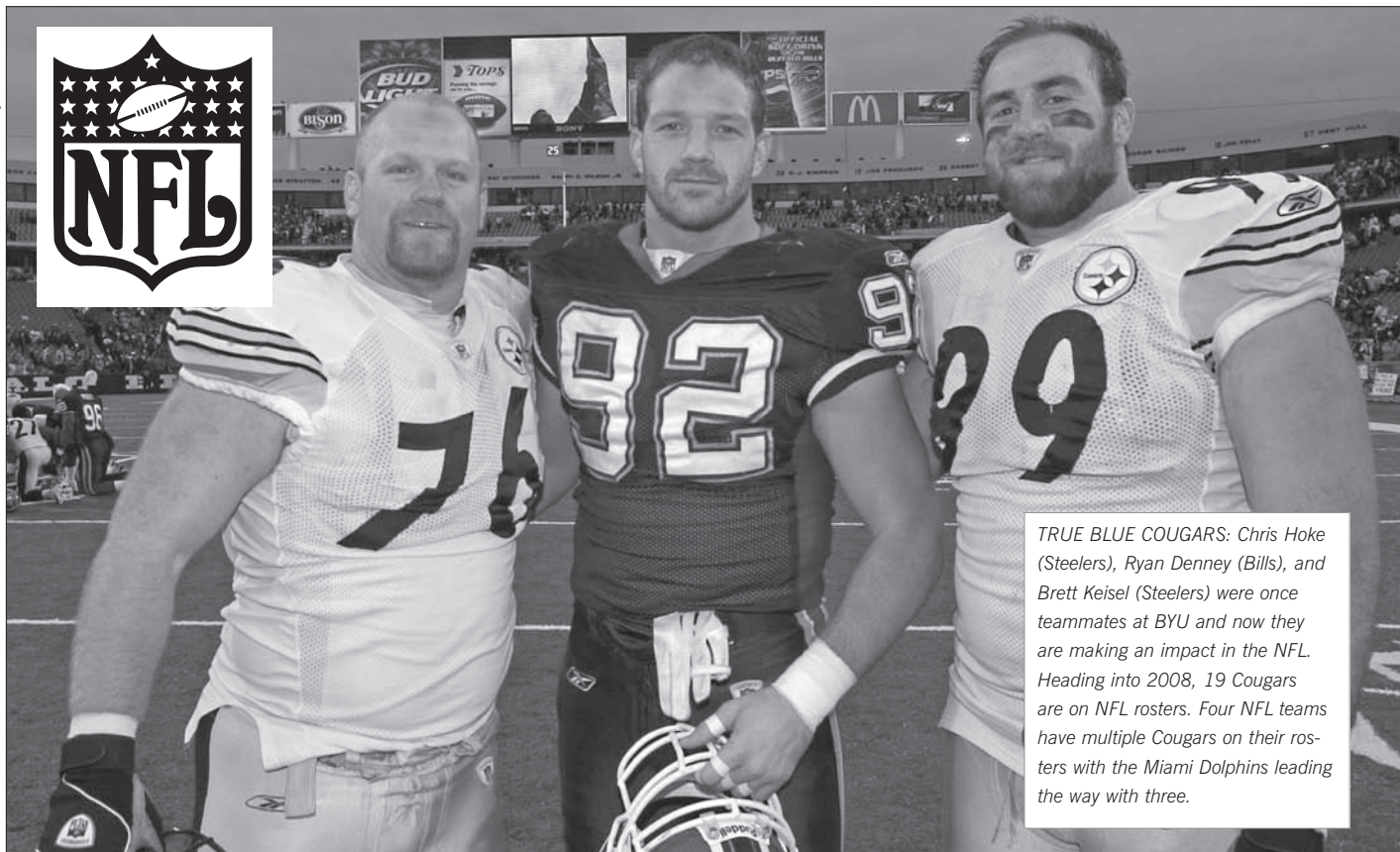

CREDENTIAL REQUESTS

All requests for credentials to cover BYU football should be sent on company letterhead to: Jeff Reynolds, Associate Director; Athletic Communications; 30 SFH; Provo, UT 84602. Fax requests may be sent to (801) 422-0633.

All single-game credential requests should be received no later than one week prior to the date of the game. Requests received later than noon on the day prior to the game will not be accepted. Credentials for working media, including print and electronic (radio & television) media outlets, are restricted in accordance with BYU, Mountain West Conference and NCAA rules and guidelines. It is our intention to ensure proper, professional use is made of the space available for credentialed media.

PRESS BOX

Working press box credentials shall be issued only to accredited newspaper, radio and television reporters only. Requests from other media sources shall be evaluated on a game-by-game basis. Reporters representing newspapers with next-day editions, daily editions, national magazines, wire services, live television and radio broadcasts and television and radio stations covering for nightly news shall be given priority. Spouses, dates, children and other non-working persons will not be credentialed and are not allowed in the working media areas during the game as dictated by NCAA guidelines.

Credentials must be displayed prominently throughout the game, including pre- and post-game coverage. Pre-game interviews with players and/or coaches will not be permitted under any circumstances. Properly credentialed media representatives shall be allowed field access with four minutes remaining on the game clock. Interviews with players and/or coaches may not be conducted until the NCAA-mandated 10-minute cooling off period has expired. Individuals

or organizations violating this policy may be required to surrender their credentials and be removed from the stadium.

PHOTOGRAPHY

Sideline credentials will be issued only to accredited photographers and television reporters/camera operators on assignment. Television organizations shall be restricted to one camera operator and one reporter on the field at all times, except by prior approval from the BYU Athletic Communications office. Freelance and amateur photographers, not on assignment, are not eligible for sideline credentials, except by prior approval from the BYU Athletic Communications office.

All Mountain West Conference and NCAA rules will be enforced regarding media representatives on the sidelines. Photographers are not permitted to shoot between the 25-yardlines. Sideline supervisors will patrol both sidelines to make certain all rules are enforced. Individuals or organizations violating sideline policies may be required to surrender their credentials and be removed from the stadium. The working media area is located on the third floor of the press box, situated on the west side of LaVell Edwards Stadium. Access to the press loge may be obtained via either the north or south elevators.

The BYU Athletic Communications staff will provide working media with game notes, season stats, depth charts, flip cards, programs, game stats, post-game quotes and media guides for both teams.

With four minutes remaining on the game clock, media are invited to take the south elevator to ground level in preparation for the post-game press conference. BYU Head Coach Bronco Mendenhall and selected players will be available in the media room following the mandatory 10-minute cooling-off period. The BYU locker room is closed to all media.

Several courtesy telephones (with campus extensions) will be available in the working area of the press box, while a limited number of phones will be available in the media room. All phones are available on a first-come, first-serve basis. Phone lines can be purchased for your organization's exclusive use on a season-long basis. Collect or credit card calls can be made from each of these telephones.

The BYU press box is also equipped with high-speed internet access, including ethernet connections and wireless access.

PARKING

LaVell Edwards Stadium is located on the northwest corner of the BYU campus, just off Canyon Road (200 East) and University Parkway (1650 North) in Provo. Media parking is in Lot No. 2, immediately west of the stadium. Parking passes are required and must be obtained in advance.

INTERVIEWS

During the season, all player and coach interviews must be scheduled through Jeff Reynolds in the Athletic Communications office at (801) 422-8948. Interview requests must be made 24 hours in advance. Interviews with players and coaches may be conducted following selected practices during the week. Players and coaches will not be available for interview prior to practice. Telephone interviews, for out-of-town media, can be arranged through the Athletic Communications office. Interviews with players on the day prior to the game, as well as game day, are not permitted. No player interviews will be conducted during regular class hours.

WEB SITES

To have access to athletes, coaches, practice, games, etc., Internet sites must be held to the same professional standards required of traditional media. Website personnel must show caution, restraint and professional judgment in covering potential student-athletes and the recruiting process. Websites covering BYU recruiting must be familiar with and follow all NCAA rules. Proper judgment and an understanding of NCAA rules must be displayed at all times. Access will be determined on a case-by-case basis. Failure to adhere to the standards and regular media policies established by the BYU Athletic Communications office may result in the

loss of privileges. Live, real-time updates will not be permitted. Websites interested in seeking credentials or access should contact the Athletic Communications office for specific rules and guidelines.

SPORTS RADIO

All interviews must be arranged through the Athletic Communications office. The Athletic Communications office will not facilitate the broadcast of live guests during regular class hours. All interviews for sports talk radio must be conducted with players after practice or during the weekly media luncheon. Radio stations will be responsible for attending practices and for providing their own equipment (i.e. tape, digital recorders, telephones, etc). All sports talk radio stations will be issued one credential per home game.

WEEKLY MEDIA INTERVIEWS

Each Monday, Coach Mendenhall and selected players will be available for interview purposes from 10 a.m. until 11 a.m. in the Student Athlete Building. All live electronic interviews are for credentialed media only and must be arranged in advance with the Athletic Communications office. Coach Mendenhall will participate in the MWC weekly teleconference on Tuesdays, beginning at 11:12 p.m. (MT).

All credentials are the property of Brigham Young University and must be surrendered upon request.





MEDIA ATTENTION

From national publications to live television broadcasts, BYU football is one of the more visible programs in the country. Since its first national television appearance in 1974, BYU has posted a 57-42-2 record while playing in front of a national audience, including a 24-17 mark on ABC and a 28-23-2 mark on ESPN. Dating back to 1980, the Cougars have appeared on national television an average of three times per season. The Cougars have played at least five games on national TV over eleven different seasons, including the 2007, 2006, 2004, 2003, 2002, 2001, 2000, 1998, 1996, 1988 and 1985 seasons. Since 1980, BYU has played in at least one nationally-televised game per season. On Sept. 1, 1984, Robbie Bosco (right) led BYU to a 20-14 victory over Pitt in the first live ESPN College Football broadcast. In the 1990's, three out of the top 10 largest television audiences ever to watch a college football game on ESPN were BYU football games. In 2006, BYU was also the featured team in the first college football broadcast on Versus, another upcoming cable sports network. In that game BYU upset No.15 TCU 31-17 in front of a national television audience.
